- 3. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell, or otherwise administer, property acquired through Tax Sales and Liens.
- 4. To se if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money, if necessary, in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,061.92; the State to contribute the sum of \$7,079.50 for town road aid.
- 6. By Request—To see if the Town will elect someone to get up a program for Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of one hundredth of one per cent (1/100 of 1%) of the assessed valuation for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouh-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 8. By Request—To see if the Town will vote to, raise and appropriate the sum of (500.00) five hundred dollars to complete the "Black Top" surfacing of the road passing the Charles Johnson and Ludvig Kuhre homes; approximately 500 yards.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to change the word "adjustment" in article I clause A of the Building Construction and Zoning Ordinance to the word "selectmen".
- 10. By Request—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 to build an addition on the Fire Station to house the old fire truck, so it can be used at any time.

- 11. By Request—To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for a gate at the Commings Cemetery, the balance to be used for the repair of the fence at Trinity Cemetery.

- 13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to trading the G.M.C. truck for a new truck and raise and appropriate the necessary money therefore.
- 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the Blank Inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- 15. To hear reports of Officers, Agents, Auditors and Committees here-to-fore chosen and pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### REPORT OF THE CORNISH CIVIL DEFENSE

Compared to last year, your Civil Defense program has been considerably more active this year, and I am encouraged by the response and cooperation given me to the various calls for volunteer enlistment in classes to prepare us for the role Cornish must play to meet our statewide requirements.

We started our year's activities by a meeting last fall, with State Civil Defense representatives present, to explain the part Cornish will play in the state-wide program to receive evacuees from Massachusetts; to learn about a radiological class for detecting fall-out; a police course to train men and women for monitoring and policing; and a mass feeding course being offered by the Red Cross and Civil Defense.

Over sixty residents were present, and almost half of them signed up for the Radiological Course. This class got underway shortly afterwards and thirty-four members received their certificates. Cornish has a complete set of Geiger counters and four radiological teams of five members each, under the able and enthusiastic leadership of Wilbur Overman. Twice during the year, they have met to review the use of the Geiger counters by searching for radioactive materials placed in hidden spots by State men.

About a month later, the mass feeding class was started, with twenty members receiving their certificates. The "graduating" exercise was a demonstration of mass feeding. The food was cooked at the school and transported to the Town Hall where tables had been set up outdoors to serve and feed 180 people. The serving time was exactly 55 minutes—a record in the State for local communities.

As this report goes to press, the only police school to be held in this area is now taking place in Newport. I had hoped for twenty "scholars" from this area.

This year, for the first time, an assistant county director and a local director were to be chosen to go to the Annual Council of Women's Activities in Washington for their two-day conference. Your director was picked this year as the local director, and I felt very honored to represent New Hampshire. The conference was crammed with speakers on many Civil Defense topics, morning, at lunch, and afternoon, by Federal men and women. I learned much. I met and talked with many women from almost every

state, which was most inspiring. To see the city of Washington makes all the effort we use towards the defense of this country, worthwhile.

The Gonset Communicator, which was ordered soon after your approval last year, is still going to become a reality, but it has taken a long time for the Federal Communications Commission to establish the wave length and identification letters for this region. The money voted for the Communicator last year, is being held by the Selectmen.

### You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc., cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

- If, however, you do burn on your premises:
- Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden the law requires it.
- Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
- Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
   Save yourself much possible difficulty. Use your Town Dump.

### SCHOOL WARRANT

### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Cornish qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the seventh day of March, 1959, at one-thirty o'clock in the afternoon, and the polls will be open from 10:00 A. M. to 6:30 P. M., to act upon the following subjects:

- To choose a Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and Auditors for the ensuing year and a Member of the School Board forthe ensuing three years.
- To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 5. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 6. To see if the district will authorize the school board to appropriate receipts from federal lunch reimbursements, tuition, gifts, and any other receipts from miscellaneous sources, in addition to the original appropriation for 1959-60, for the lunch program, general expenses, equipment and improvements.

- 7. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or herinafter be forthcoming from the U. S. Government and/or state agencies.
- 8. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to relocate water pipes in the ceiling; and to see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for renovation of water pipes in the Elementary School.
- 9. To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to issue contracts for transportation of school pupils for periods not to exceed six (6) years.
- 10. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate to improve the transportation system of the Cornish Elementary School and if necessary provide additional equipment. (By request of P.T.A.)
- To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Cornish, I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

We are happy to report only two teacher changes in the school faculty. Mrs. Zelma Guy replaced Miss Arlene Abbott in the fourth grade room. Miss Maila Suojanen replaced Mrs. Hrydziusko in the second grade room.

Mrs. Guy came to us from the State of Vermont, where she taught for a number of years in the town of Chester.

Miss Suojanen is a graduate of Castleton Teachers' College, and taught for three years in the Ludlow, Vermont public schools.

I have enjoyed very much my work in the schools this year. The school board members have been most helpful and have shown genuine interest in the affairs of the school. Our teachers have given evidence of fine spirit in the faculty, and they have been most cooperative in their support of the administration. Certainly the citizens of Cornish can feel proud of the new school which provides ample facilities in which to carry out our school program.

For the first time we have been able to provide a definite music program in the Cornish School. Mr. Robert Filippone was engaged jointly with the town of Charlestown, as music supervisor in all eight grades. Mr. Filippone comes to Cornish one day each week. His Christmas program was very well received, and I am sure the pupils, teachers, and citizens value his services as a most worthwhile addition to our school schedule. Mr. Filippone is a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. We appreciate very much the interest of the P.T.A., and the support given this program by our local school board. The generosity of our Cornish citizens was expressed through their vote at District Meeting to appropriate money to finance this new program.

Mrs. Weld and Mrs. Bean have been in charge of our school cafeteria this year. They have provided very fine lunches, and have kept the financial records of this department. Surplus foods from the federal government have materially aided in the operation of the cafeteria. The cost to the pupils has been kept at a minimum. The purchase of a new Deep Freeze Cabinet has been a most useful addition to our kitchen equipment. Our thanks and appreciation to Mrs. Weld and all others who worked so hard to raise the money which made the purchase possible.

Our town census shows a probable entering class of twentyseven in the first grade next year. It is expected that twenty-nine pupils will be graduated from the eighth grade. This gain and loss points to a total school enrollment in September 1959 of 232 pupils.

Your Superintendent and the Cornish School Board are taking definite steps to improve our transportation system another year. The present criticism seems to stem from three points:

- 1. Some children must be excused early to facilitate the bus schedule, thereby losing valuable time in the classroom.
- 2. The bus capacity at present is not large enough to provide for a school this size.
- 3. The multiple trips which are necessary result in keeping teachers and pupils waiting until later afternoon. This creates many problems particularly in cold weather.

I am sure everyone appreciates the good work done by our School Nurse. In addition to her regular inspections and testing programs, Miss MacIver was instrumental in getting for us special instruction in the field of speech therapy. Mrs. Mary Mindess of Charlestown is holding two classes a week for pupils who need her services. Unfortunately we have a number of children in school who have serious speech defects.

Everyone who comes to Cornish speaks so well of the Cornish Elementary School. We are very proud of the school, the children, and the teachers who have worked most faithfully. I appreciate the cooperation of all connected with the school department, and also the genuine support of the Cornish School Board members. Each year is a new challenge, and we hope we can continue to provide an educational program which will meet the approval of the citizens of Cornish.

### SCHOOL BOARD

During the past year the School Board has had to contend with the usual problems of school operation, and also with a number of extraordinary ones.

In the Spring so much mud and silt came into the well that pump and plumbing were damaged, and the heating system threatened with failure. We immediately dug wells at the foot of the hill toward the Town Hall for emergency supply; and with the help of Mr. Donald Cass succeeded in blocking off the mud in the main well, which, we hope, will be permanent.

While paving the school yard, for which \$1,500.00 was appropriated in a special article at the last meeting, the Board learned of a fund which could be used for such purposes, and upon application we were granted \$2,500.00 from the Spaulding Educational Trust Funds of New Hampshire. With \$60.00 from the P. T. A. Landscape Fund and \$246.00 of regular budget money, this work, which we thought might take several years, has been completed.

The automatic pump in the oil furnace failed this winter, and a new one was procured. We have repaired the old one for standby in case of another failure.

The School Board has sought in many ways to improve the school bus schedule so that children need not spend long hours waiting at the school house before and after school. With the excellent cooperation of the bus operators we believe the present schedule is the best in use for some years

Our school building custodian, Mr. Seale, resigned February 1, to accept another position, and Mr. MacMillan is again giving the school the fine care he previously did.

Every winter since the school was constructed we have been troubled with frozen water pipes because all pipes run through the attic, with insulation below them. It has been necessary to open spaces in the ceiling, and to maintain heat at full temperature all night to keep them from breaking — and even this precaution has not been sufficient. Accordingly we have placed an article in the warrant to relocate the pipes in the main building. We believe the cost will be returned by savings in repairs and heating bills.

Finally, the School Board and the Superintendent have endeavored this year to encourage greater emphasis on the fundamentals of education — reading, writing, mathematics, science and knowledge of the world in which we live.

### SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

During the past year Immunization Clinics were made available to all school children as well as the pre-school children. Salk Vaccine, Triple Toxoid (a combination of Diphtheria, Tetanus and Whooping Cough) and Small Pox Vaccinations were given. Attendance at these clinics could be better. We still have a number of children who have not had Salk Vaccine despite the large number of Salk Vaccine Clinics we have had. I do hope that our spring clinics will take care of this.

The Tuberculin Patch Testing program was carried out with the children in the odd numbered grades and newcomers who had not previously had the test. This test is given to determine whether or not a child has ever had a contact with Tuberculosis. If the test reaction is positive, then the child has a chest X-ray through the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Association Chest Clinics.

Hearing and vision testing was done in all grades. The hearing defects were very few and all of those children with a hearing problem were seen by their family physician. The number of corrections of vision problems was excellent. Where a family was unable to assume the expense of eye care and glasses the local service clubs and the State Welfare Department assisted.

Examination with the Wood's Light for the detection of Scalp Ringworm was done in the elementary grades. There were no suspicious cases found. Scalp Ringworm still seems to be a public health menace in this state, as well as in the neighboring states.

The children were weighed and measured, and a general inspection was carried out by the school nurse. By far the outstanding problem was the need for dental care. Outside of the State Matching Fund there is very little assistance available for dental care.

All of the above mentioned programs are carried out yearly. These programs serve a dual purpose. First and very important is the finding of defects and the correction of them. Second and equally as important, it is a teaching program from the standpoint of the child. We strive to help the child realize the importance of good health, as well as teach him to assume the responsibility of maintaining good health and well-being.

Success in carrying out the school health program is dependent on many people. I would like to express my appreciation to you who have helped so much—the parents, the medical advisors, the School Board, the Superintendent, the Principals, the teachers and the custodians. Thank you.
