To the inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, in the County of Sullivan, and the State of New Hampshire:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Langdon on Tuesday the thirteenth day of March next at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see if the Town will appropriate and authorize the Selectmen to use the income estimated to be \$2,931.00 from:

Article 3. To see what sum of money in addition to the sum already appropriated under Article 2 of this Warrant, the Town will raise and appropriate to defray Town Charges.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to be used together with and in addition to the Class V Allotment (\$1,867.89), Duncan Money, so called, for Summer maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Winter Maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to put a seal coat on the Ball Hill Road.

Article 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$421.83 and apply for Class V assistance, TRA, so called. State to furnish \$2,812.24.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to repair, redecorate and/or renovate the Town Hall.

Article 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Fire Department to use \$200.00 from the amount authorized under Article 2 of the Warrant to be used together with and in addition to monies donated for the purchase of a Fire Siren; and to discontinue the Red Phone system now in use.

Article 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for the Town Library.

Article 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the use of the Alstead Public Dump for one year.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate to be placed in the Capitol Reserve Fund to replace the McDermott Bridge.

Article 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be matched by the State, to be used for opening back roads and trails.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to accept all Trust Funds received for the perpetual care of cemetery lots.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deed.

Article 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Article 19. To allow accounts.

#### FIRE DEPARTMENT-1962

The Townspeople have been very careful and so there have been no serious fires. A few chimney fires were handled; and a gratifying number of men turned out to make sure no trouble resulted.

Because of the care taken by the Townspeople, no brush fires got away this past year. They had better not. There is no section of Town affairs where carelessness could cause so large a burden of tax expense. A brush fire out of control builds up expense incredibly fast.

The Forestry tanker took two brush fire trips, one to South Acworth, and the other to a railroad fire in South Charlestown. The forest fire tools are now housed in the Fire Station which makes them more quickly available.

Every citizen should be sure to get a permit for outdoor fires of any kind except when the ground is covered with snow.

#### AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE SERVICE

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook—yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness—our carelessness. This, we—you—and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-ofdoors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations—hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the concern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you:

1. Follow the warden's directions.

2. Secure the required burning permit.

3. Keep your fires under control.

4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.

5. See that your children are properly cautioned. Everyone will benefit by it.

The organization can be further strengthened by appointing other key officers.

The question of Fallout shelters received a lot of serious attention, especially during last fall's Berlin crisis. This question is now a matter of National controversy; and it would be my recommendation that our townspeople should proceed with the utmost caution; principally because of the cost in time and money.

From time to time surplus property becomes available at nominal cost. In this regard I would recommend that whatever money is left over from that raised for civilian defense should be put into a capital reserve fund if unspent at the end of the year.

3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. 9. #### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of the Town of Langdon, I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

#### Staff

Miss Cleo Duncan and Mrs. Harvey Putnam returned this year as teachers in the Elementary Schools. The people of Langdon may consider themselves very fortunate in having two very well qualified and experienced teachers to guide their children. Miss Duncan is Principal of the school and teaches the Primary Room. Mrs. Putnam is teacher in the upper grade room, grades four through six.

Miss Duncan has recently completed her work for the Masters Degree at Keene Teachers College. She will be awarded her MEd, from that institution.

Mrs. Putnam completed our extension course given at Charlestown High School last fall. Subject: "Educational Evaluation." She has continued to improve her status through professional study each year.

#### 1962—1963 Enrollment

We may expect four new pupils to be admitted to the first grade in September 1962. This would give us a probable total enrollment of forty-seven pupils in the Sarah Porter School. The room groupings would be as follows: Primary Room (Grades 1 - 2 - 3) 25 Pupils. Upper Grade Room (Grades 4 - 5 - 6) 22 Pupils.

#### **School Board Meetings**

The School Board has met regularly each month during the past year, with the exception of July and August when the school is closed for summer vacation. Special meetings are held as needed and when called by the Chairman. Mr. Oren Sheldon was elected Chairman for the current year. The members should be commended on their fine work and genuine interest in the welfare of the children.

#### **School Improvements**

During the summer considerable work was done in our building. The entire school was thoroughly cleaned and the floors waxed. The chalk boards were refinished and minor improvements made in the upper grade room. The exterior of the building was painted. Mr. Alcide Chaloux was hired as janitor of the building.

#### School Costs

School costs still continue to climb upwards. The expense of public School Education is a concern of everyone, and will continue to be as long as we depend solely on the support of the property owner.

The cost of operating the Langdon Elementary School last year was \$222.00 per child. This is in contrast to the state average of \$279.00 per child. It would appear, then, that the school board has made every effort to keep costs down in the interest of the taxpayers who support the school.

There are those who feel that the public schools can operate on the same budget allowance as in the past years. School Departments are faced with serious problems. Competition for quality teaching staffs in the face of teacher shortage is a major factor in improving the standards of our schools. Also, the reduction in purchasing power of the dollar results in steady increasing costs in operation.

#### State Reimbursement

We are pleased to announce that the School District of Langdon has received this year a State Foundation Aid Grant of \$7,527.91. This sum can be used to reduce the amount of money necessary to be raised by local assessment in support of schools. In closing I wish to thank the teachers, School Board and citizens for their cooperation and support of our school. Parents may be justly proud of the Langdon School. Children going into high school enjoy their share of success and each year brings a new challenge to us.

#### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

This school term, in the primary room of the Sarah Porter School, we have adopted the Teacher Aide Plan, which was instigated by the mothers of the pupils in that room, and authorized and supported by our superintendent and the members of the school board.

Eleven mothers volunteered to give one morning every two weeks to relieve the problems arising in this year's set-up. There are twenty-nine children in the first three grades, thirteen of whom are beginners, demanding a teacher's attention every minute of the school day. Of the twenty-nine, seventeen are boys who seem to take longer than girls to adjust to the academic program of the public school. Therefore, in this particular situation, the Teacher's Aides have been able to make an outstanding contribution: they have released the teacher to teach.

A Teacher's Aide conducts classroom drill, first set up by the teacher; she gives individual attention to students doing written assignments; and the teacher can go on to teach another class in another grade. The plan has eliminated the old problem of "busy work," the problem of keeping children occupied while the teacher presents new material to a different group.

I am indebted to the following people who are working without pay to meet the educational needs of primary children: Mrs. Harry Blake, Mrs. Joseph Cheeney, Mrs. Raymond Fuller, Mrs. Charles Grout, Mrs. Franklyn Haskins, Mrs. Royal Holmes, Mrs. Maurice Jones, Mrs. Joseph Kmiee, Mrs. Robert Perry, Mrs. Donald Rumrill, and Mrs. Arthur Samsel. They also stay during the noon hour to prepare and serve hot soup to the boys and girls.

An over-crowded situation has been eliminated in the intermediate room by sending the seventh grade to the Alstead Elementary School. This allows for the enrichment of the educational program and gives the teacher time to meet the individual needs of pupils in grades four, five, and six. The Parents Club has been holding monthly meetings to discuss pertinent questions concerning the school program. At their January meeting they discussed a recommendation made in the Inglehardt, Inglehardt, and Leggett report: to have grades one, two, and three an ungraded room. The ungraded plan for the teaching of Reading has already been practiced in our school for the past eleven years.

In December, the children of Miss Duncan's room presented the operetta "The Elves and the Shoemaker" at the annual Community Christmas Party. The boys and girls in Mrs. Putnam's room decorated the town hall. The Community Club provided gifts for the pre-school and elementary school children and decorated a Christmas tree; the Parents Club gave the boys and girls candy canes and Santa Claus visited. We wish to thank the people in the community, who sponsored this delightful party.

Last spring the seventh graders in Mrs. Putnam's room presented a three-act play "Just Like Cinderella" in the town hall. The proceeds went into their class treasury for a future trip. The children in Miss Duncan's room visited Moore and Thompson's Paper Mill in Bellows Falls to observe the process of making paper. We are indebted to the parents who provided transportation. The following week, every child made a sheet of paper with a deckle and mold, and decorated it with potato prints. Mimeographed reports were written by the fourth graders.

Many new scientific books have been added to our school library. However, we remain indebted to the Shedd Porter Memorial Library, the Bookmobile, and the Langdon Library, for the hundreds of books the boys and girls read every year.

The annual Halloween Party was held in the school last October. Prizes for costumes and jack-o-lanterns, and refreshments were furnished by the Parents Club. The teachers supervised the games and dancing.

The school needs a new record player for the teaching of music; so the Parents Club is soliciting Top Value stamps from the people of the community to meet this need. We wish to thank our local School Board members and the citizens of Langdon for the wonderful spirit of cooperation that prevails in this town. We are also indebted to our Superintendent, Mr. Noyes Stickney, and our school nurse, Miss Florence MacIver, for their services and supervision.

#### SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

In past yearly reports your school nurse has stressed the importance of good physical health in the learning and educational program for all children. In this report I would like to emphasize the importance of good mental health in a child's educational program. Needless to say, the two cannot be separated—either one has a great effect on the other. For instance, the child with a severe vision handicap may have an emotional problem directly related to the physical problem. On the other hand, emotional problems may sometimes show themselves in physical symptoms.

First of all, we should acquaint ourselves with the indications of a well adjusted child and/or good mental health. There is evidence of good mental health when the child (1) Seems happy most of the time, (2) Contributes freely in a classroom discussion, (3) Is not unduly shy, (4) Enjoys playing with other children and being a part of a group, (5) Is achieving in his studies according to his ability, (6) Attends school regularly, (7) Does not seem too often fatigued, (8) Does not day dream excessively, (9) Uses adequate self-control according to his age, (10) Is able to make and maintain friends, (11) Is interested in new experiences, (12) Does not show a pattern of stuttering or of infantile speech, (13) Does not show excessive nervous mannerisms.

If it is felt that the child needs assistance, we do have available resources within the State of New Hampshire. Perhaps the best known of these is the New Hampshire Child Guidance Clinic which functions out of Concord. In addition to the services in Concord a group from this Clinic comes to Keene once a month. At these Clinics the child is given various tests by a psychologist in order to determine the child's learning potential as well as behaviour patterns. The child is also seen by a psychiatrist who may do further tests with the child. The parents of the child discuss the child and his problems with the social workerlater a conference is held and the findings of these clinic members are discussed and evaluated. At a later date the parents have the opportunity to discuss the findings of the clinic with the persons mentioned above and to make plans beneficial to the child.

In the Claremont area Child Guidance Clinic is made available by the Claremont Mental Health Association. This Clinic is served by a psychiatric Social Worker and a psychologist from the Hitchcock Clinic in Hanover. This clinic is available to our Supervisory Union. There is no charge for the services of the above mentioned clinics. On a private basis there is the Hitchcock Clinic in Hanover which offers a very fine service. It is extremely important for one or both parents of the child to attend with the child.

During the course of a school year several of our children attend these clinics. We feel that a great deal of benefit has been derived from the use of these services. The school and the home have a much better understanding of the child and his problems; the recommendations made through these clinics enable the parents, as well as the school, to really help the child. The children attending seem to enjoy the experience and cooperate well.

Once again I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all for your support of our Health Program.
