

#### TOWN WARRANT

#### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To bring forward your ballots for the necessary town officers for the ensuing year and for the ensuing three years. Polls are to open at 10 A. M. and are not to close before 6 P. M.

Article 2. To see what action the Town will take in legalizing "Beano" as passed by the 1948 Legislature.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and to make appropriation for same.

- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800. for the support of the poor and \$2,000. for assistance to the aged.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500. for maintenance of highways and bridges and for other necessary expenses of the Town.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes up to the sum of \$15,000. if needed.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700. for the Town Library.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for care of the clock on the Church.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$935.44 for the construction of Class V highways, the State to contribute \$3,741.76.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000. for the tarring of Class V. highways, under the direction of the selectmen.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day and patriotic purposes.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$246.00 to the Merrimack Valley Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the national advantages and resources of the

town in co-operation with the other 37 communities in the Merrimack Valley Region.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,300. for a tractor with a shovel and mowing machine.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to repair or remove the stone wall at Library and Greenhouse, raising and appropriating \$1800. for this purpose.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for a safe for the use of the Town Clerk.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the care of the New Cemetery; \$25.00 for pumping water for same; \$100.00 for the care of Joppa Cemetery; \$50.00 for the care of the Old Cemetery on the Back River Road; and \$25.00 for the care of the Beals Cemetery.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. to paint the inside of the Town Hall.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the care of the Town Dump.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000. to gravel Class V Roads.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200.00 to install a rest room in the Green House.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1200.00 to rearrange and equip the Town Hall kitchen.

- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. for use by the Anniversary Committee.
- Article 23. To see what action, if any, the townspeople of Bedford will take to hold future town meetings in the evening.
- Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$100.00 in trust from Grace B. Hodgman, the interest to be expended for the care of the Henry W. Brown lot in Joppa Cemetery.
- Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to accept Servant Street, westerly from Davies Street for 200 feet.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept Darling Street, easterly from Merry Street for 237 feet.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to accept Ridgewood Lane, southerly from Ridgewood Road for 300 feet.
- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to accept the road from County Road to Stebbins Pond and southerly by cottages.
- Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to accept Sea Bee Avenue and Palmetto Avenue, westerly from Plummer Road for 150 feet.
- Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept Hill Top Drive running in a southerly direction from Wilkins Street Extension for 322 feet.
- Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the road (subject to gates and bars) leading from Joppa Hill Road, near buildings formally owned and occupied by Fred Parkhurst extending in a westerly direction to the Amherst Town line.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to have a description of taxable real estate on the tax bill.

Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1500.00 in addition to the appropriation of last year for the construction of a water reservoir.

To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and of other officers heretofore chosen, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

To see what action the Town will take on the final proposed zoning ordinance submitted to the selectmen by the Zoning Commission.

# ZONING ORDINANCE FOR THE TOWN OF BEDFORD, N. H. JANUARY 25, 1950

PREAMBLE — For the purpose of promoting the health, safety, and general welfare of the inhabitants of the Town by regulating and restricting the use and construction of buildings and premises, the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of said Town, pursuant to the authority conferred by the Revised Laws of the State of New Hampshire, as amended.

#### ARTICLE I

Section A—Districts

For the purpose of this ordinance the Town of Bedford is divided into two districts.

1. The Suburban District shall comprise all land lying within the area hereinafter described and as indicated on the Zoning Map of January 25, 1950 on file with the Town Clerk and made part of this ordinance:

Beginning at the intersection of the right of way of the old Milford Branch Railroad with the northerly line of the Town of Bedford; thence following a meandering southerly line along said railroad right of way to its intersection with the highway known as Route 101; thence northeasterly along a line five hundred (500) feet east of said highway to its intersection with Bowman Brook; thence following the course of said Brook in a general easterly direction to a point one thousand (1000) feet westerly from the Daniel Webster Highway; thence northerly on a line parallel with said highway and one

thousand (1000) feet westerly therefrom to a point five hundred (500) feet south of a point opposite the intersection of said Daniel Webster Highway with Wathen Road; thence easterly along a line five hundred (500) feet south of and parallel to said Wathen Road extended to said Daniel Webster Highway; thence easterly along a line five hundred (500) feet south of and parallel to said Wathen Road and its extension to the Merrimack River at the easterly line of said Town of Bedford; thence northerly and westerly along said town line to the point of beginning.

2. The Rural District shall comprise all land in the Town of Bedford not included in the Suburban District.

## Section B—Definitions

- 1. 'Home produce and products' means and includes everything of an agricultural nature—including forest products—grown and produced on the property of the resident, including the conditioning and processing thereof, and shall mean and include also such articles as are manufactured or altered by members of the household of the bona fide resident of any property.
- 2. 'Right of Way' means and includes all town, state and federal highways and the land on either side of same are covered by statutes to determine the width of rights of way.
- 3. 'Permanent residents.' A family shall be considered permanent residents when it has used any building continuously as a residence for a period of six months or more.
- 4. 'Tourist Homes' shall mean and include dwellings where transient accommodations are provided for a price.
- 5. 'Front Yard.' A space extending for the full width of a lot between the extreme front line of a building and the nearest side of the right of way.

- 6. 'Frontage' shall mean the length of the lot bordering on the public right of way designated for common use.
- 7. 'Permanent Building.' Any building resting on or attached to a permanent or otherwise legally defined as 'real estate'.

#### ARTICLE II

#### Section A-General Provisions

- 1. After passage of this Ordinance it shall be unlawful to erect any permanent building or alter the bulk of any building or the use of any building or site or permanently relocate any building in any district, without first making application for and obtaining a permit from the Selectmen or upon appeal, from the Board of Adjustment.
- 2. Upon the receipt of such application the Selectmen shall forthwith post a certified copy thereof upon the bulletin board at the Town Hall.
- 3. No permit shall be issued until ten days after the application therefor shall have been posted on the bulletin board at the Town Hall for a period of fourteen days nor until the applicant for such permit shall within said fourteen day period have filed with the Selectmen return receipts evidencing the fact that notice of such application has been given by registered mail to abutting owners and/or those owning real estate within three hundred (300) feet in the Suburban District or one thousand (1000) feet in the Rural District of the site of the proposed structure or site of the new use.
- 4. Objection on account of the appearance or use of a proposed structure or of a site may be made by one or more abutting owners and/or owners of real estate within the limits above set forth or by ten or more taxpayers and/or registered voters of the town to the Board of Adjustment

which shall hold a public hearing to receive the evidence on both sides and shall have the authority to decide whether or not the permit shall be issued. Such objection shall be made before the expiration of the ten day period above referred to.

#### ARTICLE III

#### Section A-General Regulations

- 1. Established businesses may remain in their present locations, or may relocate within the District subject to obtaining the necessary permit and existing uses of buildings and property may be continued.
- 2. No land in any district shall be used for a dump, or a place for refuse, waste or junk of any kind, nor for abandoned vehicles, nor used in a manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious, offensive or detrimental to the public, or to the owners or occupants of adjacent property, or prejudicial to the general welfare of the community, without the approval, in writing of the Board of Adjustment upon such conditions as it may determine.
- 3. No roadside signs or group of signs, including bill-boards, shall be permitted which exceed an area of twelve square feet outside dimensions or which are so placed as to obstruct the view of the highway. The above sign limitation does not apply to signs placed on the face of a permanent building by the owner or occupant thereof.
- 4. Home produce and products may be bought and sold and exposed for sale.
- 5. Tourist homes may be maintained but no more than four rooms may be used for the accommodation of paying guests.

#### Section B-The Suburban District

1. It shall be a district mainly of residences, but no

building shall house more than two families as permanent residents.

- 2. Every new building shall be set back from the front property line not less than twenty-five feet, or such distance as shall conform to the line of existing buildings on adjacent property. All new buildings shall be set back at least fifteen feet from the side and rear property lines.
- 3. No buildings or set of buildings shall occupy more than thirty percent of its lot and each lot shall have a frontage of at least one hundred feet and a minimum square foot area of twelve thousand square feet, except that an owner of real estate at the time of the adoption of this ordinance shall have the right to construct one single family residence despite the fact that the lot area may be less than twelve thousand square feet.
- 4. Each family unit shall have a minimum of four hundred square feet of floor space.

#### Section C-The Rural District

- 1. It shall be a district mainly of farms and residences with a lot area of not less than forty thousand square feet, except that an owner of real estate at the time of the adoption of this ordinance shall have the right to construct one single family residence despite the fact that the lot area may be less than forty thousand square feet.
- 2. Only single family residences shall be permitted except that existing dwellings may be permitted to house two families as permanent residents.

# Section D-Non-conforming Properties

All non-conforming properties in active use when this Ordinance is passed and adopted may continue indefinitely in their present use except that in the event of the discontinuance of such use for a period of one year or the damage or destruction by fire, storm or Act of God, said building

or use may be rebuilt or continued provided such building or use is restored within one year of its discontinuance, damage or destruction.

#### Section E-New Development

- 1. The owner of any plot of ground intended for development or subdivision into building lots not fronting upon a public highway shall file with the Board of Selectmen a plan or map of the proposed subdivision, and shall obtain the approval of the Board of Selectmen thereon before proceeding with the development or sale of lots in the said subdivision.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen to inspect the site of such proposed subdivision, and to require such roadway and other areas for common use as will eventually be acceptable to the town for maintenance by the town, and to approve the same when satisfied that such proposed plans are in harmony with and conducive to the general welfare of the Town and the neighborhood, and not detrimental to existing property values, but in no sense shall this be deemed an acceptance by the town of the street or streets.

#### ARTICLE IV

# Administration, Enforcement

Section A. This ordinance shall be administered and enforced by the Board of Selectmen, subject to right of appeal to the Board of Adjustment as herein defined. Applications for permits shall be in writing and shall be accompanied by such plans, specifications or other details as the Selectmen may require. Printed forms for the assistance of applicants shall be furnished by the Town Clerk.

Section B. Permits shall be granted under such conditions and for such building or for such premises as the

Board of Selectmen may approve, if and when said Board shall find:

- 1. That such use is in harmony with the purposes and intent of this ordinance, including its general purpose of promoting the health, safety, convenience and general welfare of the community and such other purposes as are stated in Section 52 of Chapter 51 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire, as amended.
- 2. That such use is in harmony with the convenience, welfare and character of the district or neighborhood for which it is proposed, provided that in case of conflict between the best interests of the neighborhood and those of the community as a whole, the latter shall prevail.
- 3. That denial of such permit will result in a hardship to the owner out of proportion to any hardship to the community and neighborhood that might arise out of the granting of such permit.

#### ARTICLE V

# Membership of Board of Adjustment

The Moderator shall make the initial appointment of a Board of Adjustment conforming in membership, duties and authority to the Public Laws of New Hampshire, said Board to serve without compensation. Thereafter, upon expiration of the term of any member of said Board his successor shall be elected at Town Meeting.

#### ARTICLE VI

#### Violations

Section A. Upon any well founded information that this Ordinance is being violated, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce its provisions

by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other appropriate legal action.

Section B. Whoever violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished upon conviction by a fine not exceeding \$5. for each day of each violation.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### Amendments

This Ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal town meeting provided that:

- 1. Prior to such town meeting the proposed amendment has been advertised and given a legal fourteen day notice. a public hearing conducted by said Board, which hearing has been advertised and given a legal fourteen day notice.
- 2. Each proposed amendment of any Article, Section or Sub-Section shall be the subject of a separate Article in the warrant calling for the meeting.

#### ARTICLE VIII

## Separability Clause

The invalidity of any provision of this Ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provision.

#### ARTICLE IX

# Takes Effect

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

#### CHAPTER 297

# An Act Relating to the Covering of Wells

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1. Abatement of Nuisances. Amend chapter 165 of the Revised Laws by adding after section 32 as inserted by chapter 133 of the Laws of 1949 and amended by chapter 261 of the Laws of 1949 the following new sub-division:

#### Wells

- 33. Definition. The term "well" as used in this subdivision shall mean any artificially made hole in the surface of the earth (a) which is more than four feet deep and (b) which is more than eight inches in diameter and less than sixteen square feet in area at the top and (c) the sides of which are steeper than a sixty degree slope.
- 34. Fencing or Covering. No person who owns or occupies land shall knowingly allow any well which is within five hundred feet of a dwelling or within two hundred feet of any highway to remain open on such land, unless there is around such a well a substantial fence or protection at least three feet high so constructed that no child can crawl through or under it. Any such well shall be deemed to be open unless it is protected by a covering strong enough to hold one thousand pounds and secured so that it cannot be easily removed by children.
- 35. Nuisance. Any open well which is not fenced or protected as provided in section 27 is hereby declared a nuisance and the same may be ordered abated by any court of competent jurisdiction on complaint of any prosecuting officer.

36. Penalty. Whoever violates any provision of this subdivision shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars.

2. Takes Effect. This act shall take effect upon its passage. (Approved July 28, 1949.)

Each year there is a demand for a statement on forest fires for publication in the annual town report. It is believed they serve a good purpose in reminding local citizens of the danger from such fires and how they can help prevent them. The following is offered with the respectful request for publication in your town report.

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figures show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the size of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVEN-TION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

- 1. Being careful with fire in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.
- 2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.
- 3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

- 9. To see if the School District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$30,000.00 for the construction of a two room addition to the Donald Street School. Upon petition.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed five-hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be used to survey the educational needs of the school district for the purpose of determining school building requirements; this educational survey to be performed under the direction of the State Board of Education and with the advice and counsel of a local survey committee composed of the members of the School Board and one person representing the parents of children in each of the three schools. Upon petition.
- 11. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate not exceeding \$16,000.00 for the purpose of making enlargements, alterations and improvements to the Donald Street School building and for the purchase of any necessary new equipment therefor, and to see if the District will authorize the issue of serial coupon notes or bonds of the District under and in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Bonds Statute, and all amendments thereof, including Chapter 55 of the New Hampshire Session Laws of 1949. Upon petition.
- 12. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

### ANNUAL REPORT OF BEDFORD SCHOOL BOARD

### 1949-1950

Your School Board has had a busy year and has tried to render the best possible service to the Town. All regular meetings were held as scheduled each month, and in addition several special meetings were necessary. The responsibility of running the schools is not just a matter of attending a few meetings. There are questions which arise daily that have to be settled, and each board member has shared this responsibility so that things that needed attention were handled as promptly as possible.

On July 1, 1949, Mr. Henry J. Hastings became Superintendent of our Union School District. Mr. Hastings came to us highly recommended by the State Department of Education and with a very successful record as Superintendent in the Charlestown area. In a matter of a few months he has become familiar with his duties in our District and has been serving our town very well. Our Union School District includes the towns of Bedford, Hudson, Litchfield, Merrimack and Pelham. This is a sizeable job for anyone and particularly at this time with school problems mounting in every community.

Between annual meetings and special meetings a school board has to function as an administrative board running your school system to the best of their ability. Decisions have to be made, and often they do not please everyone. However, anything that has been done this past year has been in the interest of providing as good an educational system as possible for our children. Attendance by the voters at all special and annual meetings will help your School Board to run the kind of school system you want in Bedford. Right now the question of how to provide for an increased

school population is before us. The question should receive some very careful thought and should be settled by the voters at school meetings.

Our schools seem to be functioning well. We have been able to pay our teachers adequate salaries, and this has enabled us to hold teachers and also obtain replacements when necessary.

Our school buildings are in a good state of repair and we have tried hard to maintain our equipment in good condition.

It has been the goal of the School Board to keep our schools neat and clean at all times. We have felt that our children should not be expected to spend their school hours under conditions any less attractive than they would have at home. We hope that we have succeeded in this policy and hope that it will continue.

The Schools of Bedford can be whatever the people of the Town want them to be. Your interest in school affairs will be reflected in the schools of tomorrow here in Bedford.

### REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

### To the Bedford School Board:

It is with pleasure I herewith submit my first brief report on your school system.

The crisis in public education has been receiving nation-wide publicity. This crisis is upon us because of a rapidly increasing birth rate, a reluctance to raise teachers' salaries in keeping with wages in industry and inability to construct needed new buildings during and immediately following the war. The most optimistic say it will be with us for at least ten years and the Federal Census Bureau sees no real relief from the increased school population.

In surveying your own system to see how it is meeting this crisis, you should feel a certain sense of pride. It is meeting the crisis much better than the majority of schools in the State.

Due to a wise policy of increasing salaries each year, the teaching staff is very good. Every effort should be made to keep the excellent teachers now in the system.

The buildings themselves are in excellent condition due to constant attention and by continuation of this policy can be kept so. There is one more room available in the Stevens Buswell school for expansion, and this room will undoubtedly have to be used next year. Your classroom needs can be cared for possibly two or three years before steps toward providing new facilities will become a matter of immediate necessity.

Concentrating all of the first grade pupils of the Donald Street and Peter Woodbury sections in one room can not be questioned as far as improving educational opportunities for these youngsters is concerned. If we might provide the same opportunity for all the rest of the pupils economically I

would be most heartily in favor of it. It should give all pupils a much better foundation.

I would like to recommend that a very thorough study be made of the possible future needs of the school system and a long range program be set up to care for these needs. It is only through such long range planning that a sound solution can be found.

In conclusion I should like to thank the school board for the fine cooperation shown me thus far. It is a real inspiration to work with a school board, parents and teachers who seem to have the best interests of the children at heart and are willing to give these interests a first place in their thinking.
