### TOWN WARRANT

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Hampton in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New Hampton on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March next, at 9:30 A.M., the polls to close not earlier than 5:30 P.M., to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of highways and bridges.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$666.32 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute the sum of \$4,442.11.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance and tarring of Class V roads.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 to tar the road from Kelley's Corner as far as improved with T.R.A. funds in 1953.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for purchase of Forest Fire Equipment.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the State Forestry & Recreation Department.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of Hospitals.
- 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Old Cemeteries.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of New Hampton Village Cemetery.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$183.00 which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote taken last year, to appropriate the sum of Thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500), from the accumulated interest of the Capital Reserve Fund, to improve and tar the lower river road from Central Bridge, so-called, to the Jimmie Bridge, so-called, and authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay over the same amount to the Town Treasurer, any unexpended balance to be returned to the Trustees of Trust Funds.

- 17. To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the Capital Reserve Fund; from the alteration, reconstruction or improvement of the Easterly half of Central Bridge and highways in which easements were acquired by the United States, to the alteration, reconstruction or improvement of the Easterly half of Central Bridge and the road leading from Chase Corner, so-called, up the hill by the residence of Peter Carlson and down Blake Hill continuous to the former Fiske School House.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a portion of the Capital Reserve Fund, to alter, reconstruct, improve and tar a part of the road leading from Chase Corner, so-called, to the former Fiske School House.
- 19. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collectors Deeds.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new truck, applying the old truck towards the cost of the new one, and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 21. To see if the Town desires to make any repairs upon the Town Hall and raise and appropriate money for the same.
- 22. To hear the report of the committee on the town history and to take any necessary action relating thereto.
- 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

### REPORT ON TOWN HISTORY

During the last year considerable progress has been made in gathering further material for the town history.

All the private cemeteries in town have been visited and all legible inscriptions copied, each cemetery diagramed and the position of graves indicated. An index has been prepared by which the location of any grave can be readily found and this information is on file at the Gordon-Nash Library. This has also been done for the oldest part of the village cemetery, that back of the tractor house. Eventually it is planned to include the rest of this cemetery. There are fifty-three known local cemeteries of which five have only unmarked fieldstones, and there are many of the others which contain fieldstone markers. There are about seven hundred marked graves included in the index besides about forty in the old village cemetery.

Considerable work has been done in getting information about the earliest settlers and an appeal is again made, particularly to present residents of the town who are descendents of these families, for any information they may have about them in the form of letters, diaries, old account books, family Bibles, deeds or family traditions. Since the town records back of 1797 were lost by fire, such materials are the only sources we have for such information.

Much data about the physical features of the town have been gathered into the form of a tentative chapter for the history, a copy of which will be available at the Library for examination and reference.

Mrs. Sadie Smith is at work on the section on history of the churches and will appreciate any information on this subject. Anyone having information about early schools and school districts should contact Miss Ina Bickford who is working on this part of the history. Several of the local societies are preparing brief histories

of their organizations and those of the Garden Club and of the Benevolent Society are already on hand.

Memoirs of early days in the town which were published by Col. E. C. Lewis in the Laconia Democrat in 1898 and 1905 and by Elder White in the Bristol Enterprise in 1904 and 1905 have been copied and typed transcripts are available at the Library.

It does not appear that any action needs to be taken by the town at this time, but it is hoped that by next year we may be able to make an estimate of the possibility and probable cost of publication. All cash disbursements for the work done this past year have been financed by the Library which has so far advanced \$125 for this purpose, so that the fund for publication has remained untouched to accumulate another year's interest.

Appreciation is expressed to all townspeople who have helped in this work and also to Mr. Bowdoin Plumer of Bristol for making available files of the Bristol Enterprise.

### ANNUAL REPORT of the SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and citizens of the New Hampton School District:

I herewith submit my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools:

Another year has passed since my last report and with its passing has come new problems. School problems are pretty much the same the nation over. States are reporting that they are suffering from teacher shortages, building needs are evident, and they are beset with financial difficulties. We know these conditions to exist in our state and feel them in New Hampton. I would like to touch briefly, in this report, on some of the items which I think are pertinent to you in New Hampton.

At the close of the school year in June we regretfully accepted the resignation of Mr. Lionel Metivier as Teacher-Principal of the Community School. Mr. Metivier had filled the post admirably and had done much to continue our good school program. We were most fortunate in obtaining, as his replacement, Mr. Edward Keough, a graduate of Boston University with teaching experience in Northboro High School in Northboro, Massachusetts. Mr. Keough has fitted into our educational picture very well and brings to the school a good background of fundamentals in school teaching and administration.

We were fortunate in being able to keep the rest of our staff. They are all continuing to give excellent service to your boys and girls. It is only with some continuity in our staff that we can make educational progress. I hope that the District will take the necessary steps to see that we continue to have and keep good teachers. The various agencies in the community are again giving of their time and effort to see that the schools get all the help they need. The Parent-Teachers Association through their many activities especially their work on the recreation facilities and help on noon lunch are a tremendous factor in our success. The lunch program plays a very important part in the health of the children of the school. Nowhere do we find a program that is any better than the one operated in New Hampton.

The Gordon-Nash Library has been of valuable assistance to the school. They are continuing the excellent cooperation to provide the very best in books for the children. It is certainly a joy to the superintendent to know that the citizens are so concerned about making their schools the best possible.

The school budget for the coming year, again shows an increase. When it was prepared in December we were able to come up with a figure which was approximately \$600 less than was asked for last year. In the meantime, however, the high school and elementary tuition rates at Bristol and Ashland have been substantially increased. This next year Bristol will charge \$300 per pupil for high school tuition while the rate for the current year has been \$275. Ashland has increased their rate for high school from \$250 to \$285 and the elementary from \$120 to \$165. These increases have added \$1500 to our budget figures of December. Therefore, instead of being able to come to the voters with a decreased budget we will need to ask for about \$900 more.

The problem of school financing is becoming serious in New Hampshire. It is time for some of the legislators who are elected from the communities not receiving State Aid to see if some means of assistance cannot be given for the support of schools. The property owner in the community is bearing the brunt of the tax load. If we are to continue to improve our offerings we will need to have some help on the state level.

There has been considerable talk about the rearrangement of the Supervisory Unions in the State. Some study has been made and it appears as though New Hampton will be placed in the Bristol Union when the time comes for rearrangement. On the surface it is logical for New Hampton and Bristol to be in the same Supervisory Union. I hope that you will accept it if it becomes a reality.

The budget calls for the erection of a link fence between the athletic field and the main highway. I hope that the voters will approve this move on the part of the Board. It will increase the safety factor of your children when they are playing in that area and it will improve the looks of that corner of the field.

I cannot close this report without expressing my appreciation to the many people and the many groups in the community who have helped make my job easier. The School Board, the staff, the PTA, the Gordon-Nash Library, Headmaster Frederick Smith of The New Hampton School and the many others. I am deeply grateful. With this kind of cooperation I am positive that the children in New Hampton will always receive the best in their educational life. May it continue in the years to come.
