SELECTMEN'S REPORT - TOWN REPORT 1986

PEOPLE - PLACES - THINGS

PEOPLE:

There have been several changes in our personnel this year. Russell Johnson retired from the office of Building Inspector to be replaced by Charles "Chuck" Ellingwood. We would like to take this time to thank Russ and to welcome Chuck on board. Chuck has his work cut out for him in 1987 with all of the added growth we are experiencing. Driveway and Building Permits are processed through our office.

We have been relieved of our duties as Health officers, a position that has not been filled for the past 2 years, and are fortunate to have Devin Starlanyl now serving in that capacity. Devin comes to us with a wealth of experience and knowledge in many aspects involving health. Since May, Devin has been involved with many items including but not limited to - septic approvals on conversions from seasonal to year round use and failed systems, Radon, Pesticides, household hazardous waste and will be testing the lake in 1987.

The newest addition to our forces is Berneice "Bunny" Peakes, our Secretary, who arrived on the scene not any too soon, the last week in April. Bunny may be found holding down the fort from 9:00 - 1:00.

During the course of the year, we appointed an ad hoc committee to look into the existing transfer station and dump operation. Our Solid Waste Study Committee is being served by Judy Shaw, Suzanne Thompson, William Henry, and Gail Fleming. The committee has been charged with bringing in a report and any recommendations by June 1st.

Five people were appointed to be part of the Firearms Committee looking into the ordinances dealing with the discharging of firearms within the town. Those serving were: Robert Furlone, Chrm., Thomas Allen, Anthony Souza, Stephen Bevis, and Eric Sargent. Jerry Scanlan sat in representing the selectmen.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of those serving the community on all of the Boards and Commissions. It would certainly be interesting to comput the total number of man/woman hours, not to mention the expertise donated to the betterment of our town.

Our special thanks go out to the Parks and Recreation Commission for their energies given to the North Shore Beach Project

and to the Planning Board for their increased hours and revamping of the subdivision procedures making a more efficient and effective planning process.

PLACES:

A great amount of time was spent during the beginning of the year in meetings and discussions involving the Hinsdale bridges and a proposed road from Hinsdale to Chesterfield through Mt. Wantastiquet State Park. A letter objecting to the proposals presented was sent to the Governor's office signed by selectmen from Hinsdale, Brattleboro and Chesterfield.

We are all aware of the proposed site for a regional landfill off Rte 9 on the property presently owned by Joseph Gallagher, the outcome to be decided in the near future.

The State has ordered monitoring wells on our present transfer station - stump dump site requiring a closure plan for the stump dump. The firm of Dufresne-Henry has been hired to handle this situation for us and more will be heard about this in 1987.

We are extremely proud of the new look at the North Shore Beach.

THINGS:

Our latest purchase is an electronic typwritter that has a self-correcting feature and uses several type wheels for a variety of printing. This machine can interface with our computer. We are typing our town report this year for the first time, hoping to save time and money but yet still produce a quality product.

John Leahy has worked diligently in creating programs added to our computer - The two latest are a program for Trust Funds and an Accounting program with which our financial system will be handled. John has spent endless hours in customizing our computer software. Our thanks to you, John.

GENERALLY SPEAKING:

We encourage all to read the separate reports from the departments and committees in our town report and welcome anyone interested in working for our town to contact our office.

We are launched into the growth being experienced in the Southwestern part of the state. We are ideally located between Keene and Brattleboro not too far from Rte 91. There are several projects taking place in our commercial zones and a number of proposed subdivisions and cluster developments before the Planning

Board. This projected growth has already started to cause many departments to feel the pressure from this added increase.

TOWN MEETING 1986

Proceedings of the Annual Meeting of the voters of the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, called at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 11, 1986.

At 10 o'clock in the forenoon, James Milani rang the Town Hall bell signalling the opening of the polls. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Carl A. Johnson, who read the warrant through Articles One and Two and declared the polls opened for voting for town officers and amendments to the Zoning and Building Ordinances.

At 6:30p.m. the Moderator called the 219th town meeting to order with Warren Allen and Ethel Mills as Assistant Moderator and Assistant Town Clerk, respectively.

The Moderator called for a moment of silent recognition for Larry Taylor, Who passed away January 3, 1986, followed by the invocation by Rev. Harold L. Hawlk.

Local officials and town representatives were introduced by the Moderator.

The following resolution, presented by James Milani, was unanimously accepted.

"Whereas, Lawrence W. Taylor well and faithfully served the Town of Chesterfield, both as an employee and as its representative to various local and regional bodies, and in many other capacities public and private; and

Lawrence W. Taylor enriched our lives with his ready smile, his open hand, and his gentle spirit; and

Lawrence W. Taylor, quietly and generously assisted the youth of this town and points beyond with the goods of this world within his power; and

Lawrence W. Taylor, knowing these children to be the seeds of the future, gave far more freely of the greater gifts of his time, his wisdom, his guidance, and the example of his life; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT

Resolved, that the Town Meeting of March 11th, 1986 be gratefully and respectfully dedicated to the memory of Lawrence W. Taylor:

That this resolution become a part of the permanent records of this town;

and that a copy of this Resolution be presented to the family of Mr. Taylor.

A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by William Mitchell to waive the reading of the warrant and the Moderator would read each article as it was considered.

- ARTICLE 3 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Jane Allen and seconded by Merton Yeaton to allow a 2% discount on real estate taxes paid in full up to fourteen (14) days (inclusive) of the postmarked date of the tax bill or act in any other way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 4 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by William Mitchell to authorize the Tax Collector to receive prepayment of Resident and Property taxes prior to the issuing of a Warrant or act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 5 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Susan Newcomer and supported by Mary Gold to authorize the selectmen to borrow money upon the credit of the Town in anticpation of taxes, or act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 6 The report of the Budget Committee was given by the chairman, James Milani, who stated the committee had met the required number of times and recommended the budget except for two minor changes. A motion made by William Mitchell and seconded by Jane Allen to accept the report was in the affirmative.
- ARTICLE 7 A standing vote did not pass on a motion made by Alfred Burley and seconded by Holly Huse to take each item up individually.

A voice vote was in the affirmative to accept Article 7 as read.

- ARTICLE 8 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by Alvin Davis to raise and appropriate the sum of\$16,400.00 for the construction and reconstruction of Town roads, or to act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 9 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by William Mitchell and seconded by Alvin Davis to raise and appropriate the sum of \$33,000.00 for tarring Town roads, or to act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 10 A voice vote was in the affirmative on an amendment made by James Milani and seconded by Susan Newcomer to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 to be added to the Highway Equipment Capital Reserve Fund, or to act in any other way relating thereto, as recommended by the Budget Committee.
- ARTICLE 11 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by Gary Winn to authorize the Selectmen to expend from the Revenue Sharing Account a sum of money not to exceed \$14,500.00 for the purpose of renovating the North Shore Beach property or act in any way relating thereto.

- ARTICLE 12 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by William Mitchell and supported by Glenn Chickering to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,503.00 to be added to the Parks and Recreation Building Capital Reserve Fund, or act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 13 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Dean Ericson and seconded by Richard Cooper to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000.00 to be added to the Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund for a 4" hose truck with pump for the CFD, or act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 14 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by William Mitchell and seconded by April McDonald to authorize the Selectmen to expend from the Revenue Sharing Account a sum of money not to exceed \$2,500.00 for the purpose of purchasing a copier for the Library, or act in any way relating thereto.

- ARTICLE 18 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Jane Allen and seconded by Susan Newcomer to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 fo fund the Meals-On-Wheels program for elderly and handicapped shut-in citizens of Chesterfield, or act in any way relating thereto. Sponsored through Home Health Care and Community Services.
- ARTICLE 19 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Mary Gold and seconded by Donald Emery to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,047.20 to help support the work of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service or to act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 20 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by James Milani and seconded by Helen Burley to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for the support of the United Way as follows:

or to act in any way relating thereto.

- ARTICLE 21 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Mary Gold and seconded by Audrey Ericson to have the work of the Old Home Day Committee, as established in 1985, continue for the 1986 celebration, or act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 22 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Mary Gold and seconded by Lorraine Gates to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the 1986 Old Home Day Celebration, or act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 23 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Gary Winn and seconded by April McDonald to raise and appropriate the sum of \$192.00 to support the work of the Windham Youth Services, or act in any way relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 24 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Michael Wiggin and seconded by Robert Beard to authorize the Selectmen to establish a Committee of five (5) to study the ordinances dealing with the discharging of firearms within the Town of Chesterfield and other ordinances regarding the same.
- ARTICLE 25 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Gary Winn and seconded by Alvin Davis to accept a road known as extension to Mountain Road at such time as all requirements have been met and approved by the Selecmen and Road Agent.
- ARTICLE 26 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Joan Dittrich and seconded by Susan Newcomer to adopt written welfare guidelines as proposed by the Board of Selectmen and permit the selectmen to amend said guidelines as the need arises, or act in any way relating thereto. Chapter 380 of the Laws of 1985 requires the Town to adopt written welfare guidelines prior to April 1, 1986. (Copies of the full text of the proposed guidelines are on file with the Town Clerk)
- ARTICLE 27 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Richard Wolf and seconded by Glenn Chickering to accept a parcel of land presently belonging to Michael and Bridget Leclaire being the firepond located on the corner on Old Chesterfield Road and Horseshoe Road, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 28 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by William Mitchell to authorize the Selectmen to cost-share with landowners the expense of them hiring a professional forester to oversee timber harvests on their lands within the Town. Said cost-share amount shall be determined by the Selectmen and shall not exceed 10% of the actual timber yield tax revenues paid by the landowner to the Town, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 29 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by William Mitchell to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the state, federal, or other government unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-b, or act in any way relating thereto.

ARTICLE 30 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by William Mitchell and seconded by Alfred Burley to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deed by Public Auction or advertised sealed bid, and upon such terms and conditions as they deem appropriate, or to act in any way relating thereto.

A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and supported by Antonio Souza to dispense with the reading of Article 31 - Flood Plain Development Regulations.

ARTICLE 31 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by William Mitchell to amend the Building Regulations pursuant to RSA 156-A as follows:

Add a new Section 13.14. FLOODPLAIN DEVELOPMENT REGULATIONS, and rescind regulations previously adopted by Town Meetings of 1983 and 1984.

The following regulations shall apply to all lands designated as flood hazard areas by the Federal Emergency Management Agency in its "Flood Insurance Study for the Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire" together with the associated Flood Insurance Rate Maps and Flood Boundary and Floodway maps of tha Town of Chesterfield, New Hampshire, dated April 2, 1986 which are declared to be a part of this ordinance.

1. All proposed development in any special flood hazard area shall require a permit. The term "development" is defined to mean "any man-made change to improved or unimproved real estate, including, but not limited to, buildings or other structures, mining, dredging, filling, grading, paving, excavation or drilling operations". The permit shall be issued by the Planning Board after review of the development

plan as either a subdivision and/or site plan. The permit shall be entitled "Flood Hazard Development Permit".

2. The Building Inspector shall review all building permit applications for new construction or substantial improvements (meaning any repair, reconstruction, or improvement of a structure, the cost of which equals or exceeds 50% of the market value of the structure either (a) before the improvement or repair is started, or (b) if the structure has been damaged, and is being restored, before the damage occurred, to determine whether proposed building sites will be reasonably safe from flooding. If a proposed building site is in a location that has a flood hazard, any proposed new construction or substantial improvement (including pre-fabricated and mobile homes) must (i) be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent floatation, collapse, or lateral movement of the structure; (ii) use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage; and (iii) use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.)

The term "substantial improvement" does not include either;

- a) any project for improvement of a structure in order to comply with existing State or local health, sanitary, or safety code specifications which are solely necessary to assure safe living conditions, or
- b) any alteration of a structure listed on the National Register of Historic Places or a State Inventory of Historic Places.
- 3. Where new and replacement water and sewer systems (including on-site systems) are proposed in flood-prone areas, the applicant shall provide the Planning Board with assurance that new and replacement sanitary sewage systems will be designed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of flood waters into the systems and discharges from the systems into flood waters and on-site waste disposal systems be located to avoid impairment to them or contamination from them during flooding.
- 4. The Selectmen shall maintain for public inspection and furnish upon request, any certification of floodproofing, and information on the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) of the level of the lowest floor (including basement) of all new or substantially improved structures, and include whether or not such structures contain a basement, and if the structure has been flood-proofed, the elevation (in relation to mean sea level) to which the structure was floodproofed. This information must be furnished by the applicant when

applying for a Flood Hazard Development Permit.

- 5. The Planning Board shall review proposed developments to assure that all necessary permits have been applied for and/or received from those governmental agencies for which approval is required by Federal or State law, including Section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972, 33 U.S.C. 1334. It shall be the responsibility of the applicant to certify these assurances to the Planning Board.
- 6. In riverine situations, prior to the alteration or relocation of a watercourse, the applicant for such authorization shall notify the N.H. Office of State Planning and Wetlands Board and submit copies of such notification to the Planning Board and the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Further, the applicant shall be required to submit copies of said notification to those adjacent communities as determined by the Planning Board.

Within the altered or relocated portion of any watercourse, the applicant shall submit to the Planning Board, certification provided by a registered professional engineer asuring that the flood carrying capacity of the watercourse has been maintained.

The following requirements shall apply in specific zones designated on the Flood Insurance Rate Maps:

- 7. In unnumbered "A" zones, as defined on the community's Flood Insurance Rate Map, the Planning Board shall obtain, review and reasonably utilize any 100 year flood elevation data available from a Federal, State, or other source, as criteria for requiring that (i) all new construction and substantial improvements of residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated to or above the 100 year flood level, and (ii) that all new construction and substantial mprovements of non-residential structures have the lowest floor (including basement) elevated or flood-proofed to or above the 100 year flood level. The Planning Board may require the applicant seeking a Flood Hazard Development Permit to provide the 100 year flood elevation data.
- 8. Mobile homes to be placed within Zone A shall be installed using methods and practices which minimize flood damage. For the purposes of this requirement, mobile homes must be elevated and anchored to resist floatation, collapse, or lateral movement. Methods of anchoring may include, but are not to be limited to, use of over-the-top or frame ties to ground anchors. This requirement is in addition to applicable State and local anchoring requirements for resisiting wind forces.

ARTICLE 32 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by Cornelia Jenness and seconded by Thomas Woodman to amend the article to accept the amount of \$1600.00 to establish a trust fund to be known as the Chesterfield P.T.A. Scholastic Award, or to act in any way thereto. The interest of this fund to be awarded annually, beginning in June 1987, to one or more Keene High School graduating senior(s) with the highest academic ranking(s), who reside in Chesterfield, who graduated from Chesterfield Elementary School, and who intend to further their education. The amount and number of the award(s) to be determined by the Trustees of the Trust Funds, the student recipient(s) to be selected by the principal of Keene High School, and the award(s) to be presented by a member of the Chesterfield School Board at the appropriate time. Additions may be made to the fund from time to time.

ARTICLE 33 A voice vote was unanimous on a motion made by Diane Allen and seconded by Susan Newcomer to adopt the following resolution: to oppose the burial, storage, transportation and production of high level radioactive waste in the Town of Chesterfield and State of New Hampshire; and to call upon Congress to conduct an independent investigation with full public participation into the feasibility and prudence of the US Department of Energy's (DOE's) present plan to dispose of radioactive waste and into the DOE's competence to carry out such a plan. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the Governor of New Hampshire, the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation, and to the President of the United States.

ARTICLE 34 A voice vote was unanimous on a motion made by James Milani and seconded by Susan Newcomer to adopt the following resolution, as it has for the past four years: urging the Presidents of the United States of America and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to use any and all peaceful means to request and encourage those nations to enact an immediate and mutual freeze on the production, testing and deployment of nuclear weapons and nuclear weapons delivery systems; and subsequently for both nations to engage in a mutual reduction of such weapons and delivery systems; provided that such freeze and reduction include such safeguards as are necessary and reasonable to ensure mutual and mutually verifiable compliance on the parts of both nations.

ARTICLE 35 A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by Cornelia Jenness to create a cemetery maintenance trust fund, to be known as the Chesterfield Cemetery Maintenance Trust Fund, the income of which is to be used for the care, maintenance, and improvement of the public cemeteries in the Town of Chesterfield, or act in any way relating thereto.

A voice vote was in the affirmative on a motion made by John Leahy and seconded by James Milani to accept Articles 36 through 39, inclusive, as printed and to dispense with the reading of same. These articles as adopted are as follows.

ARTICLE 36 The Town voted to accept the following with the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield Cemetery Commission for the perpetual care and upkeep of the Spofford Annex Cemetery and to be known as:

- I. Any violation of this title or any violation of a local ordinance, code, or regulation adopted pursuant to this title may be made punishable, as determined by the local governing body, by either:
 - (a) A civil fine of not more than \$100.00 for each day that such violation if found by a court to continue after the conviction date or after the date on which the violator receives written notice from the municipality that he is in violation of any ordinance or regulation adopted under this title, which ever date is earlier: or
 - (b) A criminal penalty, which shall be:
 - 1. A misdemeanor if the violation is committed by a natural person: or
 - 2. A felony if the violation is committed by any other person.
- II. In any legal action brought by a municipality to enforce, by way of injunctive relief as provided by RSA 676:15 or otherwise, any local ordinance, code or regulation adopted under this title or to enforce any planning board, zoning board of adjustment or building code board of appleals decision made pursuant to this title, or to seek the payment of any fine levied under paragraph 1, the municipality may recover its costs and reasonable attorney's fees actually expended in pursuing the legal action if it is found to be a prevailing party in the action. For the purpose of this paragraph, recoverable costs shall include all out-of-pocket expenses actually incurred, including but not limited to, inspection fees, expert fees and investigatory expenses.
- III. If any violation of a local ordinance, code or regulation, or any violation of a planning board, zoning board of adjustment or building code of appeals decision, results in the expenditure of public funds by a municipality which are not reimbursed under Paragraph II, the court in its discretion may order, as an additional civil penalty, that a violator make restitution to the municipality for such funds so expended.
- IV. The superior court may, upon a petition filed by a municipality and after notice and preliminary hearing as in the case of prejudgement attachments under RSA 511-A, require an alleged violator to post a bond with the court to secure payment of any penalty of remedy or the performance of any injunctive relief which may be ordered or both. At the hearing, the burden shall be on the municipality to show that there is a strong likelihood that

it will prevail on the merits, that the penalties or remedies sought are reasonably likely to be awarded by the court in an amount consistent with the bond sought, and that the bond represents the amount of the projected expense of compliance with the injunctive relief sought.

REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

There were fifty-two driveway permits issued in 1986. This is not counting the numerous house lots coming into town through sub-divisions.

We did not have any new equipment purchases this year. This put more burden on the repair fund.

The asphalt resurfacing program for 1986 fell behind due to the request to have the highway department rebuild the North Shore Beach and the order from the State of New Hampshire to clean up all metal at the dump site. This amounted to ten weeks of extra work which had not been planned for in our 1986 work schedule. However, we did pave the Tuttle Road and Edgar Road projects that were reconstructed in 1985.

The construction of the Lincoln Road project is about 60% complete. It should not be paved until 1988.

The 1987 asphalt resurfacing schedule is as follows:

Sugar Maple Lane Wellington Drive Wilde Road Spring Street Poor Road Cobleigh Road River Road

The addition of the care of Town Cemeteries also raised havoc with the highway department schedule. There were nineteen graves dug in 1986 which is triple the average in a year.

REPORT OF THE CHESTERFIELD POLICE DEPARTMENT

1986

To the Townspeople of Chesterfield:

As has been the case for the past few years, the Police Department saw it's numbers and activity increase on a par with the rest of the county. The developing pattern seems to indicate that the "quiet time" usually associated with the winter months has become a thing of the past.

As a department, we are experiencing the problems that you would expect in a growing community. The demand for service has increased at a higher proportion than has the ability to deal with these demands. This is especially true in the Major crime area. Our efforts to solve the Burglaries, Assaults, Thefts, etc. are constantly interupted by the multitude of other requests for service. It is in this area that I am concentrating my efforts for improvement in 1987.

In our Budget request for 1987, you will note that I am looking for a third Full-Time officer. We have reached the point that it is no longer cost efficient to rely heavily on Part-Time officers. Insurance costs, liability suits and scheduling all have made the need to switch the emphasis from Part-Time to Full-Time a necessity. We would still use the Part-Time officers but more for special details and extra patrols. Investigations would be handled by the Full-Time officers who work regular shifts instead of once a week or so.

I have also submitted a proposal to renovate the garage located in the parking lot to a Police Station. With our increased workload has come an increase in the need for a separate facility. There were several instances in 1986 where we brought people into the station that were less than polite and the Selectmen were treated to an interupted meeting. Our present location is totally unsuitable in that people are constantly walking through our office on their way to the kitchen or other parts of the building. There is no privacy or security for the files or information that we need in this business. The plan that I have submitted should be adequate for the next several years without the need for additions or changes.

As I have stated in the past, I would like to see more involvement on the communities part in calling in suspicious activity to us. Remember that we only have one cruiser on at a time and it cannot be everywhere. I would also like to restate that if someone would like to talk to me or discusses the Police Department I can be easily reached at 352-1100 or you can try the

office at 363-4233.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION REPORT - 1986

Meeting 15 times during 1986, the Parks & Recreation Commission continues to oversee both town recreation programs and the operation of the Ware's Grove and North Shore town beaches.

Our major focus this year was the renovation of the North Shore beach in time for its Memorial Day opening. Work included tree cutting, terracing of the beach, digging a gravel drainage ditch, and improving the restroom-concession building. We are especially grateful to Selectman Jerry Scanlan for his help on this project: his inspiration and his donations of lumber, millwork, and labor. We also appreciate the help of Road Agent Alvin Davis and his crew, as well as the assistance of Stub, Inc.

A second major concern was the finding and monitoring of new concessionaires for each beach.

Completing her first season as Recreation Director, Wendy Chamberlin, with the help of her husband Mike, has worked diligently to enforce Commission policies. In addition, she has brought fresh ideas to our existing program. She and her staff, for instance, offered swim lessons at no charge to local children and 60 young people participated. She also outfitted beach employees in easily identifiable orange t-shirts labeled "Spofford Lake Staff".

We continue to offer a 2-day-a-week, 8-week summer program of games and field trips to Chesterfield youth ages 6 and up at Ware's Grove or Chesterfield School. Daily attendance averaged 40.

We also continued our Thursday Night at the Movies program. One hundred ninety seven people came to Ware's Grove (or the Town Hall) at dusk to view 7 family-oriented films.

Despite 23 days made unsuitable for swimming by rain, both beaches generated income during their Memorial Day to Labor Day seasons in 1986. Ware's Grove brought in \$19,226.50 and North Shore, \$4,627.50. Resident admission fees remained the same: adults, \$.50; children, no charge. We increased admission fees for non-resident adults from \$1.00 to \$1.50 and for non-resident children from \$.50 to \$.75. (About 88% of the income from each beach comes from non-residents.) We feel that the daily beach attendant at North Shore now enables us to monitor use of this beach more effectively than in the past when the concessionaire did this.

Our budget provides some support for two sports programs which benefit town youth, ages 5-11: the Chesterfield Youth Baseball Program (82 participants) and the Chesterfield Pee Wee Soccer Program (70 participants). We are most grateful to the volunteer adults who make these programs possible.

In April we welcomed the appointment of Jim Hertzler to the Commission. Jim replaced Jeanne Viarengo, who had served as chairperson with distinction and good humor. Bill Bassler was elected new chairperson.

In 1987 we hope to focus on continued planning for a new building at the edge of Ware's Grove beach, to allow for more safely accessible restrooms and concession counter.

Commission members welocme citizens' comments on the operation of town beaches and recreation programs. Our meetings are posted and are open to the public.

CHESTERFIELD PLANNING BOARD

Planning Board Meetings were held on the first Monday of each month in 1986. In addition, due to workload requirements, work sessions for application reviews and formulating new zoning regulations were held, resulting in about twice the normal number of meetings.

Richard Lawson was appointed to the Board replacing Richard Paul who became an alternate member. The Board reviewed six site plan applications, eleven subdivisions and three boundary line adjustments. Most of the activity was residential in nature, with several proposals involving cluster development and mixed uses.

The Board initiated the preparation of new zoning and flood plain regulations, working with a Planning Consultant retained to aid the Board in complying with State land use statutes. The new regulations are to be proposed in 1987.

As always, Planning Board meetings are open to the public and we urge participation in these matters of interest and importance to the residents of the Town.

CEMETERY COMMISSION REPORT

The 1986 season was a vey busy one for the Commission. This first in which the care of the cemeteries was the responsibility of the Highway Department, saw an early start to the mowing season; one that did not slow down until snow fell in November. A small used pick-up truck, purchased by the Town, was a great help in the transportation of mowers and personnel. Burials were nearly three times the usual number, putting a strain on an already busy crew. Some reassignment of personnel will hopefully alleviate this problem.

Lot sales also increased in 1986. The number of burial lots remaining in the Spofford Cemetery is limited. However, many lots still remain in Friedsam Cemetery, with adequate acreage to lay out more lots. Single lots are \$150.00, with \$100.00 going to a Cemetery Maintenance Trust Fund, the remaining to cemetery development. Lot owners are being encouraged to purchase granite corner markers. These will be installed by the Commission and ease in the locating of a lot.

This fall, a large dying maple tree was safely removed from Spofford Cemetery by a sub-contractor. We would like to thank the cemetery crew for their excellent work this year, with a special thank you to Sexton Alvin Davis. Shirley Bevis was appointed to the Commission to fill the unexpired term of David Hall, who resigned.

REPORT OF THE CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

1986

APPOINTMENTS

The office of Civil Defense Director changed hands in May of this year with my appointment subsequent to Michael North moving from Chesterfield. I then nominated Dean Ericson of Chesterfield (also a fire officer and emergency medical technician), to serve in the position of Deputy Director. He was appointed to this position.

PRIORITIES

Our first actions were to try to establish some priorities to guide us. Those include: improving communications, developing a training program in disaster management in order to better coordinate the various town emergency services and support groups to function as a team in the event of a major natural or other disaster, and to review inventories of equipment and information.

FEDERAL AND STATE FUNDING

We have included additional funds in our 1987 proposed budget in hopes of meeting our first priority, that of improving our system of communications. It is important to note, however, that 50% of the total civil defense budget is funded through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), which means that the actual impact on the town is one-half of the amount listed. this remaining amount may be offset partially or in total by additional funding through the state.

WEATHER ALERT RADIOS

All Chesterfield residents living within the ten(10) mile emergency planning zone should have a weather alert radio in their home. These radios are used to issue a warning in the event of an emergency at the Vermont Vankee Nuclear Power Station in Vernon, VT. If you do not have one of these radios, or have one which is malfunctioning, please contact the Selectmen's office for assistance. Any resident moving out of town should leave this radio in the house for use by the next occupant.

SPECIAL NEEDS

We encourage anyone who feels that they may need help in evacuating their premises during any type of disaster to contact the Selectmen's office and fill out a card indicating this. All information of this nature will be considered confidential.

In closing, I would like to thank the Selectmen, Administrative

Assistant Joan Dittrich, and David Deans of the New Hampshire Civil Defense Agency for their continued support and assistance.

The calls I've received have ranged in topics from pesticide use, radon, and hazardous household waste to hospice and mental health. And, of course septic systems. It's a big job, and I need all of you to help. If anyone is aware of a problem, or notices a potential problem developing, give me a call. We're in a choice area, and our town is growing rapidly. Together, we can assure it is maintained as a healthy one.

ANNUAL REPORT - 1986

The Chesterfield Home Health Agency, now in its twelfth year of existence, continues its Participation and Management Agreement with Home Health Care and Community Services for providing home health related care to the residents of Chesterfield. For information or referral of these services please call the local office, 363-4337 or the main office, 352-4309 and 352-2593.

The April, 1986 Annual Meeting consisting of a panel of speakers representing the selectmen, school nurse, Home Health Agency nurse and nutritionist, fire department and emergency medical technicians provided much information on present town health related services and problems. It is hoped the result of this meeting will lead to more cooperation among town agencies. As a continuation along this line, the new town health officer, Devin Starlanyl, will be present at the 1987 Annual Meeting on April 21st to discuss the expanding role of her office. Everyone is urged to attend.

Once more your Agency assisted the school nurse in the annual Pre-school Hearing and Vision Clinic on May 21. 67 children were screened with 66 positive hearing tests and 1 continued for treatment; 49 hearing tests were positive, 13 continued for retesting and 5 continued for treatment. 14 volunteers worked with the State team testing and providing nutritious snacks.

Old Home Day in August found us participating in the Senior Social, a festive affair where old-timers had a chance to renew friendships and make new friends.

We wish to thank the Town of Chesterfield for its continued support in providing funds for home health services, clinics and meals-on-wheels for the residents of our town.

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MINUTES OF THE 1986 FIRE DISTRICT MEETING

Moderator Michael P. Bentley called the annual meeting to order at 7:35p.m. The meeting was dedicated to Otto Schlichting for his many years of service to the Precinct and a minute of silence was observed.

- Article 1: To choose a moderator for the ensuing year. Michael P. Bentley was duly nominated and elected.
- Article 2: To choose a clerk/treasurer for the ensuing year. Catherine Schlichting was nominated and sworn in.
- Article 3: To choose a commissioner for three years, 1986-87-88. Gordon Fuller was elected.
- Article 4: To see if the District will vote to adopt the budget or act thereon. A motion was made to amend the waterholes appropriation to \$1,000 and accepted. After the meeting voted to approve the budget with this amendment the warrant passed to Articles 5 and 6. After discussing Article 6, it was voted to reconsider Article 4 and increase the equipment repairs and maintenance appropriation by \$1,200.00 to upgrade the Scott airpacks. The budget passed with both increases raising the total to \$39,050.00.
- Article 5: To see if the District will authorize the Commissioners to borrow money in anticipation of taxes to pay current expenses. The Article was passed unanimously.
- Article 6: To see if the District will vote to appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 to pruchase 500 feet of 4-inch hose with couplings and 500 feet of 1-3/4 inch blitz line with couplings and nozzle. It was voted to reduce this article by \$1,200.00 and the article carried as amended.
- Article 7: To see if the District will vote to establish a Building Committee to look into the needs of the Spofford Village Hall. This motion was passed and the Moderator will so do.
- Article 8: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. John Leahy gave the following report on the activity of the Fire Department. There were 104 calls: 62 were Rescue calls; 18 of these were accidents with 2 fatalities and there were 42 fire calls. This was down substantially. The meeting was adjourned at 8:02 p.m.





CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

MARCH 8, 1986

The Clerk, Diana S. Allen, gave the oath of Assistant Moderator to Warren Allen. Mr. Allen opened the polls at 10:00 am for voting. The following persons were appointed Ballot Clerks and took the oath of office from the Clerk: Marilyn Taylor, Thomas Allen, Jo Anne Morse, Elizabeth Yacubian, James Milani, and Sandra Wiggin.

At 8:06 pm the Moderator, Michael Bently, called the meeting to order for the purpose of acting on the articles in the warrant. The Moderator introduced officials of S.A.U. #29, the Chesterfield School Board, and Mr. Robert Johnson, principal fo Chesterfield School.

The Moderator recognized Elizabeth Benjamin, Chairman of the School Board made the following statement:

DEDICATION OF MEETING

At this time the Chesterfield School Board would like to request of this gathering that the 1986 Chesterfield School District Meeting be dedicated to the

memory of Lawrence W. Taylor.

Not only was Larry a friend of many of the adults in town but, even more so, he was a friend of our children. From his loving support of our children at the Tiny Tots Kindergarten to his extensive involvement with the students participating in the American Heritage Tours, as well as other youth programs, he taught by example the most important lesson we can ever learn, that of love. Love of friends... love of country...and the love and appreciation of moral values. There is a quotation from The Little Prince which states: "It is only with the heart that one can see rightly; what is essential is invisible to the eye." Larry was indeed a man who could "see rightly"; he was truly The Man Who Loved Children.

A moment of silence in memory of Lawrence Taylor followed the dedication.

The Moderator recognized Warren Allen who made a motion to dispense with the reading of the warrant and to read each article as it is taken up. Seconded by

Jo Anne Morse. The Moderator declared the voice vote to be carried in the affirmative.

Articles in the warrant were disposed of as follows:

ARTICLE 1: Beverly Wolf moved that all reports contained in the Chesterfield Annual School District Report be approved as printed. Seconded by Susan Newcomer. The Moderator declared a voice vote in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 2: Jane Allen moved and Dorothy O'Neil seconded the motion that the District authorize the school board to make application for, and to accept and use in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof, or any federal, state, or private agency. The voice vote was declared by the Moderator to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 3: Glenn Chickering moved that the District authorize the school board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1986-1987 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money. Seconded by Ruth VanHouten. Voice vote declared by the Moderator to be in the Affirmative.

ARTICLE 4: Elizabeth Yacubian moved that the District vote to authorize the school board to contract with a qualified independent auditing firm or the Department of Revenue Administration for the fiscal year audit, in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire (Chapter 671). Such authorization to remain in effect until such time as provided by state statutes and further, the term of the auditor elected this date under Article 1 of the election warrant shall become null and void, and the term of the previously elected auditor shall terminate June 30, 1986. Seconded by Robert Yacubian. The Moderator declared the voice vote to be in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 5: Elizabeth Benjamin moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate \$1,546,523.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school dictrict officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Susan Newcomer.

Warren Allen moved to amend ARTICLE 5 to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,503,833.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Seconded by Helen Burley. After lengthy discussion and a petition for a vote by paper ballot, the Moderator asked registered voters to cast their ballots. The official town checklst was used with the amendment to ARTICLE 5 being defeated 69 yes votes to 63 no votes.

A voice vote was declared by the Moderator to be in the affirmative on ARTICLE 5.

ARTICLE 6: Susan Newcomer moved that the District vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000.00 to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established by the district on March 7, 1985 under ARTICLE 5 for the expansion of the Chesterfield School and for the purchase of equipment of a lasting character to be placed in such school or school addition. Seconded by Robert Yacubian.

Don Emery moved to amend the article to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of 100,000 to be deposited in the Capital Reserve Fund established by the district on March 7, 1985 under ARTICLE 5 for the expansion of the Chesterfiled School and for the purchase of equipment of a lasting character to be placed in such school or school addition. Seconded by Alfred Burley. The Moderator declared the standing vote to be in the negative.

The Moderator, after being presented a petition for a vote by paper ballot on ARTICLE 6, asked all registered voters to cast their ballots. The official town check list and the vote was 86 yes, 43 no, and the Moderator declared ARTICLE 6 passed.

ARTICLE 7: James Milani moved that the District amend the 1966 Keene Authorized Regional Enrollment

Area plan, serving grades 9 through 12 in the school districts of Chesterfield, Harrisville, Keene, Marlow, Nelson, Stoddard, and Westmoreland in accordance with the provisions of the amended plan printed in this warrant. Seconded by James O'Neil, Jr.

Ruth VanHouten requested that the following notation be placed in the minutes of this meeting: Under C in the Agreement the words "comprehensive high school" have been struck from the original wording of this section and replaced with the words "fully approved high school."

Using a paper ballot and the official town check list ARTICLE 7 passed unanimously with 51 yes votes and 0 no votes. The Moderator declared this motion passed in the affirmative.

ARTICLE 8: Elizabeth Benjamin made the following statement:

Whereas, Richard L. Champagne has served the Chesterfield School District with distinction, as Assistant Superintendent from 1974 thru 1976, and as Superintendent from 1977 to the present, and as such has consistently supported the elected officials of Chesterfield while earnestly directing the course of education toward excellence;

Be it resolved, that this community, in sincere appreciation, offers the following:

May your joy be full.
May your dreams be great,
and their fullfillment sevenfold.
May your love ever grow.
May you never lack hope.
May you always have peace.

A lengthy standing ovation for Superintendent Richard Champagne followed.

Jane Allen moved that the School Board set the time of the March School District Meeting for 6:30 pm. Seconded by Winstron Cray. The Moderator declared the voice vote to be in the affirmative.

CHESTERFIELD SCHOOL DISTRICT ADMINISTRATIVE REPORT

A vote for the school addition to the Chesterfield School is essential this year. School space, which will be used by the town for generations to come, can be purchased now at building and interest rates which we may not see again. If voted, taxes will not be increased over the present level due to the wise decision to establish the Capital Reserve Fund in 1985.

Space needs for classrooms, library, multi-purpose room, future programs, storage, and community activities are well documented. Spending money on an inadequate building that can no longer give the service that should be given to provide Chesterfield children with the start in life they should have is false economy. Our students are an investment in our future and an expense which will pay back the community for years to come.

With this report are charts showing the proposed 1987-88 school budget requires a 5.1% increase or \$89,944. over the current budget. That is a reasonable increase that will allow the district to continue progressing well. We are fortunate to have a strong staff and continued community involvement and support that have helped us to overcome facility needs. We appreciate the services and contributions of so many to our school system. Chesterfield is a fine example of the fact that small districts work well when good people give of their time, talent and energy to allow the schools to be successful. Special appreciation goes to the Facilities Committee, parents, school volunteers, and community service organizations which support our programs.

It has been a special privilege for me to have worked with so many fine individuals. Thank you for your support.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT 1985-1986

On September 3, 1985, the Chesterfield School opened with 216 students in attendance. The new staff members were Elizabeth Sharp, instructional computer associate and Caroline Wheeler, 1st grade teacher.

During the 1985-1986 school year the staff and administration focused their attention on a number of fronts.

With the help and support of Mary Lou Kelly and Carol Riendeau, we were able to make some major changes in our hot lunch program. Students in grades 4-8 are now able to serve "themselves" at tables set up with hot vegetables, dessert/fruit, butter and peanut butter with bread, and a tossed salad. Students are allowed to take all they wish, but are expected to eat all they take. Students will continue to have the main entre' served from the kitchen. Additionally, 3 beverages are now available: 2% low fat milk, whole milk and orange juice. Students reaction to these changes - excited, pleased, filled, satisfied. By increasing the numbers of students participating in our hot lunch program we hope to offset the increased cost of operating the program.

Our students in grades 4 and 8 participated in statewide testing along with all other 4th and 8th graders in New Hampshire. The results of the testing for this year will serve as baseline data, a bench mark, by which we can measure scholastic growth thereafter. All students in grades 3, 5, 6, and 7 were also administered the California Achievement Test as well as the Test of Cognitive Skills. Once the results of the test were returned to us we used them to design and redesign instructional strategies to correct identified student weaknesses. I am pleased to report that the eighth grade at Chesterfield School placed 7th in the state when compared with the remainder of 8th graders in New Hampshire.

We were visited by 25 Japanese teachers, principals, and administrators so that they could study our special education program for the educationally handicapped. The group, part of a program sponsored by the Japanese Ministry of Education, consisted of members from 24 of the 47 Japanese prefectures (equivalent to states in this country). Though language was a barrier, each of the three groups had one member who functioned as an interpreter. The Japanese visitors spent a great deal of time examining our instructional materials, ie. games, kits, manipulatives and software; most of which were unfamiliar to them. They were particularily pleased with the effective way we integrated our educationally handicapped into the mainstream school population. Their visit was a learning experience for all of us.

Following a computer awareness workshop, our junior high staff begun to implement the S.A.U. #29 computer continuum through a variety of structured activities. Chesterfield, Westmoreland and Marlborough cooperatively shared Title II monies to hire Becky Sharp as a computer instructional associate to work with students to discover ways to enrich their classwork through computer use. Four activity periods per week were set for computer education for all students in grades 6-8. During that time, students were given instruction in computer literacy, specifically in the knowledge of terms, history, LOGO language, Bank Street Writer and BASIC. Our goal is to familiarize students with computer technology and to prepare them for future course work at Keene High School.

OM or Odyssey of the Mind (formerly Olympics of the Mind) came to Chesterfield School. OM is a nation-wide competition in creative problem solving. Teams design and produce their own solutions - with conventional adult help - to a problem they choose from a set offered each fall by the National Association. Competition is organized into grade divisions: K-5, 6-8, and 9-12. Teams may have up to 7 members, but only 5 can enter competition. Our five teams were coached by Mary Giles, Ruth Hatt, Judy Palmer, Mary Maxwell, and Betsy Yacubian. Four of the teams presented school assemblies. Two of our teams competed in Merrimack at the New Hampshire Western Regional OM competitions. Outscoring teams Keene and Westmoreland, each team placed 5th in its division, making it eligible for state finals held in Rochester, N. H. on April 5, 1986. Though the two Chesterfield teams did not place in the first five at the state competitions, enthusiasm ran high. Plans are underway to continue it for next year.

Three Chesterfield students, Lauren Anderson, Jeff Willius and Kristin Taylor were finalists in the 1985 National P.T.A. Reflections contest. Lauren and Jeff placed in the Visual Arts category while Kristin placed in Literature.

The girls softball team had a 10-0 undefeated season winning the Southwest N.H./Vt. league for the 1985-1986 school year while the boys basketball record of 8-2 placed them in second place in the league.

My focus in my report this year has been on students and their growth and accomplishments. As parents and community members we have much to be proud of and we should be thankful. Our school is continually striving to meet the intellectual, physical, emotional, and social needs of all of its students. I'm pleased to be able to work in a community which values, indeed demands, quality educational experiences for each of its students.
