# TOWN WARRANT

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Brookline, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Daniels Academy Building in said Brookline on Tuesday, the ninth (9th) day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees and all other officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relative thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$598.49 to secure State aid for permanent improvement of highways.
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
6. To see if the Town will vote to allow any discount on property taxes.
7. To see if the Town will vote to charge a penalty of twenty cents on each poll tax unpaid after December first.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$950.00 to defray the annual cost of the "Group Alerting and Dispatch System" or take any action relative thereto.
9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to enter into a contract with the Brookline Grange for three years.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be used for the town map or take any action relative thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the Water Hole Fund.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to be placed in the Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund or take any action relative thereto. \*Note: Town Finance Committee recommends \$1,000.00 be raised under this item.)

13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to withdraw the Highway Fund in amount of \$1,966.25 from Capital Reserve Account.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to be placed in Capital Reserve Account for Town Hall painting or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the Community Council of Nashua, Inc.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to raise the rental fees for Town Hall.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$185.00 for membership in the Nashua Regional Planning Commission.

18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$900.00 to install a control panel and fire detection heads in the Fire House or take any action relative thereto.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 for the Town Ball Park, or take any action relative thereto.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to purchase new radio equipment for the Police Department.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 or any part thereof to replace the present heating system in Daniels Academy Building.

22. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following regulations for the guidance of the Selectmen in accepting roads for the Town:

1. The right of way shall have a minimum width of 50 feet.
2. Deadend roads shall be equipped with a turn around at the closed end with a minimum radius of 60 feet.
3. The roadway base course shall consist of gravel or other suitable material placed to a compacted depth of 12 inches.
4. The finished road surface shall not be less than 20 feet in width and shall consist of 2-1/2 inches of bituminous concrete or 2-1/2 inches of mix in place and sealed according to T.R.A. specifications.
5. Drainage facilities shall be provided where necessary. Pipes shall have an inside diameter of not less than 12 inches and shall be constructed of reinforced concrete or corrugated metal with paved invert.
6. Driveways joining any roadway shall be provided with drainage facilities as required.
7. Roadway slopes shall have a minimum 3 to 1 pitch.

23. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following:

### BROOKLINE BUILDING CODE

Pursuant to the authority granted and subject to the provisions thereof by Chapter 156, Sections 1 and 5, New Hampshire Revised Statutes annotated - 1955, the following ordinance is hereby enacted by the voters of the Town of Brookline, New Hampshire in official Town Meeting convened.

1. After passage of this ordinance any person intending to erect or remodel any building shall, before doing so, obtain a building permit from the building inspector.

2. The Building Inspector shall be appointed by the Planning Board to serve for a term of three years. He shall issue any and all building permits requested within fifteen days after receiving written application for such permit accompanied by a plan of the proposed building or alteration, provided such plans are in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance. Such permits shall expire and become invalid if construction has not been started within six months from the date of issuance. He shall also inspect the building during its construction for compliance with the terms of this ordinance and report any violations to the Board of Selectmen.

3. The Building Permit fees are as follows:



Construction costing:

Under \$ 1,000	Fee \$ 2.00
\$ 1,000 to \$15,000	Fee \$ 5.00
\$15,000 and over	Fee \$10.00

This fee shall be paid to the Building Inspector when the permit is issued. The Building Inspector will remit \$1.00 and a copy of the permit to the Selectmen for the records. This fee will then be put into the Town Treasury. The balance of the fee shall be retained by the Building Inspector as compensation for his duties.

4. Buildings and alterations shall comply with the following specifications:

A. No permit for a new dwelling shall be issued unless it contains at least 720 square feet of first floor living area.

B. Foundations: All structures shall be set on solid foundations of concrete, brick, stone or other acceptable masonry except in special cases where buildings are to be used for accessory use, industrial use, warehouse and the like, the Building Inspector may waive the requirement of this section and permit the use of metal or masonry piers.

C. Buildings: Must be framed according to good building practices and outside walls shall be covered with permanent materials customarily used such as wood, fire resistant shingles, siding, cinder block or other acceptable materials. In determining good building practices, the National Building Code will be used as a standard.

D. Chimney Construction: (a) No chimney shall be built, erected or altered below the roof unless containing a tile or brick lining and with an iron clean-out door at or near its base, and shall extend at least two feet above the highest point where it passes through the roof. No chimney shall be built, erected or altered below the roof having wood or other combustible materials within one inch of the chimney and shall be supported on foundations of masonry, concrete or other non-combustible material. Pre-fabricated or factory-built chimneys that are approved by a nationally recognized testing laboratory shall be installed in accordance with the conditions of approval. An outside chimney shall have at least four inches of masonry between the lining and the abutting walls to which it is attached. Each source of combustion shall have its own separate flue. (b) No smoke pipes shall be installed or erected so as to be within twelve inches of any combustible floor, ceiling, wall or

partition unless amply protected with noncombustible material. No smoke pipe shall be installed or erected which passes into or through partitions or walls or combustible material, except when guarded by a double collar of metal with an air space of at least six inches or by at least six inches of brick or other non-combustible material.

(c) Fireplaces shall have hearths of brock, stone, tile or other approved non-combustible material supported on a fire-proof slab. Such hearths shall extend at least 16 inches outside the face of the fireplace and not less than 8 inches beyond each side of the face of the fireplace opening. The combined thickness of the hearth and supporting construction shall not be less than 6 inches at any point.

E. Roofs: No roof of any building shall be covered or recovered in whole or in part save with non-combustible or fire resistant roofing material.

F. Electrical Wiring: All electrical wiring shall conform with approved methods and practices for safety to life and property. Compliance with the National Electrical Code shall be the prima-facie evidence of such approved methods and practices.

G. Sewerage: All dwellings and all commercial, public or industrial buildings shall be connected to a private sewerage disposal system, construction of which shall comply with the requirements for individual sewerage disposal systems prescribed by the New Hampshire Resources and Pollution Control Commission.

5. This ordinance may be amended by a majority vote of any legal Town Meeting when such amendment is included in the official Town Warrant.

6. Enforcement: It shall be the duty of the Board of Selectmen and the Board is hereby given power and authority, to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

7. Separability Clause: The invalidity of any provisions of this ordinance shall not affect the validity of any other provisions.

8. Exculpatory Clause: The Building Inspector shall not in any case be liable for any damage resulting from construction done under his permit whether or not such construction is in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.

9. Penalty: Every person, persons, firm or corporation violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not more than ten dollars upon conviction for each day such violation may exist.

10. Board of Appeals: Any person aggrieved by a decision of the Building Inspector may appeal to the Board of Adjustment as set up in the Brookline Zoning and Land Use Ordinance, Article X, said Board shall have the power by a vote of a majority of its members, upon an appeal to vary the application of any provision of the Building Code to any particular case, when, in its opinion, the enforcement thereof would do manifest injustice and would be contrary to the spirit and purpose of such building regulations or public interest.

11. Effect: This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

24. To see if the Town pursuant to Chapter 36, Section 19 of R. S. A. will authorize and empower the Planning Board to approve or disapprove in its discretion plans showing streets or widening thereof and if adopted to require the Town Clerk to file with the Registrar of Deeds of the County a certificate of notice showing the Planning Board has been so authorized and giving the date of such authorization.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The year of 1970 was a very productive year for the Brookline Public Library. In March we held a poster contest, the theme being "A Theme From A Book". In April at our openhouse the posters were on display around the library. Awards were given to the winners of the contest.

Another very successful Summer Reading Program was held by Mrs. Phillips for grades one through six. There were 42 children in the program and on completion of the reading requirements, they were given a party by Mrs. Phillips and some of the Friends of the Library.

The library now has 517 registered patrons, 215 adults, and 302 children. In 1970 there were 2,733 adult books and 2,090 children's books in the library, which makes a total of 4,823 books. We have 151 phonograph records and 20 magazine subscriptions. The total circulation for 1970 was 11,070.

As always the Friends of the Library have been our very loyal supporters. For the year of 1970 the "Friends" were awarded a citation at the annual meeting at the "Wayfarer". The award was for being the outstanding group of "Friends" in the state.

Mrs. Phillips has finished her courses in "Public Library Techniques" and has received her certificate.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT  
1970

During 1970 over 1,700 phone calls were received by the police department, some requiring only a few minutes on the phone while others required several hours of police work.

We received over 800 complaints that resulted in some 2,200 hours of police work and traveled some 15,000 miles in the performance of duty.

Our court activity was fairly heavy with 95 persons being summoned to court with 93 convictions and over \$1,500.00 in fines levied by the District Court in Milford, New Hampshire.

Because of many complaints received by the Police Department and the Board of Selectmen relating to speeding in the village, it was decided by the Chief of Police and the Board of Selectmen to purchase a radar unit to cope with violators and to reduce the speed in the interest of public safety.

The radar was put into use about August first and during the first ninety days, only warnings were issued. We felt that by issuing warnings, posting the roads to the effect that radar was being used and letting it be known that we were now using radar to enforce our speed limits we were certainly being fair with the motorist.

Since it was purchased, the radar has been used 29 times on various roads and streets; this resulted in 243 warnings and 18 summons to court being issued.

In closing, I would like to thank the many citizens of Brookline who have supported and cooperated with the Police Department.

- Article 11. We raised \$100.00 for Civil Defense.
- Article 12. We raised \$603.11 for State Aid for highway improvements.
- Article 13. We raised \$500.00 for Merrimack Valley Home Health Care Association.
- Article 16. We accepted the Edwin E. Smith lot to be administered by the Conservation Commission.
- Article 18. We accepted a gift of land from the Eli and Bessie Cohen Camp Foundation to be known as the Max Cohen Memorial Grove.
- Article 19. We voted to establish a Recreation Commission and elected the following members: 3 years - Rodney Wright, Jr. and Carl Anderson; 2 years - Sidney Hall and James Tucker; 1 year - Quentin Young.
- Article 22. We raised \$300.00 for cutting, spraying, and removal of trees.
- Article 23. We raised \$500.00 for cutting brush.
- Article 24. We authorized the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 25. We authorized a 2% discount on property taxes paid within 30 days.
- Article 26. We authorized the Tax Collector to accept prepayment of taxes in amounts not less than \$10.00 or any amount divisible by 10.
- Article 27. We authorized a twenty cent penalty on Poll Taxes unpaid after December 1st.
- Article 28. We raised \$400.00 for care of cemeteries.
- Article 29. We authorized the Town Trustees to set a price on cemetery lots.
- Article 30. We raised \$250.00 for Radio Equipment Fund.
- Article 31. We raised \$200.00 for Water Hole Fund.
- Article 32. We voted to raise the Firemen's pay to \$2.25 per hour.

- Article 33. We raised \$1,500.00 for New Hose & Fire Equipment Fund.
- Article 34. We raised \$825.00 for Group Alerting and Dispatch System.
- Article 35. We Raised \$2,000.00 for Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund.
- Article 36. We voted to join the Souhegan Mutual Aid Fire District and the North Middlesex Mutual Aid Fire District.
- Article 37. We voted to adopt as official names the names of the roads shown on map.
- Article 38. We voted to raise \$500.00 to purchase and erect road signs.
- Article 40. We voted to raise \$3,000.00 toward drawing of Town Map.
- Article 43. We voted to have the Board of Selectmen and Mr. Hal Taylor take up the matter of Bear Hill Village roads between them and report to the next Town Meeting.
- Article 44. We voted to authorize and direct the Board of Selectmen to execute and deliver to the Melendy Pond Authority a deed to the Melendy Pond Tract.
- Article 45. We voted to accept two legacies for care of cemetery lots.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:35 AM. Total monies raised - \$68,334.11.

## REPORT OF BROOKLINE RECREATION COMMISSION

The Recreation Commission met 12 times during the year. By unanimous agreement of its 5 members, the Commission accepted the responsibility for the following program:

### A. MAX COHEN MEMORIAL GROVE

This project, in its second year, ran smoothly as a self-supporting enterprise. 129 families joined the Grove and their dues of \$15.00 per family covered all of the operational costs and some of the Capital Improvement cost. (See Treasurer's Report) However, many improvements were made due to the generosity of interested citizens. The low swampy area was filled in at no charge by Clarence Farwell who also donated additional sand for the beach area. A rugged raft was built, and seven picnic tables constructed and installed on the grounds. A new parking lot was made possible with finish grading and fine fill applied. Many hours of donated labor by Brookline citizens has made this area one which the Town can be proud of.

The Commission is interested in the safeguarding of the lake as a swimming area and is conducting tests on its pollution level in conjunction with the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission. The last tests were taken Oct. 5, 1970 and showed the lake water to be in excellent range in lowness of both bacteria and phosphate levels.

### B. REDCROSS SWIMMING LESSONS

This 3-233k program was run at the Max Cohen Memorial Grove during the morning hours. Mr. David Groff was the instructor and 104 swimmers participated. A fee of 50¢ per pupil was charged and the instructor received a pay of \$150.00

### C. BALL PARK

The Commission held several meetings with the representatives from Little League, Babe Ruth League and other interested citizens. Tom Moran attended as Consulting Engineer and Surveyor. An overall, long range plan was formulated that would make the Ball Park into a Town Park that would offer many recreational facilities. Basically, the plan calls for a Little League diamond, Babe Ruth diamond, and Hard Ball diamond, and regulation size hot-topped hockey and skating area that would convert into tennis, basketball and volleyball courts in the summer. The whole area

would be landscaped and the facilities laid out with a minimum disturbance of existing trees. Meetings between the Commission and Selectmen were held and the plan given the approval by the Selectmen. A certain amount of progress was made in the grading, clearing, etc., before winter, and work will continue immediately upon the arrival of spring.

#### D. SUMMER RECREATIONAL PROGRAM

The Commission was able to present a Summer Recreational Program for the town youngsters, 6-14 years of age. This program was made possible by the Spaulding Potter Foundation, through the N.H. State Office of Economic Opportunity. Brookline was one of 5 towns in the state selected for this project, with the understanding that if it were successful, the Town would vote at its next Town Meeting whether it wished to continue the program at the Town's expense.

Miss. Betti Conti of Milford was hired as the program's Recreational Director. The program ran for 8 weeks and made use of the Max Cohen Memorial Grove facilities in the mornings and the Ball Park and Youth Center in the afternoons. Total registration was 100 youngsters, with an average attendance of 45 each day. The Recreation Commission feels that it is a worthwhile program but that it should be limited to mornings only. It wishes to thank all of the Town's people who contributed so generously of their time in making the program a success.

# WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

## The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the School district in the town of Brookline qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the fourth day of March 1971, at eight o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

2. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

# ADMINISTRATOR'S SCHOOL REPORT

To the citizens of Brookline:

The year into the decades of the 70's has passed quickly and with it some of the educational goals that have been set for the decade have been met.

Change continues to be especially urgent as we provide education for increasing number of students, for longer spans of productive life, at far higher levels of understanding, competence, and always with the goal of strengthening our democratic way of life.

Educating is never an easy task in this age of constant change and discovery. To encourage individual potentialities we must keep looking at the child in a multi-dimensional way if we are to understand what is happening to this generation. A fresh look is required due to the rapid change in the child's environment.

The task calls for continued re-examination and realignment of educational priorities to see that what we are doing is the best that can be done. In this re-examination, we continue to include all the component parts of a school - students, staff, curriculum and facilities.

A Volunteer Teacher Aide Program, under the direction of Mrs. Barbara Coon, Co-ordinator, and Mr. Richard Maghakian, Principal, continues this year. The children being helped by the aides have shown much progress in their reading and over-all education levels. Mr. Maghakian and the staff wish to express their sincere thanks to the Volunteer Aides for their time and concern.

Our school secretary, Mrs. Mary Dulac, continues to ease the burden of the ever-increasing non-teaching paperwork. This allows the teachers and the principal to devote more time to the actual teaching duties.

Mrs. Margaret McInnis continues to be our school nurse. Again, no report of our staff and school would be complete without mentioning the continuous concern and dedication of Mrs. Eliza Wright, school custodian.

Mrs. Betty Hall, Reading Consultant, continues to give her useful direction to Brookline Elementary School. Miss Ann Shervanian, Speech Therapist, works with those students who display the need of help in speech. Miss Marie Ciaraldi, The Guidance Counselor/Title I Director for Supervisory Union #40, and her aide work closely



with the staff.

Under the supervision of Mr. George Marineau and Mr. Richard Maghakian, an intramural sports program continues to be developed with much enthusiasm and involvement of the students.

It is the citizens' responsibility to continue to invest in the kind of education which will produce good future citizens. This responsibility costs money, but it is an investment we can ill afford to ignore. For it is the purpose of our school system to provide such opportunities that our young people may develop to the full extent of their ability and become responsible, contributing citizens of our community, state and nation.

We are grateful to the staff and citizens of Brookline, School Board members and all others who have helped to make our first year into the new decade a successful one.

# SYNOPSIS OF ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING

March 5, 1970

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Thomas I. Arnold, at 8:00 p.m. The warrant was read, and because of absence of the clerk, nominations were accepted for a clerk pro tempore. Cynthia Fottler was nominated by Rachel Petersen, and the nominations were closed. It was moved by Marcia Farwell that the school board be instructed to cast a single ballot for Mrs. Fottler, and it was seconded by Beatrice Hall. The meeting opened for business under Article 1.

## Article 1

Beatrice Hall moved that Article 1 be passed over and acted upon with the Budget Article. The motion was seconded by Allan Fessenden.

Motion put to a voice vote and the ayes carried.

## Article 2

The motion was made by Marjorie Soper that all reports appearing in the 1969 Town Report be accepted. It was seconded by Beatrice Hall.

The motion was put to a voice vote and the ayes carried.

## Article 3

Eddy Whitcomb moved that the Town Auditors serve as School Auditors. It was seconded by Marjorie Soper.

Put to a voice vote and the ayes carried.

## Article 4

Beatrice Hall moved that the district vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire or from any other source. It was seconded by Manual Agran.

Put to a voice vote and the ayes carried.

## Article 5

Marjorie Soper moved that the district vote to establish a capital reserve fund for the purchase of school buses and to transfer the balance remaining in the transportation account to this fund. It was seconded by Beatrice Hall.

Mrs. Florence Palmer asked what amount was to be put into the fund this year. Beatrice Hall answered \$2,500. Mrs. Hall said that the estimated cost per bus will be \$8,000, and that the total approximate price will be \$20,000. Carl Anderson asked what the comparison between leasing and purchase was. Beatrice Hall said that leasing was slightly more. Manual Agran asked if upkeep, insurance, drivers, etc., had been taken into consideration. Marjorie Soper said that they are still investigating all costs. Approximately one-half of the school districts in New Hampshire own their own buses. If buses are not purchased, the fund can be turned into the capital reserve fund for school additions.

Motion put to a vote and the ayes carried.

Ayes - 28

Nays - 18

## Article 6

Eddy Whitcomb moved that the district vote to raise and appropriate \$5,000 for the capital reserve fund for the construction of future classrooms. It was seconded by Marjorie Soper.

Philip Chandler asked when classrooms were anticipated. Marjorie Soper said in approximately 3 years. Ernest Kulik asked how much was in the capital reserve fund now, and the answer was \$5,234.

Put to a vote and the ayes carried.

## Article 7

Beatrice Hall moved that the district vote to raise and appropriate \$279,477.16 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the district. It was seconded by Marjorie Soper.

Motion put to a voice vote and the ayes carried.

Article 8

Allan Fessenden moved that the meeting be recessed to the 10th day of March at 7:30 p.m., at which time ballots would be counted. Seconded by Carl Clifford.

Motion put to a voice vote and ayes carried without dissent.
