1990 TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March 1990 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The following articles in the warrant will be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and vote on any ballot items.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for support of the 1990 Bartlett Bicentennial Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by George Howard and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to remove \$2,000.00 plus accrued interest from the Bicentennial Capital Reserve Fund to offset costs of this year's Bicentennial Celebration. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to purchase land for an addition to the Glen Cemetery. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Towns of Jackson and Hart's Location to construct and operate a transfer station for the disposal of solid waste on the jointly owned land (Bartlett/Jackson) located at the Bartlett/Jackson town line on Rte. 16. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$316,000.00 to cover landfill and engineering costs, construction of a transfer station on the land owned jointly by the Towns of Bartlett and Jackson, and partial costs of closure of the existing Bartlett landfill and to see if the Town will vote to remove \$316,000.00 from the Capital Reserve Fund created for that purpose. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for its share (50%) of the cost of a new ambulance for the Bartlett-Jackson Ambulance Service. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to designate and proclaim April 22, 1990 as Earth Day 1990 and to set aside that day for public activities promoting preservation of the global environment and launching the "Decade of the Environment". Agreeable to a petition signed by Joseph D. Van Note, Jr. and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purchase of a new police cruiser. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purchase of a computer system and associated software for the Office of the Tax Collector and Town Clerk. Agreeable to a petition signed by Howard C. Nichols and others. If passed this money will purchase said computer and related software from Howard C. Nichols.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Bartlett Athletic and Recreation Association for the purpose of hiring a swim instructor and for the summer recreation program. Agreeable to a petition signed by Peter Fresco and others. Selectmen oppose.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,403.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Eldridge and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,096.00 for support of the Nutrition and Transportation Programs for the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Eldridge and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to approach the owners of Second Iron Beach relative to allowing access to the area for Bartlett residents and providing them management of the area. Agreeable to a petition signed by Timothy Marcoux and others. Selectmen have discussed this matter with the owners several times.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 in order to continue the Community Tree Lighting Ceremony held every year in the Village Park. The unused balance to be returned to the Town. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kathlyn Nealley and others. Hodgkins favors \$200.00. Chandler/Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. Agreeable to a petition signed by David Eldridge and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to help defray the expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the Mt. Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition signed by Karen Glines and others. Selectmen oppose - not a proper use of town funds to support national organizations; people should have an individual choice concerning donations to charitable organizations.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$451.00 in support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape. Agreeable to a petition signed by Barbara McNevech and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler/Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$910.00 to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreeable to a petition signed by Julie Bennett and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler/Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the Children and Youth Project of the Mt. Washington Valley. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gerald Ellis and others. Hodgkins favors \$2,000, Chandler/Chadbourne favor \$1,700.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$896.55 for the Early Intervention Program of Children Unlimited, Inc. said sum being equal to \$0.55 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler/Chadbourne oppose.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the Center of Hope, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Lepis and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler/Chadbourne favor \$1,000.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,075.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Vicki Varrichione and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,845.80 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.80 per person in the Town of Bartlett (1,581 - Based on 1988 Census from the Office of State Planning). Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to abandon that portion of discontinued Rte. 16 between stations 89+0 and 74-00, the general area being the section of road on the west side of Rte. 16 opposite Storyland. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,700 for principal and interest payment on the Fire Truck note and authorize the transfer of \$40,700 of the December 31, 1989 fund balance for this purpose. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 31. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from C.C. Russo, Inc. for a certain parcel of land intended for public use for a road or street and other public utilities; said parcel being 66 feet in width and approximately 1360 feet in total length, more specifically being named Marsden Drive; said parcel being described and shown on a plan entitled Rocky River Resort, subdivision plan prepared by H.E. Bergeron dated 12/16/86, updated 1/29/88. Acceptance of deed is contingent upon construc-

tion of road to standards established by Town of Bartlett and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Robert McLeod and others. Selectmen favor.

ARTICLE 32. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

There are three major items for discussion in this year's report; our 200th birthday, the pause (end?) of the building boom and "prosperity", and the end of the useful life of our landfill.

On June 20, 1990 the incorporated Town of Bartlett will be 200 years old, a major municipal milestone. The Bicentennial Committee has made some great plans to celebrate the event and it promises to be memorable indeed. A schedule of events is presented elsewhere in this report so that you can make plans to participate. We urge you to do so.

For the past couple of years this Board has been alerting town administrators and citizens alike that the building boom of the 80's was losing its steam; that rapidly rising assessed valuation (tax base) would no longer be available to pay for increased spending, and that increased spending would mean increased taxes. Our worst fears have been realized. We do not need to belabor the economic condition of the Mt. Washington Valley. It can be characterized many ways but simply put it is just plain lousy. One observer characterized it as "on its knees". The following table will display graphically what has happened in expenditure, tax rate, and tax base terms.

The above table contains all the information you need to understand how the slowing New England economy has and will continue to affect you as a Bartlett taxpayer. The critical relationship is between the columns of Assessed Valuation and Total Spending. The important, not to say only, thing to remember when studying this table is that when there is a lot of construction activity (homes, businesses, etc.) taking place the tax base (assessed valuation) grows and tax receipts increase accordingly to finance increased spending without increasing the tax rate. From 1985 through 1988 the increase in the tax base was sufficient to finance an increase in spending of over 50% while maintaining the tax rate at a constant or in this case even lowering the tax rate. In 1988 and 1989, as we all know, the building boom collapsed. As a generalization, the increase in the tax base in 1989 was the result of completing construction of

projects already begun rather than initiation of new construction. There will not be a similar carryover into 1990 nor will there be a significant number of new starts. The message is clear and irrefutable. Any large increases in spending, and there will be some e.g. closing the current landfill, constructing and operating a transfer station, school bond and interest payments, will only be accommodated by increases in the tax rate. It is a tough message - not one we like to give or that you want to hear. The Board wishes to point out that the \$600,000 increase in school spending in 1989 did not include any funds for the new school. The first bond principal and interest payments for the new school will appear in the 1990 budget and the property tax impact of the new school will be felt for the first time in October 1990. There is one way and only one way you can control your economic future and that is to attend all budget hearings and town and school meetings and make your voice heard (or move to Puerto Rico).

In recognition of the economic hardship being currently felt by many Bartlett residents, the Selectmen are not recommending pay raises for Town employees for 1990. This action in no way reflects on the dedication and hard work of Town employees but is dictated by consideration of prudent fiscal management.

Ten years ago the town contracted with Dick Garland to operate a landfill on his land at Roger's Crossing. Sometime this summer or fall the useful life of the site will end and the Town is now planning for the next step. Plans are fairly well along for a Carroll County-wide solution to the solid waste disposal problem but it will be at least a few years before such plans can be translated into a workable product. This Board is now planning, with the Town of Jackson, to construct a transfer station on the Bartlett-Jackson owned property on Rte. 16. Jackson under current plans will abandon their present site and transfer the equipment to the new site. Bartlett will, of course, reimburse the Town of Jackson for a share of the sunk capital costs of their present site. We are planning to recycle the maximum amount of material to avoid the high tipping costs of disposal in a landfill. Contact has been made with Sanco, Inc., a private firm in Bethlehem operating a landfill, and all material not recycled will in all likelihood be disposed of at that site. An important note - the disposal of garbage is a booming industry, for businessmen, for environmentalists, for lawyers, and for State and Federal bureaucrats. For the municipalities it is a very expensive headache and aspirin will not relieve the pain. We will be holding public hearings in the near future to review our plans with you. Please attend.

In conclusion, a few notes. In April 1987 you will remember the River Street bridge suffered considerable flood damage to the tune of \$220,760. You will be pleased to hear that the Federal government, State government, and US Forest Service collectively paid the bill in total. It did not cost the Town of Bartlett a nickel, except for considerable administrative effort such as postage, phone calls, letter writing and reporting, etc. We like that.

In accordance with your approval at Town Meeting, Roger Labbe was hired in August 1989 as the full-time Bartlett Fire Chief. He rapidly adjusted to his expanded responsibilities and is building a fire department we can all be proud of.

There is one lawsuit still pending against the Town. You will recall that in March 30, 1989 the Ossipee Superior Court found for the Town in the case where LEMM Development Corp. was suing the Town after being denied approval for construction of an amenities building at the Attitash Woods development on West Side Road. LEMM Development Corp. has appealed the adverse decision to the State Supreme Court. We do not know when the case will be heard.

And finally, the Selectmen have included a non-binding question on the ballot asking if citizens would prefer twice-a-year tax billing. Under semi-annual tax billing a bill for one-half of the previous year's tax bill would be mailed in late May due July 1st and the balance of the current year's tax bill would be mailed in late October due December 1st. The procedure would reduce the interest costs associated with borrowing in anticipation of tax receipts.

The Selectmen would like to thank all Town employees and department heads for their enthusiastic and capable work over the past year. We are indeed fortunate to have such dedicated employees. The Selectmen would also like to thank all the citizen volunteers who serve on the Planning Board, Zoning Board of Adjustment, Fire Departments, Ambulance Service, and the many other Town committees who really make a difference in helping to run the Town.

1989 BARTLETT PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORT

Nineteen eighty-nine was a "year of change" for the Bartlett Public Library. In June the library moved into its temporary quarters - a classroom where it remained for the remainder of 1989. Approximately one half of its collection was put into storage because of lack of space and shelving. In January 1990, the library moved into its spacious new quarters and is now waiting for the arrival of new shelving and furniture. Unfortunately the main entrance of the library will not be ready for use until early spring; the entrance that is now available is on the east end of the school. Proceed down the hall through two sets of double doors, the library is located on the right beyond the school office.

The library circulated 7,226 library materials in 1989 and added 540 volumes to its collection. The library co-sponsored four programs with the N.H. Humanities Council featuring New Hampshire history as its theme.

The library is now making its plans for its 1990 series of speakers. The Topics will be "Historians of New Hampshire and their Points of View" - March 6th; "Admirals, Surveyor Generals, Timber Barons" - May 15; "Backyard Archeology" - October 16th; and "Down and Out in America" (depression years) - November 13th. A program is also being planned for April but is not finalized at this time. Place these dates on your calendar and plan to attend.

In preparation for the town's bicentennial the librarian and the Bartlett History Volunteers have been busy gathering information for its Town History File as well as the up-coming town history. The library received a Henney Fund grant to purchase a fire-rated file to store its Bartlett History file and photos and for preservation materials. It also received a \$1000 grant from the Northern New Hampshire Foundation for the Town History Project.

Mrs. Garland is a member of the State Library Advisory Council representing rural and school libraries and attends monthly meetings in Concord whenever possible. She also attended three area forum meetings during 1989.

This year the library is requesting a capital expenditure for library furniture. This will provide a much-needed new card catalog, comfortable furniture for public library patrons, and an exhibit case.

This bicentennial year will be a busy year for all. Do plan to take time for reading a good book. Visit YOUR NEW LIBRARY!!

BARTLETT-JACKSON AMBULANCE SERVICE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett:

In 1989 we had 247 calls for service, not to include many calls at our personal residences, which we respond to on our own.

Our donation account is at approximately twenty-eight hundred dollars. This money is only used as a last resort toward non-budgeted training and equipment.

Our ambulance is now eight years old. We are going to ask the towns of Bartlett and Jackson this year to purchase a new vehicle. The cost is about seventy-four thousand dollars. We may be able to reduce this figure to around sixty-five thousand dollars, depending on resale of our old unit and manufacturers willingness to deal with "cash in hand". If approved at the Town Meeting, we will do our best to keep the price as low as possible.

We were able to lower our 1990 tax based budget by twenty percent this year, due mainly to our new billing system which is now computerized. Credit goes to Paula Churchill for devising the system which now allows her to follow the accounts receivable more closely.

**REPORT OF
TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND
STATE FOREST RANGER**

During calendar year 1989, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, children, and debris burning fires that escaped control. All these causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. By New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27B), "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, **without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done.**"

Violations of RSA 224:27 and the other burning laws of the state are misdemeanors punishable of fines up to \$1,000. and/or a year in jail, and you are also liable for paying all fires suppression cost.

The State of New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1989, including several large fires in Alton, Allentown, Concord, and Chesterfield areas, as well as the 100 acre fire on Mt. Belknap in Gilford.

In order to eliminate false alarms, it is advisable to notify your local fire department whenever you intend to do any outdoor burning.

If you have any questions regarding New Hampshire forest fire laws, please contact your local Forest Fire Warden, Forest Ranger, or the Division of Forests and Lands at 271-2217.

1989 MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING

Meeting opened at 7:05 PM by Moderator William Paine.

Selectman Chandler led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Moderator Paine recognized Hellen Hayes and Myra Smith for their many years as ballot clerks. Recognition plaques were awarded to them earlier in the day.

David Taylor, who passed away last November, was also recognized for his years of service to the Town in many capacities.

Moderator Paine also read a paragraph commemorating the Bartlett Hotel.

Moderator Paine read the posted warrant as follows:

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in the Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Town Hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday the fourteenth day of March 1989 at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects hereinafter set forth. The voting on Article 1 will be by official ballot and the polls shall open for balloting at nine o'clock in the forenoon and shall not close before six o'clock in the evening. The following articles in the warrant will be acted upon at seven o'clock in the evening at the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School in Bartlett Village.

We hereby certify that we posted a like copy of said Town Warrant and Budget on February 27, 1989 at the post offices in Glen and Bartlett, at the Town Hall in Intervale (Bartlett) and the Josiah Bartlett Elementary School, the places of meeting, all being public places within the said Town of Bartlett, New Hampshire. Signed, Gene G. Chandler, James F. Chadbourne, Frederick T. Hodgkins.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year and vote on any ballot items. The results were not available yet so the Moderator continued on to the next Article.

ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same. Motion was made by Chandler, seconded by Hodgkins to accept the budget of \$776,400. Chandler reviewed the budget. Motion was made by Kathleen Head, seconded by Geraldine Tilton to amend the Library appropriation by adding \$3,475. Vote = PASSED.

Motion was made by Chandler, seconded by Hodgkins to amend the Fire Dept. appropriation by adding \$6,300 to cover costs of the Bartlett Hotel fire. Vote = PASSED. No further discussion. Vote was then taken on the amended total budget figure of \$786,175. Vote = PASSED (\$786,175).

ARTICLE 3. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year and to issue in the name of the Town and on the credit of the same, negotiable notes therefor, to be repaid during the current year from taxes collected within the current municipal year. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds or by any other means. Subject only to the interest of relatives and heirs, all disposal shall be by public auction. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept gifts and/or Federal or State aid in the name of the Town of Bartlett. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to add to the Bicentennial Capital Reserve Fund. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 to place in the Dump Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the transfer of \$50,000.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000.00 to place in the Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the transfer of \$25,000.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the

sum of \$65,000.00 for a new highway truck and to authorize the transfer of \$65,000.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to amend the Floodplain Development Ordinance by adding Item X as follows:

Item X. Activity in the Floodway

1. Application - This regulation applies only to designated Regulatory Floodways in the Town of Bartlett.
2. Procedure - State of New Hampshire Dredge and Fill Permit applications requesting development in any regulatory floodway will not be processed by the Town of Bartlett until determination has been made that the request meets all the requirements of the Bartlett Floodplain Ordinance.
3. Permitted Activities - The only development permitted in the Regulatory Floodway will be for the protection or preservation of public and/or private property.
4. Technical Studies - The Board of Selectmen may utilize technical studies and/or consultants as necessary to properly administer this amendment with costs to be borne by the applicant.
5. Waivers - The Board of Selectmen may waive any of the provisions of this item where unusual hardship can be demonstrated.

Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler explained the article. Discussion ensued re: who should pay for the technical studies. Motion was made by Richard Patch, seconded by James Chadbourne to amend the article by deleting #4 from the ordinance. Vote = PASSED (#4 deleted). Motion was made by George Howard, seconded by Brian Hill to table the article. Vote = PASSED - Article was TABLED.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to adopt an ordinance governing septic system design and construction as follows:

**TOWN OF BARTLETT ORDINANCE
GOVERNING THE DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION
OF SEPTIC SYSTEMS**

I. Reference

- A. NH Code of Administrative Rules, Chapter WS 1000 Et Seq.
- B. Town of Bartlett Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision Regulations, and Test Pit Ordinance.

II. Purpose

The purpose of this ordinance is to protect the groundwater resources; to insure the proper placement and construction of in ground septic systems; and to promote the general health and welfare of the citizens of the Town of Bartlett.

III. Design of Septic Systems

Septic systems will be designed, constructed and/or modified to accommodate potential septage flow of the proposed use in accordance with the unit design flow figures contained in NH Code of Administrative Rules, Chapter WS 1000 Et Seq. Prior to expanding or revising the use of any land or structure, which would increase the potential load on septic systems the existing septic system will be modified to accommodate the increased potential flow in accordance with the unit design flow figures contained in Chapter WS 1000 Et Seq. Metering of actual septage flow in order to decrease the required size and capacity of a septic system as provided for in this section is not permitted.

IV. Procedure

All septic plans will be processed through the Town of Bartlett to the NH DES-WSPCC. The Town of Bartlett will review the plan and verify as necessary the topography, soil data, system sizing and compliance with other Town of Bartlett ordinances/regulations. This review will in no way imply approval or viability of the septic system design. A fee of \$50.00 will be assessed for each septic plan processed by the Town.

V. Definition

A dwelling unit is defined as one room or rooms connected together, constituting a separate, single-family, independent house-keeping establishment and physically separated from any other rooms or dwelling units which may be in the same structure and containing independent cooking, bathroom, and sleeping facilities.

VI. Use of More than One Lot

If for any reason any part of a septic system is proposed to be built on a lot contiguous to the lot on which the structure will be built, the two lots must be combined by a boundary line adjustment in accordance with the Town of Bartlett Subdivision Regulations.

VII. Waivers

The Board of Selectmen may waive any of the provisions of this item where unusual hardship can be demonstrated.

Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler explained the article. Discussion ensued re: the need for the ordinance, need for a building inspector, and legal remedies already available. Motion was made and seconded to move the question. Vote = Moderator asked for a standing vote = PASSED - question was moved. Vote on the Article = PASSED.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$5,000.00 for the preparatory expenses and editing of the History of Bartlett in conjunction with Bartlett's Bicentennial. Agreeable to a petition signed by Kathleen Sullivan Head and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Kathleen Head spoke to the article. No further discussion. Vote = PASSED.

Motion was made by Gerald McManus, seconded by Richard Patch to reconsider Article 11. Vote = Moderator asked for a standing vote = DEFEATED.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,597.00 for the purchase of a new Volvo police cruiser (to replace an existing cruiser) and authorize the transfer of \$15,597.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Chandler spoke to the article. No further discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 for the first year costs of a full-time fire chief for the Town of Bartlett, an official vehicle, and associated costs. Submitted by the Selectmen at the request of Fire Chief Roger Labbe. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Roger Labbe spoke to the article. Discussion ensued re: breakdown of costs and duties. Selectmen were asked for their position - Chandler opposed, Hodgkins and Chadbourne favored. Motion was made and

seconded to move the question. Vote = PASSED - question was moved. Vote on the Article = PASSED.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to purchase a 500 gallon per minute pump for the Fire Department and to authorize the transfer of \$6,000.00 of the December 31, 1988 fund balance (surplus) for this purpose. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to change the procedure of selecting Planning Board members to be changed from the present method of appointing members to that of electing them as provided by NH RSA 637:2 (II) (b). It is further requested that an article be placed on the Warrant for the 1989 Town Meeting so that voters can decide if the procedure of electing planning board members is to be adopted by the Town of Bartlett, the first election of members to take place at the 1990 Town Meeting for terms as provided in NH RSA 673:5. Agreeable to a petition signed by Owen Jefferson and others. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Owen Jefferson spoke to the article. Discussion ensued re: current procedures, importance of a balanced interest Board, and lack of people running for office now. No further discussion. Vote - Moderator called for a standing vote - PASSED.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,185.00 for the support of the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Lepis and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,905.00 for support of the Nutrition and Transportation Programs for the Gibson Center for Senior Services. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Lepis and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 in support of Carroll County Against Domestic Violence and Rape. Agreeable to a petition signed by Gordon Robert Wentworth and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Moderator gave permission to Doreen Sharp to explain the article only as she is not a resident of Bartlett. Charles Kalil offered to give

them the \$400.00 if the article is defeated. No further discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$685.00 for support of the Community Action Outreach program. Agreeable to a petition signed by William Lepis and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Terrie Kroger spoke to the article. No further discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$875.00 to assist the Family Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Julie Bennett and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Discussion ensued whether the Center provides birth control/family planning. Andrea Mains stated that this money was only for the pre-natal program. No further discussion. Vote = PASSED.

Motion was made by Joseph Heuston, seconded by William Fabrizio to consider Articles 22-26 as a group. Discussion ensued re: procedure. Motion was made to move the question. Vote = PASSED -question was moved. Vote on taking Articles 22 - 26 as a group = DEFEATED.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 in support of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce. Agreeable to a petition signed by Dale Goodwin and others. Hodgkins favors, Chandler and Chadbourne oppose. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = DEFEATED.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the Center of Hope, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Norman Laughlin and others. Hodgkins and Chadbourne favor; Chandler opposes - favors \$1,000.00. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$871.85 for Children Unlimited, Inc. said sum being equal to \$0.55 per person in the Town of Bartlett. Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen opposed. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,856.60 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.80 per person in the Town of Bartlett (1,368 - Based on 1986 Census from the Office of State Planning). Agreeable to a petition signed by Terrie Kroger and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,975.00 to assist the Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Victoria Hariow and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Brief discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to support the Saco River Advisory Council for the purpose of making recommendations to the Town and to the New Hampshire River Management Advisory Committee, as provided in Senate Bill 326 of 1988, for the protection and management of the Saco River and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint representatives to the Saco River Advisory Council. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard M. Plusch and others. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. Richard Plusch spoke to the article. Discussion ensued re: purpose and goals. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from the Forest Ledge Property Owners Association for a certain parcel of land intended for public use for a road or street and other utilities; said parcel being 66 feet in width and approximately 1450 feet in total length, more specifically being the Forest Ledge Road; said parcel being described and shown on a plan entitled Glen Ledge Area, Subdivision Plan, prepared by Thaddeus Thorne Surveys, Inc. dated 1976, updated 7/24/80. Further being described and shown on a plan of Forest Ledge a subdivision for R. Michael Lynn, dated 10/31/86. Acceptance of the deed is contingent upon construction of a road to a standard established by the Town of Bartlett and satisfactory to the Selectmen. Agreeable to a petition signed by Russell Fish and owners. Selectmen favor. Motion was made and seconded to accept the article as read. No discussion. Vote = PASSED.

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town of Bartlett will vote to authorize the Selectmen to accept a deed from West Side Woods, Inc. for a certain

Approved on May 2, 1988 by Town of Bartlett and recorded in Book 111, Page 70 of the Carroll County Registry of Deeds. PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Not unlike much of New England, the Town of Bartlett has seen a dramatic slowdown from the unprecedented growth of only a few years ago. We are no longer submerged in extensive and comprehensive studies for numerous residential projects throughout town. Concerned abutters are no longer flooding the meeting room with emotion and concerns. Meetings are quieter, subdivisions are slower to come on line, if at all.

As a Board empowered and commanded to plan for the town's future, we've only just begun to meet our challenge. Years of work and dedication, coupled with a strong and dynamic zoning ordinance have allowed this Board to realize one of its major goals: the preservation of the quality and character of a great New England town. But our work can't stop here. We need to establish a clear direction for the future. We need to be ready for the unexpected, if we are to safeguard the quality of our rivers and groundwater, and preserve the pristine beauty of an unspoiled area.

With the aid of Planning Board Assistant, Beverly Weld, a comprehensive update of statistics for development and tax map information has been completed. We're ready to begin our challenge.

I urge the newly elected planning board to respond by meeting with land planners, conservationists, environmentalists, and townspeople. Develop a proposal that will address future growth in residential and commercial areas and offer a decisive plan for an economic future.

TOWN OF BARTLETT OFFICIALS CLOSELY MONITOR COMPLIANCE WITH THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCES, REGULATIONS, AND BY-LAWS:

BUILDING PERMIT ORDINANCE: required for construction valued at \$1,000 or more and/or construction which would affect the assessed value of the property. Violation = fine of up to \$100/day.

WINTER PARKING ORDINANCE: prohibits parking on Town streets between Nov. 1 and May 1. Violation = fine of \$50.00 plus towing charges.

SNOWPLOWING REGULATION: no snow shall be plowed into or across any Town road.

ILLEGAL DUMPING ORDINANCE: prohibits dumping and littering at other than in authorized area at landfill. Violation = fine of \$100.00.

PARKER PIT REGULATIONS: prohibits dumping garbage and outlining contractor responsibility for materials dumped at the site.

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE ORDINANCE: prohibits drinking of alcoholic beverages in public places. Violation = fine of \$25.00.

TEST PIT INSPECTION ORDINANCE: requires inspection of pits prior to application for state septic design approval.

EXCAVATION PERMIT REGULATION: permit required to excavate in Town road. Permit must be obtained 24 hours prior to commencement. Violation = fine of \$100.00.

DOG LEASH BY-LAW: requires that all dogs be restrained by leash or under direct control of owner. Violation = fine of \$10.00+ board reimbursement.

PERMIT TO OCCUPY ORDINANCE: required prior to occupancy of any construction that is intended for habitation or for which a septic system is required. Violation + fine of up to \$100.00 and/or \$10.00 per day/each day of violation.

SPECIAL EVENTS ORDINANCE: regulates the conduct of special events; provides for fines up to \$300.00 for violations.

ZONING ORDINANCE: covers setbacks, density, green areas, frontage, signs, etc. Copies available at Town Hall.

FLOODPLAIN ORDINANCE: governs activity in the floodplain.

GRAVEL PIT ORDINANCE: governs the excavation of gravel pits.

SEPTIC SYSTEM DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION ORDINANCE: governs the design and construction of septic systems. \$50 review fee.

Complete descriptions of any of the above ordinances and regulations may be obtained at the Selectmen's Office.
