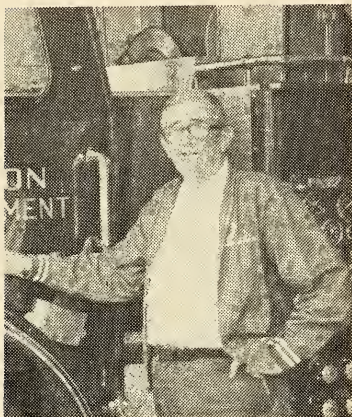

RESULTS OF THE 1978 LITTLETON WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the fourteenth day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M., and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Moderator for two years, and one Supervisor of the Checklist for six years.

— on ballot — election of officers of the town.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, for Town Manager's salary if Article 6 below is adopted, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Fixed Charges, Town Building, Police Department, Whitefield Airport, Civil Defense, Planning Board, Zoning Officer, Board of Adjustment, Damages and Impounding Dogs, Hospital, White Mt. Community Services, North Country Home Health, Senior Wheels Transportation, North Country Council, Health Officer, Fire Department, Forest Fires, Town Garage, Dump, Vital Statistics, Region Association, Sewers, Sidewalks, Streets and Highways, Town Road Aid, Highway Subsidy, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, National Holidays, and other necessary expenses.

— Moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,076,253.21 — this was increased by a motion to increase the town building appropriation by \$10,000.00 and restore capital reserve funds to the capital reserve account. This was duly voted — the sum of \$1,086,253.21 (adopted as amended.)

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1978 and to be paid therefrom.

— Voted yes.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept any State and/or Federal aid and/or funds available at any time relating to disasters or emergencies within the Town, and to expend such funds for repair and relief.

— Voted yes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, until directed to the contrary at a subsequent Town Meeting, to apply, negotiate and do all other things necessary to obtain such Federal, State or other assistance as may be available for the design of, and construction of a sewage disposal system.

— Voted yes.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 37 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended, relating to the Town Manager plan; the following question to be printed on the official ballot, namely: "Do you favor the adoption of the town manager plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated?"

If the foregoing Article is adopted, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to advertise the position at a salary not to exceed Twenty-four Thousand Dollars (\$24,000.00), said appropriation to cover salary and administrative assistants for said manager, and to appoint a Selection Committee of five (5) to interview applicants. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

— This was on ballot — the vote — 621 in favor — 614 opposed. Town Manager

article. Vote on salary of Town Manager (\$24,000.00) made by secret ballot — results: votes — 195 yes — 85 no.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town wishes to exclude from the plan service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the remuneration paid for each service is less than \$50.00.

— Voted yes.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a police cruiser, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Four Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$4,900.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Four Thousand Nine Hundred Dollars (\$4,900.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

— Voted to purchase a police cruiser, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of \$4,900.00, and to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of \$4,900.00 from Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to purchase certain highway equipment for use by the Highway Department, namely heavy duty truck, pick-up and sweeper, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Sixty-eight Thousand Dollars (\$68,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Sixty-eight Thousand Dollars (\$68,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

— Voted to purchase certain highway equipment for use by the Highway Dept. the sum of \$68,000.00 — said sum to come from Revenue Sharing Fund.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) for renovation of the jail cells; and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

— Voted to raise the sum of \$3,500.00 for renovation of the jail cells, said sum to be withdrawn from Revenue Sharing Funds.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Forty-three Thousand and Thirty-four Dollars and Eighty-eight Cents (\$43,034.88) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to defray the cost of lighting the streets of the Town.

— Voted to authorize the Selectmen to withdraw the sum of \$43,034.88 from the Revenue Sharing Fund — to defray the cost of lighting the streets of the Town.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new fire truck, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

— fire truck — it was amended and approved to place \$30,000.00 from Revenue Sharing Funds and placed in escrow until next year.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$4,520.00) toward the operation of the Kindercenter for the year 1978. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

— Motion by Rev. Carlton Schaller, Jr. that this be postponed indefinitely.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) to pay the amount of the installment payable by the Town to New England Power Company pursuant to the Decree of the Grafton Superior Court entered on March 12, 1975 in the tax abatement suits previously brought by said Company against the Town.

— The sum of \$300,000.00 was approved as the annual payment on the Town's installment payable by the Town to New England Power Company, the debt to be retired by 1981.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to direct and empower the Selectmen to waive and/or release the right of first refusal upon the Schoff Lumber Mill property and the appurtenances thereto. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

— Approved, with amendment.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to designate the Pest House Property, situated at the end of Hill Street, containing eleven (11) acres, more or less, and now owned by the Town, as a Town Park, to be held as is until such future time as the best recreational use(s) can be determined, and development funded, by the Town. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

— Tabled.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to change the land use classification on the remaining land belonging to the Littleton Sand and Gravel Company bordering South Street Extension, so-called, from Residential 1 on the northerly side of Interstate 93 and from Residential II on the southerly side of Interstate 93 to Industrial. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

— Approved as a resolution with the understanding that the applicant go through proper channels.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for the purpose of assisting Alpha House, so-called, a place where remedial activities are carried on relative to the health of the bodies and minds of the persons who go there for treatment. (R.S.A. 47:11b). (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

— Sum of \$500.00 was approved for Alpha House.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Expanded Elderly Exemption Law pursuant to the provisions of R.S.A. 72:43-B and 43-C; the following question to be printed on the official ballot, namely: "Shall we adopt the provisions of R.S.A. 72:43-B and 43-C for Expanded Exemptions on Real Estate which provides for a resident 65 years of age up to 75, a \$5,000.00 exemption; a resident 75 years of age up to 80, a \$10,000.00 exemption; a resident 80 years of age or older, a \$20,000.00 exemption. Provided that the resident owns the real estate individually or jointly with another or his spouse with whom he has been living for at least 5 years as man and wife; said resident had a net income of less than \$7,000.00 or combined income with spouse of less than \$9,000.00; and owns assets of any kind, tangible or intangible, less bona fide encumbrances, not in excess of \$50,000.00".

— Elderly Exemption — on ballot — 767 for — 377 against.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution, namely: That the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Littleton; and that said New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to sponsor a project under Section 8 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination thereof; (a) existing standard housing, not to exceed forty (40) units; (b) newly constructed housing not to exceed ten (10) units.

— Voted in favor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to charge and collect a fee in the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each building permit issued by the Zoning Officer, and to apply the proceeds of such fees as a credit to the compensation of the Zoning Officer.

— Voted to charge the sum of \$5.00 for each building permit.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to increase the number of Selectmen from three (3) to five (5), if Article 6 relating to a Town Manager is not adopted.

— passed over.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt an amendment to the existing Town Zoning Ordinance to change Saranac Street from Commercial I to Residential. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

— passed over.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the current National Fire Protection Association's Life Safety Code 101.

— adopted.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 8, "Penalties", of the existing ordinance relating to the licensing and regulation of dogs by providing that any owner found violating any provision of the ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of Two Dollars (\$2.00) for a first offense, Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for a second offense, and Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) for any third and subsequent offense.

— passed — change of wording — to violation instead of misdemeanor.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to administer and sell and convey any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed for such price and upon such terms as the Selectmen may in their discretion determine.

ARTICLE 27. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 28. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the Warrant.

ARTICLE 29. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town and State affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall on the thirteenth day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon (the polls are to open at 8:00 A.M. and may not close prior to 6:00 P.M.; business meeting to be held at the High School Auditorium at 7:00 P.M.), to act upon the following:

ARTICLE 1. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, one Park Commissioner for three years, a Town Treasurer, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, and one Supervisor of the Checklist for six years.

ARTICLE 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Board of Selectmen and approved by the Planning Board for the Town of Littleton Zoning Ordinance as follows: "To amend the Land Use Classification on the remaining land approximately 6.9 acres belonging to the Littleton Sand and Gravel Company bordering South Street Extension, so-called, and the Northerly side of Interstate 93 from Residential 1 to Commercial."

ARTICLE 3. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Board of Selectmen and disapproved by the Planning Board for the Town of Littleton Zoning Ordinance as follows: "To amend the 5 acre minimum requirement in a rural area to 3 acres."

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' Salaries, for Town Manager's Salary, General Expenses, Elections, District Court, Fixed Charges, Town Building, Police Department, Whitefield Airport, Civil Defense, Planning Board, Zoning Officer, Board of Adjustment, Damages and Impounding Dogs, Hospital, White Mt. Mental Health Center, North Country Home Health Agency, Senior Wheels Transportation, North Country Council, Health Officer, Fire Department, Forest Fires, Town Garage, Dump, Vital Statistics, Region Association, Sewers, Sidewalks, Streets and Highways, Town Road Aid, Highway Subsidy, Welfare, Old Age Assistance, Parks and Playgrounds, National Holidays, and other necessary expenses.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the expenditure of the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00), for the purpose of constructing headworks facilities at the Littleton sewage treatment plant, said sum to be raised as follows: Town and State funds \$62,500.00; State to reimburse the Town the sum of \$50,000.00; Federal funds up to \$187,500.00; and to raise and appropriate the Town and State shares by the issuance of Serial Bonds or Notes not to exceed Sixty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$62,500.00), under and in compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act or any other enabling authority, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Littleton, and further, to authorize the Selectmen to file an application for Federal Grant Assistance and to allow the Selectmen to expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government under the Financial Assistance Program of the Construction Grants section of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended (33 U.S.C. § 1251 et seq.) and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) to pay the amount of the installment payable by the Town to New England Power Company pursuant to the Decree of the Grafton Superior Court entered on March 12, 1975 in the tax abatement suits previously brought by said Company against the Town.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a police cruiser, and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new fire truck and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00), and to authorize the expenditure of the Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000.00) placed in escrow by vote under Article 12 at the 1978 Town Meeting; and further, to authorize the withdrawal of Fifty-five Thousand Dollars (\$55,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a 1974 — 75B Michigan loader and raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-one Thousand Dollars (\$41,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Forty-one Thousand Dollars (\$41,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Bombardier SW48FA Sidewalk Tractor with plow and sander and to raise and appropriate for said purpose the sum of Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000.00); and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said sum of Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$17,000.00) for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw the sum of Thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000.00) from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 to defray the cost of lighting the streets of the Town.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Eleven Thousand Two Hundred Eighty-five Dollars (\$11,285.00) for repairs to the Library Building; and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Twenty-four Thousand Dollars (\$24,000.00) for repairs to the Bridge Street bridge; and further, to authorize the withdrawal of said amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, the following sums for the following specific capital improvements: Police Department, radio — \$1,400.00; Fire Department, radios, monitors, protective equipment — \$6,000.00; Public works, truck — \$12,000.00; Repairs to building at Remick Park — \$3,500.00; total — \$22,900.00.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow monies, from time to time, for current indebtedness of the Town for the ensuing year, in anticipation of taxes to be collected for the year 1979 and to be paid therefrom.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, contract for and accept any State and/or Federal aid and/or funds available at any time relating to disasters or emergencies within the Town, and to expend such funds for repair and relief, utilizing appropriate departments.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the previous vote of the 1970 Town Meeting authorizing a seven man Fire Department.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to place the following limits upon the amounts the Town shall pay for installation of septic systems, namely:

Tank — 1,000 gal.	Vee Box
Stone — 40 yards	Labor — 16 manhours
Perforated pipe — 200 ft.	Labor — 4 Backhoe
Solid Pipe — 20 ft.	

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to provide by ordinance provisions for the granting of licenses to itinerant vendors, hawkers and others, as set forth in R.S.A. 31:102-a, to sell or take orders for merchandise from parked motor vehicles, push carts, temporary stands or other stationary temporary outlets at such locations and subject to such conditions, fees and terms as in the opinion of the Board of Selectmen the public convenience and safety demands.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enact the following ordinance that: "Any person plowing, removing or piling snow shall not be allowed to place snow in any manner that will obstruct a driver's view at any street or road intersection in the Town of Littleton, or to cover any hydrant."

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to provide workmen's compensation for eligible employees by participating in the New Hampshire Municipal Association Self-funded Workers Compensation Program, and to authorize the Selectmen to take such action in furtherance of this vote as may be necessary.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution, namely: That the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Littleton; and that said New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to sponsor a project under Section 8 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, for the following dwelling accommodations: newly constructed housing for the elderly, not to exceed forty (40) units.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to require inspection by the Fire Department of new chimney installation and all types of heating unit installation; and before thimble is installed or heating unit is used, including a change of any unit, the owner of the property shall make application for a permit for construction, installation and inspection to include a fee to be set by the Selectmen; the installation shall conform with State of New Hampshire Fire Marshall Standards 89M-211, and the Chief of the Fire Department shall have the right to deny operation of the unit if it is considered unsafe or does not meet State Fire Marshall codes; and the Chief of the Fire Department is authorized to enforce the foregoing by issuing a Cease and Desist Order if necessary.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of An Act amending the charter provisions of the Littleton Water and Light Department enacted by the 1979 General Court.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to retain and maintain its membership and participation in the Twin State Fire Mutual Aid Association. Dues for such membership to be paid from the Fire Department budget. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 26. To amend Article #20 that the New Hampshire Housing Commission be and is authorized to operate in the Town of Littleton; and that said NHHC be and is authorized to sponsor a project under Section 8 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, for any of the following dwelling accommodations or a combination thereof; a) existing standard housing, not to exceed forty (40) units; b) newly constructed housing not to exceed ten (10) units, passed on March 14, 1978, to read . . . (a) existing standard housing, not to exceed eighty (80) units. (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$750.00) for the purpose of assisting Alpha House,

so-called, a place where remedial activities are carried on relative to the health of the bodies and minds of the persons who go there for treatment. (RSA 31:4, XLVIII). (This Article inserted upon written application of voters.)

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to purchase from New England Power Company the existing transmission line known as the 3315 power line extending from the Moore Dam to South Street in the Town of Littleton for Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00); said sum to be paid by the Littleton Water and Light Department at no cost to the Town.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to administer and sell and convey any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed for such price and upon such terms as the Selectmen may in their discretion determine.

ARTICLE 30. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, including the Planning Board, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 31. To choose any other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, and to choose and elect any Agents or Committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under the Warrant.

ARTICLE 32. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.


Gentlemen:

1. Significant Account Policies

Basis of Accounting

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed by all funds, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles applicable to government units. Modifications in this method from the accrual basis are as follows:

- a. Inventory items are recorded as expenditures when purchased.
- b. Revenues are recorded as received in cash except for property taxes and other measurable and available items which are accrued.
- c. Interest expense is recorded as payments are made.

Investments

Investments are stated at cost.

General Fixed Assets

General fixed assets are recorded as expenditures when purchased. No depreciation is provided on general fixed assets.

2. Parking Meter Fund

The resources of the parking meter reserve fund can be expended for the purchase and maintenance of parking meters and for street and high-way related expenses.

3. New England Power Company Settlement

Subsequent to December 31, 1974, a settlement was reached with New England Power Company in their suit against the town for abatement of several years' taxes. The settlement was for \$1,700,000 plus interest at 6% from March 1, 1975, to be paid over six years according to the schedule included in Exhibit E.

4. Pending or Threatened Litigation, Claims and Assessments

There are currently pending three items of litigation as follows:

1. Claim of Gerald Winn vs. The Town of Littleton and its Zoning Board of Adjustment which was heard by Grafton County Superior Court on November 15, 1978, resulting in a verdict for the plaintiff, Mr. Winn, against the Town in the amount of \$3,048.33. This case is currently in the process of being appealed to the New Hampshire Supreme Court.
2. Claim of Kenneth E. Curran, Inc. vs. Town of Littleton pending in Grafton County Superior Court and assigned for jury trial. This claim is in the total amount of \$100,000 and arises out of a contract between the defendant Town and the plaintiff dated November 30, 1971, for the design and construction of sewerage improvements in the Town. The subject matter of this suit is contested.
3. Tax abatement claims for 1977 and 1978 of Dennis Carroll vs. Town of Littleton pending in Grafton County Superior Court. The outcome is undeterminable at this time.

ANNUAL PROPERTY INVENTORY FORM

Chapter 231, Laws of '77, states that any person who fails to file a fully completed inventory form on or before April 15th, unless granted an extension, will be subject to a penalty of 1% of the property tax, (a minimum of \$10.00 and not more than \$50.00). Selectmen shall first send notice of failure to file or failure to file a completed inventory form to the property owner of record as of April 1st, before the penalty can be imposed. The penalty is part of the tax and should be billed with the annual property tax bill.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

This has been a year of smooth transitions. Mrs. Ellen Robbins, Librarian for two years, left in June. Betsy Eaton assumed the position in September, and in the interim, Ellen Morrow and Pat Stillings, Assistant Librarians, kept the books circulating and the budget balanced.

This was also the year for trying some new ideas. Numerable new programs were tried, and with one exception, all received enthusiastic response.

Bill Cox of Northern Lights Music gave a multi-part lecture-discussion series titled "Music Appreciation for People who Hate Music Appreciation". We believe that libraries are a place to get information, but that information does not have to be in books. We thank Bill Cox for providing us this opportunity to offer a new media for information seekers. It is interesting to note here that a similar live program, planned in October, "How to Cut Home Heating Costs", did not receive any response from the community.

Children's Book Week in November was celebrated by a "Big Vote". Young and old were asked to vote for their favorite children's book. 1500 votes were counted. Favorites ranged from **Elsie Dunsmore** and the **Lone Ranger** to **Dr. Seuss. Winnie the Pooh** seemed to be the big favorite.

The Library had a Christmas tree this year donated by William Kittridge. Littleton Senior Citizens agreed to decorate it, and spent weeks making ornaments, plus one afternoon trimming the 12 foot high tree. They titled the tree "An Old-Fashioned Christmas."

After Franconia College closed, the New Hampshire State Library transferred its teletypewriter exchange service machine (TWX) to our Library. We now transmit all our interlibrary loan requests, and those from neighbor libraries, via this machine rather than through the mail. This eliminates paperwork and speeds the procedure of borrowing books from other libraries. 710 books were requested from other libraries to answer needs we were unable to fill from our collection. This number is an increase of 371 books over last year.

Also new is the Reserve Table. Each week five to seven books are featured on a small table by the Circulation Desk. The idea is that everyone gets to see what is new before it goes into circulation. If you want to read a title on the Table, you sign up on a list, and are called when your turn comes.

These few innovations in library service have been refreshing for the staff but more, we hope, they are a service to the community. We appreciate responses, both positive and negative.

Along with the new programs and services, we have continued the tried-and-true. Storyhour for preschoolers continues to be a big favorite with 3-5 year olds. Ellen Morrow entertains from 20-40 children and their mothers, fathers, and babysitters weekly, Thursday at 10:30 a.m. This year's program has included puppets, fingerplays, and magic tricks.

134 children participated in the Summer Reading Program titled "Big

Chief Reading Feather". Each was asked to read 18 books. Films were shown weekly through the 6 week program which culminated in an Indian powwow party complete with Rodney Russell of Sugar Hill in full Indian dress. Thanks to the Strong Nourse American Legion Auxiliary, the Board of Trustees, mothers and friends for the funds and food for this gala affair.

National Library Week created a stir among all age groups. The Second Annual Craft Contest was sponsored by the Library with over 70 items entered and prizes awarded in 13 categories. Children in Grades k-2 were asked to draw pictures of Louie, the Leprechaun, the Library's behind the scenes reporter and general snoop. Children in Grades 3-6 submitted essays on imaginary trips to a place beginning with the first letter of their name; 22 prizes were awarded.

Continuing the tradition of monthly art exhibits, Andii Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Millicent Clark, Joanne Webster of Twin Mountain, Miss Erin Godbout, David Labonte and his two students, Mrs. Jean Miller and Mrs. Louise Gurney, and Louise Tabbut all hung their art in our mini stairway gallery. Mrs. Aldrich's kindergarten class also exhibited their art at the Library.

The Annual Library Book Sale was held in August. Proceeds were impressive — about \$700.00. We thank those who gave the books, and those who gave their time and efforts.

Family and friends of Polly Tuck continued to give books in her memory. Books were also given in memory of Sylvia Smith, Bea Tunney, Bertrand and Beatrice Perry, Dora Burgess, Malcolm Bissett, Virginia Anderson, Katherine Camann, Barbara Jean Eastman and Elmer Sawtell.

The Littleton Savings Bank, Friday Club, and White Mountain Garden Club each gave money which was used for books and services. The Village Book Store generously has given the Library a book each month. The Littleton Garden Club once again gave Christmas wreaths for the Library doors.

Pat Stillings and Ellen Morrow deserve a gold medal, not only for the double duty they did during the summer, but for the loyal and enthusiastic service they give to library patrons daily. We thank Barbara Melnick, Kathy Colony, and Sally Haskell for all they have done to maintain sanity at the Circulation Desk. We thank Sandra Fillion, our summer helper, who made the Summer Reading Program a success. And we thank Tom Tuck, the janitor, for keeping an eye on the building, including the temperamental furnace. All this would not be but for the Library Board of Trustees who meet monthly to deliberate about library policy, repairs, and finance. Thank you all.

LITTLETON DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND HIGHWAYS

STREETS AND HIGHWAYS

From January through March the majority of our time was used for Winter maintenance, plowing, sanding, salting and picking up snow. We also cut brush along the roadsides and hauled cover to the dump.

With the arrival of Spring, we had running water to take care of in the compact area and also the outside roads, keeping it in the catch basins and culverts. During Spring, Summer and Fall we cleaned ditches, rebuilt Highland Avenue from Grove Street to Beacon. This project required removing the storm water from the sewer line and installing 900' of storm drain, rebuilding catch basins, excavating and hauling in gravel and hot topping.

Replaced 140' of crushed storm drain line on Oak Hill Avenue; we rebuilt Riverside Drive onto South Street to make it safer for traffic, as the large trucks going to the salt shed, freezer plant and Schoff Lumber are using this route instead of the Bridge Street Bridge.

The storm in June caused a lot of damage to our roads, especially Fowler Hill, Brook Road, backside of Mt. Eustis, Walker Hill, Hicks Road, Lake Road and Gannon Road. The worst were Broomstick Hill, Fox Ridge and the Brickyard Road. We had to replace culverts, haul in fill and gravel. We had Clinton Clough's dozer helping on Broomstick Hill and Ron Marvin's helping on the backside of Walker Hill. Mr. Marvin also did some work in Palmer Brook for the Town as the flood did a lot of damage along the banks of the brook.

We made about 600 yds blade mix at the Treatment Plant which was used on Slate Ledge, Fowler Hill and Mann's Hill roads. Several catch basins were rebuilt, cold patching was done, sweeper was out and we continued the hot top program. Streets done were Richmond, Ely, Myron, Auburn from West Main to the McCormick residence, Riverside Drive and Owen Street.

Last Spring we hauled about 900 yds of sand from Curran's pit to the Treatment Plant for oiling and blade mix. We hauled 4600 yds of sand to the Town Garage stock pile for Winter sanding.

SIDEWALKS

We installed a new retaining wall on Ely Street and repaved the sidewalk. We installed two new walks at the Elementary School to accommodate the new addition. On Main Street we repaved the sidewalk from Meadow to Brook Street. The foot bridge from Saranac to Riverside Drive was repaired, new stringers and flooring replaced.

SEWERS

We installed 316 ft. of 8" sewer line on the Whitefield Road, extended the line on Mann's Hill 200 ft. with 8" pipe. On Keeler Road the line was extended 200 ft. with 6" pipe. We are also working on 27 septic systems — 18 new and 9 repair.

DUMP

4400 yds of cover was hauled from the Mt. Eustis pit in addition to what was hauled in from sweeping and ditch work.

LITTLETON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

In 1978 we added another E.M.T. (Emergency Medical Technician) to our Rescue Squad. This makes a total of seven qualified E.M.T.'s in the Fire Department. Also a Hurst Tool, known as, The Jaws of Life, was obtained through Federal Funding to aid in auto extrication or any emergency where its assistance can be used. This tool is stationed at our headquarters and is meant for use in town and surrounding towns in our area for emergencies. All regular men are qualified to operate this tool which can be transported easily to any emergency situation — a very valuable life saving piece of equipment.

All regular and call men in the department have successfully completed an eight hour defensive driving course. This course was put on through the Safety Division of the State with a State instructor.

The 4" hose which arrived last winter was put into good use this year. A number of drills in town and out of town were set up and practiced, with the new hose and adapters received. The main objective of the 4" hose is to supply a main feed line from a water source to a pumper at the scene of the fire. This hose moves a large quantity of water with a small amount of friction loss which makes it so valuable in the fire service.

These last few months have been spent speaking to different fire equipment companys about information on a new pumper. Many slides have been viewed on different trucks, their sizes, pumps and the construction. Much thought and consideration has gone into this project. We feel that a medium size attack pumper would be perfect for our needs. This pumper would have a 750 g.p.m. mid-ship pump and the water tank will be at least 500 gals. possibly more depending on which chassis we get and the height of the front doors. With more and more housing developments going up on the outskirts of town, this type of attack pumper will give us quicker response time, easier handling, and plenty of pumping and water capacity. Another important factor and especially in today's economy is the cost. We are also taxpayers in this town and with this type of pumper we are talking a savings of \$20,000 to \$30,000 as opposed to the larger truck mentioned last year. Inflation has also hit the fire service and with this type of pumper, which we feel is better suited for the town's needs anyway, we can stay in the proposed \$60,000 of last year.

In closing, we urge all to use extra caution and fire safety in these winter months ahead and hopefully have a cheerful spring and fire safe summer. Help us, help you, prevent fires.

THE LITTLETON HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION

1978 was an exciting year of accomplishments and challenges for the Littleton Hospital as it continued to provide the highest quality health care services to the residents of Littleton and the other towns in its service area. There was substantial growth in the quantity of service rendered by every ancillary department. Both inpatient admissions and out-patient visits increased greatly. (See chart next page).

This summer the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals reviewed the hospital's progress. In recognition of the diligent efforts of the hospital employees and medical staff to deliver optimal medical care, this commission awarded us full accreditation for two years.

The Department of Health, Education and Welfare approved our proposal for renovation and construction of the hospital in order to meet current stringent life safety codes and to provide improved patient accommodations and therapy, expanded laboratories, and more efficient supply and administrative support facilities.

Financing for this major undertaking has been accomplished through the sale of public taxable bonds and a community based public subscription campaign. The outstanding success of this New Horizons Campaign is a monument to each member of this community whose contribution of effort and money testifies to their recognition of the value of this medical facility. Individuals, clubs, organizations, corporations and members of the hospital community have pledged more than \$512,000.

Construction is on schedule and we look forward to begin to occupy the new construction in May. Renovation of the 1932 and 1906 portions will then begin. Completion of the entire project is set for January of next year.

Littleton Hospital began to provide nuclear medical services to this area in December. The capability of our new Gamma Camera provides increased diagnostic capabilities to the medical staff while lessening the danger and expense to their patients.

To meet the current and future laboratory workload, a full time pathologist joined the hospital staff. Addition of this full time specialist enhances the hospital's ability to serve the needs of the members of our medical staff.

Through the initiative and diligent effort of members of our medical staff, the capabilities of an electroencephalograph has been added to their available services.

The Cardiology Department now serves the needs of several neighboring hospitals and also began a Cardiac Rehabilitation Program which is a model for other community hospitals.

These are among the many other actions and activities which have been undertaken to maintain Littleton Hospital's reputation for providing optimal medical care. Provision of this care continues to cost the patient more money each year. Fortunately for those served by Littleton Hospital this rise in cost is substantially lower than in other hospitals across the nation. While nationwide average increases were 15%, here the increase

was 7.3%. The Board of Trustees has adopted a firm stance on making every reasonable effort to minimize costs without sacrificing quality of services rendered. The hospital budget process provides the means for administrator, physician and trustee to share the responsibility to plan, organize, implement and evaluate efforts aimed at cost reductions without quality loss.

During the past year specific services rendered to residents of Littleton included:

- 850 in-patient admissions.
- 4,384 out-patient visits.
- provision of \$57,000 worth of free medical care.
- infusion of \$1.2 million in wages paid to 127 town residents employed at the hospital.

MENTAL HEALTH CENTER
Executive Director's Report**

Enclosed in this report are facts and figures which reflect the activities of White Mountain Mental Health Center during the past year. Our request for town support is based primarily on our goal of maintaining service delivery at this level for the coming year.

A. Clinical Activity:

1) Enrolled 325 clients (260 of which, or 80% were new referrals). A total of 658 clients were counselled during the year in 4,636 sessions.

2) Held numerous consultation sessions with other professional persons and volunteers (doctors, nurses, social workers, attorneys, etc.) and organizations concerning those individuals they were attempting to serve.

3) Held educational and community planning sessions with and for interested professional lay persons in the region served by the agency.

B. Services Rendered:

1) A 24-hour seven-day a week on-call emergency service for problems that need immediate attention. A WMMHC professional staff member is on call at all times.

2) A partial hospitalization program to provide more extensive care for those individuals for whom individual therapy is not sufficient.

3) Outpatient counselling to area residents — the major activity of the clinic. The services offered include individual counselling, group therapy, family therapy, marital counselling and play therapy (for children). The services are provided in Littleton and in three satellites located in the Cottage Hospital in Woodsville, in the Lin-Wood Medical Center in Lincoln and at Weeks Memorial Hospital in Lancaster.

4) Intensive diagnostic and inpatient care in our local hospitals for those individuals experiencing an emotional problem.

5) Psychotropic medication. In certain cases medication is used as an adjunct to other forms of therapy listed above.

6) Pre-admission screening and aftercare services for patients entering and leaving the New Hampshire Hospital in Concord.

7) Social, psychological, and psychiatric evaluation and/or testing for schools, Courts, and State vocational/rehabilitation services.

8) Psychiatric consultation to physicians and to hospital staffs serving patients hospitalized in our local general hospital; mental health consultation to the District Court, school system, police, Head Start, public nurses and the Welfare Department.

9) An on-going inservice program for community and school nursing personnel.

10) Sponsorship of T.E.M.P.O. Inc., a sheltered workshop for developmentally disabled persons between the ages of 15 and 65 and now serving 27 individuals. This program provides job skills training through contracts obtained from local business and industry. This program has re-

cently expanded to a new facility on Main Street in Littleton (the old Saranac factory) and now offers a comprehensive program of skills training to individuals with various needs and levels of skill.

11) Specialized clinical services for the elderly so as to strengthen our support to this population over 65.

12) Expanded clinical programming for post-New Hampshire Hospital patients with the help of a State Hospital employee as well as an experienced para-professional so as to deliver more consistent aftercare services.

13) Participation with other local people to maintain an acceptable halfway house facility as an alternative to inpatient hospitalization.

14) Participation with PADA (Program on Alcohol and Drug Abuse) to maintain joint programs so as to strengthen services to alcoholics.

White Mountain Mental Health Center is approved as a comprehensive mental health center by the New Hampshire Department of Mental Health and is affiliated with the following state and national organizations: New Hampshire Association of Community Mental Health Clinics, Northern New Hampshire Mental Health Center, New Hampshire Health and Welfare Council, the Association of Mental Health Administrators, and the American Management Association.

This non-profit agency is governed by a 40-person Board of Directors of local citizens. Elections are held each year at the time of the agency's annual meeting (May). All money voted or contributed to White Mountain Mental Health Center is used to support local needs. This agency serves 22 towns totally, a resident population of 25,775.

The Ice Hockey Programs at Remick Park were very successful as always. Jim Baker and his tireless staff of volunteers devoted many hours to our local youth, teaching them the finer points of ice hockey. If Ice Hockey becomes a varsity sport at Littleton High School sometime in the future, our youth will be well prepared to represent our Town on an interscholastic level.

Our appreciation to Darrell Champagne and his staff for keeping our facilities in good condition and for the great natural ice that is made at our skating rink.

The Park Commissioners wish to thank the people of our Town for supporting our programs and our budget. Our children should be very thankful to all who understand the need for recreation in Littleton. We look ahead to the future to improve on the fine programs we have started — and to another good year.

LITTLETON POLICE DEPARTMENT

The Littleton Police Department made 1058 arrests during 1978. Motor vehicle arrests totaled 772, Criminal arrests 239 and juvenile cases 47. The department investigated 273 reported offenses which included 108 thefts with 41 cleared, 48 Criminal Mischief with 32 cleared and 22 burglaries with 5 cleared.

Speeding offenses were again the most common motor vehicle violation with 532 summons issued, followed by 55 DWI cases. There were 92 Breathalyzer tests run on the Littleton equipment of which 13 were under the prima facie limit of 0.10%; 21 were between 0.10% and 0.15%; 39 between 0.16% and 0.19% and 19 were over 0.20%.

The department investigated 270 accidents which resulted in one fatality and five persons injured. There were three bicycle accidents and two pedestrian accidents, resulting in five injuries.

Crimes against property offenses ended in 71 arrests, disorderly conduct related offenses totaled 43 and crimes against the person 19. Of juvenile offenses thefts, Criminal Mischief and drug violations were the most numerous. Theft type crimes resulted in a loss of \$55,374.00 of which \$40,707.00 was recovered. 67 bad check cases were investigated and resulted in 59 being cleared.

The renovations of the Littleton Jail are incomplete, but security and fire safety goals have been accomplished. Some sanitary work is incomplete.

Training goals for 1978 were achieved with the exception of Clerk/Dispatcher courses which were oversubscribed. Officer Brian Beard graduated from the Basic Recruit Academy with highest academic honors and was 3rd in the firearms training program. All Littleton Police Officers completed a Defensive Driving Course conducted by the N.H. Safety Council. Scheduling of 1979 Training Programs is being hampered by man-power limitations brought about by proposed budget cutbacks. The hiring freeze in effect at this time will seriously jeopardize all phases of police services and to some extent, police training.

Throughout the year efforts have continued to relocate the public foot-path right-of-way to the Kilburn Crags. Agreements, permits and legal work must be cleared before this is finalized.

This Commission organized the cooperative efforts of The Littleton Garden Club and ourselves to plant two trees along Main Street. The Garden Club purchased the tree on the property of Butson's Market, and we paid the cost of the stump removal there and for the planting of another tree on the property of The People's National Bank.

Many hours have been spent in research on a working recycling program for this town. It is very complex and this effort will continue.

Several Dredge & Fill applications were acted upon after viewing the sites, one resulting in a public hearing in Concord.

Miss Gwen Letson attended the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests Youth Conservation Camp at Interlocken, N.H. this past summer with a partial scholarship from our fundings. Gwen gave us an interesting report with pictures she had taken there.

Miss Chris Stearns was employed part-time by the Commission to continue maintenance work and litter pickup at the Dells this past summer.

My sincere thanks to all the Commissioners for their hard work and interest and to Carl Schaller and the members of All Saints' Church who have permitted us to use their Parish House as a meeting place for our Littleton Conservation Commission these past several years.

NORTH COUNTRY HOME HEALTH AGENCY

North Country Home Health Agency, from its main office at 60 High St., Littleton, and satellite offices in Cottage Hospital and Lin-Wood Medical Center, provides health care services aimed at both prevention and treatment of disease. The Agency serves residents of 15 towns in the North Country.

In 1978, the following services were delivered:

6173 Skilled Nursing Care visits to patients in their homes. These are for the chronically ill, care following hospitalization or acute care in lieu of hospitalization.

507 Health Promotion visits for the assessment and evaluation of a person's needs and/or problems.

160 Visits to Newborns and their mothers for assistance and reassurance. No charge is made for either health promotions or newborn visits.

200 Physical Therapy visits to homebound patients.

22 Speech Therapy Visits to homebound patients. This is a new service added in November.

8130 Homemaker/Home Health Aide visits for assistance with personal care, light housekeeping and meal preparation, and other health-related services which enable people to remain in their own homes.

Public Health activities, aimed at prevention:

A total of 29 clinics for children were held throughout the area, as well as 4 adult health screening clinics co-sponsored with Lions Clubs. Follow-ups as needed were made on problems discovered in the clinic settings. 739 children received services ranging from immunizations to orthopedic evaluations. 501 adults attended the health screening clinics in four towns. Clinics are available to all residents without charge.

This Agency is approved by Medicare and the New Hampshire Department of Public Health as a certified provider of home care services. The Board of Directors is composed of volunteer members representing the towns served. It is a non-profit agency.

Services Received by Littleton Residents:

1889 Skilled Nursing Visits; 72 Physical Therapy Visits; 22 Speech Therapy Visits; 3062 Homemaker Home Health Aide hours; 107 Health promotion visits; and 35 visits to newborns and mothers. A total of 324 children were served by Littleton based clinics, and 210 adults attended the adult health screening clinic in Littleton.

CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

After many years of service, Bill Houle retired as Civil Defense Director for the Town of Littleton. I was appointed to fill the vacancy in October, 1978. In November, I submitted a Town Plan to the State Civil Defense Office for the 1979 calendar year; these program papers were accepted by the State Office on December 7, 1978.

During the month of December, I visited all the shelters in Littleton to acquaint myself with the supplies — most of which I found outdated. The medical supplies which can be salvaged will be moved to Ross Ambulance Service for use in a disaster. I have obtained State approval to seek possible buyers to replenish the unusable supplies.

All riot control pistols and shotguns have been collected and placed in the hands of the Littleton Police Department.

In late December, a 2250 watt generator was purchased and will be placed on the Littleton Fire Department aerial ladder; it will also be available for emergency use at the discretion of the Fire Chief or Civil Defense Director.

At this time I am updating the Disaster Plan for the Town and working with Town officials to accomplish a coordinated effort.

These new members filled vacancies created by the resignations of our past Chairman John Pilgrim and our Secretary Bettina Hummel. Sincere thanks are extended to John and Tina for their leadership on the Board and their service to the Town. Subsequently, Brien Ward was elected Chairman and Milton Bratz, Secretary.

The Planning Board approved thirty subdivisions during the year. The feedback we received from working on those subdivisions has clearly indicated to the Board that the previous Planning Boards developed a Zoning Ordinance that is responsive to both the individual and the best interest of the town. The community is accepting the planning process and it is working for all concerned.

In the spirit of "Tax Dollar Frugality" the Planning Board decided to implement a fee for the approval of subdivisions. This fee will be used to cover the Board expenses rather than relying on the property tax dollar as has been the practice in the past.

The Board meets the first Wednesday of every month at 7:30 p.m. in the Town Building. We urge all citizens who are contemplating a subdivision to come in and discuss it with us on an informal basis before having plans made. If you do this, it will possibly save you time and money in the future.

As we look back over 1978, we realize there have been many accomplishments for the Littleton Area Historical Society. Our membership continues at about 200, 122 of whom live in Littleton, the remainder being area neighbors and those who still have roots in our community from previous school days or happy associations as past and present part-time residents. Membership dues are our major source of income and the slight increase voted this year will be very helpful in meeting our expenses. We have celebrated the first anniversary of the Museum in the Littleton Public Library and are sharing a close and cooperative relationship with the Library Board of Trustees and Staff. With limited space and a growing Museum collection, we continue to use the third floor room at the Community House for storage and are most appreciative of the Littleton Community Center for making this possible. The Officers of the Society have given freely of their time in the development of our program and many of the members have participated as hosts and hostesses at the monthly meetings and served as volunteers in carrying out the schedule of the Museum. Monthly Executive Board meetings have proven helpful in planning for the Society's program. Members of the community have given or loaned local historical data and memorabilia to the Museum; requests for information or help and guidance in historical research have increased. The variety and quality of our programs have been outstanding, have involved a number of local participants and been well attended. We are grateful to the Business Education Department of Littleton High School for printing our program at a most reasonable cost.

1978 held a number of "firsts" for the Society — among them; the inclusion of the Littleton Area Historical Society in the Annual Report of the Town of Littleton; the opportunity to have a die made of the Littleton Bicentennial seal for the use of the Society; the addition of an outdoor sign to identify the location of the Museum; the initiation of a "Museum Log" column in the Courier (now in need of an editor to be continued!); and participation in the Community Day sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

Sale of the Paul R. Clay book, "Picturesque and Progressive Littleton

and the White Mountains” continues. Mrs. Thelma Santy, Town Clerk, and The Village Bookstore have been most helpful in promoting its sale. We are grateful to the Littleton Bicentennial Committee for making available a number of Mildred C. Lakeway’s book, “Historical Glimpses of a North Country Community” to sell for the benefit of the Society. We recommend that the Littleton School Department incorporate these books into their study of Littleton history.

Interest in House Plaque Dates continues but there is great need for volunteers to research data in the town and county records.

The future holds much challenge. Hopefully, we shall become increasingly involved as a Society in historical research and study. **Littleton’s Town History**, published in 1905, needs updating and our Historical Society should be working to further such plans. There continues to be a vital need for **PARTICIPATING** membership — to serve in program leadership and as volunteers in maintaining and furthering the work of the Society. We have done a lot and we have a lot more to do in service to our community.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

In Littleton, North Country Council provided information to the Town's Engineer on the downtown improvement and traffic program. Provided follow-through activities on the EDA "304" Application to supplement a previous Title I grant for the Littleton Industrial Park Project. Submitted a request for EDA funds to undertake necessary engineering work for improvements to the Town's Industrial Park access road. Met with the Planning Board on general planning matters.

The North Country Council continued to make substantial progress in 1978 by providing services in the following areas:

Planning Services: Providing local technical assistance to member communities continued to consume a good amount of Council time. Areas of assistance include: master planning, subdivision regulations, zoning, reviewing development proposals, mobile homes, grantsmanship, etc. Through a grant from the Farmers Home Administration, NCC will have the service of a project planner and planning engineer to further assist communities in water supply, solid waste and review of development proposals.

Economic Development: NCC updated its Overall Economic Development Program, a requirement which entitles the North Country to EDA grants and loans. The Council also completed a Wood Energy Study and a Downtown Improvement Program for 1 town. Through the resources of the University of New Hampshire, a business counseling program is being developed. Federal and state agencies use the Council's work as a guide for future public investments.

Preparation of Regional Plans: In 1978, the Council adopted and published both the Land Use Element and the Housing Element. Both of these documents provide a broad framework for action in these two areas. In the area of solid waste, the Council has coordinated a number of meetings with the NH Air Pollution Control Commission, Division of Public Health and sponsored a meeting on solid waste disposal in January 1979. The Council has continued to make progress in the Public Transportation Program. NCC also coordinated with the NH Department of Public Works and Highways in the annual meeting to receive local input on needed highway improvements. Much of the Council's time is spent responding to requests from Selectmen on various planning matters. Fact sheets have been prepared on soils and community planning, wetlands, and master planning. Other educational documents will be prepared in 1979.

North Country Perspective: NCC continues to respond to opportunities to provide a North Country perspective to federal and state policies. NCC represented the area in a 3-day workshop as part of the Farmers Home Administration's national assessment of rural community facilities. Council members represent the North Country on the State's "208" Water Quality Program, solid waste program and other areas. The Council testified before the NH House subcommittee on Growth.

Education and Information: For the third consecutive year, the North

Country Council co-sponsored the six municipal law lectures. A special workshop was held on the development of small hydro sites. NCC also sponsored a North Country meeting of bankers, real estate agents, local officials, and other development interests to inform them of the opportunities under the NH Housing Finance Agency's mortgage program. With the advent of **Planning Profiles**, the Council's monthly newsletter, NCC is making an effort to keep local officials and interested persons up-to-date on Council programs and other related planning activities. In a further effort to solicit local input on planning projects, the Council has been holding a series of subregional meetings around the North Country.

In 1979, the Council expects to provide more services to local officials to help them carry out the goals of their own towns. The newly-funded Area Development Assistance Program will provide greater assistance to communities. NCC will be working on an energy program to determine the practicality of developing indigenous energy resources. Requests for community planning services will increase.

Membership in the Council over the last five years has increased from five members in 1973 to forty active members in 1978. A good deal of service has been provided in that period and it is hoped that more can be provided in the years ahead. Ideas of how the Council can be of greater assistance to towns are welcomed. The Board of Directors and all the members of the North Country Council greatly appreciate the support received from the towns. This support has enabled the Council to provide its planning services for the region and local communities.





- 3) The Littleton Water and Light Department maintains a card system for inventory control. During 1978 the department removed from inventory small dollar items which were consumable supplies by nature. They also removed items which were considered obsolete to the department's use. The cost of items removed are reflected in materials used in the amounts of \$16,710 and \$17,334 for the Electric and Water Department's respectively.
