To the Inhabitants of the Town of Surry in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Surry on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at eight of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to make any changes in the amount of money to be raised and appropriated as presented by the Budget Committee in the annual budget.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.75 for Town Road Aid.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$165.00 for the Elliot Community Hospital.
- 7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a Town Dump or take any other action thereto.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To hear the report and recommendations of the Town Planning Board which was created by vote of the last annual Town Meeting.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance as recommended and proposed by the Town Planning Board in accordance with the provisions set forth in Chapter 51, Sections 50-71 revised Laws of New Hampshire, 1942, as amended by Chapter 110 and 278, Laws of New Hampshire 1948, or take any action thereon.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to set aside a portion of Town Hall as a Selectmen's Office. to set aside a portion of Town Hall as a Selectmen's office.
 - 12. To hear the report of the Town Officers.
 - 13. To allow accounts.
- 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said Meeting.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE SCHOOL WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Surry qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall of said district on the 7th day of March, 1951 at 8 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
 - 4. To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the school board, and truant officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

- 9. To see what action the district will vote to take in instructing the school board on treating the outside of the school house, and painting the toilets, and to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$400 for this purpose.
- 10. To see what action the district will vote to take in regard to having a storm vestibule constructed at the entrance to the school and to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$100 for this purpose.
- 11. To see what sum of money, not to exceed \$400, the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the school lunch program.
- 12. To see if the school district will vote to exchange such part of the present school property, fronting on the old Village Road, for such part of the former Starkey property as is offered in exchange; or vote to acquire said part of the former Starkey property by any other means, or take any action thereto.
- 13. To take up any other business that may properly come before this meeting.

NOTES ON SCHOOL BOARD ESTIMATE

There are several factors that contribute to an increase in the budget needed to operate the schools next year. Teachers' salaries are much lower than in other towns of similar size and condition. If you are to keep good teachers you must be willing to pay them a reasonable salary. Last year the figures for fuel and lights were estimates, only. The budget for next year is still an estimate for these items, but present rates seem to indicate that the figures are fairly close to what we can expect to have to pay. Of course, in a season like this, it is difficult to determine just how much fuel would be used under more severe weather conditions.

The item of maintenance includes two provisions in special warrant articles. Careful consideration should be given to these matters. The outside of the building needs to be either stained again or painted. Every new building needs attention for the first year or two to insure a lasting product. Some people feel that the present finish is very satisfactory and the school board would like expressions of preference to guide them in this matter.

We can expect an increase in high school tuitions in another year. It so happens that the classes from Surry are small at the present time. Only two pupils are in the eighth grade this year, but succeeding grades are much larger. The tuition rate in Keene will be \$250 next year.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Surry:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report as superintendent of your school.

School opened last fall with a full program. The grammar room teacher, Miss Sawyer, comes to us with several years of experience teaching in Maine. She is a graduate of Gorham Teachers College. This year we have a school nurse, Mrs. Marian Warner, of Keene. Mrs. Warner served as school nurse in Surry a number of years ago. She has already examined the pupils and tested their sight and hearing. Those having defects have been advised to have a more thorough check-up by their own physician.

The State Dental Trailer is making a stop at the Surry School to clean and give fluoride treatment to the childrens' teeth. This is being done through the cooperation of the parent's club.

The school lunch program went into operation last fall. The teachers and parents are much pleased with the results that are being obtained. The children appear more eager in the afternoon, less fatigued, and are gaining some weight. The Parents' club is sponsoring this program.

Following the action taken at the special meeting of last summer the school board purchased chairs and tables for all the pupils and new desks for the teachers. The furniture adds much to the educational program of the school, as well as improving the appearance of the building.

The eighth grade testing program in cooperation with Keene High School has begun. This consists of a series of tests to determine the pupils' ability, aptitudes and achievement. A similar group of tests is being given to the other grades to ensure that every pupil is progressing according to his own ability.

Present indications are that the school will increase in enrollment quite rapidly during the next few years. The number of pupils now attending high school from Surry is lower than it has been for several years. However, a considerable increase will occur within a short time. The last two eighth grades were the smallest there will be.
