TRUSTEES OF THE TRUST FUNDS

The income from Common Fund #1 is less this year as a result of a reinvestment of some of the Capital into bonds that will produce a capital gain at the expense of income.

The approximate yield on total investment for 1981 was 9.5%. Based on an average principal and accumulated dividends of \$55,456.19 and income of \$5,295.07. This yield of 9.5% compares with 8.0% for 1980 and 6.5% for 1979.

On July 30, 1981, the balance of the municipal building fund of \$23,609.54 was turned over to the Selectmen for payment for the Thorsen lot.

A new perpetual care cemetery fund was established in the name of Clifton Arnold.

A capital reserve account for the purchase of a new fire truck was established this year. The contributions were: \$711. from the sale of old engine #3, \$289. donation from the Fire Belles, and \$10,000. appropriated by the Town at Town Meeting.

TOWN OF DANVILLE, N. H. WARRANT and BUDGET

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Danville Fire Association Hall in said Danville on Tuesday, the ninth (9th) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (by ballot)

2. To choose all necessary School District Officers for the ensuing year. (by ballot)

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

4. To see how much of the Parsonage Fund the Town will vote to spend for the ensuing year.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell Tax Title Property by public auction.

7. To allow the Selectmen to reconvey title to tax deeded property to the former owners only upon repayment of all taxes, costs, interest and other expenses which would have been paid.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept aid relative to natural disasters from the Federal Government from the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration in Washington. 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon: \$3,000. for new roof at Town Hall; \$1,000. for parking lot adjacent to Town Hall; \$4,000. for Tax Map; and \$3,000. for Fire Department.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31: 95-b.

11. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Replace Article II, General Provisions, Paragraph D. 4., Sanitary Protection Requirements, to read: "All percolation tests to be witnessed and certified by the Health Officer prior to State approval. The fee for same shall be \$20.00 plus \$5.00 for each additional test in contiguous lots. Fee payable by the landowner directly to the Town. The Health Officer will be compensated for his services by the Town of Danville." (by ballot)

12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Amend Section III, Procedure, Paragraph K to read: "In areas not currently served by public sewer systems it shall be the responsibility of the subdivider or his agent to provide adequate information to prove that the area of each lot is adequate to permit the installation and operation of an individual sewage disposal system (septic tank and drain field). Such information shall consist of the report of the Health Officer regarding seepage and other tests he may require. The subdivider or his agent shall be required to provide the necessary equipment and labor for the Percolation tests conducted making of these tests. within the Town of Danville shall be deemed valid only if witnessed and certified by the Health Officer of the

Town of Danville prior to State approval. No subdivision approval or building permits shall be deemed valid without aforementioned participation of the Health Officer." (by ballot)

13. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Amend Article II, General Provisions, Paragraph G, Water, Health and Safety Provisions, to read: "No structure shall be erected or fill placed within marshy, wet or seasonally flooded areas within the Town which will reduce the natural seasonal high water storage capacity, interfere with the natural flow of water courses or risk the health and safety of present or future residents of the Town. All new construction shall require a building permit review. All building permit applications filed with the Building Inspector(s) will be reviewed by a Permit Site Evaluation Committee consisting of a Building Inspector, Road Agent and/or Town Engineer, Conservation Commission member, Health Officer and a Planning Board member. This Committee will determine if the proposed location falls within an area which will reduce the natural seasonal high water storage capacity or interfere with the natural flow of any flood or seasonal high water. The Committee will insure that those areas of proposed construction or fill must be at an elevation above the mean seasonal high water mark." (by ballot)

14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Replace Article III, Paragraph A, to read: "To require all new businesses to obtain a permit to transact business. Permit to be issued by the Board of Selectmen at a cost of five dollars (\$5.00)." (by ballot)

15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Replace Article XIV, Definitions, Paragraph M, <u>Building Code</u>, to read: "The Building Officials and Code Administrators International (BOCA) Code, basic only, in effect January 1981 and as amended yearly shall be the minimum standards for all construction within the Town of Danville. All new electrical wiring to comply with the National Electrical Code." (by ballot)

16. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Adopt a new Article XVIII: "House Numbering. Adopt the numbering system in use by the Danville Fire Department as the official Town system for all purposes." (by ballot)

17. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the Amendment to the existing Danville Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations as proposed by the Danville Planning Board as follows: Adopt a new Article XIX, Comprehensive Zoning, to read:

Any building and use of any building or land which was in full compliance with all those ordinances and regulations in effect immediately prior to the adoption of this Article shall be permitted to the extent previously permitted. All change, extension or use of a building shall be subject to this Article. (by ballot)

A. <u>Zoning Districts and Boundaries</u> The Town of Danville is hereby divided into zoning Districts designated as follows:

1. <u>Residential/Agricultural</u>: Every part of the Town of Danville not otherwise hereinafter designated.

2. <u>Commercial/Retail and Service</u>: That part of the Town of Danville bounded as follows:

(a) A strip of land extending southward along Main Street from the centerlines of Colby Road and Kingston Road to a line 550 feet south of the intersection between the centerlines of Main Street and the southerly fork of Colby Road and running perpendicular to the centerline of Main Street. The strip of land to be 450 feet wide in the East to West direction on each side of the centerline of Main Street.

(b) A strip of land extending southward along the easterly side of Main Street from the centerline of Pleasant Street to a line 400 feet south of the intersection between the centerlines of Main Street and the southerly fork of Pleasant Street and running perpendicular to the centerline of Main Street. The strip of land to be 450 feet wide in the easterly direction from the centerline of Main Street.

(c) A strip of land extending southward along the westerly side of Main Street from a line 250 feet north of the intersection between the centerlines of Main Street and Hampstead Road and running perpendicular to the centerline of Main Street to a line 525 feet south of the same intersection and running perpendicular to the centerline of Main Street. The strip of land to be 450 feet wide in the westerly direction from the centerline of Main Street.

3. <u>Highway Commercial and Light Industrial</u>: That part of the Town of Danville comprising a strip of land 1000 feet wide on each side of Route 111, measured from the centerline of Route 111, excluding existing rights-ofway, and extending from a line perpendicular to the centerline of Route 111 and located 4000 feet northeasterly along Route 111 from the intersection between the centerlines of Main Street and Route 111 to the Kingston Town line.

4. <u>Mobile Homes</u>: Those parts of the Town of Danville permitted for these uses by Article V of the Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations.

5. <u>Camps and Summer Dwellings</u>: Those parts of the Town of Danville permitted for these uses by Article XV of the Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations.

B. Permitted Uses and Restrictions

1. Residential/Agricultural Zone

Principal Uses and Restrictions:

(a) Single or multiple unit dwellings which meet applicable lot area, road frontage, and dwelling size requirements.

(b) Churches, schools, hospitals, libraries, parks and playgrounds.

(c) Farms, farm uses, and customary farm occupations except that commercial piggeries and mink farms are prohibited.

Accessory Uses and Restrictions:

(a) Customary home occupations, incidental to the principal use of the premises as a residence by the proprietor and not detrimental to the residential neighborhood, such as: dressmaking; millinery; letting of rooms; taking of boarders; preparing of food for sale; professional offices; practice of a trade; selling of antiques, crafts or art objects; sale of forest products; sale of farm products raised on the premises.

(b) No such accessory use shall require more than two (2) employees additional to the proprietor.

2. <u>Commercial/Retail and Service Zone</u> Permitted Uses:

(a) Any use permitted in the Residential/Agricultural Zone under the same provisions shall apply to this zone. (b) Any retail business, such as: book, stationery, or news store; drug store; dry good store; variety store; florist or gift store; grocery store; hardware store; jewelry store; meat market; or wearing apparel store. (c) Any service establishment such as: barber shops; beauty shops; custom tailors; shoe repair; self-service laundry or cleaning and laundry shops for the delivery and pick up of garments only; banks; restaurants; business and professional offices.

(d) Automotive filling and service stations.

Restrictions and Special Provisions

(a) Each of the permitted uses, except automotive filling and service stations, shall be limited to indoor sales and service.

(b) Minimum lot area shall be two (2) acres with two hundred (200) feet frontage on an accepted Town road.
(c) New business buildings shall be at least fifty (50)

(c) New business buildings shall be at least fifty (50) feet from the nearest public right-of-way.

(d) Buildings in this zone shall not exceed four thousand (4000) feet in area.

(e) Contiguous buildings shall meet the above requirements in the aggregate for lot area.

(f) Off-street parking spaces shall be provided for each business according to the following formulas:

Retail and Service: One parking place for each employee plus one for each two hundred (200) square feet of floor area.

Business and Professional Offices: One parking place for each one hundred (100) square feet of floor area. Restaurants: One parking place for each seventy-five (75) square feet of floor area.

(g) Site Evaluation Committee approval shall be required for each planned business building.

3. Highway Commercial and Light Industrial Zone Permitted Uses:

(a) Any use permitted in the Residential/Agricultural and Commercial/Retail and Service Zones under the same provisions shall apply to this zone.

(b) Any business, such as: public garages; repair shops; sales agencies for automobiles; boats, farm, industrial and construction equipment.

(c) Establishments for the sale or storage of furniture; plumbing supplies; construction supplies; and building materials.

(d) Animal hospitals; greenhouses; nurseries; boarding kennels.

(e) Shops for the use of carpenters, cabinet makers, electricians, painters, upholsterers, plumbers, or repairers of televisions and home appliances.

(f) Plants for the manufacturing of electrical or electronic devices, appliances, apparatus or supplies, medical, dental, or drafting instruments, optical goods, watches, or other precision instruments.

(g) Research, experimental or testing laboratories of a non-hazardous nature.

Restrictions and Special Provisions:

(a) Minimum lot area shall be two (2) acres with two hundred (200) feet frontage on Route 111 or an accepted Town road.

(b) Buildings shall be at least fifty (50) feet from any public right-of-way.

(c) Total building area shall not exceed fifteen (15) percent of the lot area.

(d) Off-street parking places shall be provided for each business according to the following formulas: Retail: One parking place for each employee plus one

for each two hundred (200) square feet of floor area.

Wholesale, Distribution and Manufacturing: One parking place for each five hundred (500) square feet of floor area.

Restaurants: One parking place for each seventy-five (75) square feet of floor area.

(e) Site Evaluation Committee approval shall be required for each planned building.

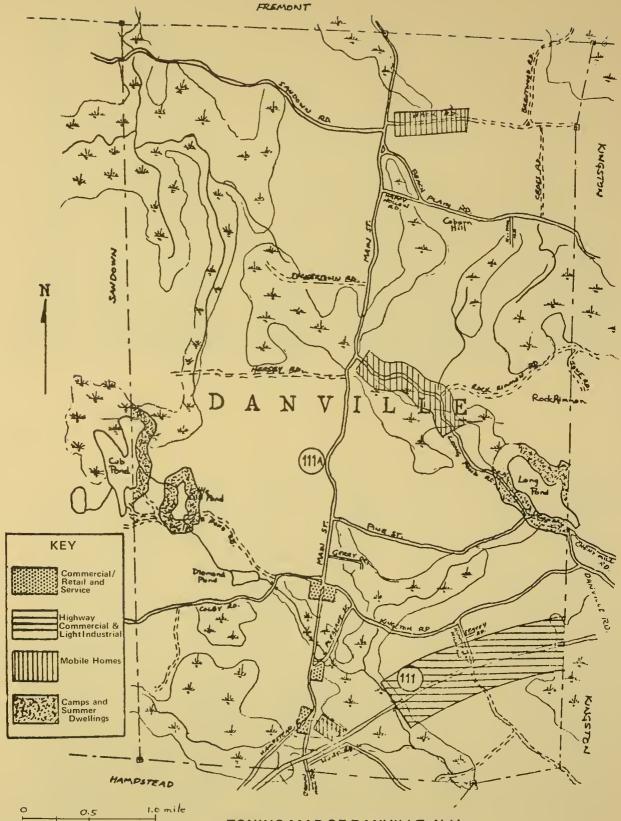
4. Mobile Homes Zone

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5. Camps and Summer Dwellings Zone

Permitted uses and restrictions as provided by Article XV of the Zoning Ordinances and Land Subdivision Control Regulations.

18. To see if the Town of Danville will maintain the remaining 5/10 of a mile of Old Johnson Road and Hunt-ington Hill Road. (By petition)

19. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town road "Hickory Lane" which has been certified by the Town Engineer as acceptable.

20. To see if the Town will vote to accept as a Town road "Coburn Hill Road" which has been certified by the Town Engineer as acceptable.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 (ten thousand dollars) to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for future Fire Truck purchases. (Not recommended by Budget Comm.)

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,765.50 (Two thousand, seven hundred and sixty-five dollars and 50 cents) to replace the concrete floor and front doors on Fire Station #2 located on Beach Plain Road. (Not recommended by Budget Comm.)

23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. (five thousand dollars) to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purchase and development of future recreation facilities. (Not recommended by Budget Comm.)

24. To see if the Town will vote to require the Board of Fire Wards and the Selectmen to adopt regulations which will include the following requirements:

1. Establishment of physical requirements and standards for categories of firefighters.

2. That all firefighters successfully complete a thorough physical examination within 12 months of the passage of this article. 3. That all new firefighters pass a physical before assuming their duties.

4. That all firefighters successfully complete a physical examination every 3 years after the initial examination called for in paragraph 2 or 3 above.

5. That in the interim, all firefighters will complete a physical examination to establish existing physical conditions in keeping with RSA 281:2 V-a.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before the Meeting.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT 1981

During the past year our department has responded to the usual varied calls such as neighborhood and family disputes, theft, vandalism, medical emergencies, fires, accidents, traffic control, lost and stray animals and other various duties.

Our budget does not allow for special patrol duty but members of our department are always alert as they travel through town on a trip to the store or to visit someone, etc., so "patrol" is at various times in many various ways, at no cost to the town. We do however, as always, rely on our good and faithful residents to also be alert and notify us of any suspicious activity. Our police telephone is "manned" 24 hours a day for quick response to emergencies as well as providing any information you may need.

Some years ago the State of New Hampshire created a Police Standards and Training Council to establish minimum standards for all New Hampshire Law Enforcement Officers. They have implemented a program for certification of part time as well as full time officers. Our department does not employ officers on a regular 8 hour paid schedule but respond to emergency calls and other necessary business, so we fall into the part time category. The specifications for certification are much the same with classes in Community Relations, Police Ethics, Constitutional Law, Laws of Arrest, Criminal Law, Motor Vehicle Law, Civil Liability and Use of Emergency Motor Vehicles. Introduction to Service Revolver, Report Writing, Complaints and Warrants and Accident Reports. Handling Domestic Complaints, Prowler and Disturbance Calls, Searching and Handcuffing and Vehicle Pullover techniques. Classes were held weekly at Timberlane Regional High School and the University of New Hampshire, with periodic testing in each area. Each officer has to attend classes and receive a passing grade on each test in order to receive certification.

We are pleased to have had the following mem-

bers of our department receive their State Certification -- Selectwoman, Patricia Coté ; Chief, Clyde Goldthwaite; Officers, Eleanor Goldthwaite, Chester Walker and Robert Wilson. Other members attended some classes but have not completed all areas needed, for certification. They will continue their studies when classes become available, in this area, again. Since our budget did not allow payment for time spent for schooling, we thank our officers who spent so many hours to receive this certification.

While this is a must, it is by far no guarantee of a good officer and we must also have officers who have good common sense, experience and general knowledge and with a "Call" department such as ours, devotion and cooperation are very important, to give 24 hours a day coverage.

The members of our department have made every effort to provide necessary protection for the people and property of the Town of Danville, and we want to thank all our citizens for their cooperation and understanding.

SUPPLEMENTAL POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT

Over 1500 calls were handled during this past year. More than 500 of these were for information-(names and hours of town officers, directions, legal information, other information, etc.). Calls that required immediate action and subsequent investigation and resolution were over 200 regarding animals. (Lost & stray dogs, dog bites, complaints. Other missing & found animals, stray horses, cows, goats, etc.)

- 38 Family and neighborhood disputes
- 34 Incidents of vandalism
- 31 Thefts including 9 motor vehicles
- 26 Fires responded to (not including emergency medical assistance)
- 25 Accidents
- 11 Complaints on OHRV (Off Highway Recreational Vehicle)
 - 6 Missing Persons

Numerous miscellaneous calls requiring field work and follow-up included suspicious activity, investigations, property checks, vehicle verifications, disabled vehicles, messages, medical assistance and other assistance.

EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION, INC.

This non-profit community health service agency continues to provide acute, chronic, and preventative health care to member town individuals and families in their homes, in the office, and in the clinic. Referrals may be from physicians, patients, families, or other agencies. A physician must prescribe ongoing therapy.

Home Health Care includes provision for treatment by a registered nurse or physical therapist. Under the supervision of a nurse or physical therapist, home health aid care is available.

The Maternal and Child Health program includes nursing visits to new and expectant mothers, two well child clinics per month, and family planning when appropriate.

The Adult Screening Program includes the Blood Pressure Clinics and the Annual Flu Clinics, one of which is held in Danville in October to distribute the vaccine.

There is a mental health program and a communicable disease program available.

Thanks to all those in the Town who have volunteered their time and energies to the Agency.

Danville's population has increased and a secone member to the board should be appointed to represent the Town. Meetings are every other month, excluding July and August. Available transportation to these meetings is a requirement. If <u>anyone</u> could serve in this capacity for a 3 year term, please call Claire Mace and me.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN REPORT

The local fire warden has control of the kindling of all outside fires, when the ground is not covered with snow, by issuing a written permit for kindling a fire. Permits are only issued at such times and places as the Fire Warden deems as safe.

Burning hours are from 5 p.m. to 9 a.m. unless raining. A permit is required even if it is raining. Outside cooking fires using wood must have a permit.

If one burns when the ground is covered with snow, please let the warden be aware of it by calling 382-6967 or Fire Dept. dispatcher 362-4781. This sometimes saves unnecessary runs for the Fire Department.

This year's acreage from the ten starts was less than one half acre. The fast report of the fire by the person discovering the fire, and the fast response of the Fire Dept. no doubt contributed to the low acreage.

The latest special event funded by the Commission was bus transportation for the youth of Danville to visit the Exeter Haunted House at Hallowe'en. Fun was had by all who participated.
