SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Route 9 Project

Well, all of the dust has settled, the trucks and heavy equipment are gone and perhaps it doesn't look so bad after all. However, the amount of traffic, speeding and reckless driving taking place on this vital highway have all increased beyond expectations.

Police Department

Twenty weeks were spent by our two full-time officers at the Police Academy this year for basic training. A big effort by all kept the salary budget from going over as the second ten week training period was hoped to occur in 1986. The Department appears to be running very smooth. Complaints have been limited mostly to those who have got caught. We are fortunate to have such a dedicated group of full and part-time professionals working for our safety. Please see the Police Department Report for additional information.

Safer Local Roads

As you are aware, we have had stop signs installed at most intersections throughout town. First, we would encourage you to use them like your life depended on it. Secondly, please report any theft or destruction of these or any other road signs. They are put up for your protection and they cost you money.

Over the years we have made the gravel roads in our town wider and smoother and all but a few are open year round. Because of this, use of the road network has increased as has the speed at which the vehicles travel on them. In 1986 we will address the problems of sight distance in some areas and speed in general.

Road Work

Tuttle, Edgar and Lincoln Roads are all under construction and should be completed in 1986. Whenever possible it's best to let the new roadbed set for a winter and let Mother Nature compact it her way.

Also in 1986 we will be working on the upper Gulf Road in two areas to remove blind spots as well as resurfacing Wilde Road, Wellington Drive, Sugar Maple Lane, Edgar Road, Poor Road and a section on Maple Road. Please see the Road Agent's Report for more detail.

Hearing Attendance

Public hearings are held to allow the public the opportunity to contribute to the planning process of the group holding the hearing. At a hearing usually one of the board members will present the subject of the meeting while the rest of the board members listen to the public response. This system falls apart when a hearing is poorly attended. We have had several hearings where the board members and public officials outnumber the public. Your affect on the subject can be greater at a hearing than at the voting booth. Please make a greater effort in 1986.

Health Officer

This office has been vacant for over a year now. The duties have been carried out by the Selectmen during that time. This is a fine job for someone who wants to get involved in town affairs, but does not have a lot of time to spare. If you're interested, please contact our office. We can use your help.

Master Plan

The first phase in the Master Plan was completed in December in time to comply with the State law. More work has to be done this year to complete the plan. You'll notice an increase in the planning budget to cover the costs associated with professional assistance on completing the plan.

Transfer Station

The death of our good friend Larry Taylor has not only left a void in our hearts but in our operations here as well. As time goes on we are finding that his assistance to the community went far beyond the gates of the Transfer Station.

Rubbish is becoming quite an issue to be dealt with. Gerry Scanlan, Joan Dittrich and Dick Wolf have been working at a regional level to solve the disposal problem. We are looking for a decision by the regional district this

year on burning or burying the refuse. During 1986 we will address the collection part of the operation so that it can mesh well with the regional solution.

Short Notes

Gerry Scanlan completed assessing school in July and has settled into the chores of the Selectmen's office.

Frank Dean has recovered from his illness and has returned to the Highway Department on a part-time basis.

Prudence Mitchell is back in full swing after her illness.

Our Town

Our town consists of three distinct villages, three separate Fire Departments, and is defined by six zip codes, two telephone exchanges and is quartered by two State Highways. Part of our population is drawn West to work and shop in Brattleboro, while the rest go East to Keene for those purposes.

The problems associated with the above, plus the potential of the explosive growth we face, will certainly give us all something to work on during 1986

Our town's true market value at year's end is about \$100 million, a milestone for us, which is \$30 million more (43%) than the 1980 base year.

So bear with each other as we continue to grow and experience those pains of growth.

WARRANT

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon (Polls close at 8:00PM) to ballot for Town officers and other questions required by law to be decided by ballot.

The business meeting will be called to order at 6:30 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To vote an Australian Ballot for all necessary Town officers.

ARTICLE 2. To vote by Ballot on Amendments to the Zoning Ordinance.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to allow a 2% discount on real estate taxes paid in full up to fourteen (14) days (inclusive) of the postmarked date of the tax bill, or act in any other way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Tax Collector to receive prepayment of Resident and Property taxes prior to the issuing of a Warrant, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will Authorize the Selectmen to borrow money upon the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$676,695.00, for the following purposes as recommended by the Budget Committee, or act in any way relating thereto:

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$16,400.00 for the construction and reconstruction of Town roads, or to act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,000.00 for tarring Town roads, or to act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to be added to the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any other way relating thereto. (\$30,000.00 Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend from the Revenue Sharing Account a sum of money not to exceed \$14,500.00 for the purpose of renovating the North Shore Beach property or act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,503.00 to be added to the Parks and Recreation Building Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way relating thereto. (Said sum represents a portion of the income over expenses generated by Parks and Recreation in 1985.) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for a 4" hose truck with pump for the CFD, or act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to expend from the Revenue Sharing Account a sum of money not to exceed \$2,500.00 for the purpose of purchasing a copier for the Library, or act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,500.00 for a Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, or act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for an Auditing Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund, or act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,037.00 to aid Home Health Care and Community Services, or to act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to fund the Meals-On-Wheels program for elderly and handicapped shut-in citizens of Chesterfield, or to act in any way relating thereto. Sponsored through Home Health Care and Community Services. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,047.20 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or to act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the support of the United Way as follows:

Windham County United Way	\$250.00
Monadnock United Way	\$250.00

or to act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to have the work of the Old Home Day Committee, as established in 1985, continue for the 1986 celebration, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the 1986 Old Home Day Celebration. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$192.00 to support the work of the Windham Youth Services, or act in any way relating thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to establish a Committee of five (5) to study the ordinances dealing with the discharging of firearms within the Town of Chesterfield and other ordinances regarding the same. (By petition)

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept a road known as Extension to Mountain Road at such time as all requirements have been met and approved by the Selectmen and Road agent. (By petition)

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to adopt written welfare guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen and permit the Selectmen to amend said guidelines as the need arises, or act in any way relating thereto. Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985 requires the Town to adopt written welfare guidelines prior to April 1, 1986. (Copies of the full text of the proposed guidelines are on file with the Town Clerk.)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept a parcel of land presently belonging to Michael and Bridget LeClaire being the fire pond located on the corner of Old Chesterfield Road and Horseshoe Road, or to act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to cost-share with landowners the expense of them hiring a professional forester to oversee timber harvests on their lands within the Town, or act in any way relating thereto. Said cost-share amount shall be determined by the Selectmen and shall not exceed 10% of the actual timber yield tax revenues paid by the landowner to the Town.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal, or other government unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b, or to act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed by Public Auction or advertised sealed bid, and upon such terms and conditions as they deem appropriate, or to act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building Regulations pursuant to RSA 156-A as follows:

Add a new Section 13.14. FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, and rescind regulations previously adopted by Town Meetings of 1983 and 1984.

The following regulations shall apply to all lands designated as flood hazard areas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in its "Flood Insurance Study for the Town of Chesterfield, NH" together with the associated Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Flood Boundary and Floodway maps of the Town of Chesterfield, NH dated April 2, 1986 which are declared to be a part of this Ordinance.

1. All proposed development in any special flood hazard area shall require a permit. The term "development" is defined to mean "any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including, but not limited to, buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations." The permit shall be issued by the Planning Board after review of the development plan as either a subdivision and/or site plan. The permit shall be entitled "Flood Hazard Development Permit".

2. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements (meaning any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the structure either (a) before the improvement or repair is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged, and is being restored, before the damage occurred, to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including pre-fabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure; (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage; and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

The term "substantial improvement" does not include either:

a) any project for improvement of a structure in order to comply with existing State or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions, or

b) any alteration of a structure listed on the National Register of Historic Places or a State Inventory of Historic Places.

3. Where new and replacement water and sewer systems (including on-site systems) are proposed in flood-prone areas, the applicant shall provide the Planning Board with assurance that new and replacement sanitary sewage systems will be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and on-site waste disposal systems be located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding.

4. The Selectmen shall maintain for public inspection and furnish upon request, any certification of flood-proofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been flood-proofed, the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was flood-proofed. This information must be furnished by the applicant when applying for a Flood Hazard Development Permit.

5. The Planning Board shall review proposed developments to assure that all necessary permits have been applied for and/or received from those governmental agencies for which approval is required by Federal or State law, including Section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1334. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to certify these assurances to the Planning Board.

6. In riverine situations, prior to the alteration or relocation of a watercourse, the applicant for such authorization shall notify the N.H. Office of State Planning and Wetlands Board and submit copies of such notification to the Planning Board and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Further, the applicant shall be required to submit copies of said notification to those adjacent communities as determined by the Planning Board.

Within the altered or relocated portion of any watercourse, the applicant shall submit to the Planning Board, certification provided by a registered professional engineer assuring that the flood carrying capacity of the watercourse has been maintained.

The following requirements shall apply in specific zones designated on the Flood Insurance Rate Maps:

7. In unnumbered "A" zones, as defined on the community's Flood Insurance Rate Map, the Planning Board shall obtain, review, and reasonably utilize any 100 year flood elevation data available from a Federal, State, or other source, as criteria for requiring that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100 year flood level, and (ii) that all new construction and substantial improvements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or flood-proofed to or above the 100 year flood level. The Planning Board may require the applicant seeking a Flood Hazard Development Permit to provide the 100 year flood elevation data.

8. Mobile homes to be placed within Zone A shall be installed using methods and practices which minimize flood damage. For the purposes of this requirement, mobile homes must be elevated and anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement. Methods of anchoring may include, but are not to be limited to, use of over-the-top or frame ties to ground anchors. This requirement is in addition to applicable State and local anchoring requirements for resisting wind forces.

ARTICLE 32. To see if the Town will vote to accept the amount of \$1,600.00 to establish a trust fund to be known as the Chesterfield P.T.A. Scholastic Award, or act in any way relating thereto. The interest of this fund to be awarded annually, beginning in June, 1987, to the Keene High School graduating senior with the highest academic ranking, who resides in Chesterfield, who graduated from Chesterfield Elementary School, and who intends to further his or her education. The amount of the award to be determined by the Trustees of the Trust Funds, the student recipient to be selected by the principal of Keene High School, and the award to be presented by a member of the Chesterfield School Board at the appropriate time. Additions may be made to this fund from time to time.

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will vote to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Chesterfield and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the US Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the Governor of New Hampshire, the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, and to the President of the United States. (By petition)

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will adopt a resolution, as it has for the past four years, urging the Presidents of the United States of America and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to use any and all peaceful means to request and encourage those nations to enact an immediate and mutual freeze on the production, testing and deployment of nuclear weapons and nuclear weapons delivery systems; and subsequently for both nations to engage in a mutual reduction of such weapons and delivery systems; provided that such freeze and reduction include such safeguards as are necessary and reasonable to ensure mutual and mutually verifiable compliance on the parts of both nations. (By petition)

ARTICLE 35. To see if the Town will vote to create a cemetery maintenance trust fund, to be known as the Chesterfield Cemetery Maintenance Fund, the income of which is to be used for the care, maintenance, and improvement of the public cemeteries in the Town of Chesterfield, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following with the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Spofford Annex Cemetery and to be known as follows:

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TOWN MEETING 1985

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 12, 1985.

At 10 o'clock in the forenoon, James Milani rang the town hall bell signalling the opening of the polls. The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Carl A. Johnson, who read the warrant through Articles One and Two and declared the polls open for voting for town officers and amendments to the Zoning and Building Ordinances.

At 6:30PM the town hall bell was rung and the Moderator called the meeting to order with Warren Allen and Ethel Mills as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Clerk, respectively.

Reverend Harold Hawlk, Pastor of the Asbury United Methodist Church, offered prayer.

The Moderator stipulated that this was the 218th town meeting of the Town of Chesterfield.

The following resolution presented by James Milani was seconded in mass and unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, Robert T. Mills, Jr. well and faithfully served the citizens of the Town of Chesterfield, as Constable from 1964 to 1976, and as Chief of Police from 1976 to 1984; and

Robert T. Mills, Jr. is primarily responsible for the improvement and enhancement of police protection in this Town from the previous system of three part-time constables to the professional department we have today; and

Robert T. Mills, Jr. retired on August 18, 1984 from his more than twenty years of life-on-the-line service to the citizens of the Town of Chesterfield;

Now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That this Town Meeting of March 12, 1985 be gratefully and respectfully dedicated to Robert T. Mills, Jr.; and

That this resolution become a part of the permanent records of this Town; and

That a copy of this resolution be presented to him.

At the conclusion of the presentation, Bob was given a standing ovation.

The Moderator introduced the town officials to those in attendance.

ARTICLE 3. A motion was made by James Milani and seconded by John Leahy to raise and appropriate the sum of \$186,000.00 to construct a new Highway Garage and authorize the Selectmen, under Municipal Finance Act, RSA 33 et sec., to borrow \$136,000.00, said loan to be repaid within four (4) years. \$50,000.00 will be paid out of the 1985 taxes.

Voting was by paper ballot on a motion made by James Milani and supported by George Wright to amend the article to read, "to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000.00 to construct a new Highway Garage and authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$150,000.00 with \$50,000.00 paid out of the 1985 taxes. The result of the vote was:

84 "Yes"

75 "NO"

Without the necessary 2/3 majority, the Moderator declared the motion lost.

ARTICLE 4. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Merton Yeaton and supported by JoAnn Morse to allow a 2% discount on real estate taxes paid in full up to fourteen (14) days (inclusive) of the postmarked date of the tax bill, or act in any other way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 5. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Lawrence Thomas and seconded by Paul Welcome to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money upon the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 6. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by James Milani and seconded by Alfred Burley to authorize the appointment of a Deputy Treasurer pursuant to RSA:41:29a, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 7. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by James Milani and supported by John Schreiver to elect two (2) Auditors for terms of office pursuant to RSA:41:32a, (staggered 2 year terms) said election of auditors to take place at the 1986 annual Town Meeting, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 8. The report of the Budget Committee was given by Robert Beard in lieu of the Chairman, Paul Boroski, who was absent.

ARTICLE 9. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by Darrell Chase to raise and appropriate the sum of \$571,300.00 for the following purposes as recommended by the Budget Committee, or act in any way relating thereto:

ARTICLE 26. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Jane Allen and supported by Susan Newcomer to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 to aid Home Health Care and Community Services, or to act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 27. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Susan Newcomer and supported by Jane Allen to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to fund the Meals-On-Wheels program for elderly and handicapped shut-in citizens of Chesterfield, or to act in any way relating thereto. Sponsored through Home Health Care and Community Services.

ARTICLE 28. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Judith Johnson and seconded by Judith Palmer to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,919.25 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or to act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 29. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Gary Winn and seconded by JoAnn Morse to pass over this article.

A voice vote was in the affirmative on motion made by Susan Newcomer and seconded by Beth-Ann Betz to reconsider Article 29.

A voice vote was in the affirmative on motion made by Susan Newcomer and supported by Glenn Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the United Way as follows:

ARTICLE 30. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Judith Johnson and supported by Beth-Ann

ARTICLE 31. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Glenn Chickering and seconded by Russell Johnson to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the 1985 Old Home Day Celebration.

ARTICLE 32. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Audrey Ericson and seconded by Karen Ericson to have the Selectmen appoint eight (8) people to work with the Chesterfield Historical Society as an Old Home Day Committee.

ARTICLE 33. A vote by paper ballot was unanimous on a motion made by Joan Dittrich and supported by Richard Wolf to accept the provisions of RSA 53-B:1 to 11 inclusive providing for the establishment of a regional refuse disposal district, together with the towns of Fitzwilliam, Gilsum, Harrisville, Hinsdale, Marlborough, Nelson, Roxubry, Surry, Swanzey, Troy and Westmoreland and the City of Keene, and the construction, maintenance, and operation of a regional refuse disposal facility by said district in accordance with the provisions of a proposed agreement filed with the Selectmen or the Mayor. There were 77 "Yes" votes.

ARTICLE 34. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Jane Allen and seconded by Susan Newcomer to allow the Cemetery Commission to sell the unused tool shed at Spofford Cemetery. All proceeds from sale to go into establishment of a new trust fund for general care and maintenance of older sections of Spofford Cemetery.

ARTICLE 35. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Audrey Ericson and supported by Carolyn Wiggin to allow the Selectmen to act in their behalf in arranging the transfer of property presently used as a parking lot of the United Methodist Church to the Asbury United Methodist Church. The Church agrees to pay all fees necessary in the line adjustment that must take place to accomplish this.

ARTICLE 36. A voice vote was in the affirmative on an amendment made by James Milani and seconded by Thomas Woodman to allow the Selectmen to transfer ownership of the Highway Department's army truck to the Chesterfield Fire Department.

ARTICLE 37. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Gary Winn and Seconded by Robert Hall to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and

expend money from the state, federal, or other government unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 38. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Gary Winn and supported by Joan O'Neil to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed by Public Auction or advertised sealed bid, and upon such terms and conditions as they deem appropriate, or to act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 39. A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and supported by William Mitchell to discontinue the old sections of the following roads:

Holman Hill Road - from Route 9 to Tuttle Road

REPORT OF THE CHESTERFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT

1985

To the Townspeople of Chesterfield:

1985 brought many changes to the Police Department. Both Al Morse, who was hired in April as our second full-time Officer, and I attended the 10 week Police Academy which is held in Concord. I attended the 70th session in the Spring and Sgt. Morse attended the 72nd session, held this past Fall. We will both attest to the fact that a vacation it was not.

In order to provide the coverage for the Town we added two part-time officer's to our ranks. Both James VanOudenhove and Joseph Willis have been assets to the Department. With their additions, we now have five part-time officer's. They are used to fill the four empty shifts during the week and to fill in for such things as sick leave, vacation, or added patrols during heavy weekends, holidays, etc.

1985 also was the year of completion of the Route 9 project. In checking with State Highway planners I learned that we have the busiest highway, on a daily basis, in both Cheshire and Sullivan counties. On average, 8,500 vehicles cross through Chesterfield a day. This has meant a dramatic increase in our activity without an increase in our patrols. As the City of Keene and the Town of Brattleboro continue growing, I am sure that the activity will increase proportionally.

In addition to the increases in Motor Vehicle activity we also experienced a large increase in our criminal activity. We went from 67 cases in 1984 to 113 cases in 1985. I attribute a large share of this increase to the extremely transient nature of the traffic on Route 9. I back this with the fact that, of our last twenty criminal arrests, only four were residents or had ties to the Town of Chesterfield. It is for this reason that I would ask anyone observing unusual or suspicious activity to contact us through Mutual Aid in Keene. As you know, we cannot be everywhere at once and the more eyes and ears that we have on our side, the more effective we can be. Your report will be held in the strictest confidence possible.

It is our desire to continue to improve in 1986. Training for the Officers is one of the highest priorities. This becomes more important as the job becomes more complex. I would also like to see more DWI arrests. With Brattleboro sitting just across the river with it's 50 or

so bars and restaurants, this is becoming more of a problem. The one area in which we were able to reduce the numbers on was accidents. We went from 100 in 1984 to 73 in 1985. By maintaining our enforcement of the traffic laws I am hopeful to see a further reduction in 1986.

At this time I would like to state that if any of you would like to meet with me to discuss a problem or to bring something to my attention, I would be more than happy to meet with you. I would especially like to receive some input from you on any special programs that you might like to see implemented. If you have suggestions, please feel free to call me.

CHESTERFIELD PLANNING BOARD

The Board met monthly during 1985, normally on the first Monday of each month. The following applications were processed:

- 12 Subdivisions - 33 lots
- 3 Site Plan Reviews
- 6 Boundary Line Adjustments
- 2 Petitions for zoning amendments

In addition, the Planning Board met on many occasions and devoted a considerable amount of time on the Comprehensive Master Plan. The sections written included Goals and Objectives, Existing Land Use, and Future Land Use. These were subsequently adopted after a public hearing. For the first time in it's history, the Town has a future land use plan, in narrative and map form, to be utilized in the preparation of new zoning and subdivision regulations. These development regulations will be addressed by the Board in 1986.

In 1985 James Milani was appointed as a regular member of the Board, replacing Pat McNamara, who resigned. Pat was formerly Chairman of the Planning Board.

Planning Board meetings are open to the public and we urge your participation in the matters of interest to the residents of Town.

CEMETERY COMMISSION REPORT

The Commission has taken an important step towards its goal of having all cemetery work funded by Trust Fund income. A warrant article before the 1986 Town Meeting would establish a general cemetery maintenance fund, the income of which can be used for the up-keep and improvement of all of the public cemeteries in town. In the past, perpetual care trust funds for individual lots were created. These funds could only be used for the care of those lots. If this warrant article is accepted, a portion of the revenue from lot sales will be added to this fund instead of creating an individual trust fund. The lot owner's contribution to this fund will be recorded and recognized. A petition to the Superior Court of New Hampshire by the Trustees of the Trust Funds of the Town of Chesterfield has resulted in permission to use the excess income from individual trust funds for the general care of the cemetery to which a particular trust applies. This will also result in an increase in the amount of Trust Fund income available each year for the care of the cemeteries.

Several acts of vandalism occurred in our cemeteries in 1985. The most serious was to the Draper/Crouch Burying-Ground in Hardscrabble. All of the stones were knocked down; the sign was torn down. The sign was recovered and replaced. The stones have been righted and repaired. Our thanks to Walter Calkins of West Swanzey, who alerted us to the damage and also checked our other remote cemeteries for damage (there was none). The Field Burying-Ground was also hit by vandals who knocked over several stones, and stole several footstones and the sign. The stones have been righted and repaired. If anyone has any information on either of these episodes, they should contact a member of the Commission or the Chief of Police.

Beginning with the 1986 season, the care of the cemeteries will become a function of the Town Highway Department. The responsibility for the care of the cemeteries will still rest with the Cemetery Commissioners; however, the work will be done by Highway Department employees. This will simplify bookkeeping, payroll, and full time employment. Alvin Davis, as head of the Highway Department, will assume the position of Sexton. We are confident that the excellent level of care of our cemeteries will continue.

The Commission would like to thank retiring Sexton David Hall for the fine job that he has done during his five years as Sexton. During those five years, the 23 cemeteries for which the town cares have been restored. Countless stones have been reset and repaired; tons of leaves and brush removed; walls and gates have been rebuilt...all thanks to Dave and his crew. His genuine concern for the care and preservation of our cemeteries has given us all a new pride and respect for these properties.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT - 1985

During 1985 the Commission met 14 times.

In April we welcomed new member Bill Henry, who fills the vacancy left by the resignation of Will Vogeley, long-time Commission member and Treasurer, whose contributions have been much appreciated.

In September the Commission regretfully accepted the resignation of Marty Mahoney, Recreation Director since the Commission's founding in 1974. We are most grateful to Marty for managing Ware's Grove Beach and the summer recreation program with efficiency, style and committment.

In late November, from a field of six candidates who answered our Sentinel advertisement, the Commission hired Wendy A. Chamberlin (formerly Wendy Kelly) as new Director.

Our meetings this year have focused on:

(a) Establishing similar fees and procedures at both town operated beaches;

(b) Upgrading of the N. Shore Beach; and

(c) Continued planning for a new building at the edge of Ware's Grove Beach (for more accessible rest rooms and concession counter). As the amount in our Building Capital Reserve fund is still so small, and construction so far in the future, we did not use the funds voters allotted us for architect's fees at last year's Town Meeting (Article 17), but drew up preliminary plans of our own for this project.

We continue to offer a 2-day-a-week, 8-week summer recreation program for local young people at Ware's Grove or Chesterfield School.

Our weekly summer films on Ware's Grove Beach were attended by over 300 residents last summer.

Total attendance at Ware's Grove Beach reached 23,291 last summer. We are noticing that since 1983 non-resident attendance has remained constant, while resident attendance has declined.

We continue to support the Chesterfield Youth Baseball Program and appreciate the work of its volunteer coaches and its 1985 co-ordinators, Diana Allen and Bob Yacubian. In the coming year we hope to add our support to the Chesterfield Pee Wee Soccer Program, organized by Klaus and Harriet Knappe.

We are grateful to Boy Scout Troop 286 and their leaders for pre-season maintenance work at N. Shore Beach last May; to the Spofford General Store men's baseball team and their sponsor, David Dennis, for labor in repair of the David G. Ericson Memorial bleachers on the ball field; and to Tom Chase, for labor on the new water bubbler at Ware's Grove.

Commission members welcome citizens' comments on the operation of town beaches and recreation programs. Our meetings are posted and are open to the public.

CHESTERFIELD HOME HEALTH AGENCY, INC.

ANNUAL REPORT - 1985

The Chesterfield Home Health Agency is in its eleventh year of providing the citizens of Chesterfield with care of the sick or disabled and the rehabilitation of such persons through nursing care and other therapeutic services at home. The Agency also promotes good health in the inhabitants of Chesterfield through nursing services and various programs and clinics.

The 1985 Annual Meeting was held in April with Susan Ashworth, Director of Senior Services at Home Health Care and Community Services, showing a videotape on the program offered by her organization and describing the services available to our residents. Your Agency tries to keep a check on those who might need health assistance in the homes of Chesterfield and urges our residents to refer any such persons to Home Health Care and Community Services by calling our local office, 363-4337, and leaving a message or calling the main office in Keene, 352-4309 or 357-2593. Recent review has brought out the fact that Chesterfield has a large number of widows living alone. Residents are asked to do neighborly checks and be of assistance if at all possible.

In fiscal 1985 our Agency made a donation of \$500.00 towards the furnishings needed at the new office of Home Health Care and Community Services in the Island Mill Complex.

We have lost three directors this year. Timothy Jordan and Martha Fuller have resigned, and Herta Schoefman has moved out of town.

Your Agency is most appreciative of the support from the town over the past eleven years, and hopes it will continue in the coming years. In 1986 the Annual Meeting will be on Tuesday, April 15, at 7:30PM, at the Chesterfield Town Hall. We urge all to attend and participate in a round-table discussion on "Chesterfield's Care Bears", those responsible for the well being of the residents of Chesterfield. We hope to have at this meeting representatives of the town officers, fire departments, emergency medical technicians, police department, school health department and the home health agency.

- ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to purchase 500 feet of 4-inch hose with couplings and 500 feet of 1-3/4 inch blitz line with couplings and nozzle.

ARTICLE 7: To see if the District will vote to establish a Building Committee to look into the needs of the Spofford Village Hall. Said Committee to be appointed by the Moderator and comprised of 1 Commissioner, 2 Firemen and 4 members of the District. Said Committee will report to the Commissioners on or by September 1, 1986.

ARTICLE 8: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

MINUTES OF THE 1985

SPOFFORD FIRE DISTRICT MEETING

ARTICLE 1: To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 2: To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency.

ARTICLE 3: To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1986-87 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for the purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

ARTICLE 4: To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.

ARTICLE 5: To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000.00 to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established by the district on March 9, 1985 under Article 5 for the expansion of the Chesterfield School and for the purchase of equipment of a lasting character to be placed in such school or school addition.

**THE KEENE AUTHORIZED REGIONAL ENROLLMENT AREA PLAN
AMONG THE SCHOOL DISTRICTS OF
CHESTERFIELD, HARRISVILLE, KEENE, MARLOW, NELSON,
STODDARD, AND WESTMORELAND**

This amendment to the 1966 A.R.E.A. Agreement is entered into pursuant to Chapter 195-A of the New Hampshire Statutes Annotated, as amended, among the School Districts of Chesterfield, Harrisville, Keene, Nelson, and Westmoreland, and as enlarged to include Marlow and Stoddard on February 6, 1973. This agreement shall be deemed to replace its predecessor 1966 A.R.E.A. agreement.

A. NAME

The name of the Authorized Regional Enrollment AREA School shall be the Keene High School, located in Keene.

The Chesterfield School District, Harrisville School District, Marlow School District, Nelson School District, Stoddard School District, and the Westmoreland School District shall be the sending districts, and the Keene School District shall be the receiving district, and together they shall form the region which shall be served by the AREA School. The receiving district shall be responsible for grades nine through twelve.

B. PURPOSE

To assure every member of the Keene High School student body equal access to all educational programs and opportunities, membership rights, and responsibilities independent of their home community. To provide long-term security for member districts by establishing a guarantee that the sending districts will send, and the Keene School District will receive students.

To provide a broader range of program offerings for students than would otherwise be financially feasible for individual school districts.

To share equitably the costs of education at Keene High School among the districts involved in this plan.

To provide a mechanism for sending districts to actively participate in the evaluation and planning of programs at Keene High School.

C. QUALITY OF EDUCATION

The Keene School District guarantees to own and operate a fully approved high school consistent with the standards as defined by the laws of the State of New Hampshire for the education of its own and sending district students, grades nine through twelve.

D. STUDENT ORIENTATION/GUIDANCE SERVICES

Guidance services will be made available to grade eight pupils of the sending districts for ninth grade placement and subject placement.

E. PUPIL REGULATIONS

It is understood that the same pupil regulations will apply to the students from the sending districts as to those of the receiving district.

F. REPORTS PROVIDED

All member district boards will have access to educational records for legitimate educational purposes for pupils residing within their districts, all in accordance with the Federal Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, also known as the Buckley Amendment, Public Law 93-380 (20 USC S. 1232g.). All member districts will have access to educational records, with no identification of individual students, for the purpose of conducting evaluations of school programs.

G. EXCEPTIONS FOR ENROLLMENT

Keene High School shall be deemed the assigned school for all resident pupils of a member district attending high school. Exemptions from attendance at Keene High School shall be determined in accordance with state law in existence at the time of the request for exemption.

H. SENDING DISTRICT PARTICIPATION IN KEENE BOARD ACTIVITIES

The A.R.E.A. sending district boards will elect, collectively, one representative to serve on each of the standing committees of the Keene Board of Education outlined in their Manual of Operation as voting members in all advisory matters. Sending district representatives may be excluded from standing committee meetings held in executive session. The decision to exclude shall rest with the standing committee membership, and shall be recorded in the minutes of the meeting. All sending district board members are encouraged to attend all standing committee meetings and meetings of the Keene Board of Education.

I. PURPOSE AND FREQUENCY OF A.R.E.A. MEETINGS

There shall be annually at least two joint meetings of the Chesterfield, Harrisville, Keene, Marlow, Nelson, Stoddard, and Westmoreland school boards for the purpose of consulting and advising regarding any matters of joint interest. These meetings will be educationally oriented and will provide opportunities for the sending district boards to become better involved with the program of studies at Keene High School and its administrative procedures.

J. COMPUTATION OF TUITION RATES; NOTIFICATION AND PAYMENT DUE DATES

The tuition rate shall be established by the Keene Board of Education by November 15, for the subsequent school year. The rate shall be the estimated net operating expenses of the high school for the current school year divided by the estimated average daily membership for the current school year. The operating expenses shall not include the cost of pupil

transportation (except for athletics and field trips), expenses reimbursed by federal or state governments, the cost of capital equipment purchased using capital reserve funds derived from surpluses in the high school's budget as determined by the comparison of the actual expenditures to the estimated expenditures used in the tuition calculation, the cost of debt service and any costs which are specifically designated for Keene resident students (e.g. special education tuition, tutoring, etc.). Certain revenue, such as rental income offsetting high school expenses, vocational school tuition, tuition from patrons, and athletic fees, shall be deducted from the operating expenses to arrive at the net operating expenses. In addition to the tuition rate, each sending district will be responsible for any costs which are specifically designated for such sending district's resident students, e.g. special education services not included in the tuition calculation.

The per pupil rental charge of 2% of the estimated replacement costs of the high school facility shall be added to the tuition rate to arrive at the full charge. The receiving district shall bill the sending districts on a semi-annual basis and the sending districts shall pay said tuition on a semi-annual basis not later than February 1, and June 21. The tuition for a pupil who attends a portion of the full school year shall be the product of the daily rate and his average daily membership.

K. SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

In case of disagreement as to the interpretation or application of this agreement, such controversy shall be submitted in writing to the State Board of Education which, after notice and hearing, shall make a decision.

L. METHOD OF AMENDMENT

Amendments to the within Agreement, to include, without limitation, withdrawal/addition/substitution of member districts, changes in grades covered by the plan, or other changes in the rights and responsibilities of the member districts, shall be governed by the provisions of law then in force.

M. DATE OF OPERATING RESPONSIBILITY

This agreement was developed using the amendment process defined in Article J of the Keene A.R.E.A. Plan of 1966.

It shall become effective on July 1, 1986. This agreement shall continue in force until modified or amended by the member districts involved through the application of appropriate provisions of law. Review of this agreement shall be conducted periodically at intervals not exceeding twenty years.

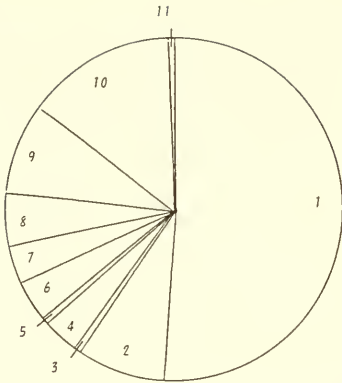

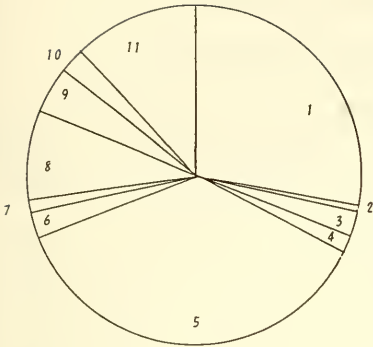

CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

MARCH 9, 1985

The Clerk, Diana S. Allen, gave the oath of Assistant Moderator to Warren Allen. Mr. Allen opened the polls at 10:00AM for voting. The following persons were appointed as Ballot Clerks and took the oath of office from the Clerk: Marilyn Taylor, Karen Krak, Michael Wiggin, Jane Allen, Sandra Wiggin, and Joanne Morse.

At 8:00PM the Moderator, Michael Bentley, called the meeting to order for the purpose of acting on the articles in the warrant. The Moderator introduced officials of S.A.U. #29, the Chesterfield School Board, and Mr. Robert Johnson, principal of Chesterfield School.

The Moderator recognized Warren Allen who made a motion to dispense with the reading of the warrant and to read each article as it is taken up. Seconded by James O'Neil. The Moderator declared the voice vote to be carried in the affirmative.

Articles in the warrant were disposed of as follows:

ARTICLE 1: Warren Allen moved that all reports contained in the Chesterfield Annual School District Report be approved as printed. Seconded by Richard Wolf. The Moderator declared a voice vote carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2: Diane McGilvray moved and James O'Neil, Jr. seconded the motion that the district authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. The voice vote was declared by the Moderator to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3: Beverly Wolf moved that the District authorize the school board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1985-1986 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for the purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money. Second by Richard Wolf. Voice vote declared by the Moderator to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 4: Susan B. Newcomer moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,427,992 for the support of schools for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Terry Wiggin. With no discussion, the motion passed unanimously in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5: Cornelia Jenness moved and Susan Newcomer seconded that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000 for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund for the expansion of the Chesterfield School and for the purchase of equipment of a lasting character to be placed in such school or school addition.

Elizabeth Benjamin moved to amend the article to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100,000 for the establishment of a Capital Reserve Fund for the expansion of the Chesterfield School and for the purchase of equipment of a lasting character to be placed in such school or school addition. Seconded by James Milani. After a lengthy discussion, Mrs. Benjamin withdrew her amendment as did James Milani his second.

The Moderator, after being presented a petition for a vote by paper ballot on ARTICLE 5, asked registered voters to cast their ballots. The article passed with 86 yes votes, 34 no votes.

James Milani moved that the Meeting accept the following motion: If the Department of Revenue Administration (or any other body having similar authority) for any reason should rule invalid the motion for the \$200,000 capital reserve fund contribution that we just passed, the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110,000 for said school addition. Second by Susan Newcomer.

ARTICLE 6: Terry Wiggin moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000 for the purpose of hiring an architect to prepare preliminary plans and cost estimates for the construction of an addition to the Chesterfield School. Seconded by Richard Wolf.

Elizabeth Benjamin moved to amend Article 6 to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the purpose of hiring an architect to prepare preliminary plans and cost estimates for the construction of an addition to the Chesterfield School. Second by James Milani. The Moderator declared the voice vote carried in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 7: David Smith moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the purpose of

bringing water to the Chesterfield Ball Field. Second by Elizabeth Benjamin. Voice vote was declared by the Moderator to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8: Elizabeth Benjamin made the following statement: We would like the record to report that the Chesterfield School District is appreciative of the time and effort that David Smith has given in filling out the unexpired school board term of office and that we express that appreciation by a standing ovation. The meeting responded with a standing ovation for Mr. Smith.

Ruth VanHouten moved that this incoming board immediately appoint one board member as an education chairperson, said chairperson to be an advocate of education and be available for teachers and parents to have dialogue on educational programs including curriculum, materials, and that this board immediately direct itself to do whatever is necessary to expand to a five person board and establish chairmanships for each member with suggested areas of expertise to be education, SAU #29 AREA, transportation, building facilities, and finance. Seconded by George Wright. After some discussion, Mrs. VanHouten agreed to amend the article, dropping the section referring to a five person school board. Seconded by George Wright. The Moderator declared the motion defeated on a voice vote.

James Milani moved, and Michael Wiggin seconded, that the meeting be adjourned at 10:15PM. Motion was declared carried in the affirmative who also declared the polls closed.

The official town check list was used for the elections of 1762 eligible voters, 226 cast ballots. 223 ballots were cast at the ballot box, with 3 absentee votes.

ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

Chesterfield has every reason to be proud of its school. Students are achieving well, teachers are improving curriculum, citizens are working hard to improve space problems, and voters have shown support at the polls.

The California Achievement Tests in Grades 3-8, completed recently as part of the State's testing program, shows students achieving well. Skill development in reading, language arts, and math are above the median national percentiles in all grades tested.

Under Mr. Johnson's leadership, your teachers have become a strong team of professionals who deserve much of the credit for the school's success. Their recent work on curriculum is just another example of their fine efforts.

Hard work by the Chesterfield School Building Committee has resulted in schematic drawings by the firm of LaVallee and Brensinger. This year the committee has focused on involvement of citizens and providing definite answers to the many questions that have been raised in past years. Your involvement questions and concerns are not only appreciated, but are essential if we are going to resolve school space problems. The committee seeks your continued support for the Capital Reserve Fund so that building will be possible in 1987 under plan A without increasing the present level of taxation.

The proposed 1986-1987 budget shows a 4.72% increase. Charts accompanying this report explain details which have received the support of the school board and budget committee.

Your school board continued to represent you well. Responsiveness to others, attention to fiscal details, and real concern for the students characterize this board. It has been a privilege to work with them and for you in the Chesterfield School.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1984-1985

On September 3, 1985, the Chesterfield School opened with 209 students and two new staff members. The new staff members are Karen Krak, instructional associate and cafeteria monitor and Gail Woodward, our mathematics teacher for grades 6, 7 and 8. The oversized fifth grade class has been divided into two reasonably sized classes thus allowing for greater learning opportunities for all of the students.

Annually all New Hampshire elementary schools are evaluated to determine whether they meet the minimum standards required for State approval. Chesterfield School is able to meet 31 of the 37 standards. We still continue to be deficient in the following areas: lack of an art program, art teacher, certified librarian, and an adequate library space. If the proposed revision of the elementary school minimum standards is adopted by the New Hampshire State Department of Education add to that list - a kindergarten. As a result of meeting 31 of the 37 standards, we have been identified as an approved category III school.

During the 1984-1985 school year the staff and administration worked diligently to revise the school's curriculum (outline of academic content) for grades readiness through 8. The revised curriculum guides are not a set of long term goals, but rather what is ACTUALLY happening in each classroom of our school. The guides were written by each of the teachers, reviewed by myself for revisions and amendments, and approved by the Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Towns, Lawrence E. Seavey. Each teacher approaches the curriculum in a unique way. This capitalizes on the individual strengths and interests of our professional staff. In the final analysis this is what elementary education is about - learning with enthusiasm and purpose from a skillful, trained, and experienced teacher. These curriculum guides will be reviewed annually and, when necessary, revised so that our program of studies continues to remain current.

Commencing with the 1985-1986 school year, the Chesterfield School moved into the computer-assisted instruction era. With the purchase of 6 Apple II E's complete, the resource room and 5 junior high classes (grades 6-8) will be using the computers to learn LOGO and BASIC as well as to discover a myriad of other uses and applications for computers and computer software. The enthusiasm of the students toward computers has been gratifying. Equally gratifying is the growing interest of the staff on utilization of the computer in the classroom as a teaching aid and as a management tool. Following the

arrival of the computers, a computer workshop led by Bruce Cloutier was offered at the Chesterfield School. As a result of the workshop overall interest has been enhanced and teachers are eager to discover ways to enrich their classwork through computer use. Three Commodore PET's which had earlier been purchased by the P.T.A. have been repaired and are now ready for use in the lower primary classrooms. Additionally, the Chapter I program is using a Commodore 64 to assist its students with reading instruction. Computers will never replace the teacher. They do offer to both the student and teacher another tool to access information and help both students and teachers better manage the myriad of information made available through the world of communications.

As always we are looking for ways to better communicate the "good news" about Chesterfield School's students, staff and programs. With that goal in mind, I am publishing a monthly "Principal's Newsletter" as well as a monthly "Calendar of Events". I have asked all staff to send home a quarterly newsletter. A student newspaper is published several times throughout the school year. All students in grades readiness through grade eight are given a free copy to take home and share with their parents, siblings, grandparents and friends. Additionally, Judy Palmer, a parent volunteer, regularly takes photos and writes articles for submittal to two daily newspapers and to two weekly newspapers.

During the past 2 years with the strong support of the School Board and the Assistant Superintendent of Schools for Towns, we've made great strides in improving the general condition of our school. We've been able to retile, carpet 5 classrooms, repaint nearly the entire interior and correct numerous electrical and plumbing deficiencies. As part of its 5-year building maintenance plan, the Board plans to continue to upgrade the existing school facility.

As your school principal, I wish to tell you how very much I appreciate your support and encouragement. The past two years have been personally and professionally rewarding for me. I look forward to a continued cooperative relationship.
