INFORMATION REGARDING
MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATION

To the Residents of Orford:

There have been some changes in Motor Vehicle laws in fees and registrations. These include an increase in Title fees from \$5.00 to \$7.00. Also a new law in the execution of the transfer of ownership on the back of the Title affects a person who may buy a car and wishes to sell. He must apply for a Title. There can be only one transfer of ownership on the back of a Title to an individual. If the first transfer is to a dealer, there can be another.

The minimum fee increased from \$2.00 to \$5.00 and the clerk fee increased from \$.50 to \$1.00. This applies to the registrant, only. The Town still pays \$.50 for each vehicle registration processed.

Beginning in September I was named "Approved Municipal Registration Agent" and can issue renewing stickers for the following vehicles:

- Passenger, Commercial and Handicap Plates up to 8,000 pounds
- Trailer plates up to 8,000 pounds.
- Air Compressors, Cement Mixers, Log Splitters and saw rigs.
- Veteran plates.
- Tractor plates.
- Initial plates.
- Motorcycle plates.

I cannot do Agri plates.

There is an additional fee of \$1.50 to the Agent for the renewing stickers. This is to compensate for the daily log, daily depositing in the Bank of State Funds and mailing in a daily report!

You may still go to Lebanon for the stickers or send by mail. I have been seeing people from Lyme and Piermont as well as Orford residents who, on the last day of the month seem to be pleased that the long wait in Lebanon can now be avoided.

I must see the old registration or print on the top of the registration "NOT VERIFIED" which means that the people in Concord check the computer print out for errors. For Orford Residents, I must have a Resident Tax receipt.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

During the fall the Orford-Wentworth Town line was walked and blazed by Donald Tatham and representatives from Wentworth. In the spring additional work will be done at the Orford-Piermont-Wentworth corner. These lines have been difficult to follow due to lumbering operations and the many years which have elapsed since they were officially marked.

We wish to express the thanks of the Town to the School Study Committee whose report gave unanimous recommendation to the continuance of the High School.

Orford is still trying to solve the problem of solid waste disposal. In accordance with RSA 149 M:17 which mandates affiliation with a regional study group, it has seemed wise to continue with the Pemi-Baker Solid Waste District. The feasibility study which was made in 1983 and to which the Town contributed was deemed too expensive and unworkable.

Repairs to the roof of the Selectmen's building and the painting of the trim on the Library will be done in the spring.

We feel that a satisfactory solution to the Stonehouse Mt. road problems can be brought about in the near future through the cooperation of the Town of Lyme.

A new Town truck was purchased and has proved to be satisfactory. The maintenance of the roads has been good thanks to the efforts of the Road Agent, Roger Noyes. However, a survey of the Town bridges made by state engineers is cause for concern. The expense of bringing some of the bridges up to standard will be great and there is little state or federal aid available.

The time has come when the Town must face up to the fact that Town government has become "big business" in the management of its monies and the administration of its office. The required time and expertise to handle an ever-increasing budget and the subsequent paper work make the position of Selectman difficult to fill. Other towns have solved the problem of Town management by hiring an administrative assistant. We recommend that a study be made of the options which are available.

We wish to thank Hazel Donnelly, our tax collector during the past 12 years, for her unstinting effort to bring in the money. Since the death of our Treasurer, Evelyn Bunten, as Deputy Treasurer, has provided a continuity in fiscal matters and we are grateful. The detail and accuracy of the Town's accounts are a lasting tribute to the 30 years of service which Gunther Sunderhauf, as Treasurer, gave to Orford.

Richard Butman continues the work of up-dating the tax map. Because of the many transfers due to the relocation of the Appalachian Trail, the work has been more complicated and more time-consuming than in other years.

We are sorry that poor health made it necessary for Everett Blake to resign before his term was completed. As a life-long resident of Orford he contributed in a special way to the government of the

Town. We were fortunate that Bill McKee was willing to accept the appointment as Selectman and it is the Town's loss that he cannot continue in this office. To all the other people in Town who have given us advice and counsel we say "thank you"!

The coming year will bring many changes in official personnel and we shall miss those who have served, but as the "old order changeth" we shall continue to provide the Town with good government.

This is a state law enacted by the State Fire Marshal's Office, and in the town of Orford to be enforced by your Fire Chief.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow-covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000.00 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

The OCHS offers skilled nursing to all residents of Orford. Home health aides, physical, occupational and speech therapies are provided through contract with Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center's Department of Continuing Care. Direct patient care was increased by 260 hours in 1983.

Karen Garrigan is the visiting nurse for Orford and Piermont. The OCHS telephone number is 353-4853. There is an answering machine in the office for messages when the nurse is not in.

One hundred and eighty-eight children were seen at the Well Child Clinics in 1983. At these clinics we offer physicals, immunizations, hematocrits, urinalysis and vision and hearing screening. These clinics are held on odd months in Orford and even months in Lyme. There is a \$5.00 fee per family per year to cover operating expenses. At these clinics adults can have blood pressure taken for a dollar donation. The same service is offered adults at the Mini-clinics which are held the last Thursday of the month at the Congregational Church in Orford.

The Town of Piermont contracted for services from the OCHS in 1983 as it has in the past.

The School Nurse is no longer employed by the OCHS, but by the Supervisory Union.

A sincere thank you to all persons who helped us at our clinics and in our fund raisers!

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

We appreciate this opportunity to more directly communicate with our taxpaying citizens through their annual town/city reports.

Because of our July 1st fiscal year, it is hard to anticipate the local tax impact of the county budget. The Commissioners are accountable to the public and taxpayers, and accordingly are extremely conscious of meeting the citizens' needs adequately and efficiently, yet as economically as possible. However, we are faced with similar budgeting dilemmas as towns and cities. Real budget concerns are created by the federal and state mandated programs and services without supporting funds or local control, and the increased demand for services while attempting to hold down budgets and taxes. We all must maintain a close relationship with our legislators. The Commissioners are following very closely the pending legislation regarding settlement and assistance programs, and hope that the towns are also involved in this very important issue.

Courtroom #2 was finished last summer and was dedicated during the opening of the fall term of Superior Court on September 13, 1983. We anticipate having a second judge in March, which should relieve the backlog and reduce the need for masters.

Counties, as well as towns, are experiencing the transition of the courts into the new State Unified Court System, and should notice a decrease in local expenses for the judicial system. However, the counties will have to "reimburse" \$2.75 million to the Unified Court System in fiscal year 1985, which means approximately \$200,000 to Grafton County. We also expect that the counties will retain certain operating expenses such as Probate Court guardianship and appeals costs, Superior Court bailiff costs, and probably will have to provide court space, furnishings and equipment without remuneration.

On Commissioner recommendation, the Delegation Executive Committee appointed a Jail Study Committee to review the needs for the county correctional facility. The National Institute of Corrections made an independent study of the correctional facility at no cost to taxpayers, and issued an encouraging report recommending minor changes, but overall indicating a good facility in general compliance with laws, regulations and meeting needs. Some attention is being given to the need for additional space, especially for "weekend" incarcerations. There was no recommendation for new permanent facility construction at this time.

Grafton County is currently involved in litigation in a retirement buy-back issue which could have heavy impact on all local governments in the N. H. Retirement System. Assessment on Grafton County in this one case could run approximately \$70,000 plus legal fees and could result in a serious "domino" effect on local governments.

Grafton County will be going through the budgeting process in May and June, with a public hearing on the Commissioners recommendations expected to be held in mid-June. The hearing will be advertised, and we strongly encourage your attendance at the hearing to voice your opinions and feelings on the budget. We welcome your attendance and comments.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DISTRICT PRINCIPAL

On the evening of November 18, 1983, at a special school district meeting, Dr. Mark Harris presented the results of a seven month study by the Orford School Study Committee to approximately one hundred and fifty residents.

Whether or not one agreed with the Committee recommendation that the Town of Orford maintain a K-12 public school system, one had to appreciate the amount of research represented in the extremely well-written Report to the Town. Committee members Kathy Blanchard, Timothy Dyke, Portia Fitzhugh, Mark Harris and Robb Thomson deserve a good deal of credit and thanks.

During the past few years the Orford School Board has initiated many energy conservation measures in the school district. These include additional wall insulation in Memorial Hall and the Academy Building, mercury vapor lamps and ceiling fans in the gymnasium, furnace controls with heater sensors at Memorial Hall and the high school, and double glass windows in the cafeteria and gymnasium.

Improvements this year include radiator steam traps, new storm windows and an entry vestibule at the high school. It is anticipated that substantial savings in fuel costs will be realized as a result.

Three teachers were new to our staff this fall. Barbara Brayman possesses a B.S. Degree from Rhode Island College and an M. Ed. from Keene State College. Barbara serves our students in the area of Special Education.

Janis Saugstad graduated from the University of Missouri and is teaching K-12 art and 7-8 grade social studies. Janis is an advisor to the Sophomore Class.

Steve Risberg, a graduate of Dartmouth College, is teaching mathematics. Steve enjoyed a very successful fall season as coach of our volleyball team and also serves as an advisor to the Senior Class.

Present enrollment, K-12, is 172 students.

This is a number we should like to see increased and attempts will be made to do a bit of recruiting in Lyme, Piermont, Fairlee and Wentworth for the 1984-85 school year.

Now that we have nine microcomputers, developing a K-12 computer curriculum and securing appropriate software to support it will be a top priority for us this year.

Our successful adult education computer course will be repeated between the February and April school vacations.

This has been a banner year for varsity sports at Orford High School. In the fall our soccer and volleyball teams were in the state tournaments and it looks as though our boys and girls will be tournament bound in basketball.

Achievement test results for students in Grades 5-8 were

encouraging to the staff and Orford School Board. Individual results will enable teachers to identify strengths and weaknesses of students so that an appropriate remedial or enrichment program may be developed and implemented.

A class analysis enables the teachers to pinpoint specific areas of the curriculum which may be in need of improvement.

I wish to thank the Orford community for the warm welcome and many courtesies extended to me since my arrival in August.

I am particularly grateful to the student body and professional staff for their assistance and cooperation.
