TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Durham in the County of Strafford, in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said New Durham on Tuesday, the ninth (9th) day of March, next at twelve of the clock, to act up the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

And you are hereby further notified to meet at said Town Hall in said New Durham at seven o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 2. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to pay current expenses in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 3. To see if the town will vote to maintain Valley Road and Cross Road only as summer roads until changed by vote of the town.
- Article 4. To see if the town will vote to close any road or roads going from Caskin's house and/or Wyatt's house on or around Durgin Mountain.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to maintain the road from Wyatt's house to Caskin's house only as a summer road.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to pay State Rates to the Highway Personnel provided an increase is granted State Employees.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to purchase Jaws for Stone Crusher. (Recommended by Road Agent.)

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to allow the children free use of the Town Hall under direct supervision of the "200 Club" at discretion of Selectmen. (Recommended by "200 Club".)

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to allow the Selectmen to sell the old dump on Merrymeeting Road when it is abandoned.

Article 10. To discuss the Zoning Laws as proposed by the Planning Board appointed at the 1964 Special Town Meeting.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as are necessary to defray the expenses of town government for the ensuing year in accordance with the recommendations of the budget committee.

Article 12. To hear reports of any standing Committees.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.



CIVIL DEFENSE REPORT

Early this year, Robert W. Berry accepted the position of Assistant Civil Defense Director. This completes the requirement that we have two persons listed on our Manning Table, other than the director, to take charge in case either of the other two are not available.

Radiological Monitoring equipment arrived late this summer. It has been placed at the Powder Mill Hatchery and the New Durham Fire Station. Periodical checks are made to assure that the batteries are fully charged.

The State Radio Officer assisted by local volunteers installed a new antenna system at the Town Hall this fall. This is expected to improve radio communications between here and the County headquarters in Dover. We participate in the radio check with Dover every Tuesday evening on the R.A.C.E.S. net.

When a broken power line caused power failure all over town for several hours this fall, our emergency generator was used to furnish power for the fire station.

At present we do not have information that any nearby communities have started the Medical Self-Help course. If any do, it will be published in local news columns, so that any one wishing to take the course may attend.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES' REPORT

The trustees are pleased with the functioning of the Library this past year. Dorothy LaPointe, our Librarian, has been a faithful and dedicated worker, and besides opening the Library on its regular day, has opened it many times to help students who need books in mid-week. The number of readers has almost doubled in the past year.

The N. H. State Library Bookmobile has called four times, leaving books for all ages and interests. Its staff has been very helpful.

During the spring we cleaned out many out-dated magazines, papers and advertising booklets. With the assistance of a consultant from the State Library we weeded out other obsolete, delapidated and worthless books, thus clearing our shelves for the new books which were purchased in the fall. Some of these discarded books, plus others donated, were disposed of at a book sale held in August.

The trustees are at present considering affiliating with the Statewide Library Development Program, which proposes: direct financial aid to all affiliated libraries; Service centers to be established in many of the larger libraries; centralized cataloging and purchasing of materials (with a larger discount on book-buying) and improved reference and interlibrary loan service.

Such affiliation would incur no expense to the town at the present time; in fact, our immediate entry would enable us to receive \$125 from the state to purchase referance books.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous vears in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.

2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.

3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your very fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire

record in 1965.

ZONING, BUILDING, AND LAND USE ORDINANCE

for the

Town of New Durham, New Hampshire

An ordinance to promote the health, safety, convenience, and general welfare of the community by regulating the use of the land and erection and alteration of buildings in the Town of New Durham.

ARTICLE I

Preamble

In pursuance of the authority conferred by Chapter 31, Section 60-89, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended, and the authority conferred by Chapter 156, Sections 1-5, New Hampshire Revised Statutes, annotated, 1955, as amended, for the purpose of promoting the health, safety, morals, prosperity, convenience, or general welfare, as well as efficiency and economy in the process of development, of the inhabitants of the incorporated Town of New Durham, Strafford County, New Hampshire, by securing safety from fire, panic, and other dangers; by providing adequate areas between buildings and various rights-of-way; by preserving the rural charm now attached to the town; and in order to assist in the promotion of good civic design and arrangements, the wise and efficient expenditure of public funds, and the adequate provision of public utilities and other public requirements, and by other means; now, therefore, the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of New Durham, New Hampshire, in official Town Meeting convened.

ARTICLE II

Establishment of Districts

For the purpose of this Ordinance, the Town of New Durham is zoned in the following districts, as shown on the official zoning map of the Town (entitled Official Zoning Map of the Town of New Durham, New Hampshire, and dated, recorded with the Town Clerk, as the same may hereinafter be amended, which map is hereby made and declared to be a part of this Ordinance:

- A. Residential Agricultural District
- B. Residential Recreational District
- C. Commercial District
- D. Industrial District

ARTICLE III

General Provisions

A. No junk yard or place of storage of discarded machinery, vehicles, glass, paper, cordage, garbage, refuse, or other waste matter or discarded material shall be maintained in the Town, except for such public dumping as may be provided by the Town.

- B. No owner or occupant of the land shall permit any building or structure thereon to be left in a badly damaged, dilapidated, or unusable condition, whether caused by fire, the elements, or from any other cause. Property so damaged, dilapidated, or unusable shall be repaired or rebuilt, or the runins shall be removed to ground level within one year of the time of the damage.
- C. If clay, sod, loam, sand, or gravel for either private use or for sale is removed within 100 feet of a highway, when the supply is depleted, the area shall be re-graded to assure that the premises will be left in a sightly condition and protected against erosion.
- D. Any uses that may be obnoxious or injurious by reason of the production or emission of excessive odor, dust, smoke, refuse matter, fumes, noise, vibration, or similar conditions, or that are dangerous to the comfort, peace, enjoyment, health or safety of the community, or lending to its disturbance or annoyance are prohibited.
- E. Business, professional, or service enterprises shall be allowed advertising signs or identification signs, which advertise activities conducted in New Durham.
- F. No privy, cesspool, septic tank, or sewage disposal area shall be constructed or maintained less than 75 feet from the edge of a public water body; from a well; or from a dwelling other than to which it is appurtenant; as set forth by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes, annotated, 1955, as amended.
- G. No waste water or sewage shall be permitted to run free into a public water body or be discharged in any way that may be offensive or detrimental to the health of others. All such waste shall be conveyed away underground through use of an accepted sanitary system or in such a way that it will not be offensive or detrimental to health.
- H. All dwellings and sanitary systems shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with standards set forth and enforced by the New Hampshire State Department of Health by the Water Pollution Commission.

ARTICLE IV

Residential — Agricultural District

A building may be erected, altered or used, and a lot may be used or occupied, onlly for the following purposes and in accordance with the following provisions:

A. Uses Permitted

- 1. Single family and two-family dwellings.
- 2. Residential uses include such customary uses by the owner or tenant as offices for recognized professions and/or workshops for recognized trades, except that the number of persons at any one location shall not number more than three persons in addition to the owner or tenant's immediate family. The employment of more than three persons constitutes a commercial enterprise.
- 3. Home food and garden produce may be exposed for sale in the district on the same premises with a residential use and not otherwise.
- Farm and garden activities are permitted, except that no person or persons shall be allowed to raise or propagate

more than two pigs within 250 feet of another residential property without the approval of the Board of Adjustment.

5. Churches, schools, non-profit, private, recreational, and cultural uses are permitted.

B. New Buildings and Alterations

No new buildings shall be erected and the use of a building shall not be changed from residential to another use without first obtaining a building permit, as provided in Article XIII hereof

C. Lot Areas Required

- 1. Each lot shall be not less than 40,000 square feet and the frontage and depth not less than 150 feet, provided, however, that a lot with less frontage and depth which is recorded and tared as a lot of record at the time of the passage of this Ordinance, shall be deemed a conforming use. Every principal use permitted hereunder shall be sited on its own individual lot.
- 2. Front Yard. There shall be, betwee nthe nearest right-of-way and the extreme front of any new building, a minimum of 30 feet from the existing right-of-way.
- 3. Side and Back Yard. No new building shall be located nearer than 15 feet from the property lines of any abutter.
- 4. The size and contour of the lot must be such that the sanitary requirements of the State of New Hampshire can be complied with.

D. Minimum Building Area

Every dwelling unit shall have a minimum ground floor area of 600 square feet, excluding garage and porches.

ARTICLE V

Residential — Recreational District

A building may be erected, altered, or used, and a lot may be used or occupied, only for the following purposes and in accordance with the following provisions:

- A. Uses Permitted: The same as Article IV, Section A. and, in addition thereto, boathouses to be used solely for storage of boats, on lots having access to lakeshore frontage; such use of lots for boathouse purposes shall be exempt from the provisions of paragraph C.
- B. New Buildings and Alterations: The same as Article IV, Section B.
- C. Lot Areas Required: The minimum size lot shall be 10,000 square feet, and the minimum width and minimum depth shall each be 100 feet, and the front yard limit may be reduced to 25 feet, provided, however, that the size and contour of the lot must in any case be such that the sanitary requirements of the State of New Hampshire can be complied with.
- D. Size and Type of Building: Any building erected or moved in for residential use shall have a first floor area of not less than 400 square feet.

E. Mobile Homes: A single-sited trailer or mobile home may locate within the District covered by this Article, provided that the owner or occupant complies with the lot area requirements and the sanitary requirements for permanent dwellings, and that the trailer or mobile home is placed upon a permanent foundation within sixty days of the date it is placed on the property.

ARTICLE VI

Commercial District

The commercial district shall consist of those areas so designated on the Official Zoning Map of the town, and shall include those areas in which business has been long established, but shall not be expanded into, or enroach upon, existing residential areas without due process of re-zoning, and with due consideration for abutting and closely neighboring property owners whose property values might be adversely affected thereby.

The usages permitted in the Commercial District shall include all uses permitted in residential-agricultural and residential-recreational districts and, in addition, thereto, wholesale and retail services and trades, professional services, motels, garages and service stations, and public utilities. Buildings erected or converted for commercial use shall comply with customary good standards for safety, fire protection, sanitary requirements, and similar criteria. Lot areas and set backs shall be in conformity with Article 4, Section C, paragraphs 1-4; business uses shall make adequate allowance for customer parking on the premises.

ARTICLE VII

Industrial District

Recognizing the possible need for industrial usage, it shall be the duty of the Town Planning Board to consider any requests for such use, and under such circumstances to seek suitable areas which will mend the re-zoning of such areas for industrial use, together with not be detrimental to residential and commercial areas, and to recomthe regulations applicable thereto.

ARTICLE VIII

Trailer Parks

Before Trailer Parks may be established, it shall be the duty of the Town Planning Board to consider any requests for such Parks, and under such circumstances to seek suitable areas which will not be detrimental to residential and commercial areas, and to recommend the re-zoning of such areas for Trailer Parks, together with appropriate regulations to apply thereto.

ARTICLE IX

Tent Camps

Before tent camps may be established, it shall be the duty of the Town Planning Board to consider any requests for such camps, and under such circumstances to seek suitable areas which will not be detrimental to residential and commercial areas and to recommend the re-zoning of such areas for tent camps, together with appropriate regulations to apply thereto.

ARTICLE X

Roadside Advertising

Advertising signs of any and all kinds shall be prohibited on all public highways of this Town, and likewise prohibited on private property adjacent to such highways for a distance of seventy-five feet from the border of such highways. This does not prohibit advertising signs on properties where business is actually conducted within the limits set forth in Article III, nor does it apply to traffic and directional signs.

Non-conforming roadside advertising signs shall be removed by the persons responsible for the same within one year of the passage of this Ordinance; or if not so removed, they may be removed and destroyed by the Town, and the expense of such removal collected

from the owner or advertiser.

ARTICLE XI

Non-Conforming Uses of Land and Buildings

- A. Any non-conforming use of land and/or buildings (other than junk yards and non-conforming signs) may continue in such use, except that any non-conforming use may not be:
 - 1. Changed to another non-conforming use.
 - 2. Re-established after discontinuance for one year, except to a use conforming to this Ordinance. In event of fire or other damage destroying 50 percent of its value, it may not be re-established.
 - 3. It may not be extended or enlarged, except on approval of the Board of Adjustment as an exception.
- B. No junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use for more than one year after the effective date of this Ordinance, except that a junk yard may continue as a non-conforming use if within that period it is completely enclosed within a continuous solid fence of such height, not less than eight (8) feet high in any case, as to screen completely the operations of the junk yard; and otherwise so as to conform to New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 1955, Chapter 267, Sections I-IV, as amended. Plans of such fense shall be approved by the Board of Selectmen before it is erected.

ARTICLE XII

Re-Zoning

Any request for re-zoning from one District classification to another shall be referred to the Town Planning Board, which shall hold at least two public hearings on the question, the same to be advertised at least 15 days in advance by posting a notice of same in at least three public places in the town and by publication in a paper in general circulation in the town. Upon hearing the evidence, the Board shall decide whether or not the change should be made; and, accordingly, shall submit its proposal with reference thereto in the manner required by New Hampshire Revised Statutes, as amended.

ARTICLE XIII

Enforcement

The Board of Selectmen shall appoint a Building Inspector, who may be a member of said Board; such Building Inspector shall have

the power and authority to enforce the provisions of this ordinance and otherwise shall have the duties and authority prescribed in Chapter 156, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended. Upon any well founded information that this ordinance is being violated, the Building Inspector shall take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other appropriate legal action.

ARTICLE XIV

Building Regulations

A. DUTIES OF THE BUILDING INSPECTOR

The Building Inspector shall have the following duties:

- 1. Receive applications and fees for the erection and/or remodeling of buildings and electrical wiring thereof, as provided in this ordinance.
 - 2. Make available applications in duplicate.
- 3. Keep complete records of his action on all applications, together with the duplicates of said applications.
- 4. Promptly survey sites of proposed buildings or buildings to be remodeled, and study proposed uses of said buildings.
- 5. Issue or deny permits within a maximum of ten (10) days of receipt of application.
- 6. Regularly inspect buildings during the process of erection or remodeling.
- 7. Report violations of this ordinance immediately to the Board of Selectmen.
- 8. Take such action in the enforcement of this ordinance as may be directed by the selectmen.
- 9. Accept and deposit with the Town Treasurer all fees collected by him under this ordinance.
- 10. Act in cooperation with fire authorities in any matter in which their duties as prescribed by law may coincide or conflict.

B. DUTIES OF THE APPLICANT

- 1. Except as may be otherwise provided in paragraph E 11 of this article, any person, persons, partnership or corporation intending to construct a new building or make structural alterations, shall first make application for a permit on forms obtained from the Building Inspector.
 - a. Said application shall be accompanied by a sketch plan and plot plan of the proposed building or alterations.
 - b. Said application shall be accompanied by a signed statement of the intended use of the building upon completion of construction or alteration.
- 2. The applicant shall display prominently at the site of the construction or alteration a card issued by the Building Inspector, evidencing his permit.
- 3. The applicant shall make the premises accessible to the Building Inspector at reasonable times for the performance of his duties.

C. APPLICATION FEES

Fees according to the following table shall accompany each application for a permit. All fees shall be returnable to the Building Inspector and shall constitute payment in full for his service.

D. ISSUANCE OF PERMITS

All permits shall become invalid if not utilized within a period of twelve (12) months and must be re-issued on payment of fee if required. No permit shall be issued unless the building is to be finished on the exterior in an approved permanent manner.

E. REQUIREMENTS

No building shall be erected, rebuilt, remodeled, re-located, or substantially repaired unless in compliance with the following requirements:

- 1. Commercial Building. No building intended or designed to be used for industrial, commercial, or other public use shall be erected, altered, or used for any purpose which does not provide non-combustible walls and partitions between its component parts.
- 2. Exits. No building intended or designed for any public use or congregation of people shall be erected, altered, or used for any purpose which does not provide adequate exits, as described in Chapters 155 and 156, New Hampshire Revised Statutes, Annotated, 1955, as amended, and in regulations of the New Hampshire Fire Marshal's Office.
- 3. Garages. No public garage for the storage of five or more motor vehicles, or no building having automobile service or repair enterprises connected therewith, shall be erected, altered, or enlarged, unless the building is constructed either in its entirety or the extent of the alteration, enlargement, or addition, of material commonly considered slow burning or non-combustible. The use of approved automatic sprinklers may obviate this requirement.
- 4. Fire-Stops. No building of wood or other combustible material shall be erected, remodeled, or enlarged without providing fire-stops in every combustible wall or partition, at every floor and between floor joists at every partition.
- 5. Chimneys. Chimneys shall be constructed of stone, brick, or concrete to the ground footing. No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof unless containing a tile or brick lining and with an iron clean-out door at or near its base, and shall extend at least three feet above the roof. No chimney shall be built, erected, or altered below the roof having wood or other combustible materials within one inch of the chimney.
- 6. Smoke Pipes. No smoke pipes shall be installed or erected so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor or ceiling, unless amply protected with non-combustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed or erected which passes into or through partitions or walls of combustible material, except when guarded by a double collar of metal with air space of at least five inches, or by at least five inches of brick or other non-combustible material between the pipe and the combustible material.

- 7. Wiring. Electrical wiring installed in any new building, or installed or extending during any reconstruction, or remodeling of any building, shall conform to and comply with the regulations and and amendments to regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters, said regulations known as the National Electric Code.
- 8. Structures. All structures shall be set on solid wall-type foundations of concrete, brick, stone, or other acceptable masonry, except that in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use, or camps, the Building Inspector may waive the requirements of this section and permit the use of wood, metal, or masonry piers.
- 9. Minimum Building Area. Every dwelling unit shall have a minimum ground floor area, as provided in Article IV, Section D, and Article V. Section D.
- 10. Outside Walls. Outside walls shall be constructed of material commonly used for outside construction and materials customarily painted shall be painted.
- 11. Small Accessory Buildings. The construction of small accessory buildings not used for living purposes, together with minor alterations, repairs and general upkeep of existing buildings shall be exempt from the provisions of Article IV, Section C.

F. ALL MONIES RECEIVED

All monies received for Building Permits shall be forwarded to the Town Treasurer for deposit in the Town Treasury. Such monies may be allocated to defray the expenses incidental to the ordinance upon approval of the selectmen.

G. GRIEVANCES

Any person aggrieved by a decision of the Building Inspector under the provisions of this ordinance may make an appeal to the Board of Adjustment.

ARTICLE XV

Board of Adjustment

Within thirty days after the adoption of this ordinance, and thereafter as terms expire or vacancies occur, the Board of Selectmen shall make appointments to the Board of Adjustment of five members, conforming in duties to the provisions of Chapter 31 of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended. Thereafter, as the terms expire or vacancies occur, the appointing authority shall be responsible for the filling of vacancies and maintaining full membership on the Board of Adjustment. The Board of Adjustment here provided shall conform in membership and term of office to the provisions of Section 67, Chapter 31, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended. In addition to the general powers granted said Board of Adjustment by said Chapter 31, it may in harmony and subject to its provisions:

- A. Permit a non-conforming temporary use for an initial period of not more than one year. Permits may be renewed by the Board of Adjustment for not more than one additional year, provided due need is shown.
- B. Waive frontage requirements where there are unusual conditions of street curvature, topography or sub-surface conditions. In such cases, however, the average width of the lot shall be equal to or greater than the frontage requirements.

C. Permit in the Town a commercial use which at a public hearing proves it can meet the following requirements:

1. Be located at least thirty feet (30) from the existing rightof-way, and not less than forty (40) feet from each side and rear boundary.

side and rear boundary.

Provide adequate parking facilities on the premises to accommodate vehicles attracted by the business.

3. See that the location is such as to provide proper access and egress without causing a traffic hazard.

D. Act as a Board of Appeal as provided for in Article XIV.

ARTICLE XVI

Amendments

This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting or otherwise as provided by Chapter 31, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended.

ARTICLE XVII

Penalties

Every person, persons, firm, or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars (\$10), upon conviction, for each day such a violation may exist, plus all legal costs in connection with settling the issue.

ARTICLE XVIII

Saving Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provisions.

ARTICLE XIX

Conflicting Provisions

Wherever the regulations made under the authority hereof differ from those described by any statute, ordinance, or other regulation, that provision which imposes the greater restriction or the higher standard shall govern.

ARTICLE XX

Effective Date

This ordinance shall take effect upon the day which it is voted upon and passed.

ARTICLE XXI

Definitions

For the purpose of this ordinance, certain terms are defined as provided in this section:

- A. Home Produce and Products include everything of an agricultural nature grown or otherwise carried on the property of the owner or resident.
- B. Right-of-Way means and includes all Town, State, and Federal highways, and the land on either side of same covered by statutes to determine the width of the right-of-way.

- C. Accessory Building, a building subordinate to the main building on the lot, used for purposes customarily incidental to those of the main buildiny.
- D. Mobile Home, a home which is mobile, a unit similar to a trailer, equipped with running water and sanitary facilities, bath facilities, and toilet.
- E. Front Yard, a space extending from the front of a house or porch to the edge of a highway or street.
- F. Frontage is that area which may border a street, highway, lake, pond or stream.
- G. Tent Camping Site, an area maintained for the renting of more than one tent or tent site, and said area complies with the rules and regulations of the State of New Hampshire regarding same. (See State Regulations on Tent Camps.)
- H. Junk means any and all debris, consisting of paper, rags, tin cans, used parts of any machinery, old cars which have been junked, or anything of a kind which is detrimental to the looks and appearance of any section of the Town.
- I. Non-Conforming Building or Structure, a building or structure in whole or in part, which does not conform to the use and regulations of the district in which the building or structure is located such as a partially finished building, one that has had a section removed, or a building which has been left to the mercy of the elements.
- J. Non-Conforming Use, a use which does not conform to the use regulations of the district in which such use exists, and which was in existence prior to the enactment of these regulations, including amendments thereto.
- K. A Trailer Park or Mobile Home Park is land upon which two or more mobile homes or trailers are parked and occupied for living purposes, regardless of whether or not a charge is made for such accommodations.
- L. A Tent Camp means a plot of ground upon which two or more temporary or permanent tents are located, established, or maintained, and operated as living quarters for children or adults or both, for a period of five days or more, for recreation, education, or vacation purposes, either free or by payment of a fee.
