INFORMATION FOR KENSINGTON RESIDENTS

RULES & REGULATIONS FOR WASTE OR REFUSE DISPOSAL

1. There will be a house to house pickup every Wednesday of each week.
2. Waste must be contained in plastic bags or trash containers, not to exceed a capacity of 30 gallons.
3. Solid waste must be placed at end of driveway at 7 a.m.
4. Weight of any container not to exceed 100 pounds.
5. No brush or stumps will be picked up and no 55 gallon drums are to be used.
6. Refrigerators, stoves, washing machines, dryers and tires will be picked up the first Tuesday in May and November.
7. Providing leaves are to be disposed of along with solid waste, the limit for each week will be four 30 gallon trash containers or 8 plastic bags.
8. There will be a container placed at the elementary school for the use of the school, fire house, library, town hall, church and american legion.

LICENSING OF DOGS

Each owner of a dog 3 months old or over must register the dog with the Town Clerk before May 1st. Each dog over 6 months must have received a "rabies vaccination" certificate of vaccination to be presented to the Town Clerk at time of licensing. Each dog must wear a collar around its neck; attached to said collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its registration number.

License fees are as follows:

Male	\$6.00	Female	\$6.50
Neutered Male	\$3.50	Spayed Female	\$3.50

Penalties - \$1.00 per month after May 1st.

JUNK CAR REGULATIONS

A recent N. H. Statute requires anyone with two or more unregistered or old cars no longer intended or in condition for legal use on highways or used auto parts equal in bulk to two vehicles must obtain a license or be subject to a \$10.00 a day fine and a mandatory injunction to end the violation by the selectmen. New and used car dealers registered as such are not considered auto junk dealers but must remove any junk cars from their premises within 160 days.

TOWN WARRANT
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kensington in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Kensington on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following Articles:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:62 for the property tax exemption on real property equipped with a solar energy heating or cooling system which exemption shall be in an amount equal to the value of the installation?
3. Land use ordinance for the town of Kensington, N. H.

CHAPTER I - POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE TOWN OF KENSINGTON

ARTICLE 1.0 Preamble: In order to promote the health, safety, prosperity, appearance, convenience, economy and general welfare of the community, the following Ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of Kensington, New Hampshire. This Ordinance is in accordance with Chapters 672 and 677, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated. (1959)

CHAPTER II - PLANNING AND ZONING

ARTICLE 1.0 General

The articles of this Ordinance were adopted at Town Meetings May 12, 1959; March 14, 1961; March 11, 1969; March 9, 1971; March 6, 1973; March 4, 1975; March 8, 1977; March 16, 1978; March 13, 1979 and March 11, 1980.

ARTICLE 1.1 This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage. (1959)

ARTICLE 1.2 Any authorized use of land may continue in its present use providing it does not create conditions hazardous to public health or safety as judged by the Selectmen and at least one qualified specialist as specified.

ARTICLE 1.3 After passage of this Ordinance it shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen to enforce the provisions herein. (1959)

ARTICLE 1.4 Upon the well-founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of the ordinance. A written warning will be issued by the Selectmen. If, after a reasonable time limit set by the Selectmen, the ordinance is still being violated, the violator shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$100.00 for each violation. Each day that the violation is allowed to continue constitutes a separate offense. The total fine cannot exceed \$500.00. The Board of Selectmen may institute in the name of the town any appropriate action or proceedings to prevent, restrain, correct or abate violations of this ordinance.

ARTICLE 1.5 This ordinance may be amended by majority vote of any legal Town Meeting at which such amendments are properly presented in accordance with the procedure prescribed by the N. H. RSA Chapter 675 as amended from time to time. (1969)

ARTICLE 1.6 The invalidity of any provision of the ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

ARTICLE 2.0 ESTABLISH LOCAL LAND USE BOARDS

ARTICLE 2.1 The Board of Selectmen is authorized to appoint an Inspector of Buildings who shall hold office for a term of one year. (1971)

ARTICLE 2.2 To provide for a means of appeal by any property owner a Board of Adjustment shall be created to adjust any grievances. The Selectmen shall appoint to the Board five members conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 673, N. H.

Revised Statutes Annotated. The Selectmen shall make appointments to fill vacancies occurring on the Board of Adjustment. The members of the Board of Adjustment shall serve without remuneration. (1959)

ARTICLE 2.3 The Planning Board is authorized and empowered to approve or disapprove in its discretion, plats showing new streets or the widening thereof, or parks, and to authorize the town clerk as the municipal officer to issue on behalf of the Planning Board when appropriate a certificate of its failure to take action on approval or disapproval of a plat submitted to it, and upon adoption of this article it shall be the duty of the town clerk to file with the Registry of Deeds of the County of Rockingham, a certificate or note showing that the said Planning Board has been so authorized giving the date of authorization, as provided in Sections 19-20 inclusive, Chapter 674, of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated. (1961)

The Planning Board accepts this as the final form of this Amendment to the Town of Kensington Land Use Ordinances. It is meant to replace Articles 1,8 & 19-26 of the Current Land Use Ordinances.

4. CHAPTER II - Planning and Zoning

ARTICLE 8 - A District of Residential and Agricultural Use - RA-I

Article 8.0 - General Purpose: These regulations and restrictions are for the purpose of regulating the use of land, and the location and construction of buildings in the Town of Kensington, while insuring safety from fires, protection of water, and other natural resources and preservation of rural charm.

ARTICLE 8.1 - Definitions: When used in this district the following terms shall have the meanings given to them in this section:

- A. Frontage - means that portion of a property line bordering on a highway, street or right of way.
- B. Lot - means a parcel of land at least sufficient in size to meet the minimum requirement for use coverage and area and to provide required yards and other open spaces. An undersize lot is permissible if it passes state standards for soil conditions and substantially meets the requirements here and if in existence at time of passage of this ordinance.
- C. Manufactured housing - as defined by the RSA 674:31 - any structure transportable in one or more sections, which in the travelling mode is 8 body feet or more in width and 40 body feet or more in length or when erected on a site is 320 sq. ft. or more and which is built on a permanent chassy and designed to be used as a dwelling with or without a permanent foundation and connected to the required utilities which include plumbing, heating and electrical heating systems contained therein.
- D. Nonconforming - means use of land, building or premise which is not a use permitted by the provisions of this ordinance for the district in which such land, building or premise is situated.

- E. Permanent building - means any building resting upon a foundation or otherwise legally defined as real estate.
- F. Permanent resident - means an individual or family using any building continuous as a residence for a period of six months or more.
- G. Right of way - means and includes all present and proposed town, state and federal highways and the land on either side of same as covered by statutes to determine the width of the right of way.
- H. Set back - means the distance between the nearest portion of a building and a lot or right of way line which ever is closer.
- I. Dwelling unit - means a single unit providing complete independent living facilities, eating, cooking and sanitation.
- J. Two family dwelling - means a building containing two dwelling units.
- K. One family dwelling - a building containing one dwelling unit.
- L. Multifamily apartment house - means a building or portion thereof containing more than two dwelling units and not classified as a one or two family dwelling.
- M. Sign - an outdoor display structure including its letters, figure, character and design constructed, erected or manufactured in any manner whatsoever so that the same shall be used for the attraction of the public to any place.
- N. Commercial - is a business involved in the exchange, buying or selling of commodities and/or services as a merchant for financial profit whether wholesale or retail, exclusive of agricultural products.
- O. Industrial - is a business enterprise which employs a labor force to manufacture, process or supply a product for wholesale distribution.
- P. Home occupation - is a business located in a single dwelling unit which displays or sells stocks of goods, wares, services or merchandise to the general public including among others: retail stores, shops, salesrooms, professional services and where such use is clearly incidental to the use of the building as a residence.
- Q. Cluster dwelling - a group of two or more dwelling units sharing a common lot whether or not in a planned unit development.
- R. Agricultural use - shall mean land used for agriculture, farming, dairying, pasturage, apiculture, floriculture, silviculture and animal and poultry husbandry.
- S. Scenic roads - any one of several roads in the Town which, in accordance with RSA 231:157 have been so designated by the townspeople and thereby afforded the protection of RSA 231:138 from any reconstruction with respect thereto.
- T. Mining and excavation operations - any venture, private or commercial which uses land or any portion of land or slopes for the removing of sand, gravel, rock, soil or construction aggregate from the premises the purpose of which is primarily financial profit rather than incidental to the lawful construction or alteration of a building, or change in landscaping, or part of agricultural activities.

- U. Qualified soil scientist - a person qualified in soil classification and who is recommended or approved by the Rockingham County Conservation District Supervisors.
- V. Abuttor - means any person whose property is located in N. H. and joins or is directly across the street or stream from the property to be considered or under consideration by the Board. For purposes of receiving testimony only, and not for purpose of notification, the term abuttor shall include any person who is able to demonstrate that his land will be directly affected by the proposal under construction or to be considered.

ARTICLE 8.2 - Specific Requirements of the Residential - Agricultural District

I. Restrictions

- A. There shall be no more than one single family dwelling or residence on a lot of record.
- B. Commercial and industrial uses, mining excavation operations, home occupation, two family dwellings, cluster dwellings and multifamily apartment houses are prohibited in this district except as provided in Article 8.3:
- C. Trailer parks and mobile home parks are specifically prohibited in this district.
- D. Racetracks or test tracks for motor vehicles whether ovals, drag strips or other configurations are prohibited within this district.
- E. All agricultural use is permitted in this zone except as restricted below:
 - 1. Kennels and veterinary hospitals are permitted subject to the requirements of the commercial use of land. However, the boarding, breeding, training, treatment or disposing of racing dogs shall not be permitted.
 - 2. Mink farms are specifically prohibited.

II. Land Requirements

- A. The lot area of any dwelling or residence shall not be less than one (1) acre except that one dwelling may be located on a lot of less than one acre provided this lot has been duly recorded in the County of Registrative Deeds at the time of passage of the ordinance. (1959)
- B. Every building lot shall have a minimum frontage of one hundred fifty (150') feet abutting upon a public street or road (1961).
- C. Building lots must meet the following requirements based on soil conditions:
 - 1. All test pits and percolation tests shall be performed in the presence of a qualified test pit inspector approved by the selectmen.
 - 2. Soil types determine lot sizes according to the requirements of Table #1 of Subdivision Regulations for the Town of Kensington. Determination of soil types shall be made by a qualified soil scientist using published soil data with on site inspection as necessary.

3. All septic systems must meet the minimum standards imposed by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. After installation, the septic system must also be approved by the test pit inspector before it is covered over.
4. No septage, waste or sludge disposal system shall be located in wetland soil as defined by the Town of Kensington Wetland ordinance. No building of any kind shall be placed on wetland soil as defined by the Town of Kensington wetland ordinance.
5. The test inspector is authorized to consult with a qualified engineer prior to approving the proposed septic system. All fees applicable to this section will be charged to the builder and are payable to the inspector.

III. Site Requirements - There shall be observed the following setbacks in the construction of new buildings or in the relocation of existing ones.

- A. A building or addition shall not be located nearer than 25 feet from the property lines of any abuttor and not nearer than 50 feet from any structure on an abuttor's property.
- B. There shall be a minimum depth of 25 feet between the nearest right of way and any building.

IV. Building Requirements

- A. Every building including manufactured housing to be used as a dwelling unit shall have a minimum living area of six hundred and fifty (650) sq. ft. (1971)
- B. Manufactured housing used as a dwelling unit shall be subject to all the land, site and building requirements of any other dwelling unit. These regulations shall not be construed to prohibit permanent residents from storing on their premises unoccupied vacation type trailers or so called camperbodies owned by them and used for bonafide vacation purposes. Trailers used for field office or storage in conjunction with construction projects which meet acceptable sanitary standards may be permitted by the selectmen for periods of sixty (60) days subject to renewal as required.

ARTICLE 8.3 Uses Other Than Single Family Dwellings

- I. Special Exceptions - Application for special exception for uses other than single family dwellings will be made to the Board of Adjustment providing that no use will be permitted which could cause any undue hazards to health, safety or property values or which is offensive to the public because of noise, vibration, excessive traffic, unsanitary condition, noxious odor, smoke or other similar reasons. All abuttor's shall be notified by the Board of Adjustment by certified mail at least ten days prior to any public hearing regarding the site. The names and addresses of the abuttor's shall be supplied by the applicant.

A. Special exception for business, commercial or industrial ventures

1. Business, commercial or industrial ventures are permitted in this district through a "special exception" as granted by the Board of Adjustment.

2. After permission through "special exception" is granted by the Board of Adjustment, the application will be referred to the Planning Board for site plan review. A permit for intended use must be issued by the Planning Board.
3. Site Plan Review - In addition to the site plan review regulations as adopted by the Planning Board in Chapter 4, the following requirements apply:
 - a. the minimum lot size shall be 2 acres with a minimum two hundred and fifty (250) feet of frontage on a town approved street.
 - b. there shall be not less than fifty (50) feet setback from a building or a parking lot to a lot line and not less than one hundred (100) feet setback from the established right of way. Grass or beautification shall be present in the buffer area between the right of way and a building or parking lot.
 - c. any change in the nature of the grounds upon which the original approval was granted requires a re-application and a new public hearing as provided.
4. Signs

For the purpose of this ordinance all signs and billboards are classified as commercial use and shall be permitted only if conforming to the following regulation.

No billboard not existing at the time of the adoption of this ordinance or during the year preceeding this adoption shall be permitted.

No sign shall project within the limits of a public highway except when placed by the governmental unit having jurisdiction over such highway or be placed so as to obstruct the view of any highway intersection or so as to endanger traffic.

No sign, banner or other advertising medium not especially permitted in the foregoing paragraph and no sign over 12 sq. ft. in area may be erected unless the Board of Selectmen shall rule that the same in a given case and location and under the conditions specified in the permit therefore is not injurious, offensive or detrimental to the neighborhood.

Signs may be illuminated by external continuous white lighting only.

Signs shall be limited to an overall height, including supporting structures to 15 feet above ground level.

The following signs are permitted and are unrestricted.

Signs pertaining to the lease or sale of the land or buildings on which places.

Highway, park or other regulating signs of the Town or State of New Hampshire.

Signs of a temporary nature advertising events sponsored by nonprofit and civic organizations for the Town.

B. Special exceptions for home occupation

1. Home products and produce may be bought and sold in this district subject to the following rules and regulations, by "special exception" as granted by the Board of Adjustment.
 - a. Where permitted within a single dwelling unit and only by the person or persons maintaining a dwelling therein who are permanent residents of the Town of Kensington.
 - b. Evidence of use: does not display or create outside the dwelling any evidence of home occupation except a permitted sign not to exceed four square feet in area.
 - c. Extent of use: does not utilize more than twenty five (25) percent of the gross floor (including basement) area of the dwelling unit.
 - d. Permitted use: such use is clearly incidental and secondary to the use of the dwelling unit for residential purposes and that adequate provisions are made for off street parking.
 - e. Persons proposing a home occupation under the above conditions shall apply to the Board of Adjustment for a "special exception". A public hearing and notification of the abutters shall be made as previously stated.
 - f. Permit required: site plan review - after obtaining a "special exception" by the Board of Adjustment, persons proposing a home occupation shall apply to the Planning Board for approval of their plan and permission to proceed with the proposed use.

C. Exceptions for two family dwelling, multi-family apartment house, and cluster development

1. Two family dwellings and multi-family apartment houses and cluster development shall be allowed providing that a "special exception" has been granted by the Board of Adjustment after a public hearing and notification of the abutters as previously stated.
2. Site plan review - in addition to the site plan review regulation as adopted by the Planning Board in Chapter 4, the applicant shall comply with the following:
 - a. All ordinances governing residential buildings in this district.
 - b. The minimum lot size shall be 2 acres for the first dwelling unit plus one acre per unit for each unit thereafter. Minimum frontage shall be 250 feet for the first dwelling unit plus 100 feet for each unit thereafter.
 - c. Off street parking shall be for a minimum of 450 sq. ft. per unit.
 - d. Building shall be limited to the ground level plus one level higher and one level lower.
 - e. All wiring, water, plumbing and septic systems shall meet the state and local requirements.

II. Exceptions for mining and excavation operations

No mining or excavation operation is allowed in this district without a duly authorized permit for this use in accordance with Chapter V, Article 1 of the Kensington Land Use Ordinance and RSA 155:E (1979)

FINAL ACCEPTANCE BY THE PLANNING BOARD

A third public hearing on this Zoning Amendment was held on January 3, 1985 after which the majority of the Planning Board accepted this document as the final form of the Zoning Amendment Titled:

Chapter II - Planning and Zoning
Article 8 - A District of Residential and Agricultural Use
RA-I

Said Article is meant to replace Articles 2-6, 12-15, 17 & 18 of the existing Kensington Land Use Ordinances.

6. To see if the Town wishes to allow a discount on taxes paid within 30 to 60 days after presentation of tax bills.
7. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid to the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes.
8. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
9. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Public Drinking Ordinance as follows:

SECTION 1. No person shall consume any alcoholic beverage, or have in his possession any open container of alcoholic beverage, while in any vehicle or while upon any public park, playground, sidewalk, common, Town owned property, or any public way within the geographical limits of Kensington.

SECTION 2.

- A. Penalty- Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and upon conviction thereof shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each offense.
- B. Validity- If any section or part of a section, or paragraph of this article is declared invalid or unconstitutional, it shall not be held to invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section or sections, or part of a section or paragraph of this Ordinance.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Littering Ordinance as follows:

SECTION 1. No person shall put or place, or cause to be put or placed, in and upon any Town owned roadway or property any bottles, glass, crockery, cans, scrap metal, junk, paper, garbage, old automobiles or parts thereof, or refuse of any nature whatsoever or noxious thing.

SECTION 2. Penalty - Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a violation and upon conviction thereof shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for each offense. 12

B. Validity - If any section or part of a section, or paragraph of this Article is declared invalid or unconstitutional, it shall not be held to invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section or sections, or part of a section or paragraph of this ordinance.

11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the False Alarm Ordinance as follows:

SECTION 1.

A. "False Alarm" means the activation of an alarm system as a result of mechanical failure, accidental activation, misoperation, malfunction, misuse or neglect, by or of the owner or lessee of an alarm system whether used for domestic, commercial or industrial purposes. "False Alarm" shall not include alarms caused by earthquake, violent winds, malfunction of telephone line circuits, or external causes of a kind beyond the control of the owner or lessee of an alarm system. Upon the evidence failing to establish an illegal intrusion or other legitimate need or cause for the activation of an alarm system, a conclusive presumption shall arise that the activation is a "false alarm".

B. If an owner or lessee of an alarm system shall record more than three (3) false alarms in any period of 180 days, such owner or lessee shall be liable to a penalty of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).

SECTION 2.

A. Validity - If any section or part of a section, or paragraph of this Ordinance is declared invalid or unconstitutional, it shall not be held to invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section or sections, or part of a section or paragraph of this Ordinance.

12. To see if the Town will vote to allow that monies appropriated for the conservation commission be allowed to accumulate from year to year as allowed by RSA 36-A:5.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to purchase and install road name signs on Kensington Town roads.

14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt by reference the BOCA Basic Building Code, as amended.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 to provide a full-time Police Chief.

16. By petition of Hubert H. Schweizer, Jr. and others: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the purchase of a new pumper-tanker fire engine and necessary equipment, said engine to meet specifications as drawn by the Board of Fire Engineers; and for this purpose, to raise a sum not exceeding Ninety Thousand Dollars (\$90,000.00) by issue of serial notes of the Town, under and in accordance with, the provisions of Chapter 33 (Municipal Finance Act) of N. H. Revised Statutes Annotated as amended, the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, interest rate or discount rate, the place of payment, the form and other details of said notes to be delegated to the selectmen.

17. By petition of Seth W. Perry and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of participating in a Regional Home Hazardous Waste Collection program.

18. By petition of Patricia Williams and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$318.00 to the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc.

19. By petition of Judith Pease and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to the Rockingham Land Trust for the purpose of participating in a study to identify landholdings abutting the Exeter River and its major tributaries, with an ultimate goal of forming an association to protect this vital watershed area.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,347.10 to pay Kensington's share of a state ordered hydro geological study, installation of ground water monitoring wells, and closure plan at the Kingston land fill.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,708.00 to the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.
22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$907.28 to the Rockingham Planning Commission.
23. By petition of Nancy Roffman and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for the continuation of the Mediation Program.
24. By petition of Judith Pease and others: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to the Rockingham Child and Family Services.
25. By petition of Alfred Felch and others: To see if the Town, out of concern for the health and safety of its citizens, will instruct its selectmen and other appropriate public officials to work cooperatively with the N. H. Civil Defense Agency and other involved state agencies to help improve the Town's draft Emergency Response Plan which has been prepared in order to protect the public in the event of an accident at Seabrook Station or any emergency such as a major fire, flood, storm or toxic spill and, in so doing, to participate in the exercise conducted in cooperation with state and federal officials to test the plan. This article is not intended to constitute final approval by the Town of the draft Emergency Response Plan.
26. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$7,949.58 and interest from the Revenue Sharing Fund to be transferred to the Capital Reserve Fund established for the investment of a town office. This amount to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund as needed.
27. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Motion was made by Sandra and seconded by James Kaler. Voice vote was in the Affirmative. Voice vote on ammended article was in the Affirmative.

3. To see if the Town wishes to allow a discount on taxes paid within 30 to 60 days after presentation of tax bills. Voice vote to indefinitely postpone article was in the Affirmative.

4. To vote on the basis of payment and the amount thereof to be paid to the Tax Collector for the collection of taxes. Voice vote in the Affirmative to pay Tax Collector $\frac{1}{2}$ of 1% of taxes collected.
5. To see if the Town will grant the Selectmen authority to borrow money in anticipation of taxes. Voice vote was in the Affirmative.
6. By petition of Francis Pease, Jr. and others: "To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to purchase equipment and services needed by the Planning Board." Voice vote was in the Affirmative.
7. To see if the Town of Kensington will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,520.00 to the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. Voice vote was in the Affirmative.
8. To see if the Town of Kensington will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$919.80 to the Rockingham Planning Commission. Voice vote was in the Affirmative.
9. By petition of Nancy Roffman and others: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the continuation of the Mediation Program." Voice vote was in the Affirmative.
10. By petition of Edith M. Keough and others: "To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$476.00 to the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency. This amount represents 2.5% of \$19,077.00, the value of services rendered to Kensington residents from September 1, 1982 through August 31, 1983." Voice vote was in the Affirmative.
11. By petition of Judith Pease and others: "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$345.00 to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services, a private non-profit organization. It has been established that our counseling services must be assessed at \$40.00 per hour. During the period July 1, 1982 through June 30, 1983, our fiscal year, 10 residents of the Town of Kensington used this Counseling Center for a total of 29 $\frac{1}{2}$ sessions at a cost of \$1,180.00 to the agency. However, only \$373.00 was received. These funds requested to be used for current operating expenses to enable Rockingham Child and Family Services to continue providing individual and family counseling for residents of the Town of Kensington whether or not said residents are able to pay." Voice vote was in the Affirmative.
12. By petition of James R. Rosencrantz and others: "To see if the Town of Kensington shall call upon the Governor and Executive Council, its State Representative(s) and State Senator to promptly convene a Special Session of the Legislature for the sole purpose of preventing the imposition of huge cost increases in electric rates resulting from the Seabrook Nuclear Power Plant on the citizens, businesses, schools and agencies in the Town of Kensington, and to direct the Selectmen to promptly notify our above listed elected officials of the Town's desire." Voice vote was in the Affirmative.
13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the purchase of a police cruiser. Voice vote was in the Affirmative.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

1984 was an extremely busy year. The Board worked extensively on new Sub-division Regulations which use on-site information as a basis for lot size and have more restrictions on the construction of new streets which the Town may be obliged to maintain. The Site Plan Review Regulations were updated with a new definitions section and our Town Land Use Ordinance were consolidated and reworked to be more consistent with state statutes. Work continues on Excavation Regulations and Driveway Regulations. With the help of several Townspeople the Master Plan is being rewritten. This is especially important in view of the recent state legislation and court action in this regard. The Planning Board has been working with the Rockingham Regional Planning Commission toward construction of a current land use map for the Town.

Business as usual was made much more efficient with our new map storage file (replacing old cardboard boxes) and a new system of recording and filing Town Plats on 35 mm. film file cards in the Town Hall. We approved several minor lot line changes and some new building lots and one addition to a major subdivision this year. We continue to grapple with the problems of home occupations and commercial uses of land throughout town, including excavation operations about which we held several joint meetings with the Board of Selectmen. How all these fit into a town that wants to maintain a rural character is always challenging.

To paraphrase a comment from the 1968 "Kensington Study" - "The future of our community is very largely determined by the hopes, plans and decisions of those who are its members." The Planning Board encourages and needs active participation by the Townspeople. Our meetings are held monthly on the first Thursday at the Town Hall - all are welcome.

REPORT OF THE KENSINGTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

As your Chief of Police, I am pleased to report to you the activities of the Kensington Police Department for the calendar year 1984.

This past year, the Kensington Police Department has come a long way establishing itself with integrity and professionalism. We have been recognized by state authorities as a dependable and efficient department based on our part-time availability.

Our conviction rate is at an all time high for this department. Our police officers are well versed with the importance of compiling a solid case for court presentation.

This past September, we had an opportunity to conduct and execute an investigation which led to the seizure of 286 marijuana plants. State officials informed us that this contraband would have netted a street value of \$572,000. The Attorney Generals office indicated that this was one of the states largest seizures.

Our department also had an opportunity to assist the Exeter Police Department in a local search for the missing Tammy Belanger child. An extensive area search of the Hathaway gravel pits off the Old New Boston Road was conducted. This involved an underwater dive team as well as support and surface crews dragging the bottom of the quarries. We were honored to be part of this effort for little Tammy.

Both the marijuana seizure and the missing Belanger child brought us local, state and New England recognition.

The department has also expanded its in-service training for all our police personnel. These training classes have become a necessity in order to stay current with the rapidly changing criminal justice system.

Fire Chief Schweizer and myself have also initiated training sessions for both fire and police members. This training has taught both departments their immediate duties and responsibilities at the scene of an emergency. Both

departments are confident and well trained in their respective areas.

This past year we have also had an opportunity to update some obsolete equipment within the police department. The purchase of a new cruiser now provides the community with a dependable response. The installation of a new cruiser radio now enables us to communicate with the Rockingham Dispatch Center, the N. H. State Police, all local towns within the county, Seacoast Fire, and of course our own town frequency which is a direct communication between local police and fire departments. The addition of two portable radios also allows us to maintain continuous communication with our dispatch center at all times. We now conduct plain clothes investigations, surveillance, and foot patrol. It also allows us to equip off duty police officers detailed at private town functions. This will enable him to monitor and seek immediate help from the duty officer should he require assistance.

The day to day activities of the Kensington Police Department has also kept us busy over the past 12 months. Three particular areas which required the immediate involvement of the Kensington Police Department have been highlighted for your evaluation. These categories in past years have had a tendency to stand out in public view.

- 1.) PROPERTY CRIMES such as theft, burglary, criminal mischief (vandalism) and littering have taken a slight increase to 59 reportable offenses verses 54 in 1983. The most alarming concern in this area is burglary. There is nothing more discouraging than to return home and find the privacy of your castle invaded. Most of the time, personal property will be missing, "Some Irreplacable." Burglary is up 50% over last year. 90% of these burglaries had ocured during daytime hours.
- 2.) CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS such as assault, criminal threatning and harrassment is also up this year. Domestic offenses is a major concern in this category, up 97% over the previous year. The majority of these cases are alcohol related.
- 3.) MOTOR VEHICLE activity has looked favorable for the Kensington Police Department this year. We have had 64 reportable accidents verses 70 last year. Unfortunately, some are more serious than others. One accident in July nearly crippled two young people for the rest of their lives. The sad thing is, it wasn't their fault. Motor vehicle violations have decreased over 50% from 1983. This is not a result of inattention to duty, but additional patrol hours. Patrol means visibility and visibility is a proven deterrent!

Many other duties and responsibilities are preformed by your local police department. A consolidated review of these areas follows this report.

"REMLMBER," crime prevention and community awareness are key elements in our efforts to curtail crime. The more the public can tell us, the more effective we can be at our investigation and apprehension duties.

The members of the Kensington Police Department are always happy to serve the citizens and visitors of the Kensington community. We welcome your questions and interest in the department. Please feel free to call on us at any time.

The circulation total shows a SATISFACTORY INCREASE OVER 1983. There is quite an increase in the magazine circulation. Many borrowers come in just to take out a load of magazines. There are a number of generous citizens in town who donate some of their magazines to us when they have read them. This increases the number of magazines we have to offer the public. To these people, my thanks. It is deeply appreciated.

We added a total of 644 books to the library this past year. Of these 267 were gifts. Doris Sullivan gave us the largest number when she moved out of town. Doris's books were of exceptional value and of a wide variety of subjects. Most of them were in the non-fiction category.

Memorial books were given to the library in 1984 in memory of Frank Welsh, Jeffery Kuegel, Ruth Sawyer and Peter Atwood. This is one way of honoring people who are no longer with us.

A paperback book rack was purchased this fall and we were able to clear some stacks for hard bound books when we placed our paperback collection in the new rack. We were able to relieve some of the over crowding in the non-fiction section of the adult stack. Some additional stacking is on order and this, when in place, will make for a narrower center aisle but will bring some relief for a short while. Something will need to be done to help the crowded

fiction stacks in the near future. There is little more weeding that can be done and still maintain a useful collection.

Sally Head has offered excellent programs for the children of the community during the summer months. Last summer's summer reading program was well attended and the children read with enthusiasm. A party is held for the youngsters who complete the requirements for the program and all of the children qualified. The party was a pool and pizza party held at the Head residence. Pizza Hut furnished individual pizzas for each of the children. Sally taught several different crafts to the children for the craft programs. Space is limited in the children's room so the number of children who may take the craft sessions is limited.

Weekly movies for the children were held during July and August and were well attended. Sally Head works very hard during the summer to amuse and keep our young ones occupied and out of mischief.

June Armstrong retired as of the end of 1984. She worked at the library for 16 years and she will be greatly missed. A retirement party was given her before she retired. Carol Sargent has been hired to make up the staff of four. Carol is a quick learner and is very fast becoming familiar with the various ways of doing things. We are very pleased to have Carol as a member of the staff.

We wish to thank both the Social and the Public Trustees for their un-failing support and cooperation during the past year. It has been a most productive year in the library.

My personal thanks go to all the members of the library staff for their cooperation, excellent work effort and for never refusing to undertake any task I asked of them. They were always completely dependable. Sally Head supervises the children's room in a professional manner and the children are most comfortable with her methods. This fall Sally completed a course in children's literature at Portsmouth High School which should be a help in her book selection for the children's room. Priscilla Prescott is an excellent typist and assists at the library in other ways. We will miss June Armstrong's attention to details and the many other things she did so well. My personal thanks to each member of the staff for performing their duties so capably.

We wish to thank the members of both boards of trustees for their willing cooperation and for responding so well to the library's needs. We have come a long way in the past year.

I would also like to thank anyone who has served the library in a volunteer capacity during the last year. The volunteers are very valuable to us if we are to continue serving the community effectively. Believe me, we do appreciate you.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

During the year of 1984, the Conservation Commission has held regular monthly meetings. The Commission has adopted the following as a general goal: The protection of the integrity and accessibility of the large open spaces in town for the purpose of maintaining the quality of the town's water resources, perpetuating the rural character of the town and preserving the existing wild-life habitat. This goal has been extensively developed in the proposed conservation section for the 1985 revision of the Town Master Plan.

The Conservation Commission has contributed to the development of a comprehensive map of the land use in Kensington being prepared by the Rockingham Planning Commission.

In July, 1984, Dr. Charles DeLuccia transferred to the Town the title on five acres in the Great Meadows. This parcel is contiguous with land on which the Town has previously acquired conservation easements. The Conservation Commission is grateful for Dr. DeLuccia's generosity and plans to continue efforts to ensure the long-range protection of this natural resource.

EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION, INC.

1984 marked the seventeenth year that the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association has provided professional and caring health services to the residents of the Exeter area. From 1958 to mid 1967 the Exeter VNA employed one nurse who visited within the town of Exeter only. Seventeen years later, the Exeter Area VNA is providing skilled and therapeutic services to a population of over 40,000 in twelve towns. The caring and the warmth are still very much evident as the staff provides many more services with up-to-date skills and competence. The Agency has increased from one nurse to a staff of thirty-one, including therapists, nutritionists, physicians and nurse specialists.

16,352 units of service were provided by EAVNA staff during 1984, seven days a week and twenty four hours a day. The EAVNA provides Home Care today that meets the increased and frequently technical needs of its clientele as hospitals are discharging patients "quicker and sicker." People are now in need of health services at home that before were thought to be only possible in a hospital. The EAVNA Staff is skilled and current in its knowledge and abilities.

The Services provided in 1984 by programs are:

CARE OF THE SICK - 12,343 visits - These included home and office visits by nurses, aides and therapists.

MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH - 1,474 units of service - includes home visits and clinic services.

ADULT HEALTH - 2,535 units of service - includes Blood Pressure Screenings, Foot Care, Sugar and Iron, Health Risk Appraisals, Diptheria and Tetanus, Flu Protection, Health Teaching and Nursing Assessments.

The Agency continues to provide a clinical setting for Home Health to students from area schools and universities.

The shift of health care from hospitals to home and community, which began a few years ago, is proving to be cost effective and preferred by many.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Our first forest fire prevention law was enacted by our State Legislature 90 years ago. This early law set in place a cooperative forest fire prevention and suppression effort between city and town governments and State government. It simply stated that no open fire could be kindled, when the ground is free of snow, without the written permission of the town/city Forest Fire Warden. This law also stated that anyone kindling a fire without written permission shall be liable for the damage caused and subject to a \$1000 fine.

During the past 90 years, this law has worked so well that it has remained unchanged. All open fires when the ground is not covered with snow must be authorized by the local Forest Fire Warden. Persons kindling a fire without a permit when one is required are liable for damages caused, fire suppression costs and subject to a \$1000 fine.

This cooperative fire prevention law has contributed significantly to our nationally recognized annual forest fire loss record.

REPORT OF THE ROCKINGHAM PLANNING COMMISSION

Of the many regional projects currently being pursued by the Commission, several are of interest to Kensington. The expected closing of the Kingston dump in the near future makes the Commission's role as consultant to the Kingston Solid Waste Management District, to which Kensington belongs, much more crucial. In addition to finding a solution to the solid waste problem, the Town needs help in finding an approved place to dispose of its septage as required by law. A plan for the disposal of household hazardous wastes is being developed by the Commission and is expected to be implemented in May.

The Commission has sponsored several well-attended public information meetings on subjects of considerable importance to local officials. These include the forum on the ramifications of the Atkinson and Fremont cases, the Natural Resources Lecture Series, the Annual Law Lecture Series, and others. Additionally, the Commission routinely informs the members towns' governing bodies of recent environmental and legal developments germane to their responsibilities.

Kensington has received more specific assistance throughout the year. This included researching and drafting a proposed weight limits regulation requested by the Selectmen. For the Planning Board, the Commission has been assisting the various sub-committees updating the Master Plan, and has reviewed proposed subdivision changes. Research was done on the role of conservation commissions in reviewing gravel pit permits and assistance was given to the Conservation Commission in its development of an open space conservation plan. Draft copies of an index of Kensington's geographical names was typed and reproduced twice during the year for the Historical Society.

KENSINGTON, N. H. - March 10, 1984

The Annual School District Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Stephen Smith, at 7:00 p.m. Steve Jones opened the meeting with a prayer. Charles Eastman led the salute to the flag. The Moderator read the warrant.

The Moderator recognized Linda Blood who moved that the meeting be recessed until May 12, 1984 at 7:00 p.m. at the Town Hall. Dick Drew seconded the motion.

The Moderator then recognized Tom Kerr who stated that the negotiations with the teachers were still going on and that the School Board and the teachers had not reached a settlement. Mr. Kerr stated that he thought it unfair to all concerned to vote on part of the school budget. He noted that the school board would like to hear from the townspeople in regards to negotiations. Mr. Kerr stated that the School Board had been in negotiations with the teachers since September. The Board has met with the teachers five or six times through the fall and winter and again on Feb. 9, 1984. Not being able to reach an agreement, a joint request for a mediator was filed. A mediator was appointed and they had their first meeting with the mediator on Wednesday, March 7 beginning at 5:00 p.m. and continuing through Thursday morning March 8, 1984 to 3:30 a.m. When the meeting broke off the teachers were considering a new proposal from the school board covering all issues except salary and benefits. The mediator told the Board that the teachers will respond to that proposal by Wednesday, March 14, 1984. Mr. Kerr noted that the negotiations were complicated. Among some of the issues are salaries and health benefits as well as many other items including certain elements of the grievance procedure, employee rights in the event of a reduction in work force, sick leave, emergency leave, preparation time, length of the work day for teachers, and maternity leave. The current school board proposal now being considered by the teachers addresses these issues. Mr. Kerr stated that on the issue of wages and benefits there were three components, they are salaries, health insurance and dental insurance. The teachers have asked for a 20% salary increase for 1984-85 and a 20% salary increase for 1985-86. In addition they have asked that the school board continue to pay the full family plan BC/BS payments plus the full amount of the dental plan. Mr. Kerr stated that at the Feb. 9, 1984 meeting the school board had offered the teachers a 9% salary increase for the 1984-85 school year and an 8% increase over that figure for the 1985-86 school year. The board also offered the teachers a full paid family plan in A\$\$et, a N. H. School Board Association plan which is comparable to BC/BS, but which is less expensive, or to share with the teachers the cost of BC/BS with the school putting a cap on its BC/BS liability at the 1983-84 levels and with the teachers paying the increase. Mr. Kerr stated that the estimate provided to them indicated that BC/BS costs for the teachers would increase \$2500.00 while the A\$\$et plan would cost about the same as the 1983-84 BC/BS cost. Mr. Kerr noted that he had been advised that a neutral arbitrator in a Raymond case involving teachers has concluded that A\$\$et is comparable to BC/BS. The board proposed to limit its payments for the dental plan to 1983-84 levels or the same kind of sharing program.

Mr. Kerr reported that neither party had changed their positions since the Feb. 9, 1984 meeting. Mr. Kerr noted that in regards straight salary Kensington teachers rank fourth among the outlying towns in SAU, with East Kingston, Brentwood, and Stratham ahead of them and Newfields being behind them on the salary scale. Mr. Kerr stated that if the teachers received what they were asking for they would be the highest paid teachers of all the outlying towns in SAU. Mr. Kerr then compared Kensington's teachers with the other outlying towns in SAU in benefits paid on behalf of the teacher along with her salary and the Kensington teachers were in the middle of the scale with East Kingston and Stratham being ahead of them and Newfields and Brentwood being below them. Mr. Kerr said that if the teachers received what they were asking for the outlay for them will be far above that of any teacher in the outlying towns in SAU. Mr. Kerr stated that the Board had bargained in good faith and that they had tried to be flexible. Mr. Kerr concluded that he was very proud of the Kensington Elementary School and that he was happy that his son had Mrs. Street for a teacher and his daughter had Mrs. Bagnall for a teacher. Mr. Kerr asked that the townspeople vote to recess the meeting and commented that the Board would like to hear from the townspeople with some of their ideas and comment.

The moderator then recognized Ann D. Smith who stated that upon moving to Kensington she felt that the teachers were some of the best paid but now felt this to be no longer true. She then asked if it were not true that with the A\$\$et Insurance plan you had to pay up front and then be reimbursed later by the company. Mr. Kerr answered that he had been advised that this was not the case.

Hal Bodwell III stated that he felt the School Board had done an excellent job and that he could sympathize with all concerned.

The moderator then called for a vote on the motion to recess. The vote was in the affirmative.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:40 p.m.

KENSINGTON, N. H.

The recessed March 10, 1984 School District Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Stephen Smith at 7:00 p.m. on May 12, 1984.

ARTICLE I. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate Six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$6,500.00) for the purpose of removing, regrading, and hot-topping the bus drive-through and parking area of the Kensington Elementary School.

Dick Drew moved to adopt Article I. Linda Blood seconded the motion. The vote was affirmative.

ARTICLE II. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the School District.

Arthur Wiggin Jr. moved to adjust the salaries of the School Board members. Mr. Wiggin moved to set the salary of the Chairman of the School Board at One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and the Board members at Seven Hundred Dollars (\$700.00). Judy Pease seconded the motion. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE III. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relative thereto.

Linda Blood moved to table Article III. Dick Drew seconded the motion. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the District wishes to request from the Commissioner of Education a waiver of the requirements stated in RSA 189:11-a which requires the establishment of a school lunch program.

Dick Drew moved to adopt Article IV. Mr. Sanborn seconded the motion. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE V. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year. Said money must be used for legal purposes for which the School District may appropriate money; requires a public hearing of the action to be taken; must not require the expenditure of other School District funds.

Charles Eastman moved to adopt Article V. Dr. Singer seconded the motion. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VIB. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the payment of salaries for School District teachers and all other cost items as defined by Revised Statute Annotated 273: A:1.

Dick Drew moved to raise the sum of One Hundred Forty Thousand, Seventy Dollars (\$140,070.00) for the payment of salaries for the School District teachers and all other cost items as defined by RSA Chapter 273:A:1. Linda Blood seconded the motion. The moderator then recognized Thomas Kerr who reported on the status of the teacher negotiations. Mr. Kerr reported that the Board had not yet reached agreement with the teachers. Mr. Kerr stated that in order for the school to be ready for the 1984-85 school year the aforementioned sum be raised for teachers salaries. Mr. Kerr noted that the School Board has asked that a fact-finder be brought in and that after receiving the factfinders report a special School Meeting would be held to vote on any changes in the budget. Mr. Kerr stated he did not know when the meeting would take place. He stated the Board wanted to keep the teachers competitive with comparable towns and the Board felt that the town had instructed them over the years to try to get control of the ever increasing cost of the health insurance. Mr. Kerr stated that on April 18, 1984 the Board offered the teachers a two year contract. It was proposed in the first year the teachers received a 12% salary increase, the current insurance with a 5% cap on the increased cost of the plan and proposed that a committee be set up to examine new Health Insurance plans. In the second year the teachers would receive a 10% salary increase, the current Health Insurance with a cap of 5% on the increased cost of the plan and any money saved on the cost of a new health plan going directly to the teachers. The teachers rejected the offer. Mr. Kerr noted that last week Blue Cross/Blue Shield announced that the increased cost of BC/BS would

be about 3% for 1984-85. Mr. Kerr said at that time the Board asked the teachers to reconsider their offer. The teachers would not reconsider the offer. Mr. Kerr said that on Friday, May 11, 1984 the Board offered the teachers a new proposal. The Board proposed a 12% salary increase, current BC/BS with no cap and asking that a committee study new insurance plans. In the second year the Board proposed a 10% salary increase, current BC/BS coverage and proposed that any money realized from a less expensive insurance plan go directly to the teachers. Mr. Kerr said the teachers would accept the first year plan, but not the second year plan. Mr. Kerr explained the roll of a factfinder. Mr. Kerr also stated that the Board was presented a petition signed by 29 people asking that the Board pay the teachers the same salary that the teachers in Brentwood receive. Mr. Kerr then compared the overall cost of the two budgets in regard to teacher salaries and benefits. Mr. Kerr stated the Board had been working on negotiations for nine months. He stated it would be very easy to cave-in to the teachers counter offer to make it a one year contract but felt the time had come to settle the insurance issue. Mr. Kerr stated the Board would like to have one year of peace with the teachers so that time could be spent on other school matters. Mr. Kerr shared with the town the amount of time spent on trying to come to an agreement with the teachers. Mr. Kerr said that on April 9, 1984 a representative from the school board called the teachers to set up a meeting date for April 18, 1984. Mr. Kerr noted that on April 10, 1984, after agreeing to meet on the 18th, the teachers filed a request for a factfinder. Mr. Kerr noted this action in itself probable constituted an unfair labor practice. Mr. Kerr said the Board ignored it and went to the meeting on April 18th and made a great deal of progress. Mr. Kerr stated the teachers were well aware of the Boards' concern over the rising cost of Health Insurance. Mr. Kerr reiterated the fact that the Board tried again to come to an agreement with the teachers proposing the final offer on Friday, May 11, 1984. Mr. Kerr said he felt the offer was very competitive with the comparable towns in SAU #16.

The Moderator then recognized Marjorie Streeter who noted the State of N. H. ranks 47 in teacher salaries. Mrs. Streeter noted that the average teacher salary in N. H. is Fifteen Thousand, Three Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$15,350.00) and the average teacher in Kensington with eight years experience receives Fourteen Thousand, Two Hundred and Forty Five Dollars (\$14,745.00). The average paid teacher in Kensington is paid Fifty Dollars less than the average teacher in the state of Mississippi, which ranks 50th in the U. S. in teacher salaries. Mrs. Streeter stated the teachers in Kensington rank 5th on the pay scale in the SAU #16, with only Newfields paying their teachers less. Mrs. Streeter said that Kensington students for the last five years have been in the 80-90 percentile in regards test scores on the IOWA's, showing the children in Kensington receive a quality education. Mrs. Streeter said the 1984-85 cost of BC/BS will cost about Nine Thousand, One Hundred Seventy Dollars, (\$9,170.00). Mrs. Streeter said no other insurance plan was offered the teachers other than A\$\$ets which Mrs. Streeter noted is too new for the teachers to join. Mrs. Streeter said the teachers in Kensington do not make enough money to give up any benefit. Mrs. Streeter noted that with a 12% salary increase the average pay for a teacher in Kensington will be Fifteen Thousand, Nine Hundred Fifty Four Dollars (\$15,954.00). Mrs. Streeter said the town of Kensington pay the teachers at the Exeter Jr. and Senior High schools more than the teachers in Kensington. Mrs. Streeter stated that it is the teachers at the Kensington Elementary School who have the job of preparing the students for the Jr. and Sr. High School.

Joseph Ripel asked about the cost of hiring a factfinder suggesting that perhaps the town was giving money to a stranger instead of to our teachers. Mr. Ripel asked if it would be resolved at the present time.

The Moderator stated that legally the town had to vote on the budget proposed by Mr. Drew.

Dr. Pease asked for clarification on the vote.

Mrs. Kerr asked for further clarification.

Stephen Smith, the Moderator explained that after factfinding a special School Meeting would be held to vote on an ammended budget.

Dick Drew noted that unless a budget was passed this evening there would be no money to pay teachers after July 1, 1984.

Hal Bodwell III asked if legally it was this or nothing.

The Moderator answered, yes.

Mr. Rand asked if he were correct in assuming there was approximately Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) difference between the School Board and the teachers coming to an agreement.

Mr. Kerr answered that it would be a much larger increase.

The Moderator asked for a vote.

The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VIC. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district.

Dick Drew moved to adopt a budget in the total of Seven Hundred Ten Thousand, Six Hundred Sixty Five Dollars (\$710,665.00).

Mrs. Singer seconded the motion. The vote was in the affirmative.

ARTICLE VII. To choose Agents and/or Committees in relation to any subject embraced by this warrant.

There were no motions made.

ARTICLE VIII. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

There was no further business.

Dr. Singer moved to adjourn the meeting.

Mr. Sanborn seconded the motion.

The meeting was adjourned at 7:55 p.m.

At the beginning of the 1983-84 school year, School Board members established a goal to improve and coordinate the elementary and secondary curricula. Consequently, for the past two years, the school boards, administrators, teachers, parents, and citizens have worked together toward this goal.

At the elementary level, school-community task forces developed reading, social studies, and math curricula; decided to initiate a more comprehensive standardized testing program for grades two(2) through six(6); and, defined sixth grade expectations in art, music, physical education, career education, computers and library science. The recommendations of these task forces will be acted upon in June, and implemented in September, 1985. Next year at the elementary level, two more curriculum task forces, in Language Arts and Science, will develop curricula for implementation in September of 1986.

At the secondary level, the entire high school faculty, under the leadership of the school-community High School Curriculum Committee, defined Expected Student Outcomes for every course at the high school. In conjunction with this massive undertaking, the High School Curriculum Committee surveyed a sample of citizens in all of the SAU towns, recent high school graduates, current secondary faculty members, and current students to determine the communities' curriculum priorities and expectations for the high school. The results of this survey will be analyzed and used to help the High School Curriculum Committee, School Boards, and Administrators to develop long and short term plans for the high school curriculum.

In a further effort to improve instruction throughout the district, supervisors throughout the SAU participated in a training program in evaluation of instruction. This intensive, year-long training program has helped supervisors implement a new evaluation system, and has improved communication and instruction within our district.

Looking toward the future, the Joint Board, cognizant of the projected growth within the SAU has established a long-range planning group to study the potential impact of this growth, to offer recommendations, and to propose possible plans for action.

As we look further into the future, increasing the public's understanding of the schools' mission, and the public's participation in reaching and setting the goals for the school district is critically important. The task of preparing the next generation for the challenge and rewards of the 21st Century will require the combined efforts of the schools and the community. We urge your continued assistance in providing the students in our region with a quality educational program.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The Kensington Elementary School continues to look with pride on the many fine academic accomplishments of its students. Standardized Test composite scores for grade 2 were in the 99th percentile, grade 4 were in the 83rd percentile and grade 6 were in the 94th percentile. These scores place our average students in the top 20 percent of their class.

Curriculum changes included updating the written reading curriculum for grades 2 and 3. A SAU #16 committee is presently working towards revising the reading curriculum for the rest of the grades. Other curriculum areas being investigated are in the areas of Mathematics and Social Studies. Both curricula are being revised and the committees are looking towards the 1985-86 school year for adoption.

Staff changes include the leaving of Corinne Spencer who was replaced by Nina Dionne as Reading Specialist. Mrs. Scott replaced Miss Mantarian as the Speech and Language Therapist. Mrs. Pike has replaced Miss Simmons as the Physical Education Teacher. Mrs. Ruskey, a University of New Hampshire Intern, helps first grade get off to a good start.

Yearly, the school undergoes a self-evaluation of minimum standards. The state has 37 standards divided into 5 categories. Category I being the best (meeting all 37 standards), we meet 32 standards placing us within a Category II. The standards not met include library services and guidance services. Space limitations also prohibit us from becoming a Category I.

We continue to be pleased with our Parent Volunteer Program which helps out tremendously in classrooms, the office, and at home. This program is of great value in strengthening the academic success for our students.

Technological needs of students are increasingly knocking at our door. We have acquired a fourth computer and a variety of quality software. We feel that student preparedness and fears in a highly technological society will be minimized through early hands-on computer experience.

Finally, the school this year has instituted an enrichment program. The goals of the program are to provide for student experiences they might not normally receive within the curriculum. Also, we are stressing skill development in problem solving and creative thinking.

We know that through your continued support, we can continue to meet student needs and provide excellent educational opportunities for all students of the Kensington Elementary School.



1. How much specifically can we save by having certain special education children taught at Kensington school?
 - 1.1 If we had the addition in 1984-1985 and the appropriate staff, how many children specifically could have been taught at Kensington and how many still would have been tutitioned out.
 - 1.2 What specific transportation costs would have been saved for each child and in total?
 - 1.3 What specific tuition costs would have been saved?
 - 1.4 What specific tuition costs would we still have been incurring?
2. When specifically can we expect to start realizing the savings described in Question 1?
 - 2.1 How long will it take our reading teacher to qualify to teach special education?
 - 2.2 What are her specific plans to qualify for this position?
 - 2.3 What are the additional costs which we will incur to train her and to pay her after she qualifies?
3. While we understand what the basic construction costs will be, what additional costs will we incur specifically and when will we incur them? Should these costs be budgetted for 1985-1986?
 - 3.1 What specifically will it cost us to operate the addition?
 - o janitorial costs
 - o heat and light
 - o insurance
 - o landscaping, if any
 - o costs for hiring a librarian
 - o maintenance
 - o what else?

- 3.2 What will it cost us specifically to outfit and equip the addition so that it will be usable? When specifically will we incur those costs?
- o desks
 - o chairs
 - o carpetting or other flooring
 - o partitions
 - o book shelves
 - o books
 - o media supplies
 - o what else?
4. What are the real, current and near term needs of the school?
- 4.1 Does the reading specialist/special education teacher really need a full size classroom? How much space does she really need now or within the next few years?
- 4.2 Do we really need four cubicles in the one classroom area? How often during the typical week will each of those cubicles be used? Can their use be combined? Can they be shared - how or why not?
- 4.3 Do we need an area for assemblies, indoor recess and physical education. Can we design the smaller option in a way to allow for any of these by use of moveable partitions?
5. Are there alternative designs for the smaller option which would give us more functionality?
- 5.1 Instead of fixed walls could partitions (either half-wall or floor to ceiling) be used in the smaller option to allow for increased use of the space for the reading teacher if and when she needs it, to allow for use of cubicles for other purposes when not in use, and to accomodate assemblies of people?
6. In the larger option, how often would the auditorium be used specifically and for what purposes specifically? For example, how many hours specifically would it be used on Monday, by whom, by how many children and for what purposes? How about for every other day of the week?
- 6.1 Is it correct to assume that the auditorium would be used all day on Fridays during the winter for physical education, all day for music on another day, otherwise for indoor recess when needed, and for plays, projects, etc. when needed? What other uses and when?

- 6.2 For which of the purposes described in 6.1 could the media center be used instead if we do not have an auditorium?
- 6.3 If the media center area was slightly expanded by using part of the area presently designated as a reading teacher's classroom, could any of the functions described in 6.1 (for example music and plays) be accommodated? Would expansion of the media center even be necessary?
- 6.4 For what purposes might the auditorium be used for the benefit of the whole town? Could the media center, either as planned or expanded, serve any of those purposes? How much if at all would the media center have to be expanded to accommodate some of these uses?
7. How do we plan to manage the media center? Will it require a full time librarian? Will a part-time librarian and volunteers be sufficient? What will our management costs for operation of the media center be?
8. How often specifically would the nurse's area be used. Who will use the area? In the absence of the nurse, how will the nurse's area be supervised? Will it be locked? Who will watch over sick children in the absence of the nurse?
9. What effect will our having the media center have on our use of and relationship with the town library?
- 9.1 Will we request from the town library the return of all books we have given them over the years for our media center or will we start from scratch?
- 9.2 Assuming we start from scratch, how much will we have to spend in the first year or two specifically to make the media center functional so that we will no longer need to use the town library?
- 9.3 For how long will we continue to use the town library until the media center fills the library needs of our children?
- 9.4 Do we expect to continue to use the town library for the foreseeable future even with our media center?
10. What are the specific uses intended for the four cubicles in the one classroom area?
- 10.1 How often specifically will they be in use?
- 10.2 Might any of the cubicle space be used for other purposes when not being used for the primary purpose?
11. If the reading specialist ^{is} fully employed teaching reading now, how will she have time ^{also} to teach special education students and adequately provide for their needs? Might we need to have an additional person to assist in this effort just to handle our current load of reading and special education students?
