

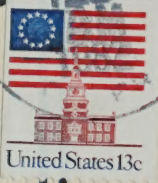
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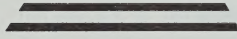

## TOWN WARRANT

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.  
BUSINESS MEETING AT 8:00 P.M.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Webster in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grange Hall in said Webster on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at 10:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By Ballot)

2. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the zoning ordinance as proposed by petition of the voters of this town: to Article VI, Non-Conforming Building Land or Uses. (By Ballot)

Add as 1a,

A structure permitted as a matter of right but not as a Special Exception may be erected on each lot of record at date of adoption or amendment to this ordinance even though such lot fails to meet requirements for area, width or frontage.

(The Planning Board unanimously opposes the passage of the above amendment.)

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- a. Town Officers Salary - \$9,800.00
- b. Town Officers Expenses - \$15,250.00
- c. Election and Registration Expenses - \$1,500.00
- d. Cemeteries - \$3,750.00
- e. General Government Buildings - \$2,500.00
- f. Reappraisal of Property - \$1,500.00
- g. Planning and Zoning - \$200.00
- h. Legal Expenses - \$4,000.00

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,873.00 for the operating budget of the Police Department.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for new equipment for the Police Department.

6. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate \$8,300.00 for a new Police Cruiser and authorize the withdrawal of \$3,300.00 and any accumulative interest thereon from the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund, with the balance to be raised by taxation.

7. (If Article 6 is defeated) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Police Cruiser Capital Reserve Fund.



8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$14,974.00 for the operating budget and medical budget of the Fire Department.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,715.00 for new equipment for the Fire Department.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for the Future Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Civil Defense.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the following sums for the Highway Department.

- a. Town Maintenance - \$55,000.00
- b. General Highway Department Expenses - \$3,500.00
- c. Town Road Aid - \$796.76
- d. Additional Highway Subsidy - \$7,057.28
- e. Tar for Sealing Roads - \$10,000.00

13. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

- a. Sanitary Landfill - \$4,700.00
- b. Ambulance Service - \$2,000.00
- c. Franklin Visiting Nurse Association - \$1,399.00
- d. Welfare - General Assistance - \$1,500.00
- e. Welfare - Old Age Assistance - \$1,500.00
- f. Welfare - Board and Care - \$4,706.00
- g. Library - \$3,000.00
- h. Parks and Recreation - \$800.00
- i. Old Home Day - \$500.00
- j. Conservation Commission - \$50.00
- k. Interest Expense - Tax Anticipation Notes - \$11,000.00
- l. Retirement Contributions - \$1,845.66
- m. Insurance - \$9,000.00
- n. Community Action Program - \$1,141.29

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes.

16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money, provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies, and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95-b.

17. To see if the Town will vote to transfer tax lien property to private owners by advertised sealed bids. The Selectmen shall have the power to accept or reject any or all bids, and sign and deliver suitable deed to successful purchaser.

18. (If Article 6 is passed) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell by advertised sealed bids the 1978 Police Cruiser. The Selectmen shall have the right to accept or reject any or all bids.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to quit claim any interest in the so-called "Weld Land", Lot 7 - Map 5 on the Webster Tax Map, to Robert H. Pearson, Jr. and Elizabeth Pearson, reserving the right for the Town salt sheds which may or may not, partially or in whole, be located on said lot, and allowing the Town to continue using the area as it is currently being used.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements of the Town of Webster, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1981, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Webster, New Hampshire at December 31, 1981, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Webster, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined and combining fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the Town.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are Federal Revenue Sharing, Public Library and Old Home Day Association funds.

FIDUCIARY FUNDS

Trust Funds - Trust Funds are used to account for the assets held in trust by the Town for others.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets)

All governmental funds and expendable trust funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present

increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

C. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General, Special Revenue and Expendable Trust Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or in the case of judgments and claims against the Town, when there is a probability that such judgments and claims will result in liabilities, the amounts of which can be reasonably estimated. All Nonexpendable Trust Funds are accounted for using the accrual basis of accounting.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations. The Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special town meetings. The Selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning fund balance to achieve that end. In 1981, beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures; and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year. The reserve for encumbrances at December 31 consists of the following:

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F. Investments

Investments in all instances are stated at cost, or in the case of donated investments, at market value at the time of bequest or receipt.

G. Inventories

Inventory in the General and Special Revenue funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost thereof has been recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items were purchased.

H. Taxes Collected For Others

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes levied for the Merrimack Valley School District and Merrimack County which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rests with the Town. The payments are recorded in the general fund as intergovernmental transfers.

I. Property Taxes

Annually, the Town establishes an amount for abatements, discounts and refunds of property and resident tax revenues known as overlay. All abatements, discounts and refunds are charged to this account. The amount raised in 1981 was \$2,607 and expenditures amounted to \$4,589.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due, where applicable. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lien holder.

J. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services and fund capital outlay. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

K. Interfund Receivable and Payable Balances

NOTE 3 - PENSION PLAN

The Town participates in the State of New Hampshire Retirement System. The Town's contribution for normal cost of the plan is based upon an actuarial valuation of the entire State plan. Since the actuarial valuation is performed on the entire State plan the amount, if any, of the excess of vested benefits over pension fund assets is not available. The Town does not have an accrued liability for past service costs. Pension costs amounted to \$1,333 in 1981.

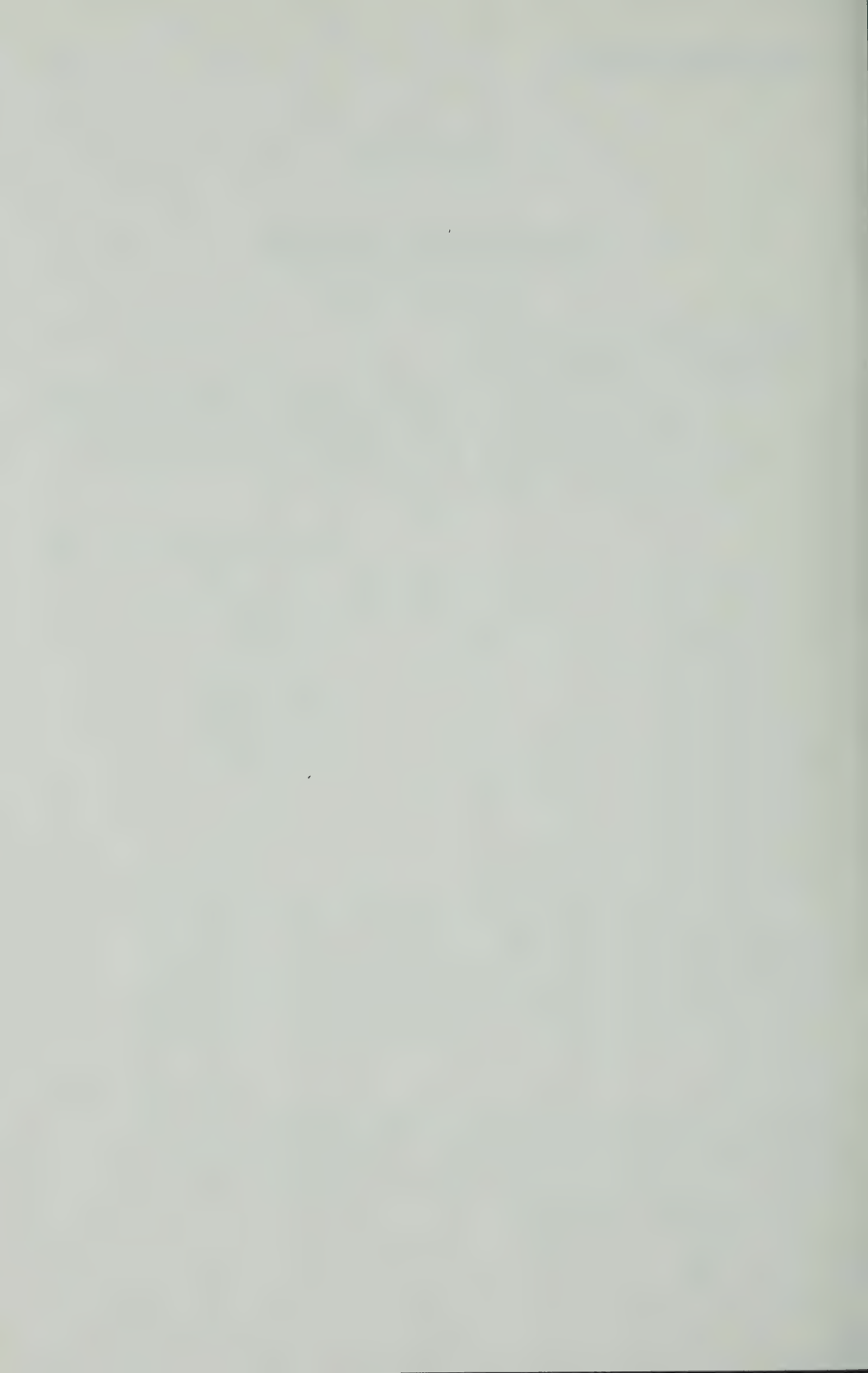
NOTE 4 - TRUST FUNDS

The sanitary landfill agreement with the Town of Hopkinton provides that the Town of Webster will pay 20% of the yearly expenses of the landfill operation. In addition, the Town receives from Hopkinton 20% of its receipts from the Town of Warner for its use of the facilities. The net expense to the Town in 1981, after the above reimbursement, was \$3,430.

REPORT OF THE WEBSTER FIRE DEPARTMENT  
1981

The officers of the Webster Fire Department for 1981 are as follows: Deputy Chief, Bill Welcome; Captain, Mike Jenovese; Lt., Bob Lake; 2nd Lt., Dan Creighton; 2nd Lt., Ray Kimball; Sec.-Treas., Sue Shoemake; Medical Squad Director, Carol Creighton; Medical Squad Training Coordinator, Sally Becker. We have a total of 21 active members and are always looking for others to become members. If you are interested, please contact me or visit us at a meeting or training session. We meet every Thursday night at 7:30 p.m.

In 1981, we responded to 78 calls: Medical Aid, 24; Mutual Aid, 13; Auto Accidents, 5; Chimney Fires, 10; Mutual Aid Drills, 3; Structural Fires, 4; Brush Fires, 6; Smoke Investigations, 3; Vehicle Fires, 3; Fire Alarm Systems, 3; Wires Down, 4.

Our 1981 average response time was 2.9 minutes. This is the period from the time of the initial notification to the dispatch center until the first truck responds from the station. Our responses were backed up by, and the Webster station covered by fire apparatus from the surrounding Mutual Aid System towns and cities many times in the past year. We must be grateful for the aid given to the town by its surrounding Mutual Aid towns, for we receive much more than we are able to return.

In 1981, we seemed to be plagued by many mechanical breakdowns, including pump problems with our attack pumper, Engine 3, causing it to be out of service for several days; the loss of the clutch in our Tanker 1, which was out of service for two months, and our Engine 1 (our mini-pumper and medical truck), which had steering problems, causing it to be out of service for two days. Luckily, we had no major incidents during those times, and we covered ourselves with extra automatic responses of apparatus from our surrounding Mutual Aid towns and cities.

Training during the past year has included CPR, Advanced First Aid, and various courses at Lakes Region Fire School and N. H. Fire Service Training sponsored classes.

The Webster Fire Department Medical Squad continued to build itself up, both in training and in equipment. Its present EMT's went through EMT refresher training and CPR courses, and had to attend at least 48 hrs. of continuing education that was approved by the National Registry of EMT to be recertified. At the present time, we have 5 members enrolled in an EMT course in Hopkinton.

Our present equipment consists of a 1973 Ford Pumper, a 1967 Ford Medical Unit and Mini-Pumper, a Civil Defense 1953 Dodge 3/4 ton pick-up (utilized by us to carry forest fire equipment) and a State of N. H.-owned 1963 Military 2½ ton 10-wheel drive tanker.

Our 1982 operating budget has had to increase slightly because of the increase in prices of heating oil, gasoline, electricity and maintenance of equipment. We also increased an item, Firefighter's Expenses, trying to make it easier for a person to be a member of the Department. Because of the poor economic conditions, the cost of being a firefighter is beginning to hurt our members to the point where we have lost some members. Often a firefighter loses time from work, many times losing over-time pay, either because of a night call or by leaving work to respond home to a call. Also, I find that training and drill attendance is poorer because the wood must be cut or the overtime must be worked to make ends meet. We are therefore increasing our firefighters' expenses to make it a little more feasible to be a member.

As far as new equipment capital outlay goes, we are mainly asking for a few new items, some new hose to up-date some of ours that dates back to the 1940's, and also needed items (pump, storage tank, etc.) to complete our water system to the station.

We are asking that \$30,000 be placed in our existing Future Fire Equipment Fund, thus keeping this fund growing and beating inflation. Doing this, this year will make it feasible for the Town to purchase a badly needed pumper/tanker in 1983. The purchase of this truck in 1982 would not be practical, for this year we would have to raise \$61,000 by taxation or issuance of a bond.

The firemen's fund-raising continued this past year, with its raffles, a chicken barbecue and lobster/clambake, which netted \$1,755.55. We spent \$1,513.80 toward the completion of the Fire Department station water system, and the rest was spent in support of the Hy-Mar Little League team, training, flags for the cemeteries, and emergency telephone number stickers.

We still have chimney-cleaning brushes available to the residents of Webster, and if you have a problem or need information regarding fire-related items, please feel free to contact me or a member of the Department.

Our Department will continue to serve you promptly and efficiently whenever necessary; however, it is our sincere hope that you won't need our services!

I would like to thank the residents of Webster for their support, donations and help; and especially, I wish to thank our dedicated firefighters and Medical Squad members for their sacrifices of both time and money in providing an important service to the Town of Webster.

## REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year 1981 "came in like a Lion" and continued on for a busy year. At approximately 12:15 a.m. on January 1, 1981, we had a "hit and run" on Warner road, followed by two accidents (naturally, one in either end of the town), all within one-half hour!

To give you a brief synopsis, this year we managed to reclaim the area known as the "rope swing"--it is once more safe to take your family swimming there without running into a large noisy party. I attended and graduated from the New Hampshire Police Training Academy immediately upon becoming your full-time Chief; while I was away, my part-time officers worked together many additional hours to continue to give you 24-hour coverage. On June 22nd, a small twister hit town, swept a roof off one of our homes, brought down trees all over town, and knocked out power lines. I was very impressed with the high degree of cooperation and the complete "working together for a common cause" that was shown our department by the Fire Department, the Highway Department, and the citizens of Webster! It makes me proud to be a member of a town in which the "Old Tyme Spirit" of arising together to combat a crisis is still very much present! Many thanks to you all!!!

Among our purchases for the Police Department this year were two pocket pagers--one for Boby Drown to use so he can hear us when needed, even if he is on a tractor--and the other for myself so Merrimack County Dispatch can locate me wherever I am; and a chain saw, which is very handy after wind storms to keep roads open in this wooded rural setting.

We had a total of 12 burglaries this year, and have caught and cleared by arrest and trial 9 of these. We have also been lucky this year in managing to recover much of the stolen property. The armed robbery and kidnapping resulting in a shooting, which I mentioned in the last Town Report, is still going through the court system. We had one stolen vehicle from town, which we managed to recover the following day; unfortunately, it had been torched. We recovered a car stolen from Claremont parked in our woods (its presence had been reported by one of our townspeople). We won in court ALL of the DWI arrests we made this year; many thanks to our townspeople who were willing to go to court to testify!

We had a fatal motorcycle accident on Pleasant Street, and a tragic drowning at Walker Pond.

Since the Town widened and repaired the sharp corner by the Ayer's residence on Dustin Road, our motor vehicle accidents went down. Last year we had 8 accidents on that corner alone. We have had none there since the repair.

Animal complaints have risen--last year, it was only dog complaints--this year, we have been called to chase pigs, horses, cows, bulls, cats, and dogs!

We have also been called upon to pump out cellars and "jump" vehicles--we don't mind; if we can't do it, we know who to contact who can, and we feel our job is to assist you however we can.

Juvenile problems appear to have risen, partly because juveniles from nearby cities have chosen our rural setting to try to "hell-raise" in. Many have been caught and dealt with accordingly.

All in all, we have had a very busy, but successful year, I feel. You, the townspeople, can accept much of the credit for our success in catching lawbreakers this year, as you have all been very observant and dedicated in reporting suspicious happenings, which has helped us tremendously. Many thanks to you all!!

## REPORT OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Resurfacing work was done in 1981 on Clothespin Bridge Road from Blake's field to Dingit's Corner. The sharp corner near the Ayers property on Dustin Road was widened and straightened as much as possible. Additional highway subsidy money and TRA funds were used for these projects. Sealing was done on part of Dustin Road, Clothespin Bridge Road from Blake's to Dingit's Corner, Corn Hill Road to the Boscawen line, part of Roby Road, Clough and Sanborn Hill, and the shoulders on Hannah Dustin Drive.

The old, dilapidated wooden rails on Clothespin Bridge were replaced by new steel posts with two strands of cable. A culvert had to be replaced by the parsonage, which was an unexpected project.

Some of the roads which will be considered for 1982 are a portion of Little Hill Road, Shore Road, and part of Pleasant Street. I have asked for an appropriation of \$10,000.00 to be used just for tar for sealing roads. If the tar roads we have are not taken care of, they will eventually have to be completely resurfaced.

The Highway Department had an unexpended balance of \$5,564.00 in 1979 and \$5,947.00 in 1980 due to the mild winters. The winter of 1981-1982 has been an extremely hard one, which caused an overdraft of \$9,831.00. Therefore, we are asking for a \$10,000.00 increase for town maintenance.

I would like to thank the men who have worked long and hard hours during the snow storms to keep the roads open. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the Police Department for their cooperation throughout the year.

The Kearsarge Valley Community Action Program, Main Street, Warner, serves an area encompassing some 300 square miles comprised of eight towns; Bradford, Henniker, Newbury, New London, Sutton, Warner, Webster, and Wilmot.

This past year we were able to provide \$305,391.42 in aid to the elderly and low-income families of this area.

Elderly Services include: The Meals-on-Wheels for home-bound seniors, the Senior Companion Program for shut-ins, the Congregate Meal site in Warner, and a Rural Transportation Bus providing trips to Concord.

Our Fuel Assistance Program reached 263 families in the eight towns served.

We also offer many other programs, including an on-going information and referral service, crisis intervention, and advocacy for those in need.

The money your town appropriates for Community Action goes for salaries, travel expenses, office supplies and maintenance of the local Area Center; program funds are provided largely by the Federal Government.

Voted to accept a portion of Windsor Terrace, running from Deer Meadow Road to the westerly bound of the property line of William and Beth Inman, providing that construction of a turn-around be completed at no expense to the Town and to the satisfaction of the Selectmen and Road Agent.

Article 16.

Voted to discontinue an old road which runs parallel to the westerly side of present Route 127 from the northerly line of Forsberg property, approximately adjacent to the intersection of Route 127 and Pearson Hill Road.

Article 17.

Passed over (concerning deleting the taxpayers' list in the Town Report).

CLERK'S REPORT -- MARCH 14, 1981

The annual meeting of the Pillsbury Lake District was called to order at 10:15 A.M. by the Acting Moderator, Bruce E. Friedman.

Article 1. The report of the district commissioners was given by Stephen R. Gilman and Lester R. Schulz. High-lighted were: (a) Completion of the watermain cross-lake connection in the northerly part of the lake and near the new well (Well #5). The cross-connection was put in service the end of May, and the output of #5 Well was connected to it in December. (b) Progress on the development of Well #5 which culminated in its being cut in to the distribution system on December 26th. (c) The occurrence of nine freeze-ups this winter in service piping within basements, crawl spaces or below ground between the above places and the mains, caused primarily by the exceptionally cold weather between 12-20-80 and the end of February 1981. The desirability of owners having and using heating tapes on pipes in inadequately heated spaces was emphasized. (d) Existence of a claim brought forward in 1980 that 55 acres of wild land owned by Mrs. Alice K. Hyde of Littleton, N.H., since 1934 may lie entirely or in part within the District's land known as the Hunting Preserve. Legal counsel has been obtained and efforts to resolve the problem have been proceeding. Question was asked from the floor in regard to Mrs. Hyde's taxes; we know them to be paid through 1979. The commissioners' report was approved as given.

Article 4. Voted unanimously to authorize the commissioners to participate with the Fire Department of the Town of Webster in the acquisition and installation of one fire hydrant on public land on the shore and bottom of Pillsbury Lake; not to exceed \$500 Pillsbury Lake District share at 50% of total cost.

Article 5. Voted unanimously to raise by taxation and appropriate the sum of \$11,530.00 to pay expenses and charges of the District not covered by water revenue and other available funds for the ensuing year.

Article 6. Voted unanimously to authorize the commissioners to borrow money in anticipation of revenue and taxes.

Article 7. Voted unanimously to authorize the commissioners to transfer any unexpended balance of money from one appropriation to another within the budget.

Article 8. Other business:

(a) A question was raised from the floor suggesting that a catwalk or similar structure be provided to make it safer to put in or remove boards from the westerly Pillsbury Lake Dam. The commissioners agreed to consider an improved means of access to the dam boards.

(b) A question regarding arsenic tests for the District's water supply was asked. The commissioners referred to a list of test laboratories which has been obtained from the WS&PCC water test laboratory and stated the intention to have samples tested in the near future.

(c) One of the residents on New Hampshire Drive asked about getting a "Dead End" or "No Thru St." sign for New Hampshire Drive to try to reduce the number of drivers who turn around in the private driveways.

She was advised that she should make a request to the Town Selectmen, and that one of the commissioners will mention it as well.

(d) It was noted in the Town Report several Pillsbury Lake lots have been acquired by the Town through tax-collector deeds. These will be sold in the near future by sealed bids. Mr. Gilman pointed out that no money can be appropriated under this article of the warrant; however, there was discussion of the possibility of acquisition of such a lot on which a storage tank could be installed in a future year. The water system has only minimal storage capacity, and more will be needed in due course as more houses are built. One of the lots to be sold, Lot 90, Section 1, with a present assessed value of \$950 might be suitable for this purpose. A motion was made, seconded and carried to authorize the commissioners to purchase a lot, deemed suitable for the purpose, utilizing funds otherwise available.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:00 Noon.
