SELECTMEN'S ANNUAL REPORT 1998

1998 will probably be best remembered for the weather. January started out with a devastating and costly ice storm. Many of the roads in town were closed and power service was cut off for many of our residents. The ice storm was followed by torrential rains and high winds in the spring; one storm dropped almost 10 inches in a three-day period. The rain wreaked havoc with drainage facilities, rivers, lakes, caused considerable damage to the active area of the new landfill, and also washed out the Whitaker Lane Bridge. The bridge will remain closed for one more year until we receive the 80-20 funding from the state. Our compliments go to the Town Public Works Department for its efforts toward repairing all of the damage. The year's weather was capped off by the first week of December when temperatures reached almost 70 degrees; this seemed like a nice change for everyone except the skiers.

One of the larger projects that we had proposed for 1998 was the landfill expansion project. It was budgeted to take two years. However, the project bids came in substantially lower than anticipated, and it was completed under cost in only one year, and without bonding.

Looking ahead, in 1999 the Selectmen have proposed an article for the renovation and expansion of the Conway Public Library. The article will read that \$1,337,200 will be raised by bond and \$334,300 will be raised through grants and donations. This is a proposal that both the Board of Selectmen and the Library Trustees have found to be an acceptable solution to a long time concern. Public toilets seem to be another hot topic on the ballot this year. The Board has proposed that the facility in Conway Village be an addition to the Chamber of Commerce information booth and, in North Conway, the facility to be located on the site of the former Water Precinct Office building on Seavey Street. Although there has been controversy over these locations, the necessity of providing such facilities is unquestionable.

These are only two of the many Selectmen's and petitioned articles. We hope that you take the opportunity to read through these articles, and that you contact the Selectmen or Town Office with any questions.

ARTICLE 10: (Separate) To see if the Town will vote to approve a five year nine month (5 year, 9 month) contract for **EMERGENCY AMBULANCE SERVICE** between the Town of Conway and two providers (North Conway Ambulance, Inc. and Conway Village Fire District) beginning April 1, 1998, with an indefinite one (1) year rollover clause which, if not executed by the Board of Selectmen at its discretion, shall then terminate the contract at the end of the balance of the contract term. Further to raise and appropriate One Hundred Nineteen Thousand Eight Hundred Thirteen Dollars (\$119,813) to be disbursed to the two providers in accordance with the contract provisions for 1998. CONWAY TOWN WARRANT STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF CONWAY, County of Carroll, in the State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Karl Seidenstuecker Gymnasium at Kennett High School, Conway, New Hampshire, on Monday, February 1, 1999, at 7:00 p.m. for the deliberative portion of the annual Town Meeting to discuss and amend if deemed appropriate, Articles 8 and 11 through 52 hereinafter set forth. Final voting action on all Articles, 1 through 52, shall take place by ballot on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, 1999, at the Conway Community Building, East Main Street, Center Conway, New Hampshire. The polls shall open for balloting at 8:00 a.m., or as soon thereafter as the Moderator calls the meeting to order, and shall close at 7:00 p.m.

ARTICLE 1: To choose all necessary officers.

ARTICLE 2: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-19.C(5) by limiting the time of a sign erection permit to one year, and if not erected within the year term the permit expires; and deleting the completion of construction requirements now in the Ordinance. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (5-0-0).

ARTICLE 3: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-12.A(2)(e) by clarifying that an ".....on site....." storage tank is the subject of the regulation in the Center Conway Village Commercial District. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (7-0-0).

ARTICLE 4: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-6 by inserting alphabetically a definition for "Wetlands" and establishes new provisions for a new overlay district controlling wetlands by insertion of new provisions in said Ordinance at 147-11.1.1 setting forth the District, its boundaries, permitted uses, lot sizes, density, setback, lot coverage, buffer and other detail uses and special exceptions and modifying present setback in said Ordinance at Article 147-17 by adding new subparagraphs D. and E. and fixing its boundaries in said Ordinance with a new Article 147-25 integrating into the District Boundaries Article the 1997 Wetlands Composite Map to indicate presence of wetlands, and other details of certain uses and key word definitions within the District. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (4-3-0).

ARTICLE 5: To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends Conway Zoning Ordinance Article 147-6 by inserting alphabetically a definition for "Special Highway" and establishes a restriction applicable

to all Districts requiring that all utility systems shall hereafter be placed underground by adding subparagraph C. to said Ordinance at Article 147-10.1 and by establishing a new provision for a Special Highway Corridor District in said Ordinance at Article 147-14.2 along the proposed Conway Bypass stating the purposes, its boundaries, applicability, development standards, permitted uses, lot sizes, yard setbacks, buffer strips along lots and intersecting streets, development density and density credits for protective buffer strips, lot coverage, signs, lighting, building heights, parking lots and other details of certain credits and uses within this District and with insertion of new Article 147-26 to establish the actual boundaries of the District which are within 500 feet of the edge of the right-of-way and intersections of the Conway Bypass per the State of NH Bypass Plan (1993). Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (4-2-1).

ARTICLE 6. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Conway Planning Board to the Town Zoning Ordinance which creates new definitions within the Conway Zoning Ordinance at Article 147-6 for buffer, buffer for the Special Highway Corridor District, buffer for wetlands, building footprint, development (deleting the present definition and inserting a new one), footprint, parking space, scenic view or vista, sediment, shoreline, storage shed, slope, soil type, state highway, street, wetlands and wetland buffer. Recommended by the Conway Planning Board (6-0-1).

ARTICLE 7. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment No. 6 as petitioned by Rosalie F McGee and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the boundaries of the Highway Commercial District in the Town Zoning Ordinance at Article 147-22.A(3) which is in the Conway Area so as to extend the Commercial District boundary northerly along Route 16 on its westerly sideline changing the Liberty Santa Maria property which is now in the Residential/Agricultural District into the Highway Commercial District. Not recommended by the Conway Planning Board (7-0-0).

ARTICLE 8. (Bond - to be acted on by Separate Ballot) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of One Million Six Hundred Seventy One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,671,500) for the purpose of constructing an addition to the Conway Public Library, to include improvements to the existing structure; and to authorize the Selectmen to raise through borrowing up to One Million Three Hundred Thirty Seven Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$1,337,200) under the Municipal Finance Act, with the Selectmen authorized to arrange all terms and conditions of such borrowing and its repayment, to be acted on by separate ballot of the Town; with the balance of Three Hundred Thirty Four Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$334,300) to be raised through grants, gifts and other fund raising activities of the Conway Public Library Trustees and the Friends of the Conway Public Library. (2/3 vote required.) Submitted and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-2-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-1-2).

ARTICLE 9. To see whether or not the Town will vote to amend the first sentence of the Charter of the Town of Conway, Part II, Legislative Form of Government, Section XXII, Commissions, Subsection D, Conway Planning Board, by inserting the following:

...RSA 674:5, 6, 7 & 8 (Capital Improvements Program) ...

The purpose of this Charter amendment is to give the Planning Board authority and responsibility of preparing and maintaining a Capital Improvements Program. This authority requires legislative approval.

ARTICLE 10. To see whether or not the Town will vote to amend the Charter of the Town of Conway, Part II, LEGISLATIVE FORM OF GOVERNMENT, Section XXII, Commissions, Subsection D, Conway Planning Board, by deleting the second sentence and last paragraph and inserting therefor as follows:

The Planning Board shall consist of seven (7) voting members with one (1) member to be one (1) designated Selectman as a voting ex officio member and six (6) members who are residents of the Town to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen, per RSA 673:2(a) as may be amended from time to time.

No Planning Board member may be appointed to more than two (2) full consecutive three (3) year terms or serve in said office more than eight (8) consecutive years, whichever is greater. Nothing shall prohibit reappointment of said person to the Planning Board after being out of office for one (1) year.

This Amendment to become effective the second Tuesday of March in the year 2000.

The purpose of this Charter amendment is to appoint the Planning Board members instead of electing them. This change is allowed by Town Charter and is in accordance with RSA 673:2, II, (c).

ARTICLE 11. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) to be used to **repair a foundation drainage problem at the Conway Public Library**. If the Library Bond Article #8 passes, this Article shall be deemed null and void. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 12. (Operating Budget) Shall the Town of Conway raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by Special Warrant Articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant for the purposes set forth therein, totaling Six Million Two Hundred Eighty Eight Thousand Four Hundred Twenty Three Dollars (\$6,288,423). Should this article be defeated the operating budget shall be Six Million One Hundred Eighty Three Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Two Dollars (\$6,183,982) which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Conway or by law, or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-5-1).

ARTICLE 13. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) to be used to **implement the Whitaker Properties Four Year Master Plan construction**. The

monies in 1999 shall be used primarily for the relocation and renovation of the barn on the property. Any unexpended funds shall be carried over to the year 2000 to be used to offset the cost of the second year of the plan. This will be a non lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the Implementation Master Plan construction is completed or in five (5) years whichever is less. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-1).

ARTICLE 14. (Separate) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items of a one year **Collective Bargaining Agreement** for the calendar year 1999 between the Town of Conway and AFSCME #93, Local #859, **Department of Public Works**, having a total estimated contract cost for 1999 of Five Hundred Seven Thousand Three Hundred Fifty Nine Dollars (\$507,359) which amount is included in Warrant Article #12, the Operating Budget Article. No further amount of money is required to be raised and appropriated as there are no additional increases in total salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (11-0-0).

ARTICLE 15. (Separate) To see if the Town will vote to approve the cost items of a two year **Collective Bargaining Agreement** for the calendar years 1999 and 2000 between the Town of Conway and AFSCME Local #3657, **Police Department**. The total estimated contract cost for 1999 is Seven Hundred Seventy Three Thousand One Hundred Seventy Six Dollars (\$773,176). No further amount of money is required to be raised and appropriated as there are no additional increases in total salaries and benefits over those of the appropriation at current staffing levels paid in the prior fiscal year. The total estimated contract cost for the calendar year 2000 is estimated to be Seven Hundred Ninety Three Thousand Nine Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$793,960). Proposed by the Conway Police Commission. By vote of the bargaining unit membership, the contract terms were not accepted (not ratified), thereby requiring negotiations to continue with no new contract for the voters to act on. The yes/no vote, therefore, shall have no legal status or be binding in any way. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (1-2-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-7-1).

ARTICLE 16. (Separate - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4,500) to be used to supplement the Conway Village Fire District Winter Sidewalk Maintenance Operations. In future years this amount shall be contained in the Town's Highway Department Operating Budget. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (2-8-0).

ARTICLE 17. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) to be used to construct a fence at the Town's Recreational Community Building property in Center Conway on the easterly property line. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (1-9-0).

ARTICLE 18. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Dollars (\$16,000) to be used to stabilize and correct the river eroding banking of the Conway Village Cemetery. During 1998 the Town was granted \$3,656 from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to stabilize the bank, but not the funds necessary to correct the situation to prevent further occurrences. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 19. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Four Hundred and Fifty Four Dollars (\$7,454) for the purchase of a key control system for the Police Department (Town's) gasoline storage, located at the Police Department. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-1-1).

ARTICLE 20. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twelve Thousand Seven Hundred Ninety One Dollars (\$12,791) (Gross Budget) for a federal local law enforcement block grant. Of the total amount, One Thousand Two Hundred Seventy Nine Dollars (\$1,279) shall be raised by taxes as the Town's grant match, and the balance of Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Twelve Dollars (\$11,512) shall be received as revenue from the block grant. The block grant is to buy radio equipment and to set up a repeater system for the Police Department radios. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:7, VI, and will not lapse until the program money is expended or in two years, whichever is less. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 21. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Four Hundred and Fifty Six Dollars (\$16,456) for the purpose of complete connection of wiring to the existing generator transfer switch, relocation of existing electronic striker control box, exterior cameras for outside the Police Station building and a monitor and time lapse recorder and multiplexor for video taping the cell blocks. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-1-1).

ARTICLE 22. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Thousand Five Hundred Twenty Seven Dollars (\$8,527) for the purchase and installation of an updated Telephone/Communications System for the Town Hall. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-0).

ARTICLE 23. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighty Thousand Dollars (\$80,000) to build a Public Restroom Facility in North Conway Village with the Selectmen proposing to construct the same on Seavey Street at the site of the old North Conway Water Precinct building. The Town of Conway has applied for an 80/20% grant under the Federal Highways Scenic Byways Program. If the grant

is approved, the Town will raise \$16,000 of the \$80,000 appropriation; otherwise, the entire \$80,000 will be raised. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:17, VI, and will not lapse until facility construction is completed or in two years, whichever is less (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (8-3-1).

ARTICLE 24. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12). To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000) to build a Public Restroom Facility in Conway Village with the Selectmen proposing to construct the same adjacent to the Conway Village Chamber of Commerce Building. The Town of Conway has applied for an 80/20% grant under the Federal Highways Scenic Byways Program. If the grant is approved the Town will raise \$8,000 of the \$40,000 appropriation; otherwise, the entire \$40,000 will be raised. This will be a non-lapsing account per RSA 32:17, VI, and will not lapse until facility construction is completed or in two years, whichever is less. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-4-1).

ARTICLE 25. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000) to be used to do a cost engineering analysis to remove the utility poles and place all services underground from Route 16/302 intersection to Barnes Road/Route 16 intersection. A portion of the funds will be used to hire a third party consultant to review the data provided by the utility companies. The Town of Conway has applied for an 80/20% grant under the Federal Highways Scenic Byways Program for which the Conway portion of Route 16 qualifies, and has received a letter of commitment for five gifts and grants of \$500 each totaling \$2,500. If the Federal grant is approved, the Town will raise through taxes \$500 of the \$15,000 appropriation; if not approved, \$12,500 will be raised. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (4-1-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-1).

ARTICLE 26. (Separate - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) for the purpose of compensating elected or appointed Planning Board members One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) a year, exclusive of the Selectmen's representative and Alternates. (Majority vote required.) Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (5-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (3-7-1).

ARTICLE 27. To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt the following ordinance regarding Septage:

CHAPTER 106 SEPTAGE

106-1. Legislative authority; intent.

This Article is adopted pursuant to RSA 31:39 and RSA 147 for the purpose of better regulating and promoting the general health and welfare of the public and toward more prudent operations.

106-2. Authority to adopt rules and regulations.

A. The Selectmen are authorized to establish and/or amend reasonable rules

and regulations from time to time controlling hauling and disposal and land application of septage. Such rules and regulations may encompass fines for violation of the rules and regulations and all other reasonable rules and regulations necessary and/or appropriate toward the prudential management of said solid waste activity.

106-3. Manner of adoption of rules and regulations; amendments.

A. The Selectmen may adopt and/or amend such rules and regulations from time to time, provided that at least two (2) public hearings shall be held, with each hearing having published notices therefor at least two (2) weeks prior to such hearing; after the second hearing, the Selectmen shall vote to adopt and/or amend such rules and regulations and record the rules and regulations so adopted and/or amended with the Town Clerk of Conway, and thereafter the same shall be valid and enforceable. In the notice of the second hearing, the entire proposed rules and regulations or amendments thereto shall be published, and only nonsubstantive changes may be made after the last hearing.

106-4. Violations and penalties.

A. Any violations of any provision of the Article or the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder shall be subject to civil fines and actions as follows:

- (1) First offense: Written notice of violation.
- (2) Second offense: a fine of five hundred dollars (\$500).
- (3) Third offense: a fine of one thousand dollars (\$1000) and revocation of permit for one (1) month.
- (4) Further offenses: revocation of permit for one (1) year.

B. Failure to comply with the penalties, as prescribed above, within five (5) days of notification shall result in the immediate revocation of the permit until such time as the penalty has been complied with.

C. Civil fines or actions assessed for a violation more than one year prior to a subsequent violation shall not be considered for purposes of determining whether or not a second or subsequent violation has occurred under this ordinance. The date of payment of a civil fine or revocation of the permit shall determine the date of a violation hereunder.

D. Should the Town find it necessary to take court action regarding any violation of this article, the cost of court action, including the Town's reasonable Attorney's fees, shall be paid to the town upon conviction. The Town may also enforce this Article and the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder by injunction, restraining order or other appropriate action where such remedy is appropriate.

106-5. Amendments by Town Meeting and by Selectmen.

A. This Article or any rules and regulations promulgated by the Selectmen may be amended by majority vote of the Town at any Town Meeting, the warrant for which gives notice of the proposed change. This shall not be deemed

to otherwise limit the authority of the Selectmen to adopt and/or amend rules and regulations consistent with the powers and procedure hereunder established or as may be amended at any such town meeting.

106-6. Regulations.

A. All rules and regulations governing septage shall be in accordance with the most current version of New Hampshire Code of Administrative Rules Env-Ws 1600 Septage Management, hereafter referred to as the State Rules.

B. In Addition to the State Rules, the Town shall require that all septage be screened prior to land application. Screening of the septage shall be performed such that no visible or identifiable plastics or other non biodegradable materials shall be applied to the land.

106-7. Permits.

A. All septage haulers are required to file a copy of their State permit with the Town of Conway. It shall be the haulers' responsibility to insure that current permits are on file with the Town. Permits are to be filed with the Town's Health Officer.

106-8. Enforcement.

A. The Town's Health Officer shall enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

106-9. Origin.

A. Only Domestic Septage from the following towns shall be permitted for land application in the Town of Conway:

Albany, Bartlett, Chatham, Conway, Eaton, Hales Location, Jackson, Madison.

106-10. Definitions.

A. Domestic septage shall mean septage as defined in 40CFR 503.9 *and* shall *not* include septage from hotels, motels, restaurants, food processing institutions, commercial operations or industrial operations, *and* does *not* include grease removed from grease traps.

This ordinance to become effective on its passage. Submitted by Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 28. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twenty Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$23,500) for the purpose of restoring the Town field known as "Hussey Field" off River Road, North Conway, NH, and to further stabilize the Saco River embankment at that location through a dredge, fill and planting project sanctioned by the NH Dept. of Environmental Services. Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000) of the project cost shall come from an existing Conservation Commission savings account and Eleven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$11,500) shall be raised by taxes. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (5-5-1).

ARTICLE 29. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 79-A:25, II, to deposit one hundred percent (100%) of the revenues of all future

Current Use Change Tax Revenue payments collected into a Conservation Trust at the time of collection pursuant to RSA 79-A and in accordance with RSA 36-A:5, III. At such time as the Conservation Trust Fund balance is \$100,000, fifty percent (50%) of subsequent Current Use Change Tax Revenue payments collected shall then be deposited in the Trust and fifty percent (50%) to go into the General Fund. The funds from the Trust may be expended by the Conservation Commission for only those purposes delineated in RSA 36-A:4, subject to approval from the Town's legislative body. Submitted and recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0).

ARTICLE 30. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) for the support of the Eastern Slope Airport Authority. Agreeable to a petition signed by Michael J. Valladares and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (7-3-1).

ARTICLE 31. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy Five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000), said sum to be allocated to the North Conway Community Center for programs of the North Conway Community Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Melinda A. Puglisi and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-1-1).

ARTICLE 32. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Four Hundred Seventy Eight Dollars (\$7,478) to assist Carroll County Mental Health Service. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ruth E. Hamilton and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-0-2).

ARTICLE 33. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Eight Dollars (\$7,908) to assist the Family Health Centre. Agreeable to a petition signed by Ruth E. Hamilton and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 34. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred Dollars (\$2,100) in support of Starting Point, providing crisis services to the victims of domestic and sexual violence and their children. Agreeable to a petition signed by William T. Riley and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 35. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) in support of the North Conway Day Care Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Iris A. Bouden and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 36. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1,500) to be awarded to the Vaughan Community Service, Inc.

Agreeable to a petition signed by Eugene R. Hussey, DVM and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 37. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Four Hundred Forty Dollars (\$10,440) for the Visiting Nurse & Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maryellen LaRoche and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-0-2).

ARTICLE 38. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand Dollars (\$6,000) for the Early Supports & Services Program (birth to 3 years) of Children Unlimited, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Maryellen LaRoche and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 39. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand One Hundred Forty Two Dollars (\$25,142) for support of The Gibson Center for Senior Services, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Francine Lampidis and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 40. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for assistance in operating vital services of the Mt. Washington Valley Chamber of Commerce and Visitor's Bureau. Agreeable to a petition signed by Bartram W. Bumsted and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-1).

ARTICLE 41. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) for the Conway Village Area Chamber of Commerce. The allocated funds will be spent to help operate and maintain the Conway Village Chamber Information Booth. Agreeable to a petition signed by Thomas Kugel and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-4-1).

ARTICLE 42. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty One Thousand One Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$21,175) for the support of Children's Health Center. Agreeable to a petition signed by Barbara S. Lucy and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 43. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Thousand One Hundred Eighty Six Dollars (\$6,186) to defray the expense of Disaster Services of the Mount Washington Valley Chapter of the American Red Cross. Agreeable to a petition

signed by Jeffrey L. Ohman and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 44. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for Tri-County Community Action for the purpose of continuing services of the Fuel Assistance Program for the residents of Conway. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard O'Brien and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 45. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Six Hundred Forty Dollars (\$3,640) for the Family Support Program of the Center of Hope, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Curtis Hayes and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (2-0-1). Recommended by the Budget Committee (9-0-2).

ARTICLE 46. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Five Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$1,550) to assist the Conway Historical Society with money to be used for renewal of insurance on the Eastman Lord House Museum. Agreeable by a petition signed by Richard S. Putnam and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (10-0-1).

ARTICLE 47. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Eight Hundred Fifty One Dollars (\$2,851) for the support of the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council for 1999. Agreeable to a petition signed by David A. Burdette and others. Recommended by the Board of Selectmen (3-0-0). Recommended by the Budget Committee (6-3-2).

ARTICLE 48. (Special - not included in Warrant Article #12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Nine Hundred Eighty Dollars (\$10,980) for the costs of day to day operations of The United Front. Agreeable to a petition signed by Michael Blackwood and others. Not recommended by the Board of Selectmen (0-3-0). Not recommended by the Budget Committee (0-9-2).

ARTICLE 49. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to negotiate and consummate a land swap to facilitate a realignment of a portion of Depot Street in North Conway, and to provide sufficient land area for an off street parking lot and possible other improvements. The properties involved extend from the southern side of Depot Street to the southern lot boundary of the Hand Crafters Barn (Depot Street and parcels 68-66, 68-67, 68-68 and 68-69). There are no funds to be raised and appropriated with this article. The Town's portion of any costs associated with surveying and deed preparation/recording shall be covered in the Operating Budget, Article #12. Submitted by the Board of Selectmen.

ARTICLE 50. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept the deed to a parcel of land, 0.15 acre in size, recorded in Carroll County Registry of Deeds Book 532, Page 65, and shown on the Town of Albany

Map 008, Lot 002, as a bequest to the Conway Public Library from the estate of Elizabeth J. Frunzi. Submitted by the Conway Library Trustees.

ARTICLE 51. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell at public or private sale a parcel of land, 0.15 acre in size, recorded in Carroll County Registry of Deeds Book 532, Page 65, and shown on the Town of Albany Map 008, Lot 002, for fair market value, with the net revenue to be deposited in the Conway Public Library Building Fund, to be used for the renovation and expansion of the Conway Public Library, as specified in the Will of Elizabeth J. TOWN MANAGER'S ANNUAL REPORT 1998

Those tasked with managing the Town and operationally providing municipal services were confronted with some interesting challenges in 1998. Showing flexibility, innovation and patience, certainly helped carry us through the year.

- January ice storm
- Late spring floods
- Bridge damage requiring closure to traffic
- Competing in the employment marketplace
- Reconstruction of Davis Park Tennis/Basketball Courts
- Revamping health insurance program to generate considerable savings
- Assuring adequate job transition and training for new or promoted personnel
- Preparation of a procedures and policy manual on Violence In The Workplace
- Staying on top of the Town's remapping project
- Involvement and progress on Bypass design and relevant issues
- Keeping taxpayers and residents better informed through TV Channel 3, meetings, and other media
- Coping with the rise in Welfare cases and issues
- Continuation of strong financial accountability
- Responding to commercial growth demands
- Development of the Whitaker Homesite Master Plan

The emphasis for 1999 will be to manage the Town's resources and service delivery effectively and efficiently with a level tax rate goal. During 1999 the construction of the Bypass will become more active, and a continued strong economy will place a heavy workload on code enforcement, zoning enforcement and zoning. Articles on the March 9, 1999 ballot will have a project impact on the staff's workload upon voter passage.

I refer you to my Annual Budget Narrative which follows this report for an overview of the Town's financial position.

I do want to express my thanks to the Board of Selectmen and the employees of the Town. They provide diversity and professionalism under a strong team concept to which they are committed to serve to the best interests of the Town. We truly encourage and welcome your input and ideas.

ANNUAL NARRATIVE FINANCIAL/BUDGET REPORT

Submitted by: James B. Somerville, Town Manager
January 1, 1999

OPENING COMMENTS:

It is hard to believe that this is the last Annual Narrative Financial/Budget Report for THIS CENTURY. The purpose of this report is to provide the Town's residents, taxpayers and voters with a vehicle to better understand the annual budget which they are being asked to vote on. The report attempts to take \$6 million of complex numbers and put them into logical words, with insight into management's financial philosophy, and how operations, services and manpower relate to the budget. The report highlights increases and decreases, and provides an overview of the Town's financial condition and posturing in today's economy.

GENERAL OVERVIEW:

A. The Town's financial profile shows continued improvement for the seventh consecutive year. Each year there are different causes/reasons for this encouraging trend. For 1999 some examples are as follows:

1. We are able to REFUND (similar to refinance) our largest bond, which lowers the yearly debt service and saves \$169,000 during the remaining term of the loan.
2. Because of increased revenues (strong economy) and stringent spending policies, the Town's uncommitted funds grew and it was deemed prudent to transfer some of the funds to offset taxes. At the same time, a sufficient amount was retained to help assure a high bond rating which will benefit the Town when we have future bonding requirements.
3. Through increased construction and market value assessments, the Town had \$32 million in property value growth.
4. The economics of supply and demand has caused a rental housing shortage and higher rents. A subsequent increase in welfare costs has resulted.
5. Through shifting of priorities and other management and operational decision making, the Town was able to absorb the financial impacts of the ice storm and floods without seeking permission from the NH Dept. of Revenue to spend non-appropriated funds.
6. Recycling programs and projects continue to grow and be successful.
7. The Town experienced an increase in revenues from various sources such as Motor Vehicle Registrations and Building Permits.
8. As in previous years, the departments know my management philosophy and expectations. Spending is always carefully scrutinized, caution prevails in anticipation of revenues, and high employee performance standards are the rule, not the exception.

B. The 1998 operating expenditures, subject to final audit, came in under appropriation by \$35,000. On a \$6 million budget this is really too tight; however, we did absorb the ice storm and flood costs. Municipal management cannot overexpend the gross budget appropriation, but it must retain the ability to be flexible in order to deal with the complexity and diversity of operations to assure the delivery of quality service within the total appropriation granted by the voters. Management continually seeks new ideas to improve upon workplace efficiencies and cost effective operations. It is our goal to have a FAT FREE budget.

BUDGET PHILOSOPHY:

The budget philosophy for 1999 is consistent with the practices and experiences of the trend of 1993 thru 1998 which was stated as "continuing to evaluate each and every department, identify areas of excess, ways to consolidate and cross train/utilize manpower, find more effective ways to get the job done or to purchase services/supplies, continually ask questions such as: "Can it wait? Do we need it? Can we do it for less cost? Can someone else do it? Where is it on the prioritized list? Is the service essential?," etc. This philosophy has once again generated a budget which for 1999 is manageable and is accountable. There is nothing arbitrary within the 1999 budget. It is a continued reflection of hard work by people who care and are tasked with "running a six million plus dollar operation like a business."

BUDGET ANALYSIS:

Only significant changes from the 1998 budget are discussed.

Executive:

Most of the increase is represented by \$9,972 for the Welfare Agent whose hours have been increased to 30 hours a week to handle a substantial workload increase; \$5,500 to purchase (mandated) new system - postal meter; \$23,313 to meet ongoing computer needs.

Revaluation of Property:

The increase is the result of budgeting \$5,000 to fund a consultant to assist in handling a complex tax abatement case that, if lost, would have an annual negative impact on tax revenues of \$100,000.

Employee Benefits:

Decreased. Town researched and shifted health insurance carriers for all but the Police Union which has an unsettled contract negotiation. An initial savings of 30% was realized which, on a formula basis of 75/25, has been shared with the employees.

Police Department:

Increases are primarily reflected in the Union medical insurance costs - \$30,946; Traffic Control Officers - \$6,500; Retirement fund actuarial charges \$16,201; Computer upgrades - \$7,359; and Vehicles at \$9,310 (the fleet has 3 vehicles turning over this year instead of 2).

Ambulance:

The increase is in actuality only \$2,000 as a new five year contract was negotiated and put in place last year. To implement the contract the voters, through

a Separate Article, approved the contract cost. That amount is now represented in the Operating Budget.

Fire:

Increase of \$6,307 is in the non precinct fire protection portion which is based on an agreement and a property value formula.

Inspections:

Increase is necessary due to workload. During 1998 the inspection revenue fees went to \$61,267 compared to \$34,291 in 1997. The increase in activity requires more man hours to conduct inspections and service applicants. The budget increase of \$12,000 is more than offset by the revenues.

Parks & Recreation: Increase which is 100% funded by a grant.

Library:

Increase of \$82,037 is offset by \$61,000 in revenue transfers from various Library accounts. The balance is distributed in payroll/benefits and equipment maintenance.

Patriotic Purposes:

Increase of \$5,000 is to help meet costs of the Town's 4th of July celebration. It has been suggested and supported that the day in Schouler Park be a 50-50 partnership of Town taxpayer support and fund raising.

CLOSING COMMENTS:

The 1999 Selectmen's Operating Budget, when compared to 1998 (including Special & Separate Articles relating directly to operations), has a decrease of \$81,976 (1.2%). The Town will, however, operate "status quo" with no cutback of services and will have absorbed 98's inflation factors.

You will note on the ballot; however, that in 1999 there are more Special Appropriation Articles than last year. These articles total \$526,678 compared to \$237,714 in 1998. That means that if ALL articles are passed by the voters there will be a potential total appropriation increase of \$206,988. However, taking into account grants, revenue estimates, availability of uncommitted funds and growth, I do not feel the tax rate will increase more than six cents (1%) which equates to \$6 a year on a home valued at \$100,000.

The Town continues to be in good financial status and is benefiting from the strong economy. We are borrowing less and are seeing higher revenues and, therefore, anticipate a positive and solid 1999. The financial well being of the Town has been carefully planned and we are well postured to weather any future cyclical economic down turn without a negative impact on the services the Town provides.

Once again, your comments and ideas are always welcome and appreciated. I hope that you have found this report to be helpful and informative.

The past year was a good one for the Town, financially, thanks again to the prudent management of the Town's affairs by our Town Manager, his staff, and the Board of Selectmen. We were able to move from an "in advance" basis of tax anticipation borrowing to an "as needed" basis, requiring total borrowing of only \$800,000, and for only a period of 40 days. Due to a favorable rate environment, we were able to do a refunding of the new landfill's \$2,945,000 bonding debt, saving the Town approximately \$160,000 over the life of the issue.

The year was one of transition for the Finance Department, with Lucy Philbrick very ably succeeding long-time Finance Manager, Mary Conlon, and my sincere thanks to Lucy for a job well done.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 1997 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Town of Conway has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Conway, as of December 31, 1997, and the results of its operations and the cash flows of its nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated February 13, 1998 on our consideration of the Town of Conway's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Town of Conway. The accompanying Single Audit schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

We have audited the financial statements of the Town of Conway as of and for the year ended December 31, 1997, and have issued our report thereon which was qualified as indicated therein dated February 13, 1998. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Town of Conway's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants; noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Town of Conway's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

This report is intended for the information of management and federal awarding agencies and pass-through entities. However, this report is a matter of public record and its distribution is not limited.

CHAPTER 106 SEPTAGE

106-1. Legislative authority; intent.

This Article is adopted pursuant to RSA 31:39 and RSA 147 for the purpose of better regulating and promoting the general health and welfare of the public and toward more prudent operations.

106-2. Authority to adopt rules and regulations.

A. The Selectmen are authorized to establish and/or amend reasonable rules and regulations from time to time controlling hauling and disposal and land application of septage. Such rules and regulations may encompass fines for violation of the rules and regulations and all other reasonable rules and regulations necessary and/or appropriate toward the prudential management of said solid waste activity.

106-3. Manner of adoption of rules and regulations; amendments.

A. The Selectmen may adopt and/or amend such rules and regulations from time to time, provided that at least two (2) public hearings shall be held, with each hearing having published notices therefor at least two (2) weeks prior to such hearing; after the second hearing, the Selectmen shall vote to adopt and/or amend such rules and regulations and record the rules and regulations so adopted and/or amended with the Town Clerk of Conway, and thereafter the same shall be valid and enforceable. In the notice of the second hearing, the entire proposed rules and regulations or amendments thereto shall be published, and only non-substantive changes may be made after the last hearing.

106-4. Violations and penalties.

A. Any violations of any provision of the Article or the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder shall be subject to civil fines and actions as follows:

- (1) First offense: Written notice of violation.
- (2) Second offense: a fine of five hundred dollars (\$500).
- (3) Third offense: a fine of one thousand dollars (\$1000) and revocation of permit for one (1) month.
- (4) Further offenses: revocation of permit for one (1) year.

B. Failure to comply with the penalties, as prescribed above, within five (5) days of notification shall result in the immediate revocation of the permit until such time as the penalty has been complied with.

C. Civil fines or actions assessed for a violation more than one year prior to a subsequent violation shall not be considered for purposes of determining whether or not a second or subsequent violation has occurred under this ordinance. The date of payment of a civil fine or revocation of the permit shall determine the date of a violation hereunder.

D. Should the Town find it necessary to take court action regarding any violation of this article, the cost of court action, including the Town's reasonable Attorney's fees, shall be paid to the town upon conviction. The Town may also enforce this Article and the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder by injunction, restraining order or other appropriate action where such remedy is appropriate.

106-5. Amendments by Town Meeting and by Selectmen.

A. This Article or any rules and regulations promulgated by the Selectmen may be amended by

majority vote of the Town at any Town Meeting, the warrant for which gives notice of the proposed change. This shall not be deemed to otherwise limit the authority of the Selectmen to adopt and/or amend rules and regulations consistent with the powers and procedure hereunder established or as may be amended at any such town meeting.

106-6. Regulations.

A. All rules and regulations governing septage shall be in accordance with the most current version of New Hampshire Code of Administrative Rules Env-Ws 1600 Septage Management, hereafter referred to as the State Rules.

B. In Addition to the State Rules, the Town shall require that all septage be screened prior to land application. Screening of the septage shall be performed such that no visible or identifiable plastics or other non biodegradable materials shall be applied to the land.

106-7. Permits.

A. All septage haulers are required to file a copy of their State permit with the Town of Conway. It shall be the haulers' responsibility to insure that current permits are on file with the Town. Permits are to be filed with the Town's Health Officer.

106-8. Enforcement.

A. The Town's Health Officer shall enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

106-9. Origin.

A. Only Domestic Septage from the following towns shall be permitted for land application in the Town of Conway:

Albany, Bartlett, Chatham, Conway, Eaton, Hales Location, Jackson, Madison.

106-10. Definitions.

A. Domestic septage shall mean septage as defined in 40CFR 503.9 and shall *not* include septage from hotels, motels, restaurants, food processing institutions, commercial operations or industrial operations, and does *not* include grease removed from grease traps.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION AVAILABLE TO CONWAY TAXPAYERS

Veteran Service Exemption: RSA 72:28-36

Amount = \$100 Regular Veteran, \$1,400 Total & Permanent Service Connected Disability. Must be a resident of NH for at least one year prior to April 1st of year exemption is applied for. Must be separated or discharged under honorable conditions and have served during correct time periods covered in statute, or widow of same. Applies only to place of primary abode; does not apply to second homes or parcels of land.

Optional Adjusted Elderly Exemption: RSA 72:43-h

Must be resident of NH for at least five years prior to April 1 of year exemption is applied for. Own real estate individually or jointly, if real estate owned by spouse, must have been married at least 5 years.

Net income of \$14,000 or, if married, \$21,000.

Have assets of \$50,000 or less, excluding the value of residence.

Amount of exemption:

65 to 75 years of age, \$25,000

75 to 80 years of age, \$40,000

80 years or older, \$50,000

The applicable amount is deducted from the assessed value of property before tax is figured.

Physically Handicapped: RSA 72:37-a

"Physically handicapped person" means a person who by reason of physical defect or infirmity permanently requires the use of special aids to enable him to propel himself. The cost of special aids which are built into the property are deducted from the valuation of the property.

Blind Exemption: RSA 72:37

Must be legally blind as determined by The Blind Services Department of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Education Department.

Amount of exemption is \$25,000 deducted from his or her residential real estate equalized.

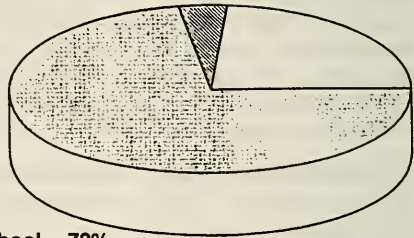

ASSESSOR'S REPORT

In this, the fifth year since our last major revaluation, sales analysis shows that the town is assessing at market value.

This is not to say that every property sells at exactly its assessed value. The buying and selling of real estate involves negotiation and different people will find different paths to the same end. If we had ten different buyers and ten different sellers, each pairing off to exchange the exact same house, it is very likely that they would arrive at similar but different sale prices. What a property actually sells for is known as its *contract sales price* and it is not necessarily market value. Market value is better described as the *most probable price* a property would sell for.

Here in the assessing department, we track all sales against their assessments in order to measure assessment accuracy. We determine which types of properties are appreciating or depreciating and if assessed values require adjusting. When we find a sale property whose price differs significantly from its assessed value, we investigate to find out whether or not the price represents "market value" before we rely on it to make changes.

There are three basic reasons why a sale price will differ significantly from its assessed value.

1. The sale may not be *arm's length*, a term used by real estate professionals to indicate if a sale is representative of market value. Circumstances may cause a sale price to be influenced in some way. There are too many of these circumstances to detail here but, if a seller or buyer is under atypical pressure, for example: employment relocation, financial problems or divorce, the final price may not represent "market value".

2. The assessment data may not be correct. Perhaps an assessor has never had the opportunity to inspect the interior of the property or, and you may be shocked to hear this, some value enhancement was done without a building permit.

We try to maintain accurate data through discussions with owners, brokers, appraisers, bankers and whatever other ways we can gather information about a property. We welcome the opportunity to personally inspect properties but, I have to admit, attempts to do so have been frustrating. Letters requesting inspections resulted in a less than ten percent response rate and cold calling at the front door is inefficient. Local people work hard and are seldom home during business hours and seasonal owners, by definition, are often not available during the week. Conway's rural character makes it time consuming and not cost effective to walk door to door when the doors are a quarter mile or more apart. Still, we will accept every invitation to visit a property. If you want your property inspected, please feel free to call the Assessor's office at 447-3811. I know, I know, it's like getting a card from your dentist saying it's "time for your root canal" but, my experience has been that estimated properties tend to be over, not under, assessed.

3. The real estate values may have moved away, in either direction, from their assessed values. If sale prices prove to be "arm's length" and the data is accurate, we consider the possibility that we may have to revalue an entire neighborhood or class of property. We then determine what we need to do to bring those properties back into line with everyone else.

We had been considering adjusting values in the commercial sector for some time. They hadn't been fully reviewed since 1994 and the level of sales activity, along with an increase in new construction, seemed to indicate a need. Values were adjusted after a great deal of research. Unfortunately, some property owners saw significant increases in their tax bills and this caused some controversy in the local media. Some of the criticism was an understandable emotional response to unexpected tax increases.

Other points were well taken. It was suggested that property owners are not given enough notice of tax increases and value changes. While we cannot predict the tax rate until all adjustments are final, we would like to be able to give earlier notice of property value changes. We normally wait until Fall to finalize adjustments and then mail notices to everyone affected at the same time. However, we have now decided to notify property owners of assessment changes once we are reasonably certain the property will receive no further adjustments for that year. We will try this for a while to see if any bugs turn up in that system.

Every assessor I know wishes their work did not result in raising taxes. If taxes are level, complaints are minimal. Assessors know that it is really the bottom line of the tax bill and not the assessed value that causes abatement requests. However, from the assessor's point of view, he must be fair to those who, without adjustments, would be shouldering someone else's share of the tax burden.

In the coming year, we will be completing the town wide mapping project. The results will soon be displayed at town hall for public review and comment.

We also hope to have a more user friendly (Windows) interface for our computer terminals. It is scheduled for installation in February.

While these are exciting technological changes, our primary focus is our personal service to you. If you have occasion to need our assistance, my assistant, Dale Schofield, and I hope to impress you with our willingness to assist you, answer any questions you may have and deliver the information you need. We are always happy to discuss assessment and taxation issues. Feel free to offer advice on how we can improve our service to you.

The Board accepted with regret the decisions of Dave Burdette not to be reappointed; Greg Grinnell served with the Board until October 1998, and asked not to be reappointed. Alternate, Jan Weinraub, was appointed as a member from the Alternates. As of this time we are seeking to fill three Alternate positions.

CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT ANNUAL REPORT 1998

The title of this report is unchanged from past years, but it has become inaccurate. This department is no longer responsible for all "code enforcement" as changes that were made in staff responsibilities have shifted some duties. Many zoning issues, sign ordinance items, and our many more trivial permit requirements are now being handled by the Planning Department. This change has streamlined many issues and, hopefully, will continue to improve, and thereby assist Conway's residents and business owners with facilitating their needs. The aforementioned changes have also helped this department's primary client - the construction community. More time is being allotted to plan and design reviews before work begins, thereby reducing the amount of delays in the field. Communication between town hall and the construction sites and offices occur much more frequently than in the past, with the conversations being more positive than negative. The "us versus them" attitude has been almost entirely removed from our work. The reality of this, for all of us, is that we are working towards a common goal; safe buildings, reasonable demands, and efficiency of process that is normally unheard of in the municipal world. We're all very fortunate that this is working. With 413 building permits having been issued in 1998, all construction records for Conway have been broken and efficiency of process is the largest contributor to our successes. 1999 is bringing new challenges and changes. Some new regulations will be in place, and we're constantly being challenged to improve our abilities and knowledge related to the old ones. Every project seems to develop a new twist. As of this writing, we're already 50% ahead of last year's issued building permits at the same time. Combine the increased quantity of permits with an increase in the complexity and size of the proposed projects, and we'll have our hands full. Please continue with your continued support and we can assure you that we will move towards the turn of the century as accurately, efficiently, and as safely as possible.

The next new area that we are delving into is our electronic mapping. During 1998, Conway contracted with Cartographic Associates of Littleton and made them responsible for the creation of the most accurate, up to date town maps that Conway has ever had. This office and the assessing department have spent hundreds of hours compiling information, negotiating contracts and working with Cartographics to develop the final product. The initial arrival of these maps is expected in March of 1999 with their arrival opening up a whole new area of convenience and knowledge. No longer will anyone have to wonder where their home sits in relationship to the property lines, the edge of the right of way, or the edge of the flood plain. With this information, we hope to eliminate disputes that often cost the town and our citizens lots of time and money. To the uninitiated, this may appear trivial... to those of us who work with, and need this information on a daily basis, our jobs will be easier, more accurate and efficient. The implementation of this project, essentially installing all the necessary computer equipment, software and learning how to use everything is going to be time con-

suming and frustrating. Interestingly enough, everyone is looking forward to continuing this project. We know that the end result will be a smaller expenditure of our personal energies to accomplish a better end result in our daily work.

In closing, I just had to look back at half a decade at Conway Town Hall. It's hard to believe, but this is the 5th such report that I've authored and it's interesting to see what has changed and what has remained the same. We have the same amount of Town Hall staff in 1999 that we had in 1993. In 1993, there were two personal computers and one small computer network in the building. Today we all have our own computers, operating in a networked environment with electronic documentation keeping our processes efficient. In 1993, Conway issued less than 300 building permits with an approximate constructed value of 5.6 million dollars. In 1998 Conway issued 413 building permits with an approximate constructed value of 20.3 million dollars. In the 1993 annual report we talked of increasing efficiency and accuracy, something that we'll always be working on. In 1993 we talked about planning for Wal-Mart. In 1999, we're still planning for Wal-Mart.

As always, I'm looking forward to the new year.

CONWAY CONSERVATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1998

The Commission met monthly to attend to the routine business of overseeing the many properties in the Town of Conway that we are entrusted with. These include Whitaker Woods, Shedd Woods, Hubbard-Davis Town Forest, Abenaki Land, Puddin Pond, Walker's Pond, Smith-Eastman Landing, Rt. 16 vista at the Elks Club, and the 900+ acre Town Common Lands off Hurricane Mtn. Road. These lands are valued on the Town books at \$2.4 million dollars.

This past year there was a selective cutting in Shedd Woods to harvest mature timber and to open up a fine vista. It is worth a stop across from the hospital and a walk in 100 yards for a fine view of the Moats and the ledges across the Intervale.

Working with the Green Hills Preserve, trail work was done off Hurricane Mtn. after the ice storm, as well as routine maintenance at Puddin Pond. Trail work was done at Walker's Pond and in Whitaker Woods. Many individuals and organizations that enjoy using Whitaker Woods helped us with many hours of volunteer work.

The Commission continues to review Wetland Permit applications and passes on recommendations to the State's Department of Environmental Services.

This year, the Commission spent many hours working with the Planning Board, the Town Planner, the EPA and its consultants, drafting a Wetlands Ordinance for placement on the Town Warrant (Article #4) for action by the voters on election day, March 9, 1999. Its object is to prevent pollutants from getting into the Town's streams, ponds, lakes, and larger wetland areas. It is strongly endorsed by the Conservation Commission (7-0).

In the coming year, a major effort of the Commission will be to draw up long term goals for each parcel of Conservation land and plans to implement these goals. We hope that you will explore and enjoy the many wonderful assets owned by the Town of Conway and we welcome your input and suggestions to enhance these properties.

TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER ANNUAL REPORT 1998

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Ranger, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required before doing ANY outside burning. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

There are ten Forest Rangers who work for the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Protection Bureau. State Forest Rangers are available to assist communities with forest fire suppression, prevention and training programs as well as the enforcement of forest fire and timber harvest laws. If you have any questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, please call our office at 271-2217.

There are 2400 Forest Fire Wardens and Deputy Forest Fire Wardens throughout the state. Each town has a Forest Fire Warden and several Deputy Wardens who assist the Forest Rangers with forest fire suppression, prevention, and law enforcement. Early in 1998 we experienced an ice storm, which caused severe damage to forests of New Hampshire. This damage created a greater potential fire hazard as well as safety hazards to many areas of the state. Your local fire warden and Forest Rangers need your assistance in preventing wildfires in these hard hit areas and throughout the State. If you need assistance or information dealing with ice damaged woodlands, please call 1-800-444-8978.

The State of New Hampshire operates 15 fire towers, 2 mobile patrols and 3 contract aircraft patrols. This early detection and reports from citizens aid in the quick response from local fire departments. This is a critical factor in controlling the size of wildland fires and keeping the loss of property and suppression costs as low as possible.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE OFFICER ANNUAL REPORT 1998

The Town Assistance Office processed 429 applications, distributed food to 532 individuals and assisted more than 340 households with basic living expenses during 1998. The total budget was \$47,827 with shelter costs (rent, electricity and heating fuel) requiring \$36,000 of that total. The remaining funds provided medication, food, burial preparation and miscellaneous needs to Conway residents.

The Town welfare budget is supplemented with financial aid from local agencies and government programs as well as donations of food, clothing, toys, and services from organizations, churches, schools and individuals. Discounts from businesses and landlords also stretch the welfare funds. These contributions often provide clients the temporary boost needed to become self-sufficient. This cooperative attitude among social service professionals, government personnel, health care providers, business owners and employers also enables clients to resolve issues that are hindering their ability to provide for themselves or their families. Networking within the community also prevents duplication of services.

The generosity and concern of the residents of Conway is appreciated as the Town Assistance Officer meets the legal obligations of providing for those unable to support themselves.

CONWAY PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT, 1998

The Conway Public Library has had an exciting and busy year. The library's popular programs continue to generate interest and expand. The pleasure of reading transcends all age groups and remains our focus. Advancements in technology challenge us to progress.

Margaret Marschner, Library Director, and the staff operate the library for 57 hours each week, an increase this year of three hours a week. The new hours are

Monday to Thursday, 10:00 am to 8:30 pm
Friday and Saturday, 10:00 am to 5:30 pm

The History Room hours are

Monday and Tuesday, 10:00 am to 5:00 pm
Wednesday 5:30 to 8:30 pm

During the year 35,304 visitors to the library checked out 70,463 items, including adult and juvenile fiction, nonfiction, large print books, periodicals, puzzles, videos, and audio books. In 1998 the library registered 758 new card holders. A total of 8,659 requests for reference services were acknowledged during the year.

The Conway Public Library now offers free Internet access to the public. Twice weekly Internet training classes began in February with 144 people taking advantage of this service. CD-ROM databases continue to be popular.

Knitters Workshop, Pet Partners, Netting Your Ancestors, Operant Conditioning Pet Training, Experiences in Nicaragua, Symmetry and Illusion in the Art of M. C. Escher, and David Baker reading from his book *Blue Tarp* were some of the programs offered. Story time for children, with attendance topping 1,419, was a popular program. Others included The New Hampshire Humanities series, poetry and writing contests, and the Dr. Seuss Birthday Party. The summer reading program, "Live Free and Read," had 276 participants who read a total of 7,055 books. "Books for Babies," a welcome package for all newborns whose parents reside in the town of Conway, is a new program, designed to encourage mothers to jump-start childrens' ability to read and to learn. Twenty two packets were presented in 1998.

The Henney History Room went on-line in 1998 with an ever increasing number of queries arriving by e-mail. A Carroll County Genealogy Forum board has been set up as an Internet site for researchers to exchange information. The computerized genealogy database was increased by over 11,000 names. The Henney History Room is a repository for an ever growing collection of one of a kind items pertaining to the Conways and surrounding areas. Several rare and unique volumes were added to the collection this year. In house use increases each year with 551 individuals making use of the history room in 1998. Space considerations, for both researchers and research materials, have become critical.

Generous volunteers contributed 394 hours of service covering books, assist-

ing with overdue notices, interlibrary loans, mending, shelving and running a successful book sale. A special thank you goes to Barbara Hoyt for continuing to maintain the beautiful flower garden.

The library received gifts in memory of A. Kenneth Lucy, who served as library trustee from 1987 to 1990, Milton Bennett, Gertrude "Fostie" Bumstead, and Jennifer Hill. A generous bequest of Jerome Schwartz established a trust in his name. A lover of books and reading, he specified that the interest be used to purchase books.

The trustees presented to the voters a plan of expansion in March. Although the vote was not successful for a 2/3rds passage, the trustees were encouraged by the favorable results. In May trustees met with the selectmen to discuss suggestions for a positive decision in 1999. A non profit organization, the Friends of the Conway Public Library, was formed in August. This group will help in fund raising activities and be a vehicle for accepting grant and foundation money. Their work this year included a booth at the July 4th celebration, the annual library books sale in August, and the raffle of a donated quilt.

The North Conway Public Library trustees have expressed their full support of "the Conway Public Library's planned expansion and believe it is necessary to meet the present and long term needs of Conway's citizens, especially its school children."

Starting in January 1999 the non resident fee will increase to \$35.00. This amount is comparable to the cost Conway residents pay toward library expenses.

The trustees returned to the selectmen in November to discuss the expansion project. We reported our progress and collectively came to the conclusion that a need for expansion is clear. The selectmen endorsed the project with the condition that the trustees raise twenty percent of the construction costs through private funds.

In March 1999 the trustees will present a bond article on the town ballot for the expansion project. The Conway Public Library needs this additional space to serve the needs of the community. Please support your library by voting Yes on March 9th.

MT. WASHINGTON VALLEY ECONOMIC COUNCIL

The mission of the Mt. Washington Valley Economic Council "to improve and diversify the economic vitality in the Mt. Washington Valley Region" continues to serve as a guiding light for all the activities that the Board of Directors advocates. Helping businesses with legislative issues, providing information such as the "Safety Plan Workshop", "Electric Coop Forum", and the ongoing Business Leader's Breakfasts and technology sessions, "Bits, Bytes and Business", as well as the "Industrial Roundtables" are all examples of ways the Council works for business and the community at large. The recent Northland Shoe closing, although located in Fryeburg, did impact area businesses and employees and the Council responded immediately. We were instrumental in the success of the NH Job Council's Machine Tool Training Program. Our revolving loan fund, having provided now four loans to businesses in the Conway area, continues to grow and the interest from these loans will help contribute to the Council's sustainability over time.

The Council will continue to explore the possibility of lowering electric costs, which will ultimately benefit all citizens and businesses in the Mt. Washington Valley. With your help, MWVEC can continue to work to strengthen the economies of the twelve towns we serve.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION

To the Selectmen and Residents of the Town of Conway:

The Carroll County Community Contact office is a private, non-profit subdivision of Tri-County Community Action that was established in and has operated from our base at 5 Folsom Road, Center Ossipee since 1984. We presently have nine regularly scheduled satellite office sites located throughout Carroll County.

The Carroll County Community Contact office has provided services for 1,226 of Conway's citizens, processing 495 fuel applications, 73 being elderly and 92 disabled, and linked 566 with other Community Action Programs.

TRI-COUNTY COMMUNITY ACTION HAS SPENT \$116,831.91 ON CONWAY CITIZENS BETWEEN JULY 1, 1997 AND JUNE 30, 1998.

Community Contact is dependent upon funding from your town and neighboring communities county-wide to provide necessary services for the less fortunate citizens in our communities. The local funds are combined with the Community Services Block Grant, Fuel Assistance, New Hampshire Emergency Shelter Grant, Homeless Programs, FEMA and private and corporate benefactors. We also are the conduit through which the USDA Surplus Food gets distributed to the 11 food pantries and 4 dinner bells throughout Carroll County in order to serve our residents.

Carroll County Community Contact is known as a family friendly agency. We work with families one-on-one to identify barriers blocking the way to self-sufficiency and the resources to overcome these barriers. We provide information and referral and assisted with advocacy for more than 6,500 households in Carroll County last year.

We have greatly appreciated the support, cooperation and partnership with your elected officials and staff, as well as other social service agencies, residents and our clients.

HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICE NON PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

Carroll County Mental Health Services

Carroll County Mental Health Services is a private agency which provides quality accessible professional mental health treatment to the residents of the eighteen towns and locations in our County. The outpatient and emergency services are funded by a combination of patient fees, insurance payments, grants, fund raising and town appropriations.

CCMHS provides treatment to children, adults and seniors. They receive treatment for symptoms caused by conditions such as depression, anxiety disorders, post traumatic stress disorder, schizoaffective disorder, drug and alcohol abuse or suicidality. Individuals may attend one session to fifty sessions in the course of a year. They may consult with a psychiatrist, a substance abuse counselor, a family therapist or an individual therapist.

Each person is assigned a fee based on family income. We bill their health insurance if they have a policy; more than half of the persons we serve have no health insurance. During the past year we served 520 Conway residents; they received 8400 hours of therapy. When CCMHS was incorporated in 1965, our mission was to provide affordable, quality services in our local community. We continue to work very hard to meet this goal.

Starting Point Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence

Starting Point: Services for Victims of Domestic & Sexual Violence (formerly Carroll County Against Domestic & Sexual Violence) is a private non-profit organization providing services to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Carroll County since 1981. Our services include a 24-hour crisis line, court and hospital advocacy, emergency shelter, support groups and resources and referrals. We work closely with law enforcement, the court system and area social services to insure that victims of these crimes receive the assistance they need. All of our services are provided at no charge.

In 1998, Starting Point provided 77 bed nights to Conway residents in need of emergency shelter. The agency also provided court advocacy to 63 residents of Conway. With only three staff members and a limited budget, the vast portion of these services were provided by approximately 50 trained volunteers. These volunteers donate approximately 16,000 hours of service to our community each year. The money contributed by towns to our agency is used for direct services to Starting Point clients. Money received through town funding and our own fundraising efforts enables Starting Point to qualify for State and Federal grants which make up 90% of our budget. Without the assistance of towns such as Conway, Starting Point would not qualify for the funds that keep us in operation.

Visiting Nurse & Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County

Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care Services of Northern Carroll County, a Medicare Certified and state home health licensed agency, provides comprehensive home health care and hospice services. Services include case management, skilled nursing, speech, occupational and physical therapies, IV therapy and other high tech services, home health aides, social worker, support groups, health screenings and flu shot clinics, hospice services, volunteers and bereavement services. Services are available 24 hours per day, seven days a week to individuals of all ages who meet medical need criteria.

When a person's required home care services are covered by private insurance, we are reimbursed for our services by those payers. Medicare and Medicaid are also reimbursed but do not cover the full cost of providing home care services. We also offer a sliding fee scale to those who are underinsured or uninsured. Town funding helps us to provide services to people who do not have any other payment source, and helps us provide our high level of care to everyone we serve.

The agency served a total of 500 clients during 1998. 56% or 282 clients were served in the town of Conway of which 142 were underinsured or uninsured. Total 1998 home visits for the agency including the Hospice program = 13,845; a 22% decrease over 1997; in the town of Conway = 6,730 visits; 56% of all clients and 55% of all home visits. 944 Conway home visits were for uninsured and underinsured clients; additionally 5,489 visits were Medicare visits for the frail elderly for which the agency no longer receives adequate payment to deliver the service. Conway town funding contributes \$11.06 to these sliding fee visits; the agency contributes \$45.58. On a per capita basis, Conway residents contribute \$1.26 per year to have access to these essential services. Our average cost per home visit = \$56.64 as compared to \$72 for the agency average cost per visit in New Hampshire and national average of \$85 cost per visit. Conway town funding support is essential for Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care to continue to provide access to quality home care and hospice services for the frail elderly and disabled as well as for all residents in the town.

Children Unlimited, Inc.

Children Unlimited, Inc. is a private, nonprofit 501(c)3 corporation located in Conway, New Hampshire. The Family Centered Early Supports & Services Program (Early Intervention) provides services to families with children birth to three years old who are developmentally delayed or at risk of being developmentally delayed. Children who exhibit delays in reaching age-appropriate developmental milestones are eligible for these services. The guiding philosophy of Children Unlimited is to provide quality developmental, therapeutic and support services to each child and family in their home and/or a community setting where children of all abilities gather and play. Emphasis is placed on encouraging each family to develop their own strengths and resources, to identify their concerns/needs, and to become better advocates for themselves and their child(ren). Fostering positive self-esteem in all family members, especially the child(ren) with special needs is a priority.

The program is staffed by professionals and paraprofessionals, including occupational therapists, physical therapists, speech pathologists, early childhood educators and parent support providers. Program services include: developmental screening and/or evaluations, speech, physical, occupational therapy, home visits, parent aides, inclusive play groups, parent-infant/toddler support groups, "fussy baby" assessments and interagency collaboration.

Vaughan Community Services

For thirty years the people of the Vaughan Community Services have been listening and responding to the people in need in our community. While church-based, our services are open to all persons, especially those whose needs are not met by other programs or agencies. We work together with all human service agencies with our programs:

The North Conway Day Care Center [a program listed separately in this report with its own director, staff and budget, under the Vaughan umbrella].

Food Pantry

Clothing Depot

Loan Closet for medical equipment needs

Resource and Referral Screenings

Support for persons affected by and infected with HIV/AIDS, and for persons dealing with cancer and bereavement

Diabetes Support Group

We are also involved with community programs: Community Shelter Action Committee, Gifts From the Heart, Visiting Nurse & Hospice Care Services, Sudden Death Response Team, Habitat for Humanity, Gibson Senior Center Long Range Planning Committee, KIT - the Area Food Pantries Coordinators, and the Carroll North Board of the ACS.

The North Conway Day Care Center

The North Conway Day Care Center has been operating since 1972, the first state licensed group child care center in the area.

The Center provides care for children ages 3-12 for working parents, averaging 75-100 children. Our program includes full time child care, a morning preschool, half day programs for kindergarten students, and before and after school programs. A full time program is available for school age children during the summer and school vacations.

Well balanced nutritional morning and afternoon snacks and lunches are prepared according to U.S.D.A. standards and are serviced by a full time cook.

The center has an agreement with the N.H. Department of Health & Human Services to provide child care assistance for those families who are eligible according to their family income. This enables the families to have affordable child care and stay in the workforce. All of our staff meet state licensing requirements or are in the process of being certified.

We continue to work with other community resources to help meet the needs of our families to avoid duplication of service.

The Family Health Centre

The mission of the Family Health Centre is to assist low-income women and their partners to develop an informed approach to maintaining their personal health and to make responsible decisions concerning the planning of their families. Our family planning programs provide primary care, physical exams, health screenings, contraceptive counseling, education regarding early cancer detection and screening/treatment for sexually transmitted diseases to our adolescent and adult, male and female clients. Our prenatal program provides comprehensive prenatal care from conception through the postpartum period. In addition to medical care, the prenatal services include smoking cessation, nutritional counseling and social work services. Our certified nurse midwife delivered 70 babies at the Memorial Hospital in 1998. Celebrate Families, a program of The Family Health Centre, is a home visitation program offering support, counseling and education to families of newborns and infants. One part-time coordinator and 14 volunteers served 125 families in 1998.

We are the only agency in the Carroll County area to offer the above services on a sliding-fee scale basis. The overwhelming majority of our patients have either insurance that offers only catastrophic coverage or no insurance at all. Our town appropriations enable us to provide excellent care at an affordable cost. In 1998, we served 731 Conway residents.

Children's Health Center

For thirty years Children's Health Center has been providing preventive health care for Conway children. These services include affordable immunizations, physicals, developmental assessments, vision and hearing tests, nutritional counseling, short term family counseling and other important health care. The Center's staff works closely with local physicians, school nurses and local health and social services to enable children to secure a healthy start in life.

Currently, Children's Health Center serves 385 Conway children, a 1.3% increase from last year's 379 children. The Center requests financial support in order to continue to provide accessible and affordable health care for Conway children. These funds provide direct service to children whose families have little or no health insurance, or access to other health care. At Children's Health Center, no child is refused care for financial reasons.

National health statistics clearly indicate the benefits of early childhood preventive care. Children who receive their immunizations, physicals, developmental assessments and other important health care are much more likely to be better students in school and have healthier and more productive lives as adults. Your support of Children's Health Center assures that Conway families have access to important health care for their children.

NORTH CONWAY COMMUNITY CENTER ANNUAL REPORT 1998

The Center had its usual programs that we've had for years and along with the children's and adult activities we became involved with a field at the Whitaker Homesite, work with Tin Mountain, major capital improvements and our own Children's Theater Group.

Our project at the Whitaker Homesite was a soccer field approximately 330 by 180 feet. Funds were raised locally through Civic organizations and individuals. We also purchased four (4) goals and a set of bleachers. Farming equipment from Doctor Hussey and Rit Schartner included cultivators, seeder, roller and large water sprinklers.

Players' benches will be added in 1999. The North Conway Water Precinct contributed hoses and water for the watering of the new field throughout the summer growing season.

Tin Mountain provided leadership for an outstanding 8 week course on nature and used the Whitaker Woods as its classroom during most of the Spring. A similar program was offered in the fall.

Capital improvements that were needed included re-chipping the playground and picnic area, new flooring in 5 small rooms, a new stainless steel sink for our kitchen, Whitaker Homesite property and the purchase of a new 18 H.P tractor for snow blowing the skating rink and mowing our large grass area.

Our own Children's Theater was conceived in the fall of the year and 23 children participated in the play, "Yankee Doodle Dandy." Four shows were put on in the Eastern Slope Playhouse and one special program was offered at Kennett High School with the visiting Army Band.

All funds for all the projects listed above came from fundraising or from donations from our community. We certainly want to thank everyone for their continued support of our Center.

TOWN PLANNER'S REPORT

Why do we need planning? I would like to start this year's report by answering this question as briefly as possible. One of the experiences that I have encountered this past year as Town Planner/Zoning Officer in the Town of Conway is that most folks do not understand the role of community planners. In fact, many comments indicate a feeling that community planning is about hindering economic growth. Let me clarify this myth.

In a growing community like Conway, planners might be concerned with shaping the pattern of growth to achieve a sensible and attractive land use pattern. That means avoiding both oppressively dense development or overly scattered and fragmentary development. It means encouraging a pattern of development which gives residents ready access to recreational, cultural, school, shopping, and other facilities. It means having a street pattern which is convenient to use and through which traffic flows without excessive congestion. It means separating incompatible land uses and activities, for example, high intensity commercial activity, from residential areas. In a modern planned community, it might mean providing a system of pathways so that pedestrian and bicycle traffic is separated from automobile traffic.

Planners are also concerned with the location of public facilities like school and social service centers for the convenience of the people served and to reinforce the development of a desirable land-use pattern. If the community anticipates or desires significant industrial or commercial development, its planners will be concerned with seeing that sufficient conveniently located blocks of land are available, and that these blocks are served with adequate roads, water and sewer facilities.

The above is not meant to be a complete listing of what planners do. It is simply meant to give some feeling for the range of planning issues. Again, let me stress, planning is not about inhibiting growth, but planning for it wisely.

Serving the Community of Conway as Town Planner and Zoning Officer has been a whirlwind in 1998. I have continued to work on the Bypass project, serve on the Citizen's Design Review Committee, staff the Zoning Board of Adjustment and the Planning Board, issue sign, zoning and home occupation permits and, most recently, have been appointed as the Town's representative on the Board of Directors for the Mount Washington Valley Economic Council. It has been a challenge to work with the variety of issues, personalities, and goals I have encountered these past 12 months.

Needless to say, the volunteer community planners have been extremely busy working to update ordinances, review subdivisions and site plans, updating the Capital Improvements program, and beginning the process of updating the master plan. I foresee 1999 to be even more productive, having acquired a level of familiarity with the geography, history, culture and desires of the citizens of Conway.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDMENTS 1999 Conway Town Ballot

*The following descriptions are general and readers are advised to refer to the actual proposed amendment for the exact wording. Copies can be obtained at the Town Hall or contact Town Planner Dawn Emerson at 447-3855.

- WARRANT ARTICLE 2, ZONING AMENDMENT NUMBER 1:

Proposal: "A sign permit is valid for one (1) year from the date of approval. If the sign is not erected within one (1) year, the permit shall expire."

Currently sign permits have no expiration date. This change will make sign permits expire within one year if not constructed and will be consistent with the current building permit policy.

- WARRANT ARTICLE 3, ZONING AMENDMENT NUMBER 2:

Proposal: "any size underground or above ground on site storage tanks for classified or hazardous materials are prohibited. This does not include storage tanks used for heating fuel for commercial or domestic use or an approved use;"

Currently this section of the ordinance does not specify "on site". This section was added to the ordinance in 1998. As an afterthought the board decided to add the words "on site" to make the statement less ambiguous.

- WARRANT ARTICLE 4, ZONING AMENDMENT NUMBER 3:

Proposal of adoption of definitions for the following: buffer, buffer for the Special Highway Corridor District, buffer to wetlands, building footprint, development (deleting the present definition and inserting a new one), footprint, parking space, scenic view or vista, sediment, shoreline, storage shed, slope, soil type, state highway, street, wetlands and wetland buffer. These will be listed alphabetically towards the front of the ordinance within the existing definitions section 147-6.

- WARRANT ARTICLE 5, ZONING AMENDMENT NUMBER 4:

This addition to the Zoning Ordinance is in anticipation of the 9A Bypass. In order to keep the bypass corridor a "green gateway" through Mount Washington Valley a Bypass Overlay District has been created. Mainly this consists of keeping a 75' natural wooded buffer in residential areas and a 100' natural wooded buffer in commercial areas. The underlying uses in all districts will remain the same but some design guidelines have been created specially to blend commercial development in with the rural landscape.

- WARRANT ARTICLE 6, ZONING AMENDMENT NUMBER 5:

The Wetland and Watershed Protection Overlay District has been created to protect wetlands which are among the most productive ecosystems in the

world. Wetlands purify water filtering out contaminants and sediments, they reduce property damage by providing flood storage capacity, provide food, habitat and breeding ground for wildlife and provide green space for passive recreation. This will be accomplished by creating a 50' protective natural vegetative buffer and a 75' protective structural setback from the edge of mapped wetlands 5 acres or greater or wetlands smaller than 5 acres which directly abut a year round stream or lake.

- WARRANT ARTICLE 7, ZONING AMENDMENT NUMBER 6:

To see whether or not the Town will vote to adopt Amendment 6 as petitioned by Rosalie F. McGee and others to the Town Zoning Ordinance which amends the boundaries of the Highway Commercial District. The parcel is located within the Conway Area and the intent is to extend the Commercial District boundary northerly along the western side of Route 16 from the Eastern Slope Campground to include the Santa Maria property which is now in the Residential Agricultural District into the Highway Commercial District. Currently the Commercial District on the Easterly side of Route 16 runs northerly to the northern border of the Kentucky Fried Chicken property.

PLANNING BOARD ANNUAL REPORT 1998

Part of the Planning Board's responsibility is to help shape the future for the Town of Conway by balancing the quality of life for the residents of Conway, the preservation of the natural resources and green space and the growth of the business community. The aesthetic and economic fabric of Conway, both for the citizens and the businesses, depends on visionary forethought of what impacts growth decisions have on the community. This is achieved by the site plan and subdivision regulations established by the Planning Board and writing the zoning regulations for the voters to adopt.

One of the most important considerations encompassing all of the aforementioned aspects of planning is the effect traffic generated by growth has on the Town of Conway. Traffic has long been a problem for the Town and will probably be for years to come. One of the solutions most discussed is the construction of the 9A By-Pass. Even though the licensing agencies signed off on the project several years ago, the debate on the issues of whether 9A is the best solution to solve the traffic problem if 9A should even be built, or if the design itself could and should be improved continues with the citizens of Conway. However, in an effort to keep the horse before the cart and allow the Town of Conway some planning protection if the By-Pass is ever built, the time to implement the planning protections needs to be now.

With those considerations in mind, the Planning Board, through citizen input, working closely for over a year with a private planning consultant with no vested interest in the community, the Conservation Commission, the Audubon Society and the Environmental Protection Agency developed and approved ordinances to achieve this goal. The two most important applications of protection for the Town of Conway were determined to be to keep the By-Pass as a greenbelt, with a park like corridor along the entire length, without large buildings, large parking areas and commercial signage, to protect intersections, minimize lighting and preserve views and vistas. The second most important area of needed protection was determined to be the natural resources systems. Recognizing that development in a natural watershed can have major impacts further downstream from where the impact occurs, setbacks protection is considered essential.

In addition, the Planning Board updated the CIP, revised and adopted some new zoning definitions, worked on sections of the Master Plan, and acted on sixteen Full Site Plans, nine Minor Site Plans and eighteen Subdivisions/Boundary Line Adjustments.

I would like to thank all of the Planning Board members including: Charlene Browne, Vice Chairman; Arthur Bergmann, Robert deFeyer, Sheila Duane, David Fitch, alternates Robert Barriault and John Waterman and Selectmen's representative, Jac Cuddy. I would also like to thank Dawn Emerson, Holly Meserve, and all of the other town staff.

CHIEF OF POLICE ANNUAL REPORT 1998

In 1998 the Conway Police Department Bicycle Patrol Team finished up a federal grant from 1997-98 with the following impressive statistical data:

50	Motor Vehicle Arrests
388	Check-ups
498	Warnings
185	Summons
449	Aid to Citizens
185	Building Checks
72	Parking Tickets

These figures do not include information supplied to tourists or covering minor motor vehicle accidents. The patrols covered Conway Village and all malls and parking lots. Areas such as first bridge, Echo Lake, Cathedral Ledge and Diana's Bath were also part of the patrol and we believe criminal activity in those areas did decline. The deterrent value of the Bicycle Patrol cannot be measured and the officers involved did an outstanding job. We look forward to being able to continue this program for 1999.

This year, as well as in the past, the Traffic Controllers did a commendable job. This past year it was not necessary to man the lights at the Kancamagus Highway, as predicted, however, we did man more intersections more often than we had ever done in the past.

1998 brought several major crimes to the Department. One was the bank robbery at the Fleet Bank. With the combined efforts of Conway, Federal, and State Police Departments, the subjects were apprehended within two days of the incident. Two others were suspicious deaths which were investigated and still remain open. The first of which involved a young child who died at home. The second was a young man who was hit by a motor vehicle on Route 16 in Conway while walking along the roadway. These major crimes require a great deal of time and manpower be devoted towards them.

The Department was saddened by the death of Dispatcher (retired) Robert A. Elliott. Bob was killed in a motor vehicle accident in Wakefield, N.H., by a juvenile who was in a stolen vehicle and after causing the accident, left the scene and was later apprehended in Maine. The members of the Conway Police Department will miss Bob, his smiling face and his quick wit. Our sympathy continues to be extended to his family.

CONWAY POLICE COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT 1998

The year of 1998 brought several accomplishments to the Conway Police Department as well as three tragic losses to the Department and the Town of Conway as a whole. All three losses to the Department have been deaths of individuals affiliated with the Conway Police Department.

The first was the loss of one of our Police Commissioners, Armand Milot. Armand was an excellent asset to the Police Commission with his background in budgetary issues and handling personnel as well as public concerns.

The second loss was the loss of retired Dispatcher Robert A. Elliott due to a motor vehicle accident in Wakefield. Dispatcher Elliott was instrumental in working on the "Project Good Morning" for elderly people living alone in the Town of Conway.

The third loss was the loss of Chief Robert Mullen's Secretary, Diana M. Hall. Diana lost her battle with Melanoma on December 29, 1998.

Each person lost had their own special attributes to the Town and the Department. Our love and prayers continue to go out to their families.

Mr. David Doherty was selected to fill the vacancy left on the Police Commission by Commissioner Milot. Commissioner Doherty brings a good business background to the Commission. His knowledge and successful operation of a local business helps in the decision making processes the Commission is involved with.

Due to a combination of a grant and town funds three police cruisers now have video cameras in them. These cameras help both the citizens being stopped and the Police Officer making the stop. All conversations and movements are recorded, eliminating any doubts as to what took place.

The Department has undertaken programs that bring Police Officers into the schools and community to work closer with its citizens and students. Officer Chris Kevlin is in the High School one day a week working with students in the classroom and giving lectures. He is responsible for the establishment of the Neighborhood Watch Program at Lamp Lighters. Another way Officers are involved with schools is through the D.A.R.E. program. The Department has three Officers conducting D.A.R.E. classes, one in each of the Town's Elementary Schools.

The Conway Police Department is one of the finest police departments in the State of New Hampshire and thanks go to the Town of Conway for its confidence and support.

PUBLIC WORKS DIRECTOR ANNUAL REPORT 1998

This is the third consecutive year that this report begins with a discussion of our infrastructure. For those of you who have diligently followed this narrative from year to year, I will spare you the details this time. For the new readers, what we have been discussing is the need to address the deteriorating condition of the Town's roads, bridges, drainage systems, sidewalks, etc. Last year the Town adopted a program which for the first time addressed this need while continuing to fund the maintenance of the remaining infrastructure. The Old Bartlett Road Bridge, a section of the Brownfield Road, all of Blueberry Lane, and some of the drainage along West Main Street were all repaired in this first year of the program. Hiram Philbrook Road, a section of Hobbs Street and another section of the West Main Street drainage are scheduled for this upcoming year.

The ice storm was the top story in '98. Conway was fortunate that only the southern portion of Town experienced extensive tree damage and prolonged power outages. We were also lucky that all of our expenses related to that storm were covered by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). I know I speak for all of us when I say the crew did a great job getting us through that storm. When it rains it pours or so the saying goes. In June of '98 it rained a total of 12 inches. The resulting floods damaged the Whitaker Lane Bridge and the interim cover at the landfill. The bridge is closed and will remain that way until 2000 when funds will be available from the State Bridge Aid Program to cover 80% of the total cost. FEMA assisted the Town again, this time by funding 87% of the landfill cover repair.

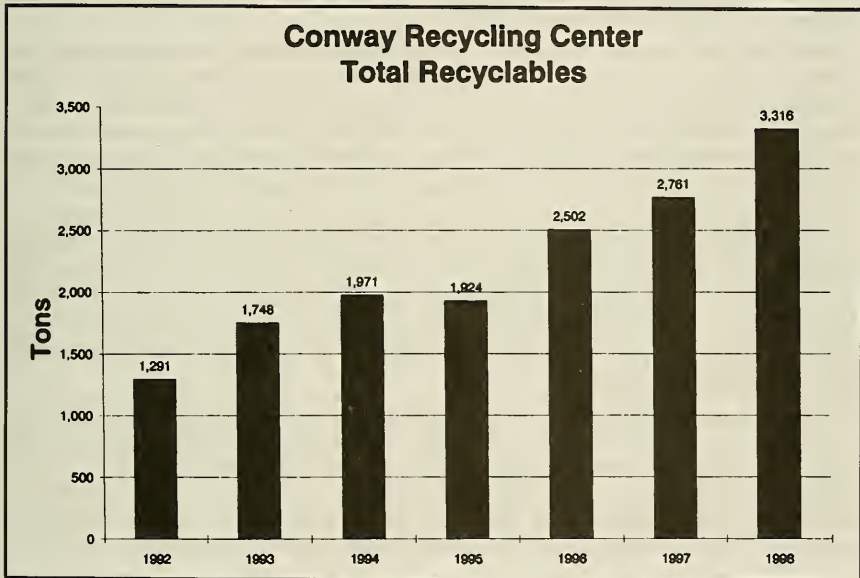
Once the rain let up, we began the Phase II Landfill Expansion. The Town selected A.J. Coleman Inc. as the contractor for this project and I congratulate them for completing the work ahead of schedule and under budget. Phase I began operations in '92 and will be completely full by the fourth quarter of '99. Phase II will begin receiving trash late in '99 and is expected to have the capacity for eight years of trash. There are a total of five phases permitted at our current landfill site. The total facility is expected to last until the year 2025. In the meantime, we must continue to recycle and to reduce the amount of waste that we generate. The annual amount of waste placed in the landfill has decreased every year since '95. This year we buried 320 tons less trash than the year before while handling a total of 460 tons more material at the transfer station. The difference results in an overall increase in the percentage of recycled material. Since 1990, the total amount of recycled material is equivalent to two years of trash.

Other public works projects this year included the reconstruction of tennis and basketball courts at Davis Park and the fire proofing/painting of the Swift River Covered Bridge. The Town would like to thank former Selectman, Harvey Blake, for his dedication and assistance in looking after this historic landmark.

This year Ron Brosnan and Gene Gray retired from the public works crew. Both men were long time employees of the town and we are sorry to see them go, but we wish them all the best.

RECREATION DIRECTOR'S ANNUAL REPORT 1998

The Conway Recreation Department is located at the Conway Community Building in Center Conway. The Conway Community Building includes a meeting room for special recreation functions, and a children's game room equipped with a pool table, ping pong table, and various video games. The playing fields surrounding the Conway Community Building accommodate various sports programs such as flag football, soccer, field hockey, T-ball, Bambino league baseball, softball and a basketball court.

The Town of Conway also offers many other outdoor parks and recreation areas for community uses: Conway Lake Beach, First River Bridge, Smith Eastman Recreation Area, Whitaker Woods, Davis Park, Schouler Park, Nasby King Field, Hussey Field and Conway Skating Rink. These sites provide recreational activities such as hiking, biking, swimming, skating, canoeing, cross country skiing, tennis, basketball, playgrounds and multi-purpose fields.

The Recreation Department offered some new programs in 1998: Adult open gym basketball, adult fencing and our most popular of new programs, Nascar model building. The model building class was unique because it concentrated on individual achievement and reward. Local dealerships: Crest Auto World, MacDonald Motors, Profile Motors, along with Albany Service Center, Varsity Beverage and Northeast Autobody, participated as major sponsors and also as final competition judges.

The re-construction of the Davis Park tennis courts provided the Recreation Department the opportunity to offer tennis lessons to children and adults in 1998. Tennis lesson participation saw more than 30 children and 12 adults enrolled in the summer program. In addition to new tennis courts, Davis Park basketball courts underwent a major face lift. These two courts received extensive use in 1998 as well as a one week basketball camp for boys & girls ages 8-14.

Programs for the Junior High age student were once again funded for the 1998 year through grants from the NH Bureau of Substance Abuse Services and PlusTime of NH. These grants provided more than \$11,280 exclusively for children ages 12-15. Programs included hiking, biking, canoeing, educational trips, hockey games, baseball games, paintball competition, and dances. To better serve the teens of our town, the Recreation Department extended its Teen Center hours. This provided more options for teens to relax and spend time with their friends in a safe and supervised setting. The Conway Recreation Department has been awarded these same grants for the 1999 year and will continue to be committed to providing safe & healthy alternatives to at risk behavior.

1998 saw the reemergence of the Friends of Conway Recreation, Inc. This volunteer based non-profit group provided scholarships for a number of children throughout the year. In addition to this, The Friends of Conway Recreation Inc., purchased a tractor for our sports field maintenance, fax machine, cell phone,

and candy machines. In the spring of 1999 The Friends of Conway Recreation Inc., will purchase an outdoor portable scoreboard to be used for the flag football, soccer and field hockey programs. Thanks to this hard working group, the Conway Recreation Department is able to better serve the Conway community.

All the programs provided by the Conway Recreation Department have some form of volunteer assistance. We were fortunate enough to have more than 90 volunteers contribute their time to coaching, chaperoning or supporting recreation programs in other capacities. Businesses and civic groups work closely with our department to ensure our programs succeed.
