SELECTMEN'S NOTES

IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. Doris H. Langley passed away January 17, 1970. Mrs. Langley was a member of the Baptist Church, Ladies Aid and other town organizations. She was a school teacher for many years, and through her effort a flag was donated by Congressman Cleveland for use at the Soldiers' Monument. She was also one of our Ballot Clerks.

ROADS AND BRIDGES

The main reconstruction projects on town roads this past year were on the Pine Hill Road between Route 11 and Village Road. This section will be tarred this next summer. The other project was continuation of the reconstruction of the North Wilmot Road by White's Pond to Lu Atwood's. We also surfaced Pancake Street.

We have been doing more work this past year on all town roads as we have had more equipment with which to work. It is necessary that we get the dirt roads into condition for hard surfacing as soon as possible as they are much cheaper to maintain.

This was the first year that our own town crew expended the T.R.A. funds and the work was done under the supervision of our Road Agent, Henry Patten. We feel that we get more for our money this way rather than have the State supervise it. It gives more work to our local people and allows us to get paid for the use of our own equipment.

TOWN HALL

The new heating system finally has been completed at the Town Hall. We did not have sufficient funds to do all the work that seemed desirable such as insulation and putting

in a new ceiling. There is also a need for more new wiring as the present wiring does not appear to be of top quality.

The State Fire Marshal has recommended some further improvements in the Town Hall, namely another Exit, all Exits to be marked as such and lights that will go on in the event that power is lost while the hall is being used. Funds for these changes are included in this year's budget.

HIGHWAY GARAGE AND EQUIPMENT

A one acre lot for a Town highway garage site was purchased from Richard Webb on Pedrick Road just off Highway 4A. This site was cleared, leveled and a steel garage building has been erected on it. Funds are included in this 1971 budget to complete this garage.

A loader was purchased with the 1970 appropriation of \$13,000. This has been a much needed piece of equipment for use on the Town roads.

CEMETERY TRUSTEES

It was voted at the 1970 Town Meeting to establish a Board of Trustees for the cemeteries and for the Selectmen to appoint such Trustees. The Selectmen did appoint a Board of three Cemetery Trustees but before they could organize and agree on any plan, they all resigned. If we are to have a Board of Trustees such as this, or for that matter, any other Board in the Town that is effective, we must learn to work together. The Selectmen have been unable to locate any persons willing to take on these duties.

TAX COLLECTOR

It was necessary to appoint a Deputy Tax Collector to fill out the remainder of the term of our long-time Tax Collector Ralph S. Staples. Mrs. Annette E. Stevens was appointed to this position. It will be necessary to elect a Tax Collector for a two-year term at this 1971 Town Meeting.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Wilmot Town Hall in said Wilmot the ninth (9th) day of March next, at eight of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to negotiate the extension or renewal of the notes securing such loans when it is necessary.
5. To see if the Town will vote to join the KEARSARGE VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$602.50 (six hundred two dollars and

fifty cents) requested by petition signed by Annette Rose and others.

6. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 (One thousand five hundred dollars) for the Wilmot Volunteer Fire Company, Inc.
7. (Requested) To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the New London Hospital.
8. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to accept the Henry L. Stevens Road, so-called, as shown on his survey.
9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any material or equipment deemed to be surplus to the Town needs; the sale of highway material or equipment to be made with the approval of the Road Agent.
10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the old Town garage and land in Wilmot Center.
11. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the sale of the so-called horse sheds in Wilmot Center to the First Congregational Church, United Church of Christ, Wilmot Center, and authorize the Selectmen to issue a deed for same.
12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the appointment of Police Officers by the Selectmen and designate one officer to be the Chief.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Regular visits to the Library are greatly enjoyed by the elementary school children with their teacher, Rosemary Aldrich; and even the tiny pre-school children love to pick out a book and have it charged to them by the librarian. Their teacher, Kay Eaves, reads the books to them during the week.

Memorial books given to the Library in 1970 were — New Hampshire, by Elizabeth Yates; Manning on Decoupage; Early American Stencils, by Janet Waring; Reverence for Wood, by Eric Sloane; Peterson's Guide to Wild Flowers; and one on order about Knitting. Hilda Aldrich is the person to contact when you wish to share in such a remembrance. For years she has given of herself in this beautiful service. We are grateful to her.

We are grateful to all who made our annual food sale a big success.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Established by vote of the Town in 1967, the Planning Board continues to work to improve the Wilmot Planning Ordinance passed in 1968.

This year you will be asked to vote on two amendments: one would increase the minimum permitted ground floor area of any dwelling from 480 to 700 square feet. The other would delete the last half of the last sentence of Article IV, Section IV, which says mobile homes "shall be restricted to those areas of the Town as determined by the Planning Board."

The ground floor area increase would, if passed, require any dwelling to be at least 20 x 35 feet in size or the equivalent. Nearly all trailers would be prohibited, except for large ones with enclosed porches added on suitable for year-round occupancy.

Current committees are developing a set of definitions for the Ordinance and Subdivision regulations, which will be

presented to the Town in the future for their approval.

Turnover among the Board's membership continued, and several meetings were cancelled for lack of a quorum. Two of the original members resigned during 1970 and deserve particular commendation for their helpful efforts: Mrs. Annette Rose and Mr. Patrick Cioffi. Our thanks to you!

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER

It is a pleasure to report that the new Kearsarge High School in Sutton appears to be operating very well. Both the students and the staff seem to like the facilities and are pleased with the "open" arrangement, i.e., very few individual classrooms.

It is not a pleasure to report, however, that the proposed gross budget for the 1971-72 school year is up over 10% and that the net budget, which is the figure used to determine the school tax for each town in the district, is up over 11%. The writer realizes that the budget will probably never decrease as the only possible saving each year is approximately \$20,000 in interest and principal payments on the various bond issues. In my opinion, it is mandatory that the idea of basing the budget each year on a percentage increase over the budget for the previous year must be discarded because the dollar amount changes considerably on a straight percentage basis. For example, the first gross budget of the Kearsarge School District was \$874,000, so a 10% increase amounted to only \$87,400. The proposed gross budget for the 1971-72 school year is approximately \$1,918,000, so a 10% increase now represents \$191,800. Thus,

it is obvious that more than twice as many dollars are now required on a straight percentage increase. Unfortunately, however, the money must come from the same old tax pot, which just isn't growing at the same rate. It is my belief that the increase in the budget should be kept in line with the average valuation growth rate of the district. This would maintain a reasonably stable school tax rate — not one that goes up by leaps and bounds each year. If this is done, it will be possible to continue to improve an already excellent school system at a reasonable rate. The writer is all in favor of good education but it is believed that the education provided should be controlled by the ability of the district as a whole to pay and by the amount the taxpayers are willing to pay without complaint. As indicated on your 1970 tax bill, Wilmot is currently spending 80c of each tax dollar on education, which is well above average.

There will be an Article in the Warrant for the March 4th Annual School Meeting proposing the establishment of a School Budget Committee under the provisions of RSA 195:12-a. It is my hope that this Article will be adopted as I believe that it would be better to have eighteen persons, rather than only nine, develop a school budget of almost two million dollars. In addition, this would offer some protection against an outlandish budget increase on a motion from the floor, as under the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act, a budget can only be increased by 10% at an Annual Meeting. The present system does not offer this protection so the budget can be increased by any amount at a meeting.

The apportionment of expenses for each town in the Kearsarge School District is based on the following formula:
75% of the cost is based on the Average Daily Membership and 25% on the Equalized Valuation of the various towns.

As can be noted, the formula is weighted heavily regarding the number of pupils. This, unfortunately, poses quite a problem for some of the smaller towns as they do not have as much valuation behind each pupil. This, in turn, explains the reason for the large school tax increases in

some towns as a result of budget increases while the tax increase is quite small in some of the other towns. The formula can be revised every five years if the voters of the District so desire. It is believed that a revision can be considered at the 1972 Annual School Meeting. It is my belief that a 50-50 formula, rather than the present 75-25 arrangement, would be fairer for the smaller towns but still would not "stick" the wealthier towns.

Regardless of the basis of the cost sharing formula, the actual percentage of cost for each town varies from year to year and it sometimes changes quite a bit due to increases or decreases in enrollment. This year, each percentage point represents over \$16,000, so even a half percent change up or down represents a considerable sum. For the coming year, Wilmot's share of the school costs will decrease by about 4/10ths of one percent, but unfortunately our share in dollars will increase by approximately \$11,000 over the present year. This, of course, is due to the increase in the proposed budget. Translated to the tax rate, this means that our 1971 *school* tax rate will increase by about \$2.40 per thousand dollars of valuation. The increase could be less, of course, if the Town gains some additional valuation.

As you probably know, the Kearsarge School District has been accepting tuition students from Andover. In the past, the tuition charged for these pupils has been less than our cost. It is a pleasure to report that next year the tuition charge for each pupil will be increased to \$1300 from only \$850 this year. The \$1300 figure is based on the district's cost for each high school pupil for the current year. It is possible that Andover may decide to send its pupils elsewhere. However, I believe that it is both unwise and unfair for any school district to accept tuition pupils at a discount rate.

It is hoped that the foregoing will help to give you a better understanding of how the Kearsarge Regional School District operates. Please feel free to ask any questions you may have regarding the information presented.

In conclusion, may I urge all of you to attend the Annual School Meeting on March 4th at the High School in Sutton and express your opinions regarding the operation of your school system. The attendance at recent school meetings has been very small and a number of people have said that they don't go because "you can't fight City Hall and nothing can be changed". This just isn't true. Changes can be made at the annual meeting but only if residents attend the meeting, express their opinions and vote on the various articles in the Warrant, any or all of which can be amended by the voters. There are several very important articles in the Warrant this year so won't you please attend the meeting and stay to vote on all of them. Thank you.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1970 forest fire season was a quiet one in this area, quiet in part because of your continued cooperation and favorable weather conditions.

Fires that did occur were, for the most part, caused by debris burning, children and smokers.

The elimination of these three causes of forest fires would drastically change this picture. To bring about this change we make the following suggestions:

1. When the ground is not covered with snow a permit to

burn must be obtained from the Forest Fire Warden. This permit covers waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, as well as garden trash and brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to prior to 9:00 A.M. and after 5:00 P.M with the following exceptions:

Commercial or industrial burning is permissible at any time under normal conditions but only with the approval of the District Chief and a written permit from the Forest Fire Warden.

- 2. Fires caused by children can be prevented only with the complete cooperation of parents in the supervision of their children. Keep matches out of reach of children. This action will help to prevent fires and may save a life, the life of your child. Try to explain this to your child, won't you?
- 3. Forest fires caused by smokers can be reduced in number by the exercise of more care in the discarding of matches and smoking material whether from a vehicle or by a hiker. In all cases, make sure that the butt or match you discard is out, dead out. Smokey says, "Thanks for your help," and invites you to join with him in setting a good example for others in the prevention of fires and the protection of our environment.
