## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nelson in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Nelson on Tuesday, the 11th day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of Calcium Chloride, or take any action relating thereto.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to repair highways and bridges or take any action thereto.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to close certain sections of road, no longer used, subject to gates and bars, or take any action relating thereto.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to pay off a note which was borrowed, some years ago, from the Trust Fund, or take any action relating thereto.
- 7. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to appoint one or more highway agents instead of having such agent or agents elected by ballot at annual town meetings or take any other action thereon.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair the road from the Munsonville church past the store and mill pond to route 9, or take any action relating thereto.

- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair fences at several dangerous points along the highway, or take any action relating thereto.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen the right to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to repair the town barn or take any action relating thereto.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150 for water holes or take any action relating thereto.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase and repair fire fighting equipment, or take any action relating thereto.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to have a telephone installed in the town barn, or take any action relating thereto.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of \$300 to erect and equip an office for town officials, or take any action relating thereto.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.
- 17. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Memorial Day.
- 18. To see what sum of money the town will raise to support the Library.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Civil Defense, or take any action relating thereto.
- 21. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purchase of a road grader, or take any action relating thereto.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$362.03, the State will contribute \$2,413.56, for Class IV and Class V Construction, Reconstruction or Betterment Aid.
- 23. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to make a suitable entrance from the old cemetery, to the new extension given to the town by Henry Melville Fuller, or take any action relating thereto.

- 24. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$50.00 for the support of the Monadnock Region, or take any action relating thereto.
- 25. To see if the town will vote to reserve the town hall for the Nelson Picnic Association for both the day and evening of Old Home Day each year, or take any action relating thereto.
- 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.
- 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for repairs on the Library.
- 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money with which to purchase a truck or take any action relating thereto.
- 29. To see if the town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to the employees of the town, the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 to defray the town's share of the cost thereof.
- 30. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire, to carry into effect the plan and to see if the town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 31. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Board of Selectmen Nelson, New Hampshire Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an audit and examination of the accounts of the Town of Nelson which was made by this Division, acting under authority of Chapter 82, Section 27, of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, which provides in part as follows:

"Audit on Motion of Commission. The commission may cause an audit to be made of the accounts of any city, town, school district, village district or precinct, as often as once in two years, or whenever conditions appear to it to warrant such."

This audit covered the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, and the period from January 1st to October 15, 1951. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report which is made up in three sections as follows:

Section I—Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1950.

Section II-Period January 1st to October 15th, 1951.

Section III—Statistical Table—Ten Year Statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes.

### SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Road Agent.

### FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1949-December 31, 1950: (Exhibit A.) Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1949 and December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt increased by \$4,394.32 during the year 1950.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:
(Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$6,107.67, less a net revenue surplus of \$470.34, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$5,637.33.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures:

(Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1950, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of October 15, 1951, is indicated in Exhibit K.

### AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes:

Table I presents a ten year statement of Indebtedness, Valuation and Taxes. It will be noted that during the period from January 31, 1941 to December 31, 1950, the Net Debt increased from \$4,371.92 to \$10,622.01.

During the same period the assessed valuation increased by approximately \$135,000.00 and the amount of the annual tax levy more than doubled,—going from \$11,364.64 to \$23,758.19. The local tax rate increased from \$3.00 to \$4.66 per hundred as compared to an increase in the average rate for the state during this period from \$3.41 to \$4.31.

Current Deficit:

The balance sheet as of December 31, 1950, (Exhibit A) indicates a current deficit of \$4,345.34, as shown herewith:

In explanation of the term "current liabilities", it may be stated that these consisted of "accounts payable," "unexpended balances of the school district and other special appropriations" and "outstanding temporary loans."

To remain in sound financial condition, a town should at all times have sufficient "assets" to meet its "current liabilities." The "current deficit" of 1950 was caused by the budget deficit which resulted from appropriation overdrafts.

Town Balance Sheet-1950:

It is noted that the town balance sheet of December 31, 1950, which was included in the annual financial report filed with this office and which appeared in the annual printed report, indicated a Net Debt of \$1,717.68 as compared to the actual Net Debt on December 31, 1950, of \$10,622.01, as shown by Exhibit  $\Lambda$ . Most of this difference was due to the omission of temporary loans outstanding which amounted to \$9,000.00.

Selectmen's Record of Receipts and Expenditures:

It is recommended that the accumulated totals of the several classification columns be carried forward from page to page in the Selectmen's Record of Receipts and Expenditures. If this procedure is followed, the relation of expenditures to appropriations may be determined at any time throughout the year.

Town Clerk:

The Town Clerk should make monthly remittances to the Treasurer of funds received from the issuance of motor vehicle permits as required by Chapter 116, Section 22 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire. It was noted that during 1950 only three remittances were made on this account, as follows:

It was also noted that the number of dog licenses issued in 1950 was 39, amounting to \$95.00. In 1951, up to October 15th, only 16 licenses, amounting to \$35.00 had been issued. While it is not the duty of the Town Clerk to go out and collect dog licenses, the law provides certain remedies to enforce their payment.

### Road Agent:

It is recommended that the Road Agent obtain the signatures of all employees on each payroll and that the signed payrolls be returned to the Selectmen to be filed with the proper youchers.

### Conclusion:

With exceptions as herein indicated, the accounts and records of the town officials which we audited were found to be in good order.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the inclusion of Exhibits is optional.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Nelson for their assistance during the course of the audit.

### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT

The school year 1950-1951 saw some changes in the school system and in the school building at Munsonville. The school-house was repainted inside and the floors were sanded and sealed. Shelves were provided for dishes and food. An electric hot-plate, dishes and silverwear was purchased and Mrs. Hastings operated a very satisfactory hot lunch program during the winter. A very important improvement was that of a new sink, drinking fountain and running water. The school grounds were rough graded and playground equipment was installed.

Due to the heavy teaching load and numerous classes, the 8th grade was sent to The Wells Memorial School after a meeting with their parents. Notices for transportation bids were posted for transportation to Keene and for elementary routes. Two bids were submitted on a three year basis, Mr. Winston French was low bidder by \$205 per year for the three year period, plus the agreement to purchase a new bus.

Pupils who attend Keene High School from the district have been doing good work, with only two subjects being failed in the entire group. Attendance has been very satisfactory.

The future organization of the school depends upon whether a teacher for a one-room school can continue to be obtained, since teachers are no longer trained for this work; or whether some grades go to The Wells School. Another solution might be the conversion of the Munsonville building into a two room school. As long as a capable teacher like Mrs. Hastings can be employed, good work can be obtained from the pupils. All solutions should be studied however, for the future.

#### REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

I herein submit my report concerning the elementary music program in the school. The aim of the music program is to develop a love and appreciation of good music and the desire to participate spontaneously in group work, both vocal and instrumental. A comprehensive course is given, starting with rote singing in the first grade and covering the prescribed fundamentals in each grade through the eighth. An opportunity is given for each pupil to play in a rhythm band in the lower grades and in a tonette band in the intermediate grades. Folk dancing also is part of the music program as well as is music appreciation.

During the year programs were presented at Christmas and on Memorial Day which were largely attended and which the children enjoyed preparing. The tonette band was a featured part of these programs.

The pupils are enthusiastic and appreciative of all phases of the music program. I find the record library available in the Union office, to be of real benefit to the pupils of the schools.
