

MINUTES OF TOWN MEETING Lincoln, N. H.

The Town Meeting was held in the High School Auditorium in Lincoln on Tuesday, March 10th, 1959. The meeting was called to order by Moderator James Maguire at 9:00 A. M.

Before the start of the meeting, Moderator Maguire read to the assembled voters, the rules governing a Town Meeting — personalities were not to be brought into any discussion because to do so would be out of order.

The Town Warrant was then read by Moderator Maguire.

The following articles were acted upon.

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Henry Waldo to pass over this article. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by Henry Waldo that the sum of \$6,000 be raised to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year; \$3,500 Town Officers' Salaries, \$2,400 Town Officers' Expenses, \$100 for Election and Registration Expense. Vote in the affirmative.

A special written motion was read by Moderator about holding a discussion before the motion is made and seconded. Recommended on a motion made such as Budget Committee Report, Murray Clark said that if motion was going to cause a

stalemate, he would withdraw his motion. It was requested that a section of the Parliamentary Procedure be read off so that the voters could be informed as to what it contained and their rights. Said procedure was read by the Moderator. Murray Clark withdrew his motion regarding Article 3.

Article 3. How much money will be raised for the Police Department.

Motion made by James MacDonald and Edmond Gionet made an amendment that it remain the same as last year and seconded by Robert Welsh. Recommendation was made on the budget for a \$300 increase in the Chief of Police pay.

Mr. Gionet read a letter referring to a Selectman's authority to negotiate a business transaction without the towns people being aware of it. George McGee explained the situation and transaction. Edmond Gionet questioned an item of expense pertaining to the Police Department and James MacDonald explained it.

Edward Clark questioned why the town was paying the dues for the members of the Police organization which is \$15., a trivial amount and should be a personal obligation and that other Police officials have to pay themselves. Question if it was alright to do this and James MacDonald agreed it was.

Questioned Police Retirement Plan and also how many years was accredited to the Retirement Plan, and 9 years was answered.

Edmond Gionet made a motion to have children move more quietly. Discussion followed.

Edmond Gionet made a motion for a secret ballot, seconded by Robert Welsh for voting of an amendment. George Boyle suggested we have a counting

of heads rather than secret ballot and requested an amendment to the secret ballot. Vote was taken by counting of heads on the amendment for the sum of \$4,900, vote negative.

Vote was taken on \$5,200 by the Moderator, vote in the affirmative.

Article 4. How much money will be raised for the Fire Department.

Mr. Levasseur made a motion that the sum of \$3,000 be raised for the Fire Department, seconded by Kenneth McInnis, vote in the affirmative.

Article 5. How much money will be raised for the Public Health Department.

James MacDonald made a motion that an appropriation of \$1,950 be set aside, seconded by George McGee and vote in the affirmative.

Article 6. How much money will be raised for Town Maintenance.

George McGee made a motion that the sum of \$16,000 be raised for Town Maintenance and seconded by James MacDonald. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 7. How much money will be raised for Street Lighting.

Edward Levasseur made a motion and seconded by Robert Welsh that the sum of \$2,800 be raised for Street Lighting. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 8. How much money will be raised for Cemeteries.

Motion was made by Edmond Gionet and seconded by James MacDonald that \$1,000 be raised for the Cemetery. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 9. How much money will be raised for Public Library.

Edward Levasseur made a motion that we raise the sum of \$1,600 for the Public Library, seconded by Edmond Gionet. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 10. How much money will be raised for Support of Town Poor.

James MacDonald made a motion that the town raise the sum of \$3,000 for the Towns Poor, seconded by Mr. Vezina. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 11. How much money will be raised for Old Age Assistance.

Edmond Gionet made a motion that the sum of \$700 be raised for Old Age Assistance, seconded by George McGee. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 12. How much money will be raised for Maintenance of Water Department.

George McGee was questioned regarding the expense and the maintenance of the Water Department by Murray Clark. Several proposals were offered regarding possible prospective plans. A motion was made to raise the sum from \$7,500 to \$10,000 in lieu of these plans by George McGee seconded by James MacDonald. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 13. How much money will be raised for White Mountains Region Association.

Edward Clark made a motion to raise the sum of \$357.95 for White Mountains Region Association, seconded by Edmond Gionet. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 14. How much money will be raised for the 4th of July Celebration.

Motion made by Roland Bourassa and seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$500 be raised for a 4th of July Celebration. Vote in the affirmative.

Mr. Clark made a motion to give a rising vote of thanks to Mr. McGuire for the best 4th of July on record, seconded by George McGee.

Murray Clark made an amendment to have a committee appointed of not more than one from each organization to decide the program, seconded by Lucille Welsh. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000 and Interest to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1959.

Motion made by James MacDonald and seconded by George McGee that the sum of \$2,000 and Interest to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1959 be raised. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,300 and Interest to take up note on Backhoe due May 1, 1959.

Edward Levasseur made the motion, seconded by Mr. Waldo that the sum of \$1,300 and Interest be raised to take up Note on Backhoe due May 1, 1959. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$96.03 for T. R. A. work, the State to contribute the sum of \$640.23.

Edward Levasseur made the motion, seconded by James MacDonald that the sum of \$96.03 be raised for T. R. A. work, the State to contribute the sum of \$640.23. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selecmten to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.

Motion made by Edmond Gionet and seconded by Mr. Vezina that the Town vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes. Vote in the affirmative.

George Boyle made a motion to recess the meeting to take up the school meeting and seconded by Murray Clark. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$350 for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Community Band.

Mr. Levasseur made a motion and seconded by Robert Welsh that the Town raise the sum of \$350 for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Community Band. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 20. To see how much money the Town will raise for Civil Defense.

Motion was made by James MacDonald and seconded by Mr. Levasseur to raise the sum of \$400 for Civil Defense. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500 for Parks and Playgrounds.

Motion was made by Edmond Gionet and seconded by Mr. Hiltz to have the Town raise the sum of \$2,500 for Parks and Playgrounds. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Town of Woodstock to supply them with water during the dry season. In return for this water supply the Town of Woodstock will agree to in-

stall a chlorinating plant and assume one-half the cost of maintenance. They also will bear the cost of connecting the two water systems at the town line.

Motion was made by Robert Welsh and seconded by Charles Doherty that Woodstock shall install a chlorinating plant and assume one-half the cost of maintenance and will bear the cost of connecting the two water systems at the town line and also assume one-half expense of repairing of the dam and the use of the water to be supplied only during dry spells. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the Lincoln Inn property at a cost of \$13,000 and authorize the Selectmen to bond the Town for a period of ten years to pay for said property.

Motion was made by George McGee and seconded by Henry Waldo. Mr. Waldo submitted an amendment as follows: "To provide that the present building should not be used in its present form until a vote was taken at a special town meeting or the regular annual town meeting." Vote in the affirmative.

Edward and Murray Clark questioned last year's report on the purchase of lots and Mr. McGee explained the situation.

Article 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Motion made by Murray Clark and seconded by Edmond Gionet that we take a vote of the people to see if they would like to have an alphabetical listing of names appear in the next year's town report whereby the taxpayers' names and assessments will appear in the book for next year. Vote in the negative.

Nominations were in order for members for the Budget Committee to serve for three years:

James Custeau nominated by Edward Levasseur

James Maguire nominated by Henry Waldo

Edmond Gionet
Nominated by Lucille Welsh

Motion made by Edward Clark and seconded by Edmond Gionet that the people of the town vote whether they should have High School on the day of Town Meeting. It was decided that High School will be recessed during the morning hours of the Town Meeting Day.

Motion made by Edmond Gionet and seconded by Lucille Welsh that the Town Meeting recess to take up balloting.

- 6. How much money will be raised for Town Maintenance.

- 9. How much money will be raised for Public Library.
- 10. How much money will be raised for Support of Town Poor.

- 11. How much money will be raised for Old Age Assistance.
- 12. How much money will be raised for Maintenance of Water Department.
- 13. How much money will be raised for White Mt. Region Association.
- 14. How much money will be raised for a 4th of July Celebration.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 and Interest to take up Water Bonds due July 1, 1960.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 and apply same to the \$12,000.00 received from the Insurance Co. to pay off our loan of \$13,000.00 to the Bank.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of making improvements to the following Class V road within the Town: School Street: and authorize the Selectmen to raise through the issuance of bonds or notes the sum of \$4,000.00 for a five year period, the Town to be reimbursed by State funds, in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241, New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, as amended by Laws of 1957, Chapter 273:3.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of Taxes.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Community Band.
- 20. To see how much money will be raised for Civil Defense.
- 21. To see how much money the Town will raise for Parks and Playgrounds.

- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$5,000.00 to purchase a new fire truck and authorize the Selectmen to borrow an amount not to exceed \$15,000.00 for a period of ten years.
- 23. To see how much money the Town will raise for the Lincoln-North Woodstock Chamber of Commerce.
- 24. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the Lincoln Inn Property.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make application to the Federal Government for a loan, interest free, from the Housing and Home Finance Agency under the provisions of Public Law 560, 83rd Congress. And to authorize the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with the Federal Government to obtain said loan. Also to authorize the Selectmen to utilize the proceeds from said loan for the conduct of an engineering study and preparation of plans, specifications and cost estimates of the sewage disposal requirements for the town. Said loan shall be repaid only if and when construction of such a project is undertaken.
- 26. To see if the Town will vote to approve the proposed local protection project for the Restoration of the Flood Control Dike at the Franconia Paper Company, and authorize the Selectmen to enter into, and execute an Assurance or other agreement in reference thereto, and to authorize the Selectmen to acquire any real estate interests for said project.
- 27. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to name Main Street.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to have the property tax list printed in the Town Report.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue plowing driveways and business places.

- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to purchase a Portable Electrocardiograph.
- 31. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND SCHOOL NURSING SERVICE

Dec. 31, 1958 — Dec. 31, 1959

Total number of visits made in Lincoln was 1,064. Of this number 127 visits were made to infants and pre-school children, 13 to pre-natal cases, to new mothers 22, bedside care to adults 684, crippled children visits 12, visits to cases not under care, welfare, clinic contacts, etc., 206. Number of children referred to pediatric and child guidance clinics 3, to orthopedic clinics 2, and one referred to an otologist.

School Health program, 113 visits were made to Lincoln schools. Nurses examinations on 300 pupils consisted of vision testing, weights and inspection. Home visits were made concerning the results of these examinations when necessary. Athletic examinations were done on 73 high school pupils by Dr. John Dooley.

This year we were most grateful to receive a gift of money from the William Barnhart Charity Fund, to be used for the purchase of an audiometer, an instrument with which hearing tests are done. It is being used in the Grammar School at this time, and will be used next in the High School.

It is regretted that the usual spring clinics for immunization against Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus and Small Pox could not be conducted due to the fact at that time we had only one doctor covering this area.

The Chest Mobile X-Ray Unit, sponsored by the N. H. Department of Health, came on November 3rd. There was an attendance of 74. This number does not include those who attended the Mobile at the Franconia Paper Corporation. The total number of X-Rays taken in Lincoln, North Woodstock and Industry was 481.

A course in simple First Aid procedures was given to the Girl Scouts during the winter, also the use of the sling, triangular bandage, etc.

The Red Cross Bloodmobile came in November. Two adult Polio clinics, under the direction of the N. H. State Department of Health, were conducted in June and July, 535 persons attending. This number included several children who had missed previous clinics. A Polio clinic for the employees of the paper mill was held separately.

The Christmas program was much enriched this year due to the thoughtfulness of the High School pupils. With their Student Council it was decided that this year instead of bringing small gifts for each other to their Christmas party, they would, instead, bring the money and turn it in to be used for toys, etc., for the needy. We are very grateful to these boys and girls. Others whose help was much appreciated included the Sisters of the Atonement, the Elks of Littleton, the Rainbow Girls, and the Lions Club.

I wish to express my sincere thanks to all those who gave their time to help on the various programs.

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturb-

ing note

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by chil-

dren.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigar-

ettes from moving vehicles - use your ash tray.

5. Don't burn at home — Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Lincoln for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

Scope of Audit

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk, Municipal Court and Trustees of Trust Funds.

Financial Statements
Comparative Balance Sheets:
December 31, 1958 — December 31, 1959

(Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1958 and December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Net Debt increased by \$11,791.82 in 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These are as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures — Estimated and Actual Revenues:

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$8,952.05, less a revenue surplus of \$3,500.90, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$5,451.15.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness:

(Exhibit G)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1959, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit G.

Audit Procedure

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

General Comments

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) decreased by \$2,091.82, from \$2,380.42 to \$288.60, in 1959, as shown herewith:

Appropriation Overdrafts and Application of Municipal Budget Law:

It is noted that in the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, there was a net overdraft of appropriations amounting to \$8,952.05. In other words — total expenditures exceeded total appropriations by this amount, as shown herewith:

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (Chapter 32 of the Revised Statutes Annotated), application should have been made to the Tax Commission by the Board of Selectmen, with the approval of the Budget Committee, for a certificate of emergency authorizing expenditures to be made in excess of budgetary appropriations.

Motor Vehicle Permits:

In accordance with the provisions of Chapter 260, Section 5, of the R. S. A. as amended by Chapter 13 of the Laws of 1957, no permit for the registration of a motor vehicle should be issued without first requiring the applicant to show a tax collector's receipt for the payment of any poll and head taxes of the preceding year for which the applicant is liable, or an affidavit that such taxes have been paid.

The provisions of this law should be strictly enforced by the Town Clerk.

Sale of Real Estate for Unpaid Poll and Head Taxes:

Real estate is holden for all taxes, therefore it may be and should be advertised and sold by the Collector at a tax sale for unpaid poll and head taxes even though the tax on the real estate has been paid.

Uncollected Poll and Head Taxes — Prior Years:

The Board of Selectmen and Tax Collector should go over the uncollected poll and head tax lists on the warrants of 1957 and prior years and such taxes thereon as appear to be uncollectable should be abated.

Municipal Court:

A cash book should be maintained in which all receipts and expenditures of the Municipal Court may be recorded.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Lincoln for their assistance during the course of the audit.

SCHOOL WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Lincoln qualified to vote in District Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the High School Auditorium in said District on the eighth day of March, 1960, at 10:30 A. M., to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary officers for the School District for the ensuing year.
- 2. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 3. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 5. To see what sum of money the District will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the Districts, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid Fund together with other income; the School Board to certify to the Selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the Town.

- 6. To see if the School District will vote to continue the School Building Study Committee until the next annual school district meeting, and to raise the sum of \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) to be used under this article by this committee, if necessary, to obtain technical advice from qualified experts in determining the needs for and costs of construction of new school facilities.
- 7. To authorize the School Board to take an option on a home for the Grammar School Principal in the school district upon the approval by the Board of the evaluation of such property by an authorized appraisor; purchase of the home would be subject to approval at the next district meeting or at a special district meeting.
- 8. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for, and to receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State Agencies.
- 9. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

To the Voters and Residents of Lincoln:

In general the conditions of both schools in the Lincoln School District have remained much the same during the past year, with the attendance slightly less this year in the High School relieving the strain of overcrowding. The expectancy still is that we can expect an increase next year with larger Freshman classes coming in.

With the continuance of the School Building Study Committee this year, and the need of continuing it still further another year, your School Board has kept in mind that only those most pressing needs of repairs to buildings and permanent equipment, or purchases of new items should be made. Our concentration has been on improving such basic maintenance needs as replacing defective wiring, repairing piping, roofs, boiler, etc., and improving the quality of the instruction itself through new classroom equipment, raising the teachers' salaries to conform with the schedule published in the district reports last year. Closer contact with the administrative officers of both schools has been possible as a result of more and regular board meetings to which the general public has been invited for an open session each month. The principals of both schools have attended with reports and recommendations for our consideration. The Board has thereby been able to maintain closer touch with the developments and needs of the schools and has continued the formulation of basic policies for both schools upon which the school officers may act with authority.

The hiring of a part-teaching principal for the Grammar School, supplemented by a half-time teacher has freed the Principal for the many administrative duties, child guidance, and extra activity group duties for which he has been especially trained. If such an ad-

ministrator could be free completely from teaching he would be able to give much more assistance to each teacher in the school and spend his full time evaluating, improving and expanding the program of the Grammar School.

The District might well expect that such a person, coming into Lincoln as a new resident, would have a family, as did Mr. Shea. Even with ample notice ahead and help in looking, the Board was made to realize the difficulty of finding adequate housing in or near Lincoln. We came very close to losing our Principal in the fall, simply because we had no home for his family. Article No. 7 in the Warrant would enable the Board to hold suitable property, if available during the year, until the townspeople could approve its purchase. It would prevent such a future problem from arising again.

With the return of a physician to Lincoln, the medical program in the schools has already been expanding to include examination of the Freshman class as well as the members of varsity teams in High School. Your School Board, as a result of conferences with the doctor and principals, has planned in both budget and policy to enlarge this program to include at least one of the lower grades this year and two grades next year. The value is two fold; a chance of discovery of physical defects which can more easily be remedied in a younger child and/or protects the other children around him, and improving the school standards in health and studies.

The Grammar School, in addition to teaching fundamental skills, is also striving for physical, mental, moral, emotional and social growth in your child. All his varied experiences at school are designed to produce in him a desire to learn, to like his school, to get along well with others, to become an effective American citizen.

This means that a variety of activities in addition to the skill subjects are included in the school program. A few of these activities are as follows:

Assemblies

In an attempt to keep the pupils informed of current events assemblies are held periodically. These assemblies range from movies to lectures, given by well-traveled people on their personal experiences.

Publications

A monthly newspaper is published by the students which takes in events from each of the classrooms. Notices from the Principal have also been sent to the parents on several occasions concerning changes in policies and regulations in the school. These notices will be supplemented by a parent-teacher handbook to be distributed in the Spring of 1960.

Social Activities

School dances and parties are conducted by the students. This gives them an opportunity to work with each other, as well as giving them a sense of responsibility and school pride.

Music Program

A well-rounded music program has proven itself very beneficial to the pupils. The students have advanced considerably in both the vocal and instrumental groups.

Athletics

Indoor and outside athletics for both boys and girls help keep the students healthy and energetic. These supervised periods also supply the child with wholesome entertainment.

Club Periods

One period each week is provided to give the students an opportunity to work with their hands as well as minds, in such activities as crafts and experiments.

It is through these activities that we have an opportunity to see the child's personality and character development in the process.

This year the faculty is placing a much greater emphasis on cooperative planning. Many changes in testing techniques, methods and procedures in planning the curriculum have been brought about by the combined efforts of the teachers.

Since no formal report can give a complete picture of what your school is attempting to accomplish, the faculty welcomes and heartily invites parents to come to visit the Grammar School.

Your School Board and the administrative officers of the High School have studied the report of the Department of Education as published in the 1958 Town Report diligently and have taken action on a major portion of the recommendations. The portions of the report on which action has been taken are mainly concerned with administrative changes in the school curriculum.

The curriculum has been reorganized along the recommendations in the report. Additional opportunities have been offered in the fine arts fields. The social studies courses have been examined for overlapping material and this has been eliminated. The courses in college biology and general biology are now given with definite aims in mind for each. A course in senior science is now available for non-college bound students. A second year of mathematics is required of all students before graduation. The content of the problems of democracy course has been revised and is now offered under the title of contemporary problems. An

additional year of a foreign language has been added to the curriculum. Thus all of the major curriculum changes recommended have been fulfilled except those in the field of practical arts and physical education. The recommendation for a practical arts course for boys has not as yet been included in the courses of study nor is physical education offered to any of the students.

The acquisition of additional equipment recommended in the report has been partially carried out. Equipment for the social studies, language and mathematics classes is now adequate. As mentioned in the report, it is felt that additional equipment without the physical means to store and use it efficiently is not a wise expenditure of money. At the present time not all science courses are able to meet in the laboratory because of insufficient space. Some classes of chemistry and biology still meet in regular classrooms, as do all classes in general science. Because of this handicap, the expansion of science equipment has been held to a minimum until an adequate place to make use of this equipment is available. The typewriting room is very crowded with sixteen typewriters, desks and chairs. Room for office practice machinery in the present room is not possible. At the present time these machines are kept in the principal's office, and travel is necessary through another classroom for members of the business course to use them.

The actions recommended by the State Department in alterations or additions to the present building have not been acted upon. The size of the library has not been enlarged, and this still is too small for a materials center. The home ecomonics room remains as it was at the time of the initial report. Progress cannot be made in regard to science laboratories or physical education facilities until expansion of building space is made.

The High School has been approved along with ten other New Hampshire High Schools for academic instruction but needs to make material progress before it can join the other eighty-three New Hampshire High Schools as approved comprehensive high schools meeting the minimum requirement for academic instruction, for practical or vocational education and for fine arts opportunities.

A teacher in Physical Education has been planned for in the program of both schools during the school year of 1960-61, which will balance our program more nearly to fulfill the State requirements and give the pupils of all grades the chance for the regulated exercise they need.

Thanks to a National Science Fund, being made available to each State this year, and a subsequent approval and acceptance of the funds and their conditions by the New Hampshire State Board of Education, the Lincoln School District had \$556.16 allocated for use in the Science and Math departments of both Grammar and High Schools, providing only that it be matched by a like sum by our district and it be used for equipment, reference materials and books not used as text books. This program has been set up for a two year period, increasing next year to \$590.92. This will accelerate the Science program in particular, though, as has been stated, due to lack of storage space, large equipment must be eliminated.

The school facilities have been improved this past year by the replacement of a new and larger refrigerator with more freezer space for the Home Economics room in the High School, a 17 cubic foot deep freezer for the School Lunch Program, an outside fire escape from the second floor of the High School, an institutional sized vacuum cleaner, floor polishing machine,

and new desks and chairs for the 1st and 7th Grades. With the purchase of desks for Grade 3 next year we will have brought the Grammar School seating and working facilities completely up-to-date.

The next "room by room" feature in most urgent need of renovation is the lighting. All danger spots are being checked and replaced as needed. More circuits are added where overloading has occurred, but ultimately new and indirect lighting fixtures should replace the eye-straining drop lights now in use.

The regular annual meeting of the Lincoln School district was called to order at 10:30 A. M., March 10th, 1959, by Moderator, James Maguire. Mr. Maguire then read the warrant, and the following articles were taken up.

Article 1. Mr. Sargent nominated James Maguire for Moderator for the ensuing year. Seconded by Mr. Edmond Gionet. Mr. McGee moved that the nominations cease and that the acting clerk cast one ballot for James Maguire for Moderator, seconded by Mrs. Burak.

Mr. Waldo made a motion to nominate Elizabeth Young for the office of Clerk for the ensuing year. Seconded by Mr. Sargent. Mr. Sargent moved that the nominations cease and that the Moderator cast one ballot for Elizabeth Young for clerk. Seconded by Mrs. Burak.

Mr. Waldo moved that the School District raise and appropriate \$119,540.00, which is an increase of \$2,500 over the amount of \$117,040.00 approved by the budget committee, and to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against said appropriation such income as is estimated by the School Board, exclusive of State Aid, and upon determination of the amount of State Aid to be received by the School District during the next fiscal year, to authorize and direct the School Board to apply against such appropriation the sum to be received from State Aid and with the School District Clerk certify to the Selectmen the balance as an assessment to be raised by the Town for school purposes. Seconded by Mr. Gionet. Vote in the affirmative.
- Article 6. Mr. Hiltz made a motion to continue as present the transportation of all school pupils, and an additional sum of \$500.00 for transportation purposes be raised under this article, seconded by Mr. Bourassa. A discussion followed. An amendment to Mr. Hiltz's motion was made by Murray Clark that a committe of seven, including the School Board be appointed by the Moderator for a study of the transportation problem, and the possibility of a five year transportation contract, and report their findings at the next School Dis-

trict meeting. The amendment was seconded by Mr. Gionet. Vote in the affirmative. The Moderator then appointed:

Martha Patterson Roland Bourassa Roger Thompson George Boyle to serve on this committee with the School Board.

George McGee made a motion for a five minute recess, seconded by Robert Welsh.

Article 7. Motion by Mr. Levasseur to continue the School Building Study Committee until the next annual school district meeting, and to raise the sum of \$500.00 to be used under this article by this committee, if necessary, to obtain technical advice from qualified experts in determining the needs for and cost of construction of new school facilities. Seconded by Roger Thompson. amendment to Mr. Levasseur's motion made by George McGee that the present School Building Study Committee be continued for the ensuing year and the incumbent School Board members be included on the committee, thereby making the Committee consist of twelve members, and that the sum of \$500.00 be appropriated for use by this committee to obtain technical advice or for other necessary purposes. George Boyle seconded the amendment. Affirmative vote.

Article 8. Mrs. Burak made a motion that the Lincoln School Board be authorized to enter into separate contractual arrangements with the School Districts of Woodstock and Thornton relative to the education of high school pupils for periods of not less than ten years and not more than twenty years, such contracts to provide that the tuition rate shall be not less than the average per pupil cost of instruction incurred in the operation of Lincoln High School, said cost to include all costs except capital outlay and debt obligations, and further provide that a rental charge of not less

than 2% nor more than 4% of the capital cost of Lincoln High School facilities as approved by the State Board of Education, such rental to be based on a per pupil cost prorated over the entire high school student enrollment, shall be added to the cost of instruction to make up the total tuition bill. Seconded by Mr. Sargent. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 9. Motion by Mr. Waldo that the School District authorize the School Board to make application for, and receive, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State Agencies. Seconded by Mr. Gionet. Vote in the affirmative.

Article 10. Motion by George McGee that the School Superintendent is hereby instructed to authorize the School Board Members to apply for and obtain surplus equipment or commodities that they deem necessary and essential for use in the School District. The School Superintendent is hereby instructed to have surplus lists made available to the Lincoln School Board. Seconded by Mr. Gionet. Mr. Waldo read the application form, currently in use, covering the use of the High School Auditorium. He stated he had checked the records back to 1914 and there was no record or mention of a meeting covering this problem. Discussion followed. Mr. Gionet made a motion that the Application forms were to be used and that the Auditorium may be used free of charge by non-profit organizations for non-profit purposes, the applicant of which must assume responsibility of proper clean-up or pay a \$10.00 custodial fee, and a rental charge of \$10.00 for purposes other than non-profit, the applicant of which must assume responsibility of proper clean-up or pay a \$10.00 custodial fee. George Boyle seconded the motion. Vote in the affirmative.

Motion by Mr. Sargent that we give Henry C. Waldo a rising vote of thanks for his outstanding service as a member of the Lincoln School Board during the last four years; with due recognition of his efforts in establishment of an excellent records-keeping system and for his guidance during the last year as Chairman of the Board. Seconded by Mr. Gionet.

Moved by Mr. Sargent that all resolutions, motions, memorials and other District meeting activities be incorporated into the Town Report. Seconded by George Boyle. Vote in the affirmative. Motion by Mrs. Burak that the meeting be recessed to take up the balance of the Town Meeting. Mr. Waldo seconded it. Vote in the affirmative.

REPORT OF THE TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE

The Transportation Committee authorized by vote of the last Annual School Meeting consists of George Boyle, Chairman; Roland Bourassa, Roger Thompson and Martha Patterson.

The Committee, after several meetings with the School Board, make the following recommendations:

(A) BUS CONTRACT

- (1) Recommends Bus Contract be put up for bid on a three year basis.
- (2) That School Board contact a lawyer to give contract advice.
- (3) A copy of the Liability Insurance Policy on the bus be given School Board.

(B) SAFETY PROGRAMS

- (1) Send written request to the Selectmen requesting Chief Johnson to make a bimonthly check of street traffic at both schools.
- (2) Request Chief Johnson give Student Patrol training to students annually.
- (3) School Board to request State that all cross walks be marked and Bus Stop Signs erected.
- (4) Request Selectmen have school yard plowed promptly so that buses can get between the buildings.
- (5) Request that Motor Vehicle Inspector Duranty regularly inspect school buses and give School Board a written report as to the safety conditions of the vehicles.

(C) PICKING UP BUS STUDENTS

- (1) Minimum of twelve stops on highway
- (2) Two stops at South End
- (3) Two stops at North End
- (4) Prefer North and South bound stops along entire route so that students would not have to cross road.
- (5) In town, pick up of children be made off public highways by having areas constructed.
- (6) Bus stops will not be made within 6/10 of a mile from school.
- (7) Do not recommend shelters.

The highway bus is now overloaded and some measures must be taken immediately to correct this situation.

The Committee members checked bus service in their sections of town, as to promptness of bus and number of children picked up.

These recommendations in no way bind the School Board as the Committee will present its Report to the next Annual School Meeting for whatever action the voters recommend.

SUPERVISORY UNION NO. 34 REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire, requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30th. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 34 during 1958-59 received a salary of \$7,600.00 which was made up as follows: \$4,250.00 paid by the State Department of Education from the per capita tax and \$3,350.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,100.00 for travel within the Union was also prorated as stated above.
