



WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northumberland, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, March 8, 1949, to act upon the subjects hereinafter mentioned. The polls will be open at said place and date from 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon until 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the reception of your ballots upon the election of town officers under the Australian Ballot Laws; furthermore, you are hereby warned that on said date and place, at 11:00 o'clock in the forenoon, the matters of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

*1. To choose by ballot the following town officers for the ensuing year: a town clerk, a town treasurer, two auditors and one highway agent.

*2. To choose by ballot the following town officers for the ensuing three years: one selectman, one library trustee, and one trustee of the trust funds.

3. To see if the town will instruct its selectmen to appoint all other town officers as required by law.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers and for the support of the town poor.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the police department.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for building and repairing highways and bridges and for town maintenance.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for sewer maintenance.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the public library.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the observance of Memorial Day.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the employment of a district nurse.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to meet interest charges for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$249.00 for town road aid, thereby obtaining from the state the sum of \$996.00 to be expended on Class V. highways.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for miscellaneous expenses.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,500.00 to maintain a public playground and to operate the Youth Center building.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.00 for maintaining a suitable skating place on the old ball field.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$325.85 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 1/100th of one per cent of the town valuation (10ϕ on \$1,000) for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

18. To see if the voters will instruct the Selectmen to put poison rat bait on the town dump, and raise money for the same.

19. To see if the town will vote to construct and install a sewerage system, along Lost Nation Road, commencing at Brooklyn Street and extending it to the homestead of Robert Forbes, and to raise and expend for the same a sum of not to exceed six thousand (\$6,000) dollars, and authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue serial town notes not in excess of \$6,000 in payment, in such manner as to the amount of the annual payments, time of payment and interest rates as they may decide, in compliance with the Municipal Bonds Statute.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$217.60 for the purpose of providing funds for the town's contribution to the State's Retirement System for our town employees for the coming year.

21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 to aid free public band concerts.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the care and maintenance of the town's public cemetery, and to repair the fence around said cemetery. (Inserted on petition of eleven voters.)

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for tarring streets in Groveton village as determined by the Selectmen.

24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for repairing and improving the public playground near the so-called Brown road, known as Centennial Field.

25. To see if the town will vote to erect a monument in honor of the men and women from Northumberland who served in the armed forces during World War II, and to raise and expend for the same a sum of not to exceed \$2,400.00, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to issue serial town notes not in excess of \$2,400.00 in payment, in such manner as to the amount of the annual payments, time of payment and interest rates as they may decide, in compliance with the Municipal Bonds Statute.

26. To see if the town will vote to install a so-called Caisson Type well, ground water supply, as an auxiliary source of town water, and to raise and expend for the same a sum of not to exceed \$13,200.00, and authorize the Board of Selectmen, to issue serial town notes not in excess of \$13,200.00 in payment, in such manner as to the amount of the annual payments, time of payment and interest rates as they may decide, in compliance with the Municipal Bonds Statute.

27. To see if the town will vote to observe, during the month of August, 1949, the 50th anniversary of Old Home Week, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

28. To see if the town will vote to continue the committee appointed last year to investigate the town's water system, and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to cover the expenses of the committee, the members to serve without pay.

29. To see if the town will vote to prohibit carnivals and other entertainment of like nature from using the athletic field opposite the High School. (By petition of ten voters.)

30. To see if the town will vote to construct and install a water and sewerage system along Graham Street on Groveton Heights, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor. (By petition of seventeen voters.)

31. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of taxes in order to pay expenses, said loans to be payable from taxes for the year 1949, and to issue notes therefor at such rate of interest and payable at such time, within one year, and place as the Selectmen shall decide.

32. To see if the town will vote for a scale of discounts for the prepayment of real estate and personal property taxes on the basis of three per cent, if paid by June 1, 1949, two per cent if paid by August 1, 1949, and one per cent if paid by October 1, 1949, or any other scale of discount that the town will vote to determine.

33. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expenses of such audit.

34. To see if the town will vote to approve an ordinance relating to permitting motion pictures and theatricals to open at two o'clock in the afternoon on the Lord's Day as adopted by the Board of Selectmen on February 21, 1949, a copy of which is annexed to this Warrant and made a part hereof.

35. To see if the town will vote to approve an ordinance relating to permitting public bowling to start at two o'clock in the afternoon on the Lord's Day as adopted by the Board of Selectmen February 21, 1949, a copy of which is annexed to this Warrant and made a part hereof.

36. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a so-called Airport Committee of three members, authorized to confer and consult with State and Federal officials in all matters pertaining to aircraft landing areas, and to raise the sum of \$100.00 to cover the expenses of the committee, the members to serve without pay.

37. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for maintaining a suitable skating place in the village of Northumberland on a field donated by Lester Fogg. (By petition of ten voters.)

38. To hear report of agents, auditors, committees or other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.

39. To transact any other business that may legally be brought before said meeting.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY

Be it Enacted by the Board of Selectmen of the Town of Northumberland as follows:

Sec. 1. Motion Pictures and Theatricals. It shall be lawful for motion pictures, lectures, and concerts to be held on the Lord's Day in the Town of Northumberland, but not earlier than two o'clock in the afternoon.

Sec. 2. **Penalty.** Any person violating the provisions of the ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be liable to a penalty of not more than ten dollars for each offense.

Sec. 3. **Takes Effect.** This ordinance shall take effect upon its approval by a majority of the legal voters of the Town of Northumberland present and voting at the next regular town meeting.

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY.

Sec. 1. Sports: It shall be lawful to engage in public bowling on the Lord's day in the Town of Northumberland, but not earlier than two o'clock in the afternoon.

Sec. 2. **Penalty:** Any person violating the provisions of the ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be liable to a penalty of not more than ten dollars for each offense.

Sec. 3. **Takes Effect.** This ordinance shall take effect upon its approval by a majority of the legal voters of the Town of Northumberland present and voting at the next regular town meeting.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT For Year of 1948

Below is a listing of the contagious diseases as reported to the Health Department during the year of 1948. This report, of course, is not complete as there still remains a great lack of reporting contagious diseases to the Health Department by the people and all others concerned. However, I believe it about 70% correct.

There were:

Mumps—11; Influenza—16; Lobar Pneumonia—6; Septic Sore Throat—89; Vincent's Angina—5; Scabies —17; Pediculosis—10; Chicken Pox—24; German Measles—11; Measles—7; Virus Pneumonia—2; Scarlet Fever—11; Cancer—2; Gonorrhea—7; Syphilis—3; Undulant Fever—0; Tuberculosis—2; Acute Meningitis—3; Poliomyelitis—2; Impetigo—15; Whooping Cough—51; Broncho-Pneumonia—11; Diphtheria—0; Rheumatic Fever—11.

There were 16 water collections made during the year at Groveton, N. H., and five of these samples showed very excessive B-Coli contamination. This reveals the fact that to make this water SAFE chlorination is required.

There were 4 samples taken from the Northumberland, N. H. water supply and all were reported as satisfactory.

The supply at Groveton is still inadequate and should require immediate attention as to increasing its amount and should be further protected by chlorination.

Street and rubbish collections should be better taken care of, as there still remains many and unnecessary full rubbish cans unemptied for a week at a time. There should be a twice a week rubbish and garbage collection.

The town as a whole enjoyed about the average health for the year of 1948. Except for a large outbreak of Whooping Cough during the early part of the year the contagious diseases remained slightly under the average run.

I also at this time wish to state that all cases of complaints, whatever their nature, should be made to the Board of Health, Groveton, N. H., and **must be made in writing and signed.** Otherwise the complaint cannot be investigated or be considered as a Valid Complaint.

TOWN OF GROVETON, NEW HAMPSHIRE BOARD OF SELECTMEN REPORT ON WATER SUPPLY

Gentlemen:

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I was commissioned by your Honorable Board of Selectmen, and special Water Committee to make a study and prepare a report on the present water supply for the Town of Groveton, N. H.

The report will consist of the following:

- 1. Surveys and maps of both transmission pipe lines from the intakes to the town storage reservoir.
- 2. Input into the storage reservoir during normal and dry periods.
- 3. Domestic consumption, industrial demand, and fire protection.

4. New sources of supply.

5. Summary.

General Layout of Transmission System Ames Brook Intake and Pipe Line

The Ames Brook dam is situated almost due south from the Town of Groveton at elevation 1461.8 feet above sea level. The dam is constructed of concrete and is 413.73 feet above the pipe line outlet into the storage reservoir. Pipe line is of 6-inch cast iron, and 10,300 feet in length. The dam is constructed across the brook and serves merely to dam up water enough to fill an intake chamber also of concrete, in which screens are located and housed with a wooden building for weather protection. Water shed consists of one square mile of drainage area, well wooded and steep, so that run-off is fast.

Moore Brook Pipe Line

Moore Brook pipe line is supplied with water from three intakes. The first, or main supply is taken from a dam constructed of concrete, across Moore Brook, with spillway at elevation 1361.73, and 313.73 feet above the pipe line outlet into the town storage reservoir. Pipe line is of 6-inch cast iron, and 9,000 feet in length. Similar to Ames Brook, the dam serves only to back water into an intake chamber housing screens, over which a wooden building is set for weather protection. Water shed is slightly larger, consisting of 1.1 square miles.

The second intake is a small concrete dam constructed across a little tributary located westerly from Moore Brook, at an elevation of 1592 feet. 2,400 feet of 4-inch cast iron pipe extends easterly from the dam to connect directly into the 6-inch pipe from Moore Brook, about 600 feet below the Moore Brook intake. Drainage area is about .25 of a square mile.

No survey was made of the line extending from the third intake supplying water into the Moore Brook line, but it was pointed out to me that a 4-inch cast iron pipe line about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile in length diverts water from a small brook further westerly into #2 brook above the dam. Similar to Ames Brook, these water sheds are steep, well wooded, and characteristic of quick run-off.

No. 2—Input into Storage Reservoir During Normal and Dry Periods

Main Storage Reservoir

Elevation 1048.0 above sea level, and situated about 2,000 feet southerly from the mercantile section of the town. Pipe line consists of 10-inch cast iron pipe. Town building at elevation 884.0. Storage 306,000 gallons.

Ames Brook dam, Elevation 1461

Storage reservoir 1048, difference, 413 feet. Pipe line is 6-inch cast iron 10,300 feet in length.

This line running with open end should deliver about 800,000 gallons of water per day, or 550 gallons per minute. However, throttling of the main valve near the pipe line leading to the Silver residence cuts the daily flow to about 660,000 gallons.

Moore Brook intake, Elevation 1361

Storage reservoir 1048, difference 313 feet. Pipe line is 6-inch cast iron, 9,000 feet in length.

This line running full with open end should deliver about 700,000 gallons per day, or 485 gallons per minute.

Using the above figures, we arrive at the maximum delivery of both transmission pipe lines supplying the town with water, when both brooks are flowing full.

Records of run-off on the Upper Ammonoosuc watershed for the past twenty-five years show that during the dry periods, run-off has reached the low amount of 80 gallons per square per minute. This occurred last year, the lowest on record, and almost that low point in 1933.

Although actual flow measurements were not made upon the Groveton brooks, they should represent a fair average, so therefore, I am going to use my figures for calculations, and apply them to the Ames and Moore brook watersheds, and thereby demonstrate the effect they would have in the dry season.

Dry season @ 80 gallons per minute per square mile of watershed.

Ames brook 1.0 square mile115,200 g.p.dayMoore brook 1.35 square miles155,520 g.p.day

270,720 g.p.day =188 g.p.min.

Domestic Consumption, Industrial Demand, and Fire Protection

Consumption of water is usually stated in terms of the average daily consumption per capita on basis of population served. In towns and cities where water is metered, statistics show that per capita consumption varies from 20 to 50 gallons. Where the supply is unmetered, 50 to 120 gallons per capita for domestic use. In industrial plants metered, use varies from 50 to 100 gallons per capita. Where the supply is unmetered, 100 to 200 gallons per capita, most all of which is contributed to leaky fixtures and unnecessary waste.

There being no main line meter, or domestic meters in service, it was impossible to accurately determine the total consumption of water in the town, so our first move after completing a survey of the reservoirs and transmission pipe line system was to take a static water pressure reading on one of the town hydrants. This was done on the afternoon of November 29th, 1948. Pressure was found to be fourteen pounds below our calculations. On this same day, the storage reservoir was found to be down 18 inches, or 40,000 gallons below being full. I might also add that both the Ames and Moore brook pipe lines were flowing full.

With the cooperation of Mr. Emery, more hydrant readings were recorded, with varying results, so that several days later, we installed a pressure recording gage in the town. From readings obtained, we discovered that there were periods of heavy draft upon the system which extended for several hours duration.

Abnormal pressure changes and estimated periodic consumption for a twelve day period are recorded in the following table.

November 29th, 1948, hydrant pressure 52 pounds.

Static pressure $66\frac{1}{2}$ pounds. 14 pounds = 32 feet head loss,=1,800,000 gallons per day=1,250 gallons per minute.

Reservoir down 18 inches—both inlet supply pipes running full, equivalent in storage to 40,000 gallons.

As previously stated, without meters, the exact amount of town consumption cannot be determined. However, the amount that the town should use, and allowing for a generous percentage of waste may be estimated, and should give us something like the following.

For population of 3,000

50 gallons per capita for domestic purposes, and 50 gallons per capita for manufacturing purposes equals 100 gallons per capita per day, or 300,000 gallons per day, or 208 gallons per minute.

For fire protection

Storage reservoir: 306,000 gallons. 2,000 feet 10-inch cast iron pipe into town, and static pressure of 70 pounds. Allowing for seven fire streams of 200 g.p.minute each, the working pressure should be about 54 pounds. On this assumption, and input pipe lines to the reservoir flowing full, fire protection at this rate, should last $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours on full reservoir, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours additional from the inlet lines, making a total of 6 hours, after which flow would be reduced to normal input.

Now: The normal input into the storage reservoir, as derived from the above figures, when brooks are flowing full, should be about 938 gallons per minute, or 1,050,720 gallons per day. These figures, as compared with daily estimated requirements are more than three times normal demand for domestic use and manufacturing requirements.

Minimum supply

Referring to our calculations on minimum run-off and estimated town requirements: Ames Brook 1.0 sq. mil. Moore Brook 1.35 sq. mil. 115,200 g.p.day 155,520 g.p.day

270,720 g.p.day =188 g.p.minute.

Town requirements based on 3,000 population and 100 gallons per capita

=300,000 gallons per day=208 gallons per minute.

Probable deficiency based on 3,000

population=29,280 gallons per day=20 g. p. min.

Careful analysis of figures so far in this report seem to indicate that your problem hinges entirely upon abnormal periods of low precipitation.

Weather authorities report that we are about half way through an abnormal period of low precipitation. The average rainfall for this section is $38\frac{1}{2}$ inches per year. The years 1947 and 1948 were 18.2 and 23.4 per cent short respectively.

New Sources of Water Supply Roaring Brook

The possibility of pumping the surplus waters of Roaring brook into the present Ames brook pipe line as it crosses the main Roaring brook near the Houley field will now be considered.

The pipe crossing at Roaring brook is some 59 feet lower than the high point near the outlet, and 38 feet lower than the outlet or discharge into the storage reservoir.

As the head from the inlet of the pipe line at the Ames brook inlet is 451 feet above the proposed booster pump location at the Roaring brook crossing, the most economical proposition would be to run the discharge from the pipe line at this point into an intake well along with the waters of Roaring brook, then take suction from the well. My figures will be based upon this proposition. The total watershed above the proposed pumping station at the Roaring brook crossing is 7.55 square miles. You are now using 2.35 square miles for the town supply, which leaves a balance of 5.20 square miles. Of this, about one square mile is composed of fields and pasture lands, and of no value during dry periods. That leaves a balance of 4.20 square miles.

The question of available water now comes into the picture. If we use the previous figure of 80 gallons per square mile minimum yield, we would have $4.2 \times 80 =$ 336 gallons per minute, or 485,140 gallons per day. With the present minimum yield of 188 g.p.min., the minimum yield would be 524 gallons per minute, or 750,000 gallons per day, and should provide the town with ample quantities for domestic and industrial uses.

Your requirements have never needed additional water during normal periods, therefore, a booster pump capable of pumping the minimum run-off during dry periods to augment the present supply should be all that is necessary, so the following equipment is proposed: One 300 g.p.min. De Laval 3-inch suction, 2½-inch discharge centrifugal pump as manufacturer by the Turbine Equipment Company, direct connected to a 10 H.P. electric motor as a pumping unit. Suction to be taken from a well pit set aside from the main brook near the pipe line crossing at Roaring brook.

This unit may be purchased at present prices for \$503.00 f.o.b. Groveton, with six weeks delivery. Other costs would be starting equipment, installation, piping, concrete well pit, housing facilities, etc.

For estimating purposes, entire cost, ready for outside wiring would be in the vicinity of \$5,000.00.

Mill Brook

This large stream has many tributaries, and is located southeast from the town, with a drainage area of about 131_{2} square miles above elevation 1300.

A study of the U.S.G.S. map indicates that it should be an ideal water shed for a public water supply. About seven miles of pipe line however, would be required to obtain water from this source. Seven miles of 10-inch pipe starting at elevation 1300 with outlet into the present storage reservoir would deliver about 1,200,000 gallons daily, or four times the estimated town requirements. As the drainage area is more than five times the area of Ames and Moore brooks, ample supply should be available for all present and future needs.

The taking of water from a watershed of this size would mean considerable money invested in some sort of a reservoir to act as a settling basin during high water periods. For estimating purposes, \$40,000 should provide a sufficient dam, intake, and necessary stripping for a reservoir. Total estimated costs would be as follows:

Christine Lake

This lake is situated about six miles northeast from Groveton. Has a watershed of $4\frac{1}{2}$ square miles, water surface of some 115 acres, storage of about 500 million gallons, water surface elevation of 1202 feet above sea level, and 318 feet above Groveton.

10-in pipe will deliver about one million gallons daily, but instead of piping into the present storage reservoir, I propose connecting directly into the distribution mains in the town. With this hook-up, there would be two separate water systems supplying the town.

The estimated cost would be:

Total

Ground Water Supply

This type of water supply differs from the regular surface supply, in that the storage is contained below the ground surface, and of inexhaustible supply. It is free from suspended matter, of an even year round temperature of about 45 degrees for this section, and sparkling clear without filtration.

A system of this type requires a 12 to 24-inch caisson, depending upon the quantities of water required, together with a screen extending from the surface of the ground to ledge formation. Depths run usually from 40 to 90 feet. Selected gravel is then placed around the screen in sufficient quantities to allow the required demand to filter into the well from a water bearing strata below the surface. A deep well pump is then placed within the screen, a small house erected above, necessary piping set up, and the well is ready for operation.

In order to obtain a supply of this type, the first step is to locate an area containing a satisfactory soil strata capable of delivering the required amount. A site is selected, and test wells driven, usually a series of 2 or $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipes sunk to depths of 40 to 90 feet. During this process, soil samples are observed, and if satisfactory as a water bearing strata, water samples and pumping tests are made. When satisfactory results are obtained, the area is ready for the final so-called caisson type well.

Wells of this type are more and more coming into constant use not only as an auxiliary supply, but as an every day unit. Some of the towns and cities in this state using them as sources of supply are as follows:

Concord, Sommersworth, Dover, Portsmouth,

North Conway, Gorham, Berlin, and nearby

towns of South Paris, Me., and St. Johnsbury,

Vt., and many others.

Groveton is situated in a valley, having a ground formation ideal for this type of well to all outward appearances, and if the area near the School house lot could be used and results obtained, the entire project ready for operation should not exceed the following estimated cost:

Summarv

Total

The scope of this report deals entirely with present input into the storage reservoir supplying water to the town, probable consumption in the town, based upon a population of 3,000, together with ways and means of increasing this input.

Methods if financing any new development has not been considered.

Estimates on the Mill brook, and Christine lake propositions, are only tentative, as no surveys were made other than details obtained from your Committee, and information taken from maps of the areas.

Estimates on the booster pumping station at Roaring brook, along with the Caisson Well Proposition are very nearly accurate.

By a thorough study and analysis of our findings, it is evident that heavy intermittent demands for large flows occur almost daily within the distribution system. This is plainly shown on the recording pressure charts extending from December 3rd, to the 14th.

We have also shown that storage and input into the reservoir, during normal precipitation, gives the town a good supply for fire protection.

The problem, therefore, hinges entirely upon shortage of input for short periods of drought.

Mill Brook. An A-1 proposition for a gravity supply. A large portion of the water shed is upon government lands which is good protection in itself from pollution. Other areas upon the water shed would, of course, have to be leased or purchased, rights of way for pipe lines obtained, etc. An undertaking of this magnitude would require quite some time before operations could start.

Christine Lake. Most of the land around this lake is used for recreational purposes, along with the lake itself as a bathing resort, and widely used by the

public at large. It would appear that litigation might be necessary before results could be obtained.

Roaring Brook Booster Pump. Based upon 4.2 square miles of drainage area, and minimum flow, pumping from Roaring brook into the Ames brook pipe line during periods of drought, to augment the present supply appears to be a fair proposition. However, some objection as a permanent set up might be made by the State Board of Health, due to the large areas of pasture lands near the intake, and along the brook itself. Chlorination, of course, would be required. **Caisson Type well, Ground water supply.**

An auxiliary supply of this type, if successfully found, would guarantee the town an abundance of pure water, requiring no chlorination or treatment of any kind. Could be fully automatic, starting and stopping as fluctuations in pressure varied, or operated by push button control. Would require no worries, or regular attendance, such as patrol of pipe lines, care of intakes, etc. The only cost would be power for pumping, which in your case, as an auxiliary source of supply, would be very small.

In closing, I wish to thank the Selectmen, and special committee for attending the numerous meetings which I have found it necessary to call during this work. I especially wish to thank the various members who so graciously worked with me in the field making the survey, as much depended upon their knowledge and cooperation.
