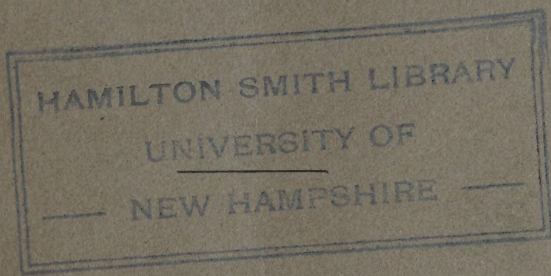

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyme, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Church Hall in said Lyme on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the various articles in the Budget as prepared by the Budget Committee.

4. To see what compensation the Town will allow its various officers the ensuing year. Also what price per day will be paid for Labor, Trucks and Teams on the Highways.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired through tax collector's deeds.

6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes.

7. To see if the Town will vote to allow bank discount on all taxes paid before Nov. 1, 1937.

8. To see what sum, if any, the Town will vote to raise for Blister Rust Control the ensuing year.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1227. for State Aid Construction, the State to give \$2454. to be expended on Grafton Turnpike.

10. To see if it is expedient to change the Constitution of the State.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the School Board and Citizens of the School District of Lyme:

Your Superintendent of Schools presents herewith his ninth annual accounting of school affairs. It is the eighteenth in a series of such documents by a

Survey

No fundamental changes in school practices have morked the work of this year. The schools are operating under the State Program of Studies which sets up fairly definite goals. Teachers and pupils still manifest a genuine interest in the achievement of these objectives. Not every pupil has reached that degree of progress which is desired but the percentage of successes is usually high. The pupils of Lyme continue to enter high schools and do satisfactory work therein.

Country and world changes seem to have ended a period of hesitency and doubt and begun an era of faith and optimism. This in the end will have its effect upon the pupils in our schools. It is confidently believed that in the next few years the results will be more easily recognized. Education will be sure to benefit by this forward movement.

Consolidation

The trend of school activities in our state and in many other states is toward a better coordinated school system. Actual experience has enabled people to see the advantages of schools with fewer grades taught by a single teacher. Lyme has been working toward this end for several years. This is due in part to the better opportunity afforded, in part to improved highways, and in part to improved vehicles of transportation. All of these factors have tended to eliminate some of the former difficulties in the way of transportation from rural areas to village centers. It is probable that not all has been done that may well be done in this town. It may not be too much to expect that the two village

schools shall eventually serve the entire school population of the town.

It has been repeatedly demonstrated that better school work is done by the pupils under these improved conditions and that at no greater cost and sometimes at a lesser cost to the community. The School Board and citizens may well give consideration as to whether or not the time has come to carry this movement still further and close one or more of the rural schools now in operation. There is a possibility that if such action is not taken in the near future, by the law of averages Lyme may receive a lesser benefit from the state allotments of aid than would be the case were her schools all to be confined to the two buildings mentioned.

This is brought to your attention at this time so that there can be no misunderstanding should it be necessary for action to be taken at a later date.

Building Improvements

The building improvements which have been undertaken during the past several years are now nearly completed. This past summer the much needed improvements were made in the building at Lyme Center. The work there included the digging of a cellar, installing a furnace, providing running water, re-building the toilet facilities and establishing a complete system of flush toilets, wash basins and drinking fountains. This was done very largely through the utilization of local labor. The cost of this project was therefore kept within reasonable bounds. The facilities afforded should serve the community for many years to come.

The increased number of pupils at the Plain School necessitated the request to the Library to move from the room formerly occupied by them and to open that room for school purposes. There will need to be some additional improvements made in that room before it is entirely adequate. These improvements include blackboards and interior decoration and finishing.

No other major items seem to be in need of immediate attention.

Unused Buildings

There are in the town at the present time several school buildings which are not in use. It does not seem probable that some of these buildings will ever again be called upon for school service. They have been closed for ten or more years. It would appear to be in the interest of sound business practice to dispose of these buildings as soon as the appropriate votes may be passed and buyers found who are willing to pay a sufficient amount to justify the Board in making sales of these buildings.

Insurance

The question of insurance has been brought to the attention of the Board this year and it should soon be decided as to whether or not the town should carry an additional amount of insurance on its school buildings to provide for possible losses. Such additional insurance could be secured on a three-year basis in such a way as to make an almost equal amount required each fiscal year. It will be necessary to add somewhat to the budget in order to meet this contingency.

Teachers

There was one change in the regular teaching staff during the past summer; that at the Chesley School. In August it was found that there would be more pupils in attendance at the school at the Plain than could be taught to advantage by the two teachers assigned there. After conference with the Commissioner of Education it was decided to provide an additional teacher for that building. The State Board has made possible this addition by an increase in the allotment for State Aid for the current fiscal year. This situation was met only because it was possible for the School Board to secure the use of the additional room at the Plain as indicated in a preceding paragraph.

Early in the present school year it became advisable for the senior teacher in the Plain School to sever her connections with the schools, due entirely to her own personal affairs. While everyone regretted that this step was unforeseen, plans were

made rapidly to adjust the school situation with a minimum of loss to the pupils. This means that at the present time, of the seven teachers in the schools three are beginning the work in Lyme this year. As indicated in a previous report it is desirable when possible to maintain over a period of years the same teaching staff but the exigencies of life make this next to impossible as do other conditions such as a desire on the part of certain individuals to grow in their profession and because of that believe that to do this it is advantageous from time to time to change teaching positions.

It is expected that the work will continue to improve as the present group becomes more and more acquainted with the plans and purposes of the schools of Lyme.

Budget

Your attention is directed to the fact that it again becomes necessary to ask for an added amount for tuition because of the increasingly large number of pupils who were in attendance upon high schools during the past school year. Since providing for high school tuition is a requirement of the law the school district is obliged to make these appropriations.

The increase in the request for budget for 1937-1938 is due primarily to the fact that unless changes take place there will be a need for seven teachers instead of six as was the case last year.

The other items in the budget seem to be fairly well stabilized and it would appear that as soon as the tuition situation is adjusted it may be possible to slightly decrease the amounts requested to be raised. It is probable that if the conditions remain about as at present that the estimated State Aid will be increased but that can not be definitely foreseen at present writing, hence the budget has been prepared as indicated.

Recommendations

To make clear that there is no misunderstanding as to the import of the statements made herein, the following are set up as recommendations which

should have the consideration of the Board and citizens in the near future.

(1) That as soon as possible additional plans be made for closing one or both of the one-room schools now in operation.

(2) That an article be inserted in the warrant to make possible the sale of such school buildings as have ceased to be of service.

(3) That additional insurance be placed upon such school buildings as continue to be used by the District.

May I express full appreciation to the pupils, teachers, citizens, and School Board for such helpfulness as has been extended in the operation of your schools. It will continue to be our effort to merit such cooperation and to carry on the work of the schools in the best manner possible.

The tardiness record for the year has continued to decrease. It will be noted that the average tardiness per pupil in all of the schools is less than one, which is the lowest record for the last ten years. Parents in outlying areas can do much toward helping the teacher in maintaining better averages of attendance and to lessen tardinesses. The average attendance for the year is somewhat lower than was anticipated. This is no doubt due to prolonged absences because of contagious diseases. While such absences can not be helped, pupils are expected to be present every school day that the school is in session.
