TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Plaistow in the (L. S.) County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Plaistow on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for same.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 (Forty) for a double door fire-proof safe for the purpose of storing the old records of the town.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 (Three Hundred Dollars) for permanent improvements in the Plaistow Cemetery; the improvements to consist of building new driveways, repairing the old well and equipping it with a pump, and fencing the easterly side of the cemetery; the appropriation to be used by the Plaistow Cemetery Trustees.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum sufficient for six additional street lights on North Main Street, beginning at a point where the last light now is located and extending towards the Hampstead line, and make appropriation for same.
6. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to raise money in anticipation of taxes.

7. To see if the Town will vote to issue serial bonds in an amount sufficient to complete the Sweet Hill Road to the Newton Trunk Line; the Kingston Road from the carbarn to the Kingston Town Line; the Westville Road from Main Street to the Junction of the East Road in Westville Village; Pine Street from Main Street to the Westville Road, near Peaslee's Mill; and the road from the Catholic Church to North Main Street to the junction of the road leading from Plaistow to East Hampstead; the work to be done under contracts and given by the Selectmen and the construction to be under the supervision of the State Highway Department, and this vote hereby authorizes the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to bond the Town to an amount not to exceed Thirty-Three Thousand (33,000) Dollars (upon petition of Joseph S. Hills and sixteen others).

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise an additional \$1500.00 (Fifteen Hundred Dollars) to complete the state highway from the Plaistow Carbarns to Kingston Town Line.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Plaistow:

Herewith I submit to you my third annual report, together with the reports of the music supervisor, Mrs. Eva W. Thompson, and school nurse, Helen Thomas.

We were very fortunate in having but one change in the teaching force last September. Miss Mary McGagh was appointed to the Westville school in the place of Miss Boucher who resigned after three years of work in this school.

There were 257 pupils enrolled in the schools last year. This is eleven less than the enrollment of the year before last. The attendance averaged 92 per cent of the membership. This was about three per cent below the average for the state for this period and was caused by the amount of illness we had during winter and early spring.

Twenty-six pupils were graduated from the eighth grade last June and twenty-four of these entered High School. It now frequently happens that nearly all of the graduates enter High School. The great majority of parents feel that their children should at least have a High School training. This is indicative of the conviction regarding actual worth of the time spent in High School. At the present time there are about twenty-five hundred High School graduates annually in this state, of these about one-half go on to post secondary institutions. This indicates that the High School is no longer the end of educational necessities and desires.

The following table shows the number of pupils in attendance at Pollard and Westville schools during a period of years: (Figures for 1925 were not available)

The comparative cost of schools is of interest to the public. The per pupil cost of the Plaistow schools last year was \$68.40. In the 244 school districts of the state, 55 had a per pupil cost equal to or lower than ours while 189 had a greater cost. The median cost per pupil for the whole state was \$83.35. State aid paid over one-half of the approved elementary school budget. The amount to be paid for high school tuition increases somewhat year by year due to the fact that boys and girls enter high school in increasing numbers.

Haverhill High School will have room for those who wish to attend during the school year 1930-1931. Should Massachusetts change its school law and require all pupils to attend school until they become fifteen years old, a condition is very likely to develop under which Haverhill could take in no more new pupils from this town.

The roof on the Pollard school is in a poor condition. At least one-half of this roof should be re-covered this summer. Otherwise this building is in a good state of repair. At Westville the interior should be repainted.

New Hampshire has had a decade of exceptional educational progress, and the State Board of Education, under the leadership of its chairman, Orton B. Brown, and State Commissioner Ernest W. Butterfield has had an interesting and important review of the achievements of the ten years.

At a meeting held recently at the Concord High School and at which meeting nearly three hundred school board members and superintendents attended, the following facts were emphasized:

New Hampshire adopted a new school code in 1919, which has been in operation for ten years. The code has raised the quality of the schools in the less favored districts,

financially. It magnified need of higher efficiency in the rural and elementary city schools. It gave added power and increased support to the State Department of Education, especially authorized it to create standards of attainment for secondary and private schools.

The code of 1919 provides equal length of school year for cities and rural communities, and no school in the state is in session less than thirty-six weeks. Now boys and girls in the most remote districts in New Hampshire are as well prepared for high school as those of the cities. The high school attendance increased forty per cent in ten years, and twice as many high school students go to college as ten years ago. The high school enrollments have increased six times as many as in elementary schools.

In 1919 few one-room schools had a teacher who had a normal school education; now a majority of these schools are taught by normal school graduates. In 1919 many children were far from high school opportunities; now 90 per cent are within easy driving distance of a high school. Now all schools have the advantage of school superintendents who are college graduates, who have taught at least five years, who have satisfactory personal and professional records, and give their entire time to school supervision.

No new untrained teachers are employed and only untrained teachers of successful experience are retained.

Before 1919 one-fifth of the schools changed teachers during the year. The mid-year change of teachers in 1919 was 540. In 1928 it was only 98.

In nothing has there been greater progress than in the professional service rendered by the State Normal Schools at Plymouth and Keene. They are graduating students from the four-year course and every graduate is engaged in the state at once. They also graduate students from two-year and three-year courses for elementary and junior high schools, and they are all employed in the state.

In only eight of the forty-eight states is the state tax for local public schools as low as in New Hampshire. In the state five times as much tax money is paid teachers as is ex-

pended for school buildings; and twenty-six times as much for teachers as for all administrative expenses.

An increasing number of school districts in this state have been arranging a school calendar which would provide for thirty-six actual weeks of school. We are at the present time about one week short of this ideal.

Domestic Arts are taught to the girls in the seventh and eighth grades. This work seems very much worth while and should receive greater encouragement by providing better equipment. The boys of these grades have devoted a similar amount of time to Junior High Algebra and Geometry. The common practice is to give Domestic Arts to the girls and Manual Training to the boys in grades seven and eight. I hope it will be possible to add Manual Training for the boys in the near future. I believe there is a need for such training. Also this would give us an approved Junior High School.

The children and teachers are well equipped with modern books and supplies. School books were never so attractive and interesting as at the present time. Parents have noticed this and often speak about it.

The work of the schools is progressing well this year. Achievement tests given at intervals, show that good progress is being made.

Our schools are engaged in moral training all day long. Character education is a by-product of all other education and far more important than the direct product. Children reflect in their behavior the influences that reach them. To spend five or six hours a day in a classroom where the virtues of courtesy, politeness, kindness, sympathy, unselfishness, thoughtfulness, orderliness, truthfulness, sincerity, industry, patience and justice are practised unconsciously, is of inestimable moral value.

In conclusion I would thank the School Board for their generous support and commend the time and energy that they have expended so generously for the good of the schools. I would also commend the effective and loyal work

of the teachers in guiding the pupils forward on the road to citizenship. The work of the year has been very pleasant.

To the Superintendent and School Board of Plaistow:

I herewith present my annual report as supervisor of music in the Plaistow schools:

The text books are from the "New Educational Music Course" by Ginn & Co. Two new sets of books were added at the beginning of the school year, "Juvenile Music" for third grade and "Elementary Music" for fourth grade. This course supplies a book for each grade and with the addition of "Juvenile" and "Elementary Music" the course at the Pollard School is now complete.

The work in musical appreciation proves very interesting to all. This work is carried on with the aid of the victrola and picture charts of the instruments of the orchestra. In May a music memory test was given in grades five, six, seven and eight. The lists being made up of well known classics by noted composers.

On November 14th two operettas were presented by the school children: "A Doll House Dream" by Ruth Branz, and "Polished Pebbles" by Otis Carrington. A new orthophonic victrola and two cases of records have been purchased with part of the money and the balance saved for a radio fund.

For the cooperation afforded me in my work I extend my thanks to the Superintendent, School Board, and Teachers.
