# TOWN WARRANT State of New Hampshire

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF ORFORD, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote on Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Memorial Hall in said Orford, on Tuesday the 8th day of March next, at 4 in the afternoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers. The polls will be open from four o'clock in the afternoon until nine o'clock in the evening for you to cast your ballot for the following officers:

Selectman for 3 years
Treasurer for 3 years
Road Agent for 1 year

and to vote on anything that may be on your ballot.

NOTICE: ARTICLES 2 through 22 WILL NOT BE DISCUSSED UNTIL 6:30 IN THE EVENING!

- Article 2. To hear the report of the Budget Committee and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for its general operating expenses.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will authorize the withdrawal of \$8,958.47 from the GENERAL REVENUE SHARING FUND established under the provisions of State and Local Act of 1972 to be used towards the Winter Maintenance account.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction or reconstruction of Class V Roads, and will raise and appropriate \$744.95 with a State Contribution of \$4,966.31.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following amounts to be turned over to the Trustees of the Trust Funds for the Capital Reserve Funds listed, and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer such funds.

\$2,500.00 purchase of Fire Truck
\$3,000.00 replacement of Town Truck
\$3,000.00 replacement of Town Loader
\$3,000.00 replacement of Grader

### TOWN WARRANT - Continued

- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the withdrawal of \$2,500.00 from the capital reserve fund for the Police Cruiser to pay for the purchase of the Police Cruiser authorized by the 1982 Town Meeting.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to institute twice a year tax billing.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to have the appraisal division of the department of revenue administration conduct a complete revaluation starting in 1986 or thereafter. To establish a capital reserve fund for the purpose of conducting such revaluation and to appoint the selectmen as agents to administer the fund.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$19,000.00 and authorize the selectmen to purchase approximately four acres of land located between the present Fire Department property and the Community Field. (by petition)
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Orford and to the health and welfare of the people of Orford.

These actions shall include:

- 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.
- 2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this goal.

The record of vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. (by petition.)

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to be turned over to the Cottage Hospital toward the purchase of new or replacement of operating room equipment. (by request)

### TOWN WARRANT - Continued

- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a cooperative agreement with other area communities under the provisions of Chapter 53-B to study the advisability of establishing a regional refuse disposal district and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$530.00 as its share of the cost of a feasability study (total cost estimated to be \$12,000.00) of a refuse energy facility to be located in Plymouth with the express intent of selling steam and/or electricity to Plymouth State College. The feasibility study to be initiated following approval at the March, 1983 Town Meeting, with a report to be completed with recommendations for further action to be presented to the participating towns at their 1984 or earlier Town Meeting. (by request)
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$186.60 for the support of the Community Action Program of Coos, Carroll and Grafton Counties in coordination with the LISTEN Center. (by petition)
- Article 16. To see what action the Town will take to direct the Town Clerk to hold regular hours for business in the Town Office twice a week, part of which hours shall be during one evening a week, and which days shall be posted on the outside bulletin board at the Town Office. (by petition)
- Article 17. To see how much the Town will vote to raise and appropriate in support of an Orford Ski Program.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the "Norris Road" bisecting the Margaret & Henry Lahey property recorded in the Grafton County Registery of Deeds Office in Book 1457, Page 686, Plan No. 1475, formerly owned by Ola Miller. (by request)
- Article 19. A. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the Trust Fund established for the Purchase of a Town Truck and to use the proceeds for the purchase of a new Town Truck with any remaining balance to be used to establish a new Capital Reserve Fund for the replacement of said Town Truck and to appoint the Selectmen as agents to administer the fund.
  - B. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,500.00 to be used with the proceeds of section A of this article to purchase a new Town Truck and to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the 1972 Chevrolet Dump Truck if appropriate.

### TOWN WARRANT - Continued

- Article 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for and receive Federal Disaster Assistance Funds through the State Disaster Coordination Office, and to expend the funds so received to repair the damage to Town Roads and/or Bridges caused by any disaster for which Federal Funds are available.
- Article 21. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, and Committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 22. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

### SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The Community Field is once again in use as a playing field. The parking area is not as yet completed and some equipment is still needed, but the appearance of the Field has brought many favorable comments and also much pleasure to those who play on it.

The Orford-Lyme Town line was walked and blazed by Everett Blake and John Harlow, a Lyme selectman. When the survey has been completed by the Federal Government for the Appalachian Trail, the Orford-Wentworth line will also be walked.

We hope that the litigation over the Stonehouse Mountain Development and road will be satisfactorily settled in the coming year.

Orford has joined with several other towns of under 1000 in an effort to solve the problem of solid waste disposal. An appeal is being made for a change in the rules so that open burning at the dump may be continued.

It was necessary to replace the furnace in the Town Hall this year and while the furnace itself was covered by warranty there was expense involved in the relining. The roof of the selectmen's office must be repaired this year as well as some exterior work on the Town Library.

There has been a cooperative effort to keep in touch with the Road Agent, Roger Noyes, who has done excellent work despite a limited budget. Because there were heavy expenses during the first part of 1982, it was necessary to cut the hours of the highway crew to stay within the budget. We also used the State Highway Subsidy money for labor-oriented projects thereby postponing several capital expenditures. A much needed new culvert was placed on the Indian Pond Road with funds from TRA and due to the increased traffic on the Orfordville-Lyme Road, this road has been widened on the south end.

Our concern for the age and condition of the existing Town equipment, as well as high replacement costs, and the desire for a stabilized tax rate have prompted us to include in the budget requests for capital reserve funds for future replacement of this equipment.

Richard Butman has continued his work on the up-dating of property transfers and assessment cards. We wish to thank the volunteers who helped with the mailing of the Town Reports and the processing of inventories, and we appreciate the time which is given by those who serve on the various commissions.

Special mention should be made of the precise work which has been done by the Town Treasurer, Gunther Sunderhauf, who celebrated his 90th birthday in January. He has served the Town long and faithfully and we are glad that he will run again for a 3-year term as Treasurer.

We look forward to the coming year and, as always, will welcome the comments and suggestions of Orford residents in our effort to provide good government for the Town.

### REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N. H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of onehalf acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

### ORFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT

According to a recent New Hampshire Chief's of Police survey there should be one full time police officer for each 600 residents to provide adequate police protection to any community. FBI Law Enforcement Personnel Statistics figure that 1.4 full time police officers per thousand residents would provide this coverage in a rural area. Based on the above statistics provided by these professional law enforcement organizations and the population of Orford being about 926, it is indicated that Orford should have 1.3 full time officers. This need has been further substantiated by this department's work load. Since I have taken over the position of Chief of Police, I have found it impossible to give the town proper police protection within the budgeted hours. (In 1982, I worked an average of 17 hours per week or approximately 2 1/2 hours a day).

Nearly all the demands on my time have been complaint originated. In fact, I received over 795 telephone calls in 1982. You, the taxpayers and residents of Orford, deserve more police protection.

During our Well Child Clinics we saw 216 children. At these clinics we offer physicals, immunizations, blood work, vision and hearing and urinalysis. We also offer blood pressure screening for the adults. These clinics are held on odd months in Orford and even months in Lyme.

Our arrangement with Piermont is the same as in the past. Piermont contracts with the OCHS for public health nursing.

The OCHS now has a contract with the Hanover Visiting Nurse Agency. Hanover provides skilled nursing which when needed offers home health aides, physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech therapy when ordered by a physician. This obviously expands all services greatly, and allows patients to remain home for this care rather than having to be hospitalized.

Karen Garrigan is now the visiting nurse for Orford and Piermont. The OCHS office phone is still 353-4853. There is an answering machine in the office to take messages when the nurse is not in.

Many thanks to all who volunteered their time and effort to the OCHS activities.

The Orford Senior Center, Advisory Committee has met the last Tuesday of each month throughout the year.

Our year started with a problem, the Nutrition Policy Committee, of the State Council on Aging, was working on a new rule that would close down all one day a week meal sites throughout the state, on August 1, 1982. This aroused the seniors all over the state, and especially our seniors and friends in Grafton County. It was their help by writing and sending of letters and petitions to the Governor, Governor's Council, Chairman and Executive Director of the State Council on Aging. With this type of action throughout the state, the Nutrition Policy Committee finally tabled the rule that would close the one day a week sites, without bringing it to the floor for a final vote.

This is not just a one day a week meal site; we try to do as much as we possibly can for the communities that we serve. 50% of our volunteer hours are from services apart from the meal site such as, Friendly Visitors, Good Neighbor Aide, Telephone Reassurance, Information, Referral, Transportation and Hostess to the Elderly.

### REPORT OF GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

In our continued effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we take this opportunity to

reach you through your annual town/city report.

Budgeting becomes more complex each year due to variables and unfunded state mandates. Until authority accompanies funding, our local governments will have little control over spiralling taxes. Counties encounter funding problems similar to towns/cities. We are continually absorbing more costs of state/federal programs. This year local governments picked up a 25% increase in their share of the OAA/APTD/ICF grants. Child placement costs are increasing dramatically with the private foster homes rapidly being replaced by more expensive group homes, some costing \$25,000 to \$40,000 per year compared to private home rates of \$2,400 to \$3,600 per year.

Our new sewage system, tied in with Woodsville Precinct's treatment plant, was complete and operational in February 1982.

Many dollars are being saved in energy accounts through conservation measures. Fuel costs were reduced by 20% and electric costs by 8% in fiscal year ending June 30, 1982, saving \$41,800.

Finishing the second superior courtroom will cost approximately \$169,500. Bonding is approved and the project should be completed

this spring.

The Jail & House of Correction had another busy year. Average census was 38. We continue to get inmates with mental or emotional problems requiring additional staff and medical treatment and higher medication costs. No change is foreseen in the admission pattern due to the continuing discharge policy of N. H. State Hospital. Pending legislation requiring more severe sentencing for some crimes will increase duration of stay and census, proportionately increasing the burden on correctional staff.

The County Farm is a productive asset to the County through participation in Extension and Conservation Service programs and by creating meaningful work for House of Correction inmates. Volume of milk remains constant although the revenue dropped slightly due to decrease in federal parity. Quality of the Holstein herd is excellent. Revenue from livestock sales grossed \$25,092 last fiscal year, and produce grossed \$40,016 for the Farm.

The Commissioners meet Mondays at 9:30 A.M. at the Courthouse, 1:30 P.M. at the Nursing Home. Meetings are open to the

public.

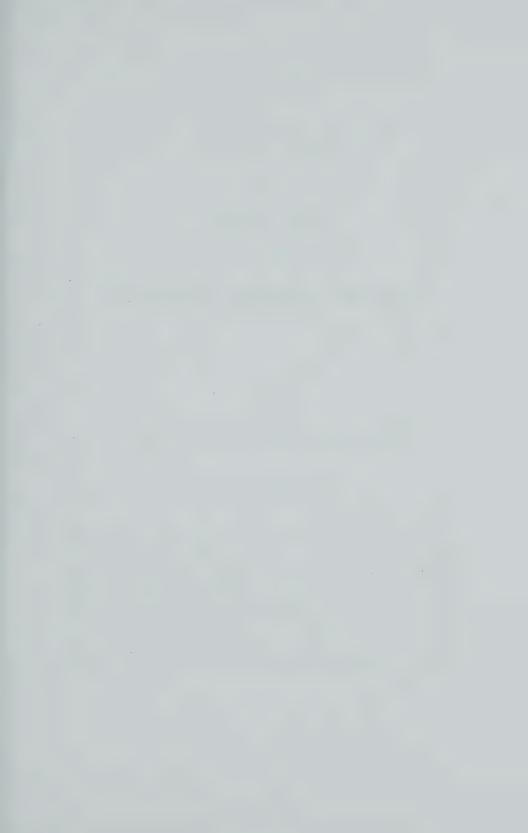

Article 1. To choose by non-partisan ballot a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, each to serve one year, and two Auditors, one to serve one year and one to serve two years, and two members of the School Board, each to serve three years. (Polls will open at 5:00 P.M. and will close no earlier than 10:00 P.M.)

NOTE: ARTICLES 2 THROUGH 6 WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED UNTIL 8:00 P.M.

- Article 2. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District.
- Article 3. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to establish a contingency fund as part of the regular school district budget and to raise and appropriate Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) for this purpose.
- Article 4. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the 1983-84 fiscal year.
- Article 5. ### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

### To the Citizens of Orford:

The Orford Schools represent a challenge for each student to progress individually depending upon his or her motivation, ability and interest level. The continued excellent performance of our students in all phases of education definitely reflects their potential.

### Staff and Enrollment

Eight new staff members were added this year. They are: Dale Gilson, Kindergarten teacher; Catherine Shope, second grade teacher; Terry Stone-Porreca, third grade teacher; Mary Jo Kitchen, 4th grade teacher; Anna Dewey, music; Larry Ryan, industrial arts instructor; Eileen Watson, Learning Disabilities aide; Richard Smith, custodian.

The enrollment continues to decline, down to 179.

### Repairs and Upkeep

The C.E.T.A. program was continued for our community for another year. Consequently, much was done by Dick Smith and his crew to improve the overall appearance of our three buildings. All lighting fixtures, walls, desks, windows, and floors were washed in all of our buildings. All rugs were shampooed. Broken desk chairs and windows were repaired. Memorial Hall's entranceway was repaired and painted. The wooden floors were chemically stripped and sealed which resulted in an improved appearance and easier maintenance. Mopboards and some ceiling tiles were installed. Windows were recaulked and weatherstripping was installed. Bookcases were repaired as were the swings at both the 'Ville and the Middle Schools. The gymnasium floor was stripped and waxed. Portions of the Middle School roof were retarred and recaulked. Some small plumbing projects were also completed. Estes and Gallup repaired the side entranceway and the fire escape to the High School and reshingled the roof as well. Through a matching energy grant, new energy-efficient lights were installed in the gym, insulation blown into the walls of the Middle School and 'Ville, night set-back panels installed to the boilers in the Middle School as was a stabilizer. The boilers were cleaned and tuned for maximum efficiency and storm windows were added to the Middle School. As we enter the third year of our five-year maintenance plan, we look for an ever better appearance and efficiency.

### Curriculum

As a result of our local accountability testing required by the State Department of Education and the Metropolitan Achievement Tests, we can proudly point to positive results, as was reported in

the February Newsletter. We can, therefore, feel comfortable with student improvement and look forward to even more favorable scores when a curriculum review is completed. One course that was added this year and which has proven to be quite popular is the computer literacy course. With only one terminal, enrollment has necessarily had to be limited. We look forward to augmenting our number of terminals through a block grant next year.

### Conclusions

Many thanks for continued support goes out to Dr. Hugh Watson, Superintendent, Eugene Roddy, Director of Pupil Personal Services, and their central office staff; my assistant principal Jerry LeSage and Middle School head teacher Gary Wells; and my highly-efficient and dependable secretary Mrs. Janet Kee. My appreciation and gratitude is extended to them, to the School Board, to the staff, parents and students for their assistance during the year.
