To the Inhabitants of the Town of Stratham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Stratham on Tuesday, the 14th day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid for road construction; raise and appropriate the sum of \$970.50 for the same.

4. To see if the town will vote to cut the pines on the top of Stratham Hill; raise and appropriate money for the same.

5. To see if the town will vote to buy a snow plow for the truck; raise and appropriate \$450.00 for the same.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25.00 for forest fire tools.

7. To see if the town will vote a 3% discount on such part of taxes as are paid on or before Aug. 15, 1939.

8. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$52.00.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Stratham, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the twentieth in the series.

The following paragraph addressed to the combined school boards of all the districts in Supervisory Union Number Sixteen, is included in my reports to each of the several districts:

"Through the twenty years since the enactment of the almost revolutionary equalization school law of 1919, you and your predecessors, to the number of sixty, have brought to the schools of your individual districts, not only the best of your thought and effort, but you have continuously shown such mutual cooperation as to make this law workable and productive of the best results in all the schools of Union Number Sixteen. This expenditure of time and effort by you is of the very essence of good citizenship. When individual willingness to serve is combined with such cooperation of school officials, parents and citizens in general have practised in this Union, then the greatest good results. Since the children who were born in the year this law took effect have now finished the high school grades, a school generation attests the merits of vour cooperative, democratic service."

That your decision to group the young grades of the Stratham schools by themselves and the older ones in a separate school was a wise one, seems now to have ample proof. Each teacher brings to her school special qualifications for the particular grades in her school. Socially the pupils are more congenially adapted as to age. The element of rivalry and example is increased by the larger class groups now possible, especially in music and kindred subjects, and the management of the school throughout the day can be more economically and beneficially planned especially in the matters of play, health and sanitation, The matter of transportation will continue to be an important item of school business so long as any transportation beyond the legal limit is provided. All school problems are best solved in a spirit of understanding and cooperation, and that of transportation is no exception. Perhaps a more serious problem is presented in the matter of numbers of pupils. Each school has now all it ought to Any considerable increase will try to accommodate. necessitate the reopening of one of the two schools now closed and the employment of a third teacher. A natural consequence would then be a new grouping of pupils with two grades in each building. All of these speculations lead always to the idea of a central school, where the grades, to be sure, would be grouped as now, but where many physical advantages not now provided would be available. It is satisfying to have proved for ourselves that in any future plan for such a school the element of doubt about grade grouping will be absent.

We all regret, of course, that we can no longer have the services of Mrs. Wiggin in the Stratham Hill School. She had organized her new school successfully and was conducting it in its second year as efficiently as she had done all her other work in the district. She is ably followed since January by Miss Marjorie Cleary. The thanks of the parents of our older pupils are due to Miss Crane for her very efficient work in The Ridge School. She must prepare those in her care for the junior high school grades, she must deal with the difficulties which the approaching age of adolescense produces in such a group as hers, and she must meet and deal with parents whose interest in the education of their children somehow increases with the grades. All this is done now, as always, most lovally, sympathetically and so, naturally, with great success.

Mr. Wilson's work in music, the good results of which were so evident in the schools and in the public exhibitions of last year, has been taken up by Mr. Wendell Hawkins, with pleasing results. We replaced Mr. Wilson's experience with Mr. Hawkin's good training and willingness. He is making a good beginning in his first teaching position.

Mrs. Sheehy's report as school nurse follows. It tells you again of Mrs. Sheehy's loyalty to work and of her professional efficiency. I feel that in this most important service of the schools we are very fortunate.

I continue to be much concerned about the matter of play ground safety in our schools. If less competent teachers than the excellent ones we have had since we combined schools should be employed, or if our pupils should sometime be less tractable, we might be suddenly shocked by the injury or death of a pupil running thoughtlessly into the road traffic which at both schools is increasingly swift and heavy. To prevent, or at least to avoid as far as possible, such a disaster, I urge again the erection of suitable fences at both schools.

Likewise, as a further safeguard to the health and morals of our schools, now much increased in size, I urge the installation of chemical toilets or the newly developed septic tanks for rural schools. These pieces of apparatus have now been installed elsewhere long enough to prove their practical usefulness and reliability.

It would be helpful to the teachers, and I should think likewise helpful and comforting to parents, if telephones could be installed in our schools.

Without the intense interest shown by the School Board and the public, and the cooperation it creates, we, who are concerned with the daily operation of the schools, would be much handicapped. So we thank you once more and we pledge our best services.
