THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Richmond, in the county of Cheshire in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Richmond, on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see how much money the town will raise for highways and bridges in addition to the amount required by law.
4. To see if the town will vote to accept state aid to highways, and appropriate the amount required by law.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount required for maintenance of state aid highways.
6. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the care of cemeteries for the ensuing year.
7. To see what sum of money the town will raise for cutting brush for the ensuing year.
8. To see what the town will raise for libraries in addition to the amount required by law.
9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Old Home Day.

10. To see if the town will vote to allow 5 per cent discount on all taxes paid on or before July 1st, 1924.

11. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to borrow money for the use of the town.

12. To elect one director for the Richmond-Swanzey Telephone Co.

13. To see what action the town will take in regard to Road Bonds.

14. To hold primary election to elect delegates of the two parties to the National Convention.

15. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the piece of road leading from the forks of the roads at the foot of the Hubbard Hill so called, to the house formerly owned by Julia A. Putney, or take any action relating thereto.

16. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen, or take any action relating thereto.

17. To take action on any other matter that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Board of Education and Citizens:

I hereby submit my third annual report as superintendent of schools.

First I will present a brief general summary of the educational results achieved as a **direct outcome of the plan** of organization and supervision inaugurated early in the school year of 1921-22. For two years and a half the school board, teachers, and the majority of citizens have co-operated whole-heartedly with me in my attempt to have all the schools in the town realize their fullest possibilities with the help of standardized mental and achievement tests.

This involved radical changes in organization and methods of teaching, and the expenditure of a considerable sum of money for tests and accessory materials. One of the main features of our present scheme of organization and control is a system of educational accounting whereby we are enabled to show at any time whether or not our educational plants are running at a profit, and whether or not any individual pupil, class, school, or the system as a whole is working up to normal capacity.

It now devolves upon me as superintendent of your most important business enterprise to submit a sort of balance sheet, so to speak, showing the amount of profit or loss and whether or not the money spent for tests and measurements has resulted in an increase in school efficiency sufficient to justify such expenditure. Also to inform the patrons of our schools how the educational product of our schools compares with that of the schools of other communities.

The following table presents the facts and figures. The figures are percentages. A minus sign means below standard

and a plus sign means above standard. For instance, the schools of the district were 28 per cent below national standards in September, 1921. In June, 1923, they were 23.3 per cent above standard; an increase of 51.3 per cent in reading efficiency as a result of two years' intensive drill to improve the reading habits of the pupils. By "standard" we mean the average for the country as a whole. The table is really a comparison, on a percentage basis, of the achievements of your schools with those of the nation as a whole.

The money expended for tests and accessories for the two years is less than two per cent of the total amount spent for schools. This means that the efficiency of the schools has been

increased nearly 38 per cent, with an added overhead of only 2 per cent. This is the answer to the question, "Does it Pay?" Most businesses would, I think, consider an increase in production or profit of 38 per cent from an investment of 2 per cent, as a paying proposition.

In conclusion I want to make an appeal to parents for more regular attendance of their children at school. Of course children should not be sent to school when they are really ill or when they have to walk a long distance and the weather is such as to endanger their health. But they should never be kept out or permitted to stay out for any other reason. Some parents do not seem to realize the disastrous effect of excessive absence on the success of children in their school work. When a child is absent from school his classmates are going ahead with the work. If he is absent three or four days or a week, they have gone considerably ahead of him and he finds it very difficult to overtake them. Furthermore, the teacher with one grade and thirty or forty pupils in her charge, or the teacher with less pupils and many grades, has little time or opportunity to help the truants catch up. Many times the teacher or superintendent is blamed because children are not promoted at the end of the year when the fault lies entirely with the parents because of unnecessary absences on the part of the children. Pupils cannot be promoted until they have completed the work of their grade. They cannot do the work of their grade and be absent from school a good part of the time. A child who loses as much as two or three weeks of school during the year decidedly lessens his chance of promotion unless he is unusually bright and industrious.
