#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear reports of agents and committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$9,337.50 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,550.00 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,625.94 for street lighting for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include care of Town Poor.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 for Summer maintenance and \$2,000.00 for Winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$507.69, the State to give \$2,030.75, to be expended on Class V highways and make appropriation of the same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a new road grader and raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,380.00 for the same and authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$3,000.00 on notes payable in one, two and three years to provide payment.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,700.00 for the purchase of new equipment and make appropriation of the same.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Hydrant service.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$210.00 towards the expenses of a series of Band Concerts for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town in cooperation with the other towns of the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 toward the maintenance of a Skating Rink.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to give permission to the New London Rifle and Pistol Club to build an extension to the present foundation of the New London Fire Station approximately 12 feet square for use as a rifle range.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for Timber salvage expense.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for civilian defense purposes under Fire, Police and Health Departments.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00, the State to give a like amount, for Forest Fire Equipment.
- 21. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

23. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

#### Librarian's Report

Ever increasing use of the building's facilities both as a library and as a community center marks our fifteenth year of service. Used for reference work, reading, borrowing books and magazines, and as a meeting place, we have received many words of appreciation from those

who have enjoyed it during the year.

Books added during the year have totaled 561 of which 263 were by gift. We have had many visitors some of whom have come to enjoy the quiet of the reading room, others for reference material, and many to sit in the garden which through the generous help of the Garden Club has been so colorful. Hardly a summer morning went by, weather permitting, but what a number of persons were seen enjoying the beauty with which it abounds. Visitors to our library have numbered 14,330. The circulation of books, magazines, and pictures has totaled 15,233 of which 9,555 were fiction and 3.003 were non-fiction and 2.300 were magazines.

There has been a great increase in the use of the library for reference work and where we haven't an abundance of material on the subject, we have borrowed from the N. H. Library Commission, State Library, Colby Junior College, Keene Teachers' College, Concord City Library, and Worcester Public Library. Starting in December, the Bookmobile has been calling at both the library and the Elkins school. Books left at the school help to supplement the 70 odd books now being

sent from our library every six weeks.

Among gifts received during the year are books. European newspapers, and magazines from Prof. T. Leslie Shear, Miss Olive Cilley, Mrs. Helen P. Blake, Mrs. Edith B. Carlisle, Miss Gertrude S. Jones, Mrs. Philip P. Wells, Samuel Best, Miss Grace Barker, W. W. Davies, Miss Sallie P. Waite, Mrs. Arthur Whitcomb, Miss Gertrude Bradley and Mrs. William H. Dimick. Herbert D. Swift renewed his gift subscription to Fortune magazine which is proving more and more useful for reference. work. Mrs. Lindsay Wallace, trustee, sent us seven cartons of juvenile books, a sterescope and several boxes of pictures for use with the latter. From Mrs. Mildred P. McKay, librarian of Colby Junior College, we received a number of library indexes, and a year of Current Biography, all of which have been useful. Mrs. William M. Kidder, trustee, loaned a beautiful lily to brighten the reading room during the Easter season. Money received from the King's Daughters was used for the purchase of new books. Our gifts have been so numerous that we have been privileged to pass on some of our duplicate books to the recently opened Sutton library.

Early in March, Mrs. Bertha M. Glassey, a member of the library staff for ten years, first as assistant and later as librarian, found it necessary to resign because of ill health. Her many friends, both local and sum-

mer residents have missed her.

The usual handwork program has been carried on in the children's room. Miss Jean London took charge of the work during the spring months. Through the generosity of Mrs. Lindsay Wallace, Miss Barbara Bool is now a part-time assistant in charge of the children's room. Book Week occasioned a showing of our new juvenile books in the store window, through the kindness of Ervin P. Edmunds. The slogan "Forward with Books" was produced by a parade of books going forward at the command of a beckoning policeman, auditorium held other book exhibits of interest to young and old. During one evening a Book Ask-Me-Another was held with the teams chosen from the high school. Several class groups from the local school visited the library, thereby creating further interest in reading, and for instruction in care of books, use of the library, and reference work.

Holidays throughout the year have been observed with appropriate bulletins, displays, and decorations. At the Christmas program, held on the Sunday evening prior to the holiday, Rev. Harold W. Buker showed slides of famous pictures on the birth of Christ, accompanied by suitable Bible readings, music and poems.

The District Meetings at Cornish Flat and Newport were attended by Mrs. William M. Kidder and the librarian. The latter was also present at several meetings on children's library work held at the Concord City Library. During July the librarian attended a two-week library summer school at the University of New Hampshire, during which time Miss Julia Todd was substitute librarian. The generous services of a summer resident, Mrs. Edith B. Carlisle were accepted during the fall months.

In the spring and early summer the building was thoroughly cleaned inside and new paint applied inside and out where most needed. Our part-time janitor and caretaker, Eugene Lorden was again relieved during

the summer months by Roy London, Jr.

Organizations meeting regularly in the clubroom and auditorium include Woman's Club, Garden Club, 4-H Club, and Civic Association. Other groups were the rug-hooking class, sponsored by the New London Home Industries, board meetings for planning the new school, Mrs. Colburn's piano recital, high school movies in the basement, prize-speaking rehearsals, defense council, Red Cross, and committee meetings too numerous to mention. We missed the annual Forum which we have enjoyed in the past, but with this year's series on subjects relative to civilian defense our auditorium seemed hardly large enough.

During July and August an antique show was held in the auditorium under the auspices of the Star Circle, King's Daughters and the library. Art displays were held by Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard and John McAuliffe. National Art Week was observed in the auditorium with pictures by John McAuliffe, Francis Merritt, William Holst, C. B. Robinson, Mrs. Elizabeth Blake Ripley, and articles from the League of N. H. Arts and Crafts. A publisher's display of juvenile books was borrowed from the N. H. Library Commission for the Children's Spring Book Festival. At another time a binding and mending display was put out for those interested in that art. During the fall, the junior class of the high school took charge of a sale of discarded library books, the class receiving a share of the returns. These books were discarded to make space for more current books.

The local Victory Book Campaign to obtain books for the Army, Navy and Marines, was started during the latter part of the library year and as usual in New Lon-

don, the response was excellent.

# REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON HOSPITAL AND NURSING ASSOCIATION

### Secretary's Report

The several changes and additions which have been made at the New London Hospital during 1941 will prove of interest to all townspeople who realize how fortunate we are to have this fine institution in our community.

Through the generosity of Miss Baker's relatives and Colby friends, the Barbara Jane Baker Fund has made it possible for the Hospital to have a laboratory for the first time. Dr. Miller of Hanover has had charge of the new laboratory and his directorship has proved of inestimable value. Miss Betty Lewis, who worked under Dr. Miller last year, has been employed as technician, and proved herself to be one of the best.

When Mrs. Foster resigned as Head Nurse in December, Mrs. Cooke was elected as Superintendent, and Mrs. Foster remained on the Nursing Staff as Assistant Superintendent.

The Doctors Clough, Sr., Clough, Jr., Hayward, Munroe of Sunapee, and Wright of Bradford, formed a Medical Staff which has met every month to discuss problems and policies of the Hospital. This group of doctors drew up a constitution listing the by-laws and rules governing the Medical Staff. This is the first time such a step has been taken to outline Medical Staff regulations. The Staff also appointed one of its members to be in attendance at the monthly meeting of the Hospital Board at which time he presents for discussion matters concerning the Hospital that require the attention of the Board. This arrangement has proved of great value to the Board in its efforts to further the best interests of the Hospital.

From the gift of money made by the Summer Residents' Committee the Hospital purchased an anaesthesia machine and an operating table. The need for these two pieces of equipment was equally great, therefore the Hospital is truly appreciative to the Committee for making such a purchase possible.

The Board voted, as a precautionary measure, to purchase only pasteurized milk for use at the Hospital.

It is hoped that the Finance Committee, appointed by President Swift, may be successful in reducing the ever-increasing bad debts which are a heavy burden to the Hospital.

The demands on the Hospital have been so great during the past year that the Board deemed it advisable to give over the three rooms on the third floor to patients, and have the nurses, who formerly occupied these rooms, live outside the Hospital. These third floor rooms are far from satisfactory, but under present crowded conditions the use of these rooms is the only possible solution in caring for the increased number of patients.

The fact that the Hospital has had more patients per day than ever before in its history is an indication of the vital role this institution plays in the community. In order to keep the high standards of the New London Hospital and to continue in the fine work which it has done, the Hospital must have, and believes you are willing to give, your untiring interest and constant support.

# REPORT OF THE NEW LONDON SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

At the annual School Meeting held on March 8, 1941. the Town came to four decisions regarding the matter of a new school for New London. As summarized in the official records of the Clerk of the School District. these decisions were: (1)"...to acquire by purchase or otherwise a suitable lot and erect thereon a central school building,"—carried by a vote of 133 to 45; (2) "...to authorize a committee to select a lot for a new building, this committee to be composed of the School Board, Building Committee, Selectmen, and three others appointed by the Moderator,"—carried by a vote of 93 to 62; (3) "...to raise and appropriate an amount not exceeding \$80,000 for the purpose of acquiring said land and erecting said building, and for this purpose to borrow said amount and issue obligations of the district in the form of serial notes and bonds to an amount not exceeding \$80,000 in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 298. Laws of 1931. State of New Hampshire,"—carried by a vote of 120 to 41, a two-thirds vote being necessary for decision; and (4) "...to continue the present Building Committee to work in conjunction with the School Board in planning and erecting said building,"—carried without opposition.

On March 12, 1941, the Joint Committee of thirteen—the appointive members being B. A. Hoban, Seth Lamson and Percy Thurston—met and considered the question of site. In obedience to a number of petitioners, the Committee appointed Messrs. Crockett and Stanley to confer with the trustees of Colby Junior College about securing the so-called "Lower Campus" as a location for the new school. Mrs. Pardy and Mr. Crockett were appointed to confer with various financial institutions concerning the borrowing of the authorized funds. On April 2, each sub-committee reported. The location

committee indicated that the obtaining of the "Lower Campus" was out of the question. The finance committee reported that the Shawmut National Bank of Boston had loaned the New London School District \$80,000 in twenty-year serial bonds at an annual interest rate of 134%. On this date the money was on deposit to the credit of the District in the National State Capitol Bank in Concord

Continued study was meantime being made of alternative sites in New London. Ten possible locations were carefully considered by the Joint Committee. Experts from the State Planning Board were called in to give their counsel. Steadily, Committee sentiment grew in favor of locating the new school on land in the rear of Mr. Bool's residence. A precise survey of all New London children between infancy and the age of eighteen showed that the exact center of school population was within a few hundred feet of the proposed site. On April 8. Mr. Walter Moreland, representing the New London Hospital Board, met with the Joint Committee and presented the viewpoint of the hospital authorities. On April 18, Mrs. Doris Shepard of the Hospital Association communicated in writing to the Joint Committee, indicating that if proper care were exercised in locating the building the Hospital Board had no objection to the proposed site. On April 23 the Joint Committee unanimously voted to take immediate steps to acquire approximately five acres of land from Mr. and Mrs. Patrick Barrett, from Mr. Bool, and from the Catholic Church; to recommend to the Town that no through road be constructed from the Pressey lot to the northwest; and to instruct the architect to design the building so that it would face the main street at the head of a road to be constructed approximately midway between the Catholic Church and Mr. Bool's. The land in question was purchased during May for \$3,400.

These decisions were at once communicated to the architect, Mr. I. W. Hersey of Durham, and he set to work to prepare the blueprints for the building, being careful to hold to the general plans as presented at the School Meeting in March. The preparation of these plans and the submission of them to various contractors

and sub-contractors occupied most of May and June. On June 30, at 8:00 P. M., in the New London Town Hall the bids were opened. All bids submitted, however, exceeded the estimates of the Committee, and no awards were given. On the contrary, the architect was instructed to revise the plans in certain ways and to ask for a refiguring of several items. On July 3 the Swanburg Construction Company of Manchester presented a revised bid, which was still too high from the viewpoint of the appropriation voted in March. Again the bid was refigured, and on July 26, the contract for the New London School was unanimously awarded by the School Board and Building Committee to the Swanburg Construction Company for the sum of \$72.975. sum together with the amount paid for land purchases and the architect's fee totaled the approximate amount of the March appropriation.

On Thursday, August 21, 1941, ground was ceremoniously broken for the new building, and on Monday, October 13, the corner-stone was laid in the presence of a large group of school children and citizens. Work on the building went steadily forward through the fall and winter, and by School Meeting time in 1942 it was planned to have the new structure roofed and closed in, with heat on to facilitate the final stages of construction. It is not unreasonable to suppose that the graduation exercises of the Class of 1942 can be conducted from the platform of the auditorium in the new building.

A summation of the financial expenditures of the Committee must necessarily await completion of the project, but it will be presented in the Town Report for 1943. Suffice it to say here that the Committee believes that every dollar has been wisely expended, and that thrift and frugality have been the guiding principles of those authorized to spend the District's money. If we have not been able to include in the new building every type of improvement and technical device which modern ingenuity has made possible, we believe that we have steadily adhered to the aphorism of Calvin Coolidge that one should make the pattern fit the cloth, rather than ask for more cloth to fit a preconceived pattern. Nothing essential has been left out of the new building and

its many attractive and efficient features, when completed, will, we believe, be the object of widespread admiration. Particularly excellent is the school auditorium. This meets every standard of excellence set forth in a recent report of the U. S. Office of Education, based on a survey of new schools in twenty-one of the states of the Union

The Committee is relating only what is probably obvious when it states that its task since March, 1941, has been fraught with great difficulties. Between the time that the appropriation was voted and the contract let. the general index of wholesale prices in the United States rose from 81.5 to 90, an increase of over 10%. In the late summer the enforcement of "priorities" and kindred regulations made still more difficult the securing of materials. The high wage rates now in effect in centers of war industry and military and naval activity made it hard to secure and keep on the job an adequate force of skilled labor. The limitations of the 40hour week and various labor union requirements rendered inevitable the loss of valuable week-end time during the autumn months of 1941. Nevertheless, the Committee affirms that, by comparison with other construction jobs of like nature now going forward in New England, New London's school has been fortunate rather than otherwise.

The Committee is entirely pleased by the services and advice of Mr. I. W. Hersey, who as architect has been uniformly helpful, stimulating and efficient. The Committee is likewise well satisfied with the work of the Swanburg Construction Company and its attention to the details of the contract specifications. The Committee is thoroughly convinced that the location for the new school—one which has been admired already by many visitors to the town—will prove excellent in the years ahead. In conjunction with the winter playground now being developed at the rear of the new building, there is in preparation an educational and recreation center not surpassed by any town of New London's size in the entire commonwealth of New Hampshire.

The Committee is grateful to the citizens of New London for their patience and encouragement in the many difficulties which have had to be overcome during the long process of construction. We have resolutely endeavored to carry out the mandate entrusted to us in 1941. Unnumbered hours have been spent by the Committee in the effort to give the people of New London the best possible building that the appropriation would buy. We sincerely believe that, as the years go by, the realization of how fine a building has been built will steadily grow. In that belief and in the faith that because of the new school New London's children will one day be better Americans, we render this report.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board:

I herewith submit my eighth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The outstanding event in the history of New London schools is the erection of a new central school building. At the time this report is written the structure is not completed but is well on the road to completion. This building was authorized by a vote taken at the annual meeting of the New London School District, March, 1941, at which time the sum of \$80,000.00 was appropriated for this project under authority granted by the state legislature, chapter 298, Laws of 1931.

In reading reports of former years one finds that a committee of five was elected March 17, 1928 "to investigate and ascertain the advisability of establishing a New London High School". That committee recommended a brick building, on a separate lot, to house a four-year high school, to cost approximately \$50,000.00. The incentive for this action was the necessity of providing high school accommodations because of the reorganization of Colby Academy as a girls' school offering junior college curricula.

The 1930 report of the superintendent of schools sidestepped the above recommendation and suggested building a high school and gymnasium adjoining the present building. At that time New London secondary pupils were being instructed either at Colby Academy or Proctor Academy.

By the March meeting of 1932 both of the above plans were laid on the shelf and it was decided to make alterations in the present building to provide temporary accommodations for a high school. Accordingly the New London High School started its individual existence in the academic

year 1932-33. The following year two rooms were finished off on the third floor. This remodeled building was always regarded as a temporary matter. The time is now at hand when our children will have a permanent and entirely adequate school home following a period of about ten years of discussion and temporary accommodations.

If the contractor meets no serious obstacle the building will be completed by next spring. Probably we can hold graduating exercises in our new assembly hall. Plans have been made to transfer all usable equipment in our present building. Desks and chairs have been purchased for the high school rooms; also folding steel chairs for the auditorium.

Between the date of the March meeting, 1941, and the signing of the contract, construction costs had increased so much that the entire appropriation of \$80,000.00 was needed for the building and architect's fees. Grading costs and new equipment will, therefore, have to be provided out of other funds. We cannot at present equip the shop and home-economics rooms. Machinery is not available under present conditions; nor could an instructor be found since all men with mechanical ability are engaged in defense work. These departments can be established after the war.

We are completing another year of school work under an ever-increasing strain of war-time economy. Our duties in days to come will undoubtedly become more arduous but we can face them with confidence and courage in the assurance that all the school personnel—school board, teachers, pupils —will work together with the same good-will and cooperation which they have shown in the past.

## School Workers

During last spring and summer there was an unprecedented number of changes in the corps of teachers in this Union. Twenty-one new teachers had to be hired. The search for teachers, interviewing candidates, correspondence, board meetings, and issuing contracts, consumed uncounted hours.

Since Mr. Oliver, on account of a major operation, was not able to teach classes, a substitute was engaged to do the teaching while Mr. Oliver attended to his

regular administrative duties. Mr. Robert Critchell was the substitute until November 7, when Mr. Samuel Fuller took over until Thanksgiving.

Mrs. Ethel Stone resigned during the summer. Her place was taken by Mrs. Dorothy E. Jones of Sunapee. She is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College.

Mr. Robert V. Frost was elected principal of the High School at West Paris, Maine. This vacancy was filled by the election of Mr. William N. Nichols, a graduate of Boston University.

Mrs. Nickerson resigned as teacher of grades 3 and 4 to be succeeded by Mrs. Charlotte Keysar, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College.

We were all saddened by the sudden death of Mrs. Irene Dean, January 5, 1942, who had served so efficiently as our school nurse. Mrs. Della C. Spiller, who was formerly school nurse, will again be with us in that capacity for the rest of the year.

Just as school was about to open, our faithful janitor, Mr. Ralph Gay dropped dead as he was about his daily tasks. Mr. Gay's good nature was unfailing, his labor unceasing, and his pride in his work was so strong that our school building had a well-earned reputation for cleanliness.

# Heidelberg Fund

The amount of this Fund, started in 1938 by Mr. Herbert D. Swift, is now \$425.30. We acknowledge with sincere appreciation another gift of \$100.00 by the donor. Mr. Swift has also been good enough to donate the cash prizes, outside of the fund, until the Fund is large enough to provide them through the interest paid by the savings bank.
