SELECTMEN'S REPORT

After several attempts, the Lawrence Street Bridge was replaced by a steel and cement constructed bridge with a sidewalk in November. Approaches and deck were paved with asphalt. The guard beams and a small amount of slope work remain to be completed in the spring.

A special thank you goes to Mr. Louis Scheyd for designing the bridge, arranging to have the bridge built by the E.D. Swett Co. and checking the bridge as it was built.

We would also like to thank the E.D. Swett Co. for its excellent work and cooperation during the period of construction.

Much of the credit for this bridge goes to J. Dale McLeod and the town crew who were responsible for rebuilding the approaches to the bridge. More important, perhaps, was the job of maintaining the temporary road through an unusually wet fall. Three weekends in a row the road was under water, but somehow transportation was maintained.

Many thanks go to Mr. Wyeth, Proctor Academy, Elmer Clark and Barbara Cangiano for allowing the town to use their property for the access road.

Complaints were at a minimum from residents on Beech Hill. We hope this new bridge was worth the inconvenience caused them while the construction took place.

The total cost of the project was \$62,829.00. There was \$35,829.67 in the Capital Reserve Fund. A loan was secured for \$27,000 at 5¼% for three years. The payments are \$9,000 per year plus interest. All expenses relative to this project are included in the total. The actual price for the bridge itself was \$50,000.

North Street, Meadowlark Lane, School Street, Ives Road were paved this year. TRA was used to finish Kearsarge Mt. Road. Duncan Fund was used on Emery Rd.

The Town Hall received a new coat of paint this year by John Dukette.

With the Planning and Zoning now in effect, the Selectmen find it hard at times to find people to fill vacancies on these boards. We would appreciate anyone willing to serve on any town boards or commissions to please let the Selectmen know.

The Tax Map is progressing on schedule. The photography was flown in May and the pictures are clear and may be seen at the Town Office. Following the Selectmen's Report is a list of meetings to be held next summer. Also, a form will accompany your inventory form and we would appreciate everyone completing and returning it.

PLANNING BOARD REPORT

During 1975 the planning board met on the first Tuesday evening of each month, the regularly scheduled meeting nights. In addition, several special and executive sessions were held.

Another year of economic stress has stabilized the growth of our town. We received only 13 applications for sub-divisions or annexations, 12 of which were subsequently approved.

No changes in either the zoning ordinance or sub-division regulations were made in 1975.

Our feed-back from the citizens of Andover indicates the desire to make zoning less restrictive than the present ordinance. Consequently, we are in the process of amending the variance section which should accomplish this simply. This amendment will be brought to a vote on March 2.

Several changes in sub-division regulations are also in the planning stage and will be acted upon very shortly, possibly preceding this printing.

May we remind you that our meetings are public and we are interested in your viewpoints.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Upon the recommendation of Town selectmen and city councils, the Division of Forests and Lands appoints a forest fire warden and several deputy forest fire wardens in each town and city every three years. The town or city warden is responsible for maintaining a force of men and adequate equipment to suppress any wild-fire that occurs in his town or city during his term of appointment. The fire warden must authorize all open burning when the ground is not covered with snow. No open fires can be authorized between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., unless it is raining, without the additional permission of the state district fire chief.

Any person wishing to kindle an open fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the forest fire warden. Camp and cooking fires also require the warden's permission.

The Division of Forests and Lands, through its Forest Fire Service, assists all cities and towns in meeting these requirements by training the warden and deputy forces in wildfire suppression tactics, making hand tool suppression equipment available at fifty percent of cost, supplying pieces of Federal excess property for use

as fire attack vehicles and sharing up to fifty percent of the cost of wildfire suppression costs.

Wildfire prevention is also a joint state, city or town program. Smokey Bear is available from the Forest Fire Service for local fire prevention programs. Posters and Junior Ranger kits are available for distribution by local fire departments upon request to the Forest Fire Service. Each forest fire warden is expected to carry on a continuous wildfire prevention program within his town or city.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

In one case the Board authorized the issuance of a permit for the proposed use, and in two cases the Board denied the issuance of permits.

The administration of the Ordinance and the appeal process were explained in the 1974 Annual Town Report on pages 77 and 78. Copies of the Zoning Ordinance, Application For Appeal, and Procedure Of Appeal may be obtained from the Building Inspector or in the Town Offices. Meetings of the Board are normally held on the fourth Tuesday of each month at 7:30 P.M. at the William Bachelder Library in East Andover.

The Selectmen appointed Martin Graefe and Charles Wein as alternate members of the Board. John Cotton, whose term expired in October, was reappointed to the Board.

ANDOVER RESCUE SQUAD

On January 1, 1976 the first ten-year charter of the Andover Rescue Squad as a non-profit incorporated unit expired and has been renewed for another similar period. We are proud that in spite of the very small daytime personnel often available no call for emergency service has ever gone unanswered during those ten years.

The 1975 service record includes 38 trips to New London Hospital and three to Franklin Hospital. In addition the ambulance and attendants took part in simulated disaster drills at Wilmot Center, Franklin, Northfield, and one at our own Andrus farm in Flaghole. All gave valuable training in coping with emergencies which "could happen here" but hopefully never will.

Andover Rescue has a standby association with the New London Hospital ambulance and a mutual agreement with Franklin Rescue on an emergency basis. Locally, whenever possible, the ambulance will stand by in answer to District No. 2 fire alarms, and at District No. 1 fires whenever notified by telephone.

Concerning the 44 patients taken to hospitals, 10 were involved in highway accidents, 8 in other accidents, 19 suffered serious illness or other emergencies, and 7 were given transportation at doctors' requests.

Your Rescue Squad is financed by the annual \$500 town appropriation (which covers insurance premiums), by the Squad's own earnings from a July 4th raffle and a percentage for collecting midway gate receipts, and by the wonderful support which you, our townspeople and summer residents, have given us through your individual and group contributions. For your support in these several fields we offer our sincere thanks.

TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS ANNUAL REPORT

In 1975 two new cemetery individual trust funds for perpetual care were established on lots in Proctor Cemetery bringing the total number of individual accounts to 144. Selectmen increased the price of lots to \$75. Lot sale money is deposited in the Proctor Cemetery Operating Fund (unrestricted). Three lots were sold in 1975. One lot purchaser elected to add \$100 to the capital balance of the Proctor Cemetery Operating Fund instead of establishing an individual trust account.

The condition and appearance of the approach lane to the Proctor Cemetery was greatly improved through the action of the Trustees of the Proctor Trust. (A private trust not town governed) The lane was regradeed, regraded and a generous asphalt apron added where the lane joins Main Street. The appreciation of the Andover Trustees is expressed to the Proctor Trust for this generous improvement to the town.

During the past year older graves in several cemeteries were regraded, reloamed, fertilized and seeded. An unusually warm, wet fall was beneficial to these improvements. However, lawn mowing had to be carried on several weeks longer than in past years due to the warmer autumn.

We recommend for 1976 that maintenance attention be given to the wrought iron fence which bounds 3 sides of the Taunton Hill Cemetery. Accumulated interest in several trusts established for the care of that cemetery should cover a majority of the cost.

Littering has continued to add to the maintenance burden at Proctor Cemetery. Andover police have been made aware of this distressing practice. We strongly favor the barring of recreational vehicles from all Andover cemeteries and their lanes year round out of respect for the tranquillity of those places.

Grounds conditions improve yearly and the careful attention given by Clarence Keyser, Sr. is appreciated by the trustees.

\$2,000 was turned over to the town for cemetery care which was taken from interest accumulated in trust funds and \$166.90 from the Proctor Operating Fund.

Library trust fund interest amounting to \$124.91 was given to the Library Trustees for use in the Andover and East Andover Libraries.

Early in the fall the trustees were notified to have their books ready for audit in the first week of January. With 159 separate accounts to negotiate, the interest amounts were called in early December after an 11 month period. Therefore, the reflected totals show less earned interest than last year when negotiations took place after 12 months.

In December \$35,829.67 in capital and accumulated interest of the Lawrence Street Bridge Capital Reserve Fund was turned over to the town for payment of building costs on the new bridge over the Blackwater River on Lawrence Street. Twice during 1975, capital reserve money set aside for tax mapping was turned over to the town for payments to Robert Bristol Associates for contracted installment payments on Tax Mapping of Andover. A total of \$11,600.25 was paid for tax mapping leaving a balance in principal and interest of \$19,634.88.

The total in the Dump Fund capital reserve stands at \$8,970.43 with no expenditures in 1975.

The total in the Equipment Fund capital reserve stands at \$9,260.30 with no expenditures in 1975.

In September, 90 day notice was given on the Lawrence St. Bridge Savings Certificates, thus saving the town approximately \$450 in penalty charges on these immature 4 year certificates. More money had accumulated in the funds than had been anticipated, reducing the amount required to be borrowed by the town to meet the payment for the new bridge.

Appreciation is expressed to the Franklin Cooperative Bank and the Franklin Savings Bank for their accommodating assistance in the handling of the town's entrusted funds.

Mrs. Shaw and Ms. Snyder wish to thank retiring trustee Bertha Fenton for her unstinting assistance and many years of service to the town.

REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Budget Committee has observed in the preparation of the budgets the effects of rising costs as they were reflected in the proposals submitted to support and operate the functions of local government. Town government, education, fire protection and water supply are all affected by the inflationary trend of the national economy. It should be noted that there are many items representing fixed charges and contracts over which we have very little control. Therefore, salaries and services become special targets in attempts to keep the cost of government within our capacity to pay. Under the circumstances the process of decision making has not been easy.

We would urge consideration of the fact that public employees at all levels are also affected by the increase in the cost of living and should not be denied reasonable increases in wages needed to help meet their own increasing costs.

With respect to services we do not believe that you would be satisfied with less than has been provided in the past and is provided for in the budgets submitted for your consideration. Our requirements throughout the Town have over the years been modest and necessary for our common good. That they cost more is an economic reality we must accept and hope that they can continue to be within our means.

The Committee urges all who may wish to have an item or activity provided for in the budget to submit their request to the appropriate sponsor (Town, School Board, Fire District or Village District) together with an estimate of the probable cost and a written explanation to justify its consideration. Such requests should be submitted as early as possible for the Budget Committee begins its consideration of budget items about mid-September. It tries to achieve reasonably firm drafts prior to January first in order that proposed budgets can be ready for presentation and discussion at the public hearing held in mid-January.

BUDGET COMMITTEE

The Budget Committee has met twelve times to prepare the budget. Two public hearings were scheduled to let the voters know of the proposed budget and to learn of any request or changes from the voters.

The figures for the proposed budgets of all departments can be found in this town report in their respective places.

REPORT OF THE ANDOVER CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Early in 1975 the Conservation Commission prepared a report to the Selectmen on solid waste disposal for the Town of Andover. (See 1974 Annual Reports, pp. 74-76). We recommended that the town contract with the city of Franklin for disposal of its rubbish in that city's sanitary landfill, and that a transfer station be located at the site of the present town dump and the rubbish be hauled from there to Franklin at the town's expense. We presented cost estimates for this proposal, together with comparative figures 1) for use of the Franklin landfill with door to door pick-up of rubbish, and 2) for establishing and maintaining a sanitary landfill in and for the town of Andover.

Before the date of the town meeting a law was passed postponing the prohibition of burning at town dumps until July 1, 1976. In consequence, the town meeting took no action on the solid waste disposal problem.

The Commission did not take the position that its report, and the failure of the town to act on it, terminated its responsibility regarding solid waste disposal. Some plan must be adopted (or at least be in process of adoption) before July 1, 1976. It was not certain that the city of Franklin would still be hospitable towards Andover's rubbish in 1976. Even if it were, it was likely that the costs would be changed. So other alternatives deserved renewed examination.

In March a representative of The Reduction Corporation visited Andover to present and describe a package proposal involving incineration, and this had to be considered. Mr. Wilbur Brownell of Danbury notified us of his plans for establishing a private sanitary landfill near the village of South Danbury; his proposition must be weighed in comparison with the one offered by Franklin. By invitation Mr. Brownell came to one of our meetings to discuss his plans. After his landfill site was approved and nearly ready for operation this Commission made a visit of inspection to it. At our December meeting Mr. Dale McLeod was present and joined our discussion. Owing to his extensive practical experience with land-moving operations, he was able to throw a new light on some aspects of the solid waste problem.

The dump has thus been our major concern for the entire year. We have not yet reached agreement on the substance of our recommendations regarding it. We are continuing to investigate every possible solution, but it is doubtful if our final recommendations will be ready by the time of the town meeting. A special town meeting later in the spring will probably be necessary to pass on plans for solid waste disposal.

The Commission voted to support the petition of the Selectmen to the Department of Public Works and Highways regarding the proposed re-location of Route 11 east of East Andover.

Several members of the Commission attended the meeting of The New Hampshire Association of Conservation Commissions held at Proctor Academy on November 1, 1975. Mr. Robart delivered the welcoming remarks. The main topic of the meeting was the Conservation Deed.

We were pleased to learn that a section of the land included in the new development east of Horsehoe Pond will be granted to the Andover Conservation Commission.

Mr. James Walker has moved out of town, and has resigned from the Commission. Mrs. Anita Cotton has been appointed to replace him.

The Commission held eleven meetings during the year, of which more than half were at Proctor Academy, and the remainder in the town library. As always we are grateful to Proctor for the free use of its facilities.

We did more reseeding, reloaming and fertilizing. This plus being able to water when necessary, gave us an exceptionally fine grass cover before the season was over.

The elementary school gym classes used the field during the fall months and it was greatly appreciated.

We now hope that the field will be used by any and all groups who need an area of that kind.

We plan to construct a baseball diamond as early as possible in the spring.

Much remains to be done and we plan to continue our work as time and volunteer help dictates.

NURSE'S REPORT - December 31, 1975

Community health nursing is more than nursing in a setting other than the hospital. It is a unique blend of nursing and medical services woven together to best serve the people in their usual environments of home, school and work. The agency staff has been reorganized and increased to include 1 full-time RN, 3 part-time RNs, 1 physical therapist, 1 occupational therapist, 1 speech therapist and 2 homemaker-home health aides. Expanded services include use of food bank and emergency fund, increased TB testing and follow-up, and the homemaker-home health aide program.

TOWNS SERVED – Andover, Bradford, Danbury, New London, Springfield, Sutton, Warner, and Wilmot.

SERVICES PROVIDED – Skilled nursing care, physical therapy, occupational therapy, speech therapy, homemaker-home health aides (designed to meet the needs of the elderly population - assists with personal care, meal planning, light housework, etc., under supervision of R.N.).

REFERRALS – Received from various sources: patient, family, friend, hospital, physician, welfare, police, churches and other organizations. Anyone can make a referral. All referrals are welcomed and highly confidential.

FEE – These services are provided regardless of ability to pay. The KVNA is supported through town appropriations, fees collected, Medicare, insurances and contributions.

TOTALS – Visits (1032) Mileage (11,904)

TOWN VISITS – 162

POPULATION ASSESSMENT – Your town resident population 6/30/75 - 1,281 - assessed at \$1.25 per capita - \$1,601.25.

VISITS – Skilled nursing care visits (498) includes care of catheters, colostomies, dressings, blood pressure check, injections, etc. Therapy visits (62).

PREVENTION VISITS – Nursing intervention and prevention visits (375) includes preventive testing, health guidance and support, counseling, teaching. No charge to patient.

FUTURE GOALS:

1. To increase patient visits per town.
2. To offer immunization clinics every 2 months.
3. To grow in the area of maternal-child health through well-child conferences and prenatal classes.
4. To develop mental health follow-up care.
5. To further coordination between school nurse and KVNA.

We thank you for your support through appropriations, contributions and also the donations of food, clothing and medical equipment.

ANDOVER SCHOOL BOARD REPORT

To the Citizens of Andover:

The year 1975 found the School Board faced with many important matters. In the spring, the School Board entered into a three-year contract with the Franklin School District, by which all of our high school students would be tuitioned to Franklin.

This fall we were again approached by the Franklin School Board to enter into an AREA contract. A committee was appointed to meet with all of the surrounding high schools, this committee to come back to the town voters with the best educational program for our students for our tax dollar. This committee has been working very hard on the study, looking into every aspect of our needs.

Due to the unavailability of qualified teachers in the shop and home economics areas, it has not been possible to offer instruction in these subjects. The Board has therefore voted to turn its attention to the New Hampshire Right to Read Program. This program has proven very beneficial and has generated a great desire to read in all of the students.

In October, a letter was received from the Commission on the Status of Women's Rights with reference to the new State Law, RSA 194-15a, concerning voluntary recitation of the Lord's Prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance in our elementary schools. It was voted by the Board to prepare a Warrant Article for the Annual School District Meeting, enabling the voters of Andover to decide if this is to be allowed in the Andover Elementary School.

Because of rising costs, the Board had a difficult time arriving at a budget for the year 1976-77. We try to keep an open mind on the needs of our school building, and the growing costs of education and its effect on the taxpayer.

We are privileged to have an excellent staff, — Superintendent, Assistant Superintendents, Principal and Teachers, — each doing his best to provide the very best education for our children. This is made evident by the number of students who are on the honor roll at the high school level.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Andover:

It is with pleasure that I submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The School Board early in the year voted reading as its top priority goal for the 1975-76 school year. This action has resulted in all staff members placing an emphasis on the school's reading program and improving the children's reading skills. The entire staff have attended two Supervisory Union workshops on reading. Many have been taking staff development in-service seminars and college credit courses to help them in improving reading at the school. Learning centers have been established in many classrooms to allow for individual interests and increase reading opportunities for all students. The school day has been restructured to provide increased reading instruction time. The school has joined with 45 other school districts in the State to commit itself to the goals of the National Right to Read Program. The goal of this program is to have every child learn to read up to his or her level of ability by the year 1980.

The school program is being continually evaluated to strengthen the basic curriculum and better meet the needs of all children. This has resulted in an effort to continue to work toward individualized instruction, a goal which is being accomplished at varying degrees in all grades.

This year for the first time a program has been started which offers opportunities for children with learning disabilities. A learning disability teacher with direction from the Clinic at Proctor Academy is assisting teachers in our school in setting up individual programs to assist pupils with learning problems to become successful in school. Some 16 children have been identified as needing special learning programs that will allow them an equal educational opportunity. In addition, three children are attending special education programs outside the district.

Enrollment in this year's first grade has exceeded the New Hampshire Minimum Standards for Elementary Schools on class size. Continuation of this growth in the primary grades may mean consideration of more than one teacher per grade. With additional students entering school during this school year the first grade class has 30 children. To assist the teacher in meeting the needs of these children the board has authorized the hiring of an aide for the remainder of the school year. It has also approved and budgeted additional staff for the 1976-77 school year for the primary grades. Census figures indicate that next year's first grade will be as large as this year's.

The district is indeed fortunate to have and keep its outstanding full time teaching faculty and administration. However, the school did lose through retirement one very valuable staff member. Mr. John Seymour served the school as school custodian for six years. His dedication and hard work was recognized by the entire school community. His contributions to the school extended far beyond his responsibilities and will be missed by staff and students.

The most pressing school problem faced by the school board and the community

has continued to be tuitioning of students in grades 9-12. As was mentioned in the past, by September 1977 no students will be attending Kearsarge Regional High School under their existing policy. The Franklin School Board has signed a three year tuition contract with the Andover School Board as approved at last year's Annual Meeting. On October 28, 1975, at a Special District Meeting the district voted to establish an AREA (Authorized Regional Enrollment Area) Planning Committee.

This committee with members - William Upson, Margaret Leber and Fred Condon - will be meeting with school boards from area communities to discuss possible long term arrangements for students in grades 9-12. The committee will report on its progress at this year's Annual District Meeting.

Many questions have been asked as to what is an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area. The New Hampshire State Department of Education has published the following comparison of Cooperative and AREA Schools.

PROCEDURE FOR FORMATION

Essentially similar procedures are followed under Cooperative and AREA laws.

1. Planning committees are created by vote at local district meetings. These may join to organize planning board which then studies the proposal.
2. If planning board recommends AREA or Co-op formation, Written Plan or Articles of Agreement are submitted to State Board for approval.
3. Proposal is acted upon at meetings of the separate districts.
4. If approved, Plan or Agreement is certified by State Board.

Comparative Balance Sheets which disclose the financial condition of the general fund as of June 30, 1972-73 and June 30, 1973-74, are presented in Exhibits 1 and 12. As indicated therein, the current surplus decreased by \$7,988.79 in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973 and increased by \$9,844.55 in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974.

Analysis of Change in Current Financial Condition: (Exhibit 2 and 13)

Statements presenting an analysis of the factors which caused the change in current financial condition of the District during the fiscal years ended June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 are presented in Exhibits 2 and 13, respectively.

Estimated and Actual Revenues:** (Exhibits 3 and 4; 14 and 15)

Comparative statements of general fund appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal years ended June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 are presented in Exhibits 3 and 4; 14 and 15, respectively.

As indicated in Exhibit 4, in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973 a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$3,079.89 plus a revenue surplus of \$648.69 resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,728.58. In the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974, as disclosed by Exhibit 15, a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$14,587.41, plus a revenue surplus of \$133.90, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$14,721.31.

Long-Term Indebtedness:**Comparative Balance Sheets:** (Exhibits 5 and 16)

Comparative Balance Sheets of the outstanding long-term indebtedness of the District as of June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 are shown in Exhibits 5 and 16. As indicated therein, the outstanding long-term debt of the Town decreased by \$5,000.00 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973 and by \$5,000.00 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1974. The outstanding long-term debt of the District at June 30, 1974 was \$35,000.00 (Exhibit 16).

Statements of Debt Service Requirements: (Exhibits 6 and 17)

Statements showing annual debt service requirements (principal and interest) as of June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 are contained in Exhibits 6 and 17.

TREASURER

General Fund:

Classified Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibits 7 and 18)

Summary statements of general fund receipts and expenditures for the fiscal years ended June 30, 1973 and June 30, 1974 made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts are included in Exhibits 7 and 18.

MISCELLANEOUS

School Tax Account: (Exhibits 11 and 22)

Statements of the school tax account with the Town of Andover are included in Exhibits 11 and 22. As indicated in Exhibit 22 at June 30, 1974, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1973-74 School Tax of \$260,916.56, less a prepayment of \$3,108.33 received during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1973, plus an advance of \$3,108.33 on account of the 1974-75 School Tax (the latter amount is shown as a liability in the general fund balance sheet (Exhibit 12) at June 30, 1974.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Treasurer:

The provisions of Chapter 197, Section 22 of the Revised Statutes Annotated require that "The treasurer shall, before entering upon the duties of his office, give a bond to the district with sufficient sureties, to the acceptance of the school board, for the faithful performance of his official duties."

School Tax:

The Town of Andover should be given credit for the advance on the 1974-75 School Tax. This situation has existed since the 1971-72 fiscal year. During the 1974-75 fiscal year a credit of \$3,108.33 should be allowed the Town on the School Tax.

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 71-A, Section 21, require that the auditors' summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Andover School District. Publication of the Exhibits contained in this audit report is optional at the discretion of the Andover School Board. This letter, however, must be published in its entirety.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Andover School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.
