TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Farmington in the County of Strafford qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Farmington on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next (1991) at nine o'clock in the forenoon to cast your ballot for Town Officers and for questions required by law to be on the ballot. Polls will close no earlier than 7 o'clock in the evening. The remainder of the Warrant will be acted upon Wednesday, the thirteenth day of March, beginning at 7 o'clock in the evening.

- ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Selectman for two years, one Treasurer for one year, three Budget Committee members for three years, two Budget Committee members for two years, one Budget Committee member for one year and one Trustee of the Trust Fund for three years.
- ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1, amending Section 3.6 of the Town of Farmington Land Use Ordinance, as proposed by the Planning Board, to allow business and commercial uses, including retail sales by special exception in the Industrial District.
- ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town of Farmington Land Use Ordinance to create an Aquifer Protection Zone to "protect, preserve and maintain existing and potential ground water supply and ground water recharge areas within the known aquifer from adverse development or land use practice." The proposed amendment prohibits certain uses and permits certain uses within the zone. It includes part or all of the following tax map lot numbers: U7 Lot 15; U1 Lots 10, 11, 12, 23, 24, 25, 26 and 27; R46 Lots 1, 1A, 2, 3, 4, 6, 7 and 8; and R50 Lot 2. Copies of this proposed amendment are available for inspection at the Town Clerk's Office, the Selectmen's Office and posted in the Town Hall, Osgood's and the Post Office.
- ARTICLE 4. Are you in favor of adopting, by reference as an ordinance, the BOCA National Building Code of 1990, and to repeal all provisions of the 1985 BOCA Code (Adopted by the Town, March 1986) in conflict therewith.
- ARTICLE 5. Are you in favor of authorizing the Planning Board to adopt site review regulations that will cover and control a change of use or expansion of use for nonresidential uses or residential uses where there are more than two dwellings per lot as provided in

RSA 674:43. This will update the Site Review Regulations regarding applicability, 2.04 of the Site Review Regulations. Copies of this proposed ordinance are available for inspection at the Town Clerk's Office, the Selectmen's office and posted in the Town Hall, Osgood's and the Post Office.

- ARTICLE 6. Are you in favor of amending the Land Use Ordinance to add a new section entitled "Special Downtown District," which would exempt commercial development in certain areas of the Town of Farmington from Site Review Regulations. Copies of this proposed amendment are available for inspection at the Town Clerk's Office and the Selectmen's Office and posted in the Town Hall, Osgood's and the Post Office. (By Petition) (The Planning Board does not have a recommendation on this article.)
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and hold harmless the Selectmen, administrative staff or agencies, for any loss, claims or causes of action arising out of or in the course of performance of their official duties.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow notes to the credit of the Town, such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will ratify the agreement negotiated between the Board of Selectmen and Davidson Rubber in settlement of claims by the Town against Davidson Rubber Company, relating to the release of contaminants on and beneath the Sarah Greenfield property, and requiring Davidson Rubber Company to remediate the aguifer beneath the Sarah Greenfield property as as to once again be suitable for use as a public drinking water supply for the Town. Under the terms of the settlement, Davidson Rubber Company has paid the Town \$525,000 for the cost of a new drinking water supply well and in repayment of legal and consulting costs, in partial settlement of the Town's claims. The \$525,000 is now held in an escrow account pending Town ratification of the agreement. To facilitate remediation, the Selectmen have negotiated a limited restrictive covenant with Davidson Rubber Company to limit the use by the Town of certain portions of the Sarah Greenfield property for a time period not to exceed thirty years, and to refrain from using the aquifer beneath the Sarah Greenfield property for drinking water purposes until the aquifer meets all applicable legal standards governing public drinking water supplies. A copy of the agreement is posted for inspection at the Selectmen's offices, Town Hall, Osgood's and the Post Office.

- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,996,853 (two million, nine hundred, ninety-six thousand, eight hundred, fifty-three dollars) for the operation, expenses and commitments of the Town government, which represents the bottom line of column No. 3 (the Selectmen's Budget) in the posted Budget (MS-7). Said sum includes Article 11 through Article 14, but is exclusive of Special Articles 15 and 16. (Budget Committee recommends \$3,001,397 (three million, one thousand, three hundred, ninety-seven dollars), inclusive of Articles 11 through 16).
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to pay, only under protest, any and all sums mandated by the State, in violation of the State Constitution, which are included in this Budget, and, which the Board of Selectmen deem expedient to pay, pending resolution of their constitutionality, and to refuse to pay those sums mandated by the State, in violation of the State Constitution, which the Board of Selectmen deem inexpedient to pay.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000 to purchase property for the new well, and if necessary, go the route of condemnation under eminent domain to obtain land for wells four and five. (The Cemetery Association has generously agreed to sell most of the land needed for \$1.)
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$397,000 to construct new wells, a pumping station and necessary transmission lines. \$400,000 plus interest from the Davidson Settlement is being set aside for Articles 12 and 13.
- ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) for the purchase of a 1,500 gallon fire truck and authorize the withdrawal of thirty-five thousand, eight hundred and sixteen dollars (\$35,816) plus interest from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$544 for the Woman's Resource Center. (By Petition) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
- ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for Strafford County Community Action. (By Petition) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)
- ARTICLE 17. This article to be voted on to determine if the people will desolve the office of Town Administrator and replace the Town Administrator with a full-time position for one of the elected Selectmen at a salary of \$20,000 per year. This act will put the ad-

ministration of Town business in the hands of the voters through their elected representative. If this article is adopted, it will go into effect 90 days from passage of the article, to insure proper transition of duties. (By Petition)

- ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend, without further action by Town Meeting, Federal and State grants, which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b, and also to accept and expend money from any governmental unit or private source, without further action by Town Meeting, to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.
- **ARTICLE 19.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept, on behalf of the Town, gifts, legacies and devises made to the Town in trust, for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.
- ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer Tax Liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by Public Auction (or advertised sealed bids) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.
- ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will relinquish all claims it might have to that portion of Courtland Street, which shows on the Town Tax Map between Lot Numbers U11, 17, U11 18, U5 166 and U5 165, excepting that portion currently maintained as a street and plowed as a cul-de-sac by the Town.
- ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Ordinance for Registration and Operation of Bicycles as proposed by the Board of Selectmen. Copies of this proposed ordinance are available for inspection at the Town Clerk's Office, the Selectmen's Office and posted in the Town Hall, Osgood's and the Post Office.
- ARTICLE 23. To authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder municipal vehicles and other equipment as determined by the Selectmen.
- ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with, and, in their sole discretion, reach a settlement with Norman and Dorothy Parent and Joan E. Deptula or the current owners of Tax Map Parcel U09 Lot 37 on a piece of land which is in dispute. The right to sell or otherwise agree upon the disposition of up to one acre of land from the Town's parcel U09 Lot 31 is specifically in-

cluded in this authority.

- ARTICLE 25. This article is to be voted on to determine if the people will desolve the Zoning Board of Adjustment. If this article is adopted, it is to take place immediately. (By Petition)
- ARTICLE 26. This article to be voted on to determine if the people will desolve the Sight Review Board. If this article is adopted, it is to take place immediately. (By Petition)
- ARTICLE 27. This article to be voted on to determine if the people will desolve the Office of the Building Inspector. If this article is adopted, it is to take place immediately. (By Petition)
- **ARTICLE 28.** To transact such other business as may legally come before this meeting.

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Farmington and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town, as of and for the year ended December 31, 1989, as listed in the Table of Contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Farmington at December 31, 1989, and the results of its operations and the changes in financial position of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town at December 31, 1989, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1990

The Water Department has experienced a persistent problem with bacteria within the distribution system this year, requiring additional monitoring and public notification. Because of this problem, we started up a temporary chlorination system at Well #3, to disinfect the distribution system. This system worked quite well, and after a period of time we were able to discontinue its use. However, as a result of changes in testing procedures for bacteria, the number of violations will probably increase to an unacceptable level. Therefore, there is a good chance that we will begin chlorination of the distribution system in January, 1991, and will continue for some period of time until we know the water will meet the criteria for bacteria levels on a consistent basis.

Efforts continue towards developing a new water supply for the Town. Currently, the project is before the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the N.H. Wetland Board for their approvals. An agreement has been reached with Davidson Rubber to fund the project. Provided we get the above approvals, we will begin the design, review, and construction of the new system as soon as possible with a probable completion date of late 1991.

We spent a good deal of time and effort to generate a computer model of the distribution system to assist in evaluating the system for the most cost effective means of restoring and increasing the system's water distribution capacity. This model will also be used to analyze the effects of new connections to the system and to optimize the installation cost of the two proposed new wells.

We reinsulated and enclosed the eight-inch water main where it goes over the South Main Street Bridge. The old enclosure and insulation were beyond use and an eyesore. The general appearance is much improved and we may make further improvements this upcoming year with the help of public-spirited citizens.

WASTEWATER DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1990

The national effluent discharge permit for the Wastewater Plant was renewed in late 1989, resulting in two major changes to the permit. The first change required chronic and acute bio-assay toxicity testing of the effluent to see what effects, if any, the effluent was having on the biology of the Cocheco River. These tests are quite expensive. The EPA was able to pay for three of the tests and paid for three tests in 1990. From now on we will be paying for all of the tests that may be required. We have requested a waiver based upon the 1990 test results, but there is no guarantee that the EPA will allow us to reduce the number of tests required.

The second change was the establishment of a very low chlorine limit, which meant the method of disinfection had to be changed or the chlorine currently being used had to be reduced at the point of discharge. We chose to reduce the chlorine by installing a dechlorination system. This required the installation of new pumps, tank, plumbing, wiring and electrical controls. We designed and installed the entire system and had the system started up by a trained professional. Overall, the system is performing quite well. We are still experimenting with it to try to optimize chemical usage and to get the consistent level of chlorine reduction.

The State is also requiring us to perform a Wasteload Allocation Study of the Cocheco River. We explored the costs of this study through engineering proposals and realized the cost was going to be very expensive. We then requested that the State perform the study. They have agreed as long as there are sufficient funds and manpower available within the Department of Environmental Services. This has been tentatively scheduled for 1991. This study will determine what type of changes are going to be required at the Wastewater Plant.

We also cleaned and tested several thousand feet of sewer line to see if there was any infiltration into the collection system that should be corrected and to get an overall picture of the condition of the collection system. We tested the 12-inch sewer line that runs parallel to the river and found no problems. We then cleaned several thousand feet of sewer lines and removed very little accumulated material. Again no problems were found. We will test other sections of lines in years to come to be sure the collection system stays trouble free.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD FOR 1990

The economic slow-down changed the proportion of the Planning Board's activities during the year 1990. The Board devoted more time toward future planning and less time towards major subdivisions.

There still was a substantial number of Site Review Applications made. Although Site Review was waived on many of these, the Board still took the time to review them and to make a decision. Eighteen Site Review Applications were presented. Thirteen requested a waiver of Site Review. Ten Site Reviews were waived. Eight proposals went through the Site Review process. There were 10 subdivisions.

The Board also monitored the situaion with the Rancourt Development. The Town has representation in the proceedings to safeguard the Town's interest.

A dispute with the Selectmen over Board membership arose in March and April of 1990. Despite the controversy, most of the members who had submitted their resignations resumed their seats. The Board was sorry to lose Lorraine Meyer as an Alternate.

The Board will present to the Town Meeting in March of 1991, a proposal for the Aquifer Protection Zone for the new well, an amendment of the Site Review Regulations and other proposed zoning changes.

The Board had hoped to accomplish more in terms of long-term planning, including revision of the Master Plan, provision of a new Wetlands Ordinance and more comprehensive revision of the Land Use Ordinance and Site Review Regulations. Unfortunately, as a result of limited professional assistance and limited time, the Board was not able to proceed rapidly with those.

The Board requested a grant from the State for the purposes of Master Plan Revision and associated revision of the Town's Ordinances. Work has also been contracted for with Strafford Regional Planning Commission for a new Capital Improvements Program.

Unfortunately, as of this date, the Capital Improvements Program has not proceeded rapidly. The Board was not able to complete a new Wetlands Ordinance. A proposed ordinance was considered at a Public Hearing. It was received unfavorably. The proposed ordinance was tabled. A new one will be reviewed for the upcoming year.

1990 ANNUAL POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

1990 was a very busy year for the Police Department. We worked understaffed virtually all year as Officer Scott Carr left to join the New Hampshire State Police.

All training mandates were achieved by the department with officers receiving instruction in drug detection, evidence, crime scene topics and courtroom demeanor.

Our court statistics continue to be larger and substantive. We presented 1,376 cases to the court; defendents received totals of 1.8 years committed time, 6.5 years of suspended jail time, lost their right to drive for 86.8 years and were assessed fines totaling \$80,330.50. During 1991, the Chief has taken over prosectution again to allow for better utilization of personnel. However, the time spent in dealing with court cases will take up over 50% of the Chief's yearly work hours.

We began to look at our facility in order to plan for the future. The department is in desperate need of a new facility. Not only is space a problem, but liability will be enhanced if we continue to put off dealing with the Police Department's needs in this area. We have taken a tight-fisted approach to our budget and presented a budget that maintains essential police services to the Town. However, programs such as the DARE Program, Bicycle Safety and Crime Prevention have been eliminated this year due to budget considerations. Lastly, the Police Department looks forward to serving the needs of the Town. To this end I would again encourage each citizen to participate with the department to fight crime, address community needs and march on into a positive 1991.

It is a well-documented fact that, in times of economic hardship, public library usage increases substantially. At the Goodwin Library, the increased usage shows particularly in the areas of in-house usage (items used in the library but not circulated) and interlibrary loan. The computer system, donated in 1989 by Mr. James E. Thayer, has allowed the library to more readily provide for the public the ILL (Interlibrary Loan) Service. Circulation statistics again increased to 10,190 (adult) and 8,136 (children). The library has 1,619 registered borrowers - this includes numerous family cards. Books purchased in 1990 are as follows - 548 adult titles and 395 children/young adult. These numbers include reference, nonfiction, fiction and paperback titles. The library accepts and appreciates gift books- - 290 books were donated to the library in 1990.

The programs sponsored by or held at the library in 1990 include:

Art Show Exhibitor Open House

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT REPORT

The Zoning Board's purpose is to hear appeals requesting variances and special exceptions to the Farmington Town Ordinance or appeals from administrative decisions made by Town officials. In the first two types of cases, the Board must determine whether unique circumstances exist which would allow a variance to be granted, or which fit the requirements of Article 5.2 for a special exception. In appeals from administrative decisions, the Board must determine whether or not the Town official carried out correctly the duties of his/her office, as outlined in the New Hampshire RSA's and in our Town Ordinance, based on the information submitted.

The Town of Farmington continues to enjoy a well-functioning Zoning Board of Adjustment. This year the ZBA welcomed James Aube as an alternative member. Colleen Lanza now serves both ZBA and the Planning Board, providing a channel of communication between them. Don Gilbert, Code Enforcement Officer, and Dianne Ficco, Secretary, have helped the Board enormously in the processing of applications.

During 1990, the Zoning Board of Adjustment held 11 public hearings. Six of these were requests for special exception and five for variances from the setback requirements. Of the requests for special exception, six were granted, and of the requests for variances, four were granted.

The Board collected application fees totalling \$497.00. These fees cover the costs of processing applications, such as: postage, newspaper advertisements, and so forth.

As in past years, Board Members continue to update their knowledge with the latest state zoning laws and procedures. During September and November, some members attended the 15th Annual Municipal Law Lecture Series.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN, 1990

1990 was a year of challenges and accomplishments. One of the challenges occurred with the change of personnel. It was with a mixture of sadness for the loss to the Town, but happiness for the challenges ahead, that the Town learned that, then Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Bill Cooper, was appointed to be Town Manager of New Gloucester, Maine. During his many years of involvement with the Town, first as Town Administrator, then on the Budget Committee, and finally as Chairman of the Board of Selectmen, Bill Cooper worked hard for the advancement of the Town. His accomplishments stand as a monument to the work he did for the Town. It was with sadness the Town learned of the death of a retired Town employee, Ken Dickie. For many years, he served as Road Agent. His son

continues to serve the Town as senior employee in the Highway Department. One of our fine police officers, Scott Carr left to join the State Police. The Board hired two new officers, Mark McGowen and Michael Maddocks and are evaluating applications for a third new officer.

Two of our officers, Tim Brown and Kenneth Button, acting in the highest tradition of service to law enforcement and the community, without thought for their own safety, entered a burning building and rescued Bill Bragg.

The most prominent accomplishment for the Board of Selectmen is that seven and a half years of investigation and negotiations have come to a successful conclusion with an agreement concerning the Sarah Greenfield property and Well No. 2. A new water source has been a pressing need for the Town of Farmington. Well No. 2, while usually within Federal Standards, is contaminated with chlorohydrocarbons and, therefore, has not been used for drinking water since 1983. Well No. 3 is stretched to the limit. This year the Town was forced to chlorinate its water. Well No. 3 again required cleaning to renew pumping capacity. After 7 years of searching, the Selectmen have finally located a water source which meets the State Standards and has adequate volume. The Town thanks the Cemetery Association for the water rights they have so generously agreed to transfer to the Town. The Town Meeting will vote to ratify the agreement between the Board of Selectmen and Davidson Rubber in settlement of claims relating to pollution upon the Sarah Greenfield property. This agreement will require the clean-up of the aguifer by Davidson Rubber, but will prevent the Town from developing certain portions of this property for various time spans and will prevent the Town from using the water for drinking purposes until the specified areas meet all applicable Federal and State standards. Davidson also pays the Town \$525,000,00 in the settlement.

Conservative spending has allowed the Town to see a drop of 6% in taxes this year. The proposed budget should result in no increase in taxes.

The auditing firm made various suggestions, regarding our computer system and the general ledger format, to improve our bookkeeping. These have been implemented, and the computer system has been adapted to these changes. During the year we continued to expand the capabilities of the system, including a new receipting program for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector to deposit money more quickly for interest earning and to facilitate posting of revenues.

The Town continued to receive various State grants including, a recycling grant to construct a storage building and to purchase a baler. This will help as we continue to recycle at the landfill. In 1991, we recycled between 90 and 100 tons of scrap metal, tires, aluminum, plastic and newsprint. The Board of Selectmen intend to add cardboard in the near future, especially for commercial users. Participation levels have continued to improve. We had the metal pile removed for the lowest cost in five years. Separation by types of metal has reduced the cost of metal removal.

The Town received two more energy grants. One paid 50% of costs for insulation and new garage doors at the Town Garage and for pipe insulation and storm windows at the Town Hall. The newest grant sets the stage to apply for a grant for insulated garage doors and other energy savings for the fire station and sewer plant energy improvements.

The Board of Selectmen approved an application for CDBG grant funds in 1991 for housing rehabilitation and are awaiting the State's reply.

On a less optimistic front, it appears attempts to recover damages for the fact that Fire Engine No. 3 is unsafe are stalled, since the firm that repaired the old truck went bankrupt. For this reason, the Selectmen accepted a Fire Department request to recommend to the Town Meeting the purchase of a new large pumper tanker. This is sorely needed as the newest fire engine that Farmington has on the road is older than some of its drivers. This past year, when one engine was down for repairs, the Fire Department was limited to the use of a ladder truck and a 500 gallon tanker. Water carrying capacity is important in many areas of the Town.

The Town is still awaiting a Waste Stream Allocation Study to make a judgment on the best way to proceed with improvements to the Waste Water Plant.

The Selectmen completed a survey of the landfill with a view to determining the life expectancy of the landfill. The Town also participated in a hazardous household waste collection with Rochester and other members of our District.

The downtown continued to see improvements with new sidewalks around the square and the paving of School Street, Warren Street, and Barry Court. Paving was also done on the Ten Rod Road. The project is not complete, but the ledge has been removed and money encumbered towards the completion of the project.

In closing, we wish to thank our outstanding staff of dedicated employees who have carried out our policies and services. We thank all the businesses and their owners who have donated time, goods, money and equipment for a multitude of causes. We also express our deepest gratitude to the many individuals who have given freely of their time to serve on committees and boards for the Town. These efforts have been a tremendous boost to the community, and we thank them for their time, help and dedication. We also thank the many citizens who have contributed their time and efforts in other ways. It is as a community working together that we are able to say with pride, "We live in Farmington."

RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC. REPORT — 1990

The Rural District Health Council, Inc. continues as a certified home health agency, providing your town with skilled nursing, physical, occupational and speech therapies, medical social worker, home health aides, homemakers and a comprehensive hospice program. We have a 24-hour answering service with a nurse on call 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, with home visits made as indicated. The staff has made, to date, 9,253 home visits with 13,840 hours of homemaking and 14,360 hourly aid.

Services also include child health care from newborn to six years old. This includes physical examinations, immunizations, growth and development, monitoring and counseling.

Every fall, influenza shots are given to the elderly within the Elderly Health Maintenance Program.

Remember, in lieu of flowers, a memorial donation may be made in memory of a loved one.

There have been to date for your town, 1,785 skilled nursing visits, 296 therapy

visits, 901 home health aide visits, 371 % homemaker hours, 102 child health visits and 289 child health clinic visits and 6,550 hourly aide.

PARKS AND RECREATION REPORT

In 1990, the Recreation Department took a plunge into some new programs, which have proven to be very successful. The program that we are the most pleased with is the Senior Citizen Trips. Starting with a shopping trip in April with about ten ladies and one van, each trip has had more people attend. We have been to a variety of places, including a trip to Boston, a cruise on the Mt. Washington, and the largest trip of all, three vans full, to the White Mountains to view the fall foliage.

The Recreation Basketball Program continues to expand, with all gym time, available during the week, being used to the maximum. The Junior High Teams have been combined into one evening as a league. This gives more playing time to all the children and eliminates the need to transport to other towns. We had a record twenty-seven teenagers try out for the High School Recreation Team. We were only able to carry fifteen players, so those who did not make the team were placed on the Junior High teams. It is possible that next year, we will have two High School Teams.

In these tough economic times, we are continuing to make recreation available to all residents, by raising our own funds and through generous donations from businesses and townspeople. We would like to thank all those who have made either time or money donations; it is you that make the Recreation Department what it is today.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

After a few years of inactivity, the Conservation Commission was reorganized with several new members. Several of the members attended a seminar for Conservation Commissioners on November 3, 1990, held at Rundlett Junior High School, in Concord, N.H.

A clean-up of the Mad River was completed with the support of the Conser-

vation Commission. Several citizens participated in the successful clean-up, as well as the Highway Department, which hauled several truckloads of tires, appliances, roadside and riverbank litter to the landfill.

In 1991, the Conservation Commission will continue to be active by setting new goals. The Conservation Commission will be working with the Planning Board to prepare a new Wetlands Protection Ordinance Proposal.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT 1990 ANNUAL REPORT

As many people are already aware, the Highway Department was involved in a major road building project on the Ten Rod Road with .08 of a mile being completely rebuilt and paved. On the lower end of the same road, the Highway Department completely rebuilt and paved one (1) mile with .05 of a mile being done by Midway Excavators.

The Highway Department oversaw the Downtown Sidewalk Project with a complete renovation in the immediate downtown business district. This year, we hope to do the sidewalk from Grove Street to School Street on the west side of Route 153.

The money for these projects came from highway subsidies from the State of N.H., with a very small percentage from property taxes. 1991's Budget includes plans to skim and seal existing paved roads to prolong their useful life.

Last year, the parts and repair line of the budget was overspent due to the fact that more than half the money (\$18,000.00) was spent to maintain the town's two Oshcosh's. I had hoped to budget half the cost to replace one of these trucks, but the Board of Selectmen opted to replace a fire truck, but these trucks will have to be replaced in the very near future.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICER/ANIMAL CONTROL OFFFICER

In 1990, the Health Officer responded to 114 complaints. He has inspected facilities for Daycare/Foster Care, restaurants and schools.

The Animal Control Officer has been busy. The officer has answered 356 calls. He has also contacted individual residences throughout the town to enforce the dog licensing requirement. This has resulted in an increase of dog licenses by 263 for a total of 677. This has raised the revenue to \$3,802.00 for dog licenses.

Fines were issued for various offenses totaling \$3,033.00 There have been 68 canines transported to the Cocheco Valley Humane Society.

The Fire Department answered 142 calls in 1990. These incidents required a total of 2,520 volunteer manhours to handle, an average of 18 manhours per call. Response was made in an average of 6 minutes with 1 engine company, 1 ladder company and 1 special company. Direct fire losses for 1990 were estimated to be \$35,410, down from 1989 at \$243,065, a significant decrease. We hope this downward trend will continue. There were 5 civilian injuries in 1990, the most severe being the result of a garage fire on East Grove Street. All other injuries were minor in nature and most did not require hospitalization. One fire fighter was injured during 1990. This injury happened while cleaning up after a mutual aid fire in Middleton. One apparatus was involved in an accident during 1990. Engine 4 was inadvertently damaged when it struck a utility pole enroute to a call at Central Street. Minimal damage was reported and the truck is back in service at this time.

FIRE PREVENTION:

The Fire Prevention Bureau was again active during the year. Despite exten-

sive budget restraints, we were able to put together a meaningful program for all our school children (grades R through 8). Our hat is off to George Mucher and his Liberty Mutual Insurance Agency for the financial assistance during Fire Prevention Week. Mr. Mucher donated one of the handouts for the program. We continue to work with the school department to bring educational programs to the children, as well as the staff.

During 1990 we also significantly stepped up inspection of multi-family dwellings. While inspecting and noting safety problems on these structures, we also began to lay out a comprehensive pre-fire plan to assist us in the event of a fire in any of these structures. Our plan is to continue this inspection effort and to make our community as firesafe as we can. To that end three officials have now been trained in the interpretation and application of the 1988 Life Safety Code. This was an intensive 35-hour program designed to give the inspector hands-on experience in dealing with code application.

Work goes on in the Prevention Bureau to help correct a still abhorable statistic in Farmington. Last year in 42 fires, we found that smoke alarms were not present or were not working in 38% of the cases. We cannot stress the importance of these devices enough. Smoke detectors are proven life savers and must be installed in every home or apartment.

TRAINING:

Fire Department training is an ongoing event. Our fire fighters meet regularly to hone their skills and to learn new techniques. We presently have a large team of fire fighters enrolled in the basic program. We are also about to undertake a special training in handling hazardous materials. This program will qualify our personnel to the Awareness Level. We currently have only one individual on staff qualified to the Operational Level.

The Fire Department roster is currently full with 33 fire fighters and 3 executive officers.

EQUIPMENT CONDITION:

All fire fighting apparatus, with the exception of Engine #3 is in good condition. We have in hand several safety devices to install on the pumpers to bring them into compliance with standards for fire fighter safety. The Ladder has once again passed certification examination and remains a good investment. There is a small problem with Engine 2, but a solution to that problem is currently under contract. We expect a complete fix soon.

We now have the capability to test all hose and such appliances in-house. We expect to have a testing schedule in place before the test weather arrives. All SCBA have been checked during 1990 for proper flow and regulator operation. The air pump used to fill SCBA has a current Air Quality Inspection Certificate.

The new chassis, purchased in the 1988 Budget, remains in place and has enhanced our ability to keep our fire fighters safe while travelling in it.

Our current radio system and dispatch capabilities are marginal at best. We recommend the replacement of this equipment in the near future. We should form a study group consisting of fire fighters and other interested citizens to explore new and better communication methods. Our present system is working but should be seriously updated to handle the needs of modern day fire fighting and rescue work.

The telegraph fire alarm system remains in service. During 1990 only 4 calls were transmitted over the system. The system is in need of serious maintenance, if it is to remain in service.

NOTE OF THANKS:

The men and women of the Fire Department would like to take this opportunity to thank all the citizens for their support. You have attended our Ham and Bean suppers and made our fundraising efforts very worthwhile during the past years. We look forward to working with the Business Association, the schools, the many clubs and civic organizations and the Planning Board, in a combined effort to make Farmington and safer place to live. We remind all of you that our speakers are prepared to visit your organization for any program need you may have.

REMEMBRANCE:

We were saddened at the passing of our dear friend and compatriot, Captain Wayne Spear. Wayne was an inspiration to many in this department and a great asset to the community. Even after his well-deserved retirement, we could count on Wayne for assistance and dedication. He will be sorely missed. May his memory be eternal.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to indemnify and hold harmless the Selectmen, administrative staff or agencies, for any loss, claims or causes of action arising out of or in the course of performance of their official duties.

William Cooper moved to accept the article, seconded by Tom Davenhall. Angelo Sassi made a motion to amend to ask the Attorney General for a ruling on the legality of the article. This was seconded by Edmund Archambault. The amendment was defeated by a show of cards. Article 8 was approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town of Farmington will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow notes to the credit of the Town, such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

William Cooper moved to accept, seconded by John Scruton. The article was approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town of Farmington will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,343,563 (two million, three hundred forty-three thousand, five hundred and sixty-three dollars) for the operation, expenses and commitments of the Town Government, which represents the bottom line of column 3 (the Selectmen's Budget) in the Posted Budget (MS-7). Said sum is exclusive of Special Articles 11 and 12. (Budget Committee recommends \$2,343,563, exclusive of Special Articles 11 and 12.

It was explained that this article covers line items on pages 12-15, and we can have up to 2 amendments to any one line.

Donald Gordon made a motion to appropriate \$2,343,563, which excludes Articles 11 and 12, duly seconded. John McStocker moved to amend to \$2,236,306, seconded by Mr. Rhines. After much discussion, this amendment was defeated by a show of cards. After much continued discussion, John Scruton moved to call the question, seconded by Barbara Spear. This was approved by a show of cards. The motion to approve the original motion was approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000 for Strafford County Community Action. (By Petition)(Not Recommended by Budget Committee)

Henry Sullivan moved to adopt, seconded by Donald Gordon. The vote required a count of cards. Approved 56 Against 60

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town of Farmington will vote to raise and appropriate \$525 for the Woman's Resource Center. (By Petition)(Not Recommended by Budget Committee)

A motion by Nina Lewis to approve was seconded by Marilyn Robicheau. Nina Lewis explained the program. The article was approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of a re-evaluation of town properties, so that the date in which the work will be undertaken is not stated.

A motion to approve was made by William Cooper, seconded by John Scruton. This was approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to accept the roads in Yonder Ridge Development as town roads. The roads in Yonder Ridge Development are as follows: Blueberry Drive, Horn Brook Drive, Deer Cove Circle, Knotty Knoll Circle, Chipmunk Lane, Flowing Brook Road, Hummingbird Drive, Morning Dove Lane, Polliwog Lane. (By Petition)

A motion was made by John Scrutton to table indefinately, seconded by Kevin Robbins. A count of cards was taken. Yes 97 No 39

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend, without further action by Town Meeting, Federal and State grants which may become available during the course of the year, in accordance with RSA 31:95-b, and also to accept and expend money from any other govern-

mental unit or private source, without further action by Town Meeting, to be used for purposes for which the Town may legally appropriate money.

A motion to approve was made by William Cooper, seconded by John Silvia and approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 261:157-a to waive the fee to be charged for a permit to register one motor vehicle owned by any person who meets the prisoner of war status stated in the RSA.

A motion to approve was made by John Silvia, duly seconded and approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to transfer Tax Liens and to convey property acquired by the town by Tax Collector's Deed by Public Auction (or advertised sealed bids) or in such other manner as determined by the selectmen as justice may require.

A motion to approve was made by William Cooper, seconded by John Silvia and approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 18.

To see if the Town will vote to require that any time that the town is going to purchase an item for a sum in excess of \$2,000, or lease equipment at a cost in excess of \$1,000, or let a contract for construction of public works in excess of \$2,000, that such a purchase or contract shall be made only after obtaining competitive bids. The normal procedure for obtaining bids shall be by an advertisement in a newspaper of general circulation in the Town. The Selectmen may authorize receipt of bids by telephone provided: (1) such authorization is in writing, and (2) not less than three bids are obtained, in the following situations: 1. Where the product or service is needed so quickly that is is not feasible to advertise in the newspaper for competitive bids; and 2. Where the product or service is so specialized and unique that a local advertisemnet would be unlikely to generate sufficient response. All bids obtained by phone shall be documented as to the firm called, the person at the firm giving the quote, the date and time of the call, and the amount of the bid. Where the product or service has been bid by the State and is being obtained at the State bid price, no bid is necessary. While price shall be an important factor, it shall not be the only factor, and the Selectmen may choose other than the lowest bid provided the reasons for such a decision are publicly stated.

A motion by John Scruton to approve was seconded by William Cooper. Butch Barron made an amendment to change to \$2,000 and \$500, seconded by Henry Sullivan. The amendment was defeated by a show of cards. The article was approved as written by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 19. To authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder, municipal vehicles, including a police cruiser and a fire rescue chassis and other equipment as determined by the Selectmen.

A motion to approve was made by William Cooper, seconded by Mary Barron. It was approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will accept the gift of a generator from Davidson Rubber and have it installed in the Fire Station.

A motion to approve was made by William Cooper, seconded by Patty Conway. It was approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey the section of the Old Hornetown Road that has not been used since September, 1866, to the abutting property owners:

Kenneth R. Leary and Nelzina Leary; Kenneth N. Leary and Celeste Leary; Donald T. Ellsworth and Ingrid Ellsworth; and Lorelei and Joseph Ercolino.

for \$1.00, per abutting property owner, all costs of the transfer, including deed preparation, transfer taxes and registry fees to be paid by the grantees. (By Petition)

A motion to approve was made by John Scruton, seconded by Willis Berry and approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with abutters, to place such restrictions, as they deem advisable, upon the parcel in question, and, at their discretion, to sell at fair market value, a parcel of land, identified as being owned by the Town of Farmington, and, known as Map U 2, Lot 68 on the Farmington Tax Map, such property being identified on said map as approximately 25 feet by 140 feet. (By Petition)

A motion was made by John Silvia, seconded by Lawrence Kelly and approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will adopt the Landfill Ordinance as proposed

by the Board of Selectmen or to take other action hereunder. This ordinance covers rules, fees, recycling, fines, etc. Copies of this ordinance are available for inspection at the Town Clerk's Office, the Selectmen's Office and posted in the Town Hall, Osgood's and the Post Office.

This ordinance covers licenses for transient sales, pushcarts, peddlars, etc. It establishes licensing procedures, as well as restrictions on operation, fees, penalties, etc. Copies of this ordinance are available for inspection at the Town Clerk's Office, the Selectmen's Office and posted in the Town Hall,

Osgood's and the Post Office.

A motion to approve was made by William Cooper, seconded by John Scruton and approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an ordinance relevant to race tracks pursuant to RSA 31:41-a, 42, as proposed by the Board of Selectmen or to take any other action hereunder. This ordinance requires all race tracks to obtain a license, post a bond, guarantee insurance and to provide police protection, fire protection, ambulance protection, meet health and safety requirements and other related matters. This ordinance would require the Town licensing of taxicabs and set conditions upon their operation. Copies of this ordinance are available for inspection at the Town Clerk's Office, the Selectmen's Office and posted in the Town Hall, Osgood's and the Post Office.

A motion to approve was made by William Cooper, seconded by

John Scruton and approved by a show of cards.

ARTICLE 27. To transact such other business as may legally come before this meeting.

A motion to adjourn was made at 8:50 P.M., duly seconded and approved by a show of cards.
