




# COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of Belknap County:

In compliance with the requirements of the laws of New Hampshire, we herewith submit the report of our transactions for the year ending December 31, 1921, and a statement of the financial condition of the county, together with the reports of all county officers required by law. Attention is called to these reports for detailed information regarding the work done in different departments of the county's business.

The cost for aid rendered to those receiving help outside of the farm has increased \$3,457.05 over last year, caused largely on account of unemployment. Deserted families continue to be a cause of much trouble and expense, and we are making every effort to lessen this crime by bringing the guilty ones to justice. We have had one family deserter committed to State's prison and on his release another prison sentence is to hang over him to be called for if he fails to properly provide for his family. All other cases are in the hands of our County Solicitor for prosecution.

The number of weeks of board furnished at the almshouse was 117 less than last year and as there has been very little change in the overhead expense, this has caused an increase in the cost of maintenance per inmate, while the actual cost for farm maintenance was less than last year.

The farm crops were good but their cash value was low compared with the past few years.

There is more livestock at the farm than last year, however, its value at present prices shows a decrease of \$2,381.40 compared with last year's prices.

The roofs of the farm buildings have been given a coat of paint and minor repairs made.

We wish to thank all who have taken any part in advancing the interest of the county and in any way brought good cheer to those committed to our care.

#### SOLICITOR'S REPORT

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

I beg leave to submit the following report of this office for the year beginning January 1, 1921, and ending December 31, 1921. During the period from January 1 to April 1, I served as commissioner solicitor, under appointment of the superior court. During the period from April 1 to December 31 I served as solicitor, having been elected to that office in November, 1920.

At the March term of court four indictments were returned by the grand jury. None of the respondents were apprehended, and the cases were continued. Four criminal cases appealed from the municipal courts were entered, all of which were disposed of. The three cases continued from the October, 1920, term were also disposed of.

The civil action brought by the County of Belknap against the County of Strafford under the pauper law was continued. The county brought suit against the City of Laconia to recover bail deposited in a criminal appeal case, and obtained judgment against the city therefor. The case was transferred to the supreme court on the defendant's bill of exceptions.

At the October term of the superior court the four cases continued from the March term were marked not to be printed, for the reason that none of the respondents could be located. Fifteen indictments were returned by the grand jury, all but one of which have been disposed of, the one not disposed of having been continued, for the reason that there was a civil action

pending covering the same matter. Only one criminal case appealed from the municipal courts was entered. This case was disposed of. The civil case brought by the County of Belknap against the County of Strafford was continued, it being in the process of transfer to the supreme court. The civil case brought by the County of Belknap against the City of Laconia was continued, it having been transferred to the supreme court, and pending therein.

The progress and disposition of all cases, criminal and civil, are matters of public record, and can be ascertained by any citizen.

#### CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

To the Board of Commissioners of Belknap County:

I herewith submit my report as chaplain of the County Farm for the year ending December 31, 1921.

Regular religious services have been held and an occasional week-night entertainment given.

Belknap County delegation met at 10 o'clock, A. M., in Room No. 156 for the purpose of organization.

The meetings was called to order by Lester Philbrook. J. B. F. Bell was elected temporary chairman.

Harry E. Trapp was then nominated permanent chairman, there being no other nomination he was elected by acclamation.

Nomination for clerk was called. Mr. Normandin placed in nomination William Kempton, Lester Philbrook nominated Charles O. Hopkins, no further nominations, proceeded to ballot. The chair appointed as tellers Frank Peaslee and Fortunate Normandin. The ballot was cast and stated as follows: Whole number of votes cast, 15; necessary for choice, 8. William Kempton had 3. C. O. Hopkins had 12, and was declared elected. Roll call resulted as follows: Oscar E. Davis of Alton, Frank E. Grant, Belmont; Oscar V. Rand, Gilford. Laconia, ward 1, George W. Tarlson; 2, Fortunate E. Normandin, Wm. D. Kempton; 3, Charles M. Avery: 4, Harry E. Trapp; 5, Joseph B. F. Bell, Lester Philbrook; 6, Charles O. Hopkins, Frank S. Peaslee. Meredith, Ralph N. Piper. New Hampton, Adelbert M. Gordon. Sanbornton, Walter A. Wilson. Tilton, Albert S. Carter. Those absent: Fred C. Berry, Barnstead; Louis L. Sanborn, Center Harbor; Charles F. Page, Gilmanton; Charles F. Little, Tilton; Charles H. Tilton, ward 4, Laconia. No further business appearing on motion of Davis of Alton, voted to adjourn, subject to call of chairman.

Laconia, N. H., February 25, 1921.

Belknap County Delegation met at the Belknap County Court House at 9.30 o'clock, A. M. The following members were present: Davis, Berry, Sanborn, Rand, Page, Tarlson, Kempton, Avery, Tilton, Trapp, Bell, Philbrook, Hopkins, Peaslee, Piper, Gordon, Grant, Wilson, Carter, Little. Mr. Randlett then addressed the Delegation, stating that before long the Court House would have to be enlarged to make room for the vaults which were fast being filled. He also called the attention of the Delegation to the fact that probably the Abbott property adjoining the Court House would, before long, be on the market, and the land would make a valuable addition to the property of the county for the purpose of erecting a boiler house outside the Court House, thus lessening the fire risk. As the boilers were getting old, they would soon have to be replaced. Lester Philbrook then spoke of land on the east side of the Court House which was purchased to enlarge the vaults, etc.

The Delegation then adjourned to the County Farm where a thorough inspection of buildings, stock, equipment, etc., was made, and everything was found to be in the best of condition.

After a bountiful dinner served by Mr. and Mrs. Batchelder the Delegation was called to order by Chairman Trapp, who stated that the meeting was called for the purpose of hearing the needs of the county and to act on the recommendations of the Commissioners for the years 1921 and 1922. Mr. Randlett then addressed the convention and stated that owing to the increased cost of labor and material, and that the House of Correction did not as in years previous furnish labor for carrying on the farm, outside help must be hired, thus increasing costs. He then made the following recommendations and asked their adoption by the Delegation: Poor of the farm, \$11,000.00; Soldiers and their families, \$400.00; Needy Blind, \$600.00; Almshouse and House of Correction, \$17,000.00; Court House, \$2,000.00; Jail, \$200.00; Medical Referee, \$100.00; Clerk of Court, \$100.00; Register of Deeds, \$700.00; Register of Probate, \$400.00; County Officers, \$1,350.00; Miscellaneous, \$150.00; Court Orders and Expenses, \$9,000.00; Interest, \$1,000.00. Making a total of \$44,000.00 (Forty-four Thousand Dollars. Estimated income from farm \$4,000.00, leaving the amount to be raised as \$40,000.00 (Forty Thousand Dollars).

The convention then went into executive session, and after some discussion, on motion of Tilton, voted to adopt the recommendations of the Commissioners and appropriate the sum of \$40,000.00 (Forty Thousand Dollars) for each of the years, 1921 and 1922. The convention was then addressed by John Hammond, Chairman of the Belknap County Farm

Bureau, who stated the needs of the Farm Bureau, and asked for an appropriation of \$2,800.00 (Two Thousand Eight Hundred Dollars) to carry on the work for the years 1921 and 1922, which after some discussion, on motion of Wm. Kempton was voted.

Mr. Ricker, County Agent, then addressed the convention and outlined the proposed work for the coming year. Davis of Alton, Grant of Belmont and others spoke of the benefit to the farmer of the Bureau, and especially the services of the County Agent and Home Demonstration Agent.

During the open meeting, remarks were made by Hon. Edwin C. Bean, Secretary of State, also County Solicitor Thomas P. Cheney, Register of Deeds Edward Lydiard, John Mathews, Supt. Batchelder and others.

On motion of Mr. Philbrook, voted to extend a vote of thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Batchelder for the excellent dinner. Motion unanimously carried. Matter of House Bill No. 315 in relation to increase of salary of sheriff was discussed, but no action taken at this time. No further business appearing the convention adjourned.
