Article 7: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 7 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town.

ARTICLE 8 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 9: To see if the town will vote, pursuant to authority under RSA 80:42-a, to retain and hold all real property

located within the marshlands and to authorize the board of selectmen to sell all other tax title property, in the first instance to former owners of the property, or the grandparents, parents, children, and spouses of said former owner, for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertised sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the board of selectmen.

Article 10: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 249 of the Seabrook Code entitled Vehicles and Traffic as follows:

Amend chapter 249-17 to change parking on Atlantic Avenue from the east to the west side.

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton, Sr. to adopt Article 10 as read.
ARTICLE 10 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 11: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 249 of the Seabrook Code entitled Vehicles and Traffic as follows:

Amend chapter 249-24 by deleting the asterisk (*) after River Street to indicate that all parking is prohibited on that street year round.

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr. to adopt Article 11 as read.
ARTICLE 11 ADOPTED AS READ.

Article 12: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 249 of the Seabrook Code entitled Vehicles and Traffic by adding the following section and to renumber the chapter accordingly:

No person shall park any bus/trailer truck at the beach parking area north of the Warren West Memorial Building on Route 1A unless authorized by the selectmen for a special town event or activity.

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Motion by Asa H. Knowles Jr. second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr. to adopt Article 12 as read.

Amendment to article 12 by Charles Kaslow, second by Thomas Battles, by adding to the end of article. No person shall park any camper/camper trailer or mobile home at the beach parking area north of the Warren West building on Route 1A at any time without a town parking permit.

Article 13: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 249 of the Seabrook Code entitled Vehicles and Traffic as follows:

Amend chapter 249-18, section B, by deleting the word "issue" after "shall" in the first sentence and adding instead "have issued".

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr. adopt Article 13 as read.

Amendment to article 13 by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr., Amend chapter 249-18, section B, by adding "or designated agent" before the word "shall" in the first sentence. Amendment to article 13 adopted.

ARTICLE 13 ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

Article 14: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 254 of the Seabrook Code entitled Waste Disposal as follows:

Amend chapter -254-2, section B, by deleting the words "from the office of the Selectmen" after "obtained" and adding instead "at the Town Hall".

Amend chapter 254-2, section D, by changing it to read "All permits will be renewed annually in conjunction with motor vehicle registrations".

These amendments shall be effective upon passage.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton, Sr. adopt Article 14 as read.
ARTICLE 14 ADOPTED.

Article 15: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 254 of the Seabrook Code entitled Waste Disposal as follows:

Amend chapter 254 by adding the following section and to renumber the chapter accordingly:

254-5. Violations and penalties.

The following penalties are hereby imposed for violations of this article:

- A. Thirty (30) days loss of privilege for the use of the town waste transfer station, and for each subsequent violation twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars fine.
- B. Illegal entry and/or use of the town waste transfer station can result in arrest for criminal trespass (RSA 635-2).

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr., to adopt Article 15 as read.
ARTICLE 15 ADOPTED.

Article 16: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 249 of the Seabrook Code entitled Vehicles and Traffic as follows:

Amend Article III, Parking Restrictions, chapter 249-10, Violations and Penalties, A., by adding "at the owner's expense." after the word "towing" at the end of the section.

Amend Article II, Parking Restrictions, chapter 249-10, Violations and Penalties, B., by adding "if the parked vehicle impedes or interferes with proper public safety and traffic control" at the end of the section.

This amendment shall be effective upon passage.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr. to adopt Article 16 as read.

Motion to amend by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr. Correct the second section by changing ARTICLE II to ARTICLE III.

Amendment to article 16 adopted.
ARTICLE 16 ADOPTED AS AMENDED.

Article 17: To see if the town will vote to amend Chapter 152 of the Seabrook Code entitled Dogs as follows:

- 1. Amend section 152.12 by changing the word "dog" to the word "animal".
- 152-12. Animal bites.
- A. Whenever any animal bites a person, the owner of said animal shall immediately notify the chief of police, who shall order the animal held on the owner's premises or it shall be impounded for a period of two (2) weeks.

- B. The animal shall be examined immediately after it has bitten anyone and again at the end of the two-week period by a qualified veterinarian.
- C. If, at the end of the period of confinement, the veterinarian is convinced that the animal is free from rabies, the animal shall be released from quarantine or from the pound as the case may be. If the animal dies in the meanwhile, its head shall be sent to the State Department of Health for examination for rabies.
- 2. Amend section 152-3 by adding the categories of goat, fowl and swine.
 - 152-3. Running at large.

It shall be unlawful to permit any dog, goat, fowl or swine to run at large at any time.

- 3. Amend section 152-10 by adding the category of cat.
- 152-10. Redemption of impounded dogs or cats.

The owner or keeper of any dog or cat impounded hereunder may redeem the same by paying all assessed costs, charges and penalties that have accrued up to the time of making the redemption. A current cat or dog rabies vaccination certificate and a valid dog license must be shown at the time of redemption. When the above requirements are met, the dog or cat shall be released to its owner.

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr. to adopt Article 17 as read.
ARTICLE 17 ADOPTED.

Article 18: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of engineering, construction, land acquisition and studies associated with the ongoing plans for the construction of municipal sewers and pumping stations, road reconstruction, drainage improvements and appurtenances related thereto, and for the funding of eminent domain procedures as necessary for land takings, and to appoint the selectmen as agents for the town for the purposes of expending said funds.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Motion by Elizabeth A. Thibodeau, second by Ivan Q. Eaton Sr. to adopt Article 18 as read.
ARTICLE 18 ADOPTED.

Article 19: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars as the total cost of a Coastal Zone Management (CZM) grant, to apply for Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.00) Dollars from the state and federal government as the fifty (50%) percent match to the above grant. The purpose of said funds and grant monies are for restoration of the foredunes at Seabrook Beach in accordance with the proposed study entitled "Environmental Assessment for the Seabrook Dune Improvement Project", dated September, 1988; and to authorize the selectmen to carry out said project.

(Recommended by the Budget committee)

- Beach residents are issued 2 window placards per living unit (including rentals) which allows parking for up to 2 vehicles on the north sides of the streets between Route 1A and Atlantic Ave. An additional beach resident sticker is necessary, however, for admission to the transfer station or to park at the town pier.

- The transfer station is open weekdays 8am to 3:30pm. Brush and metal are accepted Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday and Sunday from 8am to 12pm. Commercial dumping is prohibited on Saturday and Sunday.

SELECTMEN/TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT - 1993

In 1993 we saw the implementation of many projects, such as, the sewer project; the dunes restoration project; the Sanborn School restoration; the recreation/police building additions; and the voluntary recycling program.

The sewer construction project was started in May 1993, with contract number 1. Contract numbers 2,3,4 and 7 have now been bid and awarded. We have started construction of the waste water treatment plant on Wrights Island, which is scheduled to be completed by the fourth quarter of 1995.

The 1st phase of the dunes restoration project was completed this August, which included the streets of Hudson through Andover. The final phase, which will include all streets south of Andover Street, is scheduled to start the spring of 1994.

The Sanborn School project entails restoring this historical building by adding a new foundation, refurbishing the interior including new windows, electricity and heat. The building will be used by the Rockingham County Community Action Program, which provides assistance to many town residents.

We implemented an interim recycling program to meet regulatory requirements; otherwise, we would no longer be able to transport our waste to the Ogden Martin facility in Haverhill, Massachusetts. We are asking for your support at this year's town meeting to institute a complete recycling program.

The cable television franchise committee met several times to receive and address concerns about the cable television service and to review terms for a new contract. In 1994, several more meetings will be held, as the existing contract expires in 1995.

We would like to thank all of the town's varying board/committee members for volunteering their time and energy. It is dedicated residents such as these that help make Seabrook a great place to live and work.

ASSESSING DEPARTMENT

The town's largest taxpayer, North Atlantic Energy Corp., remains about 85% of the total valuation of the total town for tax purposes. In other words, out of every dollar that the town spends, the utility pays .85 cents and the remainder of the town pays .15 cents.

The State of New Hampshire has been pushing for a long time to take over the valuation process of the Utilities from the town, and set the valuations at the state level without the town having any "SAY" in the matter. They presently have a Senate bill in the Legislature to do this. If successful with this "BILL" Seabrook will immediately loose \$ 700,000,000 in valuation reduction to the utility benefit from the state.

OTHER TOWN VALUATION:

For this year (1993) revaluation, most properties either remained the same or in some cases saw a slight decrease in valuation.

We expect to see greater market activity for 1994, but this activity will produce very slight market increases, if any. The recession remains to repress property values.

1994 PROJECTS UNDERWAY:

Projects for the department are as follows: Computerization of map plan file; updating property card photo's; New street numbering system for the EMERGENCY 911 SYSTEM.





BUILDINGS INSPECTOR'S REPORT - 1993

1993 was a very active year for the Building Department with commercial activity leading the way. Southgate Plaza was completely renovated with Market Basket expanding their operation. A Burger King has been built and a Woodworker's Supply building is being constructed west of Route 95. There were also several municipal projects started this year. The Library construction is under way and the sewer plant has broken ground. Additions have been made to the Police Station and the Recreation Building.

New residential building was down this year and only nine new living units were added. I expect this to turn around in the coming year with three new subdivisions approved, adding thirty four lots available for construction.

The Planning Board has proposed several changes in the definitions of the Zoning Ordinance to clean up ambiguous language that now exist. They have also proposed to add day care, mixed uses and reduce the set back for sheds under one hundred square feet to two feet side and rear. A parking formula for commercial lots has also been proposed.

The event was a great success, thanks to the many volunteers. We would especially like to thank the fire, police and highway departments for their invaluable assistance and advice.

With the coming of sewerage to Seabrook we will begin to experience a great deal of pressure to grow here at the beach. We hope that we as a precinct can moderate that tendency with an eye to maintaining the family character that is rapidly becoming unique to Seabrook Beach.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT - ANNUAL REPORT - FOR 1993

The town had a problem with water in the gasoline at our refueling station. This was rectified by raising the fill pipes approximately 16". Eight barrels of water and gas had to be sent out of State for hazardous materials disposal.

A new radio was purchased and installed for the Town Manager.

The Recreation Center opened for emergency sheltering a couple of times this past year. Sand bags were issued out to residents who requested them during the high water problems.

This office purchased a new copy machine and turned in the two old ones that were no good.

I spoke at the American Legion to the citizens of Stoneybrook Park at their request regarding hurricane preparedness. Roy Neider of the N.H.E.M.O. also assisted.

There have been several hazardous material spills in town and all were handled properly by experts of hazardous material clean up crews.

The Dive Team has been activated several times this year regarding rescue situations and training sessions.

This office drafted the bids for the generator and new windows for the town office, both projects have been completed.

This office is still looking for two responsible persons to be involved with the emergency response plan, to be trained by the New Hampshire Emergency Management Office. They would represent the town of Seabrook during any radiological emergency incident.

Again, I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen, Town Manager, Fire Chief, Police Chief, Water Superintendent, Road Agent, and all The Emergency Responders and volunteers that assist in making this office of our Town Government a success.

FIRE DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1993

With your support and cooperation the Fire Department was able to purchase and receive delivery this year of a 1993-75ft. ladder/pumper which arrived in July, 5,000 ft. of 4-inch large diameter hose and 2 defibrillators for the ambulances. All of this was done to update and improve the skills of the Department to better serve you the townspeople. Our thanks go out to you.

Educational programs being conducted or taken by the personnel of the fire department are as follows:

E.M.S. training on a monthly basis as required by law, monthly drills for the call and reserve firefighters, air brake seminar held in Rochester, N.H. and taken by the department's mechanic Captain Clarence Fowler. A dispatch seminar was held in Concord, N.H. and was taken by reserve firefighter Daniel Melican. Career level training started in December and will run until April/May of 1994. This is Advanced Firefighting Techniques training that is being made available to all interested Seabrook Firefighters and is being taught by firefighter Jeffrey Brown.

Safety classes and "Learn not to Burn" programs are ongoing at the Seabrook Elementary School conducted by firefighter Harold Hewlett. As a result of the program a commendation was given to Krystal Coffey a Seabrook Elementary School student who we believe saved the lives of at least three people by knowing what to do when a fire occurred at Park Place apartments on March 31, 1993. This proves to me that although education is costly, ignorance can be very expensive.

Captain Ronald Eaton Jr. and firefighter Everett Strangman have headed up the Fire Prevention Office this past year with fire code enforcement among many other details.

The first of what will hopefully be an annual event was the community bon-fire in July. This was located at the Hooksett Street beach exit overseen by the Fire Department and headed up by Timothy Willis, and Thomas Battles. My thanks to them.

Three years ago we started an "Open House" annual event here at the Fire Station for the public to come in and see what their Fire Department is about. There were 67 in attendance this past year, and we would like to see more townspeople attend. The event is usually held the first Sunday in March. We hope to see you.

A reminder to all residents, check your smoke detectors at least on a monthly basis, they do save lives and property.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT REPORT - 1993

The sewer project finally got under way in 1993. The Health Department has been very busy this year working with the Sewer Easement Committee obtaining easements for the sewer. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of those who have granted these easements and for their help in moving the project along.

Eighteen clam samples were taken from the middle ground and Common Island flats in 1993. These samples were tested for fecal coliform and total coliform count. These are indicators of pollution in the water. The results showed the count of fecal coliform to be well below the allowed number set by New Hampshire Public Health. The total coliform count was slightly higher than the number allowed by Public Health. Total coliform included all of the natural decaying matter in the water. The State has doubled their testing and are now taking samples on Common Island and the middle ground to see if these two areas can be opened to digging in the near future.

BROWN LIBRARY Annual Report 1993

Nineteen ninety-three was a most significant year for Brown Library in that construction was begun on the new Library. Bids were opened on June 17 and the contract was soon awarded to Barletta Engineering Corporation. A most impressive groundbreaking ceremony was held on September 9 which was extremely well attended by many local dignitaries and townspeople. A second gift of land was then generously donated to the Library by Stanley A. Hamel in order to complete the site and to provide a buffer between the new building and the railroad. By the end of the year, the foundation, piers, and the driveway/parking lot were completed.

In matters other than construction, the Library had a relatively quiet year. Patronage stood at 13,821 visits and circulation was 19,870 items. The total number of registrations reached 3,423 with 349 new patrons having been registered during the year. The Library continued to strive to fulfill its mission to "ensure that the people of the Town of Seabrook have the right and means to free and open access to information and ideas".

The Children's Room held a successful summer reading program entitled "Ketchup (Catch-Up) On Your Reading" and the year-long schedule of story hour programs was held as usual. There were 152 children's programs given resulting in an attendance figure of 1,765. The Library sponsored a booth at Seabrook's Old Home Days which this year again consisted of its popular annual book sale. The Friends of Brown Library again sold glow necklaces during the evening portion of Old Home Days and were financially successful with the project. Thanks are due to Denise Favaloro, Chairperson of the Friends, Todd Favaloro and Janice Lambert for their efforts. The monthly Book Discussion Group also continued unabated, still preferring to meet on Tuesdays at dinnertime in local restaurants. The group did alter its traditional approach for a several-month-long series of programs, funded by the New Hampshire Humanities Council, led by visiting scholar Holly Perrault which met in the Library.

For Brown Library, then, nineteen ninety-three was a year both of anticipation and of holding its own. Next year, nineteen ninety-four, should prove monumental since occupancy of the new building is slated for late July - early August. Until then, visit the old Library - see how much it has to offer now, and check out its future plans. Hours are: Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 12:00 PM (noon) - 8:00 PM; Tuesday, Thursday, 10:00 AM - 6:00 PM; Saturday, 9:00 AM - 1:00 PM (note no Saturday hours during July and August). 1993 MOSQUITO CONTROL year end report

Due to the heavy snowfall in March, most mosquito breeding sites were not free of snow until mid- April. After preliminary paperwork and interviews had been completed, field began on April 19th with surveillance and Larviciding (treating the aquatic larval stages of the mosquito) of inland 'snow-melt' breeding sites. The melting snow along with heavy April rains, 5.85", led to very numerous inland breeding sites this sorioo.

Brian Felch was hired to do stream clearance work (debris is cleared from stream beds and culverts to help eliminate stagnant water areas where mosquitos can breed). Adrian Szymura began work on May 3rd as the Field Assistant. Salt marsh breeding site treatments (larviciding) began on May 10th and continued after each lunar 'flood' tide which would activate these areas (one and sometimes two weeks every month

throughout the summer).

Inland freshwater work continued through May but became less of a problem as the season progressed due to the unusually dry summer. Only 0.88" of rain fell in May and only 11.20" fell for the whole 5 month (April-Aug.) mosquito control season. The average rainfall

for that period is 20.16".

The weekly adult mosquito population monitoring (accomplished using CDC light traps baited with CO₂) showed this to be true. After mid-July, only 15% or less of the samples identified were freshwater species. The two salt marsh species, Aedes cantator and A. sollicitans (daylight biter) showed peak populations the weeks following the monthly (sometimes bi-monthly) lunar flooding tides. Particularly the weeks of July 12th, Aug. 2nd and Aug. 30th were very high for these species.

Adulticiding (evening spraying for flying adult mosquitos using the spray truck) was done on 43 different nights between June 7th and Sept. 14th. The Town is divided into three sections (evenings) for better coverage during the peak feeding time for adult mosquitos (few hours after sunset). Each section (West, Central, South) of town was completed at least 12 times this summer.

Using a Highway Dept. truck, 98 greenhead fly traps were placed along the perimeter of the salt marshes. These vicious-biting fly are attracted and trapped in the traps where they die of dehydration. Thousands are caught in every trap.

About sixty percent of the recommendations can be implemented without budget increases. Many of these have already or we are in the process of implementing. The remaining will be reflected in the budget either this year or in future years.

We feel that the study, for the most part, was a fair and comprehensive insight into the department. The changes recommended were not serious flaws in the department workings but more updating and upgrading of the department's administration and operations.

We have a crime prevention program and will be glad to come to homes or businesses to conduct surveys to prevent illegal entrys.

Remember our Crime Line Telephone number is 474-2640. This is an untaped line that calls will be taken on, for any information that can assist the police in apprehension of criminals or preventing crimes.

Thanks to all the residents who have been helpful throughout the year in supporting the police officers and the department. I welcome any input from the citizens in aiding the department to improve in any way.

I would also like to commend my staff for the professional and astute way in which they handled all investigations from the very minor to the more serious, and the way in which all duties were performed within the department. It is with pride that I acknowledge each individual in the department. Thank you for another successful year.

ARTICLE XV
SEXUALLY ORIENTED BUSINESSES

SECTION 1. PURPOSE AND INTENT

It is the purpose of this article to establish reasonable and uniform regulations to prevent the concentration of sexually oriented businesses within the Town of Seabrook; and, it is the intent to promote the

health, safety and general welfare of the citizens of the Town of Seabrook; and, it is the intent of this article that the regulations be utilized to prevent problems of blight and deterioration which accompany and are brought about by the concentration of sexually oriented businesses; and, the provisions of this amendment have neither the purpose nor the effect of imposing limitation or restriction on the content of any communicative materials, including sexually oriented materials; and, it is not the intent nor effect of this article to restrict or deny access by adults to sexually oriented materials protected by the First Amendment, or to deny access by the distributors and exhibitors of sexually oriented entertainment to their intended market; and, neither is it the intent nor effect of this article to condone or legitimize the distribution of obscene material.

SECTION 2. PERMITTED LOCATIONS

Sexually oriented businesses shall only be permitted in Zone 2 provided all regulations, requirements and restrictions pertaining to that zone are met, and sexually oriented businesses shall not be permitted within 1,000 feet of a church or place of worship, parish house or convent, a public, parochial or private school, a state approved day care center, another sexual oriented business, a sexually oriented business for which a building permit has been applied for, or 300 feet from a residence, or 500 feet from any establishment in which minors constitute more than 50% of the patrons or 500 feet from public sports, recreation park or 500 feet from Town boundaries or 500 feet from buildings owned by the Town of Seabrook and operated for government use.

SECTION 3. MEASURE OF DISTANCE

The measure of distance between any sexually oriented business and other named point of reference shall be measured in a straight line.

SECTION 4. SITE PLAN APPROVAL

Site Plan Approval by the Seabrook Planning Board shall be a prerequisite for the establishment of a sexually oriented business. The Planning Board may impose reasonable restrictions relative to buffers, outdoor lighting, signs, parking, egress and ingress, pedestrian movement, landscaping, building aesthetics, and measures to ensure that displays of merchandise conform with NH RSA 571-B.

SECTION 5. NON CONFORMING SEXUALLY ORIENTED BUSINESSES

Sexually oriented businesses which have been established at their existing locations prior to the

effective date of this ordinance and which are not in conformity with the requirements of this ordinance, may continue to operate. Once established in a permitted location under this ordinance, a sexually oriented business operating as a conforming use is not rendered a nonconforming use by the subsequent location of:

- i) A church or place of worship, parish house or convent within 1,000 feet;
- ii) A state approved day care center within 1,000 feet;
- iii) A public sports, recreation park within 500 feet;
- iv) A residence within 300 feet
- v) A public, parochial or private school within 1,000 feet;
- vi) Any establishment in which minors constitute more than 50% of the patrons within 500 feet; or
- vii) The location within 500 feet of such business or buildings owned by the Town of Seabrook and operated for government use.

SECTION 6. PUBLIC NUISANCE PER SE

Violation of the use provisions of this ordinance is declared to be a public nuisance per se, which shall be abated by the Town by way of civil abatement procedures.

SECTION 7. LIMITING CLAUSE

Nothing in this ordinance is intended to authorize, legalize or permit the establishment operation or maintenance of any business, building or use which violates any Town of Seabrook ordinance or statute of the State of New Hampshire regarding public nuisances, sexual conduct, lewdness, or obscene or harmful matter or the exhibition or public display thereof.

SECTION 8. SEVERABILITY

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or any portion of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not effect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The legislative body of the Town of Seabrook hereby declares that it would have adopted this ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections,

subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases or portions be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

2. Add the following definitions to Article II of the Town of Seabrook Zoning Ordinance:

Establishment: means and includes any of the following
for the purposes of Article XV only:

- The opening or commencement of any sexually oriented business as a new business;
- 2) The conversion of an existing business whether or not a sexually oriented business, to any sexually oriented business;
- 3) The relocation of any sexually oriented business;
- 4) The substantial enlargement of a sexually oriented business, which means the increase in floor areas occupied by the business by more than 25%, as a floor area exists on the date of the adoption of this ordinance; or
- 5) The transfer of ownership or control of a sexually oriented business, which means and includes any of the following:
 - A) the sale, lease, or sublease of the business;
 - B) the transfer of securities which constitute a controlling interest in the business, whether by sale, exchange or similar means;
 - C) the establishment of a trust, gift or other similar legal device which transfers the ownership or control of the business, except for transfer by bequest or other operation of law upon the death of the person possessing the ownership or control.

<u>Sexually Oriented Business:</u> any place of business in which any of the following activities are conducted:

- 1) Adult Bookstore or Adult Video Store: A business that devotes more than 15% of the total display, shelf, rack, table, stand or floor area, utilized for the display and sale of the following:
 - A) books, magazines, periodicals, or other printed matter, or photographs, films, motion

pictures, video cassettes, slides, tapes, records, CD-ROMs or other forms of visual or audio representations which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1, or,

B) instruments, devices, or paraphernalia which are designed for use in connection with "sexual conduct" as defined in NH RSA 571-B:1, other than birth control devices.

An adult bookstore or adult video store does not include an establishment that sells books or periodicals as an incidental or accessory part of its principal stock and trade and does not devote more than 15% of the total floor area of the establishment to the sale of books and periodicals.

- establishment with a capacity of five or more persons, where for any form of consideration, films, motion pictures, video cassettes, slides or similar photographic reproductions are shown, and in which a substantial portion of the total presentation time is devoted to the showing of material which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1, for observation by patrons. For the purposes of this ordinance, substantial portion of the total presentation time shall mean the presentation of films or shows described above for viewing on more than seven days within any 56 consecutive day period.
- 3) Adult Motion Picture Arcade: Any place to which the public is permitted or invited wherein coin or slug operated or electronically, electrically or mechanically controlled still or motion picture machines, projectors, or other image producing devices are maintained to show images to five or fewer persons per machine at any one time, in which a substantial portion of the total presentation time of the images so displayed is devoted to the showing of material which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.
- 4) Adult Drive-In Theater: An open lot or part thereof, with appurtenant facilities, devoted primarily to the presentation of motion pictures, films, theatrical productions and other forms of visual productions, for any form of consideration to persons in motor vehicles or on outdoor seats, in which a substantial portion of the total presentation time being presented for observation by patrons is devoted to the showing of material which meets the definition

of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

- 5) Adult Cabaret: A nightclub, bar, restaurant, or similar establishment which during a substantial portion of the total presentation time features live performances which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1, and/or feature films, motion pictures, video cassettes, slides or other photographic reproductions, a substantial portion of the total presentation time of which is devoted to showing of material which meets the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.
- 6) Adult Motel: A motel or similar establishment offering public accommodations for any form of consideration which provides patrons with closed circuit television transmissions, films, motion pictures, video cassettes, slices or other photographic reproductions a substantial portion of the total presentation time of which are distinguished or characterized by an emphasis upon the depiction of materials which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.
- 7) Adult Theater: A theater, concert hall, auditorium or similar establishment, either indoor or outdoor in nature, which for any form of consideration, regularly features live performances, a substantial portion of the total presentation time of which are distinguished or characterized by an emphasis on activities which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.
- 8) Nude Model Studio: A place where a person who appears in a state of nudity or displays male genitals in a state of sexual arousal and/or the vulva or more intimate parts of the female genitals, and is observed, sketched, drawn, painted, sculptured, photographed, or similarly depicted by other persons who pay money or any form of consideration or such display is characterized by an emphasis on activities which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.
- 9) Sexual Encounter Center: A business or commercial enterprise that as one of its primary business purposes, offers for any form of consideration:

- A) physical contact in the form of wrestling or tumbling between persons of the opposite sex;
- B) activities between male and female persons and/or persons of the same sex when one or more persons is in the state of nudity; and
- C) when the activities in sections A or B above are characterized by an emphasis on activities which meet the definition of "harmful to minors" and/or "sexual conduct" as set forth in NH RSA 571-B:1.

Article 9: Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows? (Amending the definition under the Flood Plains Development Article.)

Add the following definition to the Seabrook Code and renumbering the Sections of that Code accordingly: "Recreational Vehicle" means a vehicle which is (a) built on a single chassis; (b) 319 square feet or less when measured at the largest horizontal projection; (c) designed to be self-propelled or permanently towable by a light duty truck; and (d) designed primarily not for use as a permanent dwelling, but as temporary living quarters for recreational, camping, travel or seasonal use.

(Recommended by the Planning Board (On the Official Ballot)

Article 10: Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows? (Amending the Flood Plains Development Article.)

Add the following to the Town of Seabrook Code and renumbering the sections of that Code accordingly: "Recreational Vehicles placed on sites within Zones A1-30, AH, and AE shall either (i) be on the site for fewer than 180 days, (ii) be fully licensed and ready for highway use; or (iii) meet all standards of section 60.3 (b) (1) of the National Flood Insurance Program

Regulations and the elevation and anchoring requirements for "manufactured homes" in Paragraph (c) (6) of Section 60.3.

(Recommended by the Planning Board) (On the Official Ballot)

Article 11: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

In Article II, add a new Section 263-14 to read as follows:

Minimum Parking Requirements: No structure shall be erected, nor shall any non-residential land use be established unless adequate off-street parking, loading, and unloading space is provided. The minimum parking requirements are as follows:

Retail Business:

Offices:

Eating & Drinking Establishments and Places of Public Assembly:

Motels & Hotels

1 space per 250 sq. ft. of floor area
1 space per 200 sq. ft. of floor area
1 space for every 3
seats, plus 1 space for each employee
1 space for each sleeping room, plus 1 space for every 2 employees

Minimum Parking Lot Dimensions: Every parking space shall be a minimum of 10 feet in width and 18 feet in length. Travel lanes within parking lots shall be a minimum of 24 feet in width.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)
(On the Official Ballot)

Article 12: Shall the municipality approve the Charter Amendment reprinted below?

To amend the Seabrook Home Rule Charter, Article II, C-35. Public safety., A. Police., by deleting that section and replacing it so that the section will read as follows:

C-35. Public safety.

A. Police. The Town Police Department will continue in its present form, operating with all powers authorized to local law enforcement agencies under State law. The Chief will be chosen in a manner set forth in the Town By-Laws. The Chief of Police shall reside within the town during his employment and all other department employees shall reside within a 15 air mile radius of the Town of Seabrook during the period of their employment. The Chief and the employees hired after

January 1, 1984 shall be allowed up to twelve months to comply with this provision, from date of employment.

(On the Official Ballot)

Article 13: Shall we adopt an exemption for the totally and permanently disabled? The exemption, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers shall be \$20,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years and own and occupy the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by a spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of not more than \$10,000.00 or, if married, a combined net income of not more than \$12,000.00; and own net assets not in excess of \$70,000.00 excluding the value of the person's residence.

(To be Voted on By Ballot)

Article 14: Shall the town accept the provision of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes?

Article 15: Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governments unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year?

Article 16: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to accept gifts of personal property which may be offered to the town for any public purpose, pursuant to RSA 31:95-e. The selectmen must hold a public hearing before accepting such gift, and the acceptance shall not bind the town to raise, appropriate, or expend any public funds for the operation, maintenance, repair, or replacement of any such personal property.

Article 17: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to accept, on behalf of the town, gifts, legacies, and devises made to the town in trust for any public purpose, as permitted by RSA 31:19.

Article 18: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen to sell at public auction or by advertised sealed bids such town property as is no longer used by the town, with sale conditional upon restrictions satisfactory to the town.

Article 19: To see if the town will vote to authorize the board of selectmen indefinitely, pursuant to RSA 80:42-a, indefinitely, until such authority is specifically rescinded, to

retain and hold all tax lien and tax deed property located within the marshlands and to authorize the board of selectmen to sell all other tax lien and tax property, in the first instance to former owners of the property, or the grandparents, parents, children, and spouses of said former owner, for a sum not less than the outstanding taxes owed plus accrued interest to the date of tax deed; or failing such sale, then by advertised sealed bids or public auction, at the discretion of the board of selectmen.

Article 20: Delegation of Authority to Board of Selectmen for Acceptance of Streets. To see if the town will vote to authorize a delegation of authority pursuant to RSA 674:40-a to the board of selectmen to accept dedicated streets without further vote of town meeting.

Article 21: Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year?

Article 22: Hazardous Materials Ordinance. Shall the Town of Seabrook adopt a hazardous materials ordinance pursuant to the authority set forth in RSA 31:39, RSA 41:11, RSA 47:17, VII and RSA 154 and repeal, to the extent it is inconsistent with this proposed ordinance, Chapter 177 of the Code of the Town of Seabrook?

This ordinance proposes to adopt a new ordinance which is consistent with changes in state law. This ordinance specifically provides that a person who creates a hazardous materials incident is responsible for the cost of clean-up, which may include not only materials but labor expended by town personnel and by personnel of other communities in cleaning up such an incident.

Article 23: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of engineering, construction, land acquisition and studies associated with the ongoing plans for the construction of municipal sewers and pumping stations, road reconstruction, drainage improvements and appurtenances related thereto, and for the funding of eminent domain procedures as necessary for land takings, and to appoint the selectmen as agents for the town for the purposes of expending said funds.

(Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 24: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000.00) Dollars as

the total cost of a Coastal Zone Management (CZM) grant, to apply for Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars from the state and federal government as the fifty (50%) percent match to the above grant. The purpose of said funds and grant monies are for a study of Seabrook Beach erosion/long term viability of the area north of Hooksett Street to the harbor channel; and to authorize the selectmen to carry out said project.

(Recommended by the Board of Selectmen) (Recommended by the Budget Committee)

Article 25: To see if the town is in favor of pursuing a change in the dividing line between the towns of Seabrook and Hampton from its present location to the thread of the stream known as the Hampton River and the mouth of the river known as the Hampton Harbor Inlet; and to authorize the selectmen to seek this change of town boundaries through our representatives to the legislature.

Article 26: To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty-eight Thousand One Hundred Fifty-one (\$68,151.00) Dollars for the cost of Seabrook's contribution to sixteen (16) human service agencies in the seacoast area. A breakdown of each human service agency's request is as follows:

- C) If the board of selectmen and the town manager shall determine that there has been less than 80% of said compliance, then this ordinance shall become mandatory. Notice of such determination shall be published in a local newspaper.
- D) Should the town's recycling program become mandatory the town may refuse to pick up or have picked up the rubbish of single generators who do not separate the recyclables.

E) Any person, firm or corporation being convicted of violating any provision of this ordinance shall receive a written warning for the first violation, be fined \$100.00 for the second violation, \$200.00 for the third violation, and \$300.00 for each subsequent violation thereafter.

During 1993, the Recreation Commission and staff provided many of the same popular programs and leisure services for Seabrook residents of all ages. A few additional activities were added to the 1993 general program plan, in celebration of the Town's 225th Anniversary.

Projects and changes were kept to a minimum since plans were made to add space to the Community Center's storage plan. The new storage addition was started in October of 1993, but was not completed by December, therefore had to be continued into 1994. New equipment was purchase for a few programs which included: 12 durable preschool chairs for preschool activities; six sewing machines for adult and teen sewing and craft programs; a karaoke system for dances and special events; a dual cassette player used for dances & rollerskating events and as a portable P.A. system; and a Concept Two Rower for the Center's exercise room.

PARK COMMISSIONERS' REPORT - 1993

We would like to begin this report by offering our condolences to the family of George "Buddy" Ross. Buddy served the Seabrook Parks Department for four years. He was in charge of the lights for the men's softball and baseball at the veterans' park. He also performed custodial duties at both parks. Buddy passed away on June 10, 1993. He will be greatly missed by all who knew him: family, friends and co-workers.

We got off to a slow start in 1993, due to the snow falls we received in late March and April. With some hard work and a lot of hustling around, the fields were made available by May, in time for the Seabrook little leagues' softball, baseball and t-ball season. Along with our daily duties of maintaining the two parks (Veterans & Governor Weare), we have also maintained the grounds at the South Meeting House, Brown Library, Seabrook Recreation, Town Hall and various other commons throughout the town.

The following is a list of new accomplishments within the Parks Department for 1993: The updating of the honor rolls and completion of the four new war memorials commemorating the veterans that were killed in action - James Watts, located at the north end of Washington Street; Woodrow Eaton, located on Causeway Street; Herbert Lord, located on South Main Street; at the corner of Adams Avenue; and Daniel Janvrin, located at the west end of Collins Street. We have installed protective fences in front of the dugout areas at both fields to better protect the players and coaches from foul balls and loose bats. We have also planted new grass in areas that were once dried and dusty. We have painted fences, curbings, dugouts, guard rails, etc. Concrete has been placed in areas that were either cracked or weather damaged. Flag poles have been added to areas, and replaced where needed.

We have had some vandalism this year, but with the Park Commissioners policing some of our own areas, we believe it has helped in preventing the abundance of vandalism as it was in prior years.

We have had many new successes these past three years, but we also feel that there is always room for growth, i.e., the addition of neighborhood playgrounds, basketball courts, park benches, picnic areas and modern restrooms at Governor Weare Park. More importantly, we would like to complete the war memorials, commemorating the four remaining veterans that were killed in action: Douglas Souther, Jr., Ananias Janvrin, Edward Wilson and James Dirsa.

SOLID WASTE/RECYCLING COMMITTEE REPORT - 1993

This has been a very busy year for the committee, as we have concentrated on developing plans for a recycling program and new transfer station. We have a contract with Ogden Martin in Haverhill, MA. for another 10 years, at a very good tipping rate.

The State of Massachusetts has passed legislation, which requires that all communities that dispose waste in Massachusetts <u>must</u> have a recycling program. The program must include, as of April 1994: paper, plastics, aluminum/steel cans and glass. We initiated an interim program this summer and distributed recycling bins this fall.

At the March 1994 town meeting, we will be asking you to approve both a recycling program and a new transfer station. Described below is a breakdown of the warrant article capital costs and operating budget for a town operated system:

The present transfer station operation is unsafe and inefficient. We need to prepare for the future by constructing a new building with a tipping floor and facilities for a compactor. The legislation/regulation of solid waste is becoming ever more complicated and restrictive, which means we need a facility that is flexible, safe and capable of efficiently handling all types of waste.

ROAD AGENT'S REPORT - 1993

We spent a lot of time on the maintenance of the public works' building, roads, cemeteries, beaches and vehicles. The highway crew has been busy assisting other departments where necessary to make the sewer line construction more efficient. It is very important that everyone work together - town departments, sewer construction, residents, etc., for the next several years in order that this project be completed as soon as possible.

Repair work was started at the town boat ramp, which will make the launching of boats for both fishermen and recreation more efficient and convenient. We plan to finish in March or April.

A considerable amount of time was spent on the maintenance of the cemeteries. The town has contracted with a surveyor to review the Hillside Cemetery to provide an accurate layout.

Because of the increase in illegal dumping and the added expense for hauling our waste away, the attendants at the transfer station have been doing a more extensive check on people using this facility. I realize that this at times has been an inconvenience to some of our residents, but as a result of this procedure our revenues from town commercial businesses have increased and our hauling expense has decreased. I would like to commend the transfer station attendants for a job well done!

The highway crew assisted in the placement of a gas line which was necessary to operate the generator at the town hall. The gas line installed was large enough for future use in the event of a heating system conversion from electric to natural gas in the town hall building.

Recycling has had a very demanding effect on the highway crew's time. Considering the limited amount of funds with which we have had to work, I believe that the volunteer program was a success. I would like to thank the residents for their help and patience throughout this project. The town is in the process of preparing a warrant article to develop a full recycling program for 1994 on. Hopefully, with the passage of this article, it will help us to service your recycling needs more efficiently.

SEWER PROJECT REPORT - 1993

The Sewer Project is on schedule with the plant to be operational by the 4th quarter of 1995.

We have awarded five contracts, #1, #2, #3, #4 and #7. The remainder of the contracts are scheduled for bid and awarding by the 4th quarter of 1994. Contract #1 is 90% completed, Contracts #3 & #4 are in the early stages of construction and Contracts #2 & #7 have been awarded and will begin construction in the early spring of 1994.

A sewer easement committee was formed to work with the property owners on obtaining easements. The members include: Local Businessman Bruce Brown, Water Superintendent Warner Knowles. Building Inspector Robert Moore and Town Manager E. Russell Bailey. Meetings were held regularly with Project Manager John Dold, Project Attorney Cary Holmes and Randy Jones of Jones & Beach to discuss the progress of the signing of the sewer easements.

The Committee worked most of the year obtaining easements for Contract #7 at the Beach. Committee members Robert Moore and Bruce Brown made personal contact with the property owners at the beach to obtain these easements and due to their continuous efforts, on behalf of the Town, construction will begin this spring.

In September, the easement committee began working on obtaining easements for Contract #2 & #8. A public meeting was held on September 23, 1993, to discuss in further details the sewer project and to answer any questions and address any concerns that the public might have. A Route 1 business advisory group, made up of different owners and business people, was formed to assist the town in informing fellow businessmen and property owners of the easement requirements. Our thanks go out to these individuals who volunteered their time for this project.

We have had good results with the signing of the easements on Route I with 75% of the easements signed already. The easement committee processed one hundred and forty-six easements in all and obtained one hundred and twenty-five signed easements.

I would like to thank everyone involved with this project for their cooperation. The sewer easement committee's continuing efforts in obtaining these easements is essential so that construction can get started as soon as possible and the municipal sewer system will be completed and operational as scheduled.

At the request of a few residents, five new street lights have been installed and some changes were made placing larger wattage lights in certain areas rather than installing additional ones

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Seabrook as of and for the year ended December 31, 1992, as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the general purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the general purpose financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Assets Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Assets Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Seabrook as of December 31, 1992, and the results of its operations (and cash flows of its-nonexpendable trust funds) for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Seabrook. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

1993 WATER DEPARTMENT REPORT

There were 483,489,827 gallons of water pumped in 1993. This 20,270,713 gallon increase over the previous year was due to the increase in the domestic use. It is believed the lack of rain over the summer season coupled with the additional one hour of outside use time contributed to the additional outside use of water.

Industrial-commercial use decreased from 130,433,526 in 1992 to 116,076,819 in 1993. Two commercial meters were added (99 Pub-Restaurant and Burger King). Morton International, K. J. Quinn Co. and the Seabrook Car Wash had increases of 6.4, 1.5 and .5 million gallons respectively. The nuclear power plant, Spherex and Sam's Club all decreased their use by 19.8, 1.6 and .5 million gallons respectively.

Two fire hydrants were repaired after being damaged by motor vehicles. The hydrants were located on Route One and Centennial Street.

The crew observed the installation, flushing, testing, and chlorinating of two sub-division projects. Francis Drive is a sub-division project off New Boston Road which consists of 11 lots with an 8" water main and two fire hydrants. The other, a 14 lot sub-division, Tudor Crest Drive, is located off Route One and is also serviced with an 8" water main and two fire hydrants.

The crew also monitored the installation of an 8" water main with one fire hydrant at the new library site off Centennial Street.

The biggest part of our time has been spent with the ongoing sewer project. Two contractors, MacMillan in the south end and Revoli in the Lakeshore Drive area, kept the crew busy with locating and marking services, turning on and off water and observing scheduled water work, relocating and repairs. The contractors are required to replace water mains and services within the towns' right-of-way, that are deemed inferior. A few breaks to water services and mains have occurred at both locations. Along with the sewer projects, new and replacement drainage is being installed. This too requires us to mark and sometimes relocate services. Several water services and mains have been damaged and repaired.

The gas company (Northern Utilities, Inc.) has had as many as five crews replacing all its gas mains and services in town. All water services in these areas had to be located and marked by the crew. Again, a few water services were damaged and repaired.


Work has begun at the Gruhn contamination site with the construction of a 16'x 16' building. This building will be used to strip the contaminates from as many as three recovery wells which are to be installed later this year.

We would like to thank everyone for observing our partial water ban which was imposed over the summer season. This ban limited outside use of water except between 7:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. and between 7:00 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. Hopefully, the new well and pump station which we are working hard to get constructed will eliminate a future ban.

Remember, water is a precious and useful resource and should be used wisely and not wastefully. Conserving water is everyone's responsibility.
