# ORGANIZATION

## of the City Government

Tuesday, March 25, 1941

At ten o'clock in the forenoon of the above date, members-elect of the City Council for the municipal year of 1941, and the members from the previous council met for organization at the city council room agreeably to the provisions of the city charter.

In absence of the Mayor the meeting was called to order by the City Clerk and councilman Kimball was chosen chairman protem.

Prayer was offered by the Rev. Robert I. Blakesley.

The Clerk then read statement of the votes cast for Mayor and Councilmen on March 11th as returned by the Clerks of the several wards, and same was referred to the committee on Elections and returns, who retired, canvassed the returns, and reported they found the statement submitted by the City Clerk correct, and chairman Kimball declared Robinson W. Smith elected Mayor of the City of Laconia for the ensuing year. Councilmen Bowman and Hopkins escorted the Mayor Elect to the chair and he was given the oath of office by Solicitor, Robert V. Johnson, Esq. Mayor Smith then declared George R. Bowman, Philip J. Blanchette, Ralph C. Kimball, Frank R. Ricker, Malcolm E. Barney and Kenneth D. Hopkins elected councilmen from their respective wards.

The oath of office was administered to the Councilmen elect by Solicitor Johnson.

Mayor Smith then delivered his inaugural address as follows:

# INAUGURAL ADDRESS

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*Members of the Council, citizens  
of Laconia and friends:*

At this time, it becomes my duty and pleasure to deliver to you the Mayor's inaugural address. In this address I shall endeavor to present to you a brief review of the administrative office of your city government for the year 1940 and present to you recommendations for 1941.

During the past year, Laconia has lost a number of its distinguished citizens. Among them are men who have in years past served their city in an official capacity. It is therefore fitting and proper that we should at this time take a few moments to pay tribute to those men who have passed to the great beyond.

I refer to the late Verne M. Whitman, ex-Mayor Charles E. Carroll, former Mayor John A. Mitchell and former Councilmen Howard W. Byse and Thomas J. McIntyre.

VERNE WHITMAN, was graduated from Norway, Maine, High School in 1890 and from Colby College in 1894. Before coming to Laconia, Mr. Whitman served in the high schools of Calais, Canton and Norway, Maine. He was headmaster of the Peterborough and Milford, New Hampshire high schools. He came to Laconia in 1905 and for thirty-one years faithfully served our high school in the capacity of headmaster.

Mr. Whitman was a gentleman and a scholar. The hundreds of boys and girls who had the privilege of attending our high schools under his leadership during his long service will always remember him. Mr. Whitman gave a kind of service that many of us are not privileged to give any community.

CHARLES E. CARROLL was born on August 22, 1872

in Manchester, New Hampshire. He was the son of the late Charles F. and Ellen J. (Forbes) Carroll who moved to Laconia when he was two years old. Mr. Carroll was educated at Harvard Street School and St. John's School in Laconia.

For many years Charles Carroll was a familiar figure on the streets of Laconia. His interest in the affairs of his city and state can best be told by a review of the many public offices that he was elected to which are as follows:

He served as chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the Checklists for 16 years;

Member of the City Council from Ward 3, in 1929;

Representative to the General Court, in 1901-1902;

State Senator, 1932-33;

Executive Councilor in 1933-1934;

Mayor of Laconia in 1930, 1931, 1932, 1933, 1934, and 1936;

He was a delegate at large to the Republican National convention in 1936;

And Belknap County Commissioner in 1940 to the time of his death.

JOHN A. MITCHELL better known as Gus Mitchell was born in Biddeford, Maine, January 12, 1853. The family moved to Portland when he was three. In 1872 Mr. Mitchell moved to Laconia where the family established a store on Main Street and lived here in Laconia with the exception of five years which he spent in business in Boston. In 1916, 1917 and 1918 Mr. Mitchell served in the City Council and was elected mayor in the years 1919 and 1920.

Mayor Mitchell was greatly interested in the return of the men from the World War and was instrumental in

acquiring and establishing the memorial tablets that are now in place on our library lawn.

HOWARD W. BYSE came to Laconia as a young boy and received his education in the Laconia public schools. On leaving high school he entered a box factory to learn a trade. He left the factory four years later to work in a restaurant which he purchased. He became so successful in the restaurant business that he at one time owned three in this city. Mr. Byse, after leaving the restaurant business, entered the insurance field and then became interested in city government. He was elected Councilman from Ward Three in 1933 and served his city for three years. Howard Byse was very active in the Chamber of Commerce and was always willing to help on any activity that would further the interests of Laconia.

THOMAS J. McINTYRE served the City of Laconia in 1909 and 1910 as Councilman from Ward two. As a business man he did a great deal to build Laconia. Many of our best business blocks were owned by the late Mr. McIntyre. His interest in building and improving Main Street was ever foremost in his mind.

In memory of these men who at some time in the past have served our city or taken a prominent part in the building of Laconia, let us rise and bow our heads in silent prayer.

A year ago today from this platform we referred to the year 1939 as a very successful year from a financial point of view. We are pleased to report to you today that the fiscal year just closed has not only been good financially, but there have been many changes in the physical set up of our city that should be called to your attention.

I will refer briefly to the outstanding accomplishments along this line.

## THE WEIRS MUNICIPAL BUILDING

At The Weirs in Ward One, the City of Laconia has acquired from the Boston and Maine Railroad 46,870 square feet of land. This land comprises approximately 2,000 feet of shore frontage together with a plot of land on the east side of Lakeside Avenue about 8,442 feet long and 44 feet wide at the north end. Two of the railroad sidings at The Weirs have been removed thus enlarging the parking space and widening the street in that section of our city. The city also acquired several needed wharves as well as the airplane base on the lake front.

The City's contribution to the Boston and Maine Railroad for this land amounts to the rental of office space and freight room in the new municipal building erected by the city on the old railroad station site. For a long time a suitable rest room and comfort station had been needed at The Weirs. The modern municipal building which was completed last fall will meet this need and we are sure that it will prove a great benefit to the City of Laconia.

The fire of 1939 that destroyed the railroad station also destroyed the platform that had been used for many years by the people of Laconia. Therefore, it became necessary for the City of Laconia to rebuild this platform in order that the lake frontage might be restored, and be in condition for the reception of the thousands of people that come to The Weirs annually for their summer vacation. I recommend that further study be given the development of The Weirs water front based on a long term program.

## LACONIA AIRPORT

In June, a citizen's committee accompanied by civil aeronautics officials met with your Mayor and Council and suggested that the present Laconia airport be enlarged. At that time the necessary contribution that the city was

asked to make for a project of this kind seemed to be too big a burden to ask our taxpayers to assume.

However, the subject was not dropped and negotiations were immediately started to acquire a bigger and better airport to be located on a more desirable site and at the same time procure, if possible, a more favorable cost price to the city. After several weeks of conference with representatives of our government, the City of Laconia as sponsor, and Belknap County as co-sponsor, agreed to acquire certain parcels of land in the neighboring town of Gilford on which a modern airport could be constructed. The total cost to the city and county was not to exceed \$15,000. As you know this modern airport now under construction will cost approximately \$700,000. When completed said airport will become the property of the City of Laconia and the County of Belknap.

In order to protect the City of Laconia from possible embarrassment in the management of this airport in the future and that the tax question might forever be settled, your Mayor and Council with the cooperation of the Commissioners of Belknap County caused to be introduced into our Legislature at Concord an act creating the Laconia Airport Authority, and exempting said airport from taxation. This act became a law on March 13, 1941.

As stated above the total cost to the city and county will not exceed \$15,000 and we have every reason to believe that when all credits have been deducted, the City of Laconia will have spent less than \$5,000 for an airport that will cost to build approximately \$700,000.

#### CITY CHARTER

In my inaugural address a year ago, I stated that it was very evident that the voters of the City of Laconia would welcome biennial instead of annual elections and I recommended that some action be taken to bring this about. Early this year former Mayor Charles O. Hopkins, now a

representative to the General Court from Ward Six introduced a bill providing for biennial elections in the City of Laconia. Recently this act became a law. Mayor Hopkins you are to be congratulated upon your success in bringing about this change in our City Charter.

#### CITY ORDINANCES

During the past year it seemed advisable to have our City Ordinances revised and compiled. Our City Solicitor, Robert Johnson and William Keller as assistant were instructed to proceed with the work.

I am pleased to report to you that at 11:59 p.m. last evening the work was completed and the compiled City Ordinances of 1941 became a reality.

Messrs. Johnson and Keller, I wish to congratulate you on the way you have compiled these ordinances.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT

A year ago we reported to you that two new pieces of fire apparatus purchased in 1938 were added to our Fire Department equipment and that it was my opinion that our Fire Department was well equipped to handle any fire hazard that might visit us in the future.

However, later in the year one of the old homemade fire trucks went the way of the "old one-horse shay" and the question of repairing the same or to purchase a new up-to-date piece of apparatus was debated. It was decided that the good people of Laconia were entitled to the best fire protection that could be given them and a new modern pumper was purchased at a cost of \$5,918.50.

We have received many favorable comments during the past year on our Fire Department equipment and I can assure you that there is no city in New Hampshire that has a better equipped Fire Department than Laconia.



## NEW STREETS

Early last summer, your Mayor and Council received a petition for a new street called Holman Street extension. After careful investigation the street was laid out and built at a cost of \$1400.00. This new street made available a large tract of land for desirable building lots. Already two very fine homes have been built and several lots sold.

At Casino Square there is located one of Laconia's largest manufacturing plants, the Scott & Williams Inc., and naturally at certain hours of the day traffic is congested. To remedy this condition as much as possible two tracts of land running from Davis Place to Strafford Street have been purchased for the purpose of laying out and constructing a new street. When this has been completed, together with a street now being constructed by Scott & Williams Inc., which will run from Davis Place to Howard Street, traffic condition will be greatly improved in this section of our city.

## PARKING

Laconia is blessed with more and better parking space than many of our cities; nevertheless, additional parking space should be procured if possible. With our increased population during the summer months if our merchants and amusement houses on Main Street are to receive the patronage that they should, we must as a city do everything that we can to make the parking of automobiles as easy as possible:

Last summer Frank P. Tilton, Esq., wrote your Mayor a letter, calling his attention to the fact that there might be a possibility of procuring a parking area adjacent to Main Street in the locality of Harry Sanborn's store.

I would recommend that the Council give this proposal consideration at some later date.

## SEWERS, MAINTENANCE, ETC.

The question of sewers is paramount in the City of Laconia. During the past few weeks I have made a detailed study of the sewerage situation in our City. From our City Engineer's Office, I find that we have approximately 2500 homes connected with the sanitary sewer system. There are about 354 buildings that cannot be connected until new sewers are built. I am referring now only to buildings located in the compact part of our city. Each year new streets are opened up and new homes are built and this brings up the question of sewerage disposal.

*Sewers are a necessity.* Ever since our city was organized in 1893, a certain percent of our buildings and homes have been furnished with sanitary sewers at the expense of all the people. Home owners that do not have sewer connection are now and always have paid their proportionate part for those who live where sewers are available.

In the City Clerk's office at this moment there are petitions for sanitary sewers that if built would cost more than \$100,000. All of these are needed and should be granted. If these new sewers are to be built at once—all well and good—if not, the question is why should our citizens who are deprived of the privileges and use of sanitary sewers be asked to pay by taxation for the sewers that are used by others. It is my opinion that there should be a graduated fee charged for the use of our sewers. This fee to be charged back to the owner of the property that the sewers served. I find that many cities and towns in New England charge a yearly fee for the use of their sewerage system.

It costs approximately \$4,000 a year for the upkeep and maintenance of our present sewerage system. If a minimum fee of \$6. per year were charged for the nearly 3,000 buildings already connected with our sewerage system this would provide a yearly revenue of approximately \$18,000 per year. Deducting the upkeep of \$4,000, there would be a balance of

\$14,000 left to be expended each year for the extension of our sewerage system and maintenance of same.

If this policy were adopted, it would only be a few years before sanitary sewers would be extended to all parts of our city and our sewerage problem would be taken care of in a just and equitable way.

Therefore, I recommend that the Committee on Sewers make a careful study of this proposal and report their findings to the Mayor and Council at some later date.

#### CITY HALL

Last year I mentioned the fact that Laconia was sadly in need of a new City Hall. I now repeat my reasons for making such a statement.

“You are well aware of the fact that our Board of Assessors have no room in which they can carry on their business other than this Council Room and this also applies to the Board of Supervisors. The Police Court room has been made use of for a purpose other than it was intended for. The vault space is already overcrowded. The Milk Inspector of our City Board of Health has his laboratory tucked away in the corner of our basement. Our Tax Collector has a very small office in front of this building which is entirely overcrowded. Our City Clerk has not sufficient room to economically and efficiently carry on the work of that office.

“Our Overseer of the Poor has a very small room just out of the hall. Our jail, as you know, has been condemned on several occasions during the past four or five years and our Council Chamber is being used for All kinds of meeting and office room as above stated.

“Laconia is one of the fastest growing cities in New England. Its public buildings with the exception of City Hall are such that all of us feel proud of them.

The location of City Hall is ideal, but the building itself is not only inadequate to properly house the City Departments, but it is not in keeping with the public buildings that surround Veterans Square."

Probably there never will be a time when money can be hired by the City of Laconia at such a low rate of interest as at the present time.

I ask that serious study be given this recommendation.

#### CITY FINANCES

On February 15, 1940 at the close of our fiscal year, the net serial debt was \$333,750. This debt has been reduced to \$279,250 or a net reduction of \$54,000 for the fiscal year, and the cash balance on hand from our budget savings last year amounted to \$22,314.54, reflecting a net saving for the fiscal year of \$76,814.54, notwithstanding the fact that during the year \$32,000 was expended for permanent improvements. Our tax rate was reduced from \$41.30 in 1939 to \$34.90 in 1940 or a reduction of \$6.40 per thousand dollar valuation.

I have stated on many occasions that the City of Laconia was able to make this fine record because of much study on the part of your Mayor and Council, but I want you to know that no amount of planning and study on the part of your Mayor or Council could have brought the savings as previously reported without the wholehearted and genuine support of every department in our city government and at this time I wish to commend each and every department for the good work that they have given this city during the past year.

On page 146 of the City Report you will find a tax map for the year 1940 as compiled by Councilman Ralph C. Kimball of Ward Three. Councilman Kimball I want to again thank you for the many hours of hard work spent by you in compiling this tax chart. It is a valuable piece of work

and should be very enlightening to those of our citizens who wish to make a study of the expenditures of the taxpayers dollar. I hope you will find time to make a similar chart for the year 1941.

For the past two years I have stated that in order to arrive at a fair tax, we must have a just and fair valuation of our taxable property and on several occasions I recommended that a long term program of revaluation of our taxable property in Laconia be adopted by our Board of Assessors. I have reason to believe that my recommendations have been carried out insofar as practicable.

Last year I also recommended that it was highly desirable that our Board of Assessors be furnished with property tax charts or maps, giving definite information as to the location of property, in the different wards of our city. I am pleased to report to you today that this recommendation has been carried out and maps are being prepared right now with the help of a WPA project. These tax maps when completed will clearly show to our Board of Assessors the location of every piece of property in the City of Laconia. These charts will also include an aerial map of our city and certain other information which will be very valuable to our Board of Assessors in the years to come. This, too, is a project sponsored by the City of Laconia and Belknap County as co-sponsor. The total cost to the city will amount to approximately \$1,000.

I will not take the time today to further discuss the work in each department of our city government. All have done excellent work and have given us their full cooperation.

To the members of the Council that have just retired from office, I want to say that during the years that you have served with us we have recognized the valuable service that you have rendered your city. You have served well and your retirement is a distinct loss to our city government.

To the new members of our official family let us extend to you an official welcome at this time and we would remind you that your responsibilities as councilmen will be many. I can assure you that regardless of the fact that you are new in the Council you will receive full cooperation at all times from the executive branch of our city government.

To the other members of the Council who have worked with me for the past years, I need not thank you for the cooperation that you have given me at all times. The year's record speaks for itself.

Let us start the year 1941 with the same spirit of helpfulness and cooperation.

Let us strive to make this year, 1941, one of the best years that Laconia has ever known.

AN ORDINANCE relating to to Trust Funds established for parks.

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:*

Amend section 5 of chapter 17 in the Compiled Ordinances of 1941 by striking out the whole thereof and inserting in place thereof the following:

All property granted, donated or bequeathed to the city of Laconia in trust for its parks, commons or playgrounds shall be turned over to the trustees of the trust funds who shall apply the same, through the park commissioners, for the purposes of such trust; provided however, that the income from the Napoleon Gale fund for the enlargement and beautification of the park located at the Laconia Public Library, shall be turned over to the trustees of said library who shall apply the same for the purposes of said trust.

AN ORDINANCE relating to Shows and Exhibitions.

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:*

Amend section three of chapter 45 of the Compiled Or-

dinances by striking out the whole thereof and inserting in place thereof the following :

Sect. 3. License fees shall be charged and paid as follows : for every circus, menagerie, or circus and menagerie combined, \$35.00 for each day the same shall exhibit in the city ; for the right to set up and operate a "merry-go-round" \$40.00 per week, and a proportional amount of said sum for such time less than a week as the same shall be operated in the city ; for every theatrical or dramatic representation exhibiting in any hall or opera house in the city, except where such dramatic or theatrical representations or exhibitions are performed by residents of the city, \$1.00 for each day performed ; for every performance or exhibition, not hereinbefore provided for, by any showman, tumbler, rope-dancer, ventriloquist or juggler, \$3.00 per day for each day he shall perform or exhibit in the city ; for each moving picture exhibition not accompanied by any theatrical performance, a fee of fifty cents for each day the same is shown in halls of a seating capacity not exceeding five hundred ; seventy-five cents for each day shown in halls of a seating capacity of more than five hundred and not exceeding one thousand ; and one dollar for each day shown in halls of a seating capacity exceeding one thousand.

Amend Section 5 of Chapter 22 of the Compiled Ordinances of 1941 by striking out all of said section 5 and inserting in place thereof the following: Sect. 5. The chief engineer of the fire department shall receive in full for his services the sum of two thousand two hundred and fifty dollars per annum, payable monthly. The salaries of the first, second, third and fourth assistant engineers shall be two hundred twenty-five dollars each per annum, payable quarterly. The salaries of the captains of Engine Co. No. 1, Engine Co. No. 2, Hook and Ladder Company No. 1 and Hook and Ladder Co. No. 2 shall be one hundred sixty-five dollars each per annum, payable quarterly. The salaries of the individual members of said companies above mentioned shall be one hundred and fifty dollars each per annum, payable quarterly. The salaries of the members of the Weirs Hose

Company No. 4, shall be forty-seven dollars and fifty cents each per annum, payable semi-annually.

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AN ORDINANCE regulating the sale of Milk, Cream and Ice Cream in the City of Laconia.

*In the Year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and forty-two:*

*Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Laconia, as follows:*

SECTION 1. All milk or cream sold or offered for sale in the City of Laconia shall be only such as is drawn from cows that have passed an official tuberculin and Bangs disease test, under State and Federal supervision. Such milk or cream shall be either "raw" or "pasteurized" as hereinafter defined, and shall be designated as "raw" or "pasteurized" according to its type.

Pasteurized milk and cream shall be such milk and cream as has been uniformly heated in any approved pasteurizing apparatus to a temperature of not less than 142° Fahrenheit nor more than 145° Fahrenheit for not less than thirty minutes, then cooled immediately to a temperature of 50° Fahrenheit or lower and maintained at that temperature until sold. The temperature of heating, the time of heating and holding and the temperature of cooling shall invariably be recorded by an automatic recording device and a duplicate of such device shall be on hand and in good repair at all times. The charts shall be numbered and dated, shall be retained in a locked case while being recorded, and shall be conveniently filed and preserved for a period of not less than three months, to be available for inspection at all times by the Board of Health. Milk used for pasteurization shall not be more than thirty-six hours old, shall contain not more than 100,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter and no organisms of the colon group and shall have been produced in conformity with the conditions hereafter specified. At the time of sale such milk shall contain not more than

40,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter and no organisms of the colon group. All pasteurizing plants shall be so equipped and operated that the milk and cream after pasteurization shall conform to the requirements of this ordinance. After pasteurization the milk or cream shall be placed in clean, sterilized containers and the containers shall be immediately sealed. No milk or cream that has been pasteurized in one plant shall be transferred to and bottled in another plant or placed and labeled, sold or disposed of, as pasteurized milk or cream, except that cream may with the approval of the Board of Health be bottled at a plant other than the place of pasteurization, provided the cream is bottled under clean and sanitary conditions and adequate facilities provided for the washing and sterilizing of apparatus, utensils and containers used in the handling, bottling and storage of the cream. No milk or cream shall be pasteurized more than once.

Raw milk and cream shall be such milk and cream as shall contain not more than 500,000 bacteria per cubic centimeter nor more than 10 organisms of the colon group per hundredth cubic centimeter when plated.

At the time of applying for a license the dealer shall file a certificate or statement signed by the State Veterinarian, stating that all cows in the herd or herds from which the milk is produced have been tuberculin and Bangs disease tested under State Supervision within one year and found to be free from tuberculosis and Bangs disease.

SECTION 2. Every corporation, association, firm or individual selling or offering for sale milk or cream or operating a bottling or pasteurizing plant in the City of Laconia shall have first obtained a permit from the local Board of Health. Permits shall be granted only to those who conform to the requirements of this ordinance. Such permit shall expire on the thirty-first day of May in each year, shall be



renewable on or before such date in each year, and may be revoked at any time for cause by the said Board of Health or their agent after a hearing on due notice.

SECTION 3. Every corporation, association, firm or individual seeking to obtain a permit to sell milk or cream or operate a bottling or pasteurizing plant in the City of Laconia, shall make out and submit a written application therefor on a form prescribed by the local Board of Health. Every such application shall contain the name of each producer, distributor, bottler, pasteurizer or shipper from whom the applicant receives or expects to receive milk or cream for sale; notice of any change in the source of such supply shall be given the Board of Health forty-eight hours before such change.

SECTION 4. The person to whom any license is granted shall cause his name, place of business and the number of his license to be legibly placed on the outer side of all carriages and vehicles used in the business, and in the case of a merchant selling or offering for sale in a store, booth or market place, the license shall be posted in a conspicuous place in his place of business.

SECTION 5. The Board of Health and its agent under authority given them in Chapter 163, Section 9, Session Laws 1925 and revisions or amendments thereof may enter places where milk, skim milk or cream are stored or kept for sale, and into and upon carriages or other vehicles used for the conveyance thereof, may examine the product there found, may take such samples thereof, as they may deem necessary, upon payment of the current price therefor, and shall leave a duplicate sample of the same product, securely sealed, with the person from whom said sample was taken. If they have reason to believe that any such product is adulterated they shall cause specimens thereof to be analyzed or otherwise satisfactorily tested, shall make a record

of the result of the analysis or test, and shall immediately give the person from whom such sample was taken a written report of such result.

#### PRODUCTION

SECTION 6. The local Board of Health or its agents shall make a sanitary inspection of every dairy farm producing milk or cream to be sold within Laconia, at least once in every twelve months or more often if necessary; the results of such inspection shall be recorded upon a form prescribed by the local Board of Health.

SECTION 7. Barns or stables in which milk-producing cows are housed shall be kept clean and free from other animals and fowl. The floors and cow beds shall be sound and tight. The gutters shall be properly drained. The ceiling shall be dust proof if there is a loft above. The walls and ceiling shall be kept free from dust and cobwebs and shall be whitewashed or painted at least once a year. Sufficient windows shall be provided for adequate light, kept clean, and so arranged as to insure proper distribution of light. Adequate ventilation shall be maintained. Manure shall be removed from stables at least twice daily; it shall be removed from the stable before milking. If manure is put in basement of building, such basement shall be securely closed and adequately ventilated. Manure shall at no time be put in cow yards or paths. Liquid matter shall at no time be allowed to accumulate around the stable. The cow yard shall be properly graded and drained.

SECTION 8. Every cow shall be examined physically at least once in every twelve months by a licensed graduate veterinarian, and report filed with Board of Health. Milk from healthy cows only shall be sold.

SECTION 9. All cows from which milk or cream

is obtained shall be kept clean at all times and the flanks and udders of such cows shall be clean before milking.

SECTION 10. All pails, cans, strainers and coolers used for the collection, treatment, or storage of milk or cream shall be constructed of stainless steel or shall be well tinned so as to be readily cleaned; they shall have no soldered seams and shall be free from pronounced dents and rust spots.

SECTION 11. Every producer and distributor of milk and cream shall maintain adequate facilities for the sterilization of all pails, cans, covers, strainers, coolers, bottles and other containers and equipment used in the handling, transportation or storage of milk or cream to be sold or offered for sale. All such containers and utensils shall, after each use, be thoroughly washed, cleaned and sterilized. Washed and sterilized containers shall be inverted until about to be filled and so protected as to prevent contamination; or they shall be stood in the milk house. Milking shall be done with clean dry hands or with a milking machine which shall be properly cleansed and sterilized before each use.

SECTION 12. An adequate and pure water supply shall be provided for the washing and cleaning of bottles, cans, utensils and apparatus used in the handling of milk and cream.

SECTION 13. A properly constructed, lighted and ventilated milk room or house shall be provided and used for the handling of all milk and cream and shall be maintained at all times in a clean condition. The milk room or house used for the handling of all milk or cream shall not open directly into any stable or any room in a dwelling house and shall be kept screened and free from flies at all times. No fowl, cats, dogs or other animals shall be permitted in any room or house where milk is handled or stored.

No toilet shall be located so near to any milk room or house as to be unsanitary.

SECTION 14. The milk shall be removed from the stable as soon as the milking pail is filled, and shall be strained in the milk room. The cooling of the milk shall begin immediately after straining and within one hour shall be 50° Fahrenheit or less and held at that temperature until delivery.

Milk or cream shall not be sold or delivered in other than tightly closed or capped bottles or receptacles which have been filled exclusively at the dairy or receiving station.

Milk served at hotels, restaurants and lunch-rooms must be in the original capped containers as filled only at the dairy, pasteurizing plant or bottling plant.

#### BOTTLING AND DISTRIBUTING PLANTS

SECTION 15. Rooms or buildings in which bottling or mixing or distributing milk is done shall be suitable for such purposes. They shall be well lighted and ventilated and kept free from flies. The disposal of drainage shall be provided; cement floors are preferred.

SECTION 16. All bottling and distributing plants and farms shall be provided with adequate steam or hot water required for Grade A, for furnishing necessary washing and sterilizing facilities.

SECTION 17. All bottling and distributing places shall be provided with adequate refrigeration, so arranged and controlled that after bottling and before distribution all milk passing through the plant shall be cooled to a temperature of 50° Fahrenheit or lower. Bottle milk shall not be completely submerged under water.

SECTION 18. All plants and farms bottling and dis-

tributing milk shall be provided with and use mechanical bottle fillers and cappers for the filling and capping of milk bottles. Caps for bottles must be purchased or procured in sterilized containers and must remain protected from contamination until used.

SECTION 19. Every can and other vessel which is used to contain milk or cream intended for a sale, shall be kept constantly in a clean and sanitary condition. When emptied and before being returned by the person to whom it was last delivered full or partly full, every such can or other vessel shall be effectively cleansed. The Board of Health shall condemn any can or vessel found by them to be in such condition that it cannot by washing be rendered clean and sanitary as a receptacle for milk, cream, or ice cream and such can or vessel shall not thereafter be used in the handling, distribution or storage of milk, cream or ice cream. The Board of Health may seize and hold as evidence any can or other vessel used in violation of this section.

SECTION 20. No person affected with any disease, presunable communicable, or who is a carrier of such disease, or who in any way comes in contact with a person affected with a disease presumably communicable, shall act as milker, bottler, washer, or in any other similar capacity.

SECTION 21. Any owner or person in charge of any farm or dairy producing milk or cream, or any bottling, pasteurizing or receiving plant shall report immediately to the local Board of Health the name and address, and all of the facts relating to the illness and physical condition of any person who is affected with any illness or disease presumably communicable and who is employed or resides on or off any such farm, dairy or plant, or comes in contact in any way therein.

SECTION 22. Every corporation, association, firm or

individual holding a permit for the sale of milk or cream, or to operate a bottling or distributing plant, shall at any time allow a licensed M. D. practicing in Laconia and in good standing, designated by the Board of Health, or, at its or his election, by such corporation, association, firm or individual to make such physical examination of persons in any way involved in handling the milk, cream, or ice cream, or containers for milk, cream or ice cream, and to take such samples of body excreta as he may require and shall not employ any person refusing to undergo such examination or to submit such samples.

SECTION 23. No bottles or other containers to be used for the delivery of milk shall be removed from a house in which there exists, or has recently existed a case of communicable disease until permission has been granted by the Board of Health.

SECTION 24. The bacterial counts referred to in this ordinance shall be made only in laboratories approved for the purpose by the State Board of Health.

SECTION 25. No ice cream shall be sold or offered for sale unless the milk and cream used in the manufacture thereof has been drawn from officially tuberculin tested cows and has been properly pasteurized.

SECTION 26. In order to facilitate the enforcement of this ordinance, the Board of Health is hereby empowered to make such rules as may be necessary, consistent with the provisions herein contained.

SECTION 27. Any person, firm, company, or corporation, violating any of the provisions of this ordinance, or any rule lawfully made hereunder, or whoever hinders or obstructs any inspector in the pursuit of his lawful duty,

shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars.

# LEGISLATIVE ACT

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*In the Year of Our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Forty-one:*

AN ACT to amend the charter of the city of Laconia and provide for biennial elections.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court Convened:*

1. Biennial Elections. Amend section 12 for chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893 by striking out the whole and inserting in place thereof the following:

Sect. 12. Biennial meetings of the inhabitants of said city shall be held in the several wards on the second Tuesday of March, beginning March 11, 1941, for the choice of all such city, ward and school officers, except moderators, ward clerks and supervisors, as are elected by the people. Their election shall be by ballot, and the terms of their respective offices shall commence on the fourth Tuesday of March following such election.

2. Selectmen. Amend section 13 of chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893 by striking out the whole thereof and by inserting in place thereof the following: Sect. 13. At the first election under this act a moderator and ward clerk shall be chosen, by and from the qualified voters of each ward, who shall hold their respective offices until the close of the biennial election in November, 1894; and thereafter, at each state biennial election, a moderator and ward clerk shall be chosen, by and from the qualified voters of each ward, who shall hold their respective offices for the term of two years. The members of the present board of selectmen in each ward shall continue in office until their respective terms expire or until their successors are chosen and qualified. At



the biennial meeting in 1941 there shall be chosen by and from the qualified voters of each ward one selectman to serve for the term of four years; at the biennial meeting in 1943 there shall be chosen by and from the qualified voters of each ward one selectman to serve for the term of four years, and one selectman to serve for the term of six years; and at each biennial meeting thereafter one selectman shall be chosen by and from the qualified voters of each ward to serve for the term of six years each. All vacancies in the office of moderator, ward clerk or selectman shall be filled by the city council.

3. Mayor. Amend section 14 of chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893 by striking out the word "annually" in the first line and inserting in place thereof the word, biennially, and by striking out the word "three" in the tenth line and inserting in place thereof the word, five, so that said section as amended shall read as follows: Sect. 14. The mayor of said city shall be chosen biennially, and shall have the same negative upon all the actions of the council as by the public statutes the mayors of cities are given upon the action of aldermen. He shall preside in the meeting of the city council, but shall have no vote except in case of an equal division. In his absence the council may elect one of their number chairman, who shall have all the powers and perform all the duties of mayor during his absence or disability, or during a vacancy in said office from any cause. The mayor shall receive in full for his services an annual salary of five hundred dollars, payable semi-annually, which shall be in full for all services of every kind rendered by him in said office.

4. Councilmen. Amend section 15 of chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893 as amended by section 3, chapter 200, Laws of 1901, chapter 192, Laws of 1903, section 3, chapter 213, Laws of 1903, and section 2 of chapter 291 of the

Laws of 1911 by striking out all of said section and inserting in place thereof the following: Sect. 15. There shall be chosen biennially by and from the qualified voters of each of the several wards of said city one councilman to serve for the term of two years.

5. City Clerk. Amend section 17 of chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893, as amended by chapter 316, Laws of 1917, chapter 271, Laws of 1921, and chapter 281 of 1931, by striking out the words "first meeting May 3, 1893," and inserting in place thereof the words, meeting on March 25, 1941, and by striking out the word "annually" in the second line and inserting in place thereof the word biennially, so that said section as amended shall read as follows: Sect. 17. The mayor and council shall, at their meeting on March 25, 1941, and thereafter biennially, on the fourth Tuesday of March, meet for the purpose of taking their respective oaths, and shall elect a city clerk, who shall be clerk of the city council and have a salary of three thousand dollars per annum. All fees received by the city clerk shall be turned over by said clerk to the city treasurer for the use of the city of Laconia.

6. Board of Education. Amend section 20 of chapter 241 of the Laws of 1893 as amended by section 2 of chapter 282 of the Laws of 1921 by striking out all of said section and by inserting in place thereof the following: Sect. 20. The general management and control of the public schools, and of the buildings and property pertaining thereto, shall be vested in a board of education, consisting of six members, elected by the qualified voters of the city. The members of the present board of education shall continue in office until their respective terms expire, or until their successors are elected and qualified. At the biennial meeting in 1941 two members of the board of education shall be elected for the term of four years each; at the biennial

meeting in 1943 two members shall be elected for the term of four years each, and two members for the term of six years each; at each biennial meeting thereafter two members shall be elected for a term of six years each. The board of education shall have the power, perform all the duties, and be subject to the liabilities pertaining to school boards of towns, except as otherwise provided by law. All bills, notes and demands made or contracted for school purposes shall be paid from the city treasury. Members of the board of education shall receive such compensation as the city council shall determine.

7. Takes Effect. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

**REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD**

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March 10, 1942

*To the Mayor and City Council of Laconia:*

In the first place the superintendent's report has been very carefully prepared and contains practically all of the information of importance which I should choose to include in my report, if I were to write one. Anyone who is interested in the administration of our School Department will find that a thorough study of the superintendent's report will be well repaid. In the second place, because of the shortage of paper and the desire to keep City expenses down to the lowest possible level because of the increasing federal taxes brought on by the present emergency I feel that further review by me would be unnecessary and inadvisable.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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*To the Members of the School Board:*

In our desire to aid in the national and local effort to save paper and printing costs the statistical division of this report has been abbreviated. The text of the report has been kept to a minimum which allows only for the essentials of a survey of the work and conditions in the schools during the current year, the second of my administration.

When the City Charter is amended to make the city's year coincide with the fiscal year of the state government and the fiscal and educational year of the school system this report can be more easily written and intelligently read than under present conditions.

### SCHOOL PLANT

Although the current year has brought no major changes in our plant facilities, a rather active program of repairs, alterations, redecorations and minor additions of equipment and furniture was executed principally during the summer recess.

In March the seven brick buildings were insulated with a four-inch layer of rock wool on the floor of the attic and Gilford Avenue School was completely insulated. This project was carried out to improve the comfort of the buildings at an appreciable reduction in the cost of fuel.

The new indirect hot water heater in the high school building was a major installation to provide the large amount of hot water needed for healthful and hygienic conditions in the physical education program. The water heating equip-

ment in the Practical Arts building was made somewhat more effective.

Several classrooms of the high school and Academy Street School were redecorated and the gymnasium floor was completely refinished. A number of appropriate shrubs were planted along the walks and walls of the high school as a start on a long term landscaping program. The front grounds of Academy Street School were resurfaced with loam and reseeded.

One unoccupied classroom in Harvard Street School was converted into an attractive kindergarten room. The large room in the high school used for several years as a combined classroom and library was converted into a library room well furnished with shelving, reading tables, and other necessary library furniture made almost entirely in our wood shops. This represents an important addition to the high school.

Several thousand dollars worth of new and used equipment and small tools have been purchased from federal funds and made available to our shops on a loan basis in connection with our program of training workers for defense industries.

#### *Plant Needs:*

The usable playground space and equipment in all the elementary schools are seriously inadequate for normal and healthful play opportunities for growing children. Also, there is little about the grounds and buildings of all the elementary schools that adds to the attractiveness of the school community and esthetic sense of the children. The high school lawn can easily be made quite attractive by a modest landscape project, but the athletic field is sorely in need of maintenance and further development to provide



essential facilities for the natural health and recreational needs of a thousand boys and girls. To allow the athletic field to deteriorate further is to lose an important part of an earlier investment in what promised to be an excellent high school campus.

The heating and ventilating equipment in four elementary schools is uneconomical, unhealthful and generally unsatisfactory. These four small buildings are being heated by eleven hot air furnaces that burn approximately 225 tons of anthracite coal each season. It is impossible to ventilate these buildings properly in winter months.

An influx of an estimated one hundred and fifty new pupils by late summer will necessitate the purchase of additional school furniture, supplies, and perhaps the employment of a few additional teachers for rooms not now being used for regular classrooms.

This year greater demands than ever before have been made on our high school buildings by the public for cultural, recreational, educational, and national and civilian defense activities. Although these many activities add considerably to our operation and maintenance load, through them the schools are finding ways of being of greater service to the community which they are designed to serve.

#### FINANCIAL SUPPORT

Although the federal government has assumed responsibility for partially supporting public education, particularly in such areas as trades and industries, home economics and agriculture, Laconia does not qualify for nor receive federal aid for its schools. It participates in the state's meager equalization program as a contributor only. Consequently the entire burden of support of our schools at present falls upon the local school district—the city of Laconia.

As indicated in the statistical section of this report the city appropriated \$157,319.74 to cover the costs of operating the schools, payment of principal and interest on building and equipment indebtedness, fixed charges, state assessment of per capita tax, et cetera. This appropriation was supplemented by an income of \$14,260.26 from such other sources as tuition from out-of-town pupils, dog licenses, rentals, and reimbursements from the federal government for our classes in Vocational Education for National Defense to provide a total budget of \$171,580.00 for the year ending June 30, 1941.

It is impossible to prove the adequacy or inadequacy of this amount of money for the support of an educational program acceptable to the people of Laconia and the State of New Hampshire. However, it is somewhat enlightening so far as dollars and cents are concerned to see how Laconia's effort to provide public education for its children compares with the five other New Hampshire cities of comparable size listed below.

In the item of cost per pupil in all grades Laconia ranks third from low in the group of six cities. On the basis of cost per \$1,000 of equalized evaluation Laconia is the lowest

of the group. In both items Keene, the city of the state which most nearly resembles Laconia in size and general type, has the highest cost and on the basis of financial support is doing the best job of educating its children. Taking all districts of the state the cost per \$1,000 of equalized evaluation ranges from \$3.45 to \$31.54.

The budget for the current year (1941-42) is somewhat larger than last year's principally because of the larger salary item of the budget made necessary by the normal movement of teachers not already at maximum salary to the next step on the schedule; also by the allowance of a \$50 differential to married men teachers not already at their maximum, as a partial fulfilment of a provision in our salary schedule for a considerably larger differential for married men.

The rapid and marked rise in prices of practically everything our budget buys plus additional and unexpected purchases for air raid protection may overtax a budget which otherwise would have been adequate for this year's needs. These same conditions and factors plus the certain increase in school enrolment due to defense work in Laconia will demand a larger budget for 1942-43 if we attempt even to maintain our present educational plant and program.

#### TRANSPORTATION

State law requires local school districts to provide free transportation for all pupils below grade nine and pupils under the age of fourteen years who live more than two miles from the schools to which they are assigned. Laconia is meeting this minimum requirement by employing two carriers to transport slightly more than one hundred children from two routes at an annual cost of \$1,839.20. This cost is exceedingly low as compared with transportation costs in Rochester and several other cities due to the fact that we

are doing the minimum required by law while certain other cities are transporting pupils who live more than 1½ miles and even 1 mile for pupils of the lower grades.

Currently we are transporting pupils to the high school, Mechanic, and Harvard Street Schools. Also pupils living in the Lakeport area who are doing work in the special class at Batchelder Street School are being transported daily.

#### HEALTH AND ATTENDANCE SERVICES

When properly administered, health and attendance services go hand in hand with the program of instruction by helping keep pupils constantly in good health and in school. Poor health and irregular attendance are economic liabilities and detract from the effectiveness of the school program.

An effective health program requires the tireless efforts and vigilance of trained health workers and the understanding and co-operation of teachers, pupils, parents, doctors, welfare and social workers.

The customary pre-school health check-up of beginning pupils and the examination of eyes, ears, teeth, and weight of all pupils enrolled in public and parochial schools followed by recommendations for remedial or preventative action is an important part of our health program. Obviously, this program is too broad to be covered effectively by even the most competent school nurse unaided. Added to this is the program of child nutrition through the provision of free school lunches, cod liver oil, and milk. These health building foods are made available by the Surplus Marketing Administration, Works Progress Administration, our City and County governments, the local Post of the American Legion, and certain other organizations of the community.

The mental hygiene clinic established last year through

the cooperation of the State Hospital of Concord is continuing to make its contribution to the mental, emotional, and physical health of Laconia and neighboring pupils. Through the courtesy of the local Post of the American Legion, the clinic meets on the third Wednesday of each school month in a suite of rooms of the Legion Home.

The attendance service being rendered by a part-time attendance worker in co-operation with pupils, parents, teachers, welfare agencies, and the school nurse makes its contribution to the success of the school program.

#### PERSONNEL

##### *Pupil:*

Although the total elementary school enrolment at the close of June, 1941, (921) was slightly less than the enrolment for the preceding year (933), the present elementary enrolment of 893 pupils is greater than last year's figure for the corresponding date. This trend toward a larger elementary school enrolment is contrary to the state and national trends, but it undoubtedly due to the influx of a few families of defense industry workers. Without doubt the increase at this time next year will be considerably more marked.

As was expected the total high school enrolment (grades 7-12) in June, 1941, (1118), was larger than that of June, 1940, (1073). Present enrolment (1071), however, is slightly less than last year's enrolment at mid-year (1092). This deviation from the trend over the past several years may be explained by the increase in work opportunities for older boys and girls. This same influence combined with attractive openings in the armed services likely will contribute to a farther decrease in high school enrolment next year, although it may partially be balanced by pupils of par-

ents who will be brought in by local defense industries.

The present rather high ratio of elementary pupils to teachers, particularly in class rooms where two grades are brought together, is being further increased as new pupils move into the district. The acceleration of this increase during the next six months may necessitate the opening of additional classrooms and the employment of additional teachers in September, 1942.

The present ration of pupils to teachers in the high school is approximately twenty-seven. A careful distribution of pupils among curricula, classes and teachers would make it possible for the present faculty to handle a slight increase in enrolment without serious difficulty. Lack of adequate building facilities rather than the teaching staff presents the more immediate problem associated with a growing enrolment in the high school.

Due to the institution of kindergarten as an integral part of our elementary education program one elementary teacher was added to bring the number of class room teachers to twenty-six. Loss of teachers to other schools has necessitated the employment of two new class rooms teachers and two special workers in the elementary schools.

The high school staff includes thirty-six full-time and two part-time regular teachers, one librarian, and two teachers of art and music who divide their time between the high and elementary schools. Resignations for reasons of marriage or professional advancement are responsible for the replacement of four teachers. The expansion of the defense training program has added one more full-time teacher to the original group of three. These same factors along with selective service may operate to bring about even greater changes in our high school faculty next year, at a time when the available supply of good teachers will be appre-

ciably inadequate, particularly the supply of men teachers in general and women teachers in certain subject areas.

The high school administrative staff has been changed through the loss of A. J. Goodwin and Alma Elliott and the appointment of Willis B. Gifford and Elinor F. Currier to the respective positions of headmaster and clerk. Mr. Libby and Mrs. Edmands of the teaching staff are devoting more time to administration and guidance work.

Realizing that the success of our educational program rests almost wholly upon the quality of our teaching staff and our administrative leadership we are interested in attracting to and keeping in Laconia the very best personnel our salary schedule and general working conditions will permit. Realizing also that even good teachers need to be alert and to keep abreast of the times, particularly in the profession, all teachers are encouraged to broaden and refresh their training by frequently enrolling in summer schools, extension courses, educational tours, etc.

During the past summer approximately one-third of the entire staff added to their formal or general education through educational travel or summer school attendance. During the current year nearly every teacher has been enrolled in one or more short courses in Air Raid Protection, First Aid, and vocational guidance. Besides their regular teaching and extra-curricular duties several have accepted and are ably discharging important responsibilities associated with local civilian defense efforts.

The effectiveness of a well-trained staff depends to a considerable degree upon esprit de corps—their professional spirit and their willingness and ability to co-operate with their colleagues in the best interests of their pupils and the community as a whole. Those few members of a group who clearly demonstrate their lack of these essential qual-

ities sooner or later find more able persons ready to step into their positions.

To the personnel already mentioned should be added four nursery school teachers, thirteen lunchroom workers, eight janitors, one school nurse, one adult education teacher, and two additional members of the administrative staff to bring the total personnel to one hundred four.

### CURRICULUM

#### *Elementary:*

The complete program of pupil activities under the supervision and guidance of teachers constitutes the school curriculum. Partly because of the limitations of our school buildings and grounds the elementary curriculum is confined largely to the minimum program outlined in the State Program of Studies. It is being increasingly enriched however, by an expanding program in art and music and greater attention to current happenings in a closely interrelated world. Some of this enrichment is enhanced by a growing use of such educational aids as the classroom radio, phonograph, educational films, and sets of pictures on particular units of work.

Although the basal reading program now operating in the first four grades continues to be the main center of interest in the elementary program, considerable energy was devoted last year to the development of an improved course of study in arithmetic which is currently being tested in the classrooms throughout the city. The social studies area of the curriculum including such subjects as history, citizenship, safety and health, and geography is in need of careful study by the faculty with a view towards its early and effective revision.

The present national situation makes us more than



ever conscious of the need for greater opportunities for the pupils of our elementary schools.

The new kindergarten bridges an important gap in child development between home and nursery school experiences and the more or less formal school atmosphere of the primary grades. The advantages of kindergarten education should be made available to all pre-school children of the city as rapidly as funds and building facilities will permit.

*Secondary:*

The total high school curriculum can be roughly divided among the following four broad programs of study: college preparatory, general, commercial, and practical arts, the last enrolling the largest group of pupils. These broad areas of study enriched by numerous student clubs and such extra-classroom activities as sports, debating, dramatics, and music provide a rather generous educational program for the youth of Laconia.

Because of the accelerated changes in our social and economic life and the corresponding changes in pupil interests and needs the curriculum must be in a constant state of adaptation to these changes.

In an attempt to open the manual arts program to more pupils and to provide a better foundation for their vocational choices and later trade training certain revisions in this area of the curriculum were made this year. A more adequate program in vocational guidance for all high school pupils is slowly evolving.

The expansion of the high school library facilities and services including a modest remedial English program for individual students give promise of adding considerable strength to the curriculum.

To aid in the development of a strong hemisphere understanding and solidarity and to expand our foreign language and social science departments, new courses in beginning Spanish and the Problems of the American Democracies have been added this year. It is likely that first and second year Spanish will be available next year. The half-year course in Aeronautics introduced at the beginning of the current half year may be continued and expanded next year. A few rather important revisions in the science offerings were made this year.

In the area of extra-classroom activities special attention should be called to the high school operetta, HMS Pinafore, and the first presentation of a Christmas vesper service as examples of the results of close co-operation and the enriching influence of our music and art departments. As the dramatics activities become stronger and more closely integrated with the music and art work the cultural aspect of the extra-curricular program will be further strengthened.

As the faculty, pupils, and parents try to interpret the present and anticipate the future, it is quite likely that additional and even more radical changes in the high school curriculum and calendar will need to be made in the years immediately ahead.

#### SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

The number of Federal-Local nursery schools has been reduced from three to two by the closing of the nursery school in Lakeport due to the decline in enrolment and the difficulty of securing qualified nursery school teachers. The remaining schools are performing an important health and educational service to the fifty pre-school children currently enrolled.

During the year afternoon and evening classes in citizenship education sponsored by the local schools and the State's WPA adult education program have enrolled approximately one hundred adult students. Citizenship education is being energetically expanded throughout the country by the national government, and it should be made more extensive and effective in Laconia.

Due to the pressure of work and the many civilian defense courses and activities our regular evening school curriculum has been considerably abridged. A beginning course in Spanish for adults was introduced this year.

At least for the duration of the war, it may prove wise to discontinue most of what has constituted the evening school program in recent years and develop a less formal but considerably broader adult education program with the assistance and co-operation of certain other interested organizations of the city.

#### *National and Civilian Defense Activities:*

The impact of the world situation and our recent entry into the war have been forcibly felt by the schools throughout the nation. They are responsible for the continuation and the expansion of our program of vocational training for adult workers in defense industries begun in July, 1940. They have made it necessary for us to organize and equip all our schools for the protection of children against possible air raids. This has called for the training of practically every member of the faculty and a few students in first aid and in the rudiments of air raid protection.

Classrooms and other plant facilities have been made available to the Red Cross, Civilian Defense committees, and other organizations for use in training large groups in civilian defense.

Our defense stamp sales in the schools, our contract to build one hundred model airplanes for government use, our present preparation for the fingerprinting of all school children, and the rationing of sugar to all families of the city are unusual activities that have been forced on the schools by our total war effort.

The feeding of school children by means of a school lunch program made possible through the co-operation of Works Progress Administration, Surplus Marketing Administration, the County and City governments, and the School District can scarcely be classified as a national or civilian defense project. However, present and potential future demands on great physical stamina have made us more aware of the part that nutrition must play in the building of a strong people, and it has prompted us to find ways of expanding and improving our school lunch program as a phase of a broad school health program.

As we look into the years ahead it is obvious that the schools of Laconia and the nation must continue to play a major role in the preservation, perfection, and extension of the basic principles of an enlightened, energetic, democratic society.

# BOARD OF HEALTH

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*To the Honorable Mayor and Council:*

The following report of the Board of Health for the current year is respectfully submitted:

There have been no epidemics of contagious diseases with the exception of a short appearance of Anterior Poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis) in which it was necessary for the Board of Health to become responsible for some of the nursing care required in a few of the cases.

There has been some increase in the number of venereal cases coming to the health department for treatment and it is possible that there may be a further increase in these since due to selective service examinations many who would not otherwise have a checkup on their blood for the presence of syphilis will automatically be checked by the military services and a certain percentage of these may be expected to show a positive reaction and these may come in to the Health department for treatment.

All complaints have been investigated and those requiring following up for correction of the conditions have been satisfactorily disposed of with one exception which has been referred to the city solicitor for legal action which appears the only way to solve the matter.

The department has co-operated with the U. S. Public Health Service in a survey of the city of Laconia as a defense center last October and this survey will be repeated in April as a check on changing conditions since that time.

During the past year, the Fire Department responded to fifty-seven box alarms and two hundred and seventy-four still alarms. The Weirs Company responded to twenty bell alarms and twelve calls for chimney fires. The total insurance for fire losses paid during the year 1941 was \$18,960.28

Several improvements have been made during the past year—a new roof for the Central Fire Station at a cost of \$400.00; one fire alarm box at the corner of Holman street and Gale avenue at a cost of \$300.00; five hundred feet of copper drawn wire was purchased for our fire alarm system.

The past year has been unusual in so much as important changes have taken place in the personnel of the Board of Trustees and the library staff.

Early in the year Mr. William F. Knight, for many years president of the Board retired, and Mr. Henry T. Turner was appointed by the City Council to fill the vacancy. A little later Mrs. Grace Plummer, trustee, moved from the city and her place on the Board was taken by Mr. Edward J. Gallagher a former member of the Board of Trustees of the City Library, Concord, New Hampshire.

On December Mrs. Georgia Hawkins, a desk clerk, retired; and in January ill health made it necessary for Miss Hazel J. Clark, librarian, to resign. Miss Clark's long and faithful service is deeply appreciated by the Trustees, and their cordial good wishes follow her as she retires from active service.

During the month of August, Library Hall was kept opened in order that citizens of Laconia, as well as summer visitors, might see the many interesting exhibits in the hall.

In November the plan of keeping the library open Sunday afternoon for the convenience of the reading public was established and the attend has been very gratifying.

Under the direction of the State Library Commission, shelves in the basement have been culled, and a large amount of obsolete material sold.

Miss Bertha Fowler, assistant librarian, has been in

charge since the first of January. Miss Fowler's efficient and untiring efforts and the whole-hearted cooperation of all of the staff has made it possible for the library service to be maintained in a satisfactory manner.

The circulation for the past year was smaller than the preceding years, a condition noted in other libraries. However, the decrease is accounted for by the increase in employment. The large number of readers using the reading room show that the public appreciates the splendid facilities provided by the library, a service that is constantly widening in scope.

To the Mayor and all members of the City Council the Trustees extend sincer thanks for all courtesies extended, and bespeak other thoughtful attention to our requests for the future.

# BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS

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Laconia, New Hampshire

February 16, 1942

*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

The forty-first annual report of the Board of Public Works is hereby submitted, together with the detailed financial report covering the work performed by the City Engineering, Street and Sewer Departments.

The regular or routine maintenance work has been carried on throughout the year as far as funds would permit and such betterment or special work as was authorized has been completed.

Early in the year we suffered a great loss in the death of Colonel Charles A. French, for thirty-five years City Engineer and Superintendent of Streets and Sewers.

Colonel French's long record as a public servant was one of faithful and devoted attention to duty and the memory of his intelligent and efficient administration of the departments under his immediate supervision, will long remain.

In this emergency, and partly to insure carrying forward of general existing policies, the Board deemed it best to advance the Assistant City Engineer, Mr. Arnold J. O'Mara, who has been connected with these offices for many years and therefore familiar with their operation.

In our opinion, the choice made appears to have been fortunate and the work as carried on under his supervision is considered to be satisfactory.

Having in mind the desirability of brief reports and more especially in view of the uncertain conditions exist-



ing at this time, we would postpone, for the time being, any detailed discussion of the 1942 Public Works program.

We close our report with the urgent recommendations that whatever the policy determined upon as to construction work or additions, a sufficient and adequate appropriation be made for routine maintenance winter expense and the customary all year services rendered by this department.

# CITY SOLICITOR

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*To the Honorable Mayor and Council:*

The past year has been an especially active one for the City Solicitor.

The continued development of the Laconia Airport has necessitated the drafting of deeds for the new road, a hearing before the Public Service Commission for a new railroad crossing, the study of proposals for new work, the drafting of leases for hangers, the drafting of ordinances for the proposed lighting system, and other work.

The development at the Weirs waterfront has occasioned the drafting of leases relative to the municipal building, the drafting of a lease relative to the airplane base and the investigation and denial of a claim for personal injuries.

The bankruptcy of the Mt. Washington Steamship Company involved legal work relative to the proposal that the City take over the Mt. Washington boat, and relative to the City's claim against the company for taxes. Although the City's claim for taxes was not secured by a lien since it involved personal property taxes, this claim has been pressed before the referee in bankruptcy and the District Court at Concord, without expense to the City, in the hope that something could be realized thereon; the claim has not been finally disposed of as yet.

Legal services have been rendered to the Overseer of the Poor to aid in cutting down relief expenses. One case was favorably disposed of by showing the County's liability. Suit was brought against the Town of Belmont on another case involving considerable expense; this case has not been finally disposed of as yet.

Suit was brought against Joseph J. Morin for cutting down a shade tree located on the Pleasant Street sidewalk. This suit was instituted to clear up the question as to the City's power of control over trees located within its highways. The Superior Court ruled that the City does not own such trees, no matter how long it has taken care of them and protected them as shade trees. This case has been appealed to the Supreme Court to obtain a final determination of the question. The State Forester and the Attorney General both requested this appeal, and the Attorney General will file a brief supporting the City's position. It is expected that if the Supreme Court supports the decision of the Superior Court, certain remedial legislation will be introduced at the next session of the legislature.

The case of Cheney vs. City of Laconia, which has been on the docket since 1936, was settled favorably to the City.

A good number of deeds, leases and agreements have been drawn relative to the City's usual business. Legal opinions have been rendered to practically every City Department. Municipal Court cases have been prosecuted.

I have attended every meeting of the Mayor and Council, giving legal opinions when requested, and drawing the necessary ordinances.

The Revised Ordinances are now ready for publication, and I recommend that this be done during the coming year.

# PARK COMMISSION

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*To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:*

As secretary of the Park Commission I submit this report for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1941.

The personnel of the Park Commission consists of chairman Mr. Richard Shelley, Dr. C. E. Rowe, His Honor, Mayor Robinson W. Smith, Mrs. Marion Holt, Mrs. Marjorie Phillbrook. Four meetings have been held at City Hall, with all members present and the commission has endeavored to manipulate the management of the parks to the best advantage for the people of Laconia.

Leavitt Park playground in charge of Mr. Charles Peterson and Miss Anna Arnell, sums its season in two brief words—activities and improvement—with an average attendance of about 200, every boy and girl entered into the supervised games, swimming schedules and handiwork program—with an overnight mountain hike for boys over eight years and an all day hike for girls. New equipment, swings, slides jungle gym were added.

The Leavitt Park Social club carries on its weekly dances throughout the season and offer their valuable help physically and financially to the park and to the Leavitt Park Community House. The Lakeport Woman's club and the Leavitt Park Community club use the building for their worthy projects and the House is in constant use as a valuable center.

Opechee Park Playground, in charge of Mr. John Hobson, Mr. John Hayward and Miss Jessie Dutrizac, carried on the regular schedule of supervised games, tennis and waterfront activities. A new raft, 16x20 feet with a 6 foot tower and a new dory life boat were added to the

waterfront equipment. Another tennis court was re-surfaced with macadam and a practise board for beginners was constructed outside the tennis courts. A handball and squash court were laid out underneath the grandstand. The Park Cimmission and the Laconia Red Cross chapter added Mr. Joseph Lacey as a life saver on duty every evening, Saturday afternoon and evenings and all day Sundays. This proved to be a fine addition to the City's Safety Program and many hundreds of people took advantage of the supervised beach facilities.

The Opechee Park Community House has been used by the Young Peoples Social club, the Opechee Park club, the Junior Hi-Y, the 4-H group, the Americanization groups and many others.

Wyatt Park playground was supervised by Mrs. James Leh. The average attendance at the playground was 50 children. A great deal of hard work with crayons, paints and woodworking was carried on in the Community House. The Wyatt Park club have purchased two new slides for the children, to be put in use this next season. The club held a large summer carnival, a Christmas party for the children, also a winter skating carnival for all children. Card parties are held monthly in the Community House.

Skating rinks were maintained over a period of eight weeks this year instead of the customary nine weeks. Leavitt Park, superintended by Mr. Joseph Morgan, one at Casino Square under Mr. Ernest Levasseur, one at Opechee cove and one at Wyatt Park both cared for by Mr. John O'Connor.

The City of Laconia should feel justifiable pride in its three supervised playgrounds, and feel that every child and young person in the city avails himself of the opportu-

ities afforded by these parks, at one time or another, either summer or winter.

# AUDITOR

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*To the Honorable Robinson W. Smith, Mayor,  
and the City Council of Laconia, N. H. :*

Gentlemen :

Having completed the audit of the financial accounts of the City of Laconia for the fiscal year ended February 15, 1942, I present the following Statements showing the financial condition of the City as of that date.

Exhibit I—Appropriation Account year ended February 15, 1942.

Exhibit II—Excess and Deficiency Account.

Exhibit III—Balance Sheet as of February 15, 1942.

Exhibit IV—Serial Debt as of February 15, 1942.

The following items appearing in the balance sheet are commented upon as follows :

<i>Cash</i>	\$21,293.60
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This cash balance was verified by the various bank statements with the records of the City Treasurer and compared with the ledger of the City Clerk: all receipts and expenditures of the City Treasurer were properly checked with the different Departments of the City: an audit of each monthly draft is made by the City Auditor as a final check upon all bills before payment is made by the City Treasurer. All Bonds, Notes and Coupons paid are carefully checked with the Records of the City Clerk.



*Property Sold to City for Taxes* \$16,343.69

During the fiscal year, the 1940 sale of property to the City for Taxes amounted to \$13,906.69 which was several thousand dollars less than last year; during the present year several of the old accounts have been cleaned up so that we now have the above amount represented only by 1938, 1939 and 1940 taxes to be redeemed; this item is being made smaller each year.

*Accounts Receivable—Taxes* \$54,370.34

The Collector's record of unpaid taxes was examined by me and compared with the records kept by the City Clerk; the record of taxes paid was examined and compared with the records of the City Treasurer; all payments made by the Collector to the City Treasurer was properly vouched for by the Treasurer's receipts.

Warrants from the Board of Assessors to the City Tax Collector covering the commitment of all taxes were examined and all abatements were compared to see that they were approved by the Board of Assessors.

The Tax Collector has made a fine showing again in the collection of taxes for the fiscal year, a balance of \$42,177.30 being unpaid as of Feb. 15, 1942 as compared to a balance of \$46,309.71 for the previous year; many of the older accounts have either been redeemed, taken by Tax Deeds or Abated and many of these left which are uncollectable should be abated during the next year.

*Accounts Receivable*

*Balance Due from Martha E. Johnson* \$7,096.24

A Court action in the name of the City of Laconia as plaintiff for the recovery of \$22,096.24 against Martha E.

Johnson resulted in a judgment in favor of the City for the full amount: the Bonding Company having paid the \$15,000.00 limit of the policy, the above amount remains unpaid and must be carried as an asset.

*Property Acquired by Tax Deeds* \$3,195.23

Tax Deeds were taken by the City during the fiscal year in the Amount of \$130.34 on several parcels of land, redemption amounted to \$435.00 and Tax Sales Charged off by vote of the City Council amounted to \$27.48 thereby leaving the above amount.

*Miscellaneous Liabilities* \$866.37

*Leavitt Fund* \$889.07

This account was examined and verified.

*Gale Park Fund*

By vote of the City Council the unexpended balance amounting to \$765.52 on May 1, 1941 was turned over to the Treasurer of the Public Library Trustees and is no longer carried as a liability against the City.

*Motor Vehicle Taxes 1942* \$1,811.64

This source of revenue has increased during the past year; the amount received by the City Clerk was checked and verified with the receipts of the City Treasurer and also with the permit cards.

*Notes*

At the end of the fiscal year February 15, 1941 there was \$50,000.00 in notes outstanding but the present fiscal

year ended February 15, 1942 shows no notes outstanding for the first time in many years.

*Uncxpended Appropriations* \$58,395.84

Appropriations made during the year were verified with the records of the City Council and expenditures were properly approved by Treasury Warrants: all transfers were approved by the Mayor and City Council; a detailed report of all appropriations may be found in Exhibit I of this report.

Laconia Shoe Company \$2,066.46

This amount represents the amount of rents paid under the terms of this lease from the City to Laconia Shoe Company.

*Highways and Bridges* \$262.34

This small balance to the credit of this department is being carried over by the City for improvement to State Aid Roads; the State contributes a similar amount which is available for these roads.

*Overlay for Abatements* \$4,298.57

This amount is carried over to enable the Assessors to have sufficient to care for all abatements necessary during the next fiscal year.

*Credit Balance* \$33,971.15

The above amount represents the excess of current assets over current liabilities and is greater by over \$11,000.00 than the one for the previous year; and is also by far the largest ever attained since the incorporation of the City; during the past year \$49,500. was paid on the Serial Debt with no additional Bond Issue thereby reducing the Net Debt to \$229,750. which is less than 2% of the Valuation of the

City and a new low for many years. A detailed statement of the allocation of the previous year's unexpended balance may be found in the pages following the list of the appropriations for the fiscal year of 1941. The Mayor and City Council should be commended very highly for this fine showing during the past year and will most certainly come in handy during the present year.

#### SERIAL DEBT

The Serial Debt outstanding as of February 15, 1942 is detailed in Exhibit IV of this report and shows a Net Debt of \$229,750.00 as compared to \$279,250. on February 15, 1941; this represents a decrease of \$49,500.00 during the fiscal year.

#### CEMETERY TRUST FUNDS

The following statement of Trust Funds were verified by examining all pass books of Savings Banks and Securities held by the Trustees and by checking all the expenditures with the Savings Bank Books. All receipts and expenditures are properly recorded on their books.
