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ROCKINGHAM COUNTY DELEGATION

Concord, New Hampshire, January 9, 1957

A meeting of the Rockingham County delegation was held as of the above date, in Room 317, State House. The meeting was called to order by Draper Parmenter, Chairman of the 1955 delegation.

The Clerk, Mrs. Lise Payette, called the roll and found that 50 Representatives and 4 Delegates were present.

The Chairman called for nominations for Delegation Chairman for the 1957 Delegation.

Mr. Winter Eastman, Exeter, nominated Mr. Henry S. Murch, Pörtsmouth. Mrs. Margaret Griffin, Auburn, nominated Mr. George Shattuck, Danville. The nominations were duly seconded. Being no further nominations it was moved that nominations be closed. It was so voted.

Mr. Eastman, and Mrs. Griffin were appointed tellers.

Discussion ensued as to whether two delegated namely, Mrs. Ann Sadler and Mrs. Pheobe Morgan, both of Portsmouth, should be entitled to full vote. The question being that neither has been seated as a member of the House, due to the fact that as the results of a tie election recount vote (1065 to 1065) the question had not been resolved by the House Committee on Elections. Mr. Joseph V. Stancik, a member of the Committee on Elections, unofficially said that he believed the Committee were of the unanimous opinion that the Delegates in question would be seated with each a $\frac{1}{2}$ vote.

Motion was made that Ann Sadler and Pheobe Morgan each be accorded a $\frac{1}{2}$ vote. Motion was seconded and it was so voted.

The delegation proceeded to vote. The results being; 28 votes cast for Mr. Shattuck, 26 votes cast for Mr. Murch. Mr. Shattuck was therefor declared elected.

The chair then called for nominations for Vice-Chairman. Motion was made and duly seconded for Mary Dondero. Being no further nomination the clerk was instructed to cast one ballot for Mary Dondero, and Mary Dondero was elected Vice-Chairman.

The chair then called for nomination for Clerk. Mrs. Mildred L. Palmer was nominated. There being no further nomination Mildred L. Palmer was elected Clerk.

Mr. Pillsbury, Sandown, moved that the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Clerk be declared members of the Executive Committee. Motion duly seconded and it was so voted.

A note of appreciation from Speaker Douglass Scamman and Mrs. Scamman for flowers received by them on Inauguration Day, was read.

Motion by Mrs. Dondero that Draper Parmenter be accorded by rising vote of thanks in recognition of his efficient leadership as delegation chairman 1955 — 1956. Motion adopted.

Chairman, George Shattuck presided.

The roll was called. Present were 47 representatives, 2 delegates.

The chairman called for such action as the delegation desired relative to appointments of the Executive Committee. Mrs. Dondero moved (duly seconded) "that the delegation ratify the appointments previously made by the chairman, Mr. Shattuck. Mr. Foote moved, Mr. Wardwell seconded, "that the clerk be instructed to cast one ballot in favor of the motion. The motion being unanimously favored the clerk cast one ballot.

The clerk read H. B. 82.

Mr. Rathbone of Exeter, stated he was the sponsor of the bill, and favored its passage. Mr. Mott, Mr. Eldredge, Mr. Murch, Mr. Merrill, Mrs. Dondero, spoke favorably.

Mr. Jones, Mr. Stancik, Mrs. Griffin, Mrs. Palmer spoke in opposition.

Being no one desiring to speak further the hearing closed.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

Mr. Shattuck presented H. B. 82 for the consideration of the delegation. Mr. Stancik moved the bill be reported "inexpedient to legislate. Mrs. Griffin seconded. Mr. Humphreys objected to the motion as he desired to offer an amendment. Mr. Stancik withdrew his motion. Mr. Humphreys offered the following and moved its adoption. "To amend the bill to strike out wherever there appears the words and figures \$1200.00 which applies to Rockingham County, and insert the words and figures \$1000.00." Mr. Sanborn, spoke in opposition to the motion. Mr. Bisbee moved the previous question. The question being on the amendment. Mr. Jones requested a roll call. 24 members having voted in favor and 24 having voted in opposition the amendment was declared lost.

Mr. Foote moved that H.B. 82 be reported "ought to pass". Mrs. Dondero seconded. Mr. Jones requested a roll call. 25 having voted favorable, 23 voting in opposition the motion that the bill be reported "ought to pass" prevailed.

February 25, 1957

In accordance with duly issued notice, the Rockingham County Delegation met this date at the County Farm, Brentwood, at 10 A. M. with Chairman George W. Shattuck presiding.

The clerk called the roll with 41 members reporting present.

Mr. Hunter, chairman of the budget committee offered the following motion, and moved its adoption: "Move that the commissioners be given the sum of \$200.00, to pay for assembling and producing a budget in booklet form to put in the hands of the Convention in 1958, and each year thereafter. The Commissioners to notify all departments to have prepared and delivered to them not later than January 20, of each year, a complete breakdown of the expenditures of their department for inclusion in the budget". The motion was duly seconded. Mr. Hunter spoke further on the motion, and it was so voted.

Consideration of the budget as recommended by the committee was then requested by the chairman.

1 - 2 — Mr. Battles moved that items 1 and 2 be adopted, Motion duly seconded. Motion carried.

3 - 5 — Motion by Mrs. Griffin, duly seconded, that items 3, 4, 5, be adopted as recommended. Motion carried.

6 - 8 — Motion by Mr. Nickerson, duly seconded, that items 6, 7, 8, as recommended by the committee be adopted. Discussion ensued. Mr. Battles objected to passage of item 8. Motion carried on items 6 and 7.

QUESTION: Shall the recommendation of the budget committee of \$4500.00 be reduced to \$4000.00. 31 having voted against the motion, and 11 voting in favor of the motion, the motion was lost. Mr. Nickerson, moved, duly seconded, that item 8 be adopted as recommended. Motion carried.

The chairman expressed to Mr. and Mrs. Hilton the appreciation of the delegation for their gracious efforts of the day. Mr. Douglas Scamman, Speaker of the House, was recognized, and again expressed his appreciation in being able to bring to Rockingham County, the honor of the Speakership.

At 1:45 p.m. the delegation was again called to order.

Mr. Murch, moved, duly seconded, that: "The County raise and appropriate the sum of \$664,685.17, crediting estimated revenue of \$246,171.79, and committing to county tax \$418,513.38". Motion carried.

Mr. Robinson, suggested that members give some thought to the naming of the new county infirmary, and at the next delegation meeting, names be proposed.

Being no other business, Mr. Wardwell moved, duly seconded, that the meeting adjourn.

April 3, 1957

The Rockingham County Delegation held an Executive session this date in room 306 of the State House, to consider action of H. B. 82. Relative to the salary of the Treasurer of Rockingham County".

33 members present.

Mr. Shattuck, chairman, presented a letter of ruling from the office of the Atty. General. The ruling in part, stated that only such members of the delegation as are members of the house, are legally entitled to act upon House Bills.

Mr. Eldridge, Exeter, moved, Mr. Clark, Derry, seconded, that; H. B. 82 be reported "ought to pass".

Discussion ensued. Mr. Murch moved the previous question. Mr. Foote demanded a roll call.

18 voting YES 15 voting NO, the motion of "ought to pass" prevailed.

April 18, 1957

The Rockingham County Delegation held an Executive session this date in Room 306 of the State House, Concord, N. H. at 10 a. m. 30 members were present.

The Chairman stated the purpose of the meeting was to see what action the Delegation desired relative to naming the new Nursing Home at the Rockingham County Home, Brentwood.

There was much discussion. Rep. Battles, Kingston suggested that the Home be called "The General Green Nursing Home". Rep. Mary Dondero also spoke about recognition being given to members who have served in the armed forces. Rep. John Perkins of Nottingham made the motion, which was duly seconded, that the new nursing home at Brentwood be called "The Fernald Nursing Home".

The Chairman, after much discussion, called for the number of members in favor of the motion from the member from Nottingham and by hand vote, it was a unanimous decision. Mildred L. Palmer, Clerk

The chairman George Shattuck called a meeting of the Rockingham County delegation on May 27, 1957 at 10:00 a.m. Room 306, State House Concord, N. H. 24 members present.

The chairman stated the purpose of the meeting being to see what action the delegation desired relative to legislation necessary to type of prisoners to be sent to Brentwood.

Mr. Rae Laraba was present and stated that if amendment is made in our present statue, the present county facilities could be used for many committ-

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ments, and would be a saving to the county. He stated that Sheriff Frink was in favor of the move. At present the cost per day at Hillsborough is \$1.75, and it would be possible for Brentwood to keep such prisoners for \$1.00, per day.

Rep. Murch moved the bill be referred to the Rules Committee for introduction into the House. The motion was duly seconded.

By hand vote the motion was adopted.

June 4, 1957

The Delegation held a public hearing at the State House, Concord in room 100 as of the above date. 31 members were present. Also present were Sheriff Frink, Commissioners Brown and Bartlett and George Hilton, Supt. Rockingham County Farm.

Sheriff Frink explained classification of prisoners. Misdemeanor - Felonies. Felonies cannot be handled at Brentwood without much additional expense for security, therefore this type of prisoner not wanted at Brentwood. Also the prison board feel, men bound over to high court should not be in same jail as one serving time for lesser sentence. Rep. Bisbee asked Frink whether the bill was just to cover a technicality. Sheriff Frink: Yes. Bill would cover contempt prisoners. Rep. Hunter, presented facts from budget committee. Jail acceptable for Federal prisoners by Federal inspectors. 6 counties now have "jails".

Sheriff Frink presented an amendment which would state that all prisoners other than "bound over" be sent to Brentwood.

Commissioner Bartlett spoke stating interest in all contempt and non-support cases etc. being sent to Brentwood, as a saving to the county. Mr. Rathbone moved, duly seconded, that the hearing be closed. By hand vote the motion was adopted.

The chairman announced executive session June 11, 1957.

Room 100, June 11, 1957

Rockingham County Delegation met for purpose of continued hearing on H. B. 425, as of above date at the State House, Concord, N. H. 36 members were present.

Mrs. Mary Dondero, vice-chairman, presided in the absence of the Chairman, George Shattuck.

Present also was County Commissioner, Ira Brown, and Mr. Rae Laraba. Mr. Laraba spoke in favor of the bill. The merit of the bill lies in the fact that it would make our present "House of Correction" designated as a "jail". Rep. Foote, questioned the effect of the amendment to the bill. Mr. Laraba stated; the amendment provides that all prisoners other than "bound-over" be held at Brentwood.

Rep. Nickerson, Rathbone, Eldridge and Dondero questioned further.

Rep. Mott, stated he felt that Mr. Laraba had stated facts contrary to what Sheriff Frink had testified to the delegation previously.

Rep. Foote raised the question of an amendment being offered to the delegation by a person other than a member. Rep. Palmer then rose to point of order and presented the amendment to the delegation.

Rep. Eldridge, favors receiving information from other counties.

Rep. Palmer, spoke in favor of the amendment.

Commissioner Ira Brown spoke, stating he is in favor of either the bill or the amendment.

Rep. Mott moved: Rep. Griffin seconded: That the hearing be continued at a date to be announced.

The motion was unanimously adopted.

Room 207 State House, HB297 — July 9, 1957 The delegation met as of the above date. 19 members were present. In the absence of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Clerk, Rep. Ferne Prescott presided and Rep. Lise Payette served as clerk.

The title of the bill was read: an act "relative to conveyance of land in Nottingham".

Rep. Perkins, Nottingham spoke in favor of the bill.

Rep. Douglas Scamman of Stratham, gave the history of the bill, and offered the suggestion that a subcommittee be appointed to further look into the matter.

Rep. Guy Nickerson, East Kingston, seconded Scamman's suggestion.

Rep. Broadjurst, Chairman Resources Recreational Committee favors further careful study of the matter.

Rep. Monahan, Hanover, favored the bill.

Mr. Wolcutt Elwell, Nottingham was strongly opposed, and favored thorough study of the area before taking any action on the bill.

Joseph Kelsey, Chairman of Selectmen, Nottingham, recommends the passage of the bill, with the Resources Committee working with the Town officials.

Meeting adjourned at 11:15.

Rep. Tenney, Chester spoke in opposition to accepting the new program.

Rep. Perkins moved, duly seconded, that the plan be effective January 1, 1958.

Rep. Rathbone moved, Rep. Eastman seconded, that the plan be adopted.

RECORDS OF BUILDING COMMITTEE

Brentwood, January 28th, 1957 at 3 p.m.

Attendance: Parmenter, Robinson, Dondero, Payette, Carter, Murch, Haigh, Sewall, Wardwell and Eastman of Exeter.

The building committee met at the County Farm in Brentwood for the purpose of discussing final details of the planned construction before closing the contract with the Harvey Construction Co. of Manchester, N. H.

Present at the meeting were: Mr. and Mrs. George Hilton, superintendents of County Home; Mr. Alfred T. Granger of Hanover, architect; Mr. Lester Billings, state hospital advisor; Mr. Paul Harvey, president of Harvey Construction Co.; County Commissioners Fuller, Brown, Bartlett, and 10 members of the committee.

Commissioner Fuller explained some figures in regards to the contract and gave us the following details:

Were present: the 3 Commissioners, Mr. and Mrs. George Hilton, Mr. Draper Parmenter, Mr. Frank A. Robinson, Mrs. Mary C. Dondero, Mr. Wm. J. Wardwell, Mr. Edwin Eastman and Mrs. Lise L. Payette.

Acting Chairman Robinson read some replies to letters sent to our 4 Representatives in Washington, asking for maximum financial help on our new Nursing Home, and Mrs. Dondero moves that the communications be placed on file, Mr. Wardwell seconds the motion.

The choice of a Clerk of the works is the next subject, the majority of the attendance highly recommends Mr.

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David Smith of Portsmouth, so Mrs. Dondero moves that he be recommended to the Commissioners. And it is a unanimous vote. And he will be paid \$20. a day.

Meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

Brentwood, February 15, 1957 The Building Committee met at the County Farm at the request of the County Commissioners, at 1 p.m.

Commissioner Fuller reported that the Hardware contract had been awarded to Dennison Co. for the amount of \$7,777.

Commissioner Brown reported that bonds will have to be sold this year, requiring \$3,000 additional for interest on bonds to this year's appropriation. Bonds will be sold in the amount of \$400,000.

The sewage disposal system was discussed. Comm. Brown told this Committee that the state engineer had recommended an entirely new system for the whole institution, called a trickling filter system. There is the possibility of 30 per cent federal participation. An estimate of \$25,000 to \$30,000 had been made for this system. There would be approximately \$9,000 from federal participation plus the \$10,000 allowed on the present contract with Harvey Construction Co., which would leave a balance of approximately \$10,000 to be taken from the \$859,000 appropriation for the new building. At this point it is moved by Mrs. Dondero and seconded by Mrs. Payette, that Mr. Granger make the drawing of the sewage disposal AND THE GENERAL CONTRACTOR complete the work with Mr. David Smith supervising. The motion is unanimously adopted.

Comm. Brown reported that the Commissioners had obtained an estimate of \$30,000 from Standard Plumbing & Heating Co. for a boiler just like that other two which are now in use. This work would be done entirely separate from the contract. The matter of obtaining bids on this project was discussed, and it was agreed that the Commissioners would put it out to bid. The Committee voted to stand as favorable to the Commissioners proceeding with getting bids on a new boiler and reporting back to the Committee.

Commissioner Fuller brought up the matter of purchasing a strip of land of Fred Herbert Taylor to provide roadway at the rear of the new building. Mr. Smith will lay it out while on the job here at the new building.

Comm. Bartlett brought up the matter of waiving bids on the kitchen equipment and giving the equipment directly to Humphreys Co. in Concord, N. H. Upon motion by Mrs. Dondero the Committee voted that the Commissioners and Mr. Hilton be given power to purchase the kitchen equipment. Mr. Bates of Humphreys Co. was then introduced and he showed the plans and kitchen equipment lay-out, including the dining-rooms, refrigeration and dish washing area.

The meeting of the Building Committee was adjourned and the Committee members went to view the site of the proposed sewage disposal system.

An informal meeting was then held where the Commissioners and Mrs. Hilton gave us a resume of what has been done so far in regards to the Fernald Home; we learned that the initial price of \$594,095.00 was changed to \$603,320.35 due to unexpected "musts", of which amount 30 per cent is anticipated in Federal Aid.

Then a motion was made by Henry S. Murch and seconded by Mary C. Dondero to "appoint a Committee of 3 to work with the 3 Commissioners and Mr. and Mrs. Hilton to formulate a dedication program for the Fernald Nursing Home, at the County Home in Brentwood". Motion was carried and the following were appointed: Draper Parmenter, Mary Dondero, Ernest Pinkham. The former Budget Chairman Mr. Robinson will serve exofficio and they will meet here on Aug. 28th.

At this point Mr. Hilton gave us a summary of the financial part: \$400,000 and \$200,000 was borrowed and the bills get paid as they come. Mr. Smith, our clerk of the work is highly praised by Mr. Hilton.

The members advised Mr. and Mrs. Hilton to purchase the necessary linens along with the furnishings.

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 71, Section 27, of the Revised Statutes Annotated, the biennial examination and audit of the accounts of Rockingham County has been made by the Division of Municipal Accounting of the State Tax Commission. The audit covered the fiscal years ended December 31, 1955 and December 31, 1956. Submitted herewith is the report of this audit including Exhibits as hereafter listed. The report is made up in three sections as follows:

Section I: Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1955 Section II: Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1956 Section III: Ten Year Statement of County Taxes Assessed, Net Debt and Bonded Debt SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of County Commissioners, County Treasurer, Clerk of the Superior Court and Superintendent of the County Home and Mitchell Memorial Hospital.

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FINANCIAL REPORTS

Comparative Balance Sheets:

December 31, 1954 - December 31, 1955 (Exhibit A) December 31, 1955 - December 31, 1956 (Exhibit I)

Comparative Balance Sheets for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1954-1955 and December 31, 1955-1956 are presented in Exhibits A and I, respectively. As indicated therein, the financial condition of the County changed from a Net Debt of \$14,578.51 to a Surplus of \$11,652.19 in 1955. In 1956, the Surplus increased by \$61,485.50, from \$11,652.19 to \$73,137.69.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition:

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1955 (Exhibit B) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1956 (Exhibit I)

Statements presenting an analysis of the factors which caused the change in financial condition of the County during the fiscal years ended December 31, 1955 and December 31, 1956, are included in Exhibits B and I, respectively.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues

Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1955 (Exhibits C & D) Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 1956 (Exhibits J & K)

In the fiscal year ended December 31, 1955, a revenue surplus of \$19,292.80, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$6,756.54, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$26,049.34.

A revenue surplus of \$50,703.07, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$6,896.72, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$57,599.79 in 1956.

Summaries of the receipts and expenditures of the County, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, for the fiscal years ended December 31, 1955 and 1956, are presented in Exhibits E and L-1, respectively.

ACCOUNTS OF COMMISSIONERS AND TREASURER

An examination was made of all orders issued by the Commissioners and Clerk of the Superior Court during

the periods under review. Supporting invoices and payrolls were likewise examined and the classification of expenditures noted. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1956, is indicated in Exhibit L-2.

CLERK OF THE SUPERIOR COURT

The financial accounts and records of the Clerk of the Superior Court of Rockingham County were examined. Court receipts were checked by source, insofar as possible, and found to be properly recorded. Court orders issued by the Clerk were supported by invoices, vouchers and payrolls bearing the approval of a Superior Court Justice.

COUNTY HOME AND HOSPITAL

The accounts and records of the Superintendent of the County Home and the Mitchell Memorial Hospital were examined. Receipts of the Home and Hospital were checked by source through the triplicate receipt forms. All receipts, as recorded in the cash book, were properly accounted for by the Superintendent through deposits in the bank to the credit of the County Treasurer's account.

Classified summaries of receipts and expenditures of the County Institutions for the years 1955 and 1956 are presented in Exhibits F and M, respectively.

BONDED INDEBTEDNESS

A statement of the bonded indebtedness of the County as of December 31, 1956, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit Q.

Conclusion:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, a copy of this report or a summary of its findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) should be published in the next annual report of the County. This letter of transmittal should be included in its entirety but the publication of Exhibits is optional.

The appreciation and thanks of this Division is hereby expressed to the officials of Rockingham County and their office staffs for the assistance rendered during the course of the audit.

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ROCKINGHAM COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE

Work is made possible through the cooperation of the United States Department of Agriculture, University of New Hampshire and Rockingham County. During the past the Rockingham County Farm Bureau (through its Executive Board) has been the recognized local official organization cooperating in a supervisory capacity. Commencing January 1st, 1958, the recognized cooperating group will be the "Rockingham County Cooperative Extension Service Council". This is in accordance with the following resolution passed at the last Rockingham County Convention as a memorandum of understanding with the Board of Trustees of the University of New Hampshire and signed by the President of the University of New Hampshire and the chairman of the Rockingham County Convention. To quote: "Be it resolved that with a view to continuing the policy of local guidance, the Board of Trustees of the University of New Hampshire and the Rockingham County Convention do hereby enter into an agreement to recognize the Rockingham County Extension Service Council as the sponsor of Extension work in said county and further recognize a Finance Committee of the Council to deal directly with the County Convention". The County Convention is represented by a member of said Council.

Brief reports of each agent, covering the highlights of the regular lines of work ie County Argicultural, County Forester, Home Demonstration and 4-H Club Work were formerly given in past Rockingham County Annual Reports. As suggested by a Delegation Budget Committee complete reports on Cooperative Extension Work have been omitted to save space and expense. Reports or information covering the work will gladly be supplied by your Extension Service Office.

The main office of the Rockingham County Extension Service is in the Masonic Block, 61 Water Street, Exeter, N. H. Five regular Extension Agents are employed for work in the county. Also since February 1st 1955 there has been an Assistant Agricultural Agent on a part time basis (one third time during the past year). County Agricultural Agent, James A. Purington, also holds office hours on Saturday mornings in the County Commissioner's Office, Adams Memorial Hall, Derry, N. H.

ROCKINGHAM COUNTY SOLICITOR'S REPORT

During the past year there has been a slight increase in the number of felonies committed in Rockingham County. A vast majority of them have been solved and respondents either entered pleas of guilty in Superior Court or received jury trials.

The merchants of the area continue to be plagued by worthless checks, many of which are being passed by professionals. These checks frequently appear to be payroll checks drawn by some local businessman, but are actually forgeries. The police are usually able to apprehend the offender but often not until many persons have been defrauded. The only protection is to refuse to cash checks for unknown persons.

I want to extend my thanks to all the law enforcement agencies in Rockingham County for their fine work and cooperation.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

January 31, 1958

To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners:

I am pleased to report to you that another year has passed without a homicide within the County. We have had one serious assault case and although the lessor felonies, consisting of breaking and entering and also larcenv by check have substantially increased during the past year. I am glad to be able to report that the greater part of these cases have been cleared up. In the case of car larceny, many cars were returned to their owners without injury, and the value of many stolen articles was made up through restitution or by the return of the goods taken. I am sorry to have to report that Rockingham County like many parts of the Country has also shown in increase in Juvenile delinquency. Many of the cases which we have been called upon to investigate have been found to involve teenagers from all types of homes. However through the years it has been a pleasure to note that many of these young offenders have later turned out to be worthwhile citizens and a credit to their community.

We are grateful to the Commissioners for the many improvements at the House of Correction, especially the new office and receiving room, together with the new filing system and the increased radio facilities and better radio coverage. Our radio system has so greatly improved during the past three years that we now have the most efficient coverage of any county in the State.

We regret the passing of the Honorable Richard E. Shute who was for many years our Judge of Probate and we extend our deepest sympathy to his widow and the family. We congratulate our Past Chief Justice Stephen M. Wheeler in his elevation to the Supreme Court; however at the same time we shall greatly miss his friendliness and advice in our Superior Court sessions. The above two mentioned vacancies have been filled by two of our finest young lawyers from the legal fraternity. Both of these men are from Rockingham County, which is of course most pleasing to all of us. I extend my best wishes to both of them and hope for many years of success and service for Judge Thomas J. Morris and Judge William Treat.

Our January term of Superior Court was presided over by Chief Justice John H. Leahy, followed in April by Judge William Keller, and in September by Judge George R. Grant, Jr. With these capable Judges presiding, many cases have been disposed of on our docket. I am grateful to our County Solicitor, Lindsey R. Brigham for his assistance and advice to my Deputies and to myself over the past year. I believe one of the main reasons for so small an amount of unsolved crime in our county at the present time, is due to the efficient prosecution by our Solicitor together with the prompt and efficient handling of cases by our Municipal and Superior Judges, whenever the prosecuting officers were ready to present their case. I am grateful to all town and county officers and to City Marshall Betz and his department of the city of Portsmouth; the various State departments and our Municipal Judges for their co-operation and valuable assistance at all times.

May I again remind you and the citizens of Rockingham County that my services and those of my deputies are yours for the asking at any time of day or night. Please feel free to call whenever assistance is needed, remember our slogan, "When in trouble call the Sheriff". I extend to my deputies my appreciation for their efforts and efficiency and I hereby submit my list of all Deputies for the year 1958.
