THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Campton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Campton on Tuesday, the Eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of its highways and bridges and make appropriation of the same.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for Campton Cemetery, also to clean up and fence other cemeteries in Town.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Memorial Day.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.

- 10. (By petition). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be paid to the Campton Volunteer Fire Dept., for the extinguishment of fires in said town.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to lay out and rebuild or repair the road on the West side of Mad River from the Westerly approach of Chase Bridge so-called passed the residence of Walter Washburn connecting with the road leading to Campton Upper Village and appropriate money for the same.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of Agents and officers heretofore chosen.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

According to State Law the polls cannot be closed before six o'clock P. M.

- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the District.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees, in relation to any subject embraced in this Warrant.
- 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will authorize the School Board to enter into a contract with Plymouth School District to pay \$165.00 per pupil for high school tuitions for the school year 1949-50.

- 10. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to study the feasibility of the Campton School District becoming a member of a cooperative School District. request the State Board of Education to assist in the preparation of a plan for the proposed cooperative School District and prepare a complete report to the School District for presentation at either a special meeting called in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Laws, Chapter 139, or at the next annual School District meeting.
- 11. To see if the District will raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$150.00 to be used by the School Board in the preparation of the report so voted in Article 10.
- 12. To see if the District will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

I herewith submit my report as school nurse from September 1947 to July, 1948.

27 children attended the dental clinics held at Plymouth 12 of whom received free care and 15 paid part cost. The Red Cross helped with these cases. Two children had examinations and glasses through the Sight Conservation Program of the State Public Welfare. Three children had chest x-rays by the New Hampshire Tuberculosis Ass'n.

Frequent talks on cleanliness, nutrition, posture, dental care and the value of correction of defects were given. The teachers also gave daily health inspection.

13 cases of measles and 17 of whooping cough were reported.

The inspection in the Fall of 1948 was made with the following symptoms of defects noticed.

Corrections are being made and some children have reported that they have had the fluorine treatment for prevention of tooth decay.

106 children in the 3rd to 8th grades inclusive had the audiometer test in September with 17 showing some hearing loss. Possibly some of these conditions were due to colds but it is advisable that these children see their physicians to be sure that no progressive deafness occurs.

The vision test was given this year with the Massachusetts Vision Chart used. 11 children were advised to go to their oculists for examinations.

I attended several nurses meetings, the State Teachers Institute and the Health Work Shop which was held at Keene Teachers College the first week in September, at which I received much inspiration and help.

The fine cooperation of Parents, Children, Teachers, School Board and Superintendent is greatly appreciated.

WALTER I. LEE EDUCATIONAL TRUST FUND

A substantial legacy from the estate of the late Walter I. Lee has established an educational trust fund which is to be administered by the Campton School Board. The income only may be used to assist individually deserving young people either in the schools of Campton or in institutions of higher learning.

- At a regular meeting of the Campton School Board held Wednesday, June 23, 1948, the decision was made to use funds now available to assist Campton students in college or other educational institutions beyond high school. Plans for administration of the trust fund are here stated for the information of the public and especially of those who desire to make application for assistance.
- 1. The Campton School Board will make loans on written application of students in college or other post-secondary institutions.
- 2. The amount to be awarded to any applicant shall not exceed \$200 in any one year and it shall be in the form of a loan, with or without interest at the rate of two per cent per annum at the option of the borrower.
- 3. Successful applicants shall be required to sign a note payable to the order of the Campton School Board.
- 4. Charges on interest-bearing notes shall not begin until one year after completion of the college or other post-secondary course for which the loan is made or withdrawal of the student from such course.
- 5. Interest payments and payments on the principal shall not be due until one year after completion of the college or other post-secondary course for which the loan is made or withdrawal of the student from further post-secondary attendance.
- 6. Loans shall be repaid in full not later than six years after completion of the college or other post-secondary course for which the loans were made or withdrawal of the borrower from such course.

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- 7. Interest and payments on loan principal shall be added to loan funds in the hands of the Campton School Board and used for further loans.
- 8. At any time when the total of loan applications exceeds the amount of available loan funds, the Campton School Board shall have the right to accept such applications only as may be found by them to be most deserving and within the amount then available for distribution.
- 9. After one year of successful college or other postsecondary work, loans may be increased by whatever amount over the stipulated \$200 the Campton School Board may determine expedient and proper.
- 10. At their discretion and to meet unexpected contingencies, the Campton School Board may alter loan conditions, provided no loan or loans already made shall be affected by such alteration of conditions.

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Campton School Board:

In my sixth annual report now submitted you will find a discussion of school operation and needs that may be of interest to Campton people and helpful to you in formulating school policy. Statistical tables, formerly included but always of doubtful value, have been omitted this year.

The school census of 1948 showed that while Campton school population will increase somewhat in the next ten years, that increase will not be as great as many other school districts must absorb. So far as any present facts are known, we can provide necessary school facilities in the six existing schools although some transfer of pupils may be found advisable.

The chief concern for Campton is how high school pupils can be provided for in the ten-year period immediately ahead. Until after the Plymouth School District meeting in March we shall not know whether present arrangements can be continued indefinitely. In the meantime Campton people are being given information that should help them decide whether they desire membership in a Cooperative School District if the school districts now discussing it are able to organize one. Until such tie as the different districts now considering the establishment of a cooperative high school have recorded their decisions, the continued availability of high school privileges will remain an open question. It would be greatly to the advantage of pupils from all interested districts if the resources of all could be pooled to buy more and better service than any single one can provide acting alone.

In the face of higher salaries and an acute shortage of elementary teachers we have been fortunate to keep a complete teaching staff in our schools. Whenever a crisis has seemed imminent, some former teacher has come out of retirement to fill the gap. We can

only hope that the same good fortune continues. However, if it is to continue we shall have to recognize that our salaries are low as compared with nearby districts and the state as a whole and apply corrective measures before it is too late. My 1949 budget recommendations will carry specific proposals whose adoption should improve our chances of retaining competent teachers.

Textbooks and other instructional materials are excellent but much of our school furniture is obsolete and almost beyond further use. Since desk and chair units are procurable on delayed delivery it would be wise for us to make annual replacements of at least fifteen units until all pupils have modern and approved seating. A start was made in 1948 when eighteen units were purchased.

Playground space at every school is too limited as measured by present standards but such as we have could be improved without incurring too much expense. For example, both Branch and Blair Schools could be given much better play space in the school yards if a moderate amount of filling and surfacing were done. In both places the yards border on a main traffic line which makes it necessary for recess and noon activities to be kept well back out of danger. Mud and uneven surfaces have been changed in many places by an application of hot top. The need at Livermore is less than at Branch and Blair only because traffic is lighter.

Heating in the four one-room schools was improved by the installation of oil-burning equipment which maintains more even and constant heat. Temperature control was made still more economical and satisfactory by insulating ceilings. It is always good policy to make repairs and improvements promptly when the need is felt and financial conditions permit.

Since last September our children have had more instruction in music than formerly. Mr. Stephen E. Childs, who teaches music in all schools, has been employed full time in six of the seven districts in this Union instead of for two and one-half days per week

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as a year ago. The values one receives from an appreciation and understanding of music, cannot be reckoned in terms of money; but in terms of poise, personal satisfaction, and easy adjustment to every day living those values are immeasurable. Many a person of my generation whose opportunities did not equal those enjoyed by the pupils in our schools will agree with that statement.

Because of our scattered schools it would be next to impossible to operate a complete hot lunch program. It would be equally difficult to determine which of the schools should enjoy such benefits while others are excluded. However, it is recommended that the district give whatever assistance and encouragement may be within the means at our disposal. Better health and school accomplishment seem to result from hot lunch programs.

My relations with Campton people have at all times been friendly and pleasant. Teachers and pupils have cooperated splendidly. The school board members have evidenced genuine interest and helpfulness throughout our working together. These things are very much appreciated.
