TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chatham in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town House in said Chatham on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at 6:30 of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will allow a 2% discount on all property taxes paid within 30 days of mailing tax bill.

4. To see if the Town will raise \$100.00 for Civil Defense.

5. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$8,250.00 for Solid Waste Disposal (use of Fryeburg Dump).

6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$310.16 for membership dues to North Country Council, Inc.

7a. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$1,173.95 as our share of Fryeburg Rescue.

7b. To see if the Town will raise the sum of \$650.00 payable to the Fryeburg Rescue so that the Fryeburg Rescue may invest this money in an interest bearing account, these funds are solely to be used toward the purchase of a new rescue vehicle.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the support of the Eastern Slope Airport Authority.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$302.00 to assist Carroll County Mental Health Services.

10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$450.00 for the support of the Children and Youth Project of Mt. Washington Valley.

11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$305.00 for the Visiting Nurse Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc., said sum being equal to \$1.35 per person in the Town of Chatham. This represents a 25% reduction in last year's per capita request. Based on the 1989 figures from the Office of State Planning, the current census in Chatham is 226.

12a. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$150.00 for the support of the Community Outreach Program.

12b. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$200.00 for the support of the Big Brothers Big Sisters Organization also administered by the Tri-County Community Action Program.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$100.00 in support of the Lovell Youth Recreation Program.

14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$113.00 for the Early Intervention Program (birth to 3 years) of Children Unlimited, Inc., said sum being equal to \$.50 per person in Chatham.

15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$225.00 to help defray the operating expenses of the services and programs as carried out by the Mt. Washington Chapter of the American Red Cross.

16. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate \$12,118.00 for the Saco Valley Fire Association, \$5,000.00 to be paid out of surplus.

17. To see if the Town will adopt the following: "Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72: 1C which authorizes any town or city to elect not to assess, levy and collect a Resident Tax?"

18a. To see if the Town will adopt the following:

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72: 35 Section IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service connected total disability? The optional exemption is \$1,400.00, rather than \$700.00.

18b. To see if the Town will adopt the following:

Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:²⁵~~35~~ part V & VI for an optional veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for Veterans seeking the exemption? The optional veterans exemption is \$100.00, rather than \$50.00.

19. To see what action the Town will take on budget sbmittal by the Budget Committee.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

FRYEBURG RESCUE

During 1990, Fryeburg Rescue made 373 runs, 42 less than last year. This represents a 10% decrease over last year. The year of 1989 was an exceptional year. We had several months that 35 or more runs were made. The breakdown per town is as follows: Fryeburg 230, Brownfield 64, Lovell 33, North Fryeburg 16, Chatham 16, Stow 8 and East Conway 6.

At present time we have 58 members. We had 4 new members join our ranks this year. Emergency Medical Technicians represent 60% of our squad and Ambulance Attendants 25%. This year we had 4 members complete the EMT-1 course. The squad also applied to the State to upgrade the licenture level of the Squad to allow the EMT-1's to practice at that level.

Over 4452 volunteer man hours were contributed in 1990 to serve their communities. In addition our members put in approximately 2000 hours toward continuing education. These hours spent, allow us to give high quality care and to best serve friends and neighbors and summer residents. Rescue members participated in Alternative Learning Day, held at local grammar schools and were also a part of the Main Street '90 activities held in July.

The Junior Rescue Squad has seen some changes. One of their members graduated and they recruited four new members in their fall membership drive. The new members are presently participating in a training course to obtain their Ambulance Attendants License. Over the year the Junior Squad had a Chem Free Dance to raise money for jackets and supplies. Again this year we would like to thank Fryeburg Academy for allowing members of the Squad to come in and talk with students who showed interest in joining the Junior Squad.

This past year has seen many changes in the surrounding communities. Each year the members of the Rescue Squad are called upon to help neighbors and members of the community at all times of the day or night. We all gladly give our time to make living in their town safe and secure. You have to keep in mind, in order for the Rescue Squad to continue their services and to keep the care up to date, we need your continuing support and are grateful for the generous contributions that are sent to us.

We hope to continue to serve our friends and neighbors in the coming years, and will strive to keep the care to the highest quality.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL

North Country Council is the non-profit regional planning commission serving 51 towns in northern New Hampshire. The Council's primary mission is to meet the planning and development needs of its member towns. Specific assistance presently available from the North Country Council includes municipal planning, economic development, community development, solid waste, transportation, water management, GIS mapping and resource management. When requested, the Council provides professional guidance and assistance to Boards of Selectmen, Planning Boards, Zoning Boards of Adjustment, Conservation Commissions and Solid Waste Districts in member communities.

Assistance provided to the Town of Chatham in 1990 included:

- * Continuing its support for regional economic development initiatives;
- * Providing regional transportation planning services;
- * Hosting a Mount Washington Valley meeting to review and discuss regional planning issues.

In 1990, the Council also provided a variety of services on a regional level. For example, workshops were held informing local officials of excavation site requirements, innovative zoning, shoreline protection, river management and cultural resources. The Council worked closely with economic development committees throughout the region. The Council's very active Transportation Committee focused on local and regional highway, air and rail issues. NCC's Solid Waste Coordinator continued to advocate regional solid waste management while working with five area solid waste districts.

In the ensuing year North Country Council's work program emphasizes community and economic development at the subregional and local level, while continuing the existing focus in solid waste and transportation. Under the leadership of our newly-hired Executive Director, Preston S. Gilbert, NCC is fully committed to providing timely service to its member towns.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN
AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1990, the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were fires kindled without a fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden, permit fires that escaped control and rekindled fires. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help.

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when the ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forests and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1990, including a 262 acre fire on Moultonboro and several fires in Hooksett.

In 1990, the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands trained 844 local Wardens and Deputy Wardens in the Incident Command System (ICS), an incident management system for all types of emergencies. In 1991, Wardens will be trained in the use of Class A foam in wildfire suppression.

CHATHAM HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Chatham Veterans Memorial was dedicated on Sunday, 12 August 1990. The idea of having a memorial for all Chatham veterans was created by the Historical Society who raised the funds necessary for the completion of this project. The Dedication was attended by residents of Chatham, seasonal residents, and from local communities. Herbert Eastman, Selectman, served as master-of-ceremonies; the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars participated in the colorful ceremonies; and Sheriff Roy Larson was the keynote speaker. It is hoped that a light will be installed so the flag that flies over the Memorial will be illuminated at night. The sale of Chatham tee shirts, sweat shirts, and coffee mugs along with donations provided the funds for the Memorial.

The present project of the Society is the undercroft of the library which will be the Chatham Historical Museum. The room has been completely cleaned and painted and plans for the furnishings, lamps, and items of Historical interest are going ahead. Although this museum is a project of the Historical Society, it will depend upon donations and interest from all in Chatham. As is true of all town activities, volunteers are depended upon to work for the museum. Old maps, correspondence, diaries, journals, pictures are all needed as well as small tables, chairs, and other furnishings.

In November, 1990, the Society shipped boxes to young people of Chatamites who are serving in the Gulf War. All items for the boxes were donated by members and non-members; packaged, wrapped and sent air mail to the Gulf.

The Society's newsletter, The Chatham Times, is issued every three months and is sent to all members, subscribers, and other historical societies. The Chatham Times carries stories of early Chatham; pictures of scenery and old buildings; a reporting of the activities of the Society, and library information on new books and resources the library offers for research projects.

The Society meets monthly on the third Tuesday, dues are \$6 a year; and membership is open to all. Please join and support the Chatham Historical Society. Volunteer for museum work. Donate cash or other items for the museum. It is your Town - Your Society - Your Museum.

Voted Yes.

Article 7. Motioned and seconded that we vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, the sum on Money, for the payment of salaries for school district officials and agents and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Discussions on why it seems like there is so much over budgeted, than what we would use. Why was there a \$88,000 surplus last year? Board said that they had to allow for extra kids. Mentioned if our SAU #9 share would go up if more Districts pull out. Mr. Jutras replied that if it did, it would be only by \$100.00. Asked why we are paying for legal fees and also paying for legal council through SAU fees. Mr. Jutras said it depended on the circumstance. Asked why the Reserve has gone up for the bus. The Board replied that we only have 3-4 years for our current bus. Voted no on the sum of \$251,844. Motioned and seconded that

we amend the budget, and the total amount to be raised as \$238,844. Voted Yes. Voted Yes to raise the amount of \$238,844.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION

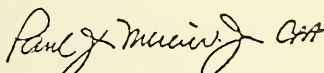
To the Members of the

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the School Administrative Unit No. 9 and the individual fund financial statements of the School Administrative Unit as of and for the year ended June 30, 1990, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the School Administrative Unit's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1B, the general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the General Fixed Asset Account Group, which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The amount that should be recorded in the General Fixed Asset Account Group is not known.

In our opinion, except that omission of the General Fixed Asset Account Group results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the above paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the School Administrative Unit No. 9 at June 30, 1990, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the School Administrative Unit at June 30, 1990, and the results of operations of such funds for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.
