TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hancock in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hancock on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March, next at nine-thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for white pine blister rust control, or take any action relating thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred eight dollars for the Monadnock Region Association, or take any action relating thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid on Class V highways, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
6. To see if the Town will vote to repair and tar the road from Sand Hill Road to the residence of Alfred Fairfield and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to relocate the road by the residence of William J. Eva, Jr., at no cost to the Town, or take any action relating thereto.
8. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the maintenance of the new tool house, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.
9. To see if the Town will vote to repair the roof on the old tool house, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.
10. To see if the Town will vote to buy a road grader for the highway department, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to support the action of the Selectmen in regard to the right of way on School Street, or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to plowing private driveways, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To hear reports of the water survey commission and see if the Town wishes to vote for any expansion of the water supply, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to extend the water line from the hydrant near the Goodridge place 850 ft. southeast to the residences of Edward Mulhall and Walter Harrington, and appropriate money from the Water Fund for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

15. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the maintenance of the new cemetery and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to lay out and sell lots in the East Avenue of Norway Plain Cemetery or take any action relating thereto.

17. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$150.00 to be known as the Ralph J. Loverin Cemetery Fund. The interest to be used for the care of my burial lot in Norway Cemetery, Hancock, N. H., George M. Loverin, Donor. This article to take effect April 1, 1955.

18. To see if the Town will vote to build a Tomb and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to set up a reserve fund for the purchase of fire hose for the Hancock Fire Dept. The fund to be established by raising and appropriating the sum of \$100.00. Said fund to be administered by the Trustees of Trust Funds, or take any action relating thereto.

20. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to the maintenance of the Bathing Beach, raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action relating thereto.

21. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to Memorial Day and Old Home Week, raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

HANCOCK 1952

Politics in 1952 stirred citizens sufficiently to bring more people down to the Town Hall November 4th than in any other year in recent memory. This urge to exercise our democratic right we shared with most of the Nation. Even some of our good Democrats saw hope for a way out of our national and international perplexities by choosing Eisenhower. The vote: 321 to 73. Incidentally, ballots cast for Hugh Gregg as Governor were 318 to 63; Norris Cotton for Congress 313 to 55 and for Katharine Jackson for the State Senate 308 to 63. Republicans all.

Walter Hadley for Supervisor of the Check List topped Eisenhower by 5 votes. Without being prodded too hard, he produced some interesting figures as to where the present citizens of Hancock were born. In this restless age when few remain living in the place of their birth (it used to be different) these statistics hold interest. Here's the compilation: Persons on the Check List 453. Born in Hancock 98. Born elsewhere in New Hampshire 82. Born in some other state or foreign country 273.

Yet unmistakably the community spirit and simple way of life of 1952 bears the stamp of those spending their lives in these hills. Many colorful characters have passed on. One Ephraim Weston and his wife departed this very year, also Harry Sheldon; their influence continues. Many not born here have been making Hancock their home 30, 40, 50 years. Some, like Ray Brown, his wife and sisters are only this year on the voting list but summer after summer they have come since horse and buggy days. It was really their home; they merely earned their living in Connecticut.

Others, too, draw pay checks outside Hancock. The number working in Peterborough grows. First, principally the attraction was Verney's Mill and the Guernsey Cattle Club, now must be added the up-and-coming New Hampshire Ball Bearing started by Bud Daniels of Hancock when his time for retirement from the Navy rolled around. Bud's wife Dodo and her family knew Hancock from early childhood. There are others working in Keene, Milford, Bennington, Dublin, Greenfield and one as far away as Bellows Falls. Errol Simonds, contractor, and Freddy Gleason, painter, range the countryside, and there are others.

At the Hancock Tool Company, our one industrial establishment (not counting saw mills), founded by Phil Engstrom, one or two come from neighboring towns to work with us. And many come each day from afar to fuel their cars at Otis Wilder's service station and nearly as far to have their cars and farm machinery put to rights at Charlie Gleason's. It is an active place, Hancock, anyway you look at it even if we don't appear in a flurry except when the fire siren sounds.

How do we look in 1952? I mean our Town complexion, how we do our hair and the cut of our bonnets? Well, Main Street never looked better. The maples and occasional elm spread wide and flourish, a new grass plot appears and newly planted trees thanks to the Woman's Club. The villagers keep their places trim and most of us further out are pretty proud of our lawns and the ordered chaos of our aging farm structures. In winter the Town plows our driveways (minimum charge \$5 we decided at Town Meeting — it used to be free) as well as our roads, in summer Everett Adams and crew smooth the dirt roads keeping the brush at a respectful distance — as respectful as funds allow. Good pine and hemlock lots are scarce but to those not lumber conscious the hardwooded hillsides with scattered conifers are just as beautiful, the streams and lakes preserve their pristine sparkle.

This is particularly true of our end of Nubanusit (Long Pond to oldtimers) where the summer lake colony changes little with passing years. Ned and Cora Perkins should write their history of this section, for he, at least, first heard the lapping waters back when voters were choosing McKinley.

What did we talk about in 1952? Well, one thing — our schools. A project is on foot to build a central high school in Peterborough for surrounding towns, including Hancock. Robbie King and others attended meetings, there was discussion as might be expected at the PTA and elsewhere, quite a lot of it. The time for decision may come next year, actually all the needed data for weighing the pros and cons is not in. The proponents say: we abandoned many years ago some 9 little red school houses scattered about town for a central school in the village, it's logical now to take the next step and have a central (cooperative) school in Peterborough. The opponents chiefly talk costs — and, as yet, no one has the neat figures on exhibit.

And, of course, we talked of life and death and taxes, but mostly this year politics, quietly.

B. ADMINISTRATIVE POLICY

It has been recognized for many years that not all children learn at the same rate, and therefore when children are admitted to school on the basis of age alone, the rate of learning by the members of the first grade varies greatly. This creates serious problems of instruction for the teacher. The question of when children should start their school experiences has been difficult to answer, and no common agreement has been reached. However, it is generally recognized by those who know most about how children learn to read that a normal child has to be at least $6\frac{1}{2}$ years old before he can acquire the skills necessary in learning to read.

In order to find a better answer than the common practice of admitting children to school in September if they will be six years old by the following December, your Superintendent asked three local people to constitute a committee to study the problem with him. Dr. Margaret Reynolds of Peterborough, Mrs. Elizabeth Gunther of Hancock, and Dr. Richard Eustis of Boston and Harrisville accepted the invitation. Dr. Reynolds is well known for her marvelous work with children as a pediatrician. Mrs. Gunther has had highly successful experience working with children with special learning problems, particularly in the field of reading. She is skilled in discovering each child's learning potentialities. Dr. Eustis has had years of experience as a pediatrician, and is head of the Speech Clinic of the Children's Hospital in Boston. Few communities in the United States, regardless of size, could find people of greater competence for the problem being attacked. The committee agreed unanimously to study a few children whose parents felt they would profit from early admission to school. The Hancock School Board, as well as the School Boards of the other districts in this Supervisory Union, voted unanimously to admit any child to school on the recommendation of the Superintendent, supported by the recommendation of the committee.

The parents of two Hancock children applied for permission for their children to enter school in September 1952, even though they would not reach the age of six by December. The committee studied the two children and agreed they would profit by entering school in September, which they were permitted to do. Both are adapting themselves well to the school experiences. It is hoped that the committee will be willing to make further studies of the problem.

At the close of the school year two of the regular teachers decided not to return: Rachel Plimpton at the Elementary School, and Nina Krochmal at the High School. The former was replaced by Mrs. Rutledge, a graduate of Castleton Normal School and Lyndon Teachers College in Vermont, with several

years of highly successful teaching experience in Vermont and New Hampshire rural and graded schools. Miss Krochmal's place was taken by Miss Freitag, a graduate of Clark University.

In February 1952 Mr. Coogan, Supervisor of Music, resigned, and Mrs. Margaret King substituted for the remainder of the school year. During the summer Mr. Prince was engaged on a permanent basis to replace Mr. Coogan. He is carrying the music work in Jaffrey and Dublin as well as in Hancock.

During the year Mr. Thawley completed his work at Boston University for his Master of Education degree. He is to be commended for this demonstration of his interest in his professional improvement.

B. PROGRAM AND METHODS

Every effort is being made in the schools, both high and elementary, to give pupils desirable and worthwhile experiences in assuming an increasing measure of responsibility for the direction of their own activities. There is no way of training people for the responsibilities of the democratic way of life except through guided experiences. Democracy depends for its success upon the way people act, not upon the facts about democracy they can parrot. The conduct of an individual becomes acceptable to the group when the individual has learned from experience how the group responds toward him in his ever-varying pattern of action and reaction. The amount of responsibility an individual assumes for his own conduct determines his maturity. If a person allows another to carry a large part of that responsibility, he is immature. If he carries it himself, he is mature. Hancock pupils are being given repeated opportunities in assuming more and more responsibility for their own conduct, thereby being helped to attain normal maturity and a wholesome life.

PART III. SCHOOL PLANT

A. REPAIRS AND NEEDS

The most important improvement to the school plant made during the past year was the replacement of the desks and chairs in the upper grade room with new movable units. This has added much to the appearance of the room, and has meant much toward relieving uneasiness on the part of the pupils.

The floors were cleaned and resealed during the past summer, and the fire escape was painted.

The school is very appreciative of the fine record player presented by the P.T.A. In order to properly care for it, a storage cabinet has been built in the upper grade room, where it can be kept when not in use.

Several minor items need attention in the near future:

1. The primary room should be painted;
2. A counter with cubicles under it for convenient storage of pupils' workbooks and other large papers is needed in the primary room;
3. Additional shelving is needed in the storage or supply room;
4. A suitable mat located just inside the front door would prevent much wear to the floors from sand and dirt now being tracked in;
5. The badly worn and unsatisfactory duplicator should be replaced by a modern liquid duplicator for use in the preparation of pupils' seat work.

Two major items should be given consideration as soon as possible:

1. Larger desks in the primary room.
2. Better lighting in both rooms.

The Warrant includes an article asking for a special appropriation to improve the lighting. Perhaps the following year the need for the desks can be met.

B INSURANCE

The amount of fire insurance being carried on the Elementary School is \$10,000, with none on the contents. The rate is \$2.80 per \$100 for five years, and the insurance is with the Grange Mutual Fire Insurance Company. The present policy expires March 7, 1957.

It may be that some consideration should be given to the adequacy of the coverage in view of the present-day replacement cost of the building and the fact that the value of the contents is several hundred dollars.

B. SCHOOL LUNCH

It may be of interest to note that the United States Department of Agriculture donated to the Hancock school lunch program during the school year 1951-52 the following amounts of food, the only direct cost being for transportation:

- 3 cases dried milk
- 1 case canned peas
- 1 case dried pea beans
- 3 cases canned sour red cherries
- 3 cases cheese
- 4 cases canned peaches
- 1 case dried eggs
- 2 cases peanut butter
- 2 cases snap beans
- 6 cases concentrated orange juice
- 28 boxes fresh apples
- 4 cases honey
- 4 cases canned tomatoes

- 4 cases tomato puree
- 3 cases dried prunes
- 1 case shelled pecans

In the report of the school lunch fund, it can be noticed that the Federal Government paid the Hancock school lunch program \$689.64, in addition to the donation of the food. The rate of allotment of Federal funds was approximately six cents per lunch per pupil. This indicates that over 11,000 lunches were served during the school year.

C. TRANSPORTATION
