MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING

Lincoln, N. H.

The Town Meeting was held in the High School Auditorium in Lincoln on Tuesday, March 11, 1958. The Meeting was called to order by Moderator James Maguire at 9:00 A. M.

Before the start of the Meeting, Moderator Maguire read to the assembled voters, the rules governing a Town Meeting — personalities were not to be brought into any discussion because to do so would be out of order.

The Town Warrant was then read by Moderator Maguire.

The following articles were acted upon.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Henry Waldo to pass over this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Henry Waldo that the sum of \$5,800 be raised

to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year; \$3,500 Town Officers' Salaries, \$2,000 Town Officers' Expenses, \$300 for Election and Registration Expense. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 3. How much money will be raised for the Police Department.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Charles Doherty that the sum of \$4,900 be raised for the Police Department.

Amended motion made by Edmond Gionet and seconded by Theresa Lehouillier that this article be voted upon by secret ballot.

Moderator Maguire asked if there was any discussion on this article.

James MacDonald read a telegram received from Mr. John Aldrich in which he commended Chief of Police Fred Johnson for the fine work he has done in the performance of his duties and expressed the desire that he would remain as Chief of Police for the Town of Lincoln.

Edmond Gionet said he thought it was about time that the Town started thinking of curtailing their taxes. He said in his opinion the Town could not afford a full time Police Officer.

Charles Doherty said that with all the Juvenile Delinquency, as evidenced in other Towns that it was impossible to get along with a part time officer.

James MacDonald said that last year the Town appropriated \$4,700 for the Police Department and no questions were asked. He wanted to know why all the questions this year. He also asked the voters if they thought a mill man should be put on as a Police Chief on a part time basis. He pointed out that the man might not be available when needed.

Edward Gionet said this didn't seem to pose any problem with the Fire Department — the firemen left the mill when needed.

James MacDonald said that situation was a little different. The firemen weren't called out every day or even every week but a Police Officer could and would be called out often.

Edmond Gionet then asked the Selectmen if the Town of Lincoln owned the Police car and if so, in whose name was it registered.

James MacDonald told him that the Town did not own the car but paid the car expenses. He then read a letter from the Motor Vehicle Department pertaining to the registration of this car.

Edmond Gionet said he was not questioning the legality of the registration but was questioning the liability the Town would have to face if the car was involved in an accident.

James MacDonald said the car was fully covered with insurance.

Again Edmond Gionet said he thought the Town could get along with a part time Police Officer. He said it had been done in the past and worked out very well.

George McGee said conditions were different now than they were at the time we did have a parttime Police Officer. The D. W. Highway, he pointed out is more thickly settled and the Town itself has grown in population. He brought up the fact that in the event the resort owners on the highway wanted to stay open the year round for the skiers, they would need full time Police protection. Mr. George Parker said that the residents on the highway want full time police protection; they want Fred Johnson the year around. (Mr. Parker owns and operates cabins on the D. W. Highway.)

Mr. James Adzarito asked the reason for all the ball throwing and suggested that the meeting get down to the serious business of voting.

George McGee offered the following amended motion which was seconded by James MacDonald that this issue be balloted from the floor and that Fred Johnson be given a vote of confidence by a standing vote.

Mrs. Elizabeth Duguay said we should vote on the motion made on the appropriation for the Police Department before voting on any further amendments.

Moderator Maguire pointed out to Mr. McGee that a motion was already on the floor and that it would have to be voted on first.

George McGee then withdrew his above motion and made a motion which was seconded by Edmond Gionet that the check list be used on all voting done at Town Meeting on this day. Vote in the affirmative.

The following is the result of the secret ballot taken on Article 3 — that the sum of \$4,900 be raised for the Police Department.

Total votes cast:

181

Yes 137 - No 44

Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald as follows: Having voted with the majority I move that we now consider the vote whereby we passed Article 3 to raise the sum of \$4,900 for the Police Department and on this motion I hope that you vote "No."

As this motion was not too clear to the voters, Mr. McGee explained that there is always an element for reconsideration and this motion means that the subject cannot be brought up again at this meeting.

Moderator Maguire called for a standing vote from the floor and the majority vote was "No" so the motion carried.

Article 4. How much money will be raised for the Fire Department.

Motion made to pass over Articles 4 to 22 inclusive made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald so that Article 23 could be taken up before the school meeting while a good representation of the voters were present. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 23. To see what action the Town will take towards appointing a committee of Five to make a study of the possibilities of erecting a community building, the purpose of which would be to house the Town Officers, hold Town Meetings and other public gatherings and provide facilities for indoor sports events such as are sponsored by the schools and report back at the next annual Town Meeting or at a special Town Meeting should such be called for this or any other reason; and that the sum of \$500.00 be appropriated to the use of the committee no part of which, however, is to be used for travel or meals of the committee membership. Committee to be appointed by the Moderator.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$500.00 be appropriated and a committee appointed.

Amended motion made by Charles Doherty and seconded by Edmond Gionet that this motion be passed over for this year.

Charles Doherty asked that an explanation be given as to how much it would cost the Town for this proposed community building.

George McGee said there were two or three trust funds in the State of New Hampshire that can be applied for to be used for this purpose. He said there is a trust fund known as The Lindsay Fund of ¹/₄ million dollars which embraces New England; the Barnhardt Fund which only takes in New Hampshire. Mr. McGee said that he had

looked into these funds at his own expense and found out that schools cannot apply. He said he saw Mr. Wakefield, Attorney for the Barnhardt Estate and was told by him that in his opinion an application from the Town of Lincoln for the purpose of building a community center would be favorably looked upon.

Mr. Doherty rescinded his amended motion to pass over this article.

Edmond Gionet wanted to know how \$500 could be appropriated without specifically stating the purpose of this amount.

Murray Clark wanted to know if the Town's people had requested that some kind of a community building be erected.

George McGee said that a petition with 10 signatures was presented to the budget committee. James MacDonald in answer to Edmond Gionet's question said that the Article stated the purpose of the \$500.00 which the Town is asked to appropriate.

George Boyle wanted to know how many voters would have to be present at a special Town Meeting.

Mr. McGee said that two-thirds of the voters would have to be present.

George Hooker asked if this community building would be constructed from trust funds or if the Town would have to appropriate money for it.

George McGee said that the Town would have to start it before making application to the trust fund. He also stated that there was no guarantee that the Town would get any monies from the trust fund. He explained that this article in

no way is a decision to erect a building; its purpose is to look into the potentials. The committee would have to report their findings to the voters before any action would be taken. Vote in the affirmative.

Meeting recessed at 10:30 to take up School Meeting. Motion for recess made by James Mac-Donald and seconded by George McGee. Vote in the affirmative.

Town Meeting resumed at the close of the School Meeting — 11:45 A. M.

Article 4. How much money will be raised for the Fire Department.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$3,000 be raised for the Fire Department.

Amended motion made by Edward Clark and seconded by Murray Clark that the appropriation be reduced by \$375.00; that the oldsters and the Chief of Police, who is already on a salary, be dropped from the department, a total of three. James MacDonald said it was the Fire Chief's prerogative to pick his crew.

Moderator Maguire asked for a standing vote on this article.

Against cutting: 29 For Cutting: 20 Vote in the affirmative that \$3,000 be raised for the Fire Department.

Article 5. How much money will be raised for the Public Health Department.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the Town raise the sum of \$1,900 for the Public Health Department. Vote in the affirmative. Article 6. How much money will be raised for Town Maintenance.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Robert Russell that the Town raise the sum of \$15,000 for Town Maintenance. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 7. How much money will be raised for Street Lighting.

Motion made by Edward Levasseur and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$2,800 be raised for Street Lighting.

Edward Clark asked if the switch on the highway had been repaired and if it would be in order for the Town to appropriate money to install a control switch on the street lights. He said that the street lights on the highway had been burning during the day, all day in several instances. James MacDonald asked if he had reported it to anyone — he himself had not been notified. As for a control, Mr. MacDonald said, the matter would have to be taken up with Public Service, the Town had nothing to do with controlling these lights.

Vote in the affirmative that the Town raise the sum of \$2,800 for Street Lighting.

Article 8. How much money will be raised for Cemeteries.

Motion made by Joseph Asselin and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$1,000 be raised for Cemeteries. Vote in the affirmative.

Guy Hiltz said that this Memorial Day there were no flowers on the grave of Dr. E. D. Burtt and he thought it was a shame after the long years of devoted service that the doctor gave to the Town. He made a motion that this year a wreath be placed on his grave the cost for same to be charged back to the Town. Seconded by James MacDonald. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 9. How much money will be raised for Public Library.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee that the sum of \$1,600 be raised for Public Library. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 10. How much money will be raised for Support of Town Poor.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee that the Town raise the sum of \$3,000 for Support of Town Poor. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 11. How much money will be raised for Old Age Assistance.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the Town raise the sum of \$700 for Old Age Assistance. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 12. How much money will be raised for Maintenance of Water Department.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Edward Levasseur that the Town raise the sum of \$9,000 for the Maintenance of Water Department.

James MacDonald explained that the increase over last year's figure is due to the necessity of relaying the water line from Arthur Asselin's Restaurant to the Y at the South End. He said the line was practically gone and a break in the winter months would be very costly to the Town. He said that eventually this new line would take care of LaBrecque and West Streets at the South End.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 13. How much money will be raised for White Mt. Regions Association.

Motion made by Henry Waldo and seconded by George McGee that the sum of \$240.80 be raised for White Mt. Regions Association.

Murray Clark said that before this sum was passed, he would like to bring up the fact that last year the sum of \$227.89 was raised and that on page 16 of the Town Report, the expenditures far exceeded the budget estimate. Made reference to the two new signs on the highway.

James MacDonald said the question raised by Mr. Clark did not come under this article. Vote in the affirmative that the sum of \$240.80 be raised for White Mt. Regions Association.

Article 14. How much money will be raised for a 4th of July Celebration.

Motion made by Roland Bourassa and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$500 be raised for a 4th of July Celebration. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000 and Interest to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1958.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee that the sum of \$2,000. and Interest to take up water bonds due July 1, 1958 be raised. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,300.00 and Interest to take up Note on Backhoe due May 1, 1958. Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$1,300 and Interest be raised to take up Note on Backhoe due May 1, 1958. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$84.03 for T. R. A. work, the State to contribute the sum of \$560.17.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$84.03 be raised for T. R. A. work, the State to contribute the sum of \$560.17. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.

Motion made by Henry Waldo and seconded by Robert Russell that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Community Band.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Edward Levasseur that the Town vote to raise the sum of \$250.00 for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Community Band. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 20. To see how much money the Town will raise for Civil Defense.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee that the sum of \$1,300 be raised for Civil Defense.

James MacDonald explained that the increase was due to the purchase of two walkie-talkies, a radio in Fred Johnson, the Chief of Police's car, and one in the Fire Chief's Car. Mr. MacDonald said these articles had already been purchased to take care of emergencies.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000 for Parks and Playgrounds.

Motion made by Henry Waldo and seconded by Robert Russell that the Town vote to raise the sum of \$2,000 for Parks and Playgrounds.

James MacDonald explained here that the two signs put up on the highway were put there at the request of people on the highway and rather than appropriate money for them at the 1957 Town Meeting, it was voted to take the money out of the surplus fund. He said that \$1,145 was not too much to pay for two signs.

Murray Clark said that this was not a true picture because Town maintenance crews and town equipment were used to erect these signs and that they had to be erected twice because they had to be moved from their original positions. He said that there was misappropriation of funds in this case and that the people of the Town should take care that this did not occur again in the future. He said there was no authorization for such expenditure.

James MacDonald referred to the "Minutes of the 1957 Town Meeting," page 4, Article 13, which states that no added appropriation needed for signs; the amount would be taken out of Town Reserve Fund.

Vote in the affirmative that the town raise the sum of \$2,000 for Parks and Playgrounds.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a tract of land at a cost of not to exceed \$2,000.00. Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the Town vote to purchase a tract of land at a cost not to exceed \$2,000.00.

Murray Clark wanted to know where the parcel of land would be and for what purpose it would be put to.

George McGee explained that the lots below the Inn were studied. There are three lots there which approximate 5 acres in area. He said if the Town did go into the Community building project, the land would be needed.

Henry Waldo said in his opinion the Town needed more land for expansion of school or town buildings and the purchase of this land would be to the Town's advantage.

Vote in the affirmative.

Article 23. Committee appointed by Moderator Maguire to act on this article:

> Kenneth McInnis W. J. Canton C. Griffin J. Patterson R. Pillsbury

Article was taken up at the early morning session and passed in the affirmative.

Article 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Murray Clark again brought up the matter of the two signs and asked if there shouldn't be some measure taken whereby some control on monies used for such matters in the future.

James MacDonald said he agreed with him but at the time, the people on the highway were the ones who asked for these signs.

Edward Clark brought up the fact that one of the signs is installed by Parker's Dam in North Woodstock.

George McGee said that the Forestry and Recreation Department would not allow the sign to be on their property so that the sign had to be erected somewhere and Parker's Dam was chosen. He also stated that the one erected in the Notch had to be taken down because the Division Engineer for Forestry and Recreation was about to lose his job over it.

Roland Bourassa asked who was to take care of the signs.

James MacDonald said it was in Roland Vezina's contract that he paint the signs this year.

Nominations were in order for members for the Budget Committee to serve for three years:

Kenneth McInnis nominated by George McGee Robert A. Russell nominated by James MacDonald Murray Clark nominated by Roland Bourassa George Parker

nominated by Edward Levasseur

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee that nominations be closed.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the clerk cast one ballot in favor of the above nominees. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by Roland Bourassa and seconded by James MacDonald that the American Flag be properly displayed at our Town Meetings. Vote in the affirmative.

Murray Clark asked to be enlightened as to what is being done or what is to be done in the future in collecting dog taxes, head taxes and poll taxes.

James MacDonald said that this year the Selectmen were planning to nominate a Dog Officer to go from house to house and collect the dog taxes. He said the Head Tax and Poll Tax collecting is entirely up to the Tax Collectors.

Murray Clark said his purpose in bringing this matter up at the Town Meeting was due to the enormous sums appropriated at the meeting on this day. He said stronger measures should be taken by the Tax Collector.

George McGee offered the following and asked that they be put into a motion and be memorialized in the Town Records:

1. Public Utilities Commission — In regard to the Boston and Maine R. R. hearings before you today, I. Representative George McGee, Selectman from the town of Lincoln, N. H., wish to state that we, of Lincoln, N. H., wish to take the stand that the Public Utilities Commission will not be injurious by their decision on the Boston and Maine R. R. to the extent that it would be injurious and jeopardize our freight service to our industries in Lincoln, N. H.

Motion made by Henry Waldo and seconded by James MacDonald that the above be accepted as read. Vote in the affirmative.

2. I move that the Board of Selectmen be and is hereby authorized and empowered to request of the Barnhart Trust, so-called, and/or any other charitable trust that may be in existence in the State of New Hampshire and which may be suitable to the purposes hereinafter indicated, that a sum of money be granted to the Town of Lincoln or any agents thereof as it deems proper to handle such monies for the purposes of assisting in the construction of a building

to be used for community purposes such as for affairs relating to education, veterans, charitable, and any other non-profit organization that may see fit to require the need of the same for any functions which it or they in the proper pursuance and corporate powers are allowed by law to engage in.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Henry Waldo that the motion be accepted as read. Vote in the affirmative.

3. I move that the Board of Selectmen be authorized and is hereby ordered to request of the Department of Public Works of the State of New Hampshire that a preliminary plan be made showing an extension of "Forest Highway Number 8" as running through the Main Street of the Town of Lincoln so that such will be available for discussion at a Public Hearing if and when said Highway is extended to meet central highways in the vicinity by said Department of Public Works; and further, that the Board of Selectmen inform the Department or other interested authorities that it is the wish of the Townspeople of Lincoln in Town Meeting Assembled, that should such extension of "Forest Highway Number 8" be entered into that this Main Street location is preferred over others now in contemplation by the Department of Public Works and/or other State and Federal agencies.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Edward Levasseur that the motion be accepted as read.

Edward Clark said the voters should take into serious consideration what will happen when heavy traffic gets onto the Main Street. Children would

be in danger, noise at all hours of the day and night by the heavy traffic and trucks that will use this highway.

George McGee explained that the above motion only gives the Selectmen the power to investigate the proposals. He said that the object for requesting the inter-change to be in Lincoln was to promote business otherwise with the inter-change by-passing Lincoln, the Town would suffer because many of the tourists wouldn't bother to turn off the highway to come here.

• Vote in the affirmative.

4. Mr. Moderator, I offer the following resolution: WHEREAS, Arthur P. Salem was a lifelong resident of Lincoln who died on September 7, 1957, and

WHEREAS, he was a devoted father of a large family, a merchant of repute and respect, and a citizen dedicated to furthering the best interests of his neighbors and his community; and WHEREAS, at the time of his death, he was serving his thirty-fifth consecutive year as a Selectman; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that when this annual Town Meeting of 1958 is adjourned, it shall do so in his honor and memory, as our token of respect for all he meant to us; and be it further

- RESOLVED, that these resolutions be entered upon our records, and a copy of them be sent to his family by the Town Clerk of Lincoln.
- . Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the above Resolution be accepted as read. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by George McGee and seconded by James MacDonald that the assembly stand and observe three minutes of silence out of respect to the late Arthur P. Salem. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee that Town Meeting recess to take up balloting. Vote in the affirmative.

Recessed at 1:20 P. M.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,300.00 and Interest to take up note on Backhoe due May 1, 1959.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$96.03 for T. R. A. work, the State to contribute the sum of \$640.23.

18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Community Band.

20. To see how much money the Town will raise for Civil Defense.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 for Parks and Playgrounds.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Town of Woodstock to supply them with water during the dry season. In return for this water supply the Town of Woodstock will agree to install a chlorinating plant and assume one-half of the cost of maintenance. They also will bear the cost of connecting the two water systems at the town line. 23. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the Lincoln Inn property at a cost of \$13,000.00 and authorize the Selectmen to bond the Town for a period of ten years to pay for said property.

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND SCHOOL

NURSING SERVICE

Dec. 31st, 1957 — Dec. 31st, 1958

The total number of visits made in Lincoln was 819. Of this number, 110 visits were made to infants and pre-school children. Visits to pre-natal cases were 11, to new mothers 19. Bedside care to adults 451, crippled children's visits 4, visits to cases not under care, Welfare, Social Service, etc., 224.

The Immunization Clinics held in April and May were attended by 77 infants and pre-school children. At these clinics, vaccine for protection against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus and Polio is given through the State Department of Health.

Due to the fine cooperation of several interested friends, the Rainbow Girls of both towns, the Lincoln Union Church Sunday School, the Sisters of the Atonement, the Franconia Paper Corporation, the Elks of Littleton, the merchants, the usual Christmas project was carried out. The aim of this project is to help needy families have a happier holiday. The clothes, toys and food were much appreciated.

The Red Cross Blood Bank made its yearly visit in the Fall. The number of those who donated blood was much lower than previous years. Therefore, it is hoped that both towns will show greater interest in this important program on its next visit.

We again had the services of a dental hygienist, through the Bureau of Dental Health Services, State Department of Health. This clinic was for pre-school children 3 to 6 years. Several mothers from both communities showed interest in having their children's teeth cleaned and treated with 4 applications of fluorine. Thirty-three children attended.

One hundred and fifty-four visits were made to the Lincoln Schools. Nurse's examination of 324 pupils consisted of eye testing, weights and inspections. It was necessary that 4 children secure glasses, 5 children returned to their doctors to have their glasses changed, and one child sent for eye surgery. Home visits are made whenever necessary to discuss any defects found. Athletic examinations were done on all High School pupils taking part in sports. The Tuberculin Patch test was done on the 132 pupils of grades I, II, III, V and VII. These were not included in last year's testings. The results of these tests were satisfactory.

We gave demonstrations of the bed bath and bed making in the care of the sick at home to the Home Economics class. Bathing the new baby was also demonstrated. Lessons in First Aid were given to the Girl Scout Troop.

You Can Help Prevent Forest Fires

Twenty-five per cent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from carelessly burning debris brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost, annually, of extinguishing these fires runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two hundred dollars.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc., cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning, yourself. It will be easier for you, personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Municipal Court.

Financial Statements Comparative Balance Sheets December 31, 1957 — December 31, 1958 (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1957 and December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Net Debt decreased by \$1,747.31 in 1958.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$1,575.03, plus a revenue deficit of \$94.82, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,669.85.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1958, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1958, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursements of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

General Comments

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$1,552.69, from \$3,-933.11 to \$2,380.42, in 1958, as shown herewith:

Appropriation Overdrafts and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1958, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$1,575.03. In other words — total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount, as shown herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Chapter 32 of the Revised Statutes Annotated) application should have been made to the Tax Commission by the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, for a certificate of emergency authorizing expenditures to be made in excess of budgetary appropriations.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of the audit.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Lincoln qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said District on the tenth day of March, 1959, at 10:30 A. M., to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary officers for the School District for the ensuing year.

2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.

3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

5. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid Fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

6. To see what action the School District will take as regards to transportation of school pupils.

7. To see if the School District will vote to continue the School Building Study Committee until the next annual school district meeting, and to raise the sum of \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) to be used under this article by this committee, if necessary, to obtain technical advice from qualified experts in determining the needs for and costs of construction of new school facilities.

8. To see if the District will vote to enter into a long term contract relative to the maintenance of a high school, the payment of tuition, and other provisions relative to costs and expenses relating to same with the districts of Thornton, Woodstock or other district or districts under the terms of the statutes in such a case made and provided, and to see what sums may be voted and appropriated therefore.

9. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for, and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State Agencies.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

To the Voters and Residents of Lincoln:

Another year is coming to a close and with it the realization that Lincoln High School is becoming overcrowded with our present enrollment of 154 students and with an expected enrollment in excess of 200 within the next few years. Our present school population consists of 76 boys and 78 girls. The proportion of Lincoln students to non-resident students continues to follow the pattern of former years. This year 79 students reside in Lincoln, 65 in Woodstock, 9 in Thornton and 1 in Carroll. It has been most gratifying to the School Board to learn that some of the non-resident students who left Lincoln High School for various reasons to study elsewhere have returned to Lincoln because they or their parents decided that Lincoln High School had more to offer them.

Acting in accordance with the vote of the last School District meeting, the School Board has investigated the problem of long term contracts between School Districts. Long term contracts, if legal and acceptable to the contracting Districts, would provide protection to Lincoln which must accept the burden of contracting for a teaching staff several months prior to the opening of the school year and to the towns sending tuition students who would be assured of adequate teaching staffs for their children. At the time this report is being written we are currently engaged in the preparation of such a contract. In making this determination we were fortunate in securing the services of Attorney Arthur J. Bergeron of Berlin who previously had done considerable research on school problems for the Council on Home Rule. Attorney Bergeron believes that long term contracts which must be approved by the voters in the School District Meeting may be entered between immediately adjoining towns, which in our case would include Woodstock and Thornton. In order to be sure of his position he is now

discussing the whole matter with the State Board of Education with the expectation that the State Board will request a ruling on the matter from the Attorney General. In a joint School Board Meeting between the Lincoln and Woodstock School Boards the matter was discussed thoroughly and given tentative approval by all of the members.

Your School Board has also served on the School Study Committee which was created at the last School District Meeting, but no reference will be made in this report to the findings and recommendations of that committee in-as-much as we expect that a separate report on the Committee's work will be prepared for your information and consideration.

The matter of a salary schedule for teachers has also been studied and conferences held with a committee representing the teachers. The schedule which we submit for your consideration provides for a base salary of \$3,600.00 per year with provisions for adjustments both upward and downward depending upon the educational qualifications of each teacher plus fixed annual increases up to established top limits for each general qualification level. The schedule is attached to this report as an appendix for your review. Your School Board has mixed reactions to a salary schedule which does not provide primary consideration for recognition of merit for each teacher but we realize the problems of administration that such a system would entail and believe that the compromises effected in this schedule are deserving of your consideration. It provides the teachers with a definite earning schedule that they may depend upon provided that their work is satisfactory, yet it permits the School Board certain latitude for action by permitting them to withhold annual increases, provided in their opinion such action is justified, or by permitting them to award additional increases for what they consider meritorious service. The teacher who has been denied an annual increase is granted the right of appeal in person before the School Board within a definite period.

The teaching staff was expanded before the start of the school year by the addition of a full time teacher of music, Mr. Francis J. Occhipinti, a graduate of The New England Conservatory of Music. Mr. Occhipinti is conducting classes in music throughout all of the grades and the high school. Another new teacher, Edward Brault, a graduate of Boston University, was secured for French and Social Studies, and Richard Dexter, who had previous teaching experience at Lincoln, returned from Bethlehem to take over a greatly expanded Science Department. The complement of high school teachers and their assignments are as follows:

Mr. Roger Stewart Principal, Guidance, Mathematics and Psychology Mr. Frederick Branscombe Social Studies, Science, Physical Education and Coaching Mr. Francis Ketcham English, Social Studies Mrs. Ethel DeGrace English Miss Dorothy Rogers **Business Miss Joan Lehan Mathematics** Mrs. Helen Keniston Home Economics Mr. Edward Brault French, Social Studies Mr. Richard Dexter Science Mr. Francis Occhipinti Music

In the Grammar School a special course in hand writing has been provided for all of the pupils from Grade 1 through Grade 8. We believe that the improvement in writing which is especially noticeable in the lower grades where children are just learning writing techniques and forming writing habits, fully justifies the cost. Our budget provides for continuing this program another year.

The school plant improvement program which was commenced three years ago continued with what we consider marked success. Tight control of expenditures has permitted the purchase of much needed equipment and improvement to the buildings. During the past year we have purchased:

- 1 Monroe learners type calculating machine. A large assortment of laboratory equipment for use in physics and biology classes.
- 200 Folding steel chairs for the auditorium.
- 100 Folding steel chairs for the cafeteria.
 - 10 Folding leg tables for the cafeteria.
 - 75 Desks and chairs for the high school. One room is now furnished with all new desks and chairs.
 - 5 Locking file cabinets for teachers.

Repairs and improvements to the buildings include:

Reroofing the headmaster's house. (The old roof was beyond repair)

Installing connecting doors in the Grammar School to connect rooms 5, 6 and 8 to provide use of the new fire escape without going into the upstairs corridor.

We have also made plans for other improvement work which we hope will be completed before the School Meeting. This includes the erection of a new fire escape on the northwest end of the High School and installation of doors in the upper corridors in both High School and Grammar School. All of these fire preparedness items have been done in accordance with plans approved by the State Fire Marshal. In fact, when these jobs are completed we will have complied with every recommendation contained in the Fire Marshal Report of 1955. We also have contracted the laying of new floors in the upstairs corridor and in two upstairs rooms in the Grammar School. A room has also been provided for the School Nurse.

A matter which has been discussed at length by your School Board concerns transportation of pupils. We call your attention to the state law which requires the School District to transport only those elementary pupils who reside more than two miles from school. However, by vote of the annual School District Meeting in March 1946, the School Board was instructed to transport pupils from the south end. This has resulted in demands on the part of the parents to have their children transported from other sections of town. We believe that this creates an unnecessary expense and burden for the town and we respectfully request the voters to give full consideration to the article in the warrant concerning school pupil transportation. It is your duty and privilege to vote to provide transportation to all children as is being done at present, or you may vote to provide transportation only to children residing a specified distance from the school. Only by a review of the situation by the voters can the School Board be assured that they are acting in accordance with the voters' wishes.

A) In the event that the disparity between the 1958-59 salary of any teacher currently in the Lincoln system and the 1959-60 salary of the same teacher called for on this schedule is more than \$300.00, the increase in salary need not be more than \$300.00 per year. In other words, increments necessary to achieve the schedule level need not be made in jumps of more than \$300.00 per year.

B) Base pay will be reviewed and may be altered by the School Board every two years in the light of existing economic conditions in the State of New Hampshire.

C) An additional allowance will be made for the teachers who coach.

D) An allowance of ten days paid sick leave for each teacher per year. This sick leave may be accumulated into other years until a maximum of twenty days allowance is achieved. However, in case of extended sickness, the teacher must present evidence substantiating the need for such absences.

E) The salaries for administrative personnel shall be determined as follows:

The High School Principal shall receive a salary equal to 130% of the schedule step to which he would be entitled were he a teacher.

The Grammar School Principal shall receive a salary equal to 110% of the schedule stop to which he would be entitled were he a teacher.

F) A teacher with thirty hours beyond a Master's Degree would start on a scale 120% of the base salary with a 3% annual increment for fourteen years.

G) Teachers entering the Lincoln system shall be credited for not more than five years of previous teaching experience, provided those years were gained within the five years previous to employment in this system.

H) Notwithstanding the provisions outlined above, it shall be understood that the School Board shall have authority to refuse to grant automatic raises if in their judgment an increase is not justified on the basis of the teacher's performance. The Board shall be allowed to grant merit raises where in their judgment the conditions warrant. In case an automatic raise is not granted, the teacher may have the right of appeal in person to the Board within thirty days after being notified that such automatic raise has not been granted.

REPORT OF ANNUAL MEETING OF LINCOLN SCHOOL DISTRICT Lincoln, New Hampshire

Lincoln High School Auditoruim March 11, 1958 — Time 10:30 A. M.

The regular annual meeting of the Lincoln School District was called to order at 10:30 A. M., March 11, 1958, by Moderator, James Maguire. A letter from Charles Griffin expressed his deep regret at not being able to be present due to urgent business in Washington. Mr. Maguire then read the warrant, and the following articles were taken up.

1. Mr. Waldo nominated James Maguire for Moderator for the ensuing year. Mr. Levasseur seconded it. Mr. McGee moved the clerk cast one ballot for Mr. Maguire, Mr. Sargent seconded it. Elected.

James MacDonald nominated Mrs. Mary Clark for clerk for the ensuing year. Robert Russell seconded it. George McGee moved Moderator cast one ballot for her. Mr. Bourassa seconded it. Elected.

2. Mr. Henry Waldo moved that the sum of \$910 be paid for salaries of School District Officers, Truant Officer and compensation for any other officers or agents of the District as follows:

Mr. Russell seconded this. Carried in affirmative.

3. Mr. Waldo moved and Mr. MacDonald seconded it that we pass over Article 2. Affirmative vote.

4. An affirmative vote followed a motion by Henry Waldo, seconded by Arthur Asselin, that the State Audit be continued.

5. Henry Waldo moved and Robert Russell seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$118,-200.00 for this article. Much discussion followed this including teachers raises, which Mr. Waldo said that the budget would provide enough money for \$314.00 per teacher, this year, if the money was apportioned in that way by the School Board, discussion of needs for minimum standards and discussion of allotment of \$10,000.00 to the Capital Reserve Fund. George Boyle made a motion to amend the article to read \$115,-250.00, this reduction to be cut from Capital Reserve Fund. Mr. Sargent seconded it. The amendment was voted and the amended article was then voted on in the affirmative.

Mr. McGee made a motion that the School Board investigate entering into an agreement between the towns of Lincoln and North Woodstock relative to the instruction of high school pupils from that town at Lincoln High School, and if no evidence is found that would appear to place Lincoln in an unfavorable position that such a contract be negotiated as expediently as possible. Mr. Russell seconded it and it was passed affirmatively.

6. George Hooker moved that we vote "No" to this article, George Boyle seconded the motion. A "No" vote carried.

7. Article Seven was read from the Warrant. Mr. George McGee then presented the following amendment:

"I move that the motion on the floor be amended to read as follows: That a study committee be appoint-

ed to determine the present need and estimated need in the foreseeable future for expansion of the school plant. Said Committee to report their findings to the voters of the district at the next annual school district meeting or at any special district meeting that may be necessary to call prior to the next annual meeting. The report of said committee to contain evidence of need and any estimate of cost of such construction as may be considered necessary to satisfy the determined requirements. This committee to be composed of eleven members, all legal voters or property owners of the district, five members of which will be appointed by the Moderator. The School Board and the Town Selectmen are to be included in the committee. The sum of \$500.00 is hereby appropriated for use of this committee to obtain technical advice from qualified experts in determining the needs and estimated costs of construction, if construction is found necessary."

The amendment was voted in the affirmative and Article Seven as amended, voted affirmative.

The Moderator appointed the following five members to this Board: Mrs. Martha Patterson, Mrs. Lucille Parker, Mr. George Boyle, Mr. George Hooker, Mr. Ralph Pillsbury.

8. Henry Waldo moved that the School District authorize the School Board to make application for, and receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and or State Agencies. George Boyle seconded. Affirmative vote.

Mr. Bourassa made a motion that the American Flag be displayed properly at all School District meetings. Seconded by George Boyle. Affirmative vote.

Mr. George Boyle made a motion that the Trustees of Trust Funds investigate and make sure that the Trust Funds are insured for full amount in Plymouth Bank. Seconded by Mrs. E. G. Duguay. Carried in the affirmative.

Mr. George Boyle made a motion that at the next budget meeting the School Board present a salary schedule for teachers, this to be a long range schedule. Seconded by Roger Stewart. Affirmative vote.

Mr. Waldo moved that all resolutions, motions, memorials and other District meeting activities be incorporated into the Town Report. Seconded by George McGee. Affirmative vote.

It was moved and seconded that we stand in a rising vote of thanks to Mr. Charles Griffin for his services of six years on the School Board.

Mr. Waldo moved and Mr. McGee seconded it, that the meeting be recessed until 6 P. M. to allow balloting for School Board members. Carried affirmative.

MINIMUM STANDARDS

Report on Visit to Lincoln High School

February 11, 1958

On February 11, 1958, the following staff members of the State Department of Education visited Lincoln High School: Messrs. C. Paul Quimby and Neal D. Andrew.

The purpose of the visit was twofold: first, to clarify what action, if any, is necessary to qualify Lincoln High School as an Approved High School under the Minimum Standards which will go into effect in September, 1958; second, to identify aspects of the school plant and program which are in need of attention if Lincoln is to offer a truly comprehensive high school program.

In addition to the comments included in this report, other recommendations and suggestions were presented verbally to School Board Member Henry Waldo, Superintendent Ronald A. Perham, and Principal Roger D. Stewart. Although these are not detailed here, it is hoped that each will be given careful consideration.

The staff or our department is available to assist in any appropriate manner as steps are taken to implement the ideas presented in this report.

Action Necessary Under Minimum Standards

The present program is inadequate in the following two areas:

a. The total number of courses in the Practical Arts program is now $10\frac{1}{2}$ whereas the Minimum Standards require 12. It is pointed out that all of the present program is in Business Education and Home Economics. A comprehensive high school

should provide Practical Arts courses for boys in an Industrial Arts Shop.

b. There are only two Fine Arts opportunities and the new standards require three. The addition of a Visual Arts course is recommended to fulfill this requirement.

Action Strongly Recommended

1. The present program should be examined to see if it is meeting the needs of the students with particular attention to the following points:

a. A minimum program in English is now being offered. The addition of an elective in Speech, Literature, or Writing is desirable.

b. The Social Studies program should be reviewed with special attention given to the following points:

1) Several Social Studies courses contain similar material. For example, at least three courses now contain units in Economics.

2) It may be desirable to reduce the number of Social Studies courses when an Industrial Arts offering is made available to boys.

3) The ninth grade Civics course should include a section on Youth Problems and Guidance to help fulfill a student need for guidance information.

4) Problems of Democracy should be expanded to include a broader concept of World Problems and might then be justifiably entitled Contemporary Problems..

c. The course in Biology should be examined to see if the present offering provides for the needs of both college preparatory and general students with experimental opportunities for all. d. A senior Science course for general students in Grade 12 is highly recommended. Elements of Physcis, Chemistry, Geology, and Astronomy might be included in this course.

e. The Business Education program should be reviewed with consideration given to the following:

1) General Business should be offered in Grade 9 as a regular exploratory business course for all students who want to elect it. This should not be a Business Mathematics course.

2) Bookkeeping should be offered in Grade 12.

3) Commercial students who do not complete Shorthand should be encouraged to continue their Typing, and a course in Clerical Office Practice should be made available to them in Grade 12.

f. A second year of General Math for non-college students in Grade 12 is desirable.

g. Three years of French offered annually in Grades 10, 11, and 12 is recommended.

h. The Physical Education program for ninth grade boys should be expanded to permit all students in Grades 9-12 to enroll. This should include appropriate Health instruction for boys and girls.

2. A careful study of the existing facilities and instructional equipment should be made with particular emphasis given to the following points:

a. Science equipment in the field of General Science and Biology is very inadequate. A complete inventory of present equipment and plans for a long-range buying program should be made.

b. The science laboratory lacks space and is very inadequate as a Science teaching center. Classes using present facilities should be limited to 12 or 14 students if experiments are to be carried on.

c. Social Studies classes are in need of new reference material, maps, charts, and globes if an adequate program is to be presented.

d. The French and English classes could use a tape recorder to improve present teaching procedures.

e. The Office Practice program needs business machines now commonly used in modern offices. Transcription equipment, calculators and other items may be rented for this program.

f. The Home Economics program is hampered by a shortage of space and equipment. Re-arrangement of present facilities into an all-purpose Homemaking laboratory would be desirable. This would involve the addition of some equipment.

g. The Physical Education facility should be improved to provide for a complete program as recommended above.

3. Certain administrative arrangements should be re-examined with particular consideration given to the following:

a. Alternation of Physics and Chemistry makes it necessary to have two sections of the class being offered. It is recommended that both courses be given every year thereby allowing a more flexible program for the students and the administration. b. The scheduling of General Science and Biology in regular classrooms seriously restricts experimentation. Unless improved facilities are provided the approval of these courses will be questioned.

c. The present assignment of Science to teachers basically trained in other fields is a serious weakness in the program. Responsibility for science should be assigned to one or two Science teachers.

d. The administrative and supervisory activity of the principal is restricted due to his teaching load. This is especially true when the teaching assignment includes a laboratory type Science course.

e. Teacher certification records should be available to the principal to insure that teachers are assigned only those courses for which they are fully qualified.

4. Some services usually available in secondary schools are rather limited:

a. The present library is small and inadequate as a materials center, teaching tool and educational service area. A teacher should have the responsibility for developing the library with funds, materials, space and time available to do so. The secondary school standards of the American Library Association can be used as a guide in providing for an appropriate program.

b. For a school of this size a teacher trained in the Guidance field should be assigned one halftime to guidance to carry on student counseling, set up and operate a comprehensive testing program, develop an occupational file and keep complete and accurate guidance records on each student.

SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 34 REPORT ON SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the prevouis school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 34 during 1957-58 received a salary of \$7,422.00 which was made up as follows: \$4,250.00 paid by the State Department of Education from the per capita tax and \$3,172.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,100.00 for travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Lincoln School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the District. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

Financial Statements

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1957 and June 30, 1958, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Surplus decreased by \$1,398.41 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of change in financial condition of the District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the Budget Summary (Exhibit D), a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$224.57, plus a revenue surplus of \$569.03, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$793.60.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1958, madeup in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1958 is indicated in Exhibit F.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.
