#### The State of New Hampshire

#### The Polls will be open from 9:00 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Barnstead in the County of Belknap in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Barnstead Town Hall in said Barnstead on Tuesday, the Ninth day of March, next at 9:00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

The second session for purpose of discussing and voting upon the Articles of the Town Warrant shall be held on Saturday, March 13th, 1982 at 1:00 P.M. at the Barnstead Elementary School, and for all other business to come before the Meeting.

- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for, receive and expend federal or state grants, which may become available during the course of the year, and also to accept and expend money from any other governmental unit or private source to be used for purposes for which the town may legally appropriate money, provided: (1) that such grants and other monies do not require the expenditure of other town funds, (2) that a public hearing shall be held by the Selectmen prior to the receipt and expenditure of such grants and monies; and (3) that such items shall be exempt from all provisions of RSA 32 relative to limitation and expenditure of town monies, all as provided by RSA 31:95-b.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw from the Tax Map Capital Reserve Fund the sum of Five Thousand and No/100 Dollars, (\$5,000.00) for payment of the Tax Map.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to withdraw from the Capital Reserve Bridge Account the sum of Nine Thousand and No/100 Dollars, (\$9,000.00), for the balance due the State for the Narrows Road Bridge.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of Sixteen Thousand and No/100 Dollars, (\$16,000.00), from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be used for the balance of the Tax Map.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of Nine Thousand One Hundred Fifty and No/100 Dollars, (\$9,150.00), from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be used for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of Ten Thousand and No/100 Dollars, (\$10,000.00), from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be used for Fire Protection.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant one or more franchises to operate a cable television system in the Town, said authorization to encompass the setting of such conditions as the Board shall deem necessary and appropriate. Said conditions may include the setting of subscription or service rates to citizens and franchising fees to the Town or the extent that they are not inconsistent with N.H. RSA Chapter 53-C and the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Communications Commission.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of Three Hundred and No/100 Dollars, (\$300.00), from the estate of the late Helen Kimball, (Hattie Danis, Exec.) to be added to the existing George G. Foss Fund, for perpetual care of said lot, in the South Barnstead Cemetery.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Deputy Treasurer.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Deputy Town Clerk.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Deputy Tax Collector.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to combine the offices of Town Clerk and Tax Collector under one office, and, the term of said office to be the term of 3 years.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote pursuant to RSA 41:25 and 41:33 to designate the positions of Town Clerk and Tax Collector as salaried positions in lieu of statutory fees, and that the total amount of annual compensation for each position be set at Four Thousand Six Hundred and No/100 Dollars, (\$4,600.00), and further to designate that all fees collected by the Town Clerk and the Tax Collector shall be paid to the Town Treasurer, as directed by the Selectmen, for the use of the town. Said action to be retroactive from January 1, 1982, and add same to approved budget.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to sell the Albert LaBrecque property to Paul LaBrecque for the sum of Four Thousand Eight Hundred Seventy and 56/100 Dollars, (\$4,870.56), and said sum to be placed in the General Fund.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate One Thousand and No/100 Dollars, (\$1,000.00), to be placed under the heading of Parks and Playgrounds for the use of recreational purposes.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to sell the so-called Pitman Heirs Lot of 60 Acres, located on Hannah Nutter extension adjacent the A. D. Otis Lot so-called. All revenue after expenses to be put in the Capital Reserve Fund for new equipment in the future.

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to sell all lots acquired by the Town, by Tax Collector's Deeds, located in Locke Lake Development and Birchwood Hideaway, at Public Auction. The lowest bid acceptable will include the cost of all taxes due and whatever expenses the sale incurs. All proceeds to be put into the Capital Reserve Fund for new equipment in the future.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twelve Thousand and No/100 Dollars, (\$12,000.00), to purchase the Old School House and Land in South Barnstead on Route 126. To preserve it as a Historical site for the people of the Town. The property is valued at \$15,000.00 (By Petition).

22. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following article:

We the undersigned voters of the Town of Barnstead petition the Town of Barnstead to adjust the elderly exemption from property tax by adopting the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax, (Chapter 496 HB 258). These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value, for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000.00; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000.00; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000.00. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000.00 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000.00 and own net assets of \$30,000.00 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence. (By Petition).

23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following article:

We the undersigned voters of the Town of Barnstead request that the assessed property evaluation of persons 65 years or older be frozen at the present evaluation until such time the property is sold or otherwise changes owners. To qualify, the person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. (By Petition).

- 24. To see if the Town will vote to have the Board of Selectmen appoint the Highway Agent (Road Agent) in accordance with RSA 245:6. (By Petition).
  - 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following article:

We the undersigned, do petition the Town of Barnstead on behalf of all the townspeople. Being that the Town of Barnstead is zoned as residential-agricultural, we require that the rights of the residents be recognized; thus, that any commercial activity be curtailed between the hours of nine o'clock in the evening and five-thirty in the morning. That the rights of the residents to peace and rest be preserved and protected during said hours; that the town have the right to enforce such requirements as we have requested above. (By Petition).

26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following article:

It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, or commercial enterprise to make, continue, or cause to be made or continued any loud, unnecessary or unusual noise or any noise which either annoys, disturbs, injures or endangers the comfort, repose, health, peace or safety of others, within the limits of the town provided, however, that nothing in this ordinance shall prevent the use of loud speakers or other sound equipment duly licensed under Chapter 41, Section 4, provided further, that the Selectmen are authorized to license any public functions or activities involving public noises it deems reasonable.

Any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a violation not to exceed a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100.00). Such person, persons, or commercial enterprise shall be deemed to be guilty of a separate offense for each and every day during any portion of which any violation of this ordinance is committed, continued, or permitted by such person and shall be punishable therefore as provided therein. (By Petition).

- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Ten Thousand and No/100 Dollars, \$10,000.00), toward the purchase of a new truck and plow for the Highway Department.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow the sum of Thirty-Three Thousand and No/100 Dollars, (\$33,000.00), at the lowest obtainable rate for the purchase of a truck and plow for the Highway Department.
- 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into a contract on a yearly basis with the Center Barnstead and Barnstead Parade Fire Companies for Fire Protection for the Town.

#### REPORT OF THE OSCAR FOSS MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Town Reports from the years just into the 1900s reveal some rather interesting facts about the public library in Barnstead. In the early years of this century the Barnstead library existed, was used and had the loyal support of the town. It was located then in two or three private homes in the various areas of town. In 1900, the annual appropriation was \$80.00. The library held 1,162 books. The following year, there were 4,576 loans – an amazing turnover of those eleven hundred volumes!

In 1910 – Mrs. Otterson and Mrs. George received \$14.00 and \$9.75, respectively, for their duties.

1917 was a banner year. Mrs. Sarah Ursula Foss gave the town the present library building as a memorial to her late husband, Barnstead lumberman Oscar Foss.

In 1921, the Barnstead Free Library, still struggling and existing on very limited funds, obtained a waste basket costing \$1.89; purchased, no doubt from one of the several stores in town.

Electric lights were installed in 1925. \$16.35 paid the year's bill in 1927. Books, stationery and stamps cost \$52.00 that year.

There were comments over the years by the various librarians that more money was needed to keep the book collection up-to-date and useful. Generous townspeople donated many volumes and they were publicly thanked by the trustees. Most of the annual reports spoke of the library as a "great force for good" and as a source of pride.

So much for the olden days. In 1981, circulation was 8,034. The Oscar Foss Memorial Library owns 8,035 volumes, 225 photograph records and cassette tapes, and received 30 periodicals. 402 books were added, 100 of which were gifts. There are 600 registered borrowers.

The renovation of the building is proceeding with the addition of a back entry which will contribute significantly to energy savings.

In conclusion, I quote from the librarian's report of 1930. "The library affords an opportunity for all who wish to read good books which give pleasure and entertainment as well as prove a source of education. It is hoped that all in town will embrace the opportunity of gaining knowledge from the well-equipped library in town."

# REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest Fire Prevention: Your Business, Our Business, Good Business. Forest fire prevention slogans have been seen in association with Smokey Bear since the late nineteen forties when a national effort to check the spread of forest fires was implemented.

New Hampshire residents recognized that forest fire prevention and suppression was the responsibility of every citizen, a half century before this national campaign, when our legislature established our first forest fire laws in 1903. Since that date, the State has appointed a town/city forest fire warden who is responsible for forest fire law enforcement in his municipality.

All fires kindled out of doors when there is no snow on the ground must be approved in writing by the forest fire warden before being kindled. All forest fires must be suppressed by the warden and his deputies as soon as they are reported. The cost of fire suppression is shared jointly by the town/city and the State of New Hampshire, as are forest fire prevention and forest fire training costs.

This state and local municipality cooperative forest fire program has given New Hampshire one of the best forest fire records in the United States.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BARNSTEAD CONSERVATION COMMISSION For the Year 1981

The Conservation Commission feels that there are new areas that come under the heading of conservation and protection of our natural resources that should be brought to your attention.

Both Town Officials and all other citizens should be on guard at all times to prevent the dumping of very dangerous industrial and nuclear waste anywhere in our town. Neighboring towns are already paying a price for such dumping. There can be no such thing as "safe dumping" of these deadly threats to our health, or even lives.

For the first time we are being threatened by a new enemy, acid rain or snow, which originates mainly in the Midwest-Great Lakes area from coal fired power plants and drifts on prevailing westerly winds into our area. It can, and does, kill all life in our ponds and lakes. It eventually even stunts the growth of trees, pollutes reservoirs and shallow wells to the point where pipes rust faster and even buildings deteriorate from its effects. The Federal Government shows evidence now of letting up on emission controls. We should all therefore protest to our elected officials in Congress to stop this further degradation of our environment.

Again we urge our fellow citizens to preserve by all means what decent farm land we have left. We will not be able to depend indefinitely for much of our food supply from far areas.

The Conservation Commission has had both a County and State Forester inspect a parcel of land known as the Pitman heirs lot, sixty acres more or less, located just north of the Hannah Nutter four corners. The Commission has concluded from the above reports that the property has little value as a residential or conservation area, and therefore recommend that the Selectmen dispose of the above lot in such a manner as justice requires.

#### REPORT OF THE PLANNING BOARD

Applications for land sub-divisions in 1981 kept the Planning Board very busy. The Board is only required to meet every 90 days (3 months), but because of a large work load, it met every month from April thru December with the exception of November. Every sub-division goes first to a preliminary hearing and then to a public hearing. It takes a minimum of 2 months to pass or reject a sub-division.

According to the Planning and Land Use Ordinance for the Town of Barnstead (voted in at Town Meeting March 9, 1970) under section III the entire area of Barnstead, North, South, Center and Parade was established as an Agriculture-Residential District. Although no specific area has been set aside for business or industry, the establishment of such an enterprise that can be shown to be an asset to the Town is encouraged.

Zoning originated as a way to protect public health, safety and welfare from incompatible use of land by geographically dividing a Town into zones or categories of permitted and prohibited activities. However, what creates incompatibility among various uses is not the use iteslf but the effect of one activity or another. The 1926 landmark Supreme Court decision which upheld the constitutionality of zoning is based on this premise:

"Thus the question whether the power exists to forbid the erection of a building of a particular kind or for a particular use, like the question whether a particular thing is a nuisance, is to be determined, not by an abstract consideration of the building or of a thing considered apart, but by considering it in connection with the circumstances and the locality. . . A nuisance may be merely a right thing in the wrong place—like a pig in the parlor instead of the barnyard."

All persons intending to have a business in Barnstead should meet with the Planning Board first, to insure conformity to the Planning and Land Use Ordinance.

There are four (4) primary groups to maintain the integrity of the Land Use regulations and the confidence of the Community.

- 1. Planning Board will maintain primary responsibility for suggesting appropriate performance controls for local adoption, administering subdivisions, site plan reviews, etc.
- 2. Local Legislative Body (Town Meeting) You and I, we the people, are empowered to adopt zoning ordinances and revisions by our vote. Use it wisely.
- 3. Enforcement Building Inspector and/or Board of Selectmen Done on a case by case basis.
- 4. Board of Adjustment Charged with permitting special exceptions, especially where strict enforcement would constitute an undue hardship on the landowner.

The Planning Board meets every 3rd Thursday of the month at the Town Hall, if there is business before the Board. The public is welcome and encouraged to sit in at the meetings.

# STATE REPRESENTATIVE'S REPORT JANE F. SANDERS, STATE REPRESENTATIVE BELKNAP, DISTRICT #4: ALTON, BARNSTEAD, GILMANTON

This year has brought a mixed bag of positive and negative in carrying out my duties as your State Representative. Although our regular legislative session ended on schedule, many major problems were left unresolved. A special session this winter offers little further resolution.

The basic difficulty is general economic dislocation at all levels of government. At the same time that the traditional forms of revenue in New Hampshire are contracting because of inflation, the federal government has cut its revenue returned to the state, while telling the state to pick up certain financial responsibilities which had been exclusively in the federal domain. We have simply not found the solution to doing more with less at any level, be it state, county, or local.

Fortunately, other areas of legislative activity have been more rewarding. Legislation which I sponsored has now become the state's first comprehensive program to combat the weed nuisance in our lakes. Although quite modest in size, the program is planned to be self-supporting and will assist our recreation industry. In another area, I successfully sponsored legislation giving local communities input in the siting of hazardous waste facilities.

Last year at this time, I noted that reapportionment would consume much legislative effort. Although this district was relatively uncontroversial, tempers and blood pressures in many other areas of the state have still not returned to normal! As of this writing, it appears that the district will be split, with Barnstead having its own member in the House, and Alton and Gilmanton sharing two members.

Altogether, this year has been a challenge as your Representative. I appreciate your comments and look forward to more either by mail: P.O. Box 97, Alton Bay, N.H. 03810, or by telephone: 875-5140.

# TOWN OF BARNSTEAD ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING

The annual meeting of the School District of the Town of Barnstead was held on Friday, March 13, 1981 in the Barnstead Elementary School auditorium to vote on District affairs.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Richard Golden at 7:30 p.m. There were approximately one hundred fifty (150) people present. The meeting opened with the pledge of allegiance to the flag.

Results of the March 10, 1981 election were read:

It was pointed out that there was an error in the totals for the School Budget on page 110 of the Annual Report. The totals should read as follows:

School Board Budget, 1981-82 should read: \$981,140.00 Recommended Budget, 1981-82 should read: \$944,929.00 The totals had been reversed.

The Moderator read the following procedure to be followed: We will have a motion and a second prior to the debate. There may be an amendment to the motion and an amendment to the amendment. The motion "a call for the question" requires a two thirds vote to pass and only when the speaker is recognized. A two thirds vote ends the debate. If you have a motion which differs from the articles in the Warrant, please put it in writing. When you stand to make a motion, please state your name.

The following persons were sworn in by the Moderator:

The Moderator, Richard Golden, was sworn in by the Clerk, Muriel Chapman.

Articles of the Warrant were read. A copy of the Warrant had been posted as required.

The Moderator announced that if the question of Pupil Transportation had not been reached by 11:00 p.m., a motion would be entertained by the School Board to adjourn the meeting until 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning.

Article I. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District. Motion by Peter Yelle: seconded Mary Gosse: "I move the salaries of School District officers be approved as follows: Moderator, \$20.00; Clerk, \$20.00; Chairman of the School Board, \$300.00; School Board members, \$200.00 each; and Auditor, \$200.00." The motion and the second were withdrawn, and the salary of the Auditor was changed from \$200.00 to \$25.00 to correct a typographical error. Howard Rath questioned whether or not these figures appeared anywhere in the report. He was informed that they are included in the amount under "2300 General Administration (2310)". All other objects \$3,335.00. The salaries in #1 are included in this figure. Motion by Peter Yelle for the corrected figures; seconded Mary Gosse. Passed, voice vote.

**Article II.** To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto. Motion by Sandra Tothill; seconded Bill Gosse: "I move the reports of agents, auditors and committees of the School District be accepted as printed in the Annual Report." Passed, voice vote.

Article III. To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of School District officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Motion by Mary Gosse; seconded Sandra Tothill: "I move that the proposed operating budget be taken up line by line item." Motion by Vernon Hipkiss; seconded Paul Tasker, to amend the motion to read: "... to discuss line by line and only vote on the bottom line." Mr. James asked if the body chooses to change a figure in the budget, what will be the procedure? Will we vote to change the figure? If we vote each line item and do not vote for the bottom total, does it lock the School Board into that line item? It was not clear to the Moderator. He stated that this is the reason we always acted line by line and voted on the total. In his opinion there is nothing that binds the School Board or any other group to adhere to a line budget. There is no way we can control the line items.

In response to a question about where the money came from for the Physical Education teacher, the explanation given was as follows: The money in the Instruction account formerly used for three aides whose jobs were abolished, was used toward the salary for the Physical Education teacher. The money was not taken out of any account but teachers'

salaries; it remained in that account. Mary Gosse pointed out that there had been much less damage in the School since Physical Education was introduced. Health instruction is also included in the Physical Education Program.

Mr. James suggested that another year it might be a good suggestion for future meetings for everybody to have a copy of the budget similar to those which were handed out at the budget hearings. He praised the Budget Committee and the School Board for the excellent job they had done in preparing the figures for that session. Sandra Tothill stated that the School Board had worked hard all year and emphasized that they are only there to serve the people of the School District. They will be willing to answer all questions. When Mr. James reiterated that the School Board had presented a very good report, Mary Gosse indicated that Mr. Paquette had given them a great deal of useful information. A call for a vote on the amendment "to take the budget item by item, but the dollar amounts should not be voted on". The amendment was defeated by voice vote. The original motion "That the proposed operating budget be taken up line by line item". The motion passed, voice vote.

#1000 – Instruction; 1100 Regular Programs \$517,604.00 \$502,544.00

Motion by Peter Yelle; seconded Sandra Tothill, that line 1100 be approved at \$517,604.00 as shown under the School Board's Budget, 1981-82. Mr. Rath requested that the list of figures be read. Peter Yelle called out the list of items which included no new staff, but did include substitutes, health insurance, Worker's Compensation Insurance (all of which have increased), and Retirement which has gone down. With regard to Retirement, the School must pay 2.17%, and the teachers pay an equal amount.

In response to Mr. Collins' question, ("What cuts would the Budget Committee recommend?"), Mr. Gosse said he could provide these figures, but Peter Yelle said the School Board felt they could not work with some of the cuts that had been proposed. Barbara Post felt that the teachers should have their salaries increased. The Budget Committee had recommended that the staff be decreased by one to allow for that. In response to Mrs. Post's question, ("Why are the teachers being let go?), Mrs. Gosse responded, "The subject of teachers cannot be discussed at this meeting." Mr. Sanborn asked: "What is the average raise suggested?" The percentage given was 7.3%. Sandra Tothill explained that in order to compete with other schools in the area such as Alton and Pittsfield for good teachers, it is necessary to offer at least equal salary amounts in order to acquire well qualified teachers. The School Board would like to coordinate programs to save money. They also want to be able to choose the teachers who will

be coming to Barnstead. Better pay would also help to keep our teachers. Motion by Leonard Tasker; seconded Mr. Gallo: "To change the figure from \$517,604.00 to \$502,444.00 as recommended by the Budget Committee." Mr. Brickner asked Leighton Tasker why the \$8,000.00 was deleted. Mr. Tasker said that against the wishes of the voters they had hired a Physical Education teacher. The Budget Committee thought it was too high. He feels that they can go over the budget and live with it.

Holly Bickford made the statement that a public meeting was held on the question of a gym teacher, and those present voted to have one. Linda Nelson asked that the voters think about the children and their education in making a decision. Motion by Leonard Tasker; seconded Howard Rath: "Move that we act on closing debate." Motion carried, and debate closed. The Moderator called for a vote on the motion to change the figure from \$517,604.00 to \$502,544.00. The voice vote was indecisive and the Moderator called for a standing vote and requested the ballot clerks, Melena Conrad and Jean Terry, to take the count of those standing. THE VOTE: 77 IN FAVOR; 72 OPPOSED. The motion to amend the figure is carried. It was then required to take a vote on the #1100 line item of \$502,544.00. There was no further discussion and the Moderator called for a voice vote. A standing vote was required and again the count was taken of those standing. THE VOTE: 78 in FAVOR; 71 OPPOSED. The first line #1100 passed at the figure of \$502,544.00 as amended.

Motion by Leonard Tasker; seconded Howard Rath: "...that lines 1200, Special Programs, \$115,282.00; and 1400, Other Instructional Programs, \$680.00 be accepted as recommended." It was explained that the amount shown is what is required to take care of the "special children". The Special Education must be provided even if the money has to come from other places in the budget. If the law changes it will be reviewed. In response to the question from Bill Gosse as to what the School Board would do with the \$50,000 if the State changes the law, Mary Gosse said that "the School Board should find the children who need help." Mr. James asked if the State is trying to keep from sending the children out of town. Mr. Paquette indicated that they are trying to reduce the number of out-of-town students and would like to see more "in-house" teaching. The motion on #1200 and #1400 was passed by voice vote.

#2500 - Business Services; 2540 Operation and Maintenance of Plant: \$90,463.00 or \$83,463.00. Motion by Leonard Tasker; seconded Paul Golden: "to accept line 2540 as recommended for 1981-82: \$83,463.00. Motion carried by voice vote.

#2550 – Pupil Transportation: \$70,610.00 or \$62,610.00

Motion by Peter Yelle; seconded John Emerson: "that the figure of \$70,610.00 as recommended by the School Board for 1981-82 be accepted." Discussion ensued. Pat Cotton had been in touch with Mr. Marston and he had stated that if he received \$3.00 a week per student he would transport the High School Students. After some discussion it was evident that the method of keeping track of selling and collecting the bus tickets was a serious problem. A suggestion was made to collect one a year. Bill Gosse recommended that the \$8,000.00 for transporting High School students which is part of the \$70,610.00 figure in the School Board's budget remain. Mr. Hayes asked how many students rode the bus. He was informed two buses go to Pittsfield and back with an average of 80-90 students per week. Mr. Paquette, in response to a question, stated that State Law requires that "students age 16, or completion of Grade 8, must be transported." After further discussion it was pointed out that the \$8,000.00 is 3% of the total tuition appropriation. Mr. Abbott called for the question seconded by Howard Rath. A vote in the affirmative would stop the debate. Motion was passed by voice vote, and the debate was stopped. The Moderator then called for a vote on the motion "that the figure of \$70,610.00 for item #2550, Pupil Transportation, be accepted". Motion carried, voice vote.

Motion to accept the last five items as read with the amendment to line 2600 was carried by voice vote.

**Article III.** Motion by Mary Gosse; seconded Bill Gosse: "I move that the District raise and appropriate \$954,029.00 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District." Motion carried, voice vote.

Article IV. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to make application for and receive in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any federal or state agency. Motion by Peter Yelle; seconded Sandra Tothill: "I move that the District authorize the School Board to make application for and receive in the name of the District such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereinafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, The State of New Hampshire, or any federal or state agency." Motion carried, voice vote.

On recommendation by Phil Hodgeman that the School Committee be required to furnish the Budget Committee with figures fourteen (14) days prior to the first public meeting, the Moderator advised those present that no action could be taken on this issue. Bill Gosse recommended that more people attend the public meetings. Dorothy Mulcahy requested dates of meetings in which the budget is discussed be posted in advance.

Article V. To see if the District will vote to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year. Motion by Mary Gosse; seconded Bill Gosse: "I move that the District establish a contingency fund of \$2,000.00 to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses that may arise during the year." Motion passed, voice vote.

**Article VI.** Motion by Sandra Tothill; seconded Mary Gosse: "to transact any other business." Motion carried by voice vote.

As suggested by a member of the audience, Mary Gosse was given a round of applause in gratitude for her dedicated work while serving on the School Board and the last year as Chairperson. Mary offered her thanks and said it had been an honor to serve.

#### REPORT OF THE BARNSTEAD SCHOOL BOARD

This annual report is presented as a communication between the Board and the citizens. I will try to explain all happenings during this past year.

January—a new year; a time to review the teachers and budgets. February—meeting with the Budget Committee. March—the Town Meeting; the election of a new Board member, Patricia Riel Cotton; and to Mary Gosse, who has served many years, given countless hours of energy to our school, a very warm thank you for a job well done!

April, May and June. We had many meetings with parents, teachers, the Superintendent and lawyers. We had no major problems, and we overcame all objects in our path with the expert help of our new Superintendent, F. Andre' Paquette and Wayne Emerson, our new Business Administrator in our own School Administrative Unit #51. Richard Tuohy was hired as our new principal.

Hiring of new staff and screening of first graders was done during the months of July and August. September we were busy preparing all of the new staff. This year we have two teachers per grade, a resource room teacher and a part-time Physical Education and Health teacher.

October and November was business as usual, meeting with S.A.U. members from Alton and Pittsfield to set a new year budget; sorting out all small problems which seem to take the longest time; and negotiations with the new Barnstead Education Association which represents the teachers.

December was a difficult month for me, but thanks to Sandy, Pat and Andre', they carried business forward.

This year has been a year of tremendous growth in our Barnstead School System. You will not see this growth in the number of students, but look at our new principal, Richard Tuohy, and the unity of our staff and in our S.A.U. Office.

It has been a real pleasure working with all of these people who have Barnstead and its students first on their minds.

#### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and citizens of the Barnstead School District, I respectfully submit my 1981 report as your Superintendent of Schools.

The 1981-81 school year has been one of significant change for the Barnstead School District. The following major changes have occurred:

- 1. The new School Administrative Unit #51 made up of the Towns of Alton, Barnstead and Pittsfield became a reality on 1 July 1981. With this change the Office of the Superintendent of Schools was located on Route 126 in Barnstead—centrally located within the S.A.U.—so as to serve the three Districts as efficiently as possible. The location of the office in Barnstead makes it possible for us to eliminate all long distance telephone calls between the individual schools and the Office of the Superintendent of Schools. In addition, we are able to keep the cost of travel by S.A.U. and local District personnel to a minimum.
- 2. Special Education was reorganized within each District and within the S.A.U. The result is that the School District of Barnstead has saved in excess of \$17,000 for the 1981-82 school year and will save an additional \$40,000 during the 1982-83 school year. Thus, the School District of Barnstead will have saved in Special Education costs alone their total contribution to the support of the Office of Superintendent of Schools for the two school years mentioned.
- 3. The Barnstead Elementary School has a new principal, Mr. Richard F. Tuohy. Mr. Tuohy was hired by the School Board following an extensive screening procedure by a committee made up of citizens, teachers, administrators and the School Board. Mr. Tuohy has taken a firm hold of the leadership position in the school and has brought a substantial measure of stability to the school. I envision that, as soon as the administrative and management problems which he faced have been resolved, he will be able to address the substantive issues of education which face the School Board and the District.
- 4. Through careful planning, the School board has been able to bring teachers' salaries in line with the salaries of neighboring Districts. The effect of this significant change has been to stabilize the teaching staff at the Barnstead Elementary School. With the exception of absences for maternity leave, we have had virtually no significant teacher absence or turnover.
- 5. The School Board and Administration have adopted and implemented a new system for evaluating all professional personnel in the School District.
- 6. To support the Administration, to plan for better education, and to assist the Board in making both management and educational decisions, the Board approved a plan proposed by the Principal and the Superin-

tendent to organize the elementary school into three teams: Grades 1 and 2, Grades 3 and 4, and Grades 5 through 8. We believe that this organization of the school will permit us to provide a much better education for the children in the future.

- 7. Under the leadership of the Principal, the Title I Reading Coordinator, and the Superintendent, the professional staff is conducting an extensive evaluation of the achievement *in all basic subjects by all children at all grade levels*. We anticipate making an extensive report to the School Board and the community on the results of this study later during the 1981-82 school year.
- 8. With the assistance of an Administrative Intern at the S.A.U. Office, Mrs. Barbara Moulton, the Office of the Superintendent has been able to propose a complete revision of the School District policies as well as procedures for refining and expanding those policies in the future.
- 9. The teachers, for the first time, have formed a Bargaining Unit as provided under New Hampshire State Law to negotiate with the School Board for conditions of employment relating to salaries, benefits, etc.

These are just a few of the significant changes which have come about during the 1981-82 school year. They are changes of significant improvement in management and in education. It is my firm belief that 1982-83 will see equally significant improvements in the operation of the School District.

As we look to the future there are a number of issues facing the School Board and the School District:

- 1. The total school population of the Barnstead School District now exceeds the total population of its sister district in Alton. Barnstead High School students now constitute more than one-third of the population of the Pittsfield High School (grade 9 through 12). The cost of educating these children now exceeds \$300,000 (or approximately one-third of the total budget of the district). What questions should the Board and the District be asking concerning the future education of high school students of the District?
- 2. Much attention and many funds have been directed toward the education of the educationally handicapped, in recent years; this has required a substantial amount of staff time, energy and creativity. What do the parents and citizens expect for the other 85-90 percent of the students by way of improved quality of education. What about the gifted students? The academically talented?
- 3. It is clear that there will continue to be an assault on financial support from the state and federal levels; how can faculty, the Administration, the Board and the District plan in order to provide quality education with increasingly severe financial constraints?

These are just a few of the major issues facing the district in the immediate future.

The transition to a new S.A.U., the appointment of a new principal, the changeover of a significant part of the staff, and other conditions faced during the current school year have placed heavy burdens on the School Board and those involved in providing education for the children of Barnstead. Nevertheless, substantial progress has been made during the current year. This is due in large measure to the dedication of the professional staff (the teachers and the principal) and the unselfish dedication of the three members of the School Board (Mr. Yelle, Ms. Tothill, and Mrs. Riel Cotton). I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to these people as well as to the citizens of Barnstead for their support and understanding during this very active school year. I encourage all citizens – especially the parents of children – to feel free at all times to contact the Principal or the Superintendent directly, or through members of the School Board, if that is more convenient.

In the year ahead, I would like to solicit a substantial amount of volunteer help in support of the schools. We have already seen significant increase in such help through the efforts of a group called, "Friends of Barnstead." I believe that one way of overcoming the severe financial cutbacks which we have faced and which we are facing is through an extended partnership between the school community and the community at large. We need the support and help of all the citizens of Barnstead.

#### REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

To the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools, and the citizens of Barnstead, I submit my first annual report.

The 1981-82 school year brought many changes in the faculty. We have eight new staff members and many of the returning staff members have new assignments. The new staff members this year are: Mrs. Laura Konkle-King, grade five; Mr. Gregory Emerson, grade five; Mr. Robert Rigor da Eva, grade six; Mrs. Patricia Morais, grade seven and eight Mathematics; Mrs. Teresa Heppe, grade seven and eight Language Arts; Mr. Donald Farnham, Physical Education and Health; Mrs. Marcy Stone, School Secretary. The returning staff members with new assignments are: Mrs. Carolyn Buber, Early Childhood to grade one; Mrs. Virginia Adams, grade one to grade three; Mrs. Susan (MacNicoll) Lore, grade five/six to grade six; Mrs. Patricia Glasson, grade seven to grade seven and eight Science; Mrs. Marcia Higgins, grade seven to grade seven and eight Social Studies; and Mrs. Katherine Latchaw, Early Childhood to Special Education Director and Resource Room teacher.

Since the opening of school in September, 1981, there has been a constant increase in enrollment. At present, we have 357 students enrolled. This compares with 337 students enrolled in September. The grade breakdown is as follows: Grade 1-48; Grade 2-46; Grade 3-40; Grade 4-48; Grade 5-51; Grade 6-42; grade 7-53; and Grade 8-29. With twenty-nine eighth grade students graduating, and an estimated forty students entering the first grade in September, 1982, there is a good possibility that we will have a school population of 375 students in academic year 1982-83.

In the seventh and eighth grades this year we have gone from self-contained classes to departmentalization. This allows the students to experience changing classes and dealing with different personalities. This experience will better prepare the Barnstead students for high school. Academically this schedule allows the teachers to focus their energies in one specific academic area, thereby giving the students a more in-depth presentation of material.

In grades one through eight there is a great spirit of cooperation among the teachers. The teachers switch classes for subjects they are most comfortable with and there is a constant sharing of materials and ideas. This allows the student to have an opportunity to work with different teachers and receive a more in-depth presentation of material.

The faculty has been reviewing the present curriculum and it is felt that the area of major concern is in the Reading Program. At present, we are assembling a reading profile and examining the material by grade level. After completion of this, it will be recommended that one reading program be adopted for the school and it will be in place by September, 1982.

This is the first of many areas that have to be addressed and by placing the subject areas on a cycle, we will be able to constantly update our materials and provide the students with the best possible education.

I would like to take this time to thank the School Board, the Superintendent of Schools, and the Citizens of Barnstead, the Faculty and Staff for their support and cooperation.

#### REPORT ON SPECIAL EDUCATION

In anticipation of changes in Special Education at the State level, an Interdistrict Task force was formed. The purpose of the Task Force was to investigate how cooperation between the Towns of Alton, Barnstead, and Pittsfield could facilitate meeting legal obligations to handicapped students should the state regional system or funding policy change.

The Task Force collected and analyzed student profile information, reviewed budgets and assessed local resources. After identifying common needs and problems, it was estimated that \$41,332.00 could be saved between the three districts if they pooled resources in providing services to educationally handicapped students.

The recommendations of the Task Force have been implemented this year by the formation of "Education 51." Ed 51 is a private, non-profit organization which provides a number of different services to the towns of Alton, Barnstead and Pittsfield:

- 1. INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMMING. Two programs for moderately to severly handicapped children have been established in Pittsfield: A self-contained class for emotionally handicapped junior and senior high school students and a language impaired program for younger students. Both programs have allowed the three districts to provide appropriate programming without sending students out of district.
- 2. EVALUATION AND REMEDIATION. This year each district has available the services of a certified diagnostic counselor and licensed occupational therapist. This has allowed related services and diagnostics to be provided in a more efficient and cost effective way.
- 3. S.A.U. PUPIL PLACEMENT TEAM. Staff resources in the towns of Alton, Barnstead and Pittsfield are shared to ensure proper representation of certified staff at the local evaluation meetings.
- 4. TRANSPORTATION. Ed. 51 has leased a van which facilitates transportation for inter-district students, and is available for other small group transportation needs within the S.A.U.

These programs will be evaluated this spring to ensure they continue to meet the needs of all three towns.

In accordance with Federal and State laws, the Barnstead School District is providing services for those students identified as needing a Special Education Program. There are thirty-two students at Barnstead Elementary School; six students at Pittsfield High School; nine students within the Inter-district Programs; and one student in an Out-of-District placement.

The Special Education services include speech and language therapy occupational therapy, and diagnostic counseling.

The Special Education Department of the Barnstead School District will continue to provide the services necessary to meet the needs of individual students.

"Do you know a child under 18 in need of Special Education? If so, please contact your school principal."

#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

Most of the children in grades one through four have had their annual eye and ear exam. The children in grades five through eight will be tested later this year. If your child does not pass either the eye or ear exam, you will be notified. A letter will be enclosed in your child's report card regarding the need for follow-up treatment. Class physicals for grades three, five and seven will begin in January. The Pittsfield Medical Association will be doing the class physicals.

The children in grades one through five are participating in a dental program that includes daily toothbrushing and a weekly fluoride rinse. Children must have parental consent to participate. We hope that all children will participate, as the program has been very effective the last few years in promoting better dental health and fewer cavities. Even if your child brushes regularly at home or uses a fluoride rinse, he can participate in the program. The children brush their teeth daily as a class.

This year we were fortunate to have the dental hygienist in our school. She cleaned and applied fluoride to the student's teeth. More than 100 children participated in the program. There was a modest fee for this service.

Health classes are being taught by myself in grades one through four. The classes cover a variety of material, including safety, nutrition, body systems and general health habits.
