DANVILLE, NEW HAMPSHIRE

The Rock Rimmon Fire Tower, featured on front cover, was erected in 1928 in Danville. Located at 42 55 43 latitude, 71 05 43 longitude, and 350 feet ground elevation, the tower stands 56 feet high.

Watchmen who have manned the Tower include George E. Shaw, 1928-31 and 1933-41; H. Henry Knowles, 1932; A. A. Hathaway, 1942-47; and John A. Burnett, 1948.

Closed by the State of New Hampshire in the fall of 1981, the Tower is currently leased to the Town of Danville, operated by the non-profit Rock Rimmon Fire Watch Association, and manned by volunteer fire control personnel from towns in the view area of the Tower.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS

The approximate yield on investments for 1982 was 10.4% based on an average principal and accumulated dividends of \$56,300. and income of \$5853.99. This yield of 10.4% compares with 9.5% for 1981 and 8.0% for 1980. Also a capital gain of \$439.87 was realized on the sale of the Consolidated Edison Bond.


Perpetual cemetery care funds were established in the names of Clistie Boles and Barbara & Raymond Wildes, Jr.

A new Capital Reserve Fund for the Recreation Commission was set up as voted at Town Meeting.

Additions to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund were received from the Town by vote at Town Meeting, from donations by the Fire Belles and Firemen's Picnic Committee, and from the sale of old Engine #4.

The Municipal Building Capital Reserve Fund was re-established by proceeds from the sale of the mobile home and monies returned by the Town.

Warrant & Budget

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Danville Fire Association Hall in said Danville on Tuesday, the eighth (8th) day of March, next, at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By ballot).

2. To choose all necessary School District Officers

for the ensuing year. (By ballot).
3. To vote on the following question: Are you in favor of the repeal of the present Zoning Ordinance and the adoption of the new Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board? (By ballot).

The proposed new Ordinance divides the Town into five separate districts in which various uses are permitted or excluded. The new Ordinance includes provisions dealing with dimensional requirements, mobile homes, nonconforming uses, the administration of the Zoning Ordinance, the regulation of growth, and other matters.

4. To vote on the following question: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 72:43-f for the adjusted elderly exemptions from property tax? These statutes provide for the following exemptions, based on assessed value,

for qualified taxpayers: for a person 65 years of age up to 75 years, \$10,000; for a person 75 years of age up to 80 years, \$15,000; for a person 80 years of age or older, \$20,000. To qualify, a person must have been a New Hampshire resident for at least 5 years; own the real estate individually or jointly, or if the real estate is owned by his spouse, they must have been married for at least 5 years. In addition, the taxpayer must have a net income of less than \$10,000 or if married, a combined net income of less than \$12,000, and own net assets of \$30,000 or less, excluding the value of the person's residence. (By ballot).

5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appro-

priations of the same.

6. To see how much of the Parsonage Fund the Town will

vote to spend for the ensuing year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for the use of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Se-

lectmen to sell Tax Title Property by public auction.

9. To allow the Selectmen to reconvey title to tax deeded property to the former owners only upon repayment of taxes, costs, interest and other expenses which would

have been paid.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for, contract for, and accept aid relative to natural disasters from the Federal Government from the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration in

Washington.

11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon: \$8,500. - Police Cruiser; \$2,500. - Sanitation; \$1,250. - Fire Department; and \$1,250. - Police Department.

12. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:

95-b.

13. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. to eliminate a blind curve by removing about 6 feet of banking on the south side of Long Pond

Road, east of Pine Street, land owned by R. W. Cheney & Son, and conditioned on land being given to the Town. 14. To see if the Town will vote to direct the Selectmen to appoint a committee to study the practicality of the purchase of a computer system to maintain Town records, and to report their findings to the 1984 Town Meeting. This committee to include, but not limited to, the Treasurer, Tax Collector, and representatives of the Selectmen's office, Auditors, Library, Planning Board, Police Department and Fire Department. (By petition). 15. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Danville, New Hampshire, and to the health and welfare of the people of Danville, New Hampshire.

These actions shall include:

1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.

2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit

both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States. (By petition).

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. to be placed in the Capital Re-

serve Fund for future fire truck purchases.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000. to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the development of future recreation facilities. (Not recommended by Budget Committee).

18. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund in the amount of \$3,000. as a partial cost of a future full reappraisal of property in the Town of

Danville.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800. for replacement of the furnace and associated duct work at the Town Hall.

20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for work at the Town Hall which would include opening the rear door with stairs and/or ramp, painting the downstairs offices, and a parking lot.

21. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Rockingham Planning Commission.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$923. as one year's membership in the

Rockingham Planning Commission.

23. To see if the Town will vote to ratify the action of the Board of Selectmen to give up rights to the land on the West side of Route 111A (Lot #105, Map 3,) to the Danville Fire Association, Inc. 24. To see if the Town will vote to close the Ballfield

Escrow Account and place the \$107.32 plus accrued inter-

est in the General Fund.

25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500. for the completion of Tanker #3. 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to grant one or more franchises to operate a Cable T. V. system in this Town, said authorization to encompass the setting of such conditions as the Board shall deem necessary and appropriate. Said conditions may include the setting of subscription or service rates to citizens and franchising fees to the Town to the extent that they (fees) are not inconsistent with N.H. RSA Ch. 53-C and the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Communications Commission.

27. To transact any other business that may legally

come before the Meeting.

PLANNING BOARD

Planning Board members during 1982 considered several subdivisions brought before them. Two were approved, one was denied and referred to the Board of Adjustment. Members also referred a request of a zoning change to that Board, which subsequently was approved.

Seven zoning ordinance articles were placed on the 1982 Town Warrant which were approved by a vote of the townspeople. The Board enacted a gravel regulation this year, putting the Town in line with the State requirements regarding gravel excavation

sites.

Recodification of the Zoning Ordinance took a great deal of time and work by each Board member and other Town Officials. The newly-proposed ordinance will be available for the townspeoples' consideration, and will be voted upon at the Annual Town Meeting.

The recodification process was necessary to strengthen and clarify the present ordinance so that problems the Town has previously faced, hope-

fully, will not re-occur.

All Planning Board meetings are open to the public, and participation and input of residents is most welcome.

FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND FOREST RANGER REPORT

Forest fire prevention, our business, business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N. H. Division of Forest and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first for-

est fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at ground. Local governments provide the fire fire fighters who are appointed as warvolunteer dens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

DANVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT ROBERT A. SEARS

Memories

A memorial usually begins with such statements as a loving husband, a devoted father and a good citizen - and Robert A. Sears, "Bob" was certainly all of these, but I want to write some memories from my association with him in the Danville Police Department.

Thirty years ago-1953-Bob and I were elected to serve on the Police Department for the first time. Bob served as Chief, and for the next 11 years we served together along with various others.

Bob was a strict but fair person and a firm warning from him was enough in most cases. He kept informed of all phases of law enforcement and conducted thorough investigations of any incident. In those early years, to receive a "talking to" from Chief Sears was very embarrassing. To go to Plaistow Court was worse. A youth, suspected of being involved in vandalism was questioned, did not consider lying to a policeman, and if involved, was taken to his parents where he would nearly always receive severe punishment.

Paper work was not a big requirement, such as it is now, so close communication was necessary and the Chief was responsible for having the knowledge and information necessary to carry on the depart-

ment. Each officer worked closely with him.

Bob held regular target practice sessions so any officer would be fully able to handle his gun

should it be necessary.
In 1953 the total budget was \$100 for the year and by 1960 had increased to \$300., but this had to cover any supplies needed as well as pay for officers. Much of our time was donated and Bob never complained, but was happy to give the community any time he felt necessary.

In those days much was left to the judgement of the police officer. As Chief, Bob had to have the ability to make the right decision on how to handle all problems.

My memories of working with him over the years are many, and I'll always be grateful for the opportunity to have served so long with Chief Robert A. Sears.

POLICE DEPARTMENT REPORT - 1982

This year, as in every year, the calls this department has handled have been many and varied with a number of these related to dogs and other animals.

A police department is a law enforcement agency and enforcing the law is the business of the department. However, we feel it better to devote time to preventing crime or other problems. This has been our aim during recent years and we are most thankful for the cooperation of our citizens. Our budget does not allow for full time patrol, so we rely on calls reporting any suspicious activity as well as devoted officers who are ever watchful as they go about town on their personal business. This is the same as free patrol time.

Last year we reported the names of five of us, on our department, who had received State Certification. This year we are pleased to report three more officers who have received their certification————Bruce Antognoni, Bradford Greeley and Richard O'Brien. We are fortunate to have these qualified officers on our department. However, our true assets are only those officers with other qualifications and in a "call" department such as ours, those who freely make themselves available to respond to a call at any time.

Our department has made every effort to provide the best possible protection for the people and property of the Town of Danville, for the least

possible cost, and we want to thank all our citizens who have been so helpful and understanding during the past year.
