

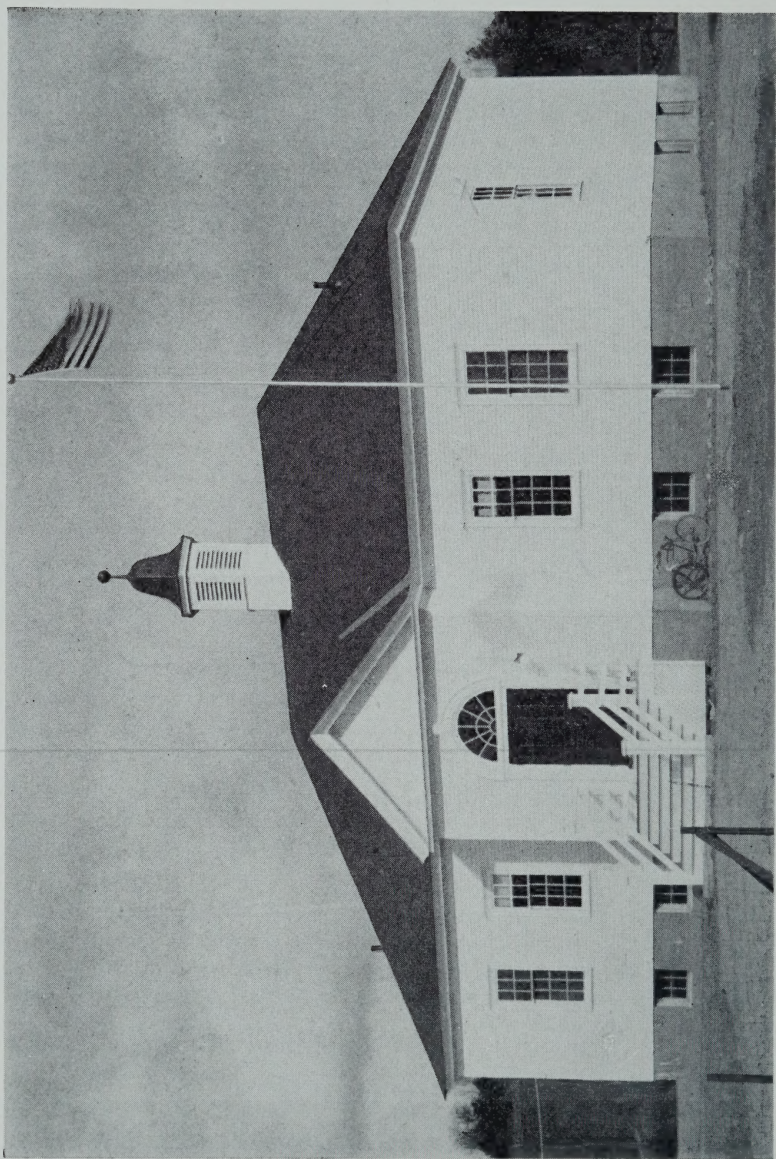

TOWN WARRANT

March, 1940

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Plainfield, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall, Meriden, in said town on the second Tuesday of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for three years, Treasurer, Tax Collector, one or more Highway Agents, one Trustee of Trust Funds for one year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, two Library Trustees for three years and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay outstanding notes and interest.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to pay all other necessary town expenses for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Town poor.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise the amount of money required by law to secure State Aid on Class 5 highways plus any additional amounts necessary.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of the Class 2 road known as the Plainfield-Meriden Stage road, and raise for said purpose the sum of \$1174.50. The State will contribute \$2348.00. Or to accept State Aid for construction of Class 5 roads and raise the sum of \$808.01 and the State will contribute \$3232.07.

Article 7. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise to assist citizens of Plainfield for a ward bed as needed in the Mary Hitchcock Hospital, Claremont Hospital, or both, also to appoint a committee or make resolutions regarding the same.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Memorial Day.

Article 9. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for snow removal.

Article 10. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise for Dr. E. L. Huse to assure the inhabitants of Plainfield the services of a resident physician. By Request.

Article 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 to assist in the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region. Said appropriation to be disbursed by the Selectmen.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the road beginning at the Gonyea road near the Park gate and continuing southerly to the Cornish Town line. By Request.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road beginning at a point near the barn belonging to Herbert Adams to the end of same, approximately one-half mile. By Request.

Article 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the purchase or renting of snow removal equipment and raise any money required for same.

Article 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector Deeds.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes to be paid on or before one year pursuant to the laws of 1917.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 2% on all 1940 Property taxes paid on or before July 10.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with delivering inventory blanks until the time of taking inventory.

Article 20. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of the Town Officers.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally and properly come before said meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Plainfield:

It is a pleasure to hand you herewith my seventh annual report on the conditions and activities of the Plainfield schools. This is the twenty-first in a series of such reports under professional supervision.

Teacher Changes

Four teacher changes are noted, although only three new teachers are employed in the District. Miss Jeannette Bowlby, who had been at the East Plainfield school last year, was transferred to the primary room at Plainfield. Her position at East Plainfield is filled by Miss Gretchen O'Mara, while Miss Ruth Berry and Miss Nina Nutting take over the work of the grammar room at Meriden and the Brook school respectively. These three new teachers are in their first year of employment as teachers.

Transportation

Due to the new school building at Meriden some slight change in the transportation route at Meriden is noticeable, but no change in conveyance or amount paid the conveyer is effected.

At the Plainfield Plain school the conveyer from the Spencer district makes two trips, the second one from the Plain school to the Descoteau home near the center of the town. This second trip, necessitated by the conditions of the road and its location, nearly doubles the cost of transportation from the Spencer school area. At the decease of Mrs. Casper Short last November a slight re-arrangement was made in the

River district transportation route, which was taken over by Mr. Berwick, whereby he takes on a few of the children normally belonging to the Black Hill route as well as those on the River route. The moving of families from one neighborhood to another oftentimes upsets a whole transportation schedule and very often with consequent increase in transportation expenses.

New School Building

The new school building is being used this year and, I am sure, very much enjoyed by the teachers and school children. Apparently the heating and lighting facilities are adequate and the location is not too great an inconvenience to any. If it were, the large playground is sufficient to more than make up for any loss in other respects. An accounting of the cost of the building will be found on another page.

Minor Repairs

Some minor repairs were made at the East Plainfield school, where the interior was entirely redecorated, as was the interior of the Brook school. At the first opportunity, when money is available, some attempt should be made to install septic tank toilets at both of these buildings, as well as put a new floor in the Brook school.

Music in the Schools

Mr. George Low continues to do some very nice work with the children in all of the schools in music. I think the operetta at Plainfield last year, the music at graduation time at both Plainfield and Meriden, as well as the small operettas put on for Christmas entertainment at both of the village schools would bear out this claim.

Budget

The budget as prepared for next year is larger than heretofore. This is principally on account of the increase in transportation and high school tuition charges that are anticipated. The per-pupil cost for Plainfield is less than the median cost for the State. The median cost for the State is \$81.07, while that of Plainfield is \$78.64. This does not consider the cost of the tuition pupils in high school. The tax rate per thousand of equalized valuation for the schools of Plainfield is lower than 91 districts out of the 241 in the State.

Health Work

A report of Mrs. Hasham, the School Nurse, is included. I think we are all agreed that Mrs. Hasham has done a splendid piece of work for the children of Plainfield in the matter of getting the various defects remedied through following up the work with the parents and seeing that children get to clinics or hospitals. A dental clinic with very much success and smoothness was carried on at both Meriden and Plainfield.

Report of the School Nurse

The school health service consists of home visits made by the school nurse to talk over with parents the handicapping conditions found during routine health inspection.

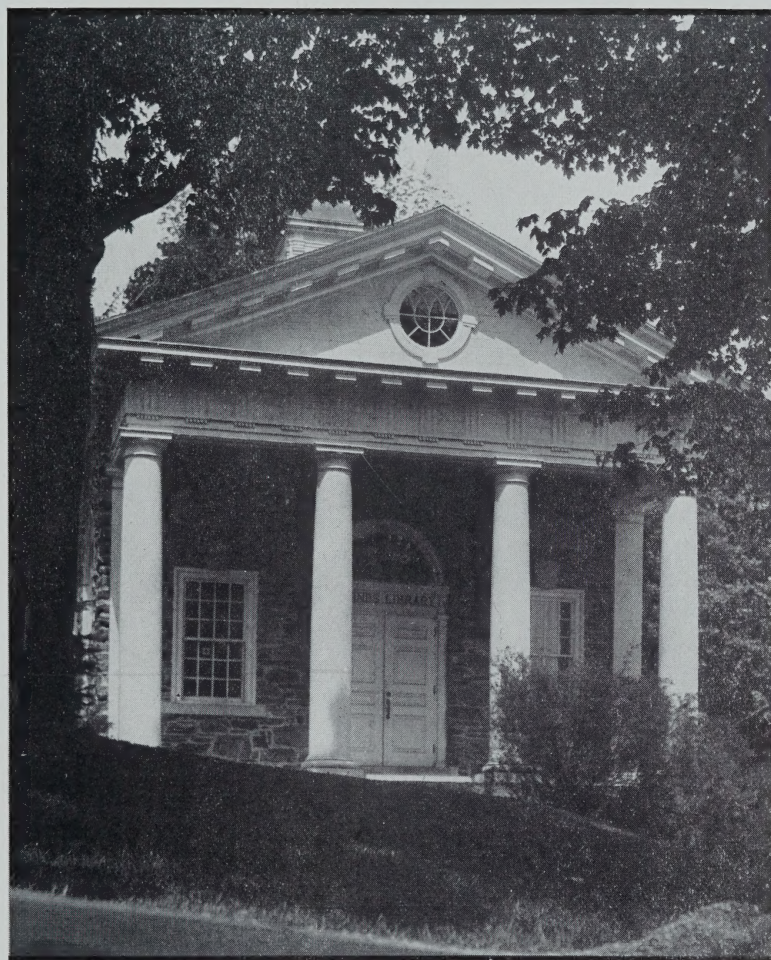
