ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT State of New Hampshire

Grafton, SS

Town of Benton

To the inhabitants of the Town of Benton Qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Benton Community Building in said Benton on the second Tuesday of March next, the 12th, at seven o'clock in the evening to vote and act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1 To chose a Town Clerk, a Treasurer, a Tax Collector and an Auditor for the term of one year, a Selectman and a Supervisor of the Check List for three year terms, a member of the Planning Board for five years and a Surveyor of Wood & Lumber for one year plus any other necessary officers or agents for the ensuing year.
- $\underline{\text{Article}}\ \underline{2}$ To see if the town will vote to accept the reports of officers and agents as printed.
- $\frac{\text{Article}}{\text{the "so called"}}$ 7 To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the "so called" Wheeler Road. (RSA 231:43)
- <u>Article 4</u> To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for Marty Noble to purchase topsoil, grass seed and fuel for his equipment to be used for restoration of the High Street Cemetery. The Selectmen recommend this article.
- Article $\underline{5}$ To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 to buy the copier, now on a trial basis in the Town Clerk's office. The Selectmen recommend this article.
- Article 6 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sums necessary to support a police officer on an "as needed" basis, \$1,500 maximum for start-up expenses, \$1,000 vehicle expense plus \$50 for the first years salary and a raise in our insurance costs of approximately \$1,000. The selectmen recommend this article.
- Article 7 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money of not more than \$130,000 and to authorize the issuance of long term bonds or notes of not more than \$90,000 for the purpose of rebuilding parts of Howe Hill Road and/or Tunnel Stream Road, in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act, RSA:ch 33, and to authorize the municipal officers to issue or negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate thereon; furthermore, to authorize the withdrawal of

Article 7 (cont'd) - \$40,000 form the Capital Reserve Fund created for this purpose. The voters must determine what action shall be taken on any one total proposal of the three tendered, or portion thereof, and determine the total sum to be raised in excess of the CRF for Roads. A 2/3 ballot vote is required. The Selectmen recommend this article.

<u>Article</u> 8 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the CRF for Roads. The Selectmen recommend this article.

Article 9 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$220 to have the Town included in the spring hazardous waste collection by the North Country Council. The Selectmen do not recommend this article.

<u>Article</u> <u>10</u> - To see if the Town will vote to have the Road Agent contract put out for bids at least one month prior to the end of the present contract.

<u>Article</u> <u>11</u> - To see if the Town will vote to have the Town's inhabitants vote and act upon the contract bids received for the job of Road Agent. The Selectmen do not recommend this article.

Article 12 - To see if the Town will vote to have the Town Clerk post notice of a town meeting to act upon contract bids for job of Road Agent in at least two local newspapers two weeks prior to meeting.

Article 13 - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum to be used for the rental of a place to store sand and/or salt for use on the roads and to determine this monthly or yearly sum. The Selectmen recommend this article.

<u>Article 14</u> - To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$54,768, which represents the opening budget. This does not include any special articles addressed. The Selectmen recommend this article.

A motion was made to recess the town meeting and open the school meeting, which was seconded and voted in the affirmative.

The town meeting resumed at 7:25 p.m.

ARTICLE II Will the town vote to accept the reports of officers and agents as printed in the town report?

The town voted to accept the reports of officers and agents as printed in the Benton town report.

(In a discussion of the High Street Cemetery and its run-down and neglected condition, Martin Noble volunteered to check the cemetery and cut brush as needed.

ARTICLE III To see if the town will vote to put property taxes in Benton on a semi-annual basis.

The motion was defeated after a discussion. It should be noted that tax payments for the coming year may be made at any time, thus avoiding the extra expense to the town of semi-annual billing.

ARTICLE IV To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110 for the town to be included in a six town hazardous waste pick-up and collection.

Motion was accepted on voice vote.

ARTICLE V To see if the town will vote to designate the selectmen as agents to withdraw the sum of \$12,000 from the Expendable Trust Fund for roads to be used for reconstruction of parts of Howe Hill and Tunnel Brook Roads.

Article V was defeated by voice vote.

ARTICLE VI To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be added to the CRF for roads.

Article VI was accepted by voice vote.

ARTICLE VII To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the purpose of updating the town map.

The motion passed.

ARTICLE VIII To see if the town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money to be raised an appropriated for the ensuing year as recommended in the budget and will vote to raise and appropriate all sums so determined.

The article was accepted as written.

ARTICLE IX To see if the town will vote to pass an ordinance to enable Benton to be part of the 911 network and to require street markers and house numbers for all Benton properties.

This article was accepted as written.

The meeting was adjourned at $8:42\ p.m.$ All new officers were sworn in at the closing.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1995 started out like any other year with all the last minute meetings and work to get the books closed for the past year, correcting the mistakes that crop up during the year, finish all the annual reports, get all the figures ready for 1996 and put together a Town Report.

In the mean time, Scott Roden, Ed Matz and some other residents were getting together with the idea of writing to all of our State and Federal representatives to see if a bit more money could be generated for the town in this manner to ease up on the constant rise of property taxes. We finally put together two letters that were sent to our Senator, Congressmen, our state representatives, the Governor's Council and the Governor. The letter writers and those interested and the Selectmen had several meetings with some of the recipients of our letters and we can see a difference in some of the monies received by the Town. Our school foundation aid had doubled and our per acre "payment in lieu of taxes" for the White Mt. Nat'l Forest went form \$.10 per acre to \$.65 per acre. revenue sharing checks also increased by \$1,100. It does look as though the "squeaky wheel" got some oil and that we all owe a vote of thanks to Ray Burton, Rep. Bill Williams, Governor Merrill, Senator Ned Gordon, Senator Hugh Gregg, Representatives Bass, King and Zeliff.

We had a very pleasant summer and the weather didn't get too cold until December. We did, however, have three very nasty wind and rain storms in October and November. Dan Elliott had all the roads in good condition to go into winter when the first hard rain storm hit. The leaves had just about finished falling and drains and culverts became leaf clogged in no time. Washouts were deep and widespread. The second violent storm hit about a week later and the wind took down hundreds of trees. Danny and Jessie spent many hours with equipment cleaning roads. There was so much damage that the first day was spent merely making openings so that a car could get through. There were several huge trees caught against the middle support of the Tunnel Brook Bridge and many many hours and much equipment was necessary to dislodge, beach and cut up all that debris. We had used all our summer money before these storms hit and we had to go into winter road money so work done on these clean-ups was minimal.

Another storm hit in November and things went from bad to worse.

The New Hampshire Office of Emergency Management contacted our Director of Emergency Management, Sam Boutin, Jr., and he contacted the Selectmen to tell us that a regional meeting was being held in Littleton to tell a few surrounding towns how to go about applying for special funds being made available to towns who had sustained damage during these storms. Selectman, John Elliott, Road Agent, Dan Elliott and Emergency Management Director, Sam Boutin, Jr. attended the meeting. They were put in contact with a federal representative who came to Benton to meet with John and Danny Elliott. They spent two to three days during two successive weeks going over roads, documenting all the damage, money that has been spent and compiling accurate accounts of material, labor and equipment necessary to put the roads back in shape.

We have been told that we will probably be reimbursed for the \$2,700 that we had to spend to merely open the roads sometime in the next two months. We then, must repair the rest of the damage, bill the FEMA and then a FEMA representative will inspect the repairs and direct the State of N.H. to issue payment for the rest of the work to the Town of Benton. We will end up with cleaned out ditches, several new and larger culverts and many loads of gravel sorely needed on washed out road beds.

We have had a busy year, our jobs became more complicated and take more time but if we can see a couple of things that are better at the end of the year than they were January 1st, we can all feel better for having kept right on working.

ROAD REPORT

The year started off kind of quiet with just regular maintenance of snow and ice. Town meeting came and a number of people said, "try and find something cheaper than cold patch." So, we tried some other materials; some worked, some didn't. We graveled Tunnel Stream Road, graded all roads twice, repaired some culverts, cleaned ditches, and general repairs. Fall came and we put up sand, cleaned a few more ditches and removed leaves from culverts. Things were in pretty good shape and well under budget, then came the last week of October and the first week of November. We received two major storms of wind and rain in that two week period and took on a lot of damage.

This county has since been declared a disaster area by the president. At this time we have just finished meeting with the F.E.M.A. government man and should receive all funds needed for repairs.

December hit very hard with early and heavy snow which further strained the budget.

We contacted paving companies and received a good quote from the firm of Blaktop, Inc. with three proposals of which #2 is recommended. Also we support the article to add to the C.R.F. for roads.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1995, our three (3) leading causes of fire were children, non-permit fires not properly extinguished and smoking materials.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

The meeting was called to order at 7:05 PM by the Moderator, John G. Elliott, with 49 townspeople present. Moderator Elliott read the warrant. Prior to action being taken on the articles, the following ensued:

John Elliott read a letter initiated by Ed Matz regarding the unfair tax burden which is placed on our income-poor, "property-rich" community. Virtually all voters present at the town meeting signed the letter, which was then forwarded to Governor Greg, elected legislators, and Ray Burton, our councilor.

Deborah Page donated a copy of the warning of the first town meeting in Coventry, New Hampshire, on December 30, 1809. The document was originally saved by Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Leonard. This record will be copied, framed, and the gift noted in town records. We are very grateful for these records of our town history.

ARTICLE 1: To choose a Moderator for the coming year. Mark Elliott was elected.

We wish to thank John Elliott for his years of service as school moderator.

ARTICLE 2: To choose a clerk for the coming year. Lyn Bandy was reelected.

ARTICLE 3: To choose one member of the school board for a term of three years.

Laurie Elliott was reelected for a 3 year term.

The resignation of Sharon Edwards before her term expired was accepted with regret. A replacement will be appointed. ARTICLE 4: To choose a treasurer for the ensuing year. Maxine Tyler was reelected.

ARTICLE 5: To hear reports of agents, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

Motion passed.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the district will vote to set the salaries of school board members at \$150 per year, the school district treasurer at \$50 per year, the school district moderator at \$10 per meeting, and the school district clerk at \$10 per meeting.

Motion was made to accept the article. Laurie Elliott then amended the article to read: School district treasurer to \$70 per year, school district moderator at \$16 per meeting, and the school district clerk at \$16 per meeting, and the school district auditor at \$30 per year. This article was accepted as stated with the amendment.

ARTICLE 7: To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of the schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

Scott Roden moved that the district raise and appropriate the sum of \$290,021.00 for the obligations as set forth in Aritcle 7. Motion passed.

ARTICLE 8:

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Stefan Cimikowski moved that the meeting be adjourned, which was seconded and passed by a voice vote at 7:25 PM.

To the Inhabitants of the School District of Benton in the County of Grafton, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in district affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 12th day of March, 1996, at 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1: To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

ARTICLE 2: To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3: To choose one Member of the School Board, for a term of three years.

ARTICLE 4: To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5: To hear reports of Agents, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 6: To see if the District will vote to set the salaries of School Board Members at \$150 per year, the School District Treasurer at \$100 per year, Auditor at \$30 per year, the School District Moderator at \$16 per meeting and the School District Clerk at \$16 per meeting. (The school board recommends this appropriation.)

ARTICLE 7: To see if the school district will vote to create an expendable general fund trust fund under the provisions of RSA 198:20-c, to be known as the Benton Tuition and Education Expendable Trust Fund, for the purpose of paying the

unanticipated cost of educating Benton children who attend schools outside the Benton school district. Furthermore, to name the school board as agents to expend and to raise and appropriate up to \$25,000 to be placed in such fund with such sum to be funded from the June 30, 1996 undesignated fund balance over \$15,000. (The school board recommends this appropriation.)

ARTICLE 8:

To see if the District will vote to appropriate \$50.00 to help support, with other school districts, the case of the Claremont School District et al vs. Governor et al, a court challenge to the constitutionality of New Hampshire's method of funding public education through near total reliance on local property taxes. (The school board recommends this appropriation.)

ARTICLE 9:

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

ARTICLE 10:

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.



School Administrative Unit #23 Report of the Superintendent's and Business Administrator's Salaries

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the Superintendent and Business Administrator.

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the Unit on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of SAU #23 during the 1995-96 school year will receive a salary of \$59,000.00 plus and incentive of \$2,100.00 prorated among the several school districts. The Business Administrator will receive a salary of \$36,000.00 plus and incentive of \$1,000.00 prorated among the several school districts.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF BENTON, I SUBMIT MY FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

In October, 1994, the New Hampshire State Board of Education granted SAU #23's request to form two SAUs: SAU 23; and SAU 68. This reorganization was discussed in last year's Town Report.

At the SAU 23 Board meeting in May, Wayne Fortier stepped down as Chair, thanking the Board for its support during his three years in office. He explained that his work as President of the New Hampshire State School Boards Association and Chair of the state's Joint Education Council made this necessary. After thanking Fortier for his leadership during the difficult SAU separation process, the Board elected Denis Ward of Monroe as Chair. Ben Harrington of Bath was elected Vice Chair. Bob Regis of Monroe became Secretary, and Donna Roche of Haverhill became Treasurer. With Board approval, we added a Business Administrator to the SAU staff, hiring Ed Emond for this position in July, 1995. Ed is a strong addition to the SAU and has earned our respect for his work developing the SAU and district budgets.

Benton accepted Sharon Edwards' resignation from the School Board with regret last year. Amy Barry served briefly in Sharon's place until she moved from Benton. Marty Noble took Amy's place. He brings to the Board the same high level of commitment to school issues that his predecessors had.

In Benton's Budget Hearing in February, community members asked if there were ways to express their concerns about school financing to state elected representatives. A meeting was arranged for the town with local officials. On the 1996 Warrant, the School Board is also including an Article showing support for the Claremont lawsuit, legal action aimed at forcing the state to develop a more appropriate school financing plan. In other attempts at cost savings, the Benton School Board continues its tuition contract with Haverhill School District. Because Benton sends over 100% of its students to Haverhill, Benton qualified for a 5% tuition discount in 1994-95 and 1995-96. With increases in Haverhill tuition costs for the 1996-97 school year, Benton has negotiated a 10% tuition discount.

Finally, I would like to thank the Benton school community for your kind support. The first few months as Superintendent have been very busy. I am continually surprised by the range of responsibilities that come with this job. I welcome hearing your thoughts about school

issues. SAU 23 Notes, published monthly, is an attempt to keep you informed about our work. The SAU #23 School-Community Forums, which have featured Dr. Jack Hruska on Family-School Connections, and Fred Bramante on Market Driven Teacher Compensation Plans, are another way we are trying to include the community in our work. As you know, we can only reach our primary goal making school a challenging and enriching experience for all students - by working together. It's a goal that we can reach, together.
