WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE The Polls Will Be Open From 12 A.M. to 6 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Columbia, in the County of Coos, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Columbia Town Hall on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at 7:00 o'clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To vote to bring in ballots for election of Town Officers to be elected by ballot for the year ensuing.
- Article. 2. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required.
- Article. 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$30,000.00 for Town Charges for the ensuing year.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$2,500.00 for extinguishing fires in said Town.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for standby fire protection to the Town of Stratford.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$990.00 to help support the operation of the Colebrook Communications Center.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 to help support the services of the Upper Connecticut Valley Mental Health Service.
- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200.00 to help support the services of the Vershire Center.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for maintenance of Ambulance District A-1 services.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 to the Upper Connecticut Valley Hospital Association to cover medical emergencies.

- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for operating expenses and matching funds of the Northern Coos Community Health Association.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 for mowing and maintaining cemeteries.
- Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$12,000.00 to be added to the capital reserve fund towards the revaluation of the town.
- Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10,000.00 to be placed in capital reserve fund for the purpose of a new tax map.
- Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$250.00 for the North Country Council.
- Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$4,000.00 for the support of the poor.
- Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$365.00 for support of the Community Outreach Program.
- Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,200.00 for the purpose of appraising buildings, mobile homes, land transfers, etc. to keep the Town at its present valuation.
- Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$12,000.00 for the maintenance of summer roads and bridges.
- Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$30,000.00 for the maintenance of winter roads.
- Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to extend its winter road maintenance past the Stoddard Road to the Smith house on the Bungy loop a distance of approximately ½ mile.
- Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire an administrative assistant to the Board of Selectmen and appropriate money for the same.
- Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to establish a conservation committee of 3-7 members and 2 alternate members in accordance with RSA 36-A. Said members to be appointed within 30 days of the annual meeting by the Selectmen, who shall also designate a temporary chairman for the purpose of calling the first meeting of the commission.

- Article 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to accept private donations of land, interest in land or money to be deposited into the conservation fund for the purpose of contributing to the local matching portion required for acquiring conservation land or interest in land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use under State and Federal programs, and authorize the Selectmen to apply for and accept the State and Federal matching funds for the purposes of acquisition of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land. Said appropriated or donated funds and State and Federal matching funds may be expended by majority vote of the conservation commission.
- Article. 25. To authorize the selectmen to accept and expend \$35,759.33 (estimated) revenue from the State Highway Department (Block Grant Aid) for additional maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class V highways.
- Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25,078.20 to the Town of Colebrook for waste disposal.
- Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150.00 to the Colebrook Library.
- Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of septic waste by joining with other Towns, if voted and accepted at their 1988 Town Meetings. This waste to be disposed of at the County Land, which has been offered to us at a dollar a year lease for a period of twenty years. The system has been designed and is estimated to cost \$60,000.00, which will be divided equally by the Towns that accept this venture. The dumping fee was discussed at \$50.00 per tank to maintain this system.

If this acticle is accepted, the Town will vote to raise and appropriate funds to be used for this disposal.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of septic waste at the Groveton septic station, which at this time has been arranged by the Selectmen for a dumping fee of \$60.00 per tank, with no limits to amounts. If some time in the future they cannot take our septic waste, they will give us ample time to make other arrangements.

If this article is accepted the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 as a standby fee to guarantee the Town of Groveton their dumping fee.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of the taxes for the ensuing year and pay such debts out of tax money when same is received.

- Article 31. To see if the Town will allow the Selectmen to apply for State or Federal Funds.
- Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept aid relative to disasters and incur debts for temporary loans for same should the need arise.
- Article 33. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.
- Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply any surplus remaining in their hands at the end of the fiscal year 1987 to the defraying of Town charges and appropriations for the year 1988 in order to effect a proportionate reduction of the amount to be raised by taxes.
- Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of agents, auditors, selectmen, and all other officers and ratify and confirm the same.
- Article 36. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

AUDITORS' REPORT

We have examined the books of the Town Clerk, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Trustee of the Trust Funds, the Planning Board, and the Selectmen. We find them to be in order and correct to the best of our knowledge and ability except for the item regarding the deposit by the selectmen to the treasurer in the total amount of \$9,884.96 for land use change tax. We wish to report on this particular item by making the following notations:

- (1) The proper channel was not used for the purpose of billing and collecting these taxes. The proper procedure for the collection of taxes is for a warrant to be issued by the selectmen to the tax collector. In the case of the land use change tax, a specific form must be filled out by the selectmen and given to the tax collector, (per R.S.A. 79-A:7 (II) (a) (b) (c). This form includes the following information: The name and address of the tax collector to whom pauments are to be sent. the assessment of land and the tax due, the billing and due date of the tax bill, the signatures of the selectmen, the name of the landowner to whom the bill should be sent, and any other pertinent information. After the bill has been paid in full, a copy of this form is to be sent to the Register of Deeds by the tax collector for in the event of uncollected taxes, a tax lien may be attached to the property. These forms were not filled out by the selectmen and given to the tax collector, therefore the proper procedure was not carried out; to the best of our knowledge.
- (2) Without this information, the auditors are not able to verify whether or not the proper amount of taxes were billed and collected, or if all the taxes due to the town of Columbia for this land use change tax has been properly assessed for 1987. It is the auditor's duty to determine if all taxes due to the town have been properly billed and collected and we can only assume

that the above mentioned figure is the entire sum that the town was entitled to for the year 1987. There is no information for billing dates or any interest collected, if necessary.

(3) Lastly, and maybe more importantly, the law states that the only people legally authorized to collect taxes are the tax collector and the deputy tax collector. We have noted where taxes were collected by a selectman and we wish to make special note of this in our report. Selectmen are not authorized or bonded to collect taxes of any kind, and any collections made by a selectman are made improperly.

Therefore no one was billed and the checks were sent to the Selectmen's office by the realtors' offices that sold this land at ten percent of the selling price. As for interest, these penalties were paid when the land was sold, so no interest had to be collected. All amounts were paid by check and those checks were turned over to the Tressurer.

We are sorry that this was printed against us, but as far as we know, we did not break any regulations.

- To determine the salaries of the School Board and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to include in the S A U #7 budget the position of Coordinator of Special Services and Secretary per RSA 189:47-a; to be effective July 1, 1989.
- 5. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to include in the S A U #7 budget the position of School Psychologist, per RSA 189:47-a; to be effective July 1, 1989.
- 6. To see if the District will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 198:20-b to authorize the school board to apply for, accept, and expend, without further action by the school district meeting, money from any source which becomes available during the fiscal year; provided further that:
 - I. Such money shall be used for legal purposes for which a School District may appropriate money.
 - II. The school board shall be required to hold a prior public hearing on any action to be taken regarding expenditures of such money.

Article 2 Vicki Bunnell made the motion to accept the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers. David Killam seconded the motion which then carried.

Article 3 Milton Adair made the motion that the School Board be authorized to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the District, any or all grants for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or the United States. David Killam seconded the motion and the vote was in the affirmative.

Article 4 Mary Lou Placy made and James Lawrence seconded the motion that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$489,275.00 for the support of schools, for the payment of salaries of School District Officials and Agents, and for the payment of the statutory obligations of the District. Mark Hill raised questions as to the relative cost of our present area agreement as compared to the cost of buying into the Colebrook School system. Perley Davis, Business Administrator, spoke to the issue giving comparative costs from several surrounding towns in the District and discussion ensued culminating in an affirmative vote on the original motion as presented.

There being no further business, Milton Adair moved to adjourn. Isabelle Parkhurst seconded and the meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

There has been a great deal of discussion and publicity pertaining to Minimum Standards for our schools. To meet some of these standards at the high school level the curriculum has had to expand significantly in the past few years.

An approved high school must now offer, as a minimum, the following units of credit (1 unit is equivalent to a full year of course work):

Arts Education (3 units) At least one must be in visual arts and one in music.

Business Education (5 units) Three units in business communication, one in maintaining numerical records, and one unit in basic business and economic education.

Computer Education (1/2 unit) This consists of awareness, operation, and programming.

Consumer and Homemaking Education (3 units) Areas of study must include Food and Nutrition, Human Growth and Child Care, Clothing and Textiles, Parenthood Education, Family Living, and Housing.

Driver Education (1/4 unit) 30 hours of classroom instruction and 8 hours of driving.

English Language Arts (6 units) Four units required of all students; two elective units.

Foreign Language (5 units) A three year sequence of one language and a two year sequence of another.

Industrial Arts (4 units) At least one unit from each of the following areas: Energy and Power, Materials and Process Technology, and Visual Communication Technology.

Mathematics (6 units) A sequence of four units for college bound students and a two year sequence for other students.

Physical Education (2 units) Body dynamics, dance, group games, individual sports, outdoor activities, gymnastics, and team sports.

Science Education (5 units) Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Earth Science, or Advanced Science.

Social Studies (5 Units) One unit of United States and New Hampshire History and Government: Three units of economics, geography, and world history; one unit from psychology, sociology, anthropology, political science, and philosophy.

Because all districts in S A U #7 are either sending districts or receiving districts, it is noteworthy that RSA 194:23-e states, "In order to be entitled to accept tuition students, a public high school must be approved by the state board of education."

Beginning with the Class of 1989, a graduate must successfully complete a minimum of 19 3/4 units from the 45 units offered as follows:

Art 1/2; Computers 1/2; English 4; Math 2; Science 2 (1 physical, 1 biological); Social Studies 2 1/2; Physical Education 1; Health Education 1/4; 3 units from at least two of the following areas: Art, Foreign Language, Practical Arts, or Vocational Education; 4 units from other electives.

School programs must also offer extra-curricular activities plus the necessary support services such as administration, guidance, special education, nurse, library, school lunch, and custodial services.

Looking at existing facilities it is clear that, overall, student enrollments do not present an immediate problem. However, to accommodate the required programs makes it necessary to refurbish areas in existing facilities and also to expand. Our schools also must become accessible to the handicapped.

These issues are now being discussed and analyzed by educators and board members. The problems will not disappear and must be addressed. Necessary improvements must be made and they will cost money. School boards have spent many hours studying options and will present their best recommendations for cost effectiveness, yet also what they consider best for educating youngsters on a long range basis.

Final decisions will rest with all of us, as voters. We must stay informed, participate, and vote whenever possible.

COORDINATOR OF SPECIAL SERVICES

There were approximately 100 students in special education throughout S A U #7 during the 1986-1987 school year. With very few exceptions, these students were placed within programs in local schools.

Two staff members are working toward certification in special education under a program set up by the State Department - Pool Expansion Plan (P E P). While there is a general teacher shortage, the shortage in special education is at a critical level nationally. School districts in S A U #7 are fortunate to have all positions filled and two individuals dedicated enough to special education to seek appropriate certification to continue in this field.

A Preschool Parent Advisory Committee has been set up. The purpose of this Committee is to meet four times a year with school personnel and all parents of preschool special education students to review special education laws and local processes and procedures. In time, this Advisory Committee should consist of parents of special education students at any grade level. Participation in this committee has provided for better understanding and more positive interaction between home and school.

The tutorial program for vocationally disadvantaged students has been re-established. Students who qualify for and participate in this program have benefited greatly.

The special services program within S A U #7 is one in which I have been able to take great pride because of the dedication of staff members and commitment of school board members. Most importantly, is the educational benefit received by our special education students because of this dedication and commitment.

GUTDANCE COUNSELOR'S REPORT

The Guidance Department at Colebrook Academy experienced another solid year. The senior class was a pleasure to work with and nearly seventy percent decided to pursue some form of post-secondary education. The services of Educational Talent Search were extended to reach into the Sophomore and Junior classes to hopefully encourage more students in those classes to consider further education.

Having received the results of the state testing for grades four, eight and ten, the decision was made to use the same tests the state uses (Test of Cognitive Skills and California Achievement Test) for all grades in order to provide consistency in the testing program.

I represented Colebrook in the North Country Collaborative for the Gifted and Talented. As a result we were able to offer several workshors for teachers and an opportunity for some seniors and juniors to take college level courses.

A career exploration program was developed for the eighth grade, as well as a component to be integrated into the ninth grade. I was able to spend more time at the Junior High than in the past which resulted in more personal contact with students. Along this line, I would certainly support strongly any consideration the town might give to establishing a Junior High/Elementary guidance position. From my experience, I can see a real need that is not being addressed.

Scheduling at CA has become more and more time consuming as we struggle to compile a master schedule to meet the state requirements. In addition, there have been many inquiries in regard to initiating a "C" track in English and History. Presently we are exploring some of the possibilities and some of the problems.

Materials in the Guidance Office remain up-to-date, relevant, and accessible. We have added some computer software that will serve as a resource in career exploration and in the college search.

As the years go by, it becomes more and more apparent that Guidance could use some clerical help. Many professional hours a week are consumed by clerical duties.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

The school nurse is the staff member most responsible for protecting and promoting the health of all students. The goal of the school nurse is to maximize each child's potential to learn and to grow by providing the best possible health care. Our new comprehensive school health program established this year by our school physican, Dr. David Goodman, has greatly helped in meeting this goal. It follows the recommendations of the Academy of Pediatrics and the program was adopted by the local school board.

One of the more noticable changes has been the policy for sports physicals. These will now be done every three years in grades 4-7-10 and for students participating for the first time. A yearly questionnaire must be completed by each student with the help of the parents/guardians. If a health problem is noted, a physical may be required or a note from the attending physican giving the student permission to participate. The physicals will be done by appointment with a \$10 fee at our local health clinic (ISPA) which provides more privacy for the student, or may be done privately if preferred. Parents are asked to accompany their child.

We have continued with our screening procedures with more and better guidelines. Namely: vision, hearing, height, weight, blood pressure and scoliosis (curvature of the spine).

Again this year, the required health education course was part of the school health program. Many students are now qualified to do first aid and CPR. The Family Life Education was also included in the health classes and I would personally like to thank Valerie Herres for all her help with this.

As in the past, we have taken advantage of the assistance available to us from state and local agencies.

In closing, I would like to thank the parents of this community for their involvement and support, as well as school personnel. Also, I would again like to extend an invitation to parents to call or visit the nurse's office any time the need arises.

COLEBROOK BUILDING COMMITTEE REPORT

Over forty individuals volunteered their time and energy to serve on committees to investigate the education and facility requirements of the Colebrook School District. Final recommendation reports were made to the Colebrook School Board in July and are on file at the S A U #7 office.

One of the recommendations stemming from the investigating committees was for the Board to seek purchase option on the Elsie Cobb property, formerly the Steven's property, on Academy Street. Communications between Mrs. Cobb and the Board resulted in the district receiving the opportunity to buy the property. A Special School District Meeting was called for November 17, 1987, at which the people authorized the purchase of the property and raised the monies for such. This and the acquisition of the Caron property have substantially changed the land area available at the Colebrook Academy site.

Doug Brown, State Consultant on Buildings and Finance, has met with the Colebrook School Board to advise the district and has submitted a report on our school utilization and facility needs.

In August, Donald Summer, our school architect for many years, informed us that he would no longer be available for district work. The search for another architectural firm ended January 28, 1988, when the Board unanimously voted to contract Architects Planning Team. We are looking forward to working with Mr. Rudolph Houk and Mr. David Buffum to find a workable solution to the district's needs.
