FOR TOWN OF JEFFERSON 1984 TOWN MEETING

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 2:00 P.M. to 8:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Jefferson in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Jefferson on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at 7:30 of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money of up to six hundred and fifty dollars (\$650) to be donated to the Beatrice D. Weeks Memorial Hospital.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand two hundred and three dollars (1,203) for a donation to the White Mountains Mental Health Center.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for the use of setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any action hereon:

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate two thousand four hundred and six dollars (\$2,406) for the Public Health Nursing Services, Inc.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) for a contribution to the Whitefield Regional Airport Commission.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year (RSA 31:95b).
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate, acquired by the Tax Collector's Deed at public or private sale, as the Selectmen, in their sole discretion, deem equitable and just (RSA 80:42 I & III).
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) to be placed in Capital Reserve Fund No. 1 for the purpose of Road Equipment.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine hundred dollars (\$900) to purchase a portable radio and two oxygen kit for The F.A.S.T. Squad, such sum to be paid by the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sunset Paradise Road, Lemieux Subdivision, from Route No. 115 to the Two Cul De Sac approximately two thousand two hundred feet (2,200), said road to meet with Town specifications. (By Petition).
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred fifty dollars (\$350) for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. (By Petition).
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to abandon 0.58 miles of the roadway, sometimes called the Jefferson Notch road, beginning at U.S. Route No. 2 and running Southerly to the Valley Road (said road having been classified as a Class V Highway by the 1983 Legislature) and authorize the Selectmen to deliver an appropriate deed of such roadway to adjoining landowner.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.
- 17. To transact any other legal business that may come before this meeting.

The State of New Hampshire's training program, started in 1982, has given basic fire fighting training to many new members and additional instruction to older members. Two members have completed the training to become state certified.

The Department voted in January 1983 to adopt a payed drill program to help keep an active membership and an incentive to bring more interest to Department activities.

Those interested in being a member may call an officer or member or attend a drill the first Tuesday of each month. The Fireman's Association has continued to benefit the Department with the purchase of the third portable radio with charger and remote microphone.

New for 1984 is the revision of a New Hampshire law that requires the installation and maintenence of Fire Warning Devices in all living units; hotels, motels, apartment houses, rooming houses, etc., excluding single family dwellings built prior to January 1, 1982 occupied by its owners. Single family dwellings built or substantially rehabilitated after January 1, 1982 require Fire Warning Devices. Effective January 1, 1984 Fire Warning Devices will be required in all 'Rental Units', single family homes, mobile homes, rented rooms, etc., occupied by tenants on a rental basis.

Anyone needing more information on this requirement or any other Fire Department related business may call Chief Jim Kenison, 586-4340.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a,m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a,m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also, during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As Smokey says, "Remember, Only You can Prevent Forest Fires!"

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE, INC.

Public Health Nursing Service has been serving the Town of Jefferson since 1973. The visiting nurse is available Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. on a regularly scheduled basis and evenings and weekends when special arrangements are made.

Skilled nursing visits include such activities as dressing changes, injections, colostomy care, blood pressure checks and health teaching.

Home Health Aides perform such functions as assisting with bathing, shampoo or follows a treatment plan established by the physical therapist, speech therapist, or occupational therapist, under the supervision of a registered nurse.

In our new program, the Homemaker, under the supervision of a registered nurse assists with housekeeping, laundry, shopping and meal preparation. Most recipients are elderly, and there are medical reasons for needing such assistance.

Children enrolled in our Well Child Clinics receive physical examinations, immunizations and dental care. Blood Pressure Clinics are held monthly in all of the towns served.

A total of 6200 visits were made during 1983 to the six town areas served by our agency, an increase of 62% over 1982.

The continued ability to meet the health needs of our communities is dependent on the contributions of time, effort and appropriations to the agency from the communities served.

LIBRARY TRUSTEE REPORT

During 1983, the Library has experienced several steps forward to hopefully better serve our Community.

In the spring, the "Friends of the Library" started a Story Hour for the youth which got many small children acquainted with the Library and its available materials.

The set of shorter Book Shelves were installed, leaving only one more set of the taller ones to be acquired.

The town's Brownie Troop planted flowers again, and the Junior Girl Scouts set out a Flowering Crab tree on the front lawn for their beautification projects. "Thanks Girls!"

Our Janitor departed to Alaska therefore a new party has taken his position.

There has been a gift of a complete set of "Books in Print" given to the Library by Ned Densmore from the Village Book Store in Littleton, of whom we give many thanks to.

The largest project was applying for the L.S.C.A. Title II Grant, for the purpose if insulating over the ceilings and getting two over-head lights as well as four wall plugs installed. We were accepted, and are the only Library in the State to be given a two to one amount of money.

This work has been completed and we have a sum of money left over. At this time we are in the process of acquiring permission to use the balance of the grant money to insulate what walls possible and perhaps install ceiling fans to help conserve on heat expenses.

It is our wish to Thank the Town for making this Grant possible.

Also, a "Thank You" to anyone who has helped on projects, given gifts, or rendered services in anyway to the Library.

Come visit your Library to see the many other items it offers besides Books.

WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH CENTER

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

1983 has been a year of change for WMMHDS. We relocated our central offices in Littleton. This is the first time we have been able to combine mental health and developmental services into a single facility. Along with this move, we changed our name. Previously, we were White Mountain Mental Health Center and TEMPO Workshop. The new name, White Mountain Mental Health & Developmental Services, reflects the integration of services which occurred. We have been at our new site for nine months and we have clearly felt improvement in the efficiency of our programs.

We have also added two New Developmental Service programs during 1983. One of the programs is Day Habilitation. This is a day service for severely or profoundly handicapped individuals. Its purpose is to teach skills which will help them to attain their highest level of functioning possible. Many of the clients in this program are former residents of Laconia State School. The second program is Early Intervention. This is a service to the 0 to 3-year-old population (and their parents) who are developmentally delayed, or at risk of being delayed.

The program staff work with the children and their parents in their own home. The goal of this service is to enhance the developmental growth of these children. We are very proud of our new programs and feel that they offer our communities essential services to the developmentally delayed.

The change and growth of our agency has occurred in addition to our regular workload.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL TOWN REPORT

North Country Council is the regional planning and economic development agency for communities in the northern part of the State. Your town is one of forty-three member towns that utilize Council services in community and land use planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation, recreation, and municipal services. The Board of directors is made up of representatives from every member town.

In Jefferson, we provided a model sand and gravel excavation regulation to the Planning Board. Local regulation of the floodplain was reviewed to determine consistency with the federal flood insurance program and we assisted in developing a proposed building code.

In regionwide economic development, the Council has devoted time to improving utilities in and access to industrial parks, in lobbying for continued maintenance of regional transportation facilities including rail, highways and airports, and to increased business marketing efforts. Through grant assistance, coordination with State and federal agencies and data, the staff has assisted local development organizations in four towns which serve as area employment centers.

The Council has provided information and guidance to several towns on the Community Development Block Grant, Urban Development Action Grant, and Farmers Home Administration Programs and prepared several grant applications. The Council is a partner in the Business Assistance to Northern New Hampshire Program, providing demographic data to individuals, businesses, and economic consultants interested in the North Country. This summer, we prepared a Plymouth Area Economic Base Study, to be followed by similar reports on other North Country subregions.

The Council participated in research and marketing efforts to increase the use of the Concord-to-Lincoln rail line and to maintain a schedule for rehabilitation of other regional real-road lines.

Other regional activities of importance include the coordination and establishment of eight solid waste districts. Council staff has assisted towns in developing work plans to

assess their waste disposal needs and current methods and develop a 10-year plan. The Council has also surveyed local disposal practices for septage, estaimated future needs, and will be recommending alternative disposal arrangements.

In community planning, we have assisted many towns with adopting or amending zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations, site plan review and other local regulations. With the reorganization and slight revision of the state planning and zoning laws, we've been busy trying to keep planning boards informed of the changes and new requirements. A workshop was held in the fall and more are planned for the spring. We also met with over 20 towns to help them review regulations relating to subdivision and building in the floodplain to insure compliance with federal regulations. The staff successfully assisted communities in applying for funds for recreation and library facilities.

A new NCC service this past year has been computerized tax billing. We provided this service under contract to four towns. We anticipate expanded municipal and in-house use of the computer.

These are some of the highlights of the past year. We welcome your town's active participation on the Board and use of the Council's services and look forward to working on your behalf in 1984.

COMMUNITY ACTION PROGRAM

February 1, 1984

TO THE SELECTMEN OF THE TOWN OF JEFFERSON:

The community Action Outreach Program is once again requesting the Town of Jefferson to help support and ensure the year-round continuation of services by voting to appropriate the sum of \$350.00.

17.06% of your residents received fuel assistance during the 1982-1983 season. This helped 137 people (51 households), of which 33 were elderly and 17 handicapped. The total Fuel Assistance dollars spent were \$24,496.56.

Weatherization monies spent through December 31, 1983 totaled \$5,813.53. At present, there are several more jobs on the active list.

Two cheese distributions helped 72 families, 198 low-income individuals, 44 elderly and 4 handicapped residents.

The "Outreach" program operates primarily during the spring, summer, and fall months providing information, referrals, counseling, and locating of "Weatherization" needs and problems.

REPORT OF JEFFERSON HISTORICAL SOCIETY

To the People of Jefferson:

The Jefferson Historical Society had a productive year in 1983, with a membership of 64 persons, many of whom contributed time, effort and displays to help improve the Historical Museum.

Donations last year included small tools, items from the Waumbek Hotel, an antique soft-paste tea set (from the Paul Thayer family), a two-seated sleigh, pictures, 1983 PCS Alumni List, old clothes, books, etc.

Others have placed on loan displays of antique tools, as well as an original Estey Organ (from Jerry and Helen Martin.)

The Society was instrumental in getting the Soldier's Park cleaned up and the fence repaired and painted -- with the cooperation of members of Troop 218 BSA and their leaders. Special Memorial Day exercises were held and a wreath placed at the Soldier's Monument. Following a march down to the triangle another wreath was placed at the Memorial Plaque honoring Jefferson's participation in more recent conflicts.

Members volunteered to open the Museum each Sunday afternoon during the Summer and 145 persons signed the guest register. As a result of her visit, one woman from Maine donated a small souvenir plate from the Waumbek, Circa 1891.

The Society entered a float depicting Transportation - An Indian in a canoe-- in the Fourth of July Parade.

Appreciation is expressed to all who helped in any way work at the Soldiers Park, Memorial Day exercises, Parade, repairs, cleaning and displays at the Museum, the flower boxes by the Girl Scouts and all who visited for their participation.

The Museum offers a protected repository for memorabilia - letters, records, old papers, books, dishes, tools, etc., all of which will be carefully cared for and placed on exhibition.

We look forward to even greater participation from local residents in 1984 and especially urge school teachers and/or parents to arrange for students to take a step into the past by touring the Museum with us.
