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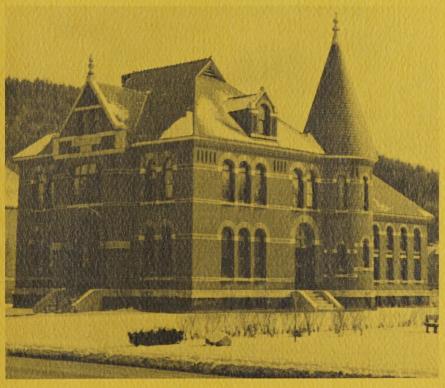

TOWN MANAGER'S REPORT

This year I would like to highlight some of the Town's major accomplishments during 1979.

Significant, and I think the most obvious change within the Town, is the construction of forty units of Elderly Housing on North Main Street. This project will help fill a very important need for many of our senior citizens.

1979 saw the completion of our Wastewater Collection Lines and the Sewer Treatment Plant which went on line in November.

The Townspeople of Winchester were extremely patient while our roads were being excavated for laying of collection lines.

This fall the Department of Revenue Administration completed the re-evaluation of all properties in Town. I am confident that they completed the job in a professional and fair manner.

Sale of the Springfield Television property in August for \$33,000.00 helped the Town increase its budget surplus at the end of the year.

In the Selectmen's Office we implemented new correspondence files and files for property assessment cards. This system has improved retrieval of data and services which the office provides.

I have seen a movement this past year towards various Boards, Commissions and Town Officers coordinating and keeping each other informed on actions being taken within the Town.

I have continued to have outstanding support and loyalty from all full time and part time Town employees.

The Town of Winchester can be proud of the professionalism and devotion to responsibility displayed by all elected and appointed Town Officers. I would like to thank them and the Townspeople of Winchester for their support, help and assistance.

The Board of Selectmen wish to thank all the taxpayers and Town Officers for their cooperation during the past year. Selectmen hold regular hours on Thursdays from 7 PM to 9 PM. Other times may be arranged by calling 239-4951 if these hours are not convenient. The Selectmen's Office is now open Monday through Friday from 9 AM to 4 PM.

We again call your attention to the numerous forms available in the Selectmen's Office to be used by the taxpayers for proper taxation. The only form that is mailed out is the Inventory of Taxable Property. All other forms must be obtained at the Selectmen's Office. The law states that an Inventory Form must be filled in, signed and returned to the Selectmen's Office before April 15th, If an Inventory Form is not filed, there is no legal basis for the Board of Taxation or the Court to consider an application for abatement.

VETERAN'S EXEMPTION

Permanent applications are available in the Selectmen's Office. We call your attention that, if a person eligible for exemption changes his domicile or a veteran's wife becomes a widow during the year, a new permanent application must be filed with the assessing officials.

EXEMPTIONS FOR CERTAIN ELDERLY PEOPLE (C.E.P.)

These forms are for persons who qualify for reduction in their tax bills. These forms must be completed and in the Selectmen's Office on or before April 15, 1980. This form must be filed every year. If there is no completed form on file we cannot grant the Elderly Exemption.

INTENT TO CUT TIMBER

Every owner including State, County or municipality or public agency shall, prior to each cutting operation, file with the Selectmen a notice of intent to cut.

ASSESSMENT OF OPEN SPACE

No owner of land shall be entitled to have a particular parcel of his land classified for any tax year under the provisions of this chapter unless he shall have applied to the assessing officials on the form approved by the Board and provided by the Tax Commission.

PERMITS

Any person, firm, corporation, municipality, public agency or institution desiring to operate, maintain, offer for rent, lease or tenancy a site, lot, field, tract of ground for location of any new building, trailer park, trailers or mobile homes or other similar conveyance, or place of abode for shelter shall obtain a written operating permit from the Board of Selectmen. Where applicable, it would be necessary to have received and to show proof of having received approval for construction granted by the New Hampshire Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission for the construction of any septic tank system before a building permit or permit to park a trailer or mobile home shall be issued.

HOUSE TRAILERS

Whenever a person moves a house trailer or mobile home into a city or town for the purpose of establishing a residence in said city or town, or whenever a person purchases an existing house trailer or mobile home with the intent of residing in the same at the existing location he shall within fifteen (15) days of the placement of the trailer or mobile home or within fifteen (15) days of the purchase of same, register with the Assessors of the city or the Selectmen of the town where he shall reside. Whoever fails to comply with the provisions of this section shall be guilty of violation 72:7B (1973:152).

AMBULANCE DEPARTMENT

1979 has been an unprecedented year for the Ambulance Department. We responded to a record number of 261 calls, and transported 238 patients. Twenty calls did not require transportation of the patient for various reasons.

On nine occasions, we responded to "stand-by" at fire scenes and community incidents, and we participated in two disaster drills, one in Richmond, the other in Keene. We also participated with ambulance and crew in an actual disaster situation in Brattleboro, Vermont.

The Monadnock Speedway, which by law must have an ambulance in attendance during races, was covered by 40-A2, our back-up ambulance, on 14 race dates. The Speedway monetarily compensates the Ambulance Department directly which helps defray the costs of maintaining a second ambulance.

1979 also held what we believe is a "first" for the Department, for on December 20th crew members assisted in the birth of a 6 pound 10 ounce baby boy in the ambulance while en route to Cheshire Hospital.

During the year, four Advanced First Aid courses were taught by certified crew membersinstructors which provided additional personnel for our Department, and also certified a number of Richmond Rescue personnel.

Currently, the members of the Winchester Ambulance Department number 18 on active status, and 4 inactive members. Six of the active members are Emergency Medical Technicians including one $R_{\bullet}N_{\bullet}$ and one $L_{\bullet}P_{\bullet}N_{\bullet}$. The remainder being certified in advanced first aid and $C_{\bullet}P_{\bullet}R_{\bullet}$

The members provide "on call" 24 hour a day coverage by taking calls in 12 or 24 hour shifts with a minimum of two crew members available at all times.

A hearty commendation must go to this crew who are thoroughly dedicated to their work, and who spend many uncompensated hours patiently waiting in readiness for a call.

We also recognize Robert Murry, Winchester resident, who is a renowned author and instructor in Emergency Services, especially Fire and Medical Rescue, and who on innumerable occasions has given the Department of his time and expertise. Thank you Bob.

Our sustained gratitude also to the members of the Winchester Police and Fire Departments for their constant assistance.

We continue to seek support from the citizens of Winchester. The Ambulance Service is for you, and though we hope you will not need us, for those of you who may, be assured of our concern and our willingness to offer our service to the utmost of our ability.

3 patients received Physical Therapy with a total of 22 visits.

149 patients were seen in Richmond.

Your nurse attends monthly meetings for in-service discussion and education purposes.

She assisted at monthly W.I.C. clinics (Women, Infants and Children) which were held at the Town Hall in Winchester.

Six blood pressure clinics were held throughout the year. Two of these were held in the Richmond Library. A total of 167 people were screened with 9 cases of elevated blood pressure noted. Your nurse assisted at one blood pressure clinic which was held in Swanzey.

Four Immunization Clinics were held in Winchester with Dr. Thomas O'Connor as the attending physician. 65 children received one or more immunizations. Winchester school children also have attended our Immunization Clinics. Your nurse assisted at two clinics held at Thayer High School.

Your nurse attended routine discharge rounds held at Cheshire Hospital. She attended the following conferences during the year:

Sudden Infant Death Syndrome Infant Stimulation Program Development of the Pre-Schooler Depression - How to Diagnose and Treat Depression in the Elderly and How to Recognize It. Alcoholism and its Complications Chest Assessment Maternal and Child Health Program Well Child Conference Life Line at Cheshire Hospital Cheshire County Energy Crisis Development Program

Your nurse, along with other agency representatives continued to attend Task Force meetings to discuss the feasability of a county merger for area Home Health Agencies. This Task Force dissolved in September following the development of a new program planner, Irene Pratt SPHN.

The Glenroy Scott fund continues to be made available to all Winchester residents who are in need of financial assistance for medical reasons.

A Medicare Surveyor certified the agency in October and found it to be well organized.

Your nurse attends agency meetings every other month and annual meetings of the Council and meets with each committee as needed.

The agency signed a contract with the E-Born program through the University of New Hampshire to allow registered nurses who are enrolled in the program, pursuing their Baccalaureate Degree to receive community health experience from our agency. It has proven to be an effective program.

The Winchester District Nursing Association is financed through funds from the Town, Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross - Blue Shield and individual fees. A sliding scale is used for those not covered by insurance. The visiting nurse services are available to all, whether or not they have the ability to pay.

The Winchester District Nursing Association offers skilled nursing services, Homemakers and Home Health Aides, and a Physical Therapist.

The visiting nurse is on duty from 8:30 to 4:30 Monday through Friday. If you should need assistance it is best to call early in the day.

I look forward to serving the community in the coming year. I request that anyone knowing of someone who is ill, recently released from the hospital or just might benefit from a nursing visit to contact our agency at 239-4352.

 - A. The owner, occupant or the agent of any owner or occupant of lots, parcels or areas within the Town permitting the premises to become unsanitary or a fire menace by allowing any offensive of unsafe matter to grow, accumulate or otherwise occupy and remain upon such premises.
 - B. The owner, occupant or the agent of any owner or occupant of lots, parcels or areas within the Town permitting pools of water to accumulate and remain upon the premises and become stagnant and foul.
 - C. The owner, occupant or the agent of any owner or occupant of lots, parcels or areas within the Town in a residential area allowing junk, disabled cars and trucks, trash, waste and old lumber to accumulate and remain upon the premises as a possible harborage for rats, snakes and other vermin.
 - D_{\bullet} The owner or occupant of lots, parcels or areas within the Town keeping bees or permitting bees to swarm on the property.

Section 4. Penalty - Each day during which a property shall be in a condition contrary to the terms of the ordinance shall be deemed a separate violation of this ordinance and the owner shall be fined \$100.00 (One Hundred Dollars) for each day's violation.

Iva Wood School Lunch Manager Winchester Schools During the school year, between September and December approximately 1500 students sought first aid or advice from the school nurse. Many of the problems children brought to the nurse had to do with home accidents that were not cared for at home. Sometimes students came needing advice about further treatment of a home accident. Although the school cannot assume responsibility for accidents and injuries that occur away from school; we do try to help children out. Most of our playground, classroom and gym injuries are minor and heal quickly. We have had to call the ambulance once within this period and we had 2 orthopedic injuries requiring casts.

School insurance is offered to all students in September but only a few students applied for it. School insurance pays for treatment for accidents that occur at school.

We try to be "safety-minded" and have had Mr. Scott Peterson, the high school physical education teacher, review how the playground equipment is designed to be used. Some children ignore safety rules and take unnecessary risks when playing. Parents help us a great deal when they know our rules and the reasons for them.

Parents help us by providing us with emergency information, and authorization for treatment, helps us care for your children and follow your preferences for doctors, hospitals and care.

In addition to caring for sick or injured children at school, the school nurse assists the school doctor in conducting routine physical examinations. 158 students were examined by Dr. O'Connor.

Inspections are conducted periodically for contagious diseases. So far, only 1 case of Pediculosis (head lice), 4 cases of Impetigo, 9 cases of Strepthroat and 3 cases of Scabies, were present in the school population. Any student or staff member with a contagious disease is immediately isolated from others at school and sent home until they have recovered.

Our school Dental Health Conference had 241 participants and 83 of those needed follow-up care by a dentist. Dr. William Weller donated a morning of his time to the school and checked 40 of those with defects at the parents request. We have a \$500.00 fund through the State of N.H. and the P.T.S.A. for dental work for children in the elementary school and children through grade 8 who are in pain from toothaches. Dr. Weller is the participating dentist and he accepts a honorarium for 25 hours of service. This does not cover his office expenses.

An Immunization Clinic was held in the high school gym.12/14/79. There were 85 students who received immunizations and 62 Tuberculin skin tests were given. Children who need immunizations were taken to the Free Clinic at the Winchester District Nursing Association on November 8, 1979 and 12 immunizations were given then. At the elementary school we have received a 96% immunization level. At the high school, levels are lower for a number of reasons. The junior high immunization rate is between 67-78%. The high school levels are 52-73%. If there should be an outbreak of measles, mumps, or rubella, students not adequately immunized will be excluded from school.

The nurse participates in parents conferences, teacher conferences and the Pupil Placement Committee. Referrals are made, as needed to social service agencies, Welfare and the Lions Club. Home visits are made by the school nurse and emergency transportation of students sick or injured at school.

It's mainly the parents responsibility to transport their sick children home from school. We encourage parents to make plans ahead for such emergencies or illness.

Vision and hearing screening is conducted with children in kindergarten, grades 2, 4, 6, 8, 10 and 12 and Driver Education participants and by request.

So far 133 Vision Tests have been done and 41 students did not pass. This means these students need to see an eye doctor. Hearing tests have been done, 35 during this time period with 5 failures. Families who need to have their children seen by an eye doctor can obtain help from the Cheshire Lions Club if they qualify. Children who do not pass the hearing test are re-tested in a few weeks. If the hearing has not returned to 25 decibels, the parent is contacted and medical care is needed. Much of what is learned is from the sense of hearing and vision; that is why we encourage prompt treatment of eye and ear defects. A pre-school vision and hearing screening is held in May each year at the Community Center.

Heights and weights are done on half the student population every year. Parents are contacted if a problem is found and referral is encouraged.

We have a daily dry brushing and a weekly Fluoride Rinse Program in grades 1 through 6. We hope to teach good brushing techniques and help the children develop good habits.

Educational programs are conducted each spring for adolescent boys and girls to help them understand emotional and body changes.

We keep used clothing available for children whose clothing becomes wet, dirty or torn during school time.

Some children come to school dirty or disheveled. Children can be cruel to other children who smell bad or look uncombed and disheveled.

We want children to learn to get along together and hope to promote health and well-being for success in school.

WINCHESTER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

There are 400 children at the Elementary School this year. Two hundred and seventy eight families are represented by that number. Seventy families have left Winchester since last year and about 54 families have moved into the area.

We have fewer children than last year. The reduction in numbers is not in any one grade; it is scattered among grades in the following way.

This reduction serves us well. We are better able to cope with the special needs of individual children. We have been aware of the fact that the number of children at our school who have special learning difficulties is double what it is elsewhere. Two years ago we were hard pressed to provide such children with the help they needed. Now we are managing well due to an increase in the amount of help we receive from Special Services and due to the gradual decline in children. The number of adults available to our 400 children is comfortably balanced. We are continually made aware of that fact by visitors who say our building is calm and peaceful and our children busily working all through the day.

Our school staff is composed of a Principal; 19 classroom teachers; 2 Reading-Resource Area teachers; 2 Special Education teachers, (1 is Federally Funded); 1 Special Education Aide; 1 Library Clerk; 1 Title I Teacher (Federally Funded); 2 office secretaries; 1 nurse; $2\frac{1}{2}$ custodians. We also have the parttime services of 2 Psychologists, and a Speech Therapist.

In addition to our regular staff, we are lucky to have the following volunteers associated with our program.

We want our volunteer program to grow. Call the Principal for a speedy placement if you want to be a school volunteer.

New to the school this year are several brochures which define the behavior expected of children. Our Student Handbook and our Behavior Code were well received by the community. We had a 99% return of signature cards from parents who read and approved of our rules and regulations.

We continue to work on the behavior of children. Our atmosphere becomes increasingly controlled and business like. During class time everywhere in the building children have their heads into books. Even as children walk in the corridor one may be seen reading a book. Frequently, you can see children helping one another with their studies. Some children who used to be problems can now be complimented on their self-control and internal discipline. There is no doubt that we approach excellence; the signs are clear.

We need to improve our behavior in some respects. Some children still need many reminders about having good manners while eating. These ame the table manners we prefer:

Talk in a soft voice.
Keep your hands out of other people's plates.
Keep your hands off other people altogether.
Sit with both feet under the table.
Clean up anything you drop or spill.
Do not play with your food.
Remove hats and coats while eating.

The number of children who fight and swear during recess time has been reduced. The number of times a group of children get after another group has been reduced. The number of incidents of big children pushing little children around has been reduced.

During 1980-81 we will work to stop destructiveness. Some children 1. Write on walls. 2. Kick, punch, or pull at doors, towel containers, or partitions. 3. Throw paper towels around wastefully, etc. These types of vandalism happen mainly in the toilet areas and are caused by a small number of children.

We use several approaches to reduce destructiveness. We send letters to parents of children who are destructive asking them to pay for whatever has been mutilated. We require that children who write on walls, clean up their mess. We expect good children who never do such things to express their displeasure when they see vandals at work. In extreme cases of repetitive behavior, we will involve the police.

Various studies show that destructiveness is reduced where broken objects and messes are fixed and cleaned up immediately in addition to using other means of control. Our custodians have been asked to inspect toilet areas frequently and fix things promptly.

Children who destroy are troubled children. Dealing with a troubled child is not as easy as one might suspect. The easy solution one frequently hears is "Make him", meaning to make the child do what you want him to do by using physical force. It would be nice if such a simple solution worked. The fact is, that it takes real cooperation and effort from the teacher, child and parent to produce an obedient person.

The <u>School Bulletin</u> continues this year and is published on a once a week basis. One grade at a time has the responsibility for getting the news out. When the Bulletin is distributed, everyone reads it with interest!

An extension of our emphasis upon writing comes with attempts to produce material for $\underline{\text{The Winchester Star.}}$ Our future writing goals will include writing well enough to get published in the $\underline{\text{Star.}}$

We continue to concentrate on "Basics". That is to say, we want children to be able to read, write and do arithmetic well. These are our first priorities. We also want children to like their involvement in the "Basics" and we want the subjects to be taught in exciting and individualized ways. We also want the work students do to be practically oriented. All the subjects we teach at school have a practical focus. Children learn to read receipts; fill out applications; write letters to important people; do number-work with ball scores; gas mileage costs, etc. We want them to be well prepared for their future life and we want them "tuned in" all the time.

Last year we gave a "Survival Skills" test, to sixth graders in an attempt to define the areas in which children were the best and least prepared for the work world. We discovered for example, that last year's 6th grade performed in the following ways:

Last year's children and their test results gave us hints about what needs to be emphasized in our program. We will watch for changes when this year's 6th graders take the same test in April.

What helps us accomplish our learning goals are two Library-Resource Areas where Specialists work with small groups or single children. These Reading Specialists have tapes and cassettes and filmstrips, and many other materials to use as they help children learn. Library-Resource Areas are like big classrooms. They are busy places all day long and as a consequence their rugs are worn and raveling.

Children come and go in the Library-Resource Areas; they come to find a good book or listen to an exciting story; they come to a small reading group or to be helped alone; they come to paint or build or write a story; they come to see a filmstrip on a Social Studies or Science subject; they come to put on earphones and listen to the song of the States. Our Resource Areas need a new rug.

The outside of our school building is in need of repair. The berm around the building is composed of sand and rock. The rocks drift over the walks and become too easily used by little children for target practice. The berm would be safer and would certainly be more pleasing to look at if it were finished properly with seed, earth and plantings. The berm was meant to be a method of conserving energy in the building by banking the earth up around the building. It was intended that the berm would keep heat from escaping outside and prevent cold from creeping inside. Since the berm was never seeded and finished, rain washes the earth and rocks away from the building thereby defeating the reason for its being there in the first place. Our building was finished on 1971; except for the berm.

The children's play area also needs seeding and repair. Back in 1974 the town received a grant for putting in a ball-field and play equipment. It then became our responsibility to maintain the field and equipment; to keep the field and the equipment in safe condition. Since then, the trampling of many little feet around the building has worn away the grass and the wash of many storms has brought rocks meant for the berm all over the play area. The area under the play equipment has also been trampled down and washed away.

It's time to pay attention to the area around the school. What does it look like? How safe is it? Does it contribute to energy conservation? The State Energy Board has recommended that we plant a wind screen of trees somewhere across the field or near the building to cut down the wind flow. All signs point in the direction of doing something now about the outside condition of the building. A PTSA committee are beginning to work on the problem of outside improvement.

In spite of our school's unfinished business, there are many reasons for us to take pride in our Elementary School. One reason for pride is this: A most unusual group of adults are gathered together in one building for the sake of your children. The teachers and school staff care a great deal about your children and show it all day long day after day. They are the best there is and deserve your trust and good-will and compliments. There is no doubt that one of the outstanding schools in New Hampshire is right here in your Town.

Local Control and the Cost of Decline

The roots of local control of education are deeply implanted in American history. The early colonial school was a logical extension of the value placed on religion and self-government. Schools were established through local initiative to accomplish specific community goals. Education today is indisputably a State function. Because education is not directly mentioned in the Federal constitution, its control resides with the States through the reserved powers clause of the Tenth Amendment.

Throughout the 19th century, however, the roles of the State and Federal governments were secondary to that of local communities. There was no conflict among the three levels of government as lay boards ran the schools and assumed most administrative responsibilities.

During the 20th century schools experienced many changes which affected their control. As the population grew and shifted from rural to urban, the need for more comprehensive education led to the consolidation of small schools into large district organizations. U.S. Supreme Court decisions imposed mandates for attacking such social problems as racial segregation, sex discrimination, malnutrition, and poverty. Federal civil rights legislation and legislation dealing with the handicapped affected the operation of the schools. The states also increasingly imposed their will through statutes and regulations. The result of increased State and Federal involvement has been to drastically alter the simple direct community control of the schools. In addition, collective bargaining agreements will further reduce the discretionary authority of the local school board and administration.

We appear now to be witnessing in our community a reaction against excessive control of the schools by outside agencies and a desire to return schools to the people. High rates of inflation, tight money, and threats of recession all contribute to a desire by our citizens to question the spending habits of school officials.

One of the most frequently asked questions is, "Why has the cost of running the schools gone up while student enrollments have either leveled off or declined?" The answers are many, varied, and some perhaps obvious. Nevertheless, the question is a legitimate one and the answers deserve thoughtful consideration if intelligent spending decisions are to be made.

Inflation, of course, is the answer which comes most often to mind. Since 1973, rising oil prices have affected individuals and enterprises, both public and private, alike. However, public elementary and secondary schools are hurt even more than most other agencies. They cannot increase their fees or raise their prices to help offset the increased costs. Their only options are to either request more money to operate or to reduce or eliminate services and programs. Environmental protection laws have also had an impact on school costs. Because of these laws, paper manufacturers have been reluctant to expand their facilities leading to paper shortages which in turn affects prices. The shortages could get worse. The Federal budget continues to increase and this feeds inflation which in turn affects everything. For example, a typical new home in 1975 was priced about \$45,000. The same home now costs about \$70,000. Numerous other examples could be given.

School programs added in recent years have contributed to increased costs. These programs were added during the years of growth when there was a public demand for enrichment and curriculum improvement. Also, as was previously mentioned, Federal mandates, such as The Education of the Handicapped Act, call for increased spending. During these years of growth, school construction was undertaken and we are still paying off those bond issues. In addition, the operating

costs for a building do not decrease with a drop in the enrollment. Student enrollments decline sporadically, a few here and there, with the result that staff cannot be reduced. We can compare the rise in per pupil costs with home expenses. If a family member leaves home, the operating costs for the home (mortgage, taxes, utilities, maintenance, etc.) remain the same, but the cost per individual in the home increases with fewer people living in the house.

Personnel costs account for a major portion of the school budget. Blue Cross/Blue Shield contributions and costs have risen. Retirement costs, Workmen's Compensation, Unemployment Compensation, and Social Security have all risen in a similar fashion and continue to rise. Salaries have gone up, too, as they have in business and industry. When schools experienced a teacher shortage new teachers were hired because experienced teachers were not changing jobs. Now these new teachers and experienced teachers cost more.

In summary there are three main factors which account for the increase in costs even with gradually declining enrollment:

1. energy, materials, and people costs are up

2. additional programs and special services and these are not tied to the number of pupils

operating costs do not decrease

One other point should be mentioned in this regard. School districts get their money from local, State and Federal sources. State and Federal revenue has not kept pace with rising school costs. As a matter of fact, the State and Federal share has dropped in many cases.

As we reflect on the cost of decline and the return-to-local control sentiments many people are voicing, we need to remember that the State is still legally responsible for seeing that everyone receives the opportunity for a good education. This responsibility implies both minimum standards of quality and resources to maintain these standards. When it comes to the attention of the State that these responsibilities are not being met the effect is to broaden the scope of statewide decisions and narrow the scope of local control.

Local control is really a simple idea of people, as directly as possible, overseeing the operation of their schools. Although the nature of local control has been altered by changes in society, it has survived these periods of change. The nature of local control in the future depends on how we view the trend toward using schools as vehicles for social change, how we deal with problems of obtaining and spending school monies, and what our attitudes will be toward government in general and schools in particular.

Once again, I express my appreciation to the staff of the Winchester School District and the citizens of Winchester for their cooperation. I also continue to be grateful for the support of the school board.
