**ROCKINGHAM COUNTY DELEGATION**

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February 24, 1958  
Rockingham County Home  
Brentwood, N. H. 10 A.M.

In accordance with duly issued notice, the Rockingham County delegation met as above noted.

In the absence of the chairman, George W. Shattuck, the Vice-chairman Mary Dondero presided.

The roll was called. Present were 39 members, 4 delegates.

The presiding chairman spoke in tribute to the late Walter F. Haigh, Salem, member of the executive committee. The delegation arose for a moment of silent reverence.

The chair was then turned over to Mr. Hunter, chairman of the budget committee.

Consideration of the budget as recommended by the committee was then requested. Resulting action being as follows:

Items

1. Mr. Nickerson moved, duly seconded that item 1, be adopted as recommended by the committee. Motion carried.

2-3-4-5 Mr. Merrill moved, duly seconded that items 2-3-4-5 be adopted as recommended by the committee. Motion carried.

6-7-8-9-10-11 Mr. Foote moved, duly seconded, that items 7-8-9-10-11, as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

12. Mr. Robinson moved, duly seconded, that item 12 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

13. Mr. Eastman, moved, duly seconded, that item 13 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

14. Mr. Blair moved, duly seconded that item 14 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

15. Mr. White moved, duly seconded, that item 15 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

16. Sheriff and Dep. fees.

17. Sheriff and Dep. expenses.

The recommendation of the budget committee under item 16 was an appropriation of \$16,000.00. The recommendation of the budget committee under item 17 was an appropriation of \$10,000.00. The sheriff requested an appropriation under item 16, of \$18,000.00.

Sheriff Frink spoke to the members explaining the reason for the requested increase being:

1. 50% increase in Deputy Sheriff fee, as provided by law. Increase per diem from \$10.00 to \$15.00.

2. \$1500. to continue seasonal night patrol.

Much discussion ensued.

Mr. Battles moved, duly seconded that item 16 be amended to \$18,000.00 and the vote be by roll call. The roll was called. 21 members voting NO — 18 members voting YES, the motion did not prevail. Mr. Scamman moved, duly seconded, that:

The appropriation under items 16 and 17 be amended to;

16. Sheriff and Dep. fees \$17,500.00.

17. Sheriff and Dep. expenses \$8,500.00.

The motion was carried.

18. Miss Spollett moved, duly seconded that item 18 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

19. Motion by Mr. Scamman, duly seconded, that item 19 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

20. Motion by Mr. Bisbee, duly seconded, that item 20 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

21. Motion by Mr. Blair, duly seconded, that item 21 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

22. Motion by Mr. Sanborn, duly seconded, that item 22 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

23. Motion by Mr. Bisbee, duly seconded, that item 23 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

24 - 25 - 26 Motion by Mr. Rathbone that items 24, 25, 26 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

27. Motion by Mr. Scamman, duly seconded, that item 27 as recommended by the committee be adopted with the provision that payments be made on a monthly basis until approval of the 1959 budget. Motion carried. The Rockingham County Extension service Council received the approval of the delegation to continue use of office space under the same arrangements as formerly held with the Farm Bureau.

28. Motion by Mr. Labranche, duly seconded, that item 28 be adopted as recommended by the delegation. Motion carried.

29. Motion by Miss Spollett, duly seconded, that item 29 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.



30. Motion by Mr. Tenney, duly seconded, that item 30 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

31. Motion by Mr. Merrill, duly seconded, that item 31 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

32. Motion by Mr. Merrill, duly seconded that item 32 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

33. Motion by Mrs. Griffin, duly seconded, that item 33 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

34. Motion by Mrs. Griffin, duly seconded that item 34 as recommended by the committee be adopted. Motion carried.

At this time a recess was declared. The delegation moved to the dining room where dinner was served. The chairman expressed to Mr. and Mrs. Hilton the appreciation of the delegation for their gracious efforts of the day.

At 2 o'clock the delegation resumed the business of the day.

#### RECEIPTS

Mr. Bisbee moved, duly seconded, that all items appearing under "Receipts" be accepted. Motion carried.

Mr. Scamman moved, duly seconded, that: The convention raise and appropriate the sum of \$756,412.66, crediting against this the estimated revenue and surplus of \$294,829.91, and committing to county tax \$461,582.-75. The motion carried.

#### OLD BUSINESS:

JAIL — Mr. Sayre Merrill brought to the attention of the delegation that recommendation of the sub-com-

mittee as adopted by the delegation July 11, 1957 — “that a committee of three be appointed to make investigation, relative to savings or additional cost, of prisoner care at Brentwood” has not been fulfilled. The vice-chairman was requested to appoint a committee. Appointments will be made at a later time.

#### NEW BUSINESS:

RESOLUTIONS — Miss Spollett moved, duly seconded, that the vice-chairman draw up a set of resolutions for our late member Walter F. Haigh. One copy to be sent to his family, one copy to be spread upon our records. The motion was unanimously carried.

FUNERALS — Mr. Bisbee moved, duly seconded, that the chairman of each succeeding delegation, from this time on be instructed to send a floral tribute to the family of a deceased member, should the occasion arise during the time the Legislature is not in session. The motion carried.

#### COUNTY TREASURER:

Mr. Mott moved, duly seconded, that: The County Treasurer notify in writing, the Chairman of the board of selectmen of each town, Mayor of each city, in the county the approximate per-centage change in county appropriation, for each city or town, of the year 1958, and that this be done before March 3, 1958. Discussion ensued. The motion carried.

#### STUDY COMMITTEE:

COUNTY RECORDS BUILDING — Mr. Robinson moved, duly seconded that: A committee of five (5) be appointed by the chairman of the budget committee to survey the county needs for additional space insofar as respects the County Records Building. That a report of same be made to the 1959 delegation. Further that the

representative of the Bar Asso. be notified that a committee has been formed for this purpose, and that they be invited to consult. The motion was carried.

COMMITTEE APPOINTED — In accordance with the above motion the following were named as a committee. Mott of Newington, Bisbee of Derry, Carter of North Hampton, Dondero of Portsmouth and Eastman of Exeter. Mrs. Dondero moved that the chairman of the budget committee be appointed Ex-Officio. The motion being duly seconded. It was so voted.

Being no further business to come before the delegation Mr. Wardell moved, duly seconded that the meeting adjourn.

Wednesday, August 28, 1957

It was suggested that the ceremony be held in the patients' dining room of the new building. It was suggested that organ music be used as a background. Mr. Chase of Derry was suggested as a possible organist to bring his own organ. Refreshments to be served in the staff dining room. The program to begin about 2:30 p.m. No date was set, the time to be open from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

The dedication of Fernald Nursing Home was held on Sunday, February 23, 2 to 4 p.m. due to heavy snow on February 16, 1958.

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Friday, March 28, 1958

A public meeting was held at the Rockingham County Home at 2 p.m. with the 3 Commissioners present, Mr.

and Mrs. George Hilton Supts., and the following members of the Building Committee: Draper Parmenter, Frank Robinson, Mary C. Dondero, George Carter, Ernest Pinkham, Edwin Eastman and Lise L. Payette. Main order of the meeting was the opening of bids received for a sewage treatment plant at the Rockingham County Home, bids went as follows:

In an Executive Session, Commissioner Ira Brown made a motion, seconded by Comm. Bartlett, "That the contract on the sewage project be awarded to the low bidder — Swanburg Construction Co. — in the amount of \$57,110.00 and that Mr. Hilton handle the telephone calls from the Federal office authorizing the contract being awarded. Mr. Hilton is then to call the Swanburg Construction Corporation notifying them of the acceptance by the Federal Agency. The motion was carried. It was arranged that Mr. Horton of Swanburg Construction Corporation would be present on Wednesday, April 9th, to sign the contract at which time he will submit the performance bond.

Following the meeting, Mr. Healy and Mr. Hilton wrote letters to the Federal Agency requesting transfer of funds from the contingency to administrative, the total participation by the federal agency to remain \$19,500.00 according to the original grant. In the letter was enclosed three copies of the tabulation of bids along with a certified copy of the bid proposal of the Swanburg Construction Corporation.

Meeting adjourned at 3:15 p.m.

Loan, which was paid on receipt of taxes; \$1,040.14 received on savings account and on \$50,000.00 Bonds, was transferred to Interest Account. \$39.80 for refunds of Delegation Expense, which was paid twice; \$467.80 for Social Security and Retirement paid in by Register of Deeds, Register of Probate, Deputy Sheriffs and others, which must be sent, along with the County's Share, to the State Treasurer; \$551.04 for the Survey Fund was Transferred to Funds Available from the 1957 Budget.

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March 14, 1958 — a day we will long remember because it represents the acceptance date by the County of the Fernald Nursing Home, a day we eagerly looked forward to because it meant the green light for occupancy and utilization of these truly magnificent facilities. The transfer from the old to the new went very smoothly.

On April 1st the construction of the new sewage disposal plant was started. This modern installation

will coordinate into one operation that which previously was being handled through two systems of septic tanks, syphon chambers and filter beds.

In relation to this building program I am prompted to cite two examples of how longevity in a well trained and interested personnel pays dividends. A change in the plans necessitated a pit to be constructed to accommodate a return pump in the boiler room. By doing this work ourselves, a savings of some \$632.00 was realized for the County.

The other incident had to do with the electrical entrances in conjunction with an emergency generator installation. The original thinking dealt with two entrances which would necessitate two emergency generators. I asked the Commissioners for time to study this problem with our maintenance foreman, Mr. Allen. In the final analysis one electrical entrance was installed to service the entire institution and at the same time converted from the old 110-220 volt system to the modern 110-208 volt, 3 phase, 4 wire system. This now made it possible to consider one generator for the entire institution. Instead of purchasing one 75 kw for the new system and one 25 kw for the old system there was purchased one 125 kw unit, representing an increased capacity of 25 kws, for some \$4,500.00 less than originally proposed. This does not take into consideration the savings effected by our staff installing the generator, wiring, and the re-use of existing conduit and wire. I offer this simply to illustrate how day in and day out a competent staff functions for the economic benefit of the institution.

After twenty-one years of concentrated breeding and culling, in conjunction with correlating type and production, we finally made Progressive Breeders Award. This is an award made in recognition of the achieve-

ment of high standards in the breeding herd through adoption and use of approved methods of production testing, type classification, disease eradication and cooperation with other breeders of Holstein-Friesian cattle in a definite program of breed improvement. Forty-four animals averaged 14,522 lbs. of milk and 585 lbs. of fat. This has been accomplished without buying any high priced animals and on a management program comparable to any good dairyman.

We were privileged also to receive a silver medal production award on a bull we bred and raised—Rocko Renegade Hero. This bull is one of comparatively few sires to be so honored in the entire history of the National Holstein organization.

At the New England Holstein sale in Northampton this Fall, where there were some fifty head of pure bred Holstein cattle to be auctioned, one of our two animals tied for first prize with the Hood Farm as being the best fitted animal in the sale.

With respect to receiving these awards, I want to express my thanks to Russell Waterman, Boss Farmer and Henry Plimpton, Herdsman.

To assist us in meeting the responsibilities and the challenges of running this institution, we feel very grateful to our faithful employees for their contribution to its success and welfare. Longevity of employment merits recognition, and we submit the following record of service.

**REPORT OF THE CLERK OF SUPERIOR COURT**

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**To The Commissioners For Rockingham County:**

The following is my financial report for the year 1958, together with a brief comment on the business of the Court, and a report on the condition of the buildings, and suggested remedies.

The number of cases in Rockingham County Superior Court is constantly increasing. An examination of the report of the Judicial Council will give more detailed information on this subject.

The records of the Superior Court dating back to 1771 are housed in the Records Building, but all are not in the office of the Clerk of Superior Court. The records from 1771 to 1880 are in the vault connected with the office of the County Commissioners.

As you know, the vault physically connected with the Commissioners office, as above stated, was formerly only used occasionally by the Commissioners for conferences. Now the vault, where those Superior Court records are stored, appears to be used as an every-day office, and with the additional furniture, records of the Commissioners and equipment in that vault, it is difficult to attain access to the records of the Superior Court without moving the various properties of the County Commissioners.

We do not have occasion to look up records, between 1771 and 1880 very often, in the vault, and we do not have any objection to moving the Commissioner's records when necessary.

We call your attention at this time to the fact that the facilities for the proper care of the records of the Superior Court are not as adequate as they might, or should be.

Re: Exeter Court House

Changes were made in the Judge's Chambers, and in the room used by the Court Stenographer and Clerk of

Superior Court a few years ago which are greatly appreciated. However, the over-all situation is far from ideal for an efficient operation of the Clerk's office. As the main office is in neither of the Court Houses, when Court is in session the current case files must be transported across the street to the Exeter Court House, or to the Portsmouth Court House.

Persons desiring to examine records frequently have to visit both buildings before accomplishing their mission.

The jury room in the Exeter Court House is located on the second floor. As there are many days when the jury must return to its deliberation room, in the course of a day, it is strongly recommended that facilities for the jury be made on the first floor. It is suggested that the ladies rest room, located at the rear of the Court room be re-located, and that that room be converted to a jury room.

This suggested change is not complicated, and would involve but a small expenditure of money. The worthwhileness of this suggestion would be readily understood upon a casual examination of the building.

It is recommended:

That the walls in the office of the Clerk of Superior Court be repainted, and that the floors be resurfaced, or rejuvenated in some manner.

It is also recommended that the cornice work on the Records Building be painted, as it appears to be quite discolored.

It is recommended that the sum of \$44,000.00 be appropriated for the use of the Superior Court for the year 1959.

**ROCKINGHAM COUNTY ATTORNEY'S REPORT**

Since my last report a year ago, there has been but one serious felony, a homicide committed in Derry, New Hampshire. The respondent was examined and found to be insane and was committed to the New Hampshire State Hospital.

Of the other felonies, the most numerous were breaking and entering and theft, along with the usual number of cases of checks drawn against insufficient funds. The so-called bad check cases are generally solved, but it is rare that the offender has any money with which to make restitution. The only effective method by which the merchants can protect themselves is by requiring better identification before cashing the checks.

Breaking and entering into camps or dwelling houses closed for the Winter is impossible to prevent completely. That situation will be kept under better control if the towns where large numbers of unoccupied dwellings are located would provide more frequent patrols. There are not enough State Policemen to give the necessary coverage and the Sheriff's Department is an investigating group. There is no authority to pay the Sheriff's Department for patrol work.

The vast majority of the minor offenses known as misdemeanors were disposed of in the Municipal Courts. The number that were appealed to the Superior Court was a very small percentage of the total cases. Of the appeal cases some were tried, some were settled by the respondent pleading guilty and some were nol prossed by me for lack of sufficient evidence to warrant further prosecution.

I extend my appreciation to all the law enforcement agencies for their cooperation and assistance and wish to express my thanks to the former Sheriff, Simes Frink, for all his help and guidance through the years.

**SHERIFF'S REPORT**

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To the Honorable Board of County Commissioners  
of Rockingham County :

Gentlemen:

It is with a mixed feeling of pleasure and regret that I submit to you my final report as Sheriff of Rockingham County. Throughout the years it has been a pleasure to serve in this capacity and to be associated with the fine men and women of this county, who have greatly assisted in making our county, one of the finest law abiding communities in the whole United States.

As with every community, differences of opinion lead to arguments, and occasionally violence may result. However in 1958, only one major crime was committed and that was quickly solved and resulted in only a small expense to our county. There were of course the usual breaking, entering and larceny cases, but as of now only one of these remains unsolved. This was of a type familiar to all law enforcement agencies and most difficult to solve because of the method in which entrance was gained. Several similar cases were reported in neighboring counties as well as the States of Maine and Massachusetts, which leads us to believe that all were committed by the same organized group. During my term of years as Sheriff few cases have remained unsolved, however with the introduction of the two way radio system in our department; together with the various towns being connected either with our system or that of the State Police, excellent results have been obtained through this source. The Rockingham Delegation and the Commissioners did much to improve our apprehension of criminals when this system was instituted. While Juvenile crime will forever be a problem throughout the nation, I feel that through the

efforts of our public spirited citizens and many agencies who give so willingly of their time to come before these young people, still in school, that we shall continue to influence a large percentage of our youngsters into the right path to become worthwhile lawabiding citizens of the future. It has been a pleasure to have had the cooperation of all the law-enforcement agencies throughout the county and the state, and much has been accomplished through this group. To all of you I extend my sincere thanks and appreciation. It has been a pleasure to work with the various Superior Court Justices, the present County Attorney Lindsey Brigham, and all former County Solicitors during my years in this office.

To my former Deputies, I extend my thanks for their years of loyalty to their work and to me, and I wish them all, success in their future. I regret the untimely passing of a man long with my department and a most efficient Deputy, Charles B. Osgood of Exeter. To his family I extend my deepest sympathy.

To my many friends throughout the county I consider it an honor and a privilege to have known you and to have served you.
