

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COVER STORY

The people of Epping are justly proud of the new Dam across the Lamprey River at West Epping. It is to be hoped that it will be the last of many that have preceded it. In 1775 the dam of that day furnished power to turn the wheels of a grist mill that ground the grain for the families many miles around. Farmers came from Stratham and from Nottingham and all the towns between to the grist mill on the "upper privilege of Pawtuckaway". Where the new Dam now stands there was not only a grist mill, but on the south side, a saw mill, a wooden box mill, a paper box mill, a shingle mill, and at one time a plaster mill. The plaster came in box cars and was ground up for fertilizer. Opposite, on the north side was a woolen mill owned in 1859 by Jacob Prescott. The other mills belonged to various members of the Folsom family.

Mr. Prescott sold to Mr. Carpenter, then it was owned again by the Prescotts who ran it this time as a hosiery mill. They sold it - or rented it - to a Mr. Dow who intended to start a shoe shop, but it was burned before he operated. On the other side for five generations the mills were operated by the Folsoms until they were sold to Henry Thibeault. By this time the saw mill was the only one remaining and that was burned shortly after the Thibeaults took possession.

The new Dam has been built with very little expense to the town of Epping. Through the efforts of Edmond Blair when he was representative, the state became interested. The Fish and Game Department have been directly back of the construction, but if it had not been for the determined efforts of Lionel Cote, it might have been a long time before this improvement to the town became a reality.

The old dams were built by private enterprise or perhaps - at least the grist mills, by a group of men who took out shares. If there were 28 shares and a man owned three of them, he had the use of the mill three days out of

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twenty-eight.

It may be that the dams were built higher in those days. Certainly the road and the bridge were lower. In an August freshet in the years between 1888 and 1890 a rowboat full of gay young people was rowed over the tops of the corn growing just east of where Daniel Thibeault's house is now. All the land between Rauh's sandbank and the east side of Stingy River was a lake. In the spring of 1901 a freshet cut off the west side of the river from the village and the only way for the teacher to get to the school house was to go up to the railroad bridge, down Holt's lane, thence to the school house.

No date can be given for the oldest dam in town - the Indian Dam back of Paul Guy's house. The Indians used to stand there to spear the Lamprey eels - for which the river is named - as they went down stream. The old dams had a little round hole in the flume and the eels were collected by the bushel as they slid through the hole. The "old inhabitants" hope the builders of the new Dam have provided a proper runway for fish and eels.

The old millyard was a scene of much activity when nearly forty men made a living in and around it. To-day it is an empty place but it is hoped that the near future will find it a scene of joyful activity when the boys and girls of this generation come to take advantage of its opportunities for happy and wholesome recreation.

TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT - 1966

I respectfully submit to the taxpayers of Epping my report for 1966.

It was a very busy year with over a quarter of a million dollars collected in the form of property, head, poll and yield taxes. (\$271.896.28)

Taxes are a necessity of life. An unpleasant necessity, but a necessity nonetheless. We tend to push things like taxes out of our minds, remembering them only when the tax bill arrives in the mail. But, the results of your taxes are with you all year round. In the educational system you have set up for your children; in your provision for local good government; in the maintenance of the roads and the community in general; in all the things you, the voters, vote on to be included in the town budget.

The tax assessment of a town is computed to provide for the overall maintenance of the town. When a few people do not pay their taxes it places an unfair burden on everyone else. This number is to be used for emergency use only! By dialing this number you are automatically connected to the Red Network, a volunteer citizens group consisting of five private homes--plus the fire station. This insures 24 hours a day coverage in the event of an emergency.

In 1965 the total circulation was 7,334. I hope the decrease in circulation for 1966 is not my fault but because of the students borrowing from the high school library. The students do make more use of the library than the non-students. We do try to keep up with the top reading for adults in both fiction and non-fiction.

Many meetings have been held in the library, sponsored by the trustees. Work has been started in the basement for a large meeting room, and it is hoped that many groups will be invited to be our special guests at the library. A furnace room has been completed and work is now going on for a stack area for storage of magazines and overflow of books. Electrical wiring will be the next step to provide adequate lighting and outlets for motion pictures and illustrated lectures. There is to be a lunch

counter area for making coffee and serving light refreshments. Tables and chairs have already been purchased. It is hoped that this project will be completed in time for National Library Week - April 16 - 22.

A card catalog file has been on order for some time now - also the double island shelving for reference books. The state library has given us 100 dollars for more reference books because we have met with standards set up for libraries of our size. This enables us to purchase the more expensive material that otherwise we could not afford too often.

The Friends of the Library meet regularly in the library every other month. These folks have been a great help in the library. They have assisted in the Christmas decorations - helped to clean out all the unusable books that were stored in the basement - and have purchased a large coffee urn.

The Epping Garden Club has done a great deal too. Flower arrangements have been brought in from time to time. The landscaping project of the library has done so much to add to the beauty of our building and will be a source of enjoyment for years to come. The trees and shrubs are doing fine. Now if we had a disposal receptacle to encourage folks not to be "litterbugs" things will improve that much more.

The Epping Women's Friendship League meet regularly in the library and the Epping P.T.A. hold their April meetings every year with us. Several classes from the grammar school have been our guests when they hear brief reviews of books and register for borrowing - besides getting off for an hour from the classrooms. Mr. Nugent's 6th grade class came down one day last spring and cleaned off the library grounds which were greatly appreciated.

Illustrated lectures were held - one sponsored by the Garden Club and the other by the Friends of the

Library. A film was shown to the P.T.A. during National Library Week. Our annual tea for the teachers was held in the fall by the trustees and librarian. This is always a pleasant get together - meeting the new teachers and the "old" and acquainting them with the library and its books.

I have attended a number of library meetings throughout the year. These prove very helpful as well as fun to meet with other librarians in their libraries. It was my pleasure to speak to the Golden Age Club of Portsmouth last April. Such an enthusiastic and active group. Would you folks like to get one started here?

The library trustees have worked hard this past year - meeting at least once a month. Many problems come up and are discussed. They devote a great number of hours and no pay and very few thank yous come their way. They are a big help to me in taking care of some of my headaches and I do appreciate all they have done. My thanks to them and to the janitor, Mr. Freeman.

My thanks go to everyone who has contributed towards making this year a pleasant one. It is always a pleasure to serve you in any way I can, and I do enjoy being the librarian of our town.

POLICE REPORT

I hereby submit my police report for the year 1966.

This has been a very busy year for the Police Dept. We have had a large increase in violations of speeders, possession of liquor by minors, adults selling to minors and adults buying for minors, etc.

We have realized over \$905.00 in revenue from fines this past year.

It has come to my attention that some citizens of this town feel the need of added police protection, this Dept. will be glad to add more man hours, but I am sure you realize that to do so, will require more funds than is now allotted to us. May I suggest with your approval that the 1967 appropriation be set at \$4,000 - \$5,000 dollars.

For comparison purposes, Kingston appropriates the sum of \$5,000 for their Police Dept., and Raymond \$4,250.00, I am sure you are aware of the fact that the population of these neighboring towns is about one-half that of Epping.

We are planning to run our teenage dances as in the past.

We invite parents to attend. They are always welcome. We would appreciate a few chaperones.

As you know, the money derived from these dances, is spent for necessary equipment used in this Dept. at no cost to you, the taxpayer.

We now own three 2-way radios, thereby assuring better police protection for everyone concerned.

Our Old State Police radio was sold at approximately the same price that it was acquired for a few years

ago, and the proceeds refunded to the town's general fund rather than the Police Dept.

This Dept. donated \$50.00 to the Raymond ambulance fund. We also contributed to the local Boy Scouts, and the Baseball Field.

WATER DEPARTMENT

To the Board of Selectmen and Townspeople of Epping, New Hampshire:

To my knowledge this is the first time that a complete report of the workings of your Water Department has been published in your Town Report. I sincerely hope that this report will answer some of your questions as to its maintenance and operation.

Your town water pump is operated by a fifteen (15) HP electric motor. A G.M.C. gasoline engine, for emergency use in the event of loss of electrical power is on standby.

Our storage capacity is 200,000 gallons, which is approximately two and one half (2-1/2) days supply. In the event of a breakdown in pumping operations this supply could be stretched to four (4) days with careful and curtailed use. This should be ample time for repairs.

The well is sixty-five (65) feet in depth and of gravel-packed construction.

The pump operates an average of eleven and one half (11-1/2) hours per day, pumping approximately one hundred and twenty-five (125) gallons per minute. The maximum that can be pumped without pumping the well dry is one hundred and fifty (150) gallons per minute. Although the recovery rate of water in the well is very good we always pump with at least a depth of twenty-five (25) feet of water in the well to keep it clear.

Samples of your town water are taken periodically by your Health Officer and sent to the Health Department in Concord for analysis. This is to insure that your water is safe for use at all times.

WATER IS A PRECIOUS COMMODITY PLEASE DON'T WASTE IT

I would like to ask parents to please instruct their children to leave the hydrant flags alone. These markers are installed in the fall and removed in the spring. They are placed on the hydrants to make the hydrants more visible to the drivers of the snowplows and to the firemen in case of fire.

In closing, I would like to thank all those who have helped to make the Water Department a successful operation this year.

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people--those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966).

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated statetown organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres—a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dis-

pose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.

- 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
- 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important--instruct your children that matches are not play things.

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of improving the Old Hedding Road (Dump Road) continuing East from point of termination of 1966 improvement. Selectmen
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be used in cooperation with State and Federal funds for the control of White Pine Blister Rust within the confines of the town. Selectmen

1966 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING REVIEW

School District Officers were elected as follows:

Moderator - Claude A. Goodrich Clerk - Flora M. Goodrich School Board Member for three years -Robert G. Kimball Treasurer - J. Philip Estey

The Annual School Meeting was opened at 10 a.m. on March 5, 1966 with less than sixty voters in attendance and the routine business was transacted.

The following items of particular interest were discussed and acted upon during the meeting.

The amount of \$790 for the purchase of an outside light at the Junior High School was discussed and the voters voted to have installed, two lights, for that area through the Public Service Company for the yearly service charge of \$120.00.

During the year the Union Office had been moved from Epping to Brentwood and this was explained that because of the addition of an assistant superintendent and office personnel, more space was needed.

It was voted to lease a portion of the Junior High site to the Quintown Little League which they will develop and will use for Little League purposes and the school will use for softball.

It was voted to continue the AREA Planning Committee.

The School Bus route was extended to pick up the children around Acre Street and on Route 125 which increased the budget \$200.00.

The voters voted to accept Title I monies from Federal sources. These monies will be spent for remedial work

and transportation of pupils to the Bixler House* in Exeter.

The West Epping School building was closed this year because of the new building and the School Board was instructed to transfer this property back to the town through the proper channels.

The meeting felt that there was no need for the school district to install a water meter at the Junior High School which would cost \$250.00.

The School Board was given permission to let the bus contract for a three or five year term, whichever could be done most advantageously, thus hoping to get newer buses.

Graduations were discussed and it was voted that all awards, given at graduation, would be presented by the school principal.

The total school budget of \$305, 950. 45 was accepted.



School census reports indicate that three rooms will be required to accommodate each of the incoming first grades for several years. (The census in 1960 totaled 195 in the under six age bracket. This year's school census totaled 319 in the under six bracket.)

The School District can accommodate its students under somewhat crowded conditions in 1967-68. The classroom used by the remedial class in 1966-67 will be used by the third first grade; the room used by the nurse in 1966-67 will be used by the remedial class. What was a teachers' work room or a book storage room in 1966-1967 will be used as a nurse's office.

It is therefore imperative that one additional classroom be available for use by elementary students in each successive year, starting September 1968.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE CITIZENS OF EPPING:

In my annual message to you last year, I encouraged you to wait until a complete report had been issued as a result of the Epping, Raymond, Candia Co-op Study, before making any further local commitments, especially pertaining to the complicated high school situation.

I am sorry to report that this particular study seems to have come to an end - at least for the time being. The last meeting was held almost a year ago and there is little possibility of another one being scheduled in the near future. In fact, a final report has not even been submitted, due to an apparent lack of interest. One can only conclude then that these three communities do not have similar educational needs at this time.

Realizing that this study was coming to naught, the Epping School Board requested me, on November 2, 1966, to write letters to the neighboring school boards of Exeter, Newmarket, and Sanborn Regional, requesting tuition information. The following information was received.

Newmarket would consider taking approximately 100 high school students, grades 10-12, for a limited period of time.

Exeter reiterated its policy of accepting no more than 20 students - new students to be in grades 9, 10, or 11.

Sanborn Regional, however, in a letter dated November 21, 1966, indicated that it would consider accepting ALL of the Epping High School students on a tuition basis, beginning with the school year 1968-69; provided that the following general conditions were acceptable to the Epping School District:

- a. That a long term exclusive contract for a minimum of ten years be signed. That the contract could be written for a longer period with renewable option at specific intervals.
- b. That transportation could be provided by either school district.
- c. That the elementary curriculum at Epping be co-ordinated with Sanborn Regional's elementary curriculum.

If these three general conditions were agreeable to Epping, the Sanborn Regional School Board went on to say, it would then undertake a study to determine (a) what building and staff alterations would be necessary to accommodate Epping; (b) if the acceptance of these Epping students would be financially sound to both school districts; and (c) the tuition rate or rates that should be established and the type of contract required.

At the time of this writing, the Epping School Board is continuing its study of these three replies, attempting to relate each to the specific educational and financial needs of the Town of Epping. Therefore, no recommendations are being offered for your consideration at this time.

However, it must be stated that no official action can or will be taken by the school board or Superintendent without specific direction from the voters of the Epping School District. The board is hoping to receive this directive at the up-coming annual school district meeting. For this reason I urge everyone to attend the March 11th district meeting. This is being scheduled for 1:00 p.m. with the hope that more people will be able to attend.

Before closing may I draw your attention to the other reports in this booklet and also to the many statistical pages. If further information is desired, it may be

obtained by contacting the members of the school boardor calling the office of the Superintendent of Schools.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools, School Board Members, Citizens of Epping:

Health promotion is a recognized component of present day junctional school education, which is designed to prepare each youngster to deal with life's academic, cultural, and practical needs. No phase of the schools activities has more to contribute to the student than does the health program.

Closely interwoven with all phases of school life, the health program aims at developing each student in terms of his present and future needs. As an achievement in living, health is integrated with all aspects of school life which contribute to the effectiveness and enjoyment of life for each youngster.

Primary responsibility for the health of the child rests with the parents, but school is in a strategic position to contribute effectively to the health of every school-age child. The school does not assume the role of the parent. Rather the School Health program is planned to fortify and supplement the efforts of the parents. The health education program in a modern school should no longer be a hit and miss one, but a continuous process. It should embrace all the activities and everyday living experiences that are a part of a child's life.

School Health Services comprise those procedures destined to determine the health status of the child; to enlist the child's interest in protecting and safeguarding his health; to help parents to understand their children's health needs; and to take the necessary steps to provide suitable treatment for disease and the correcting of physical defects.

Throughout the nation the attention of the school health program has been gradually shifting from purely physical disabilities toward a broader view.

Physical defects commend interest and effort because they are usually easy to find and treat.

Problems of personality growth and learning are more complex. We are often unaware that a student has such difficulties.

Recognizing the cause may be clouded because of contributing factors, such as; Anemia, Congenital Brain Damage, pimples, problems of family care such as, tight shoes, no shoes, watching T. V. until midnight, no breakfast, psychological problems, such as a parent expecting sixteen year old behavior from an eight year old, divorce, or poverty. Diagnosis and treatment are not simple, nor dramatic, as physical disabilities.

We spend most of the time on simple physical problems. But as we try to help more children get more from school we must see the child in relation to his environment. The nurses home visits and talks with parents, teachers, and students represents a small step in a difficult path.

This is a busy schedule, yes, but an interesting one. One that could not function without the help of all, the community, parents, teachers, groups, and individuals who have helped in so many ways. Our thanks to all of you.

Gentlemen:

Submitted herewith is the report of an examination and audit of the accounts of the Epping School District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, which was made by this Division in accordance with your request. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the School Board and the School District Treasurer.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of June 30, 1965 and June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the Net Debt decreased by \$13,806.43 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit B)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the School District during the fiscal year is made in Exhibit B, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures - Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit D), a revenue surplus of \$15,535.51, less a net overdraft of appropriations of \$110.46, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$15,425.05.

Statement of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E-1)

A summary statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit E-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of June 30, 1966, is indicated in Exhibit E-2.

Statement of Building Fund Account: (Exhibit F)

A statement of the activity in the Building Fund Account during the fiscal year is presented in Exhibit F.

Statement of School Tax Account: (Exhibit G)

A statement of the School Tax Account with the Town of Epping is presented in Exhibit G. As indicated therein, as of June 30, 1966, the School District had received from the Town the total amount of the 1965-66 School Tax of \$189,841.79.

Student Activities Fund: (Exhibit H)

A statement of the Student Activities Fund for the fiscal year of 1965-66 is included in Exhibit H.

Statement of Bonded Debt: (Exhibit I)

A statement of the outstanding bonded indebtedness of the School District as of June 30, 1966, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit I.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over currentliabilities) increased from \$2,701.40 to \$4,507.83 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1966, as shown herewith:

Note, Bond & Coupon Register:

A record of all note and bond issues should be kept in the standard form of Note, Bond and Coupon Register which is designed for this purpose. This is required by R.S.A. 33:12, which provides as follows:

"33:12 Register. The treasurer of every municipal corporation shall keep a register, in such form as may be prescribed by the state tax commission, which shall state the denomination, number and date of every bond or note issued by the municipality, the time when and the place where the principal thereof and interest, if any, thereon are payable and such other information as the state tax commission may prescribe. The state tax commission shall inspect the register provided for herein whenever it shall make any audit of the accounts of a municipal corporation."

Conclusion:

The provisions of Chapter 184, of the Laws of 1955, require that this report or the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the School District.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Epping School District for their assistance during the course of the audit.
