TOWN JOURNAL

In 1966 the drought was less severe than in the last several years but precipitation was still considerably below normal.

On May 30 the town observed its 175th anniversary with an "Old Home Day" type of celebration combined with Memorial Day ceremonies. About 150 former residents and townspeople enjoyed a picnic lunch on the common at noon. A representation from the combined Posts of the Antrim American Legion and the Bennington Veterans of Foreign Wars, accompanied by a District Color Guard, held memorial rites at World War II Memorial at Otter Lake and at Greenvale Cemetery. A parade, led by Representative Donald C. Davis, was made up of these same units plus Boy Scout and Girl Scout organizations and the Antrim High School Band. The parade marched through the village and held memorial rites at the village cemetery and at World War I Memorial at the library. Here the School children also had appropriate exercises. Later in the afternoon, in the church, Rev. Mr. Frank W. Sherman acted as master of ceremonies for a hymn sing and a program of folk songs and organ music. A tea in the town hall, arranged by the Woman's Club, concluded the day's festivities.

The July fourth Whing Ding was again sponsored by the Recreation Committee. Activities began on Saturday evening, July 3, with a dance and the crowning of the queen. The celebration reopened on Monday, the fifth, with a midway on the common, a chicken barbecue at noon, the parade of about 30 units and a muster made up of seven competing teams of the Cheshire County Motorized Firemen. The Lafayette Artillery Company from Lyndeboro was in attendance and demonstrated loading and firing their Revolutionary brass cannon. The spectacular this year was the parachute landing of two sky divers, on target, in the field next to the library. Later events were a country auction, a supper, a rock and roll dance, a raffle and fire works. Attendance was estimated at least 5,000, the largest at any of the Whing Ding celebrations. \$960.00 was realized.

The Recreation Committee continued its program as of the last several years. The beach at Sunset Lake, the ball field and the playground area were maintained. Work on the tennis court was nearly completed. This area was flooded and used for skating in the winter. The usual activities for children and young people were continued: the Halloween and the Christmas parties; the talent show; bowling trips to Peterborough in winter and the school outings for each of the three rooms at the end of the school year. There were 140 town children, from infants through the sixth grade, to receive Christmas gifts this year.

At a special town meeting on July 14, it was voted to restrict use of the town beach at Sunset Lake to residents and their guests only. The sidewalk was resurfaced from a point opposite the Greenfield Industries on Slip Road to beyond the entrance to the library on Forest Road. The town hall, the adjoining kitchen and the vestibule were painted. Painting of the walls and floor of the lower hall was completed by volunteer labor.

An electric standby generating plant was installed at the fire house. A water supply was brought to the building and a septic tank was installed. The fire alarm system was changed to the new Mutual Aid Tone System. Two hundred feet of two-and-one-half-inch hose was purchased.

Membership in a proposed co-operative school in the Wilton area was rejected. A study is now being made of participation in a proposed co-operative school in the Peterborough area. \$1,000.00 in federal funds was accepted for the purchase of audio-visual equipment at the school. Through the generosity of Camp Union, grades five and six spent a week at Camp Union Conservation School at a nominal fee. The lower grades spent a spring and a fall day there as guests of Camp Union.

Camp Union, as in previous years, offered free swimming lessons in summer to resident children.

Operation Headstart conducted a six-week summer session in our school building with four teachers and about thirty children from several towns in attendance.

The Parent Teachers' Club sponsored a dental clinic, paid part of the expenses of the fifth and sixth grades to Camp Union Conservation School and provided gifts for the children graduating from our school to Junior High.

Stephenson Memorial Library was granted \$100.00 in State Aid for children's books and \$100.00 for reference books.

The large maple tree at the library entrance was so badly decayed that it had to be cut down. The Woman's Club had the stump removed and planted a 24-foot red maple nearby on the library lot. The Woman's Club also had iron hand rails installed at the library entrance and purchased a small electric stove for use in the upper town hall kitchen.

The Grange, Sportsman's Club, Woman's Club and Women's Fellowship joined in buying additional equipment and dishes for the lower hall kitchen.

Frank W. Sherman, who has served as the minister since 1963, was ordained and installed in the Union Congregational Church here.

The State Park was again a popular camping and recreational attraction. Average Sunday attendance, at the day-use beach and picnic area alone, was 2400 during the summer. At the campers' beach, a second parking lot was built to accommodate about 55 cars.

At Crotched Mountain Rehabilitation Center, a Department of Vocational Rehabilitation Services was established.

Leonard N. Hodgman received a Bachelor Science degree from Middlebury College. Frank W. Sherman received a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Hartford Theological Seminary Foundation.

Randall Cowles, Bruce Gagnon and James Sullivan enlisted in the U.S. Navy.

Joan Belmore joined the Peace Corps.

The following organizations were active during the year: Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, Brownies, Camera Club, Couples Club, 4-H Clubs, Grange, Greenfield Improvement Association, Greenfield Woman's Club, Monadnock Community Hospital Aid, Parent-Teachers' Club, Sportsman's Club, Stitch and Chatter, Teen Canteen, Women's Fellowship, Union Congregational Church.

New houses were built by Maurice Belmore, John Elberfeld, David Houston, Lucian Hulslander, Paul Powell, Raymond Wamboldt and James Young. A large dairy barn was built by Saxton Fletcher.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenfield in the County of Hillsboro in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Greenfield on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next at ten thirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

The first article of the Town Warrant will be to choose Town Officers. The Polls will be open at Ten thirty a. m. and close at six p. m. (unless otherwise voted at the meeting.) Recess until seven thirty p. m. when Article 2 and remaining articles of the warrant will be acted upon.

- Art. 1. To Choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money for the maintenance of the Town Hall, Old Age Assistance, Parks, Cemeteries, Vital Statistics, Town Dump, Street Lighting, Social Security, Town Officers Salaries, Legal Expenses, Town Officers Expenses and any other charges arising within the Town.
- Art. 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as are necessary to defray town charges in anticipation of taxes, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 4. To hear reports of agents, auditors and committees or officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relative thereto.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Maintenance of Highways, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of Highways and Bridges, Summer roads or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the purchase of a snow plow, or take any action relating thereto.

- Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for the purchase of a sander, or take any action relating thereto.
- Art. 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$685.47 provided the State will contribute \$4,569.81 for construction of Class V Highways, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for one year, for Pine Blister Rust Control, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Police Department or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$173.52 (six cents per \$1,000.00 of the Town's equalized valuation) to Monadnock Region Association, an agency to advertise, promote, and preserve the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with the other 37 Towns of the Monadnock Region, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 to repair Library Wall, and balance to be used to construct a raised sidewalk to protect said wall, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the support of the Fire Department or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be put in escrow for the purchase of a fire truck or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to purchase two oxygen breathing units on a matching funds program with the State C. D. Authority.
- Art. 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to purchase a new radio for the new tank truck on a matching funds program with the State.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to paint the outside of the Fire Station, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to purchase new hose for the new tank truck or take any action relative thereto.

- Art. 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the control of dust or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the support of the Stephenson Memorial Library or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept legacies and gifts given to the Town in Trust or otherwise by any individuals or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 24. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of Town Property acquired by the Tax Collector's Deeds or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Town Poor or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for the purpose of repairing the Belfry of the Town Hall, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to purchase the rest of the land on the East side of the Dump to the Stone wall, containing five acres more or less, or take any action relative thereto. (Article inserted by Harry A. Dorr, land owner.)
- Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to request the Planning Board to make a further study of the Parking Provisions around the Town Hall and Town Square and submit a report of their study at the 1968 March Town meeting. (Article inserted by Dorothy Gilbert, for G. I. A., Monadnock Area Development Comm., Hillsboro Cty. Dev. and Beautification committee.)
- Art. 29. To see if the Town will enact an Ordinance, to restrict all dogs unless leashed or accompanied by owner or some responsible person, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the School Property which contains the Tennis Court and Ball Field, or take any action relative thereto.
- Art. 31. To transact any other business that can legally come before this meeting.

TOWN MEETING, GREENFIELD, 1966

The meeting opened at 10 a.m. with Moderator, Frank A. Hopkins leading the Lord's Prayer. The checklist was read by Alton F. Tupper, Jr., with 409 names. The Challenging Act was omitted.

Article 1: Town Officers elected, 267 ballots cast.

Selectman (3 years), Anna M. Chute, 154 votes, Chester Russell, 118 votes.

Highway Agent (1 year): Aime Metivier, 158 votes, Maurice Belmore, 113 votes.

The meeting was recessed at 6:00 p. m., while the above ballots were counted. The meeting reopened at 8:00 p. m. to take up Article two of the warrant.

Motion made and seconded to omit the reading of the whole warrant. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 2: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate \$14,860.00 to cover town charges as estimated by the selectmen for the ensuing year. This amount includes the \$2,000.00 for the Fire Department Budget, as proposed in Article 16. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 3: Motion made and seconded to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as are necessary to defray town charges in anticipation of taxes. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 4: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00 toward paying the Town Debt and Interest, and the sum of \$6,000.00 to pay County Tax. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 5: Motion made and seconded to accept the reports of committees and officers as printed in the town report. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 6: Motion made and seconded to raise \$9,000.00 for Winter Maintenance of Highways. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 7: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate \$7,500.00 for the repairs of Highways and Bridges and Summer Roads. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 8: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$690.15 provided the State will contribute \$4,600.97 for construction of Class V Highways. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 9: Moved and seconded to pass over the article. Vote in the negative.

Motion made and seconded to raise \$125.00 for Pine Blister Rust Control. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 10: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100 for the support of the Police Department. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 11: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the Monadnock Region Association. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 12: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to resurface a portion of the sidewalk on Forest Road from the stop sign to or above the library entrance walk. Motion withdrawn following discussion.

Motion made and seconded to table the article till Article 19 has been dealt with. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 13: Moved and seconded to pass over the article for control of Dutch Elm disease, with a request that the Selectmen ask authorities to evaluate the disease's presence in Greenfield. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 14: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to install water and a septic tank at the Fire Station. Passed in the affirmative. (Permission from the School Board to use the school line to be obtained later.)

Article 15: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to change the present fire alarm system to a new Mutual Aid Tone System. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 16: Motion made and seconded to pass over the article as the Fire Department Budget was included under Article 2. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 17: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be set aside towards the purchase of a Fire Truck. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 18: Motion made and seconded to give the Fire Department permission to use approximately \$1,000.00 from the Truck Fund to equip and remodel the 1959 Oil Truck donated by Russell Fuel Oil Company to the Fire Department. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 19: Malcolm Atherton, chairman of the Post Office Study Committee, gave his report, suggesting the site between the library and Hopkins land as the best possible available site for a new Post Office.

Motion made and seconded to authorize the Selectmen to utilize said Town land for the purpose of building a building to house the Post Office and Town Offices. The motion did not pass after a standing vote: 45 in the affirmative, and 57 in the negative.

Motion made and seconded to return to Article 12. Passed in the affirmative.

- Article 12: Motion re-made and seconded to raise the sum of \$250.00 for forementioned resurfacing of sidewalk on Forest Road, Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 20: Motion made and seconded to pass over the article requesting appropriations for the purchase of a new loader for the Highway Department. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 21: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purchase of tar and sealer. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 22: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for dust control. Passed in the affirmative with a standing vote (34-28).
- Article 23: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$225.00 for Memorial Day. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 24: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the support of the Library. After discussion, motion was withdrawn.
- Motion was made and seconded to raise the sum of \$1,000. for the support of the Library, in hopes that the additional amount would enable the library to be open at least one night a week. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 25: Motion was made and seconded to accept legacies and gifts given to the Town in Trust or otherwise by individuals. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 26: Motion made and seconded to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of Town Property acquired by the Tax Collector's deeds. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 27: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200. for the Town Poor. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 28: Motion was made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250. to use in the celebration of the Town's 175th Anniversary. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 29: Motion made and seconded to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800. for improvements to the interior of the Town Hall. Passed in the affirmative.
- Article 30: Motion made and seconded to pass over the article to raise funds for State Appraisers to appraise new and improved property. Passed in the affirmative.

Article 31: Motion made and seconded that the Selectmen reappoint the same or appoint a new Post Office Study Committee to study the matter further. Passed in the affirmative.

Motion made and seconded to adjourn the Meeting. Passed in the affirmative. Meeting adjourned at 10:50 p. m.

Newly elected officers were called forth and sworn into office by moderator, Frank Hopkins.

HIGHWAY AGENT'S REPORT

In submitting the report below, I would like, first of all to thank the Townspeople and all those who in any way worked for me and in so doing, made my work more pleasant.

The men working on the snowplows and I wish to extend our thanks for the many cups of coffee and refreshments offered us even at late hours. It has been greatly appreciated.

All roads in town were dragged and graveled many times; where necessary all roads were raked during the season. Ditches were cleaned, culverts dug out and some replaced. Many stones were removed from the traveled parts, and more of this must be done. Oil and calcium chloride was applied on all roads where there was a dust problem.

This past year Duncan Monies were combined with summer maintenance funds and expended on the East road and the road leading past Floyd Cornwells to the Gulf road. All roads were plowed and sanded this winter, also the parking lots cleaned, church yard and center of town were kept clean

salted and sanded. I wish to thank all who were inconvenienced with our parking regulations. They are necessary. Please bear in mind that due to the increase in traffic and lower and faster cars maintaining roads is becoming more and more difficult and more requests are placed on the road agent.

I am sorry that at last year's meeting the request for a loader was turned down. I still feel that it is a piece of equipment the town cannot be without regardless of who is road agent. I make this statement with all due respect and thanks to the persons who have accommodated me this past year.

The tarred roads are still in poor condition, I feel again that special money should be raised to reseal another road this

year.

Last year I recommended that the New Boston road should be tarred. I still feel that this is one of the most heavily traveled roads in town. I would like to see this road finished this year with T.R.A. monies; this could be done and still have monies available to be used on other roads. The final decisions on the use of the T.R.A. monies is decided to the best of my knowledge by the Selectmen in cooperation with a State Man.

I repeat again that no money is raised for the care of buildings, grounds, equipment, fuel, electricity and phone calls. All monies spent for the forementioned must come out of the highway funds which are too little to begin with. Our buildings, machinery, trucks, etc. must be taken care of and the cost for same should not come from our highway funds.

As I have previously stated we have had to repair and make passable the road leading from Floyd Cornwells to the Gulf road. To my knowledge this road has never been used in the winter. There are three school children living on this road. We have no choice but to get them to school. Many loads of gravel have been put on this road and charged to summer maintenance, many hours of labor have been expended plus the use of the grader on this road. If this road is to be kept in permanent use a special fund will be required to take care of the problem.

I regret that I must show an overdraft on my summer roads. The Selectmen have been understanding in this situation, but with the appropriations and requests from taxpayers the work expected from this department and the amount raised

for same is ridiculous.

This past year I have worked on summer maintenance 75% of the time by myself. This in part was caused by insufficient funds and too low an hourly rate for a helper. I hope this situation will be taken care of this year. At present the road agent is paid \$1.76 per hour, no benefits of any kind, no

overtime, and is expected to be on duty 24 hours a day. His helper is paid \$1.50 an hour, put both figures together for 40 hours a week which is low and you come up with salaries amounting to \$6,780 more or less and this does not include cost of running equipment, rent of equipment, materials and cost of repairs.

I do not wish to sound critical, I would like to see all roads in beautiful condition and whether it be myself or someone else as road agent I think my criticisms are justified.

FIRE RECORD

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966.)

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

1. A closely coordinated and integrated state-town organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.

2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires on this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres... a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

- 1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. except on rainy days. Permits are not needed when the ground is covered with snow. To minimize risk the best way to dispose of rubbish is at your authorized town or municipal dumping area.
 - 2. Be sure all discarded smoking material is out.
 - 3. Don't leave a live camp or cooking fire.
- 4. Most important—instruct your children that matches are not play things.

In various ways we have contributed to the development of the Region along cultural and educational lines to the end that such advantages are apparent and a factor in inducing desirable and valuable people to locate in the Monadnock Region.

Your Region Association will tackle any problem advancing the livability of the area of the Monadnocks for natives, visitors or new residents.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Greenfield, I respectfully submit my ninth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

STAFF AND INSTRUCTION

Very fortunately, only one change in staff was necessary in the Greenfield School this year. Mr. Bob Rogers of Lyndeborough, New Hampshire was hired as Principal and teacher of grades five and six, replacing Mr. James Holmes. Mr. Rogers has had elementary teaching experience within the Supervisory Union and recently received his Master's Degree in Elementary

Guidance at the University of New Hampshire.

The School Lunch Program which experienced some staffing difficulties last year was fortunate in being able to hire the Services of Mrs. Ellen Robertson of Hancock, New Hampshire to run the School Lunch Program and Mrs. Eva Gagnon, School Board Member, agreed to handle the books. The Lunch Program has been experiencing some difficulty in making ends meet financially because of the limited number of children participating in the program. With the coming of the winter months, it is hoped that enrollment will increase to the point where the program can stay out of the "red."

The Lunch Program was originally developed as an added school service to insure a well balanced hot meal for children at reasonable cost, but if greater support is not shown, the School Board and the community will have to take a hard look at the program to see if the costs to the district are justifiable. The closing of the program, if this is deemed necessary, would certainly be a move which would be contrary to the best interests of a number of children of the community who need this kind

of service.

Now that schools are in satisfactory operation, time has dimmed the anguish that this superintendent and many other superintendents in the state experienced in finding teachers for the current school year. This year the teacher shortage was even more severe than in any year in the past and it can be expected that the situation is going to become more of a problem with each coming year. This is not a situation which is peculiar to the State of New Hampshire, but is a nation-wide problem.

There are several reasons for the unusual teacher shortage:

First, increased elementary and secondary enrollments; second, new educational programs stimulated by Federal financial assistance and local interest that have drawn off a number of teachers; third, migration of teachers to higher salaried positions in industry and also to other nearby states; and fourth, the inability of our State educational training institutions to accept all those who are interested in going into

teaching because of a lack of sufficient facilities. These situa-

tions are **not** going to be immediately resolved.

Greenfield was quite fortunate in having a full complement of teachers, as were all the other towns in the Supervisory Union, since a report issued by the State Department of Education indicated that as of August 30, 1966, just prior to the opening of school, there were still 158 classrooms that had no teachers. 96 of these vacancies were in the elementary school, 44 in the secondary school and 18 in special classes.

The simplest way to solve this problem is to use every means available to the local district to encourage the present staff to stay in their positions and continue as teachers in the Greenfield School. One of the best ways of doing this is to try to insure that there will not be a migration into other communities by providing salaries which meet the competition in the area. Within the budget presented to the district this year, fair salary

increases are being requested to meet this need.

BUILDING AND GROUNDS

Considering the age and structure of the building, it is fair to say that the school is in good condition and is as well adapted to meeting the educational needs of children as can be expected.

A small bit of construction is being recommended within the building to provide a space for physical examinations to be made by the doctor with some semblance of privacy, and to

also use this same space for small group instruction.

A definite policy should be established by representatives of the town and the school district to determine exactly where responsibility for the maintenance and care of the tennis court. skating rink area and Little League ballfield lies. This responsibility seems to be a "No Man's Land," where neither group, town or school, is sure who is charged to do the job. It is recommended that these two groups establish responsibility for the entire calendar year. As long as the present situation continues, these excellent facilities will deteriorate because of a lack of proper care.

FINANCE

There are several areas in the budget where major increases are being recommended to the district. The matter of Teachers' Salaries has already been referred to and an increase of approximately \$1400 is a MUST if the present staff can hopefully be expected to return another year. The increase of \$200 in Custodian's salary is not as it appears since the Board has included within this salary, responsibilities that originally were assigned under Item No. 790 and paid to the custodian. Under Item No. 630, a major part of the increase lies with the use of Wakk Off Rugs at entrances to the school to prevent the tracking in of salt, grit and grime. These rugs give the floor more adequate protection than ever has been possible before. Under the No. 900 Series, an increase of \$200 in district money is allocated the Noon Lunch Program to provide support in case this need should develop in the coming year. The primary increase in the budget takes place in Item No. 1477.1, Tuitions, where an increased enrollment at the high school level and increased costs at the Peterborough School, namely \$726 per high school pupil and \$520 per junior high school pupil, results in a net increase of approximately \$9,000. Under No. 1477.3, the costs for the Supervisory Union expenses increase by a little over \$300 to provide for a more adequate superintendent's salary and additional salary and equipment for the Supervisory Union office. These increases, together with other minor increases and decreases, result in a Total Appropriation to meet the School Board's Budget of \$78,178., an increase of about \$11,000 over that requested for the operation of the school this year.

On the Income side of the ledger, very modest receipts are expected for the year 1967-68. It is not expected that any balance will exist since our usual source of a balance, namely, Tuitions, actually at this time shows a possible deficit of almost \$2,000. The Total Income estimated is \$4,200, resulting in a Net Assessment for school purposes of almost \$74,000. When this figure is compared with the assessment of the current school year, a very marked increase is shown, almost \$20,000. It must be remembered, however, that in the current school year; '66-67, almost \$9,000 was on hand from the '65-66 Budget to reduce the assessment for the operation of the schools. We cannot anticipate a balance such as this for the proposed budget and, therefore, the assessment is increased by these two factors . . . increased budget costs of about \$11,000, and a decrease in income of about \$9,000, resulting in the \$20,000 difference.

COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY

By the time action is taken on the proposed budget, a determination will have been made as to the organizational structure within which the town of Greenfield will be operating as of July 1968. It seems that this Con-Val Co-op will come into being in some form, and thus Greenfield will have taken one additional step towards a better educational offering for its children. The more centralized administrative organization is better suited to meet educational needs and has the tax base to easily provide necessary funds. Greenfield should be thankful for committee member citizens who devoted much time and effort to this landmark reorganization plan. Greenfield will be a better town to live in because of their efforts and the resultant reorganization.

CONCLUSION

I want to compliment teachers of the Greenfield School for the excellent job that they have been doing this year in meeting the needs of their children. Their efforts have been complemented by the efforts of the Noon Lunch Operator and the custodian to provide a school program and atmosphere which

insures good education for Greenfield children.

The local school board has been most understanding of school problems and worked hard to solve them. Transportation problems have plagued us all year and Board members have spent much time in unsnarling the knots.

Certainly a school can be no better than the community that it serves, and the Greenfield School has been successful

through community interest and spirit of helpfulness.
