TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chatham in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Chatham on Tuesday, the fourteenth (14th) day of March, next at 6:30 p.m. of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will allow a 2% discount on all property taxes paid within 30 days of mailing tax bill.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise \$100.00 for Civil Defense.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for Solid Waste Disposal (use of Fryeburg Dump).
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$228.80 for membership dues to North Country Council, Inc.
- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,062.50 as our share of Fryeburg Rescue.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$150.00 for the support of the Eastern Slope Airport Authority.
- 9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the support of Carroll County Mental Health.
- 10. To see if the Town of Chatham will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the support of the Children & Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley.

- 11. To see if the Town of Chatham will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$412.20 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1,80 per person in the Town of Chatham (229-based on 1987 census from the Office of State Planning).
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$132.00 for the support of the Community Action Outreach Program.
- 13. To respectfully request that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 in support of Carroll County against Domestic Violence and Rape.
- 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$100.00 for the Lovell Youth or Recreation Program.
- 15. To see if the Town of Chatham will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.95 for Children Unlimited, Inc., said sum being equal to \$.55 per person in the Town of Chatham.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,118.00 to the Saco Valley Fire Department as our share of operating expenses and truck and/or building fund.
- 17. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for a real estate tax lien procedure? These statutes provide that tax sales to private individuals for nonpayment of property taxes on real estate are replaced with a real estate tax lien procedure under which only a municipality or county where the property is located or the state may acquire a tax lien against land and buildings for unpaid taxes.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to instruct the town's representatives to the General Court to respond to our solid waste crisis by taking all necessary measures to insure that New Hampshire adopt legislation that will permit consumers to return for refund of deposit within New Hamshire all soda, beer, wine cooler and

liquor containers and that all unclaimed deposit monies shall be collected by the state and no less than 80% shall be returned annually to local municipalities for the sole purpose of implementing, expanding and reimbursing community recycling projects.

- 19. To see if the town will vote to have a complete revaluation by a private appraisal firm that has been approved by the Department of Revenue Administration. Revaluation to be completed for the tax year 1990, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for such purpose.
- 20. To see what action the Town will take on Budget shmittal by the Budget Committee.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden, and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your asistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989 the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, he uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. FRYEBURG RESCUE

To the Citizens of the Towns served by Fryeburg Rescue:

During 1988, Fryeburg Rescue made 358 runs, up 63 from 1987. This represents a 21% increase over the past year. With the growth of our areas, this increase attests to the needs now and those which will be present in the future. At present, we have 60 members of which 7 are junior rescue members. Emergency Medical Technicans represent 52% of our squad and Ambulance Attendants 48%. At present we have 12 EMT's who are certified as Defibrillation technicians.

Over 4300 man hours were contributed in 1988 making ambulance runs. In addition, 1988 saw 3200 man hours of training for our squad members. Just recently 6 members attended an all day workshop for Pediatric Emergencies. All rescue members must attend training in Hazardous Materials before October. We recognize that our area is unique in the number of dedicated non-paid volunteers we have who give so many hours of their time for the purpose of helping their fellow man.

Our Junior Rescue Program is going strong with seven young women involved this year. We are proud to say that of this group, four are planning nursing careers next year. Last year produced two young men who currently are training to become paramedics. A new advanced first aid class will begin in February for more interested young people and anyone in the community who desires to become trained in first aid. We thank Fryeburg Academy who has cooperated fully with us in this new junior program. It is nice to see the developing of interest in the medical fields once more.

During 1988 with the excellent contributions received, we were able to purchase a blood pressure/pulse monitor which will enable us to obtain accurate vital signs while moving in our ambulances. Also, a defibrillator/monitor will be ordered soon. With the age and mileage on our vehicles now, we will be in the process of fundraising for a new ambulance in the next year. Our request for funding from the towns has increased slightly this year due to the increased costs of medical supplies and the demands for safety precautions during treatment. We are mandated to use certain pieces of equipment and supplies now with the awareness of infectious diseases.

Rescue thanks all of you for your ongoing support. We hope that we can continue to provide the quality service you deserve. Thank you for helping us to help you.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

ANNUAL REPORT

In Chatham, the Council assisted the Planning Board in proposing a minimum lot size ordinance and establishing a new frontage requirement for the revised zoning ordinance. The Council also provided solid waste technical assistance and worked with the Carroll County Solid Waste Study Committee

Community planning assistance continues to dominate our staff resources. New state mandates and rapid residential and commercial growth throughout the region placed an increasing burden on local planning and zoning boards in 1988. Regional workshops, technical bulletins and newsletters, ordinance review and update, as well as review of specific subdivision and site plan applications are a sampling of the myriad services performed this year for our membership. The Council also co-sponsored the popular Municipal Law Lecture Series which reviewed new case law and other specific areas of legal interest to local officials.

In summary, it is important to understand that the North Country Council is organized and administered for the benefit of its constituents, local town governments. Our future success is, in large part, contingent upon your participation in Council activities. We rely on and appreciate involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

CHATHAM COMMUNITY LIBRARY

The Library began the year by being nearly torn apart because of the controversy about becoming a public library. Members rallied and Chatham Community Library remains a private library as it has been for our 38 years. The library began shortly before 1950 when a small group of ladies decided they needed a library. Books were donated, officers elected, dues paid and the library was born. It was housed in the members' homes, moved at one time into the Town House, Eastman School and in 1970 began its current home at the Chatham Center School which had been closed and the students transferred to Fryeburg schools.

Over the years the library has accumulated about 5,000 volumes in donations and purchases. Many town histories, geneaological material, crafts and local material is available along with fiction, for all ages.

Funding comes in part from the Town (\$200) and Mulford Fund (\$200) and the rest comes from dues and fund raising projects done by the library members each year. The Town of Chatham gives the library the use of the building relieving the library of costs of lights and heat. Other town groups meet there also. The library received a grant from the Henney Fund in Conway to have the town vital records photocopied, to buy a file cabinet and other preserving materials making the material available for family research. This year the library members sponsored two flea markets and a cake sale in the summer. In the fall a public pot luck supper was held at the Town House and was a tremendous success. Monies from the supper were earmarked for an atlas, a dictionary and some improvements (new shelves).

New books were donated by Judy Bailey, Marie Thompson, Sandy Dorner, Hilda Lusky, Louise Mann, Don MacPherson, Annie MacPherson, Donna Hennessey, Barbara Eastman, Maryann Eastman, Clara Eastman, Roberta Wilfong, Shirley Garland, Jean Curtis and Pauline Forbes. Memorial books were given by Hilda Lusky. Added to the approximately 150 books purchased this year the library is bigger and better.

Library hours have been extended this year and a new Childrens' Hour Program started.

From The School Subcommittee - S. Oppenheim, Chm. January 20, 1989

The subcommittee has investigated three possibilities for Chatham school age children. They are:

- (1) A Chatham owned and operated school for grades K-8.
- (2) An Interstate Pact between Chatham and MSAD #72.
- (3) Remain in our present tuition status to MSAD #72 and administrative status with SAU #9.

After studying the above options, the Committee finds that:

- (1) A Chatham owned and operated school appears feasible.
- (2) An interstate pact appears feasible; however, such pact has not been pursued due to present pending contract negotiations with MSAD #72.
- (3) The School Board is presently negotiating a five year contract with MSAD #72 and with Fryeburg Academy which will meet the immediate educational needs of Chatham at this time.

Article 12. To see if the School District will vote to authorize the Chatham School Board to negotiate a contract with Fryeburg Academy for the education of its students in grades 9-12.

AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

To the Members of the School Administrative Unit Board School Administrative Unit No. 9 Conway, New Hampshire

We have examined the general purpose financial statements of the School Administrative Unit No. 9 as of and for the year ended June 30, 1988, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the School Administrative Unit No. 9 at June 30, 1988, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The individual fund financial statements and schedule listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the School Administrative Unit Mo. 9. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.
