A Report by Your Selectmen

The year 1954 was a costly one for two reasons; first, the town raised more money than was anticipated in the budget, and secondly was the cost of building the Cheever Road under State Aid Construction. As a result we had a net debt of \$1,235.96 at the end of the year as compared with a surplus of \$8,473.86 at the beginning of 1954.

We borrowed \$5,000.00 on a five year note to be paid off at the rate of \$1,000.00 per year plus interest at $2\frac{1}{2}\%$, in accordance with the vote of the Town Meeting of 1952.

Whereas we have been able to keep our tax rate in the neighborhood of \$3.00 per hundred for the past few years by using part of the cash surplus to reduce the rate we can see no way to avoid a substantial increase for the year of 1955. In fact if we appropriate all the amounts which we have been asked to include in our town warrant, our tax rate will be in the neighborhood of \$4.00 per hundred.

As the articles of the warrant are self-explanatory, we have figured the 1955 budget with the possibility that all these appropriations may be raised.

We selectmen are voicing no opinion on the articles in the Town Warrant. We rely upon the judgement of the voters of the Town of Groton.



Superintendent's Report

We guite often see articles in newspapers and magazines written by nationally syndicated columnists "panning" education and "telling" educators what ought to be done. Simply because one becomes an authority in the field of politics, foreign affairs, farm subsidies, or even football, does not qualify one as an expert in all things. The expert on what can be done in an upgraded rural school is to be found in an upgraded rural school; the expert on what can be done in a small high school is to be found in the small high school. These columnist experts are unacquainted with the "educational facts of life" and will remain so until such time as they actually spend a year, more or less, in an actual situation teaching the pupils themselves. Of course they can not afford to do this and a quick, superficial survey plus a few interviews and a posed picture or two must be the basis of material for an expression of opinion. Unfortunate it is that their opinions are so widely read, and believed. Now all of us in the educational field can improve our work and have the potential of always doing a better job. Much remains to be discovered and learned in the field of human conduct, but for a college president or a noted columnist to write that all pupils in high school should have a couple of years of Latin, or three years of college preparatory mathematics is too absurd to merit additional space. Our pupils must be taught to read current publications with the proverbial grain of salt. Freedom of the press is not license, and carries on its shoulders the greatest of responsibilities.

Once again we enter a legislative year with political leaders of both parties pledged to no new sources of tax revenue which simply means that the local property tax will continue to bear the major part of increased costs of educating our children. Even granting the possibility of a stable economy, costs of education will increase where: 1) There are significant increases in the school population; 2) There is need of extensive remodeling or new buildings; 3) Where new educational offerings become necessary; 4) Where there is competition for teachers. There is an old, and elementary, law to be found in any high school text book that where there is a limited supply and an increasing demand for a commodity the price will increase. Numerically there will be a shortage of teachers for many years ahead; qualitatively speaking there is always a shortage. Teachers have the benefit now of being in the driver's seat of a "selling market." Until such time as state aid becomes available in sufficient quantity to absorb these increasing costs the local property

owner will pay the bill. Only when this condition has been met will state aid, in still larger quantities, be of any great value in lessening the burden on the property owner. If you, as a property owner, are willing to absorb these costs there is, and will be, no need of new taxes; if you really want tax relief new sources of revenue are necessary, in the opinion of the writer. To say that it doesn't make any difference because the consumer pays the bill anyway is to overlook the fact that different people consume different things, and all consumers in the State of New Hampshire do not live here "the year round" nor do they all own property! There are several towns in this union which could well use several times the aid now being received. Other towns can not have modern buildings until special building aid is allocated from a higher level either state or federal. What do you want for your children? Are you willing to "pay the freight" on present tax bases? These are the vital questions. The squeaky wheel gets the grease. Legislators have sensitive ears!

As voted at the last school district meeting, an artesian well has been drilled at a cost of \$1035. The balance of the \$1500 has been used to get the pump and tank installed and water to the sink. It will be necessary to raise and appropriate an additional sum of \$600 to complete the plumbing necessary for flush toilets, to make a drain field and to get enough heat into toilets to prevent freezing. We were fortunate in securing a low price of \$5.75 per foot for the well due in part to the fact that Alexandria needed a well too. were less fortunate in that a depth of 180 feet was necessary to secure enough water; this in turn required a sizeable motor and pump. We are fortunate in Groton in that no major building changes are necessary as has been true in several other schools, making a savings of about \$2800 or more. When completed the Groton School will be a very satisfactory building for its type. At some future time it would be desirable to improve the artificial lighting, probably by adding more of the same type of fixtures. The ceiling has also been insulated and the building painted for the most part with completion promised in the spring. A well-kept building is a good advertisement for any town. Relatively small amounts regularly spent over a period of years should keep this building in fine condition.

Supervisory Union #4 Budget

N. H. Laws Chapter 135, paragraph 43. "The school boards of the several districts forming a supervisory union shall meet between April first and June first in each year at a time and place fixed by the chairmen of the several boards, and organize by choosing a chairman, a secretary and a treasurer. They shall, when necessary, nominate a superintendent or superintendents, fix the salary or salaries, and apportion the same among the several districts and certify the apportionment to their respective treasurers and to the state board of education."

Chapter 135, paragraph 47. "At a meeting held before January first of each year the supervisory union board shall adopt a budget required for the expenses of the supervisory union for the next fiscal year, which budget may include the salary and expenses of supervisors of health, physical education, music, art and guidance, and any other employees, and expenses necessary for the operation of the supervisory union.....The basis for apportionment shall be one-half on the average membership of the previous school year and one-half on the last adjusted (Ch. 157, 1951) valuation of the district."

The chart of expenses is based on action taken by the union.



- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to the Newfound Region Chamber of Commerce, for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, in cooperation with other Towns in the Newfound Region.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to maintain the recreation area and beach at Spectacle Pond.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used for the improvement of the grounds of the Hebron-Groton Athletic Association.

- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the purchase of fire apparatus or take any action thereon.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to organize a volunteer fire department, or take any action thereon.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.
- 13. If the foregoing article is adopted, to see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to execute on behalf of the Town the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the Town will designate the Town Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to call regular Town meetings at any other time than has been the past custom or to authorize the Selectmen to call any meeting at an hour which in their judgement would be most convenient for the voters of the Town. This article if accepted to be effective until such date as other action may be taken.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to abolish the offices of North End Road Agent, South End Road Agent, and Snow Removal Agent and create one office to be called Highway Surveyor—the holder of this office to be given supervision of both summer and winter maintenance of the entire Town.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to cause the office of Highway Surveyor to appear on the ballot at the next annual meeting and to omit the offices of North End Road Agent, South End Road Agent and Snow Removal Agent from said ballot.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary for the office of Highway Surveyor.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to regulate the hours, payrolls and any other matters that may arise concerning the administration of the office of Highway Surveyor.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow an amount not to exceed \$3,500.00 and to issue serial notes or bonds in this amount for the purpose of

tarring the River Road in conjunction with the State TRA plan; the principal of this loan to be paid off in two years by using TRA money as appropriated by the Town and State.

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$223.00 for Town Road Aid, the State to contribute \$1,486.69.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be used for constructing, reconstructing, and surfacing the Cheever Road.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to confirm the Selectmen's action in obtaining Workmen's Compensation for Town employees and for insuring the Town House against fire.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate sums of money sufficient for the remaining items of the budget.
- 24. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.
