TOWN MEETING MINUTES

March 14, 1987, opened at 9:30 A.M. by the moderator, Paul Martell.

Robert Yeaton addressed errors which appear in the town report and gave corrected figures:

page 17: Vital Statistics - \$92.00

Winter maintenance - \$75,108.24

Not recommended - \$15,017.00

Revenue Sharing - \$480.15

page 16: Town Officers expenses - \$25,842.66

Legal expenses - \$14,942.25

page 18: Tax anticipation notes - \$21,253.30 Actual expenditures - \$506,049.49

page 65: Incinerator - \$100,000.00 (two places)
Selectmen's budget, estimated revenue - \$434,727.15

There was a motion made last year to sell the 1981 malibu cruiser for \$2000.00. The highest bid was \$1400.00 and the selectmen sold it to the highest bidder. An error was made by the selectmen.

Robert Yeaton made a motion to pass over article 3 until after article 19. It was seconded by Hans Wendler. The motion passed in the affirmative.

Article 4: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes. Hans Wendler made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Ralph Schmitt. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 5: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from state, federal or another government unit or private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedure set forth in RSA 31:95-b. Sue Bickford made a motion to accept article 5 as read and it was seconded by Connie Pitcher. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 6: To see if the Town will vote to accept and appropriate a private donation of \$5,000.00, plus interest, to the Fire Department to be used for the purchase of equipment and the completion of the fire station. Paul Lavoie made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Gloria Reeves. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 7: To see if the Town will accept the following Trust Funds:

Lots in McCleary Cemetery - Interest to be used on their lots. Hans Wendler made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Gloria Reeves. Bob Yeaton made a motion to amend the article to read "Lots in McCleary Cemetery - Interest to be used on their lots and the general welfare of the cemetery." Sue Bickford seconded the motion. The amendment passed in the affirmative. The article passed as amended.

Article 8: To see if the town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund of \$480.15, plus interest, for summer maintenance, and to authorize the Selectmen to accept, appropriate and expend any other Federal Revenue Sharing Funds should they become available. (Recommended by Budget Committe) Sue Bickford made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Hans Wendler. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 9: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 for the purpose of repairing and/or replacing the bridge over Deer Brook (New Rye Road). (Recommended by Budget Commmittee) Sue Bickford made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Shirley Parker. Dick Todd made a motion to amend the article to read "To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$12,000.00 towards repairing and/or replacing the bridge over Deer Brook (New Rye Road). It was seconded by Gloria Miner. The amend passed in the affirmative. The article passed as amended.

Article 10: To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell (at public auction or by advertised seal bids) the following properties. (Each property to be voted upon separately). (RSA 80:42, Supp. 1986)

Land - Northwood Lake, Tax Map U-01-049-Small lot - .06 acre (Recommended by Conservation Commission)

Land - Swamp Road, Tax Map R-02-032-Small lot - ½ acre (Not recommended by Conservation Commission)

Land - Short Falls, Tax Map U-14-028B-Small lot - .05 acre (Recommended by Conservation Commission)

Maurice Bertot made a motion to act on the article as read and it was seconded by Hans Wendler. David Noyes made a motion to amend article 10. These lots to be sold to an abutting property owner only, that they are to be consolidated with the abutting parcel and with the stipulation in the deed that they will not be a separate lot. The amendment was seconded by Bob Yeaton. The amendment passed in the affirmative.

Property #1: Norman Roberge made a motion to sell this parcel of land and it was seconded by Shirley Parker.

David Noyes made a motion to postpone any further action on Article 10 until after article 19, but before article 3. It was seconded by Katharine Coolidge. The motion passed. This would be time enough to procure copies of the town map indicating the location of these three parcels of land.

Article 11: To see what action, the Town will take on the following question: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72-1-C which authorize any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a resident tax?" Bob Yeaton made a motion of accept the article as read and it was seconded by Jack Kelleher. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 12: to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen, Town of Epsom, N.H. to dissolve the contract between the Town of Epsom, N.H. and the Lakes Cablevision Corp. and to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with a different cable vision company. (By Petition) Maurice Bertot made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Shirley Parker. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 13: To see if the Town will vote to instruct the town's representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no low level radioactive waste from the Seabrook Nuclear Plant shall be disposed of within this Town of Epsom unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the town at the annual Town Meeting by written vallot. (By Petition) Katharine Collidge made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Dick Frambach. Maurice Bertot made an amendment "To see if the Town will vote to instruct the town's representatives to the General Court to take all necessary measures to insure that no radioactive waste from any source shall be disposed of within this Town of Epsom unless and until the proposed site of the proposed storage or disposal has been approved by the voters of the town at the annual Town Meeting by written ballot. The amendment was seconded by Don Lowe. The amendment passed in the affirmative. The article passed in the affirmative as amended.

Article 14: To see if the Town will vote to accept the following: When Epsom residents reach sixty-five (65) years of age, property taxes will be held at their assessed rate and amount for that year and all following years for RETIRED residents ONLY. (By Petition) Hans Wendler made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Gloria Reeves. The moderator declared article 14 out of order based on the information receiving from the town counsel. "Towns receive their taxing authority from the State. The Legislature has expressly established the manner by which taxable property is to be appraised. See RSA 75:1;,:11. The statutory scheme requires local assessors to appraise most real estate 'at its full and true value in money.'. RSA 74:1. The limitation imposed on appraisal values; by the petition runs counter to the legislative mandate and, for this reason, cannot stand.

Alternatively the petition may focus on tax rates rather than assessed value. Although cities and towns have major roles in determining real estate tax rates, their authority is not unlimited. The Legislature has vested general supervisory power in the State Commissioner of Revenue Administration to adjust and compute tax rates. See RSA 41:15; RSA 71-A:11, IV, :30, II. It is well established that local legislation is valid if it contradicts State legislation. The petitioned Article states that property taxes will be held at their assessed rate and amount for the year in which an Epsom resident reaches the age of 65 and is retired and all following ages. The proposed tax cap would interfere with the statutory authority of the Commissioner of Revenue Administration to adjust and compute tax rates. See Bell v. Arel, 123 NH 311 (1985), and, for this reason, cannot stand.

If the Town of Epsom wishes to provide tax relief to its elderly residents then it should employ the specific statutes provided by the legislature. See RSA 72: 43-b. Expanded Exemptions on Real Estate For The Elderly and RSA 72:43-f (supp. 1986) Adjusted Elderly Exemption.

John Grundy made a motion to over rule the moderator on his move and it was seconded by Thomas Lalish. The motion was defeated.

Article 15: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to continue the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association program for the purpose of providing nursing and therapeutic services at the home, and other health programs through clinics to all residents of the Town of Epsom (By Petition) (Recommended by Budget Committee) Katharine Collidge made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Connie Pitcher. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 16: To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$18,200.00 for the annual budget of the Epsom Public Library for the year 1987. (By Petition) (Recommended by Budget Committee) Hans Wendler made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Jane Martell. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 17: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,447.00 for the continuation of services to the low income residents of Epsom through the Suncook Area Center of the Community Action Program, Belknap-Merrimack Counties, Inc. (Recommended by Budget Committee) Shirley Parker made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Gloria Reeves. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to join in the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission, and pay dues totaling \$2,017.00 for the fiscal year 1987-1988. (By Petition) (Not Recommended by Budget Committee) Hans Wendler made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Katharine Coolidge. The article was defeated.

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) as the Town's share of the purchase of a new incinerator at the Pittsfield Facility, said sum of money to be raised by the issuance of bonds or serial notes in accordance with the provisions of RSA 33, the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effectuate the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Epsom (Recommended by Budget Committee) Katherine Coolidge made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by Hans Wendler. The polls opened for voting at 11:50 AM and remained open until 12:20 PM. Yes - 141, No - 19. The article passed in the affirmative.

Article 10 (Again): Property #1 - Bob Yeaton made a motion that we sell the Northwood Lake property and it was seconded by Dick Todd. The motion passed in the affirmative.

Property #2 - David Noyes made a motion to sell the Swamp Road Property and it was seconded by Shirley Parker. The motion passed in the affirmative.

Property #3 - Hans Wendler made a motion to sell the Short Falls property and it was seconded by Shirley Parker. The motion passed in the affirmative. Article 10 passed in the affirmative as amended.

Article 3: To see what action the Town will take upon the budget submitted by the Budget Committee. Bob Yeaton made a motion to accept the article as read and it was seconded by John Kelleher.

Bill French made a motion to add \$625.00 to the parks and recreation line item for swimming lessons and it was seconded by Tim Pease. The amendment passed in the affirmative.

Bill Clark made a motion to add \$1500.00 for the cemetery line item and it was seconded by Bev Miner. The amendment was defeated.

The Bottom Line of the Budget \$735,539.00. The budget passed as amended.

Article 20: To transact any other business that may legally be brought before this meeting.

George Wiggin requested improvement of the audio equipment for next year.

Paul Lavoie, Fire Chief 1) volunteers are needed for the rescue squad, they are desperately in need for daytime assistance. 2) volunteers are needed for the fire department 3) the new fire truck will be delivered the latter part of June and it will be about \$1200.00 under budget at the present time. 4) request a poll of those present to determine if it is feasible to number the houses on each street for identification purposes - vote was unanimous to recommend that they do that.

The resident tax will be deleted affective as of April 1, 1987. This does not pertain to 1986 and any prior taxes, they are still due.

Barbara Barksdale requested a show of apreciation for town officials.

Shirley Parker made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 1:45 PM and it was seconded by Gloria Reeves. The meeting was adjourned.

AUDITOR'S REPORT

May 15, 1987

We have examined the financial statements of the Town of Epsom, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1986, and have issued our report thereon dated May 15, 1987. As part of our examination, we made a study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. The purpose of our study and evaluation was to determine the nature, timing and extent of auditing procedures necessary for expressing an opinion on the Town's financial statements. Our study and evaluation was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control taken as a whole.

The establishment and maintenance of a system of internal accounting control is an important responsibility of Town officials. The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgments by Town officials.

Because of the inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting control, errors or irregularities may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation made for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph would not necessarily disclose all material weaknesses in the system. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control of the Town of Epsom taken as a whole. However, our study and evaluation disclosed the following conditions that we believe result in more than a relatively low risk that errors or irregularities in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements of the Town of Epsom may occur and not be detected within a timely period.

These conditions were considered in determining the nature, timing, and extent of the audit tests to be applied in our examination of the 1986 financial statements, and this report does not affect our report on these financial statements dated May 15, 1987.

We wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation we received from Town officials at all levels.

We would be pleased to discuss our comments further with you should you so desire. This report is intended solely for the use of management and should not be used for any other purpose. The provisions of RSA 71-A:21 require that this letter be published in the next annual report of the Town.

Comments and Recommendations

(1) CASH RECEIPTS

Finding - A review of the records of deposits shows that funds received by the tax collector are not being deposited promptly. The tax collector is still turning funds over to the treasurer for deposit causing further delays. (per R.S.A. 41:35 tax collectors must deposit receipts at least weekly or when funds reach \$500). The result is that there is a considerable loss to the Town of the use of funds and the consequent loss in interest income and the additional cost of interest on tax anticipation notes.

Recommendation - From our review of the tax collector's precedures, we concluded that the routine of preparing receipts for deposit and posting should be modified so that deposits can be made promptly and a good internal control still be kept. The changes that could be made will permit prompt deposits of receipts and establish a good internal accounting control. Receipts can be deposited the day they are received. Posting to the account can be done later from documents received with the payments. The assistance of the deputy tax collector may be needed during peak periods.

We reiterate the recommendation in our 1983 and 1985 reports that the tax collector make the deposit to the bank and give the treasurer a copy of the receipted deposit ticket. Several days are lost unnecessarily by the extra handling by the treasurer. There would be a considerable benefit to the Town in interest income and a savings in tax anticipation note interest if these recommendations were followed.

(2) COMPUTER APPLICATION - ACCOUNTING OFFICE

Comments - The accounting office could make more use of the computer thereby eliminating some of the manual accounting work and providing better records and information for the Town officials.

The Town has used money for improving the accounting process. We recommend action be taken to acquire the necessary programs to better utilize the computer capacity.

The manual system could be replaced with some saving in time. More important than the saving in time is the management information that will be available to the selectmen, department heads and budget committee. There should then be the opportunity to improve other office procedures.

It is very important that both the office personnel should be familiar with operation of the computer in order to allow more flexibility in assignments and scheduling of duties.

As the Town grows the volume and complexity of the work in the selectmen's office grows. There is a question as to whether two people working a total of 55 hours is enough. It is difficult to determine this at this time since the implementation of the computer described above would change the work load considerably. At that time there should be a review of the many other tasks to determine the amount of time required and whether there is some duplication of effort.

(3) GENERAL FIXED ASSETS

Finding - The Town has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets as is required by generally accepted accounting principles for government units.

Recommendation - In order to conform to generally accepted accounting principles the Town should take steps to develop a record of general fixed assets.

(4) TAX MAP FUND

Finding - For several years there has been a savings account designated as "tax map". The balance at December 31, 1986 was \$492.67. This fund has been reported as a Special Revenue Fund in our financial statements.

Recommendation - We repeat our suggestion of last year that if there is no reason to continue this account the selectmen should consider closing it to the General Fund.

REPORT OF THE EPSOM PUBLIC LIBRARY

The Epsom Library is proud of its accomplishments. Epsom spends a significantly higher percentage of its budget on books and programs than other libraries throughout the State. The main reason for this is the dedication and input of time given by the Friends of the Library and other volunteers. Other savings were made by the generous donation of widening and improving the driveway given by Ronald Brown of B & B Construction Company. An up to date survey of the Library boundaries was done by David R. Noyes, Surveyor. A gift from Dr. & Mrs. Sam Clark made possible the restoration of the Library's Rogers statue.

The Library sponsored several interesting activities during the year. The Pre-School Children's group, organized by a mothers group, offered bi-weekly sessions of reading aloud, arts and crafts, and viewing of State Library films. An adult book discussion group has been meeting monthly, with anyone who is interested attending. The Library has been enlivened by monthly exhibits of the work of local artists. A Library Open House was held last June with many people attending. The Friends of the Library sponsored a talk by David Watters on New Hampshire Gravestones, and also sponsored The Little Red Wagon performers from the University. In August a Teddy Bear Picnic was held at Webster Park. Volunteers supply a book delivery service to shut-ins on request.

As always the services of the Library to the town are made possible and greatly enriched by the dedicated and skillful work of our Librarian, Nancy Claris.

EPSOM POLICE DEPARTMENT

As the Town keep growing each year so does the increasing number of calls for services of this Department.

Every year accidents increase from the prior one. We never seem to be able to complete a year without at least one fatal accident on our roads and highways. With the increased volume of traffic in some cases this helps to deep the speed down, but there is always someone who is in too much of a hurry or following too closely, failing to yield the right of way or violating another rule of safety and of the law.

There have been increases in all types of calls, domestic, animal complaints, burglaries, thefts, vandalism, assaults, juvenile problems, service calls and too many more to mention.

With this increase it was hard to keep up with the calls and the paper work, much less spend time on investigations. I asked the Selectmen in 1987 for an additional full-time officer and was denied because of large increases in other areas of the budget due to the growth of the Town. I again asked this year for an additional officer and the Selectmen recommended this position by accepting the budget I presented to them and making it part of the Selectmen's budget. The Budget Committee this year cut the officer out by not recommending the salary amount. I will be before the Town on Town Meeting day to request of the people to support my request for an additional officer and to show support for their Police Department.

I would like to personally thank the members of this Department for their dedication and service in the past year.

As in the past the members have been spending much time in training and in work details where the equipment and building are maintained, and should all be commended for their dedication to the Town and the Department. Also I would like to take this opportunity to say thanks to the various organizations associated with the department such as the auxiliary and the Fire Explorer Post, all of whom have done their best for the department this past year. The members of our rescue squad also have done an outstanding job this year and my sincere thanks goes to them also. (you will find their report elsewhere in this Town Report)

When calls come in at night, we at the present time do not have too much difficulty in finding enough volunteers to respond, however, during the day is another matter. It takes a long time for some of us to leave our places of employment and return to Epsom to answer the call. Therefore, we are still searching for volunteers who are around town during the day and could help the town. If you feel that you could do this please get in touch with us.

It was with regret that we learned of the passing away of Mr. Clarence Bartlett. Mr. Bartlett was one of the original organizers of the Epsom Fire Department and served as it first Chief from 1933 to 1953.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1986 and June 1987, we experienced fewer fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with *your* help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest tax law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, or Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217.

If you own forest land, you became responsible for the timber tax payment starting April 1, 1986. This is a change in the Timber Tax Law that will impact all forest landowners. Contact your Board of Selectmen for timber tax forms.

EPSOM RESCUE SQUAD

1987 was another busy year for the Rescue Squad. Much of our energy was spent dealing with organizational issues this year, in addition to continual training and recertification in basic and advanced emergency medical skills. We provided emergency medical care to 163 patients on 146 calls in 1987.

With the number of volunteer members decreasing and knowing that several members would not be renewing their certification at the end of the year, we undertook a major membership drive during the summer. As a result, the squad had 12 new members in September with 9 of them completing a State of N.H. First Responder course in December.

Despite our new members, we are still quite shorthanded during weekdays. Most of our volunteer members who are available during weekdays have to take time away from their jobs to attend to emergency medical calls.

As in years past, we continue to operate as a volunteer first response organization, operating in conjunction with area ambulance services who provide transportation to local hospitals for our patients.

It was a difficult year to maintain round-the-clock working arrangements with area ambulance services, as one local private ambulance service ceased operations, and our principal ambulance service, Center Barnstead Fire Department, was unable to continue operating as a volunteer service during nighttimes and weekends. Since August, Center Barnstead has been operting as a paid service 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. Special thanks are due to Tri-Town Ambulance Service from Suncook and Northwood Rescue Squad for helping us through July while Center Barnstead was reorganizing.

We continue to work to provide more advanced skills to the residents of Epsom. We have one volunteer paramedic/RN who can provide intravenous therapy when she is available and five emergency medical technicians who are certified in cardiac defibrillation and advanced airway procedures. Many of our new first responders plan to upgrade their skills to the emergency medical technician level in 1988.

We provided one CPR course to the residents of Epsom during the year. It is very important that as many people in Epsom as possible be certified in CPR to allow our advanced cardiac care program to save as many lives as possible.

I would like to thank the members of the Rescue Squad and the residents of Epsom for their dedication, hard work and support during the past year, which has allowed us to continue to provide up-to-date emergency medical care in and around Epsom.

Emergency medical care (rescue squad and emergency ambulance) is available anytime by dialing 225-3355.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

Like any other arm of Town government, the Planning Board suffers either the discontent or the apathy of the townspeople. To those who have no connection to the Subdivision or Site Plan Review processes, the Planning Board is just another part of that amorphous "THEY" which runs the town. To an applicant for Subdivision, the Planning Board is at best a necessary annoyance. The Planning Board doesn't have any happy customers; we can't give out tax abatements, register cars or even sell dog licenses.

What the Planning Board does for Epsom is not readily apparent, because we deal in the future. Plans for future subdivisions of land are brought to the Planning Board to make sure that the lots created will be in the best interest of the Town. We check to see if the lots will have adequate water and septic capabilities, if access for fire, police, and rescue services is available, and if the layout and construction of new roads is up to standard.

If you ask ten people what is best for the future of Epsom chances are you will ge ten very different answers. But if you ask what would be harmful to the future of Epsom, then you may be able to understand what it is that the Planning Board does. We ask the "what if" sort of questions. We ask the developers to show us what they are doing will not increase everyone's taxes to pay for their proposed roads.

During the past year, the Planning Board has seen an increase in the number of large subdivision proposals (greater than twenty lots). Few of these proposals become formal enough to require Planning Board action, but the interest shown in Epsom is obvious. In a recently published population estimate, Epsom will be the 7th fastest growing town in all of New Hampshire, increasing 190% in the next twenty years. The Planning Board will need the help of interested townspeople to meet this future.

REPORT OF THE HEALTH OFFICERS

1987 was a year of change. It marked the start of mandatory licensing of all food sales establishments, and the beginning of updated regulations concerning foster homes.

During the months of May, June, and July, we accompanied the state sanitarian when he inspected every store and restaurant in the town for compliance with the Sanitary Food Code. All the areas inspected received "passing" scores, and the Epsom Central School attained a score of 100%. This proves the dedication of Mrs. Tirrell and Mrs. Brown and their concern for the students.

Towards the end of the year, Diane was appointed to a committee to look into revising the inspection process for foster homes. The purpose of these revisions is not to make the licensing procedure more difficult, but to clarify some 'gray' areas that may cause some confusion between the various agencies involved in the process, and the person being licensed.

1987 also had the usual amount of septic and water problems which were taken care of as they were reported, although there were less of these than there were last year. With the amount of new construction going on in town, prospective builders should be aware that 'holding tanks' placed in the ground in lieu of septic systems are illegal under state law, and when a holding tank is discovered, the owner can be required to install a legal septic system, installed by a licensed installer. If you should have questions, contact Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, Sub-surface Waste Management Division, Health and Welfare Building, Hazen Drive, Concord.

Parents are reminded that when they place their children in a day care facility to ensure that the facility is properly licensed.

EPSOM CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The Epsom Conservation Commission has had a busy year, and we feel that we are progressing in the pursuit of our goals. In 1987, we completed the process of accepting an easement on Gulf Brook. This easement is 200 feet each side of the brook, which protects the brook, and will provide an area for nature walks and study. This is the Bronstein easement and has been donated to the Town by Samuel Bronstein. Mr. Bronstein has been very generous and will provide a road into a parking area that can accommodate a school bus so that the school children can obtain first-hand information in their nature studies. This easement enhances the subdivision as well as keeping open space for future generations.

The second easement has been given to us by William Champney in his subdivision on Route 107. This is a sensitive area as it is wetland and abuts the State easement on Bixby Pond near the Rest Area. This is a first for the Town and we have expressed our gratitude to Mr. Bronstein and Mr. Champney on behalf of the Town of Epsom. The Planning Board also deserves a pat on the back for its cooperation and care in the final plans.

Commission member Charles Miner wrote the deeds. Chuck is a new member this year and has experience in deeds for land acquisitions for the State of New Hampshire. Another new member is Sue Clement-Thomas who has had experience working for the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning, also as member of the Hudson Conservation Commission. We joined the Rivers Campaign and have declared the Suncook River as our river to protect. Research was done and many interesting things were revealed, historically and naturally. Already some wildlife trees and shrubs have been planted to provide a Greenway along the river banks, which have grown well and are providing fruit. We would be happy to hear from anyone who owns property along the river who would like it used for this purpose. Ten Wood Duck nesting boxes were put out this year; these boxes were obtained from the New Hampshire Waterfowl Association.

A Land Trust Workshop was held at the Epsom Town Hall for neighboring Commissions and the public. It was well-attended by Chichester and Pembroke. Members have attended the Law Lecture Series in Manchester and The Annual Meeting held in Concord. Both were interesting and helpful.

We received two One Hundred Dollar donations. Very special thanks go to the Epsom Garden Club, and to the donor who wished to remain anonymous. We can accept gifts of land and money in the name of the Town. Money deposited in our special fund and is managed by the Town Treasurer.

Quoting from "Saving the Land," "Granting a conservation easement is not always an economic loss. The Landowner's donation of the development

rights is treated as a charitable gift by the IRS. The deduction usually amounts to between 50% and 80% of the land's value at the time the donation is made." There have been more Dredge and Fill Applications this year. The New Hampshire Wetlands Board processed 2500 applications in 1987, and from January 1st to February 9th they have done 171.

The Conservation Commission meets the second Tuesday of each month at the Epsom Town Hall at 7:30 P.M.

CONCORD REGIONAL VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION

The Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association continues to offer three major health services to the residents of Epsom: Home Care, Hospice, and Health Promotion.

Home Care Services respond to the health care needs of those patients with acute or chronic illnesses that require skilled professional and paraprofessional care so they may return to or remain in their homes. Emphasis is on promoting independence and maximum functioning of the patient within the least restrictive setting.

Hospice services provide professional and paraprofessional services to the terminally ill patient with a limited life expectancy. The goal is to enhance the quality of the patient's remaining life by helping he/she remain at home in comfort and dignity. Emphasis is on pain and symptom management and skilled intervention to meet the patient's special physical and emotional needs.

Health Promotion services focus on the low and marginal income families and individuals to prevent illness by professional assessment and screening for health risks and needs, by early intervention to prevent, eliminate, or minimize the impact of illness and/or disability, and by anticipatory guidance and health teaching. Services rendered in the clinic setting are: child health, family planning, sexually transmitted disease, adult screening, immunizations, and HIV testing and counseling. Home visits are made in crisis situations or when needed health care cannot be given in the clinic. Senior Health services are provided at congregate housing sites. Professional and paraprofessional hourly home services are provided on a private fee-for-service basis. Emphasis is on promoting healthy children, families, and individuals through early intervention and health teaching.

Health Education and Instruction is part of each home visit or clinic visit.

Anyone in Epsom may request service; patient, doctor, health facility, pastor, friend or neighbor. All request are answered, but continuing home care will only be provided with a physician's order.

A call to the Concord Regional Visiting Nurse Association (224-4093) between the hours of 8:00 a.m. - 7:00 p.m. seven days a week is all that is necessary to start services or make inquiries. Hospice staff is on call (224-4093) 7:00 p.m. - 8:00 a.m.

Federal regulations specify a charge is applicable to all visits. Fees are scaled for that person without a health plan who is unable to pay the full charge. However, for fee scaling, federal regulations require a financial statement be completed by the patient or responsible person. Town monies subsidize those visits that are scaled or that no fee is collectible.

This Agency is certified as a Medicare/Medicaid Provider, licensed by the State of NH and is a member agency of the United Way of Merrimack County.

MINUTES OF ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING March 12, 1987

The annual meeting of the Epsom School District was held on March 12 at the Epsom Central School. The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Moderator, Paul Martell.

ARTICLE NO. ONE: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

There was no action taken on Article No. One.

ARTICLE NO. TWO: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to accept gifts and donations on behalf of the School District.

This article was approved by Bob Sawyer and seconded by Ray Godin. Bob Sawyer asked if we had anticipated any such gifts and was answered "no" by Board Member Charles Yeaton; Bruce Ahlquist asked if there were any limits to the size of such gifts, answer was "no"; Peg Tucker asked if these would be in addition to the money already in the budget, and the answer was "yes". This article was passed.

ARTICLE NO. THREE: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School board to accept and expend on behalf of the District a sum of money not to exceed \$25,585.00 to be obtained from the Federal Government or other sources that may make such funds available to the District; provided that the School District will not be thereby required to raise any money by local taxation in this or subsequent years as the result of such expenditure of \$25,585.00.

This article was approved by Shirley Parker and seconded by Norman Roberge.

There was a question from Jim Preisendorfer as to whether or not there was any money from the state or other source expected, and why was it not to exceed \$25,585.00. Charles Yeaton answered the a Federal Funds lunch reimbursement under Title I was expected and a grant under Chapter 2. Paul Dimenico explained that this was always a separate article for this. This article was passed.

ARTICLE NO. FOUR: To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal or other govt. unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1987-88 school fiscal year, provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a School District may appropriate money and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other School District funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

This article was approved by Mike Sklarin and seconded by Jim Wells. There was no discussion-the article was passed.

ARTICLE NO. FIVE: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$22,400.00 for the salary and benefits of a mathematics specialist to better serve the enrichment needs of Epsom Central School students (20,000 salary, 2,400 benefits and FICA) (Budget Committee does not approve)

This article was approved by Gary Matteson and seconded by Shirley Parker. Diana Parichand of the School Board explained why the School Board had disapproved of this article. The reason being that the bottom line figure of the budget would have been increased, and there would then have been more difficulty involved in getting the increased of 10%, or \$157,034.00 This article was not passed.

ARTICLE NO. SIX: To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$96,721.00 for unanticipated expenditures in high school tuition and special education placements as a deficit appropriation for the 1986-87 school fiscal year to be paid to the District prior to June, 1987. (Budget Committee recommends approval)

This article was approved by Gary Benner and seconded by Bob Sawyer. There was a great deal of discussion on this article. There were questions regarding the special funds which the town should have received from the State, in the amount of \$70,000; however we did not get this into the Budget because the Board had not received notice from the State at the time they drew up the budget, as to what they could expect from this fund. The vote was called, and the article was passed.

ARTICLE NO. SEVEN: To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries and benefits of statutory obligations of the District.

Herb Yeaton made the motion of \$1,646,721 and Bob Reeves seconded this motion.

At this point a motion to amend the motion was made by Bob Sawyer and was submitted, in writing, to Moderator, Paul Martell. The motion read as follows:

I move to amend the budget by increasing it 10% or \$157,034.00 of the budget committee's \$1,646,721.00

Robert Orff seconded Bob Sawyer's amendment.

There was discussion as to what cuts would still be required, a great deal of concern expressed by various individuals. There were suggestions as to ways we might save, so as not to lose the more valuable and/or essential components of the school educational system. Budget committee member, Jack Kelleher, and Tax Collector, Beverly Miner, both spoke of the obvious affects to the taxpayers of Epsom in regard to 10% increase.

There were also concerns expressed as to whether or not the cuts to our School Budget would lower our standards to the point where we would become ineligible for any State Aid.

A vote upon the amendment was called, and the amendment was approved. Discussion on the amended budget was then brought up. There were more questions, including one from Epsom student, Jamie Sullivan, regarding which grades would be effected and whether or not we would ever regain what we lose this year? Jamie's questions were answered by School Board Member, Ashton Welch, in that, all grades would be effected the same, and we would certainly try to regain what we cut.

The amended Budget article was then put to a vote and it was passed.

ARTICLE NO. EIGHT: To choose Agents and Committees in relation to any subjects embraced in the Warrant.

There was no action taken on this article.

ARTICLE NO. NINE: To transact other business that may legally come before said meeting.

A motion was made by David Tucker, and submitted, in writing to the Moderator.

I move that the School Board and Budget Committee be advised by voters of this March 12, 1987 School Dist. meeting that all future unexpected/unbudgeted costs related to Special Education and increases in High School enrollments, etc., be presented to the voters at a special School District meeting for a deficit appropriation; and that such costs not be at the expense or compromise of the regular education program at the Epsom Central School.

This motion was seconded by Shirley Parker. Motion was put to a vote and was passed.

Another motion was then made by Gary Benner, submitted, in writing, to the Moderator.

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I move to advise the School Board to petition the Superior Court for a special school district meeting to raise and appropriate the funds necessary to restore programs, materials, equipment and services in order to maintain the same level of education as the 1986-87 school year.

This motion was seconded by Mike Sklarin.

A good deal of approval was voiced for this motion, the motion was put to a vote and was passed, with a show of hand, 129 to 45.

Comments were made that perhaps nothing would really be accomplished by this last motion, but that it clearly showed the wishes of the people.

Motion to adjourn the meeting was made by M. Bertow and seconded by Shirley Parker.

The 1987 Epsom School District meeting was closed at 8:50 pm.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Growth in student enrollment combined with the newly adopted state recommended elementary standards continue to be the major issues facing the school community. As a result and as an initial step in addressing these issues, the School Board proposes the renovation of the lower level of the Epsom Central School. This renovation project, which is actually Phase I of a two phase building project, was recommended by the Space Needs Study Committee and will provide the school with three additional classrooms and bathroom facilities. Phase II will be presented at a later date which includes the addition of as many as four classrooms to the Epsom Central School. The Epsom Central School Space Needs Study Committee worked very hard throughout the year and on behalf of the Epsom School Board, I would like to extned my thanks for their dedication and commitment. The members of the Committee are:

On another space related topic and because all five school districts of SAU #53 are experiencing similar space issues, an SAU wide space needs study committee was organized to begin the investigation of a cooperative or an authorized regional enrollment area (A.R.E.A.) at the middle grade level. All five towns of SAU #53 were represented on the committee which organized itself into three subcommittees; enrollment and statistics, curriculum, and organization (benefits of cooperative vs. A.R.E.A.). The committee's consensus of opinion was that a proposal to construct any type of A.R.E.A. or cooperative middle school based upon information collected by the committee at this time would be unrealistic. The committee further stated that, in its opinion, a joint venture at this time will not be embraced by the voters of the member towns. The committee is in recess and will reconvene later this spring.

On behalf of the SAU #53 School Board, I would like to thank the members of the committee for their work and their willingness to continue their work later this spring. The members of the SAU Cooperative/AREA Committee are: Allenstown-Chairman Frank Danieli, Leigh McDonnell, Donald Coulsey; Chichester-Jane Welch; Deerfield-Joan Bilodeau, John Brinkler, Dennis Kuczewski; Epsom-Gary Benner, Thomas Lalish; Pembroke-Jerry Fleury, Stanley Grimes, Ronald Rush.

While the Board and the SAU staff have grappled with the space issues, the Epsom Central School principal, teachers and support staff have been very active in providing the children of Epsom with the very best in services and in

program. Much time has been spent in the development of curricula, specifically in the areas of language arts and science. The teachers and staff of the Epsom School District deserve to be recognized and commended for their superior effort during this very difficult budget year.

As you all know by now, the Epsom School Board charged a screening committee to review applications and to conduct interviews for the selection of a new principal. Mr. Bruce Farr was nominated and elected unanimously by the Board last July to serve as your new principal. Mr. Farr, most recently, was director of vocational programs at Coe-Brown Academy in Northwood and has had various successful teaching and administrative experiences during his career. Mr. Farr recently completed alternative III for certification as a New Hampshire principal. He is indeed a most welcomed addition to the professional staff of Epsom Central School.

The 1987 fall standardized test scores for grades 4 and 8 show increases in student achievement in reading, language arts and mathematics when compared with 1986 results. Other grade levels were not tested due to reductions in the budget. Much time has been devoted to the analysis of these test scores and as presented to you last year in my report, I offer the following cautionary note when one interprets and uses the results of test scores.

...standardized test scores are just one component in evaluating school effectiveness. Various factors enter into fluctuating test scores which may include: matching what is taught with what is tested, the number of students taking the test, the ability of students taking the test, the conditions in which the test was administered, and the amount of time spent preparing students on how to take standarized tests. The list is certainly not all inclusive. I bring this information to your attention so that judgements are not made on the success or lack of success of your school's based exclusively on test scores in a given year.

Upward trends in test scores (over time) along with declining drop out rates, increased enrollment in honor classes, improved reading scores, increased post secondary school admissions, increased student leisure time in academic pursuits (i.e. reading, computer), and increased interest in school activities show a more accurate picture which reflects a positive evaluation. If these trends are reversed, the picture would be negative. If trends are mixed, so is the picture. The point is that goals in education are complex and the measure of the success or failure of such goals is complex as well. When we look at Epsom picture, in its entirety, we have much to be proud of.

Chapter I, a federally funded program under the direction of Ms. Janet Snyder of SAU #53, continues to provide Epsom students remediation in the

areas of reading and mathematics. These remedial instructional activities are intended to assist previously indentified youngsters on-site at the Epsom Central School. Presently \$29,839.71 in federal funds are used for the hire of three Chapter I tutors and for the purchase of instructional materials and equipment to assist youngsters in their learning. The Chapter I program serves a total of 39 students in grades 1-8. Federal funding for the 1988-89 school year is expected to continue and the same level of services are expected to be maintained.

Citizen participation at Epsom Central School has been on the increase. The members of the School-Community Organized Programs for Everyone have been very active in assisting the school in maintaining its various academic and non-academic activities. Citizen involvement in your school, whether through S.C.O.P.E. or through periodic volunteerism, is one important factor for the success of the school. I thank you all for your involvement in the school and wish to encourage others to participate. Please feel free to contact Louise Carroll, volunteer coordinator, or Bruce Farr, principal, should you wish to become more active in your school.

I am pleased to bring to your attention the hire of two very capable assistant superintendents who have worked tirelessly throughout this school year to provide the school districts of SAU #53 service and expertise in curriculum, instruction and financial management. Mr. Thomas Haley was elected in June to serve as assistant superintendent of schools. Tom's primary responsibility is to assist the school districts in curriculum, instruction and evaluation of programs. As most of you know, Tom came to the SAU office from Pembroke Academy where he served as Headmaster since February, 1982. Tom is certified as an assistant superintendent in the State of New Hampshire and is presently completing a certificate of advanced graduate study (C.A.G.S.) from the University of New Hampshire. A native of Massachusetts, Tom has outstanding experiences as a teacher and school administrator prior to his move to Pembroke. Tom resides in Pembroke with his wife, Jean, and their two young children, Kate and Cara, Mr. Jack Henderson was elected in June to serve as assistant superintendent for business. Jack has a strong academic background in business and personnel management, with master's degree in both areas. He is certified as a New Hampshire assistant superintendent. Jack's past experiences as teacher, naval officer, town administrator and school business administrator, make him a very valuable addition to this office. Jack and his wife, Susan, and their two sons, Todd and Shawn, reside in Alton Bav.

Mr. Charles Yeaton, Epsom School Board member since 1976, was recognized by the New Hampshire School Boards Association, the New Hampshire Principals Association and the New Hampshire Superintendents Association this past fall as New Hampshire's Outstanding School Board Member of the Year, Charlie's dedication to the children of Epsom and his

commitment to excellence in education characterized his tenure as school board member. We wish him the very best for the future.

I thank you for your support during my first year as your superintendent and look forward to working with you providing the very best education for the children of Epsom.

During the past year, the staff at Epsom Central School has continued to provide a caring educational atmosphere for students. We continue to experience increased student enrollment and are currently re-evaluating our needs for the next five years.

Block Grant monies are being used to provide a one-day per week enrichment program for students of grades one through eight which services from twenty to thirty students. This program involves the school newspaper, computers, art and science activities.

S.C.O.P.E. (School/Community Organized Programs For Everyone) meets monthly and provides valuable school-community activities. This year the major focus has been on raising funds to support those extra-curricula activities that were not funded by the school. Because of S.C.O.P.E.'s support, we have been able to conduct a wide range of activities including pre-algebra, basketball, and student council.

School volunteers are an important part of Epsom Central and they help us tutoring students, supervising field trips, and managing our snack area (Sunspot). We continue to encourage the school volunteers who are so vital to successful programs. I would like to thank our Volunteer Coordinator, Louise Carroll for her conscientious leadership in this effort.

Teachers are involved in curriculum study committees in the areas of Language Arts and Science. These committees are insuring that curriculum objectives are being met at all grade levels.

The Epsom Central staff and I invite you to visit your school. Many of you have stopped in to visit and I am pleased by the many positive comments I have heard about the school this year. I am pleased with the quality of the education here and am looking forward to continuing the hard work and dediction that has characterized Epsom Central.

EPSOM CENTRAL SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

There were over 3000 visits to the health office during the school year for first aid, illnesses, and health counseling. Screening programs continued in the areas of: hearing, vision, color perception, scoliosis, and blood pressure; inspection for pediculosis and nutritional assessments. Referrals and follow-up care were given as needed. The School Nurse also provided nursing treatment on an "as needed" basis.

The dental programs included the Dental Health Conference which is sponsored by the Bureau of Dental Public Health and the local S.C.O.P.E. organization. 228 students participated and received a cleaning and fluoride treatment by Mrs. Linda Sawyer, Dental Hygienist. Dental care given by Dr. David Gruette and Dr. David Albee was sponsored by private funds from School Nurse Student Health Association. (These funds are secured through the cooperation of the Suncook Bank and several businesses and organizations.) The Fluoride Rinse Program was conducted in the R-5 classrooms by the teacher under the supervision of the Dental Bureau.

Some students received financial assistance from the S.N.S.H.A. for medicine, vision care and glasses, and medical care. Immunization were given at the clinic run by the Rural District Health Council. Our immunization rate continues above 99%. 85 students received "athletic physical examinations", at the school, by the Pittsfield Medical Association.

The health education curriculum continues in grades R-8. Safety programs were enhanced by members of community organizations. The new "Health Service" booklet has been used by the staff this year. The School Nurse continues to teach in the areas of First Aid for Grade 6, Human Growth and Reproduction in Grades 5-8, and "Health Awareness" for Grade 8. Our nutritional school store was run by 21 S.C.O.P.E. volunteers with Merilee Ellsworth as coordinator. Grade 5 & 6 students sold items at the store in twos and threes with 72 percent participating.

All of the programs are a result of both school and community effort. We appreciate the support of the School Board, the Superintendent, the Principal, the entire School Staff, the Epsom Rescue Squad, the Epsom Police Department, the Epsom Fire Department, S.C.O.P.E., and the many parents and volunteers who have assisted us this year.
