





## TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth, in the County of Carroll qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday the 9th day of March at Ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same. \$7500 is approved by the finance committee.

2. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and plowing snow for the ensuing year. \$7200. approved by your committee.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sanding roads. \$800 is approved.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing & building bridges. \$1200 approved.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. \$35.00 for flags and redecorating the Plaque. Approved.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library. The sum recommended and approved to be raised as a whole is \$400. Approved.



7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200. for repair of road equipment, road maintenance and general highway. Approved.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000. for support of the Tamworth Community Nurse. Approved.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$4000. for Tarvia. Approved.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for upkeep and maintenance of the Tamworth Fire Precinct. Approved \$600.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. for a Portable Pumper and hose for forest fire work. Approved.

14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for upkeep of the Wonalancet Fire Precinct. \$100. Approved.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600. to be divided equally among the three road agents for cutting bushes on the road side. Approved.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the upkeep and care

of shrubs and plants around the Town Buildings.  
Approved.

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real-estate acquired by the town through tax collector's Deeds.

18. To see if the town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$300. to be divided equally, between the Laconia Hospital, North Conway Hospital and Huggins Hospital.      Approved.

19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$175. for firemen's insurance, in compliance with the Public Laws of the New Hampshire, Section 4, Chapter 146, Paragraph 16. Approved.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for White Pine Blister Rust Control, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Dept.      Not acted on.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$818.30 for Class V Highways, and the State will contribute \$3273.21.

22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Chocorua Lake and Mountain Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources and promoting Vacational Business of the town.      Not attested by your Finance Committee.

23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300. for the Tamworth Outing Club for promoting and advertising winter business. Not attested by Finance Committee.



24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$174. which is 1/100 of 1% of the assessed valuation of the town to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region. Not acted on by Finance Committee.

25. To Choose a Selectman for three years, To choose a Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Highway Agents, Auditors, and all other officers and agents for the ensuing year.

26. To see if the town will vote to keep the polls open until six of the clock in the afternoon.

27. To transact any other business that may come legally before said meeting.

Gentlemen:

Following our agreement with cooperating towns we have prepared a report, attached herewith, on White Pine Blister Rust Control conducted in your town during the season of 1947.

The need of maintaining control of this serious bark disease of our native pine is more necessary than ever before because of the tremendous increased cutting of this tree which has taken place during the past nine years, it being twice the average yearly cut of the preceding 13 years. Returns to the State Forester for the period of 1938-1946 inclusive indicate a cut of 2,193,296,000 board feet. This is a yearly average of 243,698,000 feet. The yearly average for the 13 year period, 1925-1937, was only 102,500,000 board feet. The nine year cut has contributed to local and state-wide incomes and provided work at high rates of pay.

Were it not for the ability of white pine to re-establish itself upon cut-over and other areas, and then grow with rapidity, the cut of the past nine years could not have been achieved. While the stands of merchant-

able white pine are comparatively few, and none of any great extent, hundreds of thousands of acres of young growing pine testify to this tree's ability to maintain its position as New Hampshire's most common yet most valuable forest tree. It is these younger stands of white pine which are particularly susceptible to attacks from the Rust and which are quickly killed after being infected. It is evident, by the volume of town appropriations in 1947, which amounted to over \$23,000., that white pine is highly regarded and the danger from the Rust appreciated.

The areas worked in your town were decided upon by the District Blister Rust Control Leader after a careful survey of conditions and due consideration of the funds available for control work. Mapping of white pine areas, and the protective zones about them preceeds the work of destroying wild currant and gooseberry bushes. These maps make for more efficient control work, and provide valuable information in case future checking of the areas is needed.

If further details regarding this season's work are desired by the Selectmen, or others, it will be gladly given upon request to the district leader or the State Forester's office.

**REPORT OF THE TAMWORTH OUTING CLUB**

## USE MADE OF TOWN'S \$300. APPROPRIATION

- \$ 50. Spent on skis, bindings and poles for school children. In addition to this The Tamworth Foundation made a substantial contribution toward equipment, and the Tamworth Ski School provided weekly instruction throughout the winter.
- \$ 50. Spent on erosion control on the smoothed area of the Page Hill Ski Slope in pursuance of the Club's policy of keeping all facilities in the best possible condition and preventing damage to other peoples' property. This sum took care of the whole job.
- \$ 70. Used toward the mowing of brush on the Mt. Whittier Ski Trail, Page Hill Ski Slope, Great Hill Ski Trail. Brush mowing alone on these three areas cost \$194.89 the remainder of which was paid by the Tamworth Outing Club. The Cabin maintained by the T. O. C. for public use at the top of the Mt. Whittier Trail received necessary repairs.
- \$100. Paid to the New England Sled Dog Club to cover their expenses in running the first race of the season, the Arthur T. Walden Memorial Race, in the Tamworth area. Other expenses of holding this race came to \$84.45 and were paid by the Tamworth Outing Club.
- \$ 30. Used by the T. O. C. to purchase the lights used on the Christmas Tree at the Tamworth School, which will be put up each year in the future by the T. O. C. as a service to The Town.

During the last year the Tamworth Outing Club has been busy. It ran a Junior Tennis Tournament in

August with a large number of contestants and appropriate prizes.

Square Dances were held every Wednesday for several months in the summer, and every Saturday at the Tamworth Garden all winter. There is a steady increase in the number of young people attending these dances from all over Town.

The T. O. C. is the Town's Outing Club and the more people who join and come to meetings the better the program of activities which can be accomplished.

Also during the winter the Tamworth Outing Club takes a Town team to Wolfeboro to race the Abenaki Outing Club and invites the Emerson School to Tamworth for a meet with our Junior ski team.

The T. O. C. maintains a system of roadside signs directing motoring skiers to our various slopes and trails.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

The school year ending June 30, 1947 was historic in New Hampshire education. During this year twelve Lay-Professional Councils of thirty-six members each on a state wide basis, were formed for the purpose of studying New Hampshire schools and advising on their program. These 432 members and hundreds of guests studied the purposes and curriculum of elementary, secondary, adult, higher and vocational education in the state; policies on cooperation among school districts; financial policies; and the responsibility of local, state and federal agencies for the welfare of the educational system of our state. The conclusions of the twelve committees were coordinated in a single report and published by the State Board of Education. This report is an outstanding contribution to the field of education and should be read by every citizen.

One of the most important outcomes of this work was the stimulus to greater cooperation between citizens, parents and members of the profession. Our schools would benefit greatly by similar projects on a local scale. This is being done in two districts through recently formed Parent - Teacher Associations.

Of primary importance was an act by the 1947 Legislature whereby state aid was increased to \$2,000,000.00. Most of our towns benefitted materially by this, with a consequent relief of real estate taxation.

But the problems of our schools never cease. A marked increase in school population in most towns, increases in cost in all departments, and the scarcity of qualified teachers raise important questions that demand the serious consideration of every citizen. In your schools today are your future selectmen, representatives, school board members, doctors, lawyers, teachers, and merchants. They must be adequately

trained to discharge the responsibilities on the local, state and national level that you now bear.

Teachers in the Tamworth School were: — Principal Edwin A. Blackey, grades 7 and 8; Mrs. Elizabeth Sutherland, grades 5 and 6; Miss Grey McBride, grades 3 and 4; Mrs. Lois Boothby, grades 1 and 2. Mrs. Dexter Remick taught grades 1 and 2 the last half of the year while Mrs. Boothby was on leave of absence. For the current year the staff remains the same except for the replacement of Miss McBride by Miss Margaret King. Miss King has an excellent educational background and several years' experience. Tamworth is fortunate to have such a competent, conscientious teaching staff whose first thought and whose every effort is directed toward the realization of the greatest development of every child in the school. They deserve the highest commendation.

While last year was a year of transition it was, on the whole, a very satisfactory year of accomplishment. Several changes were made as the result of experience as the year progressed. There was a distinct improvement in attendance, although the final per cent was lowered due to an epidemic during the last part of the year. This increase in attendance is an indication that the pupils are more interested in school and that they gain greater satisfaction in their achievement. During the year a still film projector and twenty films were purchased with money from the Drew Fund. This is an important addition to the visual education equipment. More films will be added from year to year until a good library will be available to the classes at all times.

During the summer the washrooms were rebuilt to provide adequate sanitary facilities. An auxiliary heater was installed which provides heat for the basement rooms and the nurse's room, which is now on the

first floor. This is a great improvement over previous conditions.

Thirty seven pupils from Tamworth registered at Kennett High School and thirty six completed the year. During the current year 47 pupils are attending this school. This is in comparison with a registration of 36 pupils in September, 1945, and a loss of one-third by Jan. 1, 1946. Very satisfactory reports of the accomplishment of this group were made by the superintendent. Many Tamworth pupils were participants in the high school activities. It is interesting to note that a large per cent of the glee club consisted of Tamworth pupils. This was possible due to the music training they had received under the direction of Mrs. Hidden. This training continues in the Tamworth School. Special transportation is furnished for those remaining after school in order that they may be encouraged to benefit by participation in the high school activities.

This great increase in enrollment in high school is in itself justification for the change. Furthermore every child in Tamworth is now provided with excellent educational opportunities under competent instruction, and in suitable surroundings conducive to fine accomplishment. Further improvements can be made as resources and time permit. Perhaps the most important step that could be made would be the institution of a complete hot lunch program. A warm, balanced noon meal is a very important contribution to the health and proper physical development of the growing child. I urge that this be given serious consideration.

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To the School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

I feel honored to be asked for a brief report on the work of the Tamworth pupils at Kennett High School.

Since January 1, 1945 the number of Tamworth pupils attending high school has increased from 23 to 45. If we believe in education for all youth, we can find in this increase definite evidence of progress. Forty-six pupils have registered from Tamworth this year, and only one has left school.
